TUESDAY, January 11, 1972.

At 12 o'clock noon, this being the time and place appointed by the Constitution for the assembling of the Legislature, the Senate was called to order by Mr. Henry H. Patterson.

Justice Hadyn Proctor administered the oath of office to President Bateman.

On motion of Mr. Beadleston the journal of the previous session was approved and its further reading was dispensed with.

Mr. Bateman addressed the Senate as follows:

The 195th Session of the New Jersey Senate is underway. All signs point to a busy, important, and I am sure, sometimes difficult two years.

Right now, we have nearly 400 pre-filed Senate bills. Many of them are significant. Over 100 more bills will be ready for introduction next week.

The 40 of us will be called on in this two-year session to make many tough decisions. It will be a session to put party politics aside! Let me take time to mention just a few of the problems we face.

Congressional redistricting is first on the agenda. The majority kept its promise and did not attempt to redistrict during the lame duck session. Now, a bi-partisan Legislature must redistrict in a hurry. To give New Jersey voters adequate time to select primary candidates, redistricting must be finished by the end of March at the latest.

In these next two years we will be called on to develop, to approve and to schedule major bond issues in the penal and institutions areas as well as in the transportation field.

New Jersey's version of no-fault insurance is ready for early legislative action now that Assemblyman Raymond's commission has reported. This should be an early action!

For much too long we've ducked our responsibility to reform our election laws. This is the session to do something!

High on our first year priorities must be prison reform programs. I hope the new Institutions, Health and Welfare Committee will hold early hearings to determine our direction.

We must face many other priorities in this session, among them CATV regulation, PERC law changes, college aid, additional urban assistance, court reform, and workmen's compensation revision.

I'm sure our biggest headaches in 1972 will be the new budget and increased taxation. The need for additional funds to pay for many new urban, educational and environmental programs has already been forecast by Governor Cahill. Our budget and tax responsibilities could well keep us in Trenton right up to the budget deadline. I hope not. But tax programs do not (and should not) come easily in any Legislature—and especially in one where a different party controls each House.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 11, 1972

In the past few years, the New Jersey Senate has been strong, decisive and responsible in trying to meet the problems of this most urban state in the nation. This year several of our great senators are gone. But, despite these losses, I think the 195th Senate could well be one of the best.

Each of our new senators brings special assets to this body. Many of you have come over from the Assembly. Some of you bring valuable experience in county and municipal government.

I say this could become the best Senate because it is the best equipped. In a few weeks each of our 10 new committees will be permanently housed in new quarters—each will have full-time professional staff help.

Many of the legislative improvement recommendations made by Senator Beadleston's Commission will start right now in the Senate. The new Office of Fiscal Affairs will organize in the next 60 days. The new conflicts law is now in effect. So is the new regulation of lobbyists. Permanent staff under the Law Revision and Legislative Services Commission has steadily expanded. Our partisan staff will be expanded this year.

We have to be better equipped—because shortly we must meet two of the most dramatic challenges any New Jersey Legislature has ever faced. First will be the forthcoming report of the Governor's Tax Study Commission. We will be expected to study it, to react to it, to expose it to public hearings. We can't run away from its realities.

The second challenge may be closely related to the first. In California and in Texas, as you know, the courts have ruled that the property tax does not permit equal educational opportunity in the local communities. We know that New Jersey's property tax provides 74% of the public education total. This is higher than the court-rejected percentages in California and Texas.

We can meet this second big challenge by fully funding the so-called Bateman formula. Or we can accept some other equitable solution from the Sears Commission. Whatever we do must be done before the end of this two-year session. And we must accept the fact that it will mean a substantial increase in state taxation.

You've heard me declare more than once that state government is more and more becoming the place where the

action is. To meet the requirements of an ever-changing society—to respond to the needs of seven million souls—we must constantly re-examine the basic concepts and functions of state government. One result of this reappraisal is the new steam we've pumped into the Office of Consumer Protection.

The time has come in New Jersey for another reappraisal, for the creation of two new positions—lieutenant governor and ombudsman. The need for both offices has been adequately documented.

Senator Musto and I have pre-filed bills to accomplish both goals. We want to get them approved in 1972. Having served as acting governor a number of times in the past two years, I know first hand how desperately the Governor of New Jersey needs an alter ego to assume some of his administrative and ceremonial responsibilities. And if we are to maintain the constitutional separation of powers, this post is essential.

The post of ombudsman is another concept that has come of age. Big government, as necessary as it is, requires an independent advocate for the people, to help those who get caught up in bureaucratic red tape. He can also help those running the government by investigating and exposing inefficiency, corruption and abuse of power by government employees.

Thank you—all of you—for your vote of confidence. I ask all of you on both sides of the aisle, to help make the 195th Senate the best ever. This will be an exciting session and I look forward to working closely with you.

On motion of Mr. Stout, seconded by Mr. Crabel, Mr. Patterson was nominated to be Secretary of the Senate.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 11, 1972

President Bateman administered the oath of office to Mr. Patterson.

The following Senate Concurrent Resolution was read for the first time by its title and adopted by voice vote:

Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 28, by Mr. Woodcock.

Mr. Beadleston offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Senate await upon His Excellency, the Governor, and inform him that the Senate has organized and elected Honorable Raymond H. Bateman, of the County of Somerset, President, and Henry H. Patterson, of the County of Monmouth, Secretary, and is now ready to proceed to business and also to receive any communications that he may forward.

Mr. Beadleston offered the following resolutions, which were read and adopted:

Resolved, That there be employed for each Senator, Legislative Aides, to be designated by him, at an aggregate salary of \$7,500.00 payable in the same manner as all other Senate employees, for the legislative year.

Resolved, That unless otherwise ordered, the daily sessions of the Senate shall begin on Mondays at 2 p.m. and on Thursdays at 11 a.m.

Resolved, That the Legislative Manual be distributed to the Senate on the same basis as for the session of 1970-71.

Resolved, That 1,000 copies of each bill, joint resolution and concurrent resolution, and each Official Copy Reprint be printed for the use of the Senate.

Resolved, That the Committee on Ways and Means be authorized to procure bill files and the necessary stationery and supplies for the use of members and officers of the Senate.

Resolved, That the President of the Senate is hereby directed to instruct the printer to mail to each member of the Senate, at his residence and business address, at least one copy of each bill and resolution, both Senate and General Assembly, as soon as the same is printed.

Resolved, That 500 copies of the weekly Senate Journal be printed and the printer directed to mail copies to each

member of the Senate and General Assembly and to clerical officers of each body.

Resolved, That the Rules of the Senate for 1971 are adopted temporarily as the Rules of the Senate for 1972 subject to the following amendments:

1. Amend Rule 74 to read as follows:

74. The following Standing Reference[.] and Administrative [and Special] Committees, and Joint Committees shall be appointed, by the President, at the commencement of each annual session, and shall serve for the entire legislative year, unless otherwise ordered, that is to say:

The *Revenue, Finance and Appropriations Committee* shall consist of ten members, [and] the *Judiciary Committee* shall consist of eleven members, all other Standing

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Reference committees shall consist of five members; the Rules and Order Committee shall consist of **[seven]** *five* members, all other Standing Administrative Committees shall consist of five members; the membership of the Senate on the Ethical Standards Committee shall consist of four members; the membership of the Senate on all other Joint Committees shall consist of five members**[**; and the Investigating Committee shall consist of six members**]**.

2. Amend paragraph c. of Rule 102 to read as follows:

102. . . .

c. After numbering and listing each bill and resolution, the Secretary shall make available one copy to the legislative correspondents, as the President may direct, and shall deliver the original and two copies to the *Judiciary* Committee **[on Revision and Amendment of the Laws]** for examination as to form.

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of New Jersey (the General Assembly concurring):

That the printer be directed to furnish, as soon as printed and without waiting for the regular distribution, the number and copies of each bill, joint resolution and concurrent resolution introduced in the Senate and General Assembly, each committee substitute therefor, each official copy reprint thereof, and each printed amendment thereof, herein designated, to the following:

The Governor—21

The Secretary of State—40

The Attorney General—4

Law Revision and Legislative Services—15

State Library Reference Bureau, for use of said Bureau and for exchange with other States—200

Be It Further Resolved, That the printer likewise furnish to the State Library Legislative Reference Bureau 20 copies of each weekly installment of the Senate Journal and Minutes of the General Assembly.

WHEREAS, Section 52:27B-15 of the Revised Statutes requires that a request officer be appointed, and the act regulating receipts and disbursements requires the desig-

nation of approval officers for the payment of the necessary expenses of all divisions of the government; therefore,

Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of New Jersey (the General Assembly concurring):

That the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the General Assembly be designated as request officers for the Legislature for the legislative year.

Resolved, That the "Official Manual for use in Drafting Legislation for Introduction in the New Jersey Legislature," prepared and published by the Law Revision and Legislative Services, be adopted as the official manual of practice and procedure of the Senate governing the form of bills to be introduced in the Senate and governing the conduct of the preliminary examination of bills proposed for introduction in the Senate required by the Rules of the Senate; and

Be It Further Resolved, That in order to carry out said practice and procedure, William M. Lanning, H. Arthur Smith, Jr., Mary Joan Dickson, Walter Kennedy, John M. Lore, Gertrude Erman, Bonnie Danser, and E. Powers Mincher be designated as counsel to the Judiciary Committee of the Senate, and that the duties of such counsel shall be to conduct said preliminary examination of bills proposed for introduction in the Senate under the general supervision of the Chairman of said committee and through the Division of Bill Drafting Services pursuant to law.

1. Amend Rule 74 to read as follows:

74. The following Standing Reference [.,] and Administrative [and Special] Committees, and Joint Committees shall be appointed, by the President, at the commencement of each annual session, and shall serve for the entire legislative year, unless otherwise ordered, that is to say:

The *Revenue, Finance and Appropriations Committee* shall consist of ten members, [and] the *Judiciary Committee* shall consist of eleven members, all other Standing Reference committees shall consist of five members; the *Rules and Order Committee* shall consist of [seven] five members, all other Standing Administrative Committees shall consist of five members; the membership of the Senate on the *Ethical Standards Committee* shall consist of four members; the membership of the Senate on all other Joint

Committees shall consist of five members[; and the Investigating Committee shall consist of six members].

2. Add the following Rules 83A to 83E to follow Rule 83:

83A. The Chairman of each Standing Reference Committee shall cause to be filed with the Secretary of the Senate a written report of each meeting of the Committee indicating (1) the date of the meeting, (2) the names of the Committee members in attendance, (3) the vote of each member present on a motion to report a bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution favorably, unfavorably, with amendments, by committee substitute or without recommendation, (4) the number of any bill or resolution on which committee action has been requested by the prime sponsor of a Senate bill or resolution or a Senator acting on behalf of the prime sponsor of an Assembly bill or resolution and the date of receipt by the Committee of the request.

83B. The Chairman of each Standing Reference Committee, in reporting a bill or resolution, shall cause a Statement in duplicate, explaining the provisions and purposes of the bill or resolution, including any amendments thereto recommended by the Committee, to be filed with the Secretary of the Senate, one copy of which shall be delivered to the Supervisor of Bills for printing, if required.

A Statement explaining the provisions and purposes of an Assembly bill or resolution on which no Statement is printed, to which no Assembly Committee Statement is appended or as to which the Senate committee desires to append supplementary or corrective Statement shall also accompany the report of an Assembly bill or resolution.

A Statement explaining the impact of amendments, or a committee substitute recommended as to a bill or resolution which originated in the General Assembly shall similarly be filed upon the reporting of an Assembly bill or resolution.

83C. The Supervisor of Bills shall have printed, for distribution as in the case of printed bills, the Statement accompanying the report by a committee of a bill or resolution unless such Statement shall state that the Statement appended to and printed with the bill or resolution adequately explains its provisions as reported.

83D. The prime sponsor of any Senate bill or resolution, or a Senator acting on behalf of the prime sponsor of an

Assembly bill or resolution, referred to a standing reference committee may file a written request with the Committee Chairman for consideration thereof, receipt of which request the Chairman shall report to the committee at its next meeting. Upon the expiration of 60 calendar days after the receipt of such a request, plus the number of days of any intervening recess of the Senate continuing for 21 or more days, unless the bill or resolution shall have been considered by the Committee and there were less than a majority of the members of the committee concurring on a motion made to report it, the Committee to which the bill or resolution was referred shall be relieved of further consideration thereof and the Chairman shall deliver the bill to the Secretary of the Senate who shall announce receipt thereof at the next meeting of the Senate; but no such bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution proposing an amendment to the Constitution, shall be accorded second reading except upon adoption of a motion therefor.

83E. The Chairman of a standing reference committee shall cause at least one week's notice to be given to the Chairman of the Revenue, Finance and Appropriations Committee of his committee's intention to report any bill which would appropriate, or appear by its terms to require expenditure of \$50,000 or more of State funds. This rule is not applicable when the committee report is accompanied by a motion that the bill be accorded second reading by special order.

3. Amend paragraph e. of Rule 105 to read as follows:

105. . . .

e. Amendments to bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions adopted during their progress through the Senate shall be printed separately. [but a] A General Assembly bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution[, so] amended by the Senate[,] shall [not] be reprinted with such amendments included therein as a "*Senate Reprint*" of the General Assembly bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution. [unless and until] When such amendments shall have been concurred in by the General Assembly there shall be a further printing as the "*Official Copy Reprint*" of the bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution as passed by both Houses.

4. Amend Rule 106 to read as follows:

106. In reprinting bills, joint resolutions or concurrent resolutions, which have been amended in the Senate or in the General Assembly, with the amendments included, a legend shall be added at the top of the print¹, following the date of introduction,² indicating that the bill has been amended, the House or Houses by which it was amended and the date or dates upon which it was amended.

5. Amend the second paragraph of Rule 109 to read as follows:

109. . . .

The Supervisor of Bills shall forthwith have printed all such amendments and in addition he shall have reprinted all Senate bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions originating in the Senate and amended therein, with the amendments included therein¹, but no other bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution shall be reprinted, except by order of the President². *The Supervisor of Bills shall also have printed Senate Reprints of all bills, joint resolutions and concurrent resolutions originating in the General Assembly and amended by the Senate.* One copy of each amendment ^[so] to a Senate or Assembly bill or resolution adopted by the Senate shall be delivered by the Secretary to the Judiciary Committee ^[on Revision and Amendment of Laws] for examination immediately after its adoption.

6. Amend Rule 111 to read as follows:

111. The Supervisor of Bills shall have printed every bill ^[and], joint resolution, and every concurrent resolution that were originally printed, originating in the Senate, which shall have been amended in the Senate and ordered to a third or final reading which shall be known and designated as "Official Copy Reprint." *The Supervisor of Bills shall also have printed every bill, joint resolution and every concurrent resolution, originating in the General Assembly and amended in the Senate, and ordered to a third or final reading, which shall be known as "Senate Reprint" of an Assembly Bill or resolution.* The Supervisor of Bills shall deliver eighty copies of all bills, joint resolutions and such concurrent resolutions designated as "Official Copy Reprint" or "Senate Reprint" to the Clerk of the General Assembly, and forty copies to the Secretary.

7. Amend Rule 115 to read as follows:

115. The Supervisor of Bills shall affix his official stamp to each page of the copy, to be used as an official copy and intended to be submitted to the Governor for his approval of each bill or joint resolution ordered to a third reading when the same is found to be correct [and shall deliver the same to the chairman of the Committee on Printed Bills.]

[It shall be the duty of said Committee to examine all bills, joint resolutions, and concurrent resolutions which are required to be read three times, before they shall be put upon third reading, to ascertain whether or not they have been correctly printed, and if so to report the same to the Senate and the Senate shall cause to be entered upon the Journal that the same have been correctly printed. The Chairman of said Committee shall deliver the official copy of the bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution to the President,] and said copy shall be used on third reading of the bill, joint resolution or concurrent resolution.

8. Add the following Rule to follow Rule 142:

142A. Whenever any member of the Senate shall desire to introduce any bill, which if enacted, would increase or decrease county, municipal, school or special district revenues or require an increase in expenditures by any thereof, he may request, in writing, the preparation and certification to him a fiscal note containing an estimate in dollars of the amount by which county, municipal, school or special district revenues or expenditures would be increased or decreased. Such a request for a fiscal note shall be processed in the manner prescribed by Rules 137 through 142.

Whenever the preparation and certification of a fiscal note with respect to a bill which would affect county, municipal, school or special district revenues or expenditures would require an extended period of time and unduly impede consideration of the bill by the Senate, the Legislative Budget and Finance Director may so certify together with the best estimates of the fiscal impact of the bill as can be ascertained within a reasonable amount of time and such a certification shall constitute compliance with the requirements for provision of a fiscal note.

SENATE BILL NO. 282

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 282, with my objections for reconsideration.

The Senate Bill No. 282 amends the definition of “income” for senior citizens tax deductions to exclude social

security payments, Federal Railroad Retirement Act payments and federal, state, county and municipal pensions or disability payments.

I am completely in accord with the purpose and intent of this bill. However, due to the enactment on February 15, 1972 of Chapter 441 of the Laws of 1971, a conflict has arisen between this bill and the present law. The signing of this bill in its present form would result in a repeal of the reduction of the three year residency requirement to one year, and reestablish the three year period. I do not think this would be advisable and believe that the bill should be amended before it is signed.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 282 for reconsideration and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 2, Section 1, Line 34: Delete "3" and insert "1".

This concurrent resolution would place on the ballot at the next general election a proposed constitutional amendment to abolish the County Courts. The jurisdiction and judges of the County Courts would be transferred to the Superior Court.

Under the provisions of this proposed constitutional amendment, the number of judges of the Superior Court would be totally determined by law. It would be required that the judges of the Superior Court include residents of each county equal to the number of authorized positions for county court judges in each county as of July 1, 1972. The residency of each judge would be determined as of the time of his appointment.

The proposed amendment would also require that there be one part of one division of the Superior Court in each county. That part would be required to have at least one judge who at the time of his assignment to sit was a resident of that county.

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 189, without my approval, for the following reasons:

This bill amends the law relating to the use of I. D. cards for the establishment of age 21 in the purchase of alcoholic

beverages. It would relieve the alcoholic beverage licensee from the responsibility of obtaining a written statement from the youthful purchaser, in addition to the I.D. card, that the purchaser is, in fact, 21 years of age. Further, this bill repeals a section of the law which provides that the presentation of an I.D. card shall not relieve the alcoholic beverage licensee of any obligations or responsibilities otherwise imposed on him by law.

With the enactment into law of Senate Bill No. 992 of 1972, the age of majority has been reduced from 21 to 18. This permits the purchase of alcoholic beverages by persons 18 years of age and over. In light of this substantial change in the law which has direct application to the purchase of alcoholic beverages, I do not feel it is appropriate at this time to make another substantial change in the alcoholic beverage law regarding the establishment and proof of legal age for purchase.

Accordingly, I feel that I must return Senate Bill No. 189 without my approval.

SENATE BILL No. 706

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 706, without my approval, for the following reasons:

Senate Bill No. 706 would enable New Jersey to become a signator to an interstate environmental compact with other jurisdictions which adopt a substantially similar law "in accordance with applicable Federal legislation" as referred to in Article 4 of the proposed legislation. It purports to allow New Jersey to participate in the national environmental protection program pursuant to a bill which failed of passage in the last session of the Congress in Washington, United States Senate Bill No. 907. That Federal bill had been amended so that Senate Bill No. 706 would appear not even to have met the requirements of the last version of the Federal bill. Since the United States Congress has not finished considering a bill to grant pre-consent to states entering environmental compacts and such legislation has not been adopted yet and is subject to perhaps even further changes, it would appear that Senate Bill No. 706 is premature.

If the Federal legislation is passed and it becomes desirable to enter into environmental compacts, then appropriate legislation which meets the requirements of Federal law, the laws of other states and the specific circumstances may be considered.

I am, therefore, returning Senate Bill No. 706 without my approval.

SENATE BILL No. 711

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 711, without my approval, for the following reasons:

This bill would provide a system of absolute preferences based upon residency in the initial appointment of municipal policemen and firemen by separating applicants into the following classes:

- I—Residents of the municipality.
- II—Other residents of the county in which the municipality is situated.
- III—Other residents of the State.
- IV—All other qualified applicants.

In making appointments, the appointing authority would first appoint all those eligible in Class I, and then those in each succeeding class.

Veterans would receive preference over non-veterans in their particular class but would not receive preference over non-veterans in a preceding class.

Insofar as this bill would apply to municipalities which have adopted Civil Service, it is unconstitutional. It violates Article VII, Section I, Paragraph 2 of the New Jersey Constitution which provides:

“Appointments and promotions in the Civil Service of the State, and of such political subdivisions as may be provided by law, shall be made according to merit and fitness to be ascertained, as far as practicable, by examination, which, as far as practicable, shall be competitive; except that preference in appointments by reason of active service in any branch of the military or naval forces of the United States in time of war may be provided by law.”

The bill would substitute residency either within the municipality, county or State in place of the merit and fitness ascertained by competitive examination as the basis for initial appointment in violation of the Constitutional mandate.

Aside from the Constitutional problem, S-711 has other substantial defects which prevent me from signing it. Rather than upgrading the quality of appointments to the police and fire departments, it has the potential of downgrading the caliber of these appointments. Residents of the municipality, county or State with low qualifying test scores would be appointed prior to persons with higher scores who are not residents of, first, the municipality; next, the county; or, finally, the State.

Further, this legislation would provide no assurance that a policeman or fireman, once appointed on the basis of his local residence, would continue to reside within the municipality, county or State. There is no requirement that he continue such local residence during the term of his service, nor is there any incentive to do so. Further, there is no similar requirement for purposes of promotional examinations. Once appointed, he could move his residence freely. Experience has shown that a great number of policemen and firemen do, in fact, move out of the municipality after their appointment.

Another questionable feature of this bill is its effect on veterans' preference. Under existing law, veterans who qualify for appointment to the police and fire departments are placed at the top of the eligibility list. Disabled veterans are, in turn, placed at the head of the veterans' grouping. Under the provisions of S-711, veterans, including the disabled, who are not residents of the municipality, county or State cannot be appointed until after residents of each group in turn (who may or may not be veterans) are first appointed. This would, in effect, destroy New Jersey's laws and time-honored tradition under the Constitution providing a preference in appointment for veterans. I strongly oppose such a weakening of our veterans' preference laws.

In addition, the bill has several administrative shortcomings. Instead of the present single list of persons eligible for appointment with all veterans at the head of the list, four separate lists of eligibles would be required, each with veterans grouped according to their residency class. Further, the bill does not specify at what point in time the applicant must be a resident to qualify for the preference—whether at the time of advertising for testing, the time of testing or the time of appointment—nor is there any duration of residency set forth—whether it be a day, a month or a year. Such indefiniteness and uncertainty make administration of this proposal guesswork at best.

For these reasons, I feel that I must return Senate Bill No. 711 without my approval.

The county colleges are already well into the current school year, and it should be possible to postpone additional acquisitions without undue hardship.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 19 OCR

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Joint Resolution No. 19 OCR, without my approval, for the following reasons:

Senate Joint Resolution No. 19 OCR purports to create a 5 member "Hackensack Meadowlands Environmental Review Study Commission" to study the study and master plan of the Hackensack Meadowlands Development Commission, which was created by the Hackensack Meadowlands Development and Reclamation Act. P. L. 1968, c. 404 (the "Meadowlands Act"). It also purports to appropriate the sum of \$45,000 by this resolution for that purpose.

In my opinion, a joint resolution is an inappropriate vehicle for the appropriation of moneys. There is a serious question as to whether this complies with the Constitution and joint resolutions have been vetoed in the past on this ground.

I firmly believe that consideration of the environmental impact of any development of the Hackensack meadowlands is essential. The plan formulated by the Hackensack Meadowlands Development Commission (the "Commission") pursuant to the Meadowlands Act was promulgated after lengthy study. I believe that a study of a study under the circumstances is wasteful duplication, particularly since the Commission is required by its enabling legislation to take into account environmental impact in formulating the master plan, and to consider the other areas of study re-

ferred to in section 4 of Senate Joint Resolution No. 19 OCR. In addition, this resolution would appear to impose, by implication at least, a six month moratorium on the implementation of the Commission's master plan. Such further delay would be unconscionable as to all interested parties.

I note that the Declaration of Purpose in Section 1 of Chapter 404 of the laws of 1968 (N. J. S. A. 13:17-1) recites:

"... that these areas need special protection from air and water pollution and special arrangements for the provision of facilities for the disposal of solid waste; that the necessity to consider the ecological factors constituting the environment of the meadowlands and the need to preserve the delicate balance of nature must be recognized to avoid any artificially imposed development that would adversely affect not only this area but the entire State; that it is the purpose of this act to meet the aforementioned needs and accomplish the aforementioned objectives by providing for a commission transcending municipal boundaries and a committee representing municipal interests. . ."

(Emphasis added.)

Article V of the Meadowlands Act (N. J. S. A. 13:17-9 to 13:17-22) spells out specific requirements and procedures for the preparation and adoption of the master plan by the Hackensack Meadowlands Development Commission. There must be complete statements and a "report presenting the objectives, assumptions, standards and principles which are embodied in the various interlocking portions of the master plan." There are requirements for public hearings and consultation with various agencies and a requirement for providing for adequate solid waste disposal facilities.

Section 10 of the Meadowlands Act (N. J. S. A. 13:17-11) makes provision for including:

*"(a) . . . (1) the use of land and buildings, residential, commercial, industrial, mining, agricultural, park and other like purposes; (2) service-water supply, utilities, sewerage, and other like matters; * * * (5) water, forest, soil conservation, flood control, and other like matters; * * * (7) the distribution and density of population . . ."*

* * * * *

*"(b) The plan may also include codes and standards covering land use, comprehensive zoning, subdivisions, building construction and design, * * * and the control*

of air and water pollution and solid waste disposal which has been approved by the State Department of Health [now the State Department of Environmental Protection] and other subjects necessary to carry out the plan or to undertake a workable program of community improvement." (Emphasis added.)

Section 12 of the Meadowlands Act further provides that all subdivisions, site plans, buildings and other development must be in accordance with the master plan.

From the foregoing, it can be seen that the Hackensack Meadowlands Development Commission is charged with responsibility for a comprehensive study of potential development of the meadowlands. Since its inception in 1969, the Meadowlands Commission has spent countless hours and substantial sums of money in developing a balanced plan. Conservation and development of some 11,000 acres in the Hackensack Meadowlands has been delayed for the past two years while the Meadowlands Commission, its staff and consultants, worked on a master plan. Public hearings were held on the proposed plan in March of 1972, and as a result the Meadowlands Commission extended the moratorium on development pending formal promulgation of the master plan for an additional period of time, so that all of the comments made could be studied and evaluated. I am advised that changes in the original plan have been made to meet the constructive suggestions.

Another objection that I have to Senate Joint Resolution No. 19 OCR is that it appears to delay further the work of the Hackensack Meadowlands Development Commission and its ultimate objectives. To delay without justifiable cause is to frustrate the balanced improvement of an area long neglected and abused.

For all the foregoing reasons, I herewith return Senate Joint Resolution No. 19 OCR without my approval.

SENATE BILL No. 1072

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1072, with my objections, for reconsideration.

This bill amends the Essex County Retirement System Act to restore language inadvertently omitted in a recent amendment of the bill, which language provided for a special computation of benefits for persons who were members of this system prior to 1943. The bill further provides for a minimum survivor death benefit of \$2,500.00.

I am in complete agreement that the language inadvertently omitted should be restored. The minimum survivor death benefit increase, however, is not feasible. A recent amendment of this act by P. L. 1971, c. 426, increased the maximum survivor death benefit from \$2,500.00 to 25% of the deceased member's final compensation without any maximum dollar limitation. S-1072 now seeks to make \$2,500.00 the minimum benefit. The effect of such a change would be to take the recent \$2,500.00 maximum benefit and make it the minimum benefit payable. This would far exceed survivor death benefits provided in other public retirement systems.

Accordingly, I am returning Senate Bill No. 1072 for reconsideration and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Section 1, Lines 12-14: Delete "provided however, that the minimum benefit paid upon the death of any member under this act shall be \$2,500.00, and"

Page 1, Section 1, Line 14: Delete "further"

SENATE BILL No. 163

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(a) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 163, without my approval, for the following reasons:

This bill would allow a county, municipality or school district, or an agency of one of these units, to enter into a contract for group dental insurance for its employees. The bill does not specify the kinds of benefits which may be provided, nor does it limit in any way the coverage which may be provided. While there is merit to the concept of dental insurance for public and private employees, any program which does not place realistic limits on the benefits to be provided has the potential of creating an excessive burden on the taxpayers of the governmental unit agreeing to undertake such a program. The citizens of this State are already overburdened by the property tax, which is the major revenue producer. Programs in the nature of dental insurance, while beneficial and even desirable, must be examined in light of the absolute need for fiscal restraint at all levels of government.

For these reasons I cannot, in good conscience, sign this legislation. There are many demands on the limited financial resources of our local governmental units, and it would be fiscally unwise to add to these burdens dental insurance programs without statutorily defined limitations.

Accordingly, I return herewith Senate Bill No. 163, without my approval.

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14(b) of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 746 for reconsideration.

This bill would require operators of drive-in theatres to have all motor vehicles evacuated from their theatres no later than one hour after the termination of the last performance at the theatre.

I am sympathetic to the intent of this bill, however, the bill fails to take into consideration the possibility of mechanical failures, which could prevent the removal of a vehicle within one hour. The bill also fails to consider the possibility of a motor vehicle accident occurring when vehicles leave the theatre at the conclusion of the performance. Investigation of such an accident may prevent removal of a vehicle within the one hour limit.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 746 without my approval and respectfully recommend the following change:

1. *Page 1, Section 2, Line 6:* After "theatre." insert "The one hour limit shall not apply to disabled motor vehicles or to motor vehicles involved in accidents provided the operator initiates reasonable action to ensure that
