To his Excellency, George B. McClellan, Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit the following report of this Department for the year 1880:

Office Business.—The regular business of the office has been transacted as carefully and as promptly as in past years. The applications for information as to military service have largely increased and much of our time is given to necessary searches among the official records.

Pensions.—The pension list of the State under the "Act for the relief of soldiers and sailors of this State in the war of eighteen hundred and twelve," approved March 12th, 1874, and the various supplements thereto, contains at this date but twenty-three (23) persons. In accordance with the provisions of the supplement approved April 5th, 1878, I have made application for one hundred and eighty-eight (188) pensioners of this State for pension from the United States under act of Congress, approved March 9th, 1878, their claims have been prosecuted without expense to the applicant, and they have been allowed by the Commissioner of Pensions. This cancels their names from the records of the State and they now receive their relief from the general government; a saving to the State of a large amount of funds. All the cases presented by me to the pension department have been finally acted upon and my duties under the supplement to the law referred to have been completed. The pension list of the State now includes only those who have performed an insufficient term of service under the provisions of the amended act of Congress, and the soldiers, or if deceased, their widows, who performed certain special military duties for the State during the war of 1812, which service was not officially recognized by the War Department. From an ex-

penditure of \$30,000 in the year 1877, the pension fund has been reduced to less than \$2000. Under the supplement to the act first alluded to, approved March 3d, 1880, I had fourteen (14) applications for the arrears of pension, and acting under the interpretation of the law given by the Attorney-General, I certified to the Comptroller of the Treasury seven (7) of these cases and rejected the balance.

Pension Claims of New Jersey Volunteers.—The Legislature, at its last session, by joint resolution, approved March 10th, 1880, authorized and empowered you to direct me to examine, either in person or by an assistant, into a large number of unsettled claims for pensions of New Jersey volunteers, now pending before the Pension Department of the United States, made by worthy soldiers in needy circumstances, and to urge their allowance by the proper auditing officers of the treasury. Under this joint resolution, it was found necessary, for a time, to employ an assistant resident in Washington to urge the immediate settlement of these claims. This continued for some months, and many claims reached a successful issue. Soon after the publication of the law, the pressure for official action by me was very great. Under the spirit of the act I declined to allow this office to be used in such cases, which, perhaps, had but just been filed, and I only took notice of such special cases of worthy soldiers in peculiarly needy circumstances, of those whose applications had been filed for a long time, and such as would warrant me in making an appeal to the Commissioner of Pensions for immediate action. I did not think the law directed me to use this office to press the attention of the Pension Department to the entire roll of applicants from this State for pensions. I knew well that if I did so, such a wholesale effort would be fruitless. I have therefore kept my labors strictly to the cases of those in very needy condition, to those in great physical distress, and to those whom, by correspondence or otherwise, I was satisfied needed the direct and immediate attention

which I could give the claims officially. The result has been very successful, and I have aided in obtaining pensions for a large number of the soldiers, and the widows of soldiers of this State. The Commissioner of Pensions has, with the greatest courtesy, shown me every facility possible in urging the allowance of these claims, and given them such attention as my endorsement warranted. His department is not expected to give this State any invidious preference, but hampered as he is, by the great magnitude of the business and the limited clerical aid furnished him, the task of making early settlements, in every case, seems almost hopeless. I can only express my thanks for the constant favors he has shown me, in cases which I deemed worthy his special attention. During the last months of the fiscal year I have thought it proper, with your approval, to send an assistant from this office to look after these claims, and at every visit he has received the same courtesy, and his work has been attended with marked success.

Records of the Office.—For several years I have felt it my duty to call the attention of the Executive of the State to the insecurity of the valuable records of this department. I confidently expect serious consequences from the very inflammable contents of this room, and desire especially to decline any responsibility, if, at any time, the records of the military history of our State should be destroyed by fire. I have given years of labor to the proper compilation of these records; I am proud of their present completeness and reliability, and I speak with much feeling when I regret that this work for the State is left for one hour in its present dangerous condition.

National Guard.—The National Guard of this State is composed of forty-nine (49) companies of infantry, one (1) battery of artillery, and two (2) gatling gun companies. This is an increase of two companies of infantry during the year. The force now consists of two hundred and sixty (260) officers and thirty-one hundred and forty-nine (3149) men, an increase, during the year, of twenty (20) officers and one hundred and sixty-two (162) men.

Orders.—General orders have been issued, publishing the uniform full dress and undress uniform of the officers, and the regulation uniform for active service for enlisted men; in reference to orders and instructions in the Inspector's Department; announcing the appointment of the Judge Advocate General; publishing two supplements to the National Guard law; announcing the proceedings, findings, and sentences of the General Court Martial, in reference to certain officers of the First Regiment; explaining the powers and duties under the law of civil officers in case of breach of the peace, tumult, riot, or resistance to process of this State, or apprehension of imme-

diate danger of the same; organizing the First Battalion in the First Brigade.

Commissions.—The number of officers commissioned during the year is sixty-six (66); the number resigned, thirty-two (32); and two (2) dismissed; two (2) officers have died, and two (2) commissions have been returned and canceled.

Discharges.—During the year, one hundred and twenty-four (124) men have been honorably discharged, on account of expiration of term of service.

Rifle Practice.—The troops of this State have had another year of practice with the rifle at the ranges of the State. Their improvement in the skillful use of their weapon has been apparent during the entire season and is very gratifying to all who have charge of this branch of the military service. The splendid score made by the New Jersey team last year at the Inter-State military match at Creedmoor, has been followed by our team this year carrying off the prize from the well-trained contestants of other States. For special details of this contest, as well as other facts of interest in relation to this subject, you are referred to the report of the General Inspector of Rifle Practice.

Condition and Improvement of the Military Force.—During the year a considerable portion of the Guard has been furnished with the new regulation uniform for active service. It has been received with great satisfaction by the troops and it gives them at once a soldierly look and makes the force, so far as they have received it, present a perfectly uniform appearance. This plan is being carried out in other States and its effect upon the whole body of our National Guard will soon be apparent. The standard of drill and efficiency which has characterized our force for several years has been maintained during the year just past. It is to-day as fully prepared for prompt action as it was found to be in the summer of 1877. At the same time we seek to improve it in every possible way. This cannot be done by enacting for us a quantity of badly-constructed laws and acts which cannot be made operative. Nor, in my opinion, can it be done by the compilation and publication by authority of a voluminous military code. A law simple in its nature, easily understood and efficiently executed, is sufficient for our purpose. Wherein it fails, the army regulations, familiar to many of the men, will certainly suffice. We think it possible to give the citizen soldier too much law to comply with, to give the officer of citizen soldiery too many blanks to fill, too many returns to make, too much clerical duty to perform.

His entire time does not belong to the State. At the same time we welcome any plans which will improve the National Guard of this State and make it assimilate in all that is excellent with the force of other States, and with the condition and efficiency of the Army of the United States. It is with pleasure that we note that the authorities of the War Department have the disposition to aid in raising the military force of the several States to the same high standard as the regular army. They may confidently expect our co-operation.

The splendid appearance of the Second Brigade, Brevet Major-General Sewell commanding, in Philadelphia, December 16th, 1879, on the occasion of the reception of General Grant, gave that organization a reputation for excellence in drill and discipline which it well deserved. The manœuvres of the First Brigade, Brevet Major-General Plume commanding, at their field day at Pompton, in Passaic county, May 31st, 1880, while it recalled the battle-field of other days to the veterans of that command, gave the younger men such a lesson in the tactics of war as greatly benefited them and to a certain degree accustomed them to the movements of troops in active service.

Reports.—The annual report of the Assistant Adjutant General, Chief of Enrolling and Drafting, has been received and is herewith submitted.


The annual report of the General Inspector, with returns of Inspectors of the Brigades of the National Guard, is annexed, to which you are referred for special information as to its numbers and general efficiency.

The annual report of the General Inspector of Rifle Practice is also submitted.

A roster of the officers of the National Guard is added.

REPORT OF GENERAL INSPECTOR.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,
OFFICE OF GENERAL INSPECTOR,
TRENTON, December 10th, 1880. }

GENERAL:—I have the honor to submit my annual report and transmit herewith the Muster and Inspection returns of the National Guard of New Jersey.

The total number present for duty at Muster and Inspection was two thousand four hundred and forty-nine (2,449) enlisted men, and two hundred and twenty-eight (228) officers.

The total number of absentees consisted of seven hundred (700) enlisted men, and thirty-two (32) officers.

Battery A, at Hoboken, was the first inspected, and was dismounted. This command show a lack of discipline, and is very deficient in drill. The books and papers are not in a satisfactory condition. Additional new uniforms are much needed.

The Fourth Regiment was next inspected. Their appearance and discipline were good, the books and papers in fair condition, and an improvement since last inspection. I commend to your attention the remarks of Colonel Howard (whose report I have hereto attached), Inspector of First Brigade, upon the discipline and military appearance of this regiment. "There is little," he remarks, "to criticise and much to commend in this command." This is due to a competent commander, and reflects great credit upon the officers, non-commissioned officers and men of the command.

Company B, at Passaic was next inspected. This is a new company, and but lately mustered into the service, and has in the short time that it has been in existence, by the energy of enthusiastic officers, become a very creditable addition to the Regiment.

The Fifth Regiment, at Newark, was the next inspected. This Regiment is much in need of uniforms, those now in use being very poor and much worn. The equipments should be replaced with new ones throughout. As a general thing, the books and papers of this Regiment are incomplete and improperly kept, the military appearance and discipline fair.

Companies B and C of the Second Battalion are in good condition, but books and papers are incomplete.

The Ninth Regiment does not compare favorably with the other regiments of the Brigade. Their tardiness in formation for Muster and Inspection shows a laxness of discipline not calculated to encourage military ardor. No regimental books were present for inspection. It is not then surprising that Companies A, B and E should also be without books of record.

The other companies have, however, shown some improvement since last inspection. With the exception of Company A, the general appearance and drill of the several companies were good. Company A presented a very poor appearance and only partially uniformed, and seemingly ignorant of their drill, and mustered below the minimum. In view of these facts, I would recommend that Company A be disbanded, and as this would reduce the command to a battalion, the Colonel should be retired.

The general appearance of the First Regiment, as well as drill, was excellent.

I will respectfully call your attention to the general absence of system in keeping regimental and company records, as well as to the absence of unity in the manner of enrolling. I would then suggest that a form for all returns and records be furnished as a guide to the officers.

The recommendation of Colonel Howard, in reference to the Examining Board to be appointed by brigade commanders, for the examination of officers to be appointed or promoted, is worthy of favorable consideration, as well as the one requiring the submitting of muster rolls to regimental commanders, before the muster.

I would recommend a general inspection of all unserviceable arms and equipments, with a view to condemnation, and the issue, in their stead, of serviceable arms and equipments, at as early a date as practicable.

Lieut.-Colonel D. B. Murphy, Inspector of the Second Brigade, has failed to furnish any report of his inspections.

SIR:—I have the honor to report that, during the present month, in pursuance of general orders No. 4, Headquarters First Brigade, dated Newark, April 7th, 1880, I have inspected and mustered the several commands comprising this brigade, and herewith forward the several company, field and staff, battery, and consolidated brigade rolls, and inspection returns thereof.

On Saturday, May 1st, I inspected and mustered Battery A, dismounted and without its guns, at Hoboken. I regret that I am obliged to report, in regard to this command, a lack of proper discipline among both officers and enlisted men. The command shows the need of "setting up" and drilling in dismounted movements.

I would recommend that, in addition to the drills by section, now held, that the several sections be required to meet at some central location (Hoboken), at stated periods, to drill as a battery, both dismounted and with its guns.

The battery-books and papers were not in a satisfactory condition, but show quite a marked improvement over the books and papers presented for inspection last year.

Additional new uniforms are needed in this command, and many of those now in use should be condemned.

On the 4th inst. I inspected and mustered the Hudson county companies of the Fourth Regiment, at Jersey City.

The general appearance of this command was very fine, both as to the material and military deportment of its members.

The uniforms were in good, serviceable condition, and very few men were without full dress; some of the belts were in need of repairs.

The books and papers of this command were in fair condition, especially the headquarters books and the books and papers of Company C, as to appearance and completeness. There is, however, room for improvement, by assimilating the books in use by the several companies.

Some companies have enlistment papers, and others have, in lieu thereof, one enlistment paper, in the shape of a roll, which is signed by all recruits.

I am able to report some increase in the number of company books in use, and an improvement in their appearance, since last inspection.

The armory of this command is much too small for the proper inspection of five companies of infantry, and I was therefore unable to require an exhibition of the proficiency of the command in battalion movements.

The several companies, however, acquitted themselves very creditably in the school of the soldier, and company movements.

There is very little to criticise in this command, and much to commend.

On the 20th inst. I inspected and mustered the new Company B at Passaic. This company has been in existence but a few months, but has in that short time, under the command of a competent captain, become a very creditable addition to the Fourth Regiment, which is, in my opinion, saying a good deal in its favor.

The books and papers were of the proper form, and were neatly kept.

The drill and discipline were admirable. The uniforms were new.

On the 7th inst. I mustered and inspected Companies A and B of the Second Battalion, at battalion headquarters, Leonia.

The general appearance of the two commands was very good, and considering the limited space at their disposal, they acquitted themselves with credit in all the battalion movements that were attempted. The books and papers of the Battalion and of Company A (Company B did not present its books and papers), although not kept in the usual manner, and in the form prescribed by the State, are examples of exactness and neatness, and I would respectfully recommend that no change be made.

The arms and equipments are in first-class order, and appear to be well taken care of.

On the 17th inst. I mustered and inspected Company C of this command at Hackensack. Since the last annual muster this company has provided itself with a new armory, which is, in every particular, much more desirable than the old one.

The company presented a fine appearance. The uniforms and equipments were in very fair condition. Some of the arms need slight repairs, and they should be called in at once. The discipline and drill was quite satisfactory. The books and papers of the command have been neatly kept, although not in the books nor in the form prescribed by the State.

On the 10th inst. I mustered and inspected the Fifth Regiment at Newark.

The formation of the regimental line and passage in review was fairly well executed.

This command is in need of a few new uniforms and a number of new equipments, particularly belts.

The headquarters' books and papers were in fair condition and completeness.

The orders and letters are kept on files instead of in books.

Company C has neither books nor papers.

Company D has neither books nor papers.

The balance of the companies in this regiment have some books, but they are not uniform in form and style.

On the 12th inst. I mustered and inspected the Ninth Regiment at Hoboken.

The command was not formed for inspection until an hour after the time appointed in General Orders.

No headquarters' books were presented for inspection.

Company A has *not* presented any books for inspection during the past two years, although the Captain reports that Company books are kept.

The other Companies have improved the appearance of their company books and papers during the past year, and are gradually approaching the State standard.

Company E has neither books nor papers.

Company B did not present any books for inspection.

Some of the Companies are entirely without enlistment papers.

The general appearance and drill of the several companies, with the exception of Company A, were good. Company A presented a very bad appearance; several of the men were but partially uniformed.

They seemed to know but little about the manual of arms or company movements, and as a Company were not a credit to the National Guard, and as they inspected less than the minimum, should be disbanded.

On the 18th inst. I inspected and mustered the First Regiment at Newark.

The general appearance and drill of the several Companies of this Regiment were good.

There are quite a large number of belts and belt-plates unfit for service, and should be replaced with new material at once.

The arms are in fair condition, but many of them should be reblued or browned.

The headquarters' books and papers of this command are in a fair condition.

The company books and papers are not of the proper number or form, and those that are kept are not in good order.

Most of the commands in this brigade are equipped with cartridge-boxes lined with tin, which are unfit for the present fixed ammunition in general use. A wooden lining is better adapted to hold the cartridge in such a manner that it is more readily taken from the box when wanted, and less likely to drop out when the men are on the march.

The new regulation bayonet-sabbard, lately issued from the Quartermaster General's Department, is so constructed that it cannot be

worn on the cross-belt, and the web body-belt, in general use, is not stiff enough to hold the same in position.

The regimental commandants, without exception, failed to parade their respective commands for inspection, at the hour designated in orders.

This, I consider, tends to encourage a want of promptitude among the company officers, which is to be regretted.

I regret that I am obliged to report that a large majority of the company muster-rolls were not properly or correctly filled out, nor had there apparently been any attempt to follow the directions published in orders; the result of which is to triple the labors of the mustering officer, and delay the forwarding of the rolls.

In view of the seeming lack of knowledge on the part of the company officers as to the proper manner of making out and forwarding the usual and ordinary papers, rolls and returns, in use at the present time, I would respectfully recommend—

That all officers elect shall, prior to the issuing of their commission, be examined by a board of officers, to be appointed by the brigade commandants, as to their qualification and fitness to fill the office to which they have been elected.

I would also recommend that all company muster-rolls be submitted to regimental headquarters, prior to the date fixed for the muster of such company, in order that any errors may be eliminated before the rolls are presented to the inspecting officer.

Since writing the above, I have had an opportunity, at Pompton, of seeing the practical working of the cartridge-boxes now in use. When the men were in the prone positions, the cartridges could not be taken from the boxes without more or less spilling.

REPORT OF GENERAL INSPECTOR OF RIFLE PRACTICE.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,
OFFICE OF GENERAL INSPECTOR
AND INSPECTOR OF RIFLE PRACTICE,
TRENTON, N. J., November 1st, 1880. }

GENERAL:—I have the honor to submit the following report of rifle practice for the year 1880 :

Armory rifle practice with the reduced cartridge, adopted early in 1879, and manufactured at the State Arsenal, under the direction of the Acting Chief of Ordnance, was resumed by the National Guard, commencing January 5th. The regulations and instructions announced in Circular Orders No. 1, Headquarters National Guard, Series of 1879, were strictly adhered to. This order made an allowance of ten (10) rounds of ammunition per man per month, to be furnished by the Chief of Ordnance, upon proper requisition, taking the last quarterly return as a basis. The practice was continued during the months of January, February, March, April and May. Each company was furnished with reduced cartridges, and many have practiced in the Rifle Gallery, on an average, twice per month. In some instances, marksmen have had extra practice. Field, staff and non-commissioned staff have practiced, and, as a whole, each successive month showed improvement on the preceding month's practice. The companies were instructed in the position and aiming drills, by Regimental and Batalion Inspectors of Rifle Practice. The practice brought out some remarkably good shots, who made their mark, during the season, on the ranges. Some of the companies have shown superior skill with the rifle, which is due, greatly, to the Inspectors of Rifle Practice, who have acted with great promptness, and have taken a lively interest in armory practice. The beneficial result of the practice was manifest in the large attendance at practice and drill, and the good inspection in the month of May last. I do not for a moment doubt but that the armory practice has been the means of instilling life in all the companies of the guard.

In accordance with the fifty-first section of the act of the Legislature, approved March 15th, 1878, authorizing the Governor and Com-

mander-in-Chief "to contract with any association in this State having a military rifle range, for the use of said range by the National Guard of this State, for the perfection of the force in rifle practice," contracts have been made with the officers of the New Jersey State Rifle Association, the Stockton Rifle Range Association, and the Columbia Rifle Association, for the use of their ranges, located at Elizabeth, Camden and Hoboken, by the National Guard. The contracts stipulated for the use of the ranges with markers and all necessary appurtenances, from the 1st day of May until the 1st day of November. Brinton Range, at Elizabeth, was used by the First Brigade, the Third Regiment of the Second Brigade, and Gatling Gun Company A; Stockton Range, Camden, by the Sixth and Seventh Regiments of the Second Brigade; and Columbia Range, Hoboken, by the Ninth Regiment and First and Second Battalions of the First Brigade.

On the 20th of April, Circular No. 2, from this office, giving instructions for rifle practice on the ranges, to commence on the 1st of May and continue until the 1st of November, was issued. The forms laid down and the instructions given in "Wingate's Manual," were carried out as far as practicable. Forty (40) rounds of ammunition per man was allowed during the season. The ammunition was furnished by the Acting Chief of Ordnance upon proper requisition, duly approved.

It is a source of congratulation that the guard has returned, at the close of the season, out of 1284 practicing, 461 marksmen, 73 first class, 347 second class, and 403 third class, a large increase over the season of 1879, at which there were, out of 1332 practicing, 275 marksmen, 160 first class, 428 second class, and 469 third class.

Your attention is called to the reports of the Second Battalion and Gatling Gun Company A. The battalion returns 78 marksmen, 2 first class, 5 second class, and 1 third class, with a figure of merit of 44.64; and the Gatling Gun Company returns 26 marksmen, 2 first class, 3 second class, and 1 third class, with a figure of merit of 48.62. Battery A, not being armed with rifles, has no record of practice. Gatling Gun Company B did not receive rifles until so late in the season, it was not placed on the range.

At the last session of the Legislature a supplement to the act for the organization of the National Guard was introduced in the Senate, on the 10th of March, two days prior to the final adjournment. This bill authorized and empowered the Governor and Commander-in-Chief to select a team from the National Guard to compete for prizes, either within or without the State. It passed the Senate on the afternoon of the following day, and was carried to the House of Assembly too late for action in that body. Thus no authority existed by law for the formation of such a team. Nothing was done towards perfecting one to take part in the fall meeting of the National Rifle Association at Creedmoor, until late in the month of August, when Lieut.-Col. Howard, Inspector, and other officers of the First Brigade met at Brigade Headquarters on the evening of the 30th of August, for the purpose of consultation and selecting a sufficient number of marksmen to compete for the prizes offered through the National Rifle Association. Col. Howard was made Captain of the team thus formed, with Capt. Denman, Inspector Rifle Practice First Regiment, as Adjutant, and Capt. DeMott, Inspector Rifle Practice Second Battalion, as Quartermaster. The time for practice was limited, and the men had but little opportunity to accustom themselves to shooting at Creedmoor. Valuable aid in furnishing Sharp's Rifles, ammunition, and camp equipage, was rendered by the Quartermaster General, Acting Chief of Ordnance, without whose active co-operation and assistance the efforts of the men composing the team would have been entirely unsuccessful. With the little time the men were enabled to practice at Brinton, they proceeded to Creedmoor and took part in the Inter-National and Inter-State matches, on the 15th and 16th of September, when they competed against teams from the States of Connecticut, New York and Pennsylvania, and three divi-

sions of the Regular Army, being the winner in the Inter-State match by a score of 959 to—

Connecticut, 933.

New York, 932.

Pennsylvania, 837.

Securing as the prize the bronze statue of "The Soldier of Marathon," which had been previously won and awarded to the

Team from New York in 1875.

Team from Connecticut in 1876.

Team from California in 1877.

Team from New York in 1878.

The discipline and unanimity of the team was complete, and their uniforms, arms and equipments were equal, if not superior, to any of the contesting teams. Great credit is due to Col. Howard and the individual members of the team for their perseverance in carrying out the object they had in view when they started. Permit me to refer you to his interesting report, submitted herewith as an appendix. It is proper to remark that all expenses incident to the team, with the exception of transportation to and from New York, and ammunition, have been settled by Col. Howard. It is believed that a joint resolution to re-imburse him the amount expended will be presented at the coming session of the Legislature, and I earnestly recommend its passage. A supplement to the act for the organization of the National Guard, similar to the one passed by the Senate last March, will be introduced early in the session. In my opinion, the supplement should be passed, not only as an encouragement to the men, but as a means of further improvement in marksmanship and skill. In this connection I beg to call your attention to the following recommendation of the Quartermaster General, in his annual report for the year 1879: "It being settled that there is no provision under the laws of this State authorizing the payment of expenses incurred by teams at rifle matches at ranges outside of the limits of the State, it is respectfully suggested that the Legislature be requested to pass an act empowering the Commander-in-Chief to cause one or more teams, at his discretion, to be selected and entered for competition in rifle matches at ranges, either within or without the State; and that he be authorized to make his requisition upon the Comptroller to meet the expenses incident thereto." Should such an act be passed and approved, efforts will be made to organize a team by the middle of July, giving it sufficient practice to successfully contest with any and all competitors.

The matches taking place at Brinton Range during the season were the match for the Schuyler, Hartley & Graham Trophy, shot October 6th; won for the third time by the Ninth Regiment Team. The score of the contesting teams was as follows:

The "McClellan" trophy was won this year at Brinton Range by Private Frank W. Allaire, Seventh Regiment, and the "Sterling" and "Mott" badges by Lieut. Col. James M. Dart, Assistant Inspector Rifle Practice, Second Brigade.

At the range of the Stockton Rifle Range Association, seven hundred and ten (710) officers and men of the Sixth and Seventh Regiments, practiced during the season of 1880. The military matches for prizes offered by the State, viz.: Rifles and trophies did not prove a success, owing to the want of a proper understanding of the conditions and a feeling of uncertainty about getting the prizes. Only fourteen entries

were made in these matches, which did not pay the cost of issuing circulars announcing these prize competitions, and even these few competitors are asking for the return of their entrance money on the plea that they have not heard of a prize being awarded. The association, since the opening of the range, has received no prizes on behalf of the State for military competition, such as are offered at Brinton Range. The following is a statement of the military matches the past season on this range:

Teams participating must appear in the uniform of their respective corps, and no person to shoot in more than one team. Prize, a silver trophy, value \$50, presented by General E. Champion Marksman's Badge Match. For the Second Brigade National Guard of New Jersey. Prize, a *fac simile* in gold of the Marksman's Badge issued by the State, offered by the Stockton Rifle Range Association. To be awarded to the competitor who at the close of the season shall have won it the greatest number of times. This prize was won by Capt. Chas. Y. Bamford, Inspector Rifle Practice, Seventh Regiment N. G.

The season just closed has shown an improvement in business on the previous one, and although not sufficient to make the Range self-sustaining, will compare favorably with the second season of any first-class range in the country, although it is at great disadvantage in not having a long range. The opportunity is now offered to extend the range to one thousand yards, the Association having secured the refusal of the land necessary for the purpose; and if this is done, the Association will be able to retain the patronage of Philadelphia and vicinity, and if not, the Philadelphians will construct a long range themselves, which would affect the business of Stockton Range very materially. The Association has added to its grounds the past year a piece of land on the eastern side, 100 x 1500 feet, which widens out the range proper to 210 feet, making it much more convenient and less dangerous.

I herewith give the names of all members of the National Guard who are entitled to the Marksman's Badge for 1880.

A comparison of the results of three years' practice by the National Guard of New Jersey shows a steady increase in the number of marksmen, and a decided advancement in the figure of merit. It is believed that this branch of military instruction is peculiarly fitted for the National Guard, increasing its military efficiency, and, being one of the most agreeable and intelligent portions of such instruction, it has interested the officers and men, and done much to induce many to join the ranks. The continuance of the practice is recommended, and all improvements to facilitate it should be adopted.

The duties of the Assistant Inspectors and Inspectors of Rifle Practice are arduous, and, if properly performed, require much of their time and an immense amount of labor, mentally and bodily. They are good shots (with one exception, marksmen,) and interested in the subject of their duties. The services required of them in the supervision of the rifle practice of their respective commands, the special charge of the instruction of officers and men, making up reports and returns, and settling their accounts for cartridges and shells with the Ordnance Department, take up a considerable portion of their time. I cannot help but express my opinion, and wish that they should receive an annual salary sufficiently large enough to retain them, or secure the services of good and reliable officers for the position.

An improved sight for rifles, with wind gauge attachment, has been adopted by the United States Government. These sights are of value to the marksmen in securing accuracy of aim, and have given great satisfaction to expert shots. A limited number has been furnished this State, and issued by the Ordnance Department to the National Guard. I would respectfully recommend that about five hundred, or a sufficient number to supply every marksman, be fur-

nished by the Acting Chief of Ordnance upon the usual regulations of his office.

REPORT OF CAPTAIN OF STATE TEAM.

HEADQUARTERS FIRST BRIGADE, N. G. }
OFFICE OF THE BRIGADE INSPECTOR, }
NEWARK, N. J., September 18th, 1880. }

GENERAL:—In pursuance of Special Orders No. 18, C. S., from the office of Adjutant General, the officers and men therein mentioned formed themselves into a "Team" by the election of the undersigned as Captain, and thereafter Captain Isaac R. Denman was appointed Adjutant and Captain Jacob J. De Mott, Quartermaster. The team thus constituted repaired to Creedmoor, Long Island, on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of September, inst., and encamped on the range.

No regular practice was had at Creedmoor other than that obtainable on "pool targets."

On Wednesday, the fifteenth day of September, the Inter-State Match was shot. The States of New York, Connecticut, Pennsylvania and New Jersey were represented. The team representing the State of New York was drawn from the teams contesting in the several New York National Guard matches, and was composed of some of the best individual shots in the State. The team representing the State of Pennsylvania had several practice records, which, if they had been equaled in the match, would have given them the victory. The weather was most unfavorable for the making of large scores, frequent showers passed over the range during the progress of the match, the light was bad and the wind strong and puffy.

The delay in the New York State Matches compelled my team to wait for over one hour for the match to open, and owing to the damp, cold atmosphere the men were not in good condition to shoot the first stage, two hundred yards. Each team was assigned to two targets (six men on each), thus the unity of the "Team" was destroyed, and I am convinced the aggregate scores of all the teams were some twenty-five points lower than they otherwise would have been.

Annexed hereto the scores of the individual members of the team will be found, and I beg leave to call your attention to the score made by Captain Theodore W. Griffith of the Ninth Regiment at five hundred yards, which, I am informed, has never been equalled in any regular match.

On Thursday, the sixteenth day of September, inst., the International Military Match was shot at the two, five and six hundred yard ranges. The three military divisions of the Regular Army and the States of Connecticut, Pennsylvania and New Jersey were represented.

The day was clear, but there was a troublesome "fishtail" wind all day. In the afternoon the sun became very hot, which caused the moisture in the soil to evaporate rapidly, and necessitated frequent changes of elevations whenever the clouds obscured the sun.

The following are the aggregate scores of the several teams :

While the team representing this State did not succeed in taking first place in this match, yet it will be seen by a reference to the scores, that at the longest range we tied the winning team and in the aggregate stand well ahead of the other State Teams. Considering the relative amount of time spent in team practice it is all that could have been expected. I also beg leave to call your attention to the fact that the aggregate score in this match made by the New Jersey Team of 1880 is twenty-seven points higher than that of the Team of 1879.

The Regular Army Teams were armed with the Springfield rifle; but permit me to call your attention to the fact that the Springfield rifle with which our National Guard is armed is comparatively a very inferior piece, both in the rifling and size of chamber. The rifle in use by the Regular Army Teams has six grooves, whereas that in use by our National Guard has three. The one is chambered for from seventy to one hundred grains of powder, while the other can accommodate but eighty. The sights have also been greatly improved, both for elevation and wind, and, in fact, the Regular Army Teams shot

with long-range sporting rifles, stocked and mounted as military pieces.

The mechanical devices used on the range by the Regular Army Teams, in order to improve their scores, were novelties that I, for lack of time, was unable to examine with that care required in order to report on their usefulness when applied to rifle shooting. I am convinced, however, that mechanical devices for measuring the force and direction of the wind may be used to advantage in team shooting, when the team is well in hand and has a careful "coach." But for individual shooting I have seen nothing that can take the place of a flag, which, to the eye of a careful and observing marksman, conveys all the desired information.

My experience on the range leads me to believe that the winds most to be feared by the marksmen are what are termed "fish-tail," and, after repeated experiments, I find that their bad effects can be materially overcome by the use of more lead at the longer distances. If, however, the weight of the bullet is increased, the charge of powder must be increased proportionately, necessitating a large chamber.

Although the score made by our team in the Inter-State Match this year does not equal that of last year's team, yet when one considers the relative condition of the weather, it must be admitted that an equal score was not to be expected.

I would respectfully recommend that the rifles to be used by future teams be chambered for a long-range shell, and that at the five and six hundred yards' range eighty to eighty-five grains of powder and a five hundred to five hundred and fifty grain bullet be used. I would also recommend that the State Team be formed in June.

I desire to acknowledge the assistance rendered the team by the Quartermaster General, without which no team could have been sustained, and trust that our efforts to secure the first place will meet with General Perrine's approval, and will in some slight degree compensate him for the trouble and annoyance the team has caused his department.
