REPORT.

To the Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

SIR—I have the honor to make report of the principal operations of this department for the fiscal year ended October 31st, 1907:

PERSONNEL.

The statutory organization of this department, exclusive of the line, embraces the Quartermaster's Department, Commissary Department, Pay Department and Ordnance Department, consisting of seven officers, as follows:

The Quartermaster-General, with rank of Brigadier-General, who is also Commissary-General, Paymaster-General, Chief Medical Purveyor, Medical Storekeeper and Chief of Ordnance;
One Assistant Commissary-General, with the rank of Colonel;
Two Assistant Quartermasters-General, with the rank of Colonel;
One Deputy Quartermaster-General, with the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel;
One Assistant Paymaster-General, with the rank of Major;
One Assistant Military Storekeeper, with the rank of Captain.

From this department are issued all ordnance stores, clothing, camp and garrison equipage, Quartermaster's stores, medical and surgical supplies, and all miscellaneous stores, including transportation for the use of the National Guard for drills, parades and encampments in time of peace, or for actual service if called out by the Governor to suppress riot and disorder. As Paymaster-General, he has charge of all payments to troops, bills of expense incurred for encampments, and for cost of maintaining, heating and lighting the regimental armories in the State. As Commis-

sary-General, it is his duty to provide subsistence for troops when called into service at encampments or for active duty elsewhere by authority of law.

The Quartermaster-General is also custodian of the State camp grounds, rifle ranges and the State arsenal.

SMALL ARMS.

The National Guard is armed with the United States magazine rifle, model 1898, with the 1901 sight. Rifles of the new pattern (model 1903), now being manufactured by the Government, will soon be issued to the organized militia and those now in possession of the several organizations recalled.

The Chief of Ordnance, United States Army, in his report for the current fiscal year, says:

"United States Magazine Rifle, Model 1903.—A new musket, with knife bayonet and model of 1905 rear sight, has been issued to all the regular troops in service. It has, on the whole, proved most satisfactory. The minor defects mentioned in my report of a year since have been overcome, and, with the exception of the weapons in the hands of troops, the greater part have been rechambered for the model of 1906 ammunition. As soon as a sufficient quantity of this ammunition shall have been manufactured, the modified rifle will be issued, and the rifle recalled will also be converted. On this account the reserve supply of ammunition, model of 1903, has been reduced to the lowest amount possible, in order that, concurrently with the issue of the altered rifle, the new ammunition will be available and the model of 1903 ammunition exhausted."

Considerable annoyance is experienced by this department, and consequent delay in acknowledging the return of military property to the State arsenal, by the neglect of officers to notify this office by properly itemized invoices, or even a letter of advice and bill of lading covering such returns, frequently leaving such details to non-commissioned officers or janitors unfamiliar with the simple procedure necessary in making returns of military stores. This department has adopted the United States Army combination form of invoice and receipt for making transfers or returns of property, a supply of which may be obtained upon application to this office.

All boxes, packages or bundles of stores returned to the State

arsenal should be plainly marked or tagged "The Quartermaster-General, Trenton, N. J., from (name, rank and organization of officer making the return)."

A careful observance of these instructions would tend to facilitate the work of this department.

PROPERTY ACCOUNTABILITY.

The present forms of blanks used for annual returns of ordnance and clothing are modifications of the United States Army forms, and are those now generally in use by the organized militia of the States conforming to the requirements of the United States Militia laws. The directions published on these returns should be carefully read, and a close compliance therewith should be observed. They are not complicated, and if all entries thereon are intelligently made, all difficulties attending the speedy settlements of accounts for ordnance and clothing will be avoided.

These returns are due October 1st, and the blank forms will be sent out on or about September 15th. Should copies be needed before that time they can be furnished upon application to this office.

This department has considerable trouble owing to the carelessness in settlements of accounts by company and other officers charged with public property, and failure to make adjustments of deficiencies in case of transfer of such property to another officer, or by obtaining, under plea that "it is just a matter of form," a receipt for the full amount of the retiring officer's accountability without first taking a careful inventory of all State stores in possession of the command. This practice places the receiving officer in the position of being accountable for articles of ordnance, clothing or equipment that may have been lost to the command before such transfer.

General Orders No. 9, 1907, recently issued from the office of the Adjutant-General, bearing on this subject, is published herewith for the information of all concerned:

(GENERAL ORDERS No. 9.)

TRENTON, October 3d, 1907.

The attention of commanding officers of regiments is called to the following regulations adopted by the State Military Board and approved by the Commander-in-Chief:

1. Immediately upon receipt of a company commandant's resignation by the commanding officer of his regiment, he shall issue orders to the Senior Lieutenant to assume command of such company and to at once assemble said company for inspection of arms and equipment and to give triplicate receipt for all such arms and equipment as he receives, said receipt to be disposed of as follows: One copy to be sent to the Quartermaster-General; one to be given to the Captain resigning, and one to be retained by the Regimental Commander.

2. Any loss or deficiency remaining after such transfer will then be adjusted with the resigning officer by cash settlement or affidavit as the circumstances attending such loss or deficiency may require.

On the subject of clothing accountability, the circular issued from this office under date of January 16th, 1907, must be strictly adhered to, and the attention of responsible officers is especially called to paragraph 3 of the above-mentioned circular, published herewith:

TRENTON, January 16th, 1907.

Previous to 1903, half the cost of uniforms for the National Guard was borne by the organization for which the uniforms were furnished, by stoppage against the annual State appropriation of such organization. Since 1903 the cost of uniforms has been borne entirely by the State.

The wisdom of this change, which was effected by legislation, has since been questioned, as the experience is that now commanding officers do not exercise the same discretion in making requisition for uniforms as when they knew that the half cost thereof would be stopped against their State appropriation. In order to compel more care in this important matter, the attention of commanding officers of regiments, troops, batteries and signal and telegraph corps, regimental quartermasters and company commandants is called to the following regulations by which they are to be governed in making requisitions for uniforms:

1. As the appropriations, both State and National, are limited, it should be understood that the greatest care and economy must be closely observed in making and filling requisitions for uniforms.

2. As the maximum strength of infantry companies has been, by Executive Orders No. 3, December 18th, 1906, fixed at sixty-five enlisted men, all serviceable uniforms over and above that number, now in possession of companies, should be carefully inspected, cleaned, repaired and altered, and utilized to the fullest possible extent in fitting out recruits, or in replacing such parts of the regulation uniform as may be worn beyond repair.

3. No uniforms will be issued in excess of the actual strength of an organization at the time the requisition is made. If uniforms asked for are for recruits, and the issue thereof would make the total exceed such strength, the unserviceable uniforms in excess must be returned to the State Arsenal where credit will be given therefor. Otherwise the cost of the new uniforms will be charged against the annual State appropriation.

REQUIREMENTS OF THE DICK BILL.

Section 3 of the National Guard act (known as the Dick bill), to promote the efficiency of the militia, approved January 21st, 1903, requires that, in order to participate in the apportionment of the annual appropriation provided by section 1661 of the revised statutes, as amended, of which New Jersey's allotment is \$47,874.48,

"the organization, armament and discipline of the organized militia in the several States and Territories, and in the District of Columbia, shall be the same as that which is now or may hereinafter be prescribed for the Regular or Volunteer Armies of the United States within five years from the date of the approval of this act," &c.

In order to place the National Guard on a footing for actual service as required by the above act, and to insure the continuance of our appropriation, additional clothing and equipment, the aggregate estimated cost of which is \$26,000, will be necessary.

If an entire brigade was excused from encampment in 1908, and the saving made diverted to the purchase of the additional stores, the proper equipment of the National Guard could be completed without any specific appropriation therefor.

FIELD ARTILLERY.

I am much gratified to be able to report that orders have been issued to Rock Island (Ill.) arsenal by the Ordnance Department, United States Army, for the transportation and delivery to this State, for the use of Battery B, Field Artillery, Captain Samuel G. Barnard commanding, of four (4) three-inch B. L. field guns, model of 1905, with the carriages, caissons and limbers, together with all small arms, accoutrements and horse furniture necessary for its complete equipment.

STATE CAMP GROUNDS AND ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT.

The several organizations of the National Guard, with the exception of the Third Regiment Infantry, which was excused from camp duty in order to participate in the work of the Coast Artillery, United States Army, at Fort Hancock, encamped at Sea Girt, from July 8th to August 3d, in the following order:

- Fifth Regiment Infantry and Battery A, Field Artillery, July 8th to 13th;
- First Regiment Infantry and First Troop Cavalry, July 15th to 20th;
- Fourth Regiment Infantry and Signal and Telegraph Corps, July 22d to 27th;
- Second Regiment Infantry, Second Troop Cavalry and Battery B, Field Artillery, July 29th to August 3d.

As the several organizations were permitted to enter camp on the Saturday previous to the date assigned them, respectively, the encampment continued without intermission from Saturday, July 6th, until Saturday, August 3d.

Concrete floors were provided for the mess kitchens at the head of company streets, greatly improving thereby their sanitary condition.

The amount, \$11,691.93, for subsistence does not represent the net cost of subsisting the troops during the encampment, as subsistence costing \$1,794.47 should be deducted therefrom as being supplied at cost to officers' mess of the several organizations, over and above the allowance of 27 cents per day per man:

After deducting the amount of these sales from the cost of commissary stores purchased, the net cost for subsisting the organizations would be \$9,897.46, or an average of 33 3-7 cents per day per man. The officers of the Second Regiment, First and Second Troops Cavalry, and the Signal and Telegraph Corps, did not purchase any stores from the Commissary Department at Sea Girt in excess of the allowance as above.

The appropriation committee having provided the necessary funds for the purchase of the two strips of land immediately adjacent to the camp grounds, the acquisition of which by the State

was authorized by the act of March 29th, 1904, the money, \$23,500, has been paid and the title vested in the State.

With the principal tract of land acquired in 1891 for camp purposes, the entire area now consists of one hundred and sixty-five acres, at a total cost for acquisition of \$88,085.27, a low price when the location and attractive features of this magnificent site are considered.

I regret to report that nothing was done by the appropriation committee toward providing for the cost of properly disposing of the sewage from the camp grounds. The State Sewerage Commission has notified this department of complaints received of injury done by the pollution of Stockton lake or Newbury's pond. The engineer of the commission has been requested to make an inspection of the present system, with a view to its betterment to meet the legal requirements. The engineer has also been requested to make an estimate of the cost of any plan he may suggest, which estimate will be submitted to the appropriation committee of the Legislature, with the request that the amount be placed in the Supplemental Appropriation bill.
