INTRODUCTION

The Bureau of Parole has the responsibility to conduct investigations, provide supervision, and submit reports concerning persons paroled from New Jersey correctional institutions, and persons paroled from correctional institutions of other states to reside in New Jersey.

In order to execute its responsibility, the Bureau maintains eight district offices throughout the state and an institutional parole office in each of the institutions, all under supervision of the Central Office in Trenton.

DEVELOPMENTS

Following exposure to training of a number of interested parole officers in the area of group counselling, and in conjunction with meetings arranged with residential group center superintendents, two female groups and two male groups were begun. An evaluation of the results has not been completed to date.

A pilot project in the Newark Office was begun involving a specialized caseload of 20 narcotic addicts. A control group in the same office is to be used for comparison purposes. The operation has not been in existence long enough to evaluate, but there are strong indications that the specialized caseload in this area may be of value.

A pilot specialized caseload has been initiated in the field of "difficult to supervise cases." The experience in this area will be evaluated to determine whether it is desirable to expand the process.

Effective December 1, 1966, a supervisory process went into effect which provided the opportunity for three of the four supervising parole officers in the Central Office to cover district offices on a face-to-face basis. In general, the communication process has been greatly improved, the clerical tasks have been rerouted and reduced to some extent, the filing and folder traffic at the Central Office has been cut down by at least 50% and the decision-making process has been improved. The negative aspect is the unfortunate loss of time due to travel.

The "Night Visit" program was begun, encouraging the use of "off-regular-hours" supervision checks of parolees. Difficulties exist in some areas of the State, but in general the opportunity to observe, visit, interview, and evaluate the client and his family have been increased.

TRAINING

Professional personnel attended Civil Service sponsored courses in "Safety Training for Supervisors" and "Speed Reading."

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Selected supervisory clerical personnel attended similar courses on "Supervisory Techniques and Principles," "Business Letter Writing," and "Better Listening."

Three monthly area in-service training meetings were held with two adjoining district offices arranging their own program surrounding local problem areas, one in-service session was held with the entire professional staff, and mandatory attendance was required at one of the three sessions scheduled in Newark, Elizabeth and Woodbury on the "Motor Vehicle Safety Course" produced by the N.J. State Police.

Orientation programs for new parole officers were scheduled in October, 1966, and May, 1967. This is an ongoing program initiated when a total of ten new officers have been employed, preferably for a period of three to six months.

PERSONNEL

Vacancies in the professional staff which began the year with nine, were reduced through the efforts of many people and through a diligent recruiting policy to two at the end of the year. Both of these have commitments for filling as of July, 1967.

Requests for Civil Service examinations for all positions were made and the examinations were completed. The list of eligibles for Assistant District Supervisor has already been expended and another request will be made in the Fall for a scheduled promotional examination.

As a result of repeated requests for an upward reclassification of senior clerk-stenographer positions in district offices with large professional staffs, and with the encouragement of the Division Director, a principal clerk-stenographer position was finally approved in Newark, and subsequently as a result of further investigation, approved in Clifton, Jersey City and Camden.

During the year a Salary Adjustment Committee was appointed for the purpose of preparing a justification for increased salaries. The study was reproduced and widely distributed. In addition, a Parole Officers' Association was born, which directed the weight of the group in the direction of adequate salaries.

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DISCHARGED PRIOR TO EXPIRATION OF MAXIMUM

This is an increase of 5.7% over last year. In addition to those discharged by recommendation, 1126 parolees completed their maximum sentences on parole and supervision was terminated.

ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY ACT

As a result of referrals to agencies including the Job Corps, The Neighborhood Youth Corps, Rural Youth Conservation, Manpower Development and Training, etc., it was determined that as of the end of June, 1967, 945 parolees had been accepted in the various Office of Economic Opportunities programs from the inception of the project in August of 1965 (as against 627 last year). During this period, over 3,000 referrals had been made of which 261 were rejected, 1004 were still pending action, 426 failed to follow up with referral, and 383 obtained other employment.

PAROLEE EARNINGS (CALENDAR YEAR 1966)

During the calendar year 1966, parolees in New Jersey under the supervision of the Bureau earned \$9,187,478.00, an increase of \$763,571 over the earnings of the previous year. There was an increase of 117 individuals under supervision in 1966 as compared with 1965. Sixty-eight percent (5332) of the 7,797 under supervision during the year were classified as employed (worked all or part of period under supervision, which period of supervision could be from one week to the full year), and 14% (1,056) were unemployed throughout their entire period of supervision during the year, although considered employable. The other 18% (1,409) were classified as unemployable by reason of being missing or in custody for the entire period of supervision during the year, or attending school, being engaged in homemaking, or being incapacitated.
