REPORT.

To the Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

I have the honor to submit herewith my report of the operations of this department for the fiscal year ended October 31st, 1903.

ARMS.

There have been received from the National Government pursuant to Section 13 of an Act of Congress entitled "An Act to promote the efficiency of the militia, and for other purposes" approved January 21, 1903, the following described ordnance and ordnance stores; the number thereof being based on the enlisted strength of the militia as shown from an inspection made of the various organizations by Captain Miller of the U. S. Army, pursuant to General Orders No. 49, headquarters of the Army, dated at Washington, April 1, 1903, to wit:

3,750 U. S. Magazine rifles, cal. .30, model 1898, with model 1901 sights, complete.
170 U. S. Magazine Carbines, cal. .30, model 1899, with model 1901 sights, complete.
170 cartridge belts, cal. .30, cavalry.
3,750 Bayonet scabbards, cal. .20.
3,750 cartridge belts, cal. .30, infantry.
3,750 gun slings.

The number of arms and equipments issued to the several organizations is shown in the appendix.

As before stated, the issue of the calibre .30 service arms and equipments by the United States under the militia bill, for the National Guard of this State, was based on its actual enlisted strength, as shown by the official inspection, allowing nothing for increase by enlistments, or to replace deficiencies caused by unavoidable losses, breakage, etc. The Ordnance Department rules that no further issues of these stores can be made at present under any existing law. The supply is manifestly inadequate and the War Department is holding under consideration the advisability of issuing to the several

states and territories an additional number of the service arms and equipments in order to bring the supply up to the maximum strength of the National Guard as authorized by law in the said states and territories.

NEW ORGANIZATIONS.

Pursuant to S. O., No. 18, Office of the Adjutant-General, March 12, 1903, one new company designated as Company L, Fourth Regiment at Jersey City was mustered in March 20, 1903. This company has been uniformed, armed and equipped. There were no other changes during the year.

SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR CLAIMS.

With the exception of an allowance in kind of one hundred thousand rounds ball cartridge, cal. .30, to replace a like quantity of cal. .45 ammunition, representing a value of \$1,850.00, furnished by the Governor to volunteer regiments from New Jersey in the late War with Spain, there has been no further allowance on these claims. After giving the United States credit for this amount the account stands as follows :

Congress has enacted no further legislation bearing on these claims.

STATE CAMP GROUNDS AND ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT.

Pursuant to Special Orders No. 4, Headquarters Division, N. G. N. J., dated at Jersey City, March 19th, 1903, the organizations of the First Brigade, comprising the Fifth Regiment and Battery A, Field Artillery; Fourth Regiment and Signal Corps; the First Regiment and First Troop Cavalry, encamped by regiments at Sea Girt one week each respectively in the order named from Saturday, July 4th, to Saturday, July 25th. The expenditures on account of the encampment were as follows :

In order that the organized militia of this State may attain to a higher degree of efficiency, and acquire a more practical knowledge of active service, I strongly recommend that the present system of preparing camps for subsequent occupancy by troops, and issuing and serving cooked rations in mess halls be abandoned, and that the necessary tentage as allowed by U. S. regulations be delivered on the camp grounds by the Quartermaster-General's Department to be erected by troops upon arrival, and that teams, mess outfits and cooking utensils be furnished, and subsistence issued upon proper returns and requisitions to quartermasters, to be cooked by company cooks appointed by company commandants in conformity to U. S. Army regulations. If the State is to receive any benefit from the provisions of Section 14 of the National Militia (Dick) law, this course seems imperative.

I would respectfully call attention again to recommendations made in previous reports for appropriations for reclaiming the meadow lands forming the southern boundary of the camp grounds; and for building jetties for the protection of the rifle pits and sea coast battery from the ocean. The building of these jetties is very important and suitable provision therefor should be made by the legislative committee on appropriations.

The amounts paid to the various organizations of the National Guard for services at the encampment, and while on active duty will be found in the appendix.

There were also received from the Comptroller of the Treasury sums allowed in the supplemental appropriation bill, approved April 17th, 1903, aggregating \$18,719.08 to reimburse the Mechanics National Bank of Trenton for moneys advanced in the absence of any special appropriation for the payment of expenses incurred in connection with calling out troops to suppress threatened riot and disorder in the city of Paterson during the continuance of the strikes of the operatives of the silk mills in June, 1902. The vouchers and payrolls covering these expenditures have been filed with the Comptroller of the Treasury.

The amount expended during the year for additional compensation to volunteers from the State during the Spanish-American War, pursuant to Act of 1899, was \$1,226.49, making a total of \$163,535.93 to this date.

Pursuant to the Act approved March 25, 1903, appropriating \$35,000 and providing compensation "for clothing furnished by this State to volunteer soldiers of this State in the Spanish-American War of 1898, which they were compelled to discard and replace with other clothing furnished by the United States and for which they had to pay," etc., there was drawn from the treasury the sum of \$25,000.00. Of this amount there has been paid out upon properly verified accounts, to members of the Third and Fourth Regiments, N. J. Volunteers, the only organizations entitled by finding of the clothing commission to the benefits of said act, the sum of \$21,263.39.

PARADES AND MILITARY FUNERALS.

In addition to the regular meetings of the organizations of the National Guard for field exercises and drills, the Second Brigade Staff, the Second Regiment, and Companies H and K, Third Regiment Infantry, the Second Troop Cavalry and Battery B, Field Artillery participated in the celebration at Freehold, June 27th, 1903, of the one hundred and twenty-fifth anniversary of the Battle of Monmouth. Transportation, ammunition for salutes, and subsistence were furnished by this department. The troops were also paid for this service.

Transportation was also furnished to the Third Regiment Infantry on the occasion of the obsequies of Colonel John I. Shinn at Burlington on Saturday, July 25th, 1903.

MEDALS.

The supply of medals provided by authority of the Legislatures of 1899 and 1900 (War with Spain) has been exhausted. This decoration has been bestowed upon 5,600 men.

Of the 500 medals provided under Act approved March 23, 1901, for survivors of the N. J. Brigade Militia (First Defenders, War of the Rebellion) 454 have been issued.

RECEIPTS FROM THE UNITED STATES.

Stores to the value of \$5,058.66 were drawn from the Quartermaster's and Ordnance Departments during the year under section 1661 of the acts of Congress for arming and equipping the Militia. The balance standing to the credit of the State under this Section is \$37,981.35.

The value of ordnance stores issued under Act of March 2nd, 1903, was \$500.00, leaving a balance to the credit of the State under this Act of \$38,632.28.

There was also allotted to the State, and paid over to the Quartermaster-General as Disbursing Officer for New Jersey under section 14 of the Act approved January 21, 1903, for pay, subsistence and transportation of the organized militia engaged in actual field or camp service for instruction, etc., no part of which has been expended, the sum of \$21,241.82.

The charges for the year against New Jersey's allotment for arming and equipping the Naval Militia, for the year are \$6,938.91, and the present available balance is \$9,914.58.
