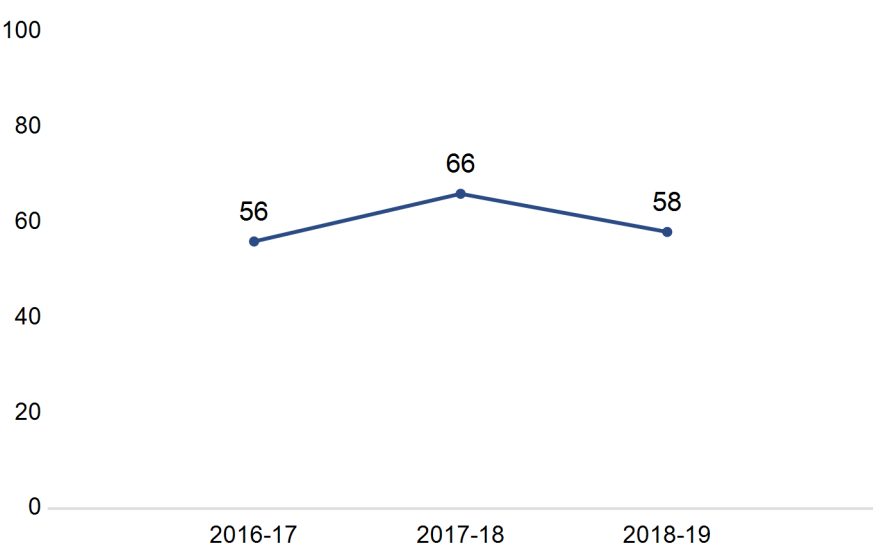
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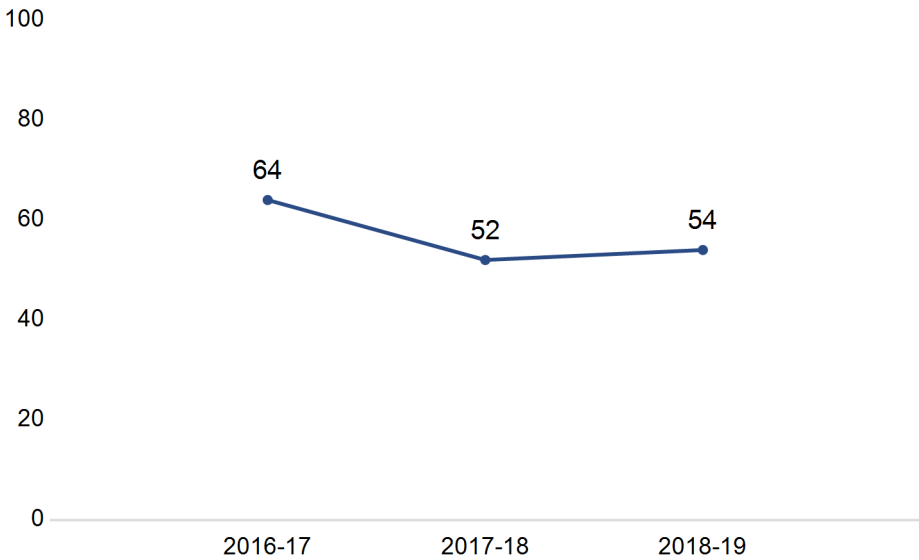
Student Growth Trends and Progress

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Student growth is a measure of how much students are learning each year. Each student receives a Student Growth Percentile (SGP) for English Language Arts (ELA) in grades 4 through 8 and for Mathematics in grades 4 through 7 that explains their progress compared to students who had the same test scores in previous years.

A student’s SGP falls between 1 and 99 and can be grouped into three levels: **Low Growth: Less than 35** **Typical Growth: Between 35 and 65** **High Growth: Greater than 65**

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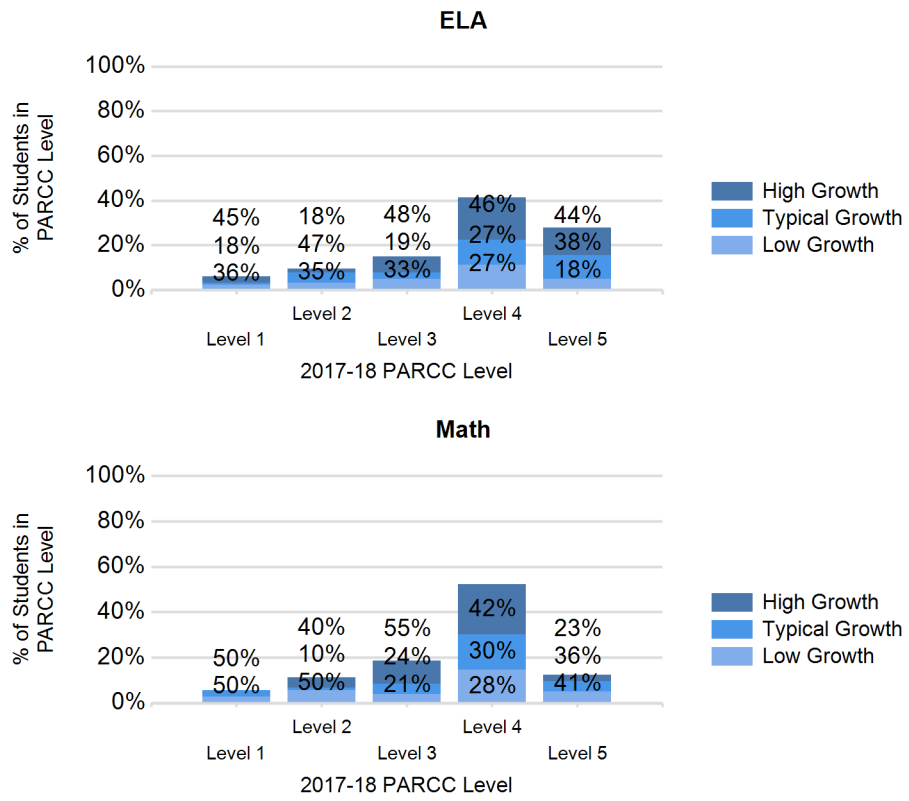

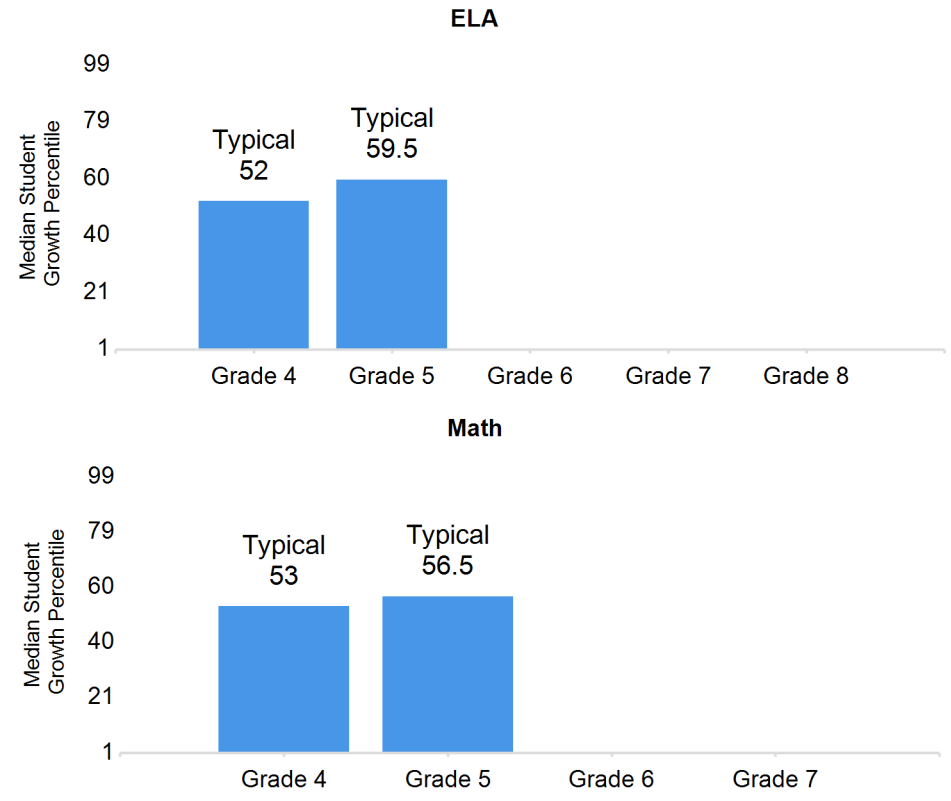
Student Growth by Performance Level

These graphs show the median Student Growth Percentile for students in each grade.



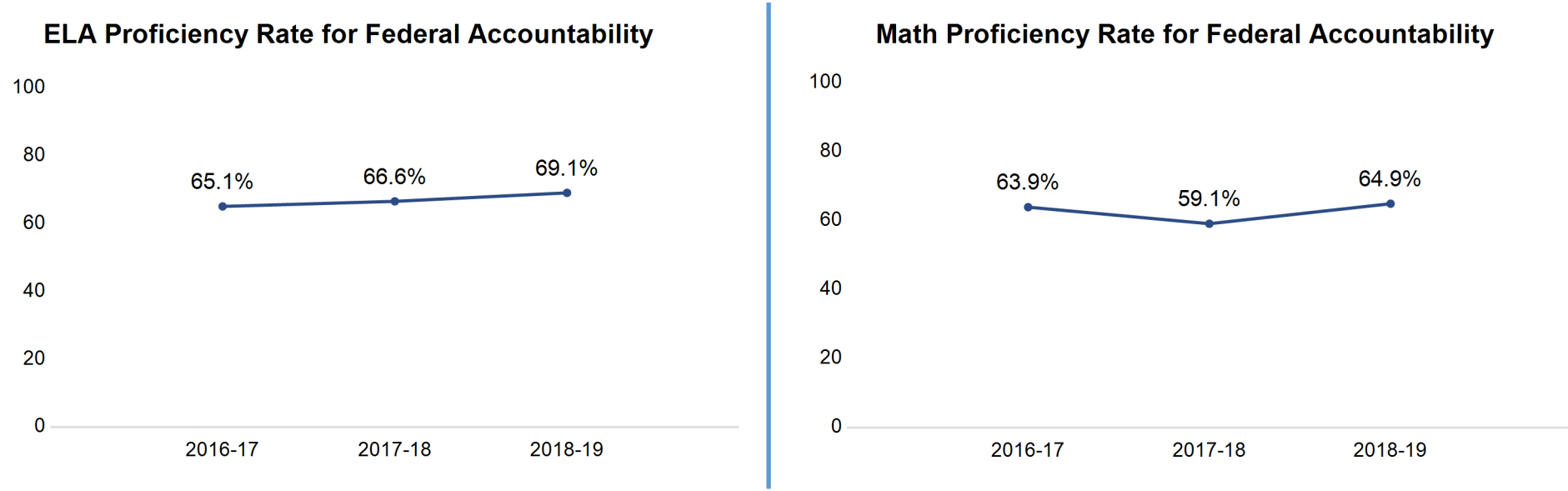


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English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends

These graphs show trends in the Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability over the last three years. The data includes the results of students taking both the statewide assessment (NJSLA for 2018-19 and PARCC for 2016-17 and 2017-18) and the DLM alternate assessment. The Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability measures the percentage of students that met or exceeded expectations on the assessments (NJSLA/PARCC or DLM) with an adjustment made if the participation rate is below 95% to ensure reporting on at least 95% of students. NJSLA/PARCC results include only students in grades 3 through 10. Students that were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. The table below provides participation rates, proficiency rates, annual targets and status in meeting the targets, and statewide proficiency rates.

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English Language Arts Assessment - Participation and Performance

This table shows performance on statewide assessments for English Language Arts both overall and by student group. It includes the results of students taking both the NJSLA and DLM assessments. NJSLA results include only students in grades 3 through 10. Students that were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. A student is considered to have met or exceeded expectations if he/she scores at Level 4 or 5 on the NJSLA assessment or at Level 3 or 4 on the DLM assessment.

This table shows both the percentage of students that met or exceeded expectations and a proficiency rate used for federal accountability. The proficiency rate for federal accountability will be lower if the participation rate is below 95%. This table also shows progress towards meeting the state's long term goal of 80% proficiency by 2030. Annual targets are specific to each subgroup, school, and district and represent the expected proficiency needed to stay on track to meet the state's long term goal. Student groups where the annual target fields are grayed out are not required to meet annual targets under ESSA accountability. 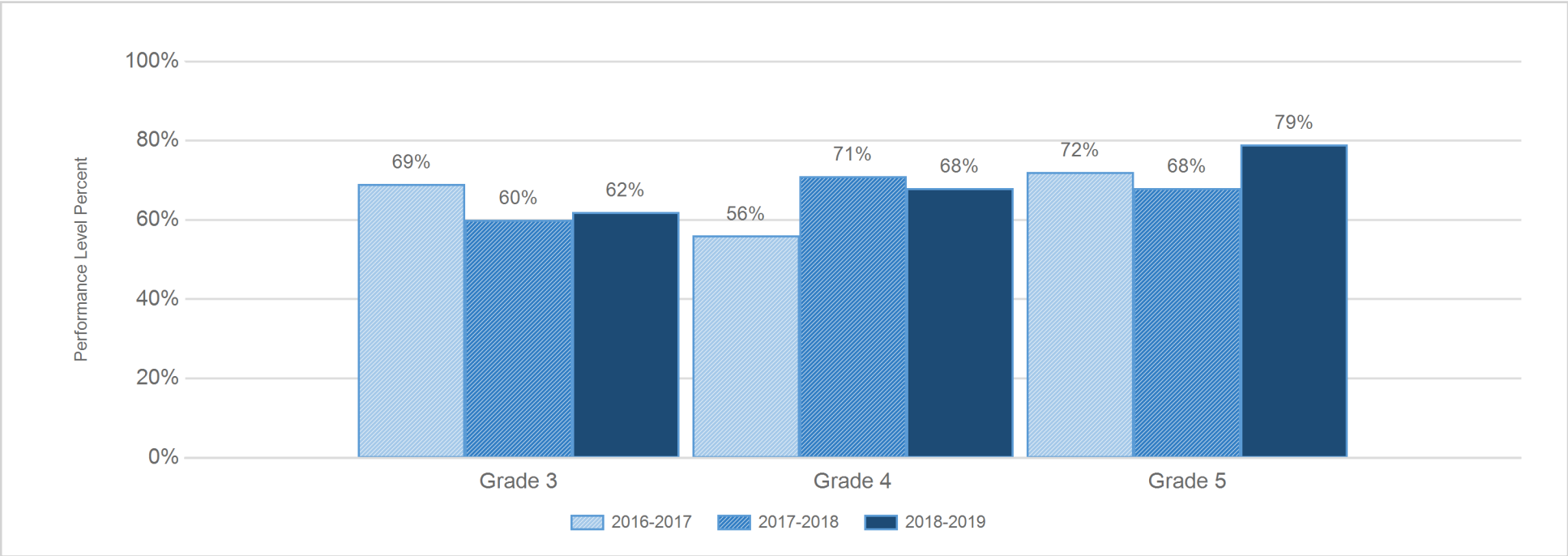

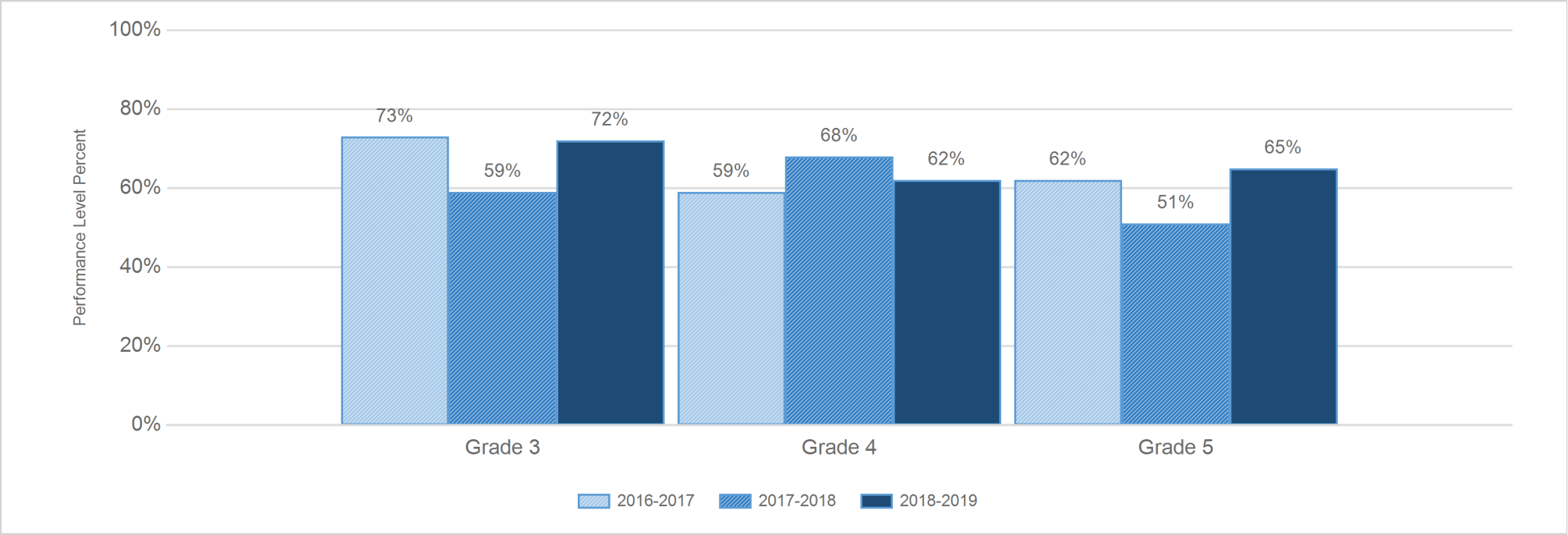

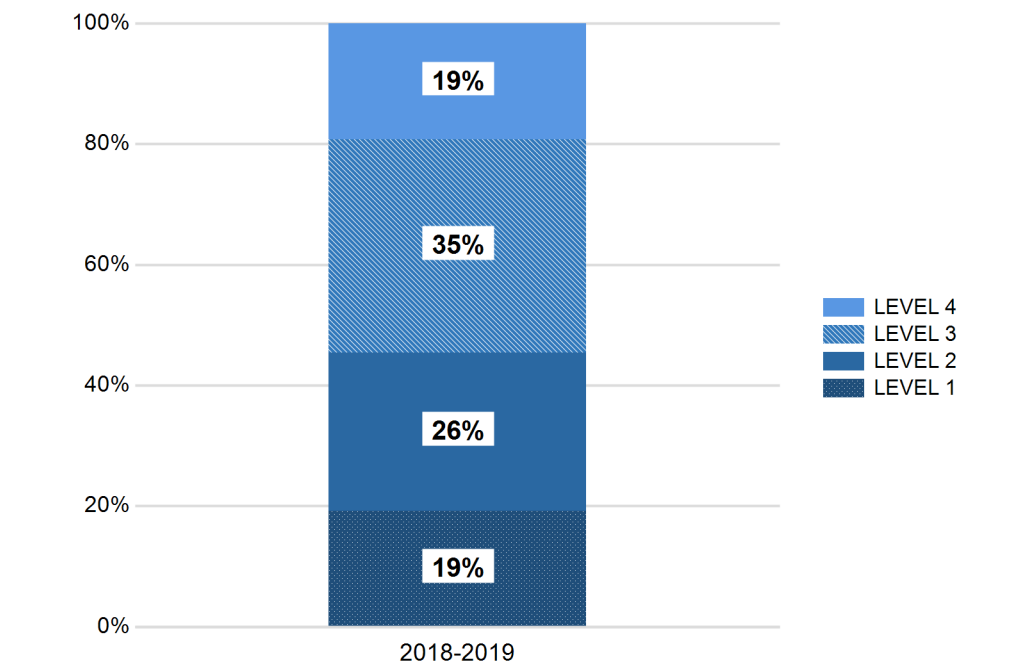

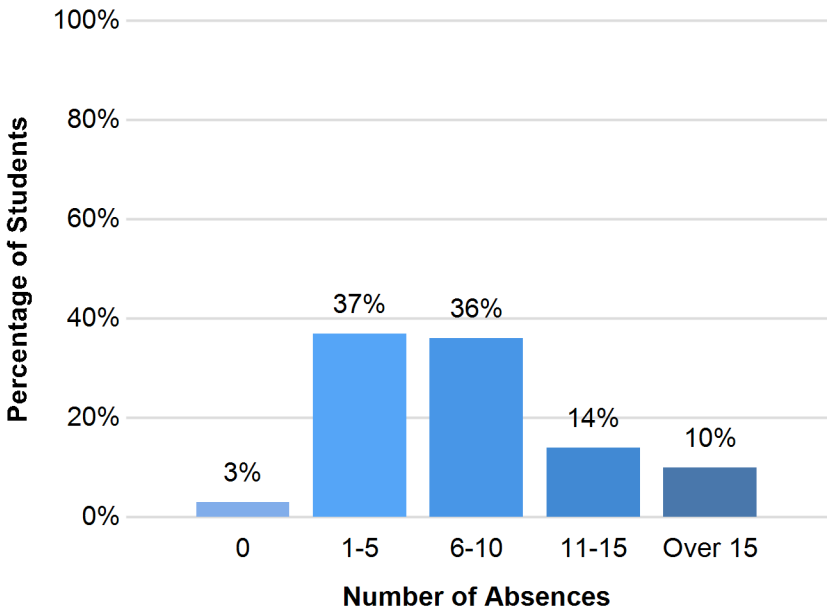

This graph shows the percentage of K-12 students by the number of days they were absent during the school year.





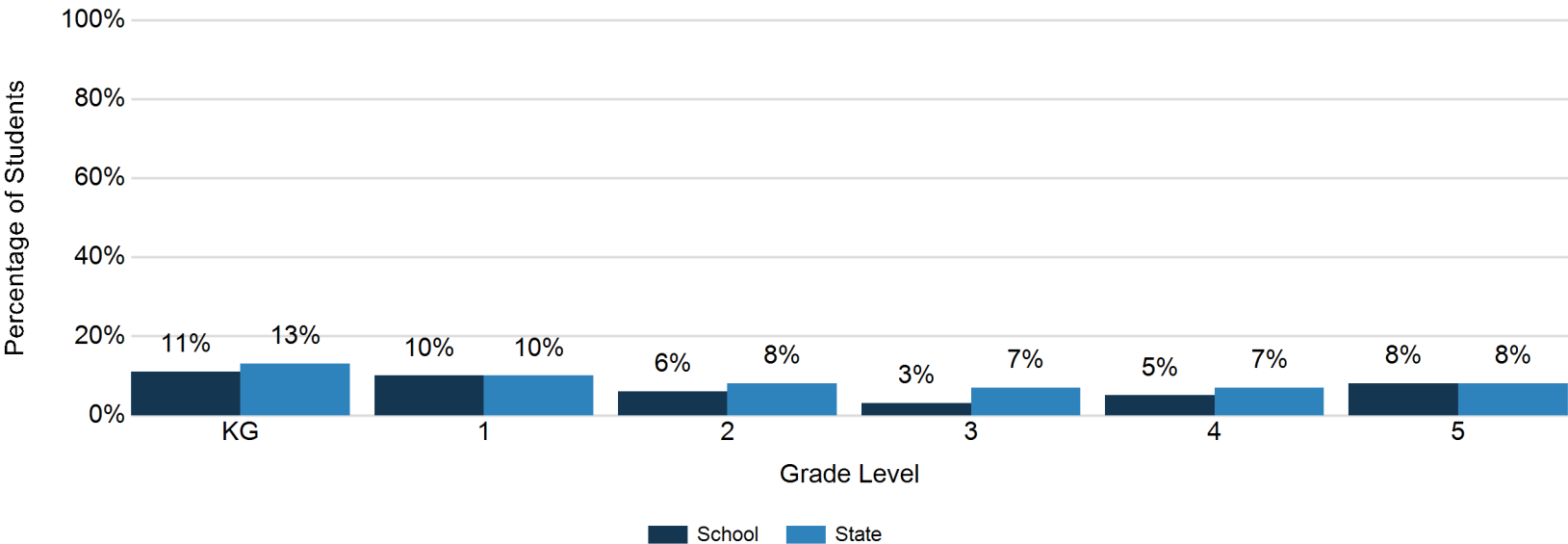
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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade

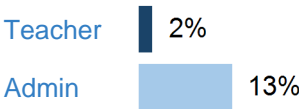

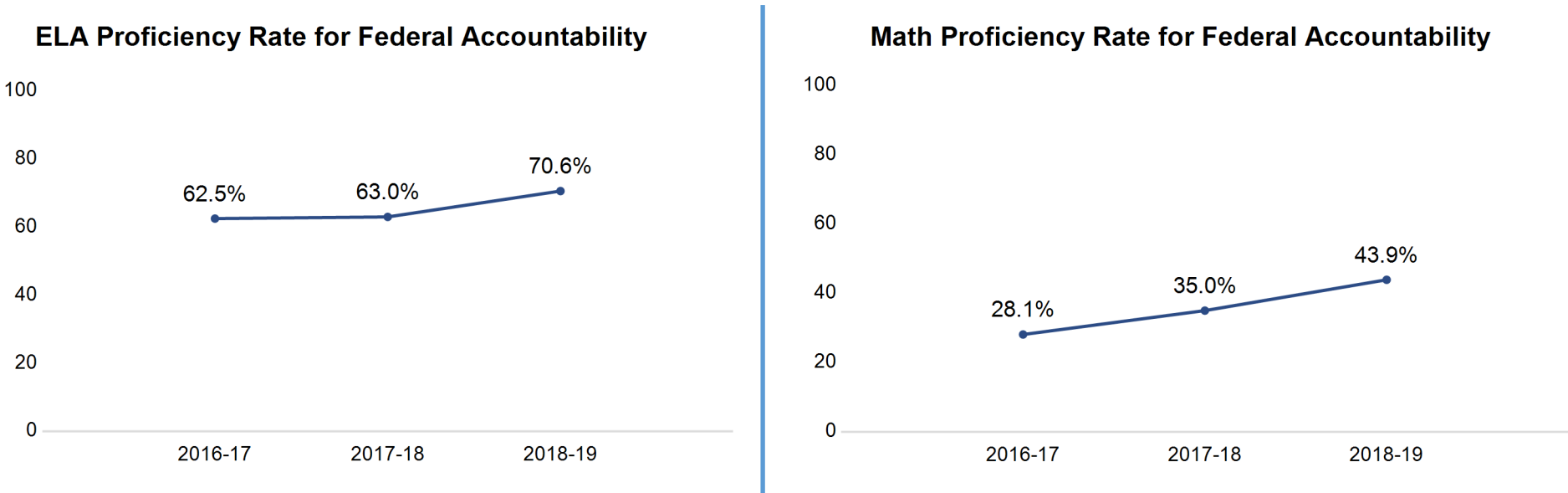

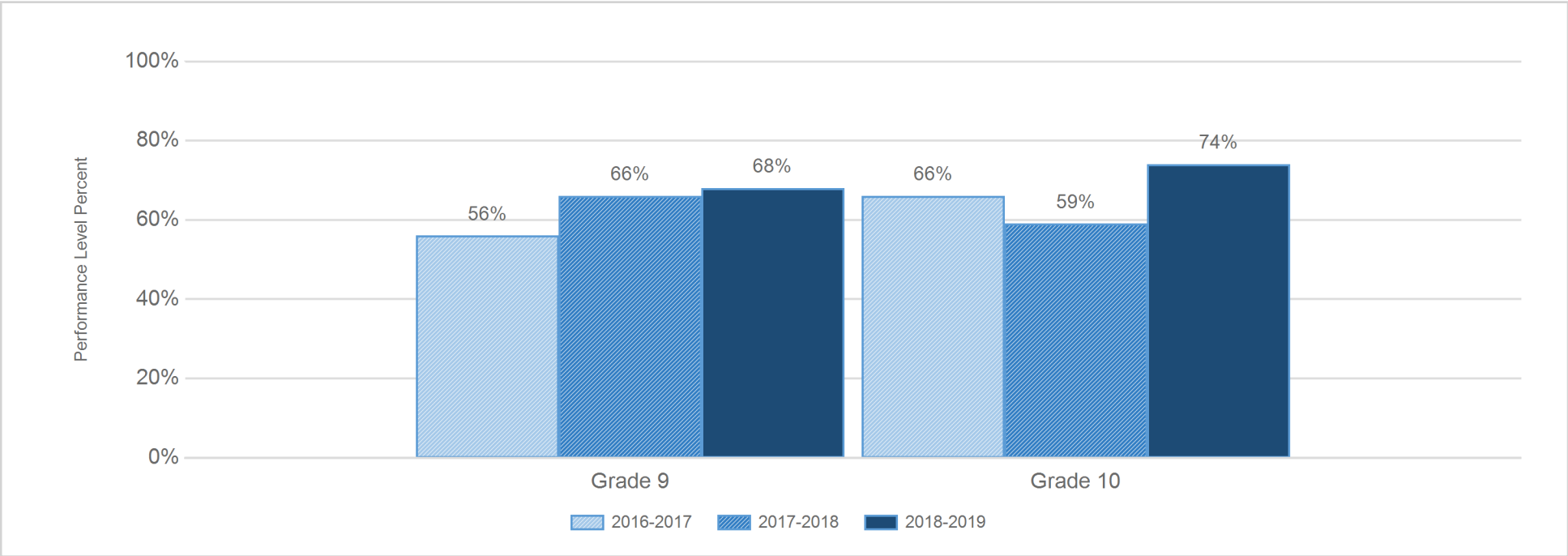

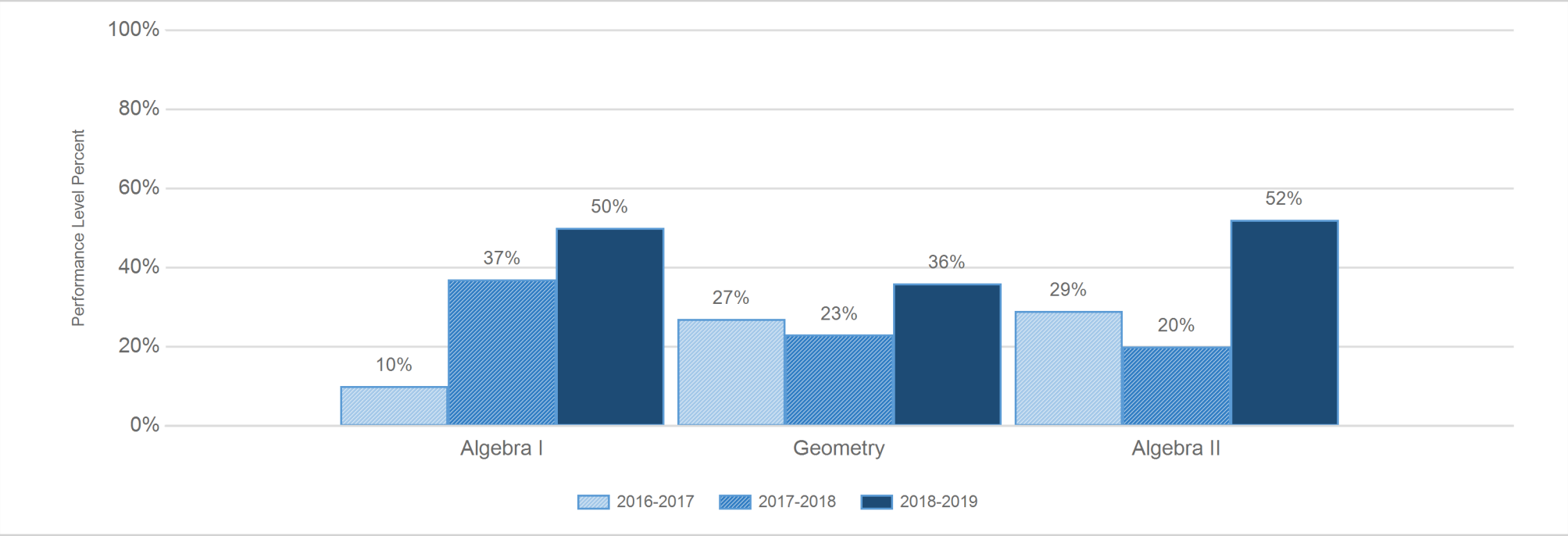

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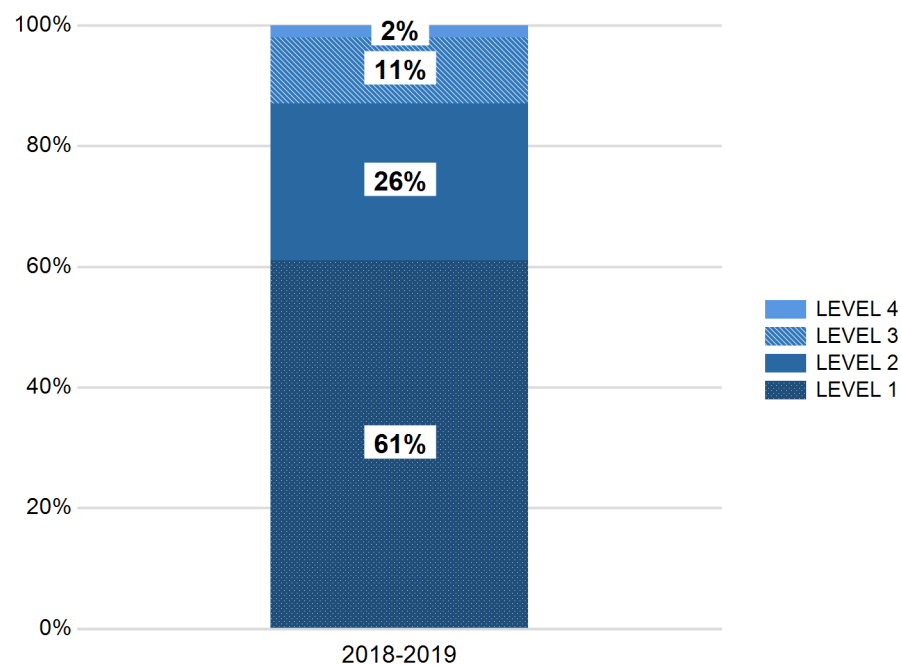

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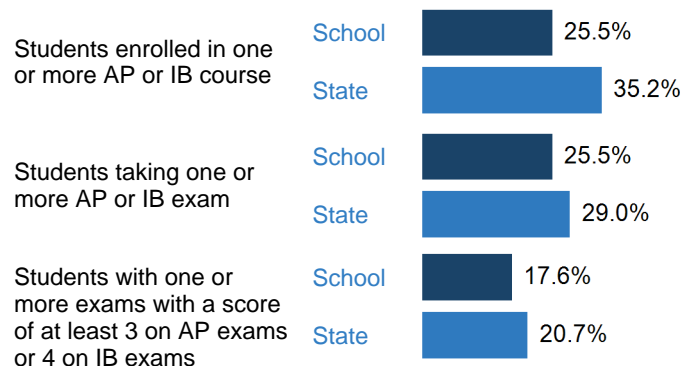

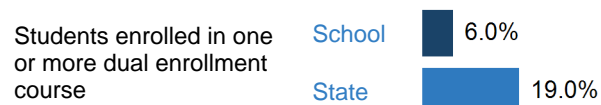
AP/IB Coursework – Participation and Performance

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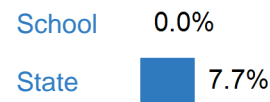

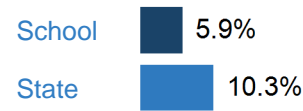

(completed only one course in an approved CTE program)



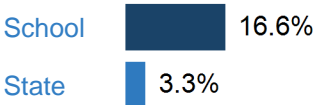

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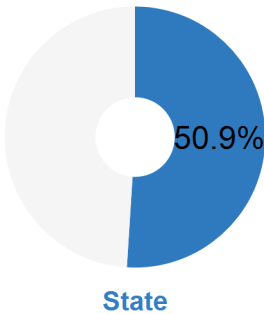
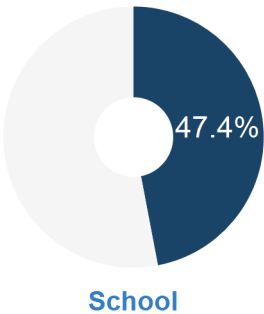

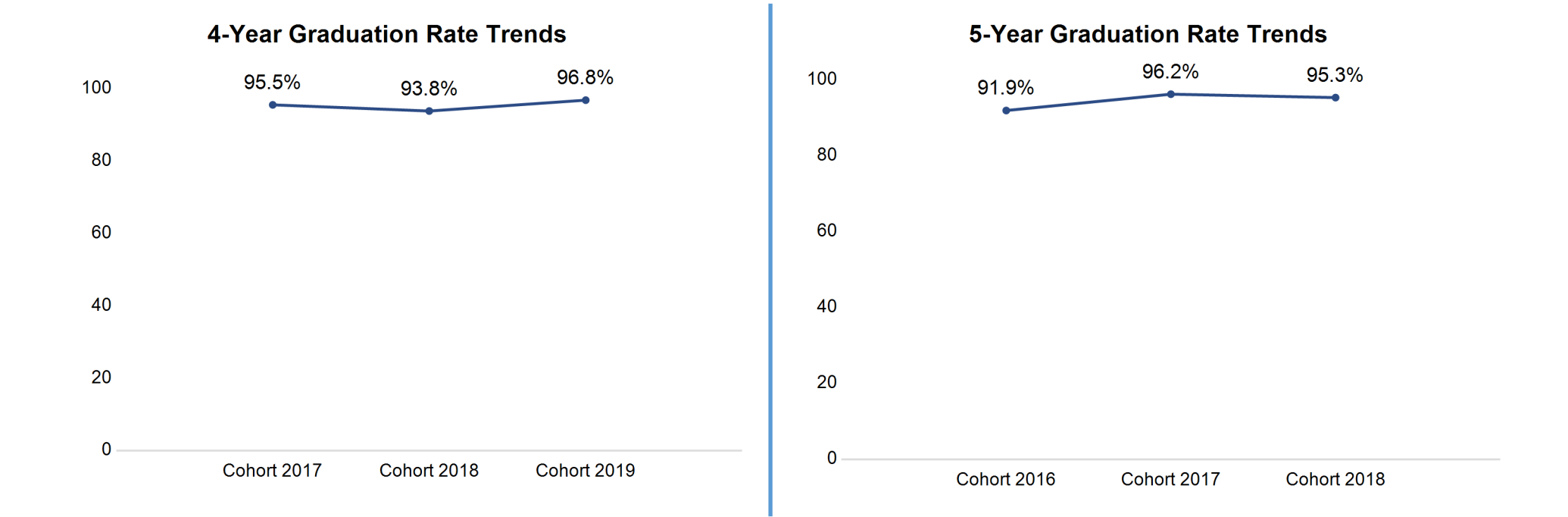

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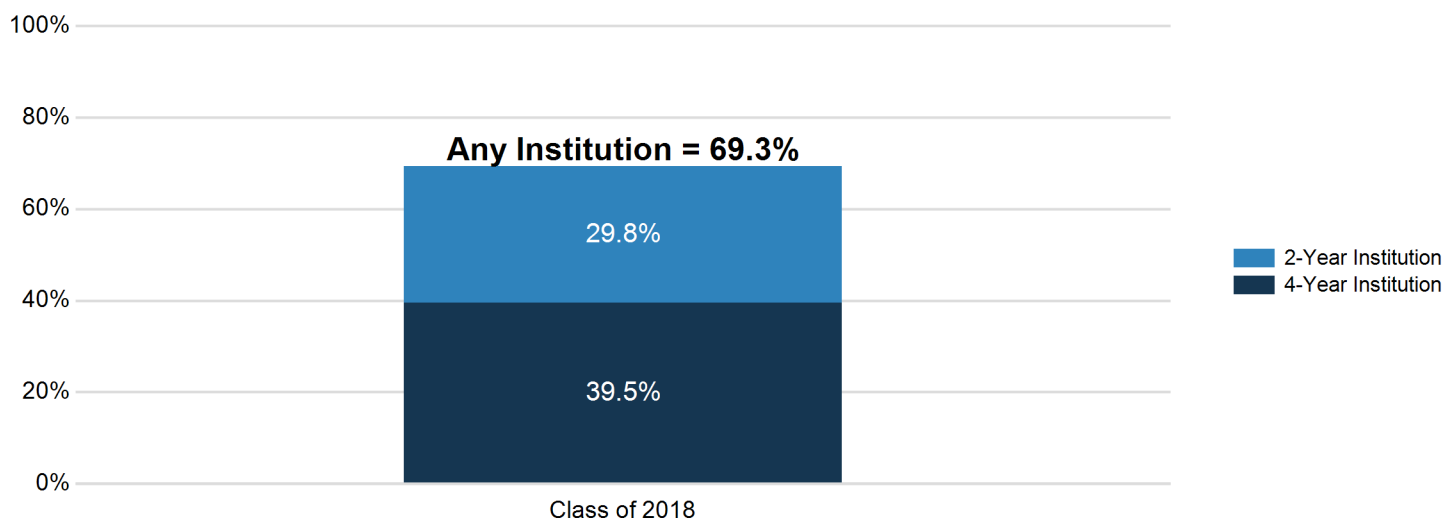

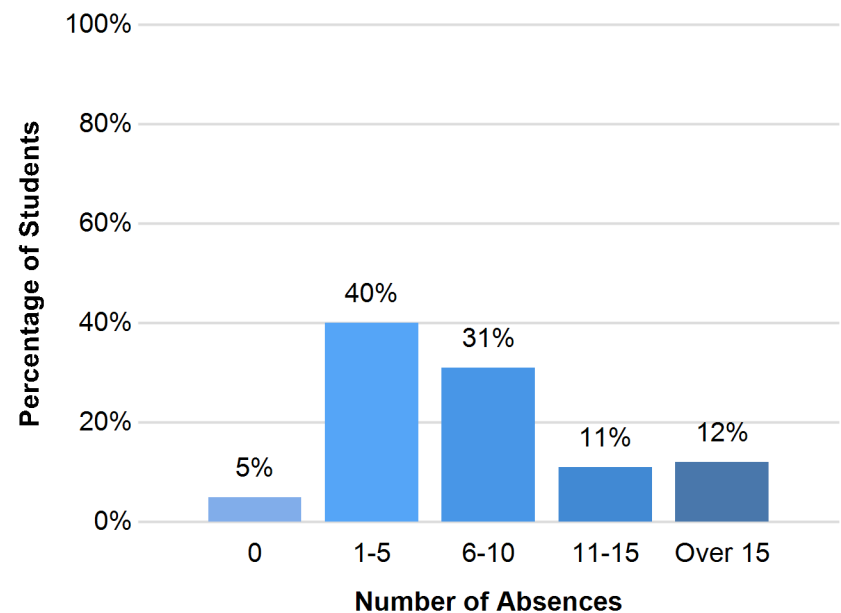

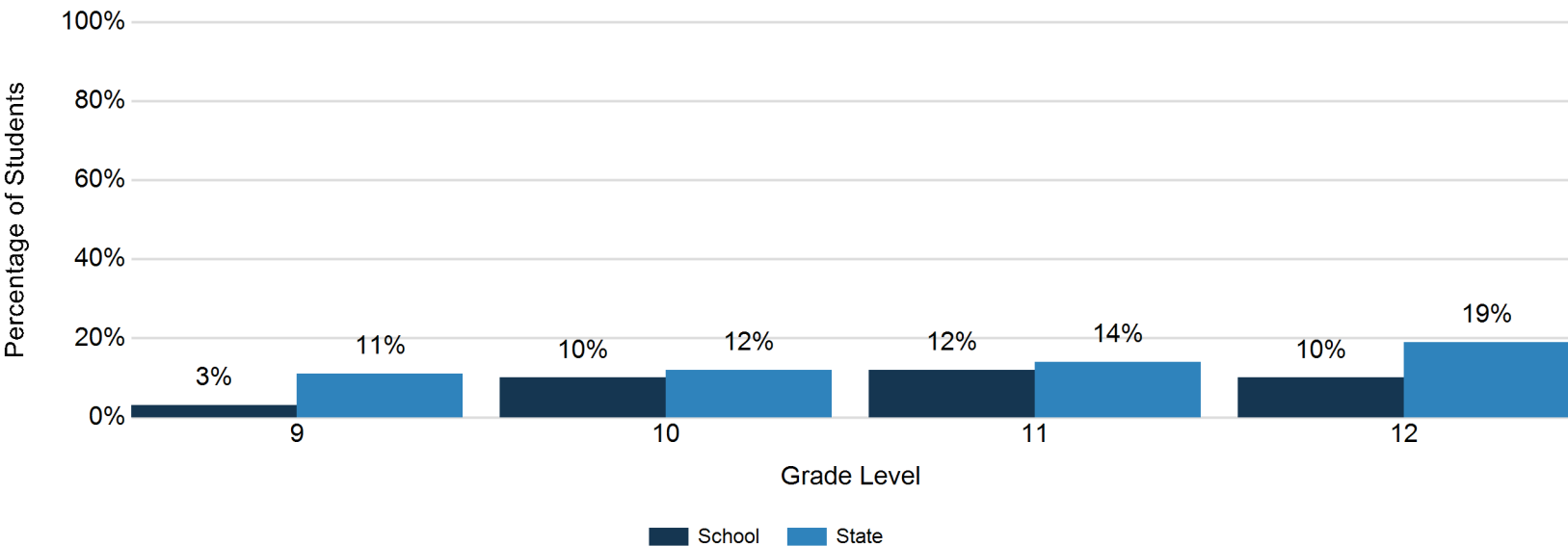
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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade

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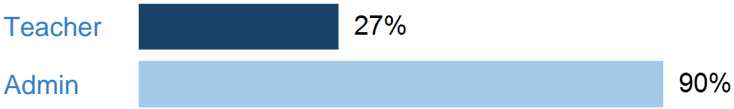

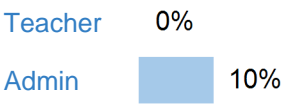

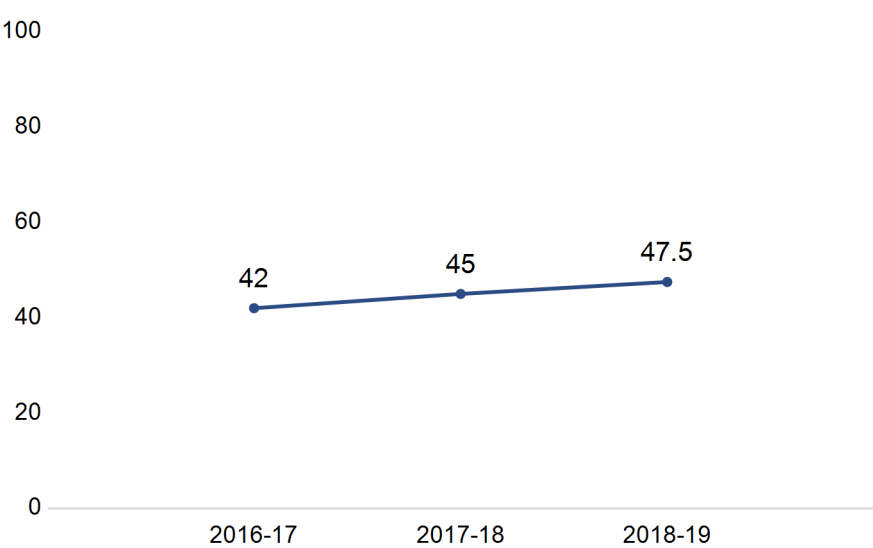

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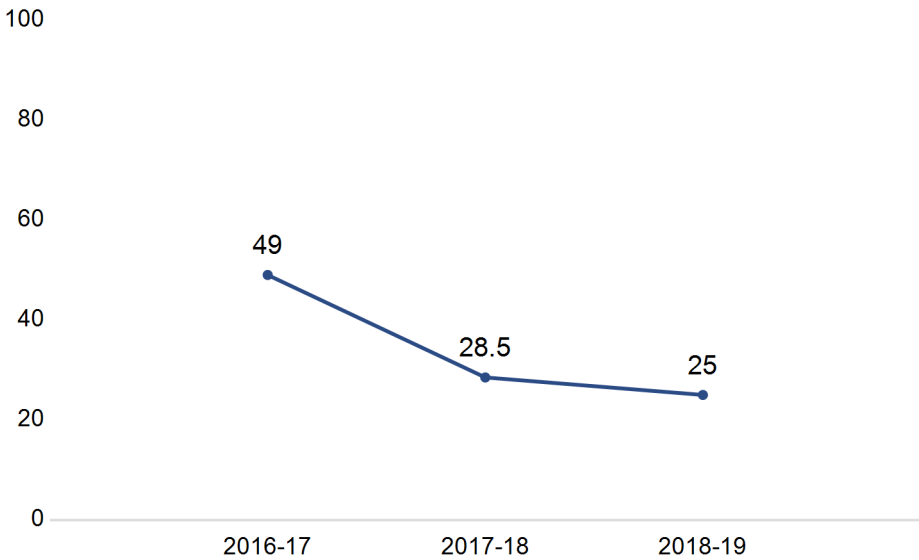

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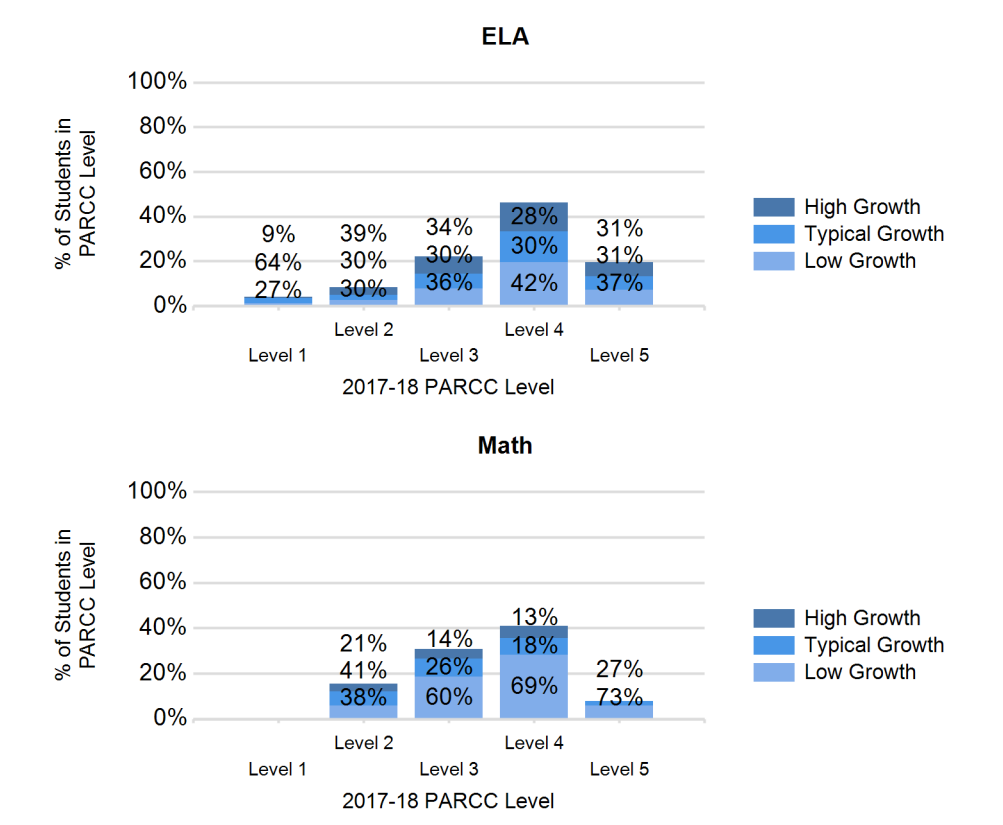

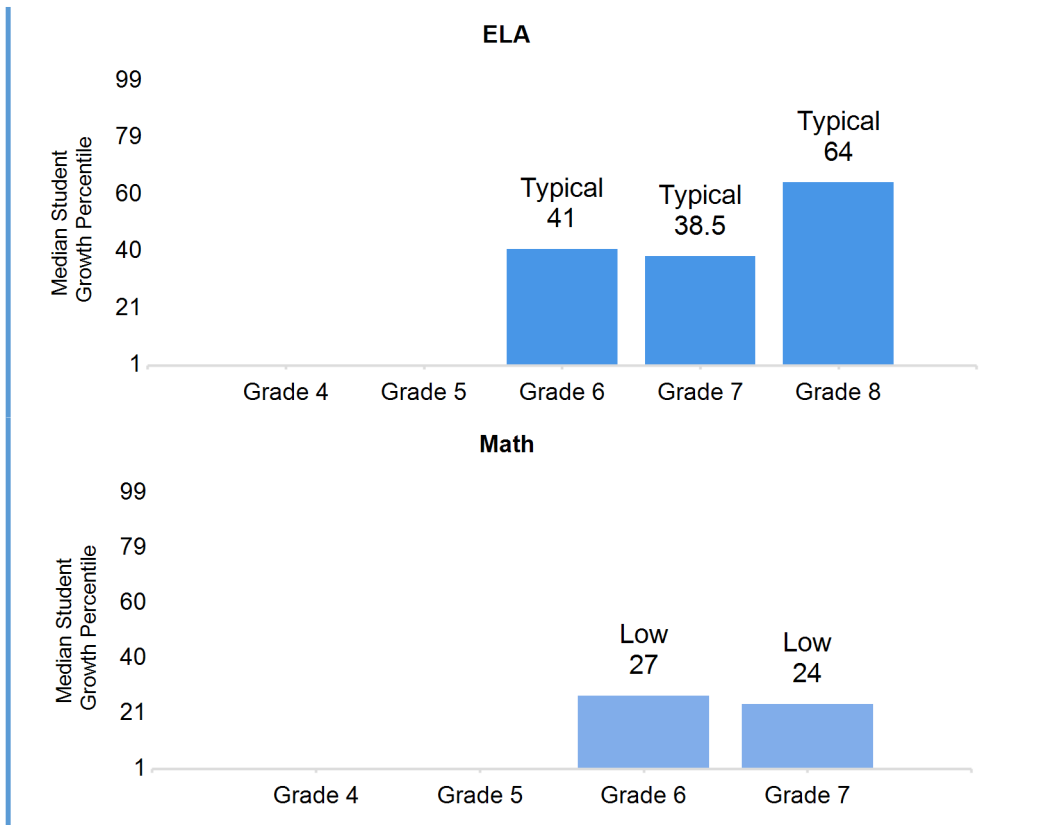
Student Growth by Performance Level

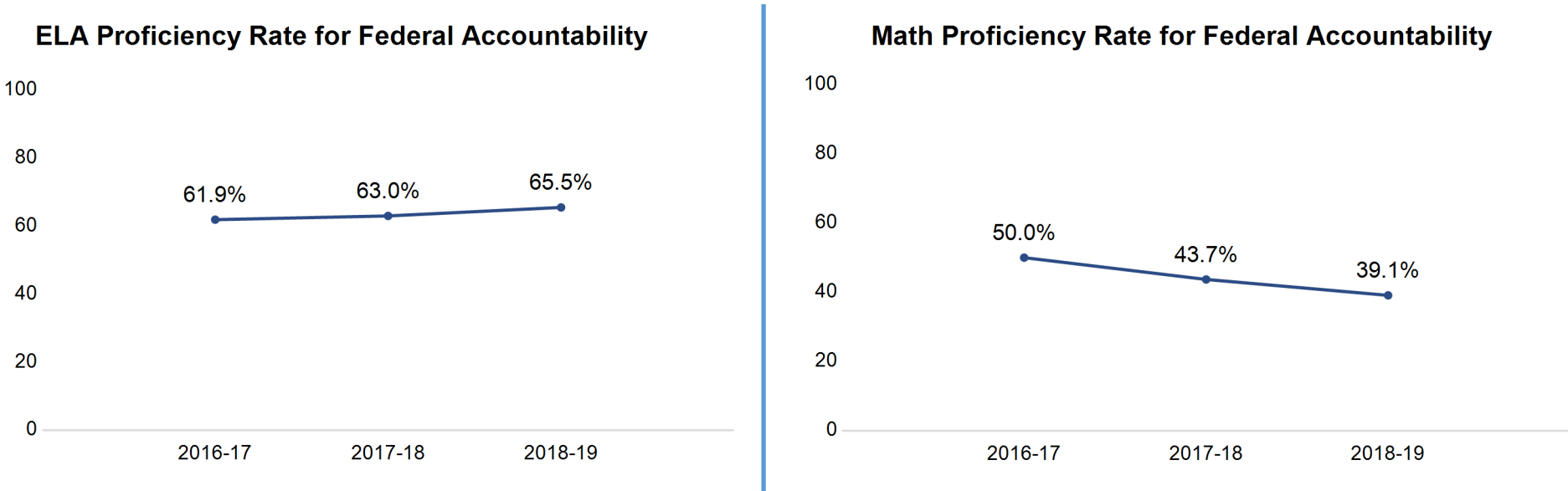

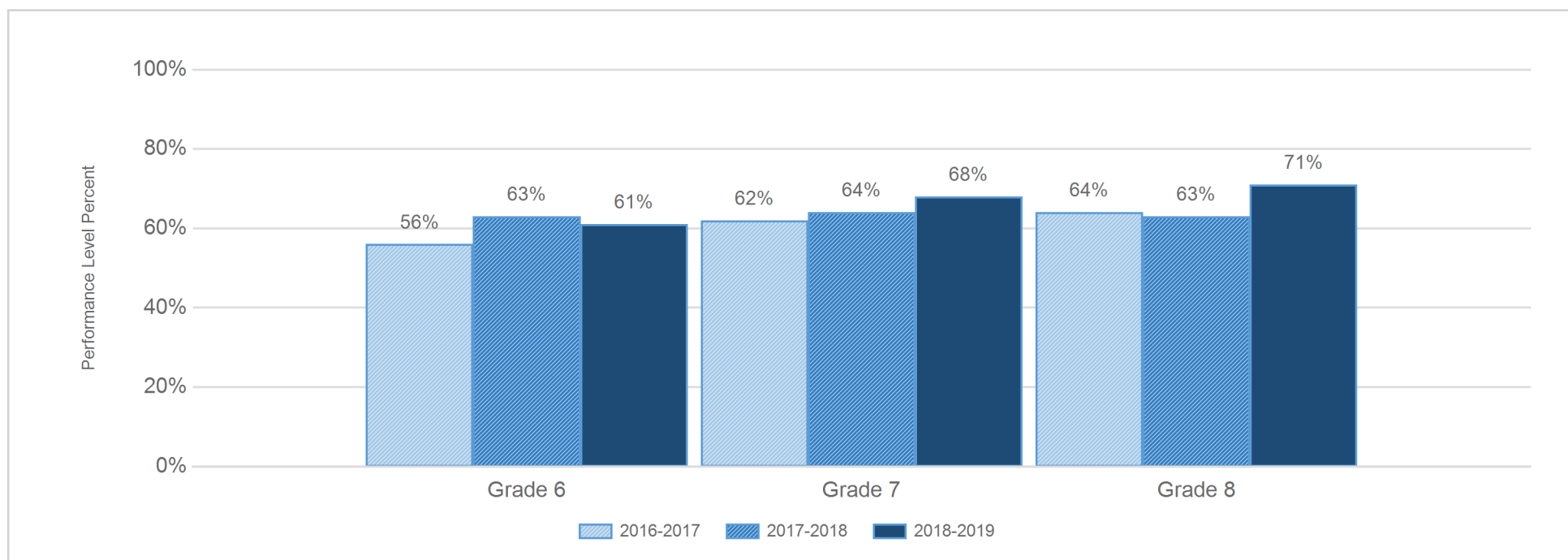

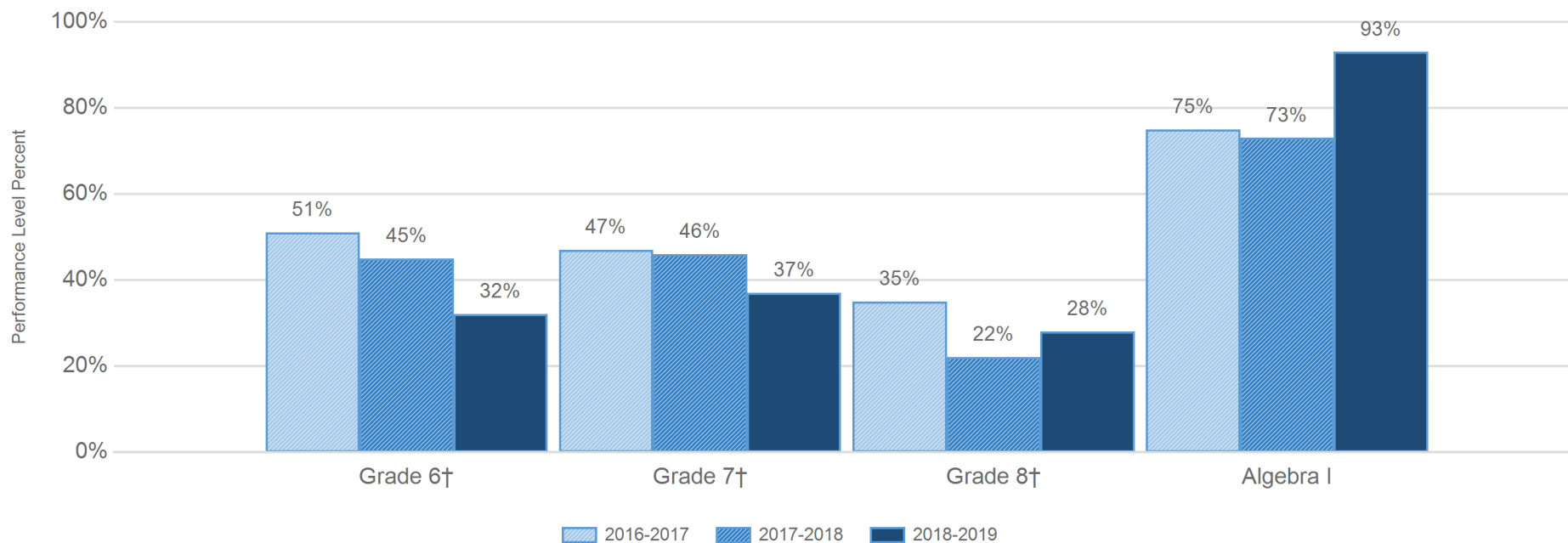

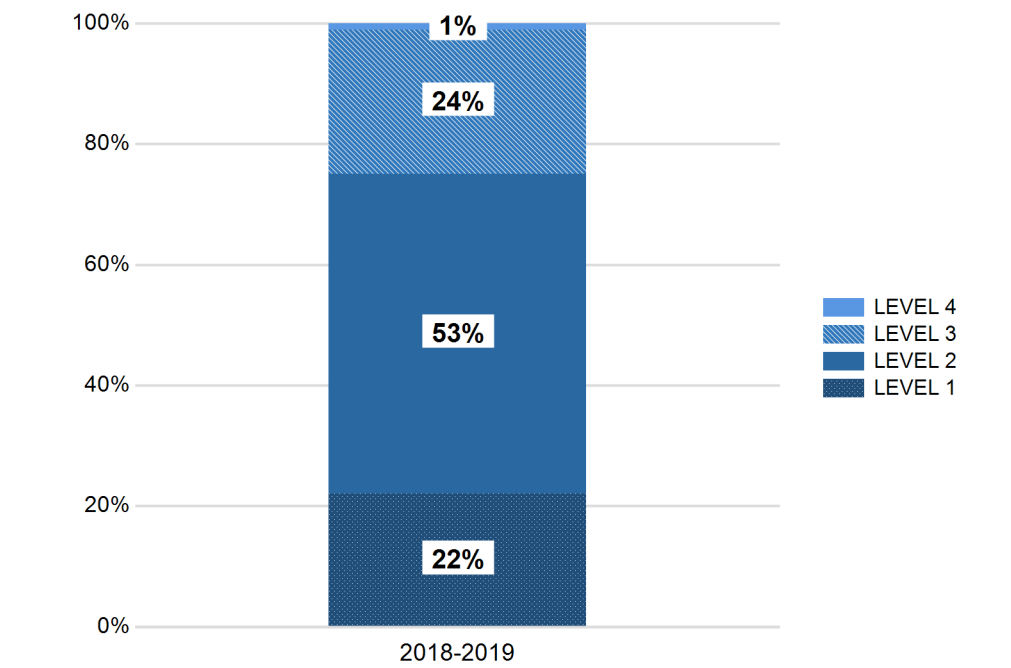

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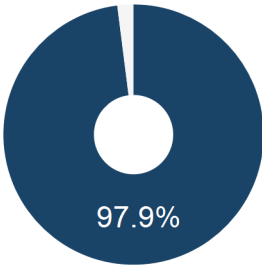

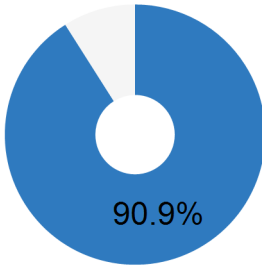

Students enrolled in one or more **visual and performing arts** classes

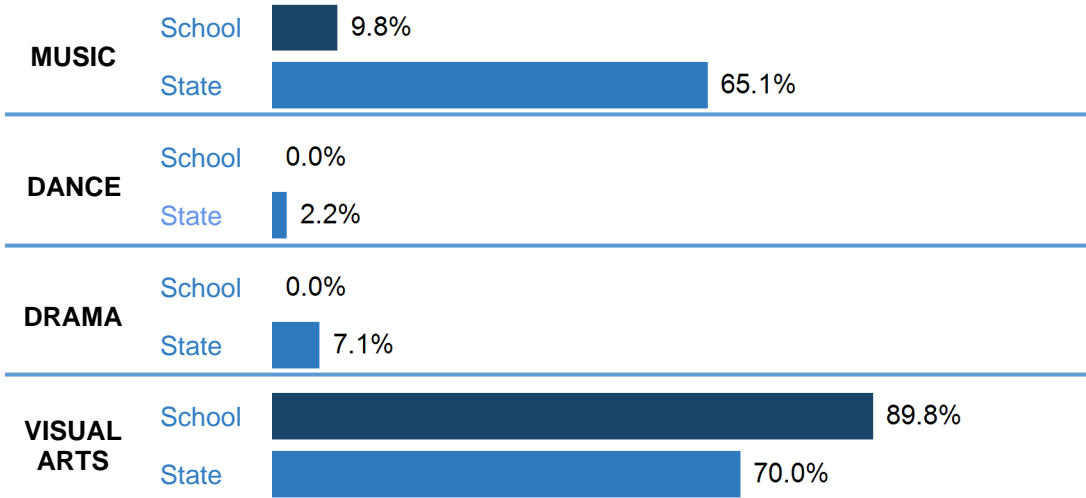

The New Jersey Department of Education used input from New Jersey communities to select chronic absenteeism as its measure of school quality and student success for the ESSA accountability plan. **Chronic absenteeism** is defined as being absent for 10% or more of the days enrolled during the school year. A student who is not present for any reason, whether excused, unexcused, or for disciplinary action, is considered absent unless permitted by state statute or regulations. Students with fewer than 45 days in membership are excluded from attendance calculations.

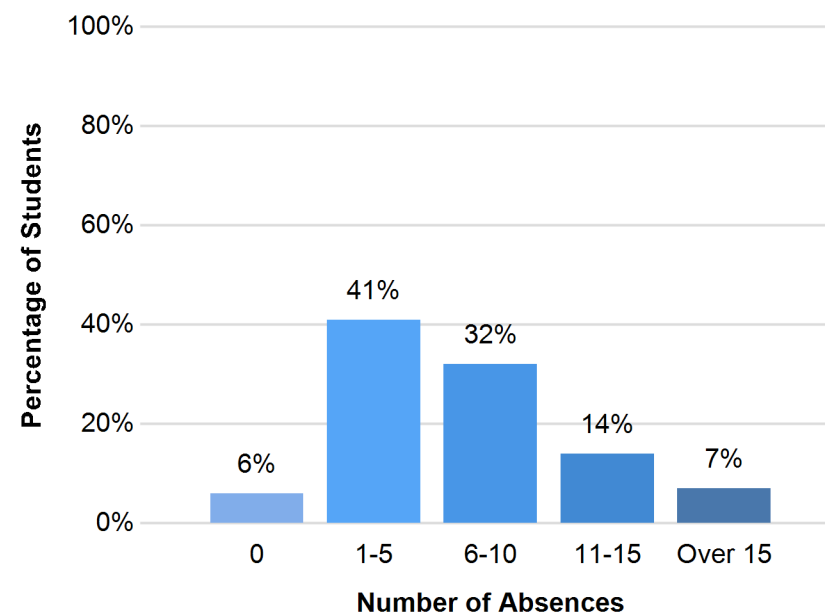

This graph shows the percentage of K-12 students by the number of days they were absent during the school year.





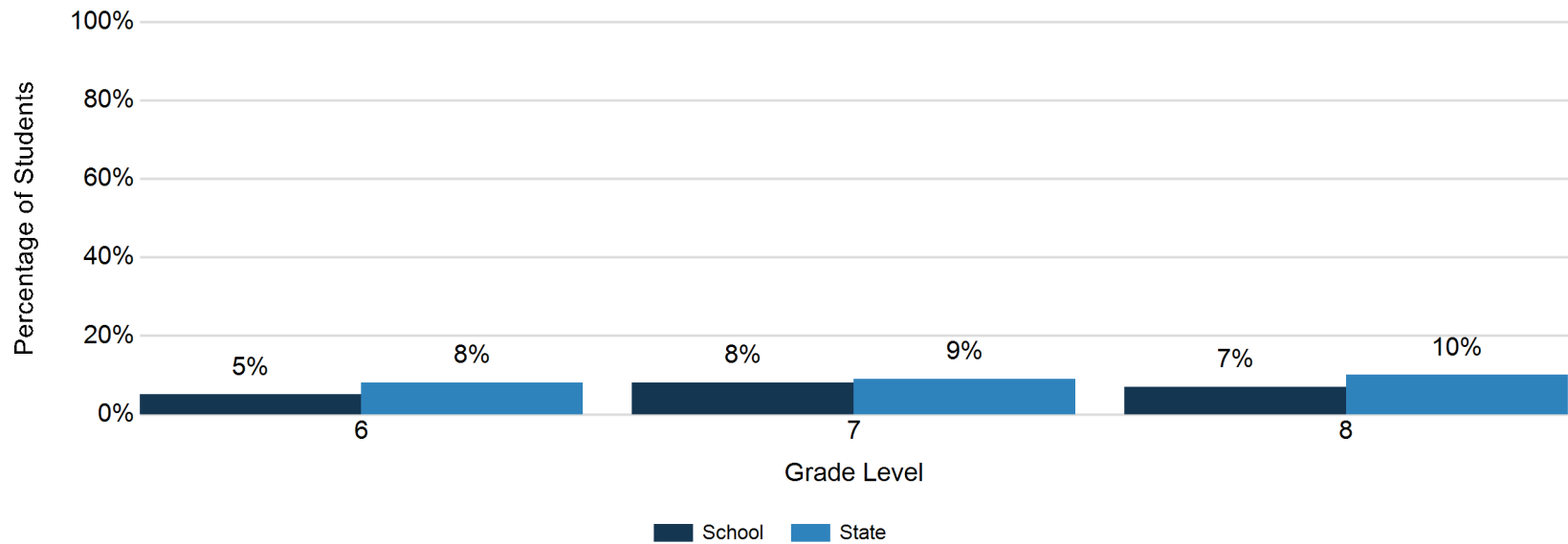
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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade

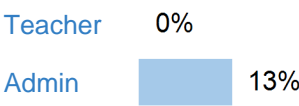

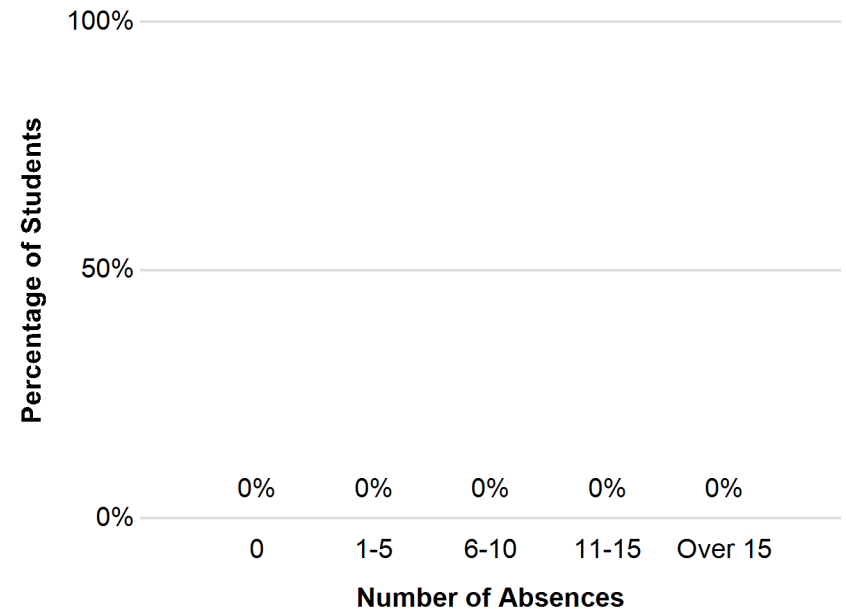

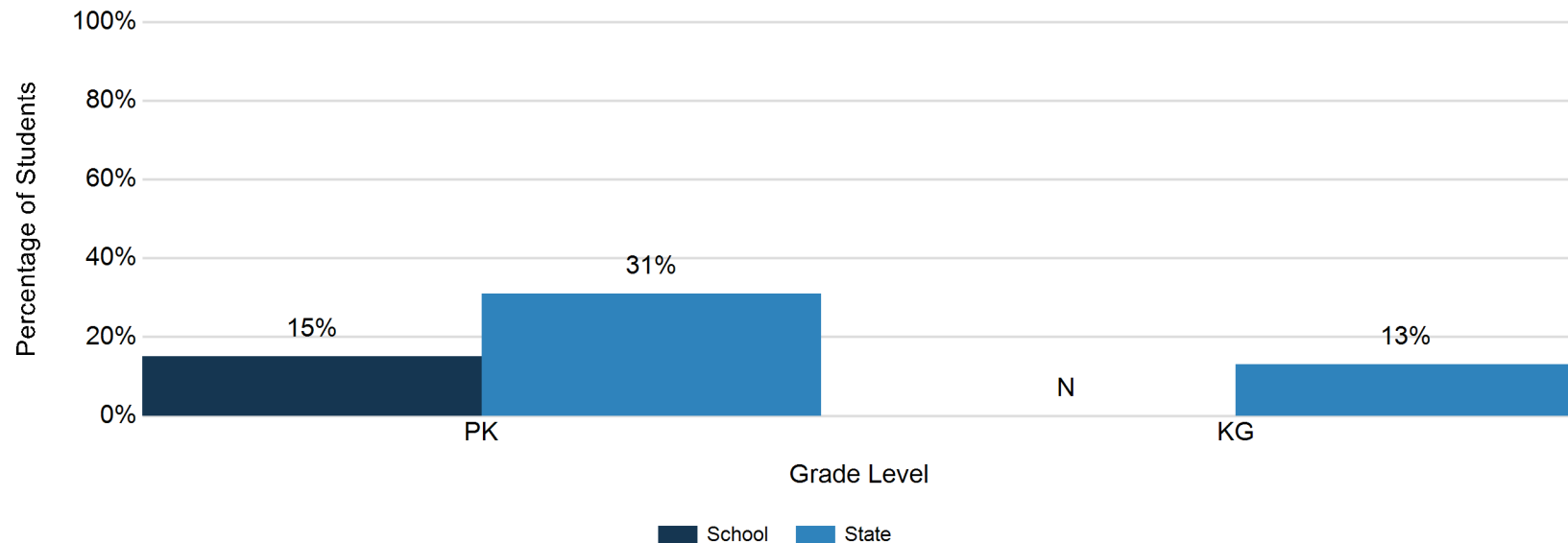
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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade

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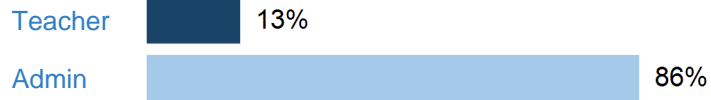
Teachers and Administrators - Level of Education

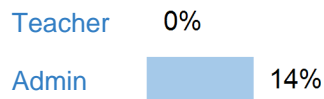
Bachelor's Degree

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Courses, Curriculum, Instruction:

All academic programs are based on the New Jersey Student Learning Standards. Literacy, mathematics, science, and social studies are integrated with character education and civic awareness in the students' daily schedules. Using exploration and discovery as a way of learning at each student's own pace, teachers utilize NJ Department of Education approved "Creative Curriculum", enabling preschoolers to develop confidence, creativity and lifelong critical thinking skills. In addition, "GOLD", an on-going observation based assessment system, is used as a tool to gather meaningful data to drive instruction to meet the needs of all students. The use of educational technology and teaching our students 21st century skills are critical components of our school day. Our STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Mathematics) activities engages our full-day preschool students in exploratory, play-based, multidisciplinary activities that are interactive, fun and age appropriate.



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Before and After School Programs:

Before and after school childcare is offered on site for students in preschool ages 3-5. During the summer the district also offers a full day summer camp for preschoolers. Both programs are at an additional cost. Program is run by a district coordinator.



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Student Supports and Services:

The New Egypt Primary School successfully utilizes a multi-level tiered system of supports for our classified students. The teachers convene to provide general education accommodations for students deemed to be at-risk due to difficulties related to academics, behavior, social-emotional needs or health. Students found to be eligible for special education and/or related services have placements available in In-class Resource or self-contained classes. Special education students may also be eligible to receive related services such as speech/language therapy, occupational therapy, physical therapy, counseling and adaptive physical education, as determined by the IEP team.
