## GCADA Objectives and Strategies

Under the direction of the Planning Committee of the Governor's Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse, the subcommittees of the GCADA annually develop sets of objectives and strategies that focus the Council's work and collaborative efforts for the upcoming year. The Council believes the work of the subcommittees is consistent with the "ground up" approach to planning envisioned by the Council's mission, vision, core beliefs and goals. Utilizing the strategic planning process adopted by the Council in 2002 the GCADA's subcommittees continue to develop comprehensive objectives and strategies.

The Planning Committee Chairman, Anthony Bucco, is deeply appreciative of the effort made by all Committee and Subcommittee Chairs and Co-Chairs. Chairman Bucco believes the Master Plan is an outstanding success made possible only through the selfless dedication of our volunteers and members of the Council involved in the planning process.

The Executive Committee of the Council, Neil Van Ess, John Gluck, Anthony Bucco and Harry Morey, has developed an Action Agenda for 2009 to provide guidance to all the activities of the Governor's Council and the Municipal Alliance Program.

The 2009 Objectives and Strategies were developed by the Alliance/Prevention Committee, the Criminal Juvenile Justice Subcommittee, the Legislative Subcommittee and the Treatment Subcommittee.

## **2009 ACTION AGENDA – GCADA EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE**

- I. Increase capacity of the Municipal Alliance Program**
  - Expand training opportunities for county and municipal alliances.
  - Provide targeted technical assistance to poorly functioning municipal alliances.
  - Provide additional support and resources to the Alliance Program by strengthening linkages with existing and potential collaborating partners (for example: Dept. of Education, Dept of Law and Public Safety, Dept. of Human Services, Dept. of Health and Dept. of Children and Families).
  - Enhance county and municipal alliance prevention planning process to ensure adherence to evidence based practices.
  
- II. Improve Accountability of the Municipal Alliance Program**
  - Implement enhanced Letters of Agreement between the GCADA and the Counties to ensure greater fidelity to fiscal oversight requirements.
  - Establish new fiscal and program reporting procedures in order to have counties and municipalities provide comparable and uniform documentation.
  - To promote effectiveness and efficiency the GCADA will restructure the site monitoring process for the County Alliances.
  
- III. Develop an evaluation process in order to measure the effectiveness and impact of the Alliance Program**
  - The GCADA will collaborate with County and local planning bodies (i.e. LACADA, CASS, MAC) to develop and implement an evaluation process for alliance programs.
  - The GCADA will engage a consultant to provide guidance on the use of surveys to collect data by the municipal alliances as part of the evaluation process.
  - Develop mechanisms to have municipal alliances report program effectiveness in order to make informed decisions for the 2010 and 2011 annual plan renewals.
  
- IV. Assess the needs of GCADA operations and build its capacity to provide the necessary support to the county and municipal alliances and to continue its coordinating and planning activities in collaboration with the rest of New Jersey's alcoholism and drug abuse field**
  - Review GCADA bylaws and make changes accordingly to reflect restructuring of Council operations.
  - Recruit additional members for GCADA's committees.
  - Modify the GCADA website to include interactive tools to assist the municipal alliances.

## **2009 Alliance Committee Objectives**

### **Objective #1:**

To increase the Alliance Committee's effectiveness in order to better influence the planning and coordination of the state's efforts to prevent alcoholism, drug addiction, and abuse of tobacco and other substances. Additionally, promote programs for youth and young adults that foster resiliency.

#### **Strategy for Achieving Objective With Time Frames:**

- Develop a speaker's list of governmental and/or non profit presenters regarding alcohol, tobacco and other drug prevention services categorized by topic such as alcohol, drug use, tobacco, gang violence, etc. to be approved by the Planning Committee.
- Recommend a workshop prevention presentation topic at the Annual GCADA Summit.
- Continue working with associations and organizations that have a focus on primary prevention services for youth and young adults in order to encourage collaboration and the development of programs to foster resiliency in their constituencies. (ongoing)

### **Objective #2:**

Educate legislators about the benefits of evidence based prevention programs that addresses alcohol, tobacco and other drug addictions and abuse affecting the residents of New Jersey.

#### **Strategy for Achieving Objective With Time Frames:**

- Work collaboratively with GCADA's various committees to educate legislators concerning the importance of promoting the benefits of alcohol, tobacco and other drug prevention. (ongoing)
- Develop presentations to educate and inform GCADA members about prevention and evidence based practices.

### **Objective #3:**

Promote programs for older adults, focusing on the "baby boomer" generation, that foster resiliency to prevent the abuse of alcohol, tobacco, medications and other drugs.

#### **Strategy for Achieving Objective With Time Frames:**

- Continue the process of working with professional organizations focused on serving older adults to encourage the development of programs to foster resiliency in their constituencies. (ongoing)

- Recommend a prevention presentation topic on Older Adult population for the Municipal Alliances through a workshop at the GCADA Summit.

**Evaluation:**

- Update and distribute the speaker's list
- Annual presentations to GCADA

## **2009 Criminal Justice/Juvenile Justice Subcommittee Objectives**

### **Objective #1:**

Continue to facilitate interaction between county drug courts and county/municipal alliances to promote utilization of the alliance community's substance abuse prevention services by drug court participants and their families.

#### ***Strategies:***

- Organize forums bringing together representatives of drug courts and county/municipal alliances for the remaining vicinages/counties that have not yet held meetings.

### **Objective #2:**

To increase the knowledge of criminal and juvenile justice officials, treatment providers, legislators, social service and mental health professionals on the impact of substance abuse on the criminal and juvenile offender population.

#### ***Strategies:***

- Provide support and sponsor training with Greater Newark Safer Cities Initiative (GNSCI) and Greater Camden Safer Cities Initiative (GCSCI).
- Through invitation allow various state and community agencies, and other organizations with an interest to attend the criminal justice/juvenile justice subcommittee meetings to present an overview of their respective duties and responsibilities relative to alcohol and drug addiction prevention and treatment.

### **Objective #3:**

Work with GCADA's ad hoc committee on veterans and military families on raising awareness in the criminal justice and juvenile justice field of the unique challenges and impacts of substance abuse faced by veterans and their families. Educate policy makers on the services available to veterans and military families.

#### ***Strategies:***

- Assist in identifying appropriate agencies and officials in the criminal justice and juvenile justice field to receive veteran's service directory compiled by GCADA's ad hoc committee on veterans and military families.

**Objective #4:**

Support coordination and collaboration to promote the crime prevention and reentry components of Governor Corzine's "Safe Streets" initiative.

***Strategies:***

- Identify those community resources throughout New Jersey that provide re-entry services for correctional offenders. Determine by networking, research and informational presentations, the methods and procedures necessary for accessing employment, housing, medical care and education/vocational training opportunities.
- Assist in organizing a forum bringing together representatives from the juvenile justice commission, youth services commissions and county/municipal alliances to further the implementation of the crime prevention and reentry components of the initiative.

## 2009 Legislative Subcommittee Objectives

### Objective #1:

Increase GCADA's awareness and knowledge about legislative activity related to alcohol, tobacco and other drug abuse, to assist the Council in making an informed decision whether to support, oppose or take no action on a bill and/or recommend legislation.

#### **Strategies:**

- Identify and track legislation related to alcohol, tobacco and other drug abuse on a weekly basis.
- Review and research related legislation, formulate policy recommendations, draft resolutions of support or opposition, and present recommendations to the Council for adoption.
- Establish appropriate measures to initiate and draft recommended legislation.
- Continue distribution of related public policy information to Council members.
- Sponsor presentations at two regular Council meetings in 2009 on public policy issues.

### Objective #2:

Notify stakeholders as may be appropriate of positions endorsed by the full Council on proposed legislation related to alcohol, tobacco and other drug abuse.

#### **Strategies:**

- Ensure the timely distribution of the Council's actions on policy and legislative positions to the administration, legislature, Alliance coordinators, substance abuse professionals and other stakeholders.
- Monitor, recommend and take further actions to educate stakeholders regarding the Council's position on legislation (i.e. press releases, legislative testimony, communication with legislative committee chairs and staff, etc.)
- Ensure the Council's official position on legislation is included in certain GCADA publications and presentations.

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**Objective #3:**

Educate legislators and other public policy decision makers about alcohol, tobacco and other drug abuse issues.

***Strategies:***

- Sponsor an event, such as the Day of Advocacy, at the State House in coordination with other subcommittees of GCADA, other state agencies and constituent groups.
- Continue to send GCADA publications to legislators and public policy decision makers.
- Encourage advocacy teams and ongoing advocacy efforts.

## **2009 Treatment Subcommittee Objectives**

### **Objective #1**

Increase the knowledge base of treatment and prevention professionals on the issue of substance abuse and provide networking opportunities to promote professional development.

### **Strategy**

Support and/or organize workshops and trainings at the GCADA annual summit, and other local or regional presentations for treatment professionals in an effort to improve the linkage between treatment and prevention community. Conduct a survey to assess the success of these trainings.

### **Objective #2**

Educate public policy makers and other stakeholders about addiction, treatment, prevention, and recovery services in New Jersey to include information on the continuum of care, identifying gaps between systems and covering all developmental stages and special populations e.g. older adult etc. populations.

### **Strategy**

Collaborate with the GCADA legislative subcommittee on assisting counties in the planning and conducting of events to educate legislators (e.g. legislative breakfast) about issues regarding access and barriers to individuals seeking treatment.

Assist in the distribution of the service directory developed by the Council's ad-hoc committee on veterans and military families to the treatment community.

### **Objective #3**

Educate GCADA members about the barriers to accessing treatment services, emphasizing the extensive waiting lists for those individuals seeking treatment.

### **Strategy**

Make presentations at Governor's Council meetings with an emphasis on types on treatment, need for additional treatment resources, and gaps in the continuum of care.

**Objective #4**

Improve collaboration between the Alliances and treatment providers in each county

**Strategy**

Schedule meetings with representatives from the Alliances and treatment providers to enhance awareness of substance abuse issues and increase opportunities for collaboration.

## **A Perspective Of The Municipal Alliance Program**

To prepare for the upcoming 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Governor's Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse (GCADA), the Planning Committee initiated this paper as a way of detailing the establishment and development of the Municipal Alliance Program. The paper will especially focus on the legislative intent involved in the creation of the Alliance Program, the collaborative governance process which links state, county and municipal governments, and incorporating evidence based prevention science into the Alliance Program while maintaining its culture of volunteerism.

### **Historical Overview**

The renowned anthropologist Margaret Mead once said, "A small group of thoughtful people could change the world. Indeed, it is the only thing that ever has." That sentiment captures the underlying and fundamental premise responsible for the establishment of the Municipal Alliances.

On March 27, 1989, an act establishing the Governor's Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse was approved by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey (PL 1989, Chapter 51). The legislature found and declared that the disease of alcoholism and drug abuse were major health problems facing the residents of our great state and that an independent coordinating, planning, research and review body be established to focus on these problems. In addition, an Alliance to prevent alcoholism and drug abuse was formed to unite the communities of New Jersey in a coordinated and comprehensive effort utilizing county, municipal and volunteer resources to address not only the symptoms but the root causes of alcoholism and drug abuse.

Nearly two decades later, the Governor's Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse has formed 403 Alliances with 527 participating municipalities throughout the 21 counties, which provide over 3,700 prevention programs and activities. Using strategies established by the Center for Substance Abuse Prevention the allocations statewide are categorized as follows: 56.2% in Education programs; 22.7% in Alternatives; 11.5% in Communication; 5.5% in Collaboration; 3.6% in Early Intervention; .3% in Policy; and .2% in Enforcement.

The Municipal Alliance Program has earned national awards from Parents' Resource Institute for Drug Education, Inc. (PRIDE) and Community Anti-Drug Coalitions of America (CADCA), for being an outstanding state network of community based prevention efforts. The Office of National Drug Control Policy recognized the Governor's Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse and the Municipal Alliance Program as one of "America's best kept secrets".

New Jersey is the only state to have maintained a sustained volunteer prevention effort. Over 7,000 volunteers dedicate their time, energy and commitment to the largest anti-substance abuse community coalition effort in the country. Municipal Alliance programs have involved more than 348,000 participants and reached more than 620,000 residents in community education efforts.

Drug Enforcement Demand Reduction (DEDR) fines provide funding for the Municipal Alliance Program. These fines are collected from persons convicted of drug related offenses. The Legislature intended the funds be returned to New Jersey's communities to help develop substance abuse prevention activities.

### **Grassroots and Collaborative Governance**

Successful prevention efforts require both local and broad-based support. Support must be local because the community is best situated to determine its needs and how to help its own citizens. It must be broad-based because the problems communities face are diverse and the resources needed to face them are great. Municipally based Alliances change the social norms of their communities. Monumental success was evidenced throughout the 1990s when Municipal Alliances got local ordinances adopted to curb tobacco use long before there was state law. In the last few years, Municipal Alliances are tackling the critical issue of underage drinking in much the same way.

Collaborative governance is the heart of the Alliance Program. What do we mean by this? It's simple, the state GCADA, the county Local Advisory Committees on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse (LACADA), County Alliance Steering Subcommittee and the Municipal Alliance Committees (MAC) are citizen advisory committees that use inclusive, deliberative and consensus-oriented approaches to planning, problem solving, and policymaking.

New Jersey has a twenty-four year history in locally based, citizen driven planning and implementation for alcoholism services. It began with the adoption of P.L. 1984, Chapter 531, which established the Local Advisory Committees on Alcoholism (LACA) in every county. The statute also designated the County Alcoholism Coordinator as the authority in the county and established the AEREF (Alcohol Education, Rehabilitation and Enforcement Fund) that was to be disbursed to the counties to fund education, prevention, intervention and treatment efforts.

P.L. 1989, Chapter 51, the law that created the GCADA, expanded the county LACAs to include responsibility for planning county based drug abuse services (LACADAs), as well as creating County Alliance Steering Subcommittees (CASS). Each CASS reviews the proposals submitted by the municipalities. The approved municipal alliance proposals are included in the County Alliance Plan that is submitted to the GCADA.

Participation on the LACADA, CASS and MAC involve representatives from local government, education, health, law enforcement, the business community, parents, youth, recovering alcoholics and drug addicts and other members of the community. Collaborative governance is central to all phases of this process. Citizens rather than experts or bureaucrats play a direct role in helping to guide decentralized decision-making, and the solutions reached are often better supported and more likely to be achieved.

In the early years of the Alliance Program, the GCADA adopted rules and guidelines for the Alliance Program providing a basic framework within which the counties and municipalities operated. Each County Alliance Steering Subcommittee and Local Advisory Committee on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse could adopt more stringent guidelines as long as they did not conflict with those issued by GCADA. In keeping with what GCADA saw as the legislative intent behind the Alliance Program, its review process had room for flexibility and often times allowed waivers from the guidelines in favor of deferring to local authorities. For instance, the GCADA until recently held the position that if a municipality believed strongly in a particular program or activity that could not be funded with DEDR funds the use of cash match as a viable alternative.

In the last decade and a half national research in the area of prevention has developed an important body of work documenting the most effective processes to follow as well as which programs work and which don't.

### **Prevention Unification Model and Evidence Based Practices**

In 1996, the GCADA along with the DAS and the Counties embarked on a collaborative prevention planning process known as *Prevention Unification*. A working committee of representatives of all three entities developed a consensus-based process that would improve prevention services for at-risk individuals, families and communities statewide.

Municipal Alliances and Counties determine and measure the risk and protective factors of their communities. The risk and protective factor framework is based on the research of J. David Hawkins and Richard F. Catalano who have identified four domains (individual, family, school and community) within which risk and protective factors can be assessed.

Prevention Unification begins with community and county data collection and needs assessment; it proceeds to consensus building and priority setting based on the needs and resources identified. Unification establishes funding priorities that are used to guide municipal alliance activities and prevention programs supported by the county and state funds.

The first step of the Prevention Unification process involved the municipal alliances completing a needs assessment, an examination of the significant findings and the setting of priorities. This step is followed by the County process involving a broad cross-section of representatives that complete the County needs assessment, prevention resource inventory, and sets county priorities. The County priorities are then used to inform the Division of Addictions allocation of community based prevention services.

The GCADA has incrementally modified the Municipal Alliance guidelines in each successive planning cycle to tighten the parameters on the use of DEDR funds in order to have the Alliance Program implement evidence based practices. Unfortunately, we lost the opportunity to be further ahead due to extending the last two plans (2000-2002) and 2005-2007) for two years (03-04) and one year (08) respectively at the request of the Division of Addiction Services.

### **Current Activities**

However, the collaboration with the Attorney General's Office and the Crime Prevention Strategy led the GCADA to adopt significant changes to the MAC Guidelines issued for the 2009-2011 applications. The new guidelines will ensure that all Municipal Alliances receiving more than \$10,000 in DEDR funds will have to implement evidence-based program as listed on a national registry or they must document and measure the effectiveness of their programs. Additionally, the annual renewal process for Municipal Alliance plans is changing to require evaluation of effectiveness in order to be renewed – automatic plan renewals with only having to submit requests for changes is a thing of the past.

The GCADA is committed to providing the resources necessary to train the County and Municipal Alliances in all facets prevention planning, implementation and evaluation. The GCADA is also mindful that local volunteers and part time coordinators, not paid prevention professionals, fuel the majority of the Municipal Alliances. The GCADA has held sacred the belief that local volunteers, in conjunction with community stakeholders, can change the conditions and the social norms in their neighborhoods and municipalities. The GCADA recognizes that targeted and specific prevention initiatives are necessary for special populations and problems; however, alcoholism and drug abuse problems would overrun our communities without locally based environmental change advocates.

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## **The New Jersey Adult Drug Court Program**

The New Jersey Adult Drug Court Program targets substance abusing criminal offenders charged in superior court with non-violent, drug-driven offenses. The primary goal of the drug court is to utilize a coordinated approach to dealing with addicted offenders in an effort to break the cycle of drugs and crime. Through a system of sanctions and incentives, the drug court judges provide support that fosters program compliance and participant accountability.

April 1, 2008 represented the six-year anniversary of the commencement of statewide funding to support the adult drug court program. In over six years the drug courts have progressed from five grant-funded pilot programs to a fully operational adult drug court system that is a national model of statewide implementation and coordination. This goal was achieved through the support of all three branches of government and the interagency collaboration of program stakeholders who developed guidelines to divert non-violent drug addicted offenders from costly incarceration to substance abuse treatment within a program of judicially monitored supervision.

Currently, the adult drug courts have approximately 3,332 active participants and 1,226 program graduates. Studies conducted on program graduates have revealed a significantly lower rate of re-arrest (15%) than similar groups of drug offenders released from state prison (54%). In the last five and a half years, 129 babies have been born drug-free to previously addicted mothers who achieved sobriety through program participation. Also during this period, 72 participant parents regained custody of their minor children who had been removed due to their substance abuse.

In addition to these obvious benefits, the drug courts also seek to improve the lives of participants and their families by helping these offenders to enhance their level of education and job training, obtain and maintain steady employment and become productive citizens capable of positive contributions to their communities. Program graduates made over \$1.2 million dollars in payments to the Drug Enforcement Demand Reduction (DEDR) fund while active in drug court.

A critical component of maintaining a sober lifestyle beyond drug court graduation is establishing a sober social network and support in the community. Through the work of the Governor's Council Criminal Justice/Juvenile Justice Subcommittee, the drug courts are partnering with local municipal alliances to hold educational seminars. These seminars are focused on providing both groups with the opportunity to educate each other about their respective programs and seek ways to further the collective goals of reducing substance abuse and concurrent criminal activity in our communities.

On August 1, 2008 statutory amendments to N.J.S.A. 2C:35-14 became effective that provides the potential to expand the adult drug court program by one-third thereby increasing the capacity to divert non-violent offenders from state prison. This expansion holds the promise of increasing the positive outcomes of the program by providing judges, prosecutors and treatment professionals with more discretion and flexibility of admissions and treatment referrals.

## Judges Given Discretion in Levying Drug Fines

Statutory amendments to N.J.S.A. 2C:35-15, effective April 12, 2008 provided sentencing judges with discretion in assessing mandatory DEDR penalties in two separate ways.

1) Previously, an individual being sentenced for more than one offense where this penalty is mandatory would be assessed a separate penalty for each offense. Offenders were assessed \$3,000 for a crime of the first degree, \$2,000 for a crime of the second degree, \$1,000 for a crime of the third degree, \$750 for a crime of the fourth degree and \$500 for a disorderly persons or petty disorderly persons offense. The April 12, 2008 amendment provided sentencing judges with the discretion to assess a single penalty applicable to the highest degree offense for which the person is convicted or adjudicated delinquent, if the court finds that the offender has established the following:

- a. the imposition of multiple penalties would constitute a serious hardship that outweighs the need to deter the offender from future criminal activity; and
- b. the imposition of a single penalty would foster the offender's rehabilitation.

2) An offender who is required to pay a DEDR penalty may propose to the court and the prosecutor a plan to perform reformatory service in lieu of payment of up to one-half of the penalty amount imposed. The reformatory service plan option will not be available to offenders if they already received a reduction in their DEDR assessment through the manner described above in 1).

A "reformatory service plan" shall include, but not be limited to, substance abuse treatment or services, other therapeutic treatment, educational or vocational services, employment training or services, family counseling, service to the community and volunteer work. Only work in which regular attendance and participation is required, supervised and recorded, and which would assist in the offender's rehabilitation and reintegration can be submitted to the court for approval. The drug court program is considered a "reformatory service plan" under this statute.

The court, in its discretion, shall determine whether to accept the plan, after considering the position of the prosecutor, the plan's appropriateness and practicality, the offender's ability to pay and the effect of the proposed service on the offender's rehabilitation and reintegration into society. The court will require verification of successful completion of the reformatory service plan before the credit can be applied against the penalty.

In addition to the above, the court may waive additional amounts of the penalty owed, in the case of extreme financial hardship, only if that offender successfully completes the drug court program.

The overall impact of these amendments on DEDR fund collections is not yet known. Although the impact of the above may result in less DEDR funds collected, the result may be that additional offenders propose and complete plans that would aid their rehabilitative efforts.

## New Jersey Addresses Issues Faced by Veterans

The ongoing global war on terrorism has called on many of our New Jersey citizens to serve and will continue to call upon these men and women and their families. More than 8000 New Jersey National Guard personnel are deployed in the Middle East in combat zones. Six Thousand have previously been deployed, some having served more than one tour, each lasting up to 12 months. In June of 2008 another 3,275 New Jersey Army National Guard Soldiers were deployed. This deployment of the 50th Infantry Brigade Combat Team was the largest New Jersey Guard deployment since World War II.

This deployment, just as previous deployments, affects Citizen-Soldiers and their families in every county of this state in many ways. Many experience psychiatric challenges and/or substance abuse problems that often times is brought on or exacerbated by long periods of separation and the combat experience that can be overwhelming and confusing. Many returning veterans come home with wounds, visible and invisible that also affect their loved ones. There is a need to address these issue and other issues that occur when individuals are cast fast forward from civilian life to that of a combatant before they escalate to unmanageable and costly problems that affect everyone.

A variety of surveys, as well as anecdotal evidence and rising alarm in many military communities, indicate growing substance abuse among recent combat veterans. These studies indicate that of particular concern are members of the National Guard and reserves, as well as recently discharged service members, who can lose their bearings outside the camaraderie and structure of the military.

One such study conducted by the Pentagon –the first to compare Iraq and Afghaniatan veterans' alcohol problems before and after deployment - entitled *Citizen Soldiers Turning to Alcohol After Combat* that appeared in the Journal of the American Medical Association in August of 2008 suggests National Guard and Reserve combat troops in Iraq and Afghanistan are more likely to develop drinking problems than active-duty soldiers.

In a New York Times article dated July 8, 2008 Lizette Alvarez stated that a New Jersey state study of 292 National Guard members who had returned from Iraq in the last year found that 37 percent had experienced "problem drinking"; for those with post-traumatic stress disorder, the figure rose to 55 percent. Yet among those reporting both, 41 percent received mental health treatment but only 9 percent received help for substance abuse. According to the Times article, substance abuse must often be treated first, experts say, since it is hard to treat someone for combat stress who is drinking or using drugs.

Dr. Edward Boyko, who works for the Veterans Affairs Puget Sound Health Care System and co-authored the *Citizen Soldiers Turning to Alcohol After Combat* study, speculates that inadequate preparation for the stress of combat and reduced access to support services at home may be to blame for the current drinking problems experienced by veterans.

Getting help can be difficult for many combat veterans who rely on the military's Tricare health plan — reservists and National Guard members living far from veterans clinics or military bases, along with some retirees — the Pentagon task force found. Finding treatment programs that accept Tricare often ends in frustration and few residential rehabilitation programs have the accreditation required by the plan.

In New Jersey, additional barriers to improving and better coordinating services are, at times, related to funding streams and limitations based upon funding requirements and available resources. Currently New Jersey is experiencing a major budget deficit. Although Governor Jon Corzine, a former Marine, supports the troops, money is tight and the State must seek new and innovative ways to address the issues it faces and the means to disseminate the information on available services.

However, in 2007 Governor Jon S. Corzine did establish the Yellow Ribbon Committee on Returning Combat Veterans (YRC) under the auspices of the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs to determine the emergent issues facing Operation Enduring Freedom (OEF) and Operation Iraqi Freedom (OIF) Veterans. In the FY 2008 New Jersey State Budget \$1million was allocated to address the issues thus determined. A portion of this allocation was earmarked for Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), and issues surrounding drug and alcohol, as wells as to provide relief, in the form of grants, for a range of veteran/family emergencies. On June 20 2007, the Committee finalized the listing of prioritized issues and divided them into Emergent Issues and Issues for Further Consideration.

In addition, the Governor's Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse (GCADA) takes a special interest in reaching out to returning service members, as well as the families left behind in order to offer support and information to help reduce the stress and strain before, during and after mobilization. In the summer of 2007, GCADA announced the formation of a Military Families and Veterans Committee to explore many of the issues facing our service personnel and their families and wherever possible looks for ways to extend its assistance. Members of the committee include representatives from the New Jersey Department of Human Services, Division of Addiction ,New Jersey Department of Labor, veterans of previous conflicts, an OIF returning veteran family member, the Partnership for a Drug Free New Jersey, law enforcement, Department of Commerce, Department of Veterans Affairs Vet Center, the Middlesex County Veteran Service Officers, the Director of Vet Works of Ocean County New Jersey, and the State Adjutant from the American Legion.

This group has published a comprehensive directory to assist military and veteran families prior to deployment, during deployment and upon return. Categories include housing issues, counseling, support groups, legal assistance, medical concerns, financial concerns, entertainment, substance abuse, PTSD, equine facilitated rehabilitation, and property upkeep care to name a few.

GCADA also oversees and funds the Municipal Alliances to Prevent Alcoholism and Drug Abuse. These municipal alliances are grass root volunteer driven organizations that

unite communities in a coordinated and comprehensive prevention strategy mobilizing the full resources of the State including counties, municipalities and its residents. There are currently 527 participating municipalities in the Alliance network throughout 21 counties implementing over 3,700 local prevention programs. This prevention network will be used to disseminate information targeted to issues returning military personnel and their families experience that often are leading causes of alcohol and illicit drug use.

New Jersey substance abuse system also includes a county-based planning and coordinating mechanism, guided jointly by GCADA and the Department of Human Services' Division of Addiction Services (DAS), which complements State planning efforts. This unified planning effort represents a comprehensive, integrated and cohesive strategy for community-based prevention and treatment services.

In 2007, DAS established a State Epidemiological Outcome Workgroup (SEOW) which is working to promote cross-systems data driven assessment, planning, implementation, and evaluation of programs related to substance abuse prevention. Efforts are also underway to incorporate the use of SAMHSA National Outcomes Measures (NOMs) into both treatment and prevention systems evaluation. Veterans and their families are among the target populations.

In 2005 a study was conducted by Governor Richard Codey's Task Force on Mental Health. The finding of the Task Force concluded that in prior military conflicts, approximately 15% to 25% of the returning veterans and their families will experience some form of post traumatic stress disorder. In 2005, 250 veterans were waiting for counseling services. Although access to current numbers of individuals and families who are experiencing some type of mental health issue are limited we can assume, based on numbers that have been deployed and will be deployed, that number has and will undoubtedly increase dramatically.

The Department of Human Services, Division of Mental Health Services (DMHS) is playing its part by serving adults with serious and persistent mental illnesses. Central to the Division's mission is the fact that these individuals are entitled to dignified and meaningful lives. In part, the mission of the DMHS is to promote opportunities for those dealing with PTSD, to maximize their abilities to live, work, socialize and learn in communities of their choice. Through DMHS services are available to military and veteran families who feel they need help with a mental health problem. The DMHS webpage currently list a feature article announcing the creation of a veteran hotline established by the NJDMVA: Veterans Counseling Hotline - 1-866-VETS-NJ4U

In October 2008 the biennial International Symposium for Behavioral Health and Traumatic Brain Injury held in New Jersey at St. Joseph's Regional Medical Center in Paterson, with a concurring program held on the Campus of Montclair State University. Army Dr. (Col.) Loree Sutton, chief of the Defense Center of Excellence for Psychological Health and Traumatic Brain Injury, members of Congress, leading International expert neuroscientists, behavioral specialists, physicians and military health experts convened to generate a comprehensive report with recommendations to the US

Congress to address the psychological health difficulties and traumatic brain injuries of our returning servicemen and women. Members of the New Jersey Military and Veterans Family team were represented at this symposium to offer input and garner additional insight. Results are not yet available.

New Jersey remains committed to serving its military and veteran population and will continue to work in partnership with federal, state and local agencies to address the needs of those who continue to sacrifice for the safety of New Jersey and America.

## **ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICE OF THE COURTS**

**AOC Mission Statement:** The AOC is an independent branch of government constitutionally entrusted with the fair and just resolution of disputes in order to preserve the rule of law and to protect the rights and liberties guaranteed by the Constitution and laws of the United States and this State.

**Drug Court:** The mission of drug courts is to stop the abuse of alcohol and other drugs and related criminal activity. Drug courts are a highly specialized team process within the existing Superior Court structure that addresses nonviolent drug-related cases. They are unique in the criminal justice environment because they build a close collaborative relationship between criminal justice and drug treatment professionals.

### Criminal Practice Division

#### **ADULT CRIMINAL DRUG COURT**

The Adult Drug Court is operational in all of New Jersey's 21 counties. The Administrative Office of the Courts and the Division of Addiction Services entered into a Cooperative Agreement to manage the treatment component of the program's funding. The adult drug courts are an alternative to incarceration for a vast majority of participants who would have otherwise been sentenced to a term in New Jersey State Prison.

The program targets the criminal offender who has an addiction, and who has been charged with a non-violent, drug-driven offense. Following application, defendants are legally reviewed by the Prosecutor's Office in the county of the offense to determine their legal eligibility under statutory requirements. Offenders also complete a comprehensive assessment with a TASC (Treatment Assessment Services for the Courts) Evaluator employed by the courts to determine if treatment for chemical dependency is indicated. Once accepted into the program, a referral for treatment at an appropriate level of care is made in collaboration with the treatment providers designated by the Division of Addiction Services for drug court, including long term residential, short term residential, halfway houses and intensive outpatient.

Drug court programs are rigorous, requiring intensive monitoring by probation services. Requirements include frequent drug testing and court appearances, along with tightly structured regimens of treatment and recovery services. This level of supervision permits the program to support the recovery process, but also allows the drug court program staff to react swiftly to impose appropriate therapeutic sanctions or to reinstate criminal proceedings when participants cannot comply with the program.

Between July 2007 and June 2008, 1,221 offenders were sentenced to drug court. As of June 2008, there were approximately 3,170 active drug court participants. Statewide, the male population is higher than female. Races represented in all counties include Caucasian, African-American, Hispanic, Asian and Other.

## Family Practice Division

### JUVENILE DRUG COURT

Currently, there are three Juvenile Drug Courts; they are in the Camden, Hudson, and Passaic Vicinages. Mercer Vicinage ceased operation of its Juvenile Drug Court in September 2007. Juvenile Drug Courts serve as a more effective way to deal with juvenile offenders who have drug-dependent problems. The drug courts serve as a diversion from the formal court process for some cases and also as an alternative to incarceration in state juvenile correctional facilities. They provide an intermediate sanction between probation and state correctional facilities as well as better treatment outcomes for juveniles with alcohol and drug-related problems. Juvenile drug courts allow intensive supervision for at-risk adolescents who are surrounded with community and court services. To date, the three operational Juvenile Drug Courts have served a total of 768 juveniles; 46 juveniles are currently enrolled in the Juvenile Drug Court Program; 219 juveniles have graduated from the program; and 14 drug-free babies have been born to the female drug court clients.

The general purpose of the Juvenile Drug Courts is to reduce recidivism, which creates a safer community; to allow juveniles to be alcohol and/or drug free, which will enable them to go back into, or continue, attending school or to become employed; to alleviate detention overcrowding; to implement effective case processing measures; to provide services for family members; and, to heighten community awareness of substance abuse.

### **Funding Amount:**

The Camden, Hudson and Passaic Vicinages were operating under grants from OJP/BJA which have since expired. The Mercer Vicinage had an implementation grant from OJP/BJA, and their Juvenile Drug Court Re-Entry

Program was operating under an enhancement grant from OJP/BJA, both of which have expired.

## **FAMILY DEPENDENCY DRUG TREATMENT COURT**

There are three pilot Family Drug Courts in the Morris-Sussex and Essex Vicinages. The Family Drug Court's goals are to help parents become abstinent from alcohol and drugs, maximize and balance child safety and permanency while preserving family integrity and functioning, and increase retention of parents in major services mandated and provided by the Family Drug Court. The Family Drug Court results in much closer monitoring for parents involved in child abuse and neglect cases. The program is expected to result in a higher percentage of reunifications of affected families, and increase the chance for parents to successfully remain drug-free and to ultimately provide a better life for their children.

As of their last reporting date, the Family Drug Courts in the Morris-Sussex Vicinage have served a total of 41 clients; there are 9 clients currently enrolled; there have been 13 graduates; and one drug-free baby born to one of the Family Drug Court clients. The Family Drug Court in the Essex Vicinage has admitted 25 clients into their Drug Court Program; they currently have 16 clients being served; and they anticipate 6 clients will graduate before the end of the year.

Funding amount:

The Family Drug Court in the Morris-Sussex Vicinage, which was implemented in April 2004, was funded by a grant from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, which has expired.

## **Criminal, Family and Probation Divisions**

### **TREATMENT ASSESSMENT SERVICES FOR THE COURT**

Working within all 21 counties, the Criminal Division's Treatment Assessment Services for the Courts (TASC) professional evaluators interview defendants, subject them to urine screening to identify current drug use, and prepare drug assessments or reports for criminal and drug court judges, detailing drug abuse histories, identifying treatment needs and recommending counseling at appropriate drug and alcohol treatment centers when support is needed to overcome addiction. Substance abuse evaluators interview defendants charged with drug and property offenses to determine the extent of their involvement with addictive drugs. This program is also resourceful to judges when determining appropriate community support systems for defendants who

are being released from jail. Failure to complete treatment may result in sanctions, including bail or probation revocation with a loss of liberty.

The Family Division's Treatment Assessment Services for the Courts (TASC) are professional evaluators located in Bergen, Essex, Hudson, Monmouth, Morris/Sussex and Passaic Counties. The evaluators interview juvenile offenders and adult litigants to identify current drug use, and prepare drug assessments or reports for family part judges, detailing drug abuse histories, identifying treatment needs and recommending counseling at local drug and alcohol treatment centers when indicated. This program is very helpful to judges in determining appropriate case dispositions. TASC Evaluators in the Probation Division provide substance abuse assessment services to probationers in Mercer and Essex counties.

Between July 2007 and June 2008, approximately 7,200 individuals were evaluated for alcohol/drug treatment services. Statewide, the male population is higher than female. Races represented in all counties include Caucasian, African-American, Hispanic, Asian and Other.

# DEPARTMENT OF CHILDREN AND FAMILIES

## Intervention

### Division of Youth and Family Services

#### **CHILD PROTECTION SUBSTANCE ABUSE INITIATIVE**

Known as CPSAI, this program serves families involved with the Division of Youth and Family Services (DYFS) by providing substance abuse assessment, drug screening, treatment referrals, case management, and support services to parents or caregivers referred for substance abuse or suspected substance abuse. The population served presents an array of challenges including poverty, homelessness, mental illness and past trauma, in addition to substance abuse. Services are available through three statewide contract provider agencies. The initiative allows substance abuse specialists to be assigned to each local DYFS office in the state to provide on-site services to families, and consultation and education to staff on matters related to substance abuse.

The Department of Human Services' Division of Family Development (DFD) and DYFS are collaborating to promote and coordinate substance abuse services for families who exceed the 250% Federal Poverty threshold and are not an active welfare case. The funding commitments are set forth in a Memorandum of Understanding between the two Divisions.

**Service Information:** Data from the period from July 2007-June 2008 indicates that 14,936 clients were referred to the initiative by DYFS staff. Of these clients, 10,787 were assessed, 7,314 met the DSM IV criteria and 2,144 clients entered various levels of treatment. The instruments used to screen clients include the ASI-F, ASAM Patient Placement Criteria. The DYFS 11-46 referral form that includes background information on parents and caregivers from the DYFS safety and risk assessment interview is also used.

## Division of Youth and Family Services

### Treatment

#### **CHILD WELFARE REFORM PLAN/ADOLESCENT TREATMENT**

This Child Welfare Reform Plan Initiative provides a coordinated network of specialized substance abuse treatment services in licensed facilities targeted to adolescents with first priority to those under the supervision of the Division of Youth and Family Services (DYFS). Services include long-term residential treatment that provides a structured recovery environment, combined with professional clinical services designed to address addiction and living skill problems for adolescents with a substance abuse diagnosis who require longer treatment stays to support and promote recovery. Thirty beds are available for adolescents to receive these services. Intervention focuses on reintegrating into the greater community with emphasis on education and vocational development.

One hundred and six (106) slots are available to adolescents needing variable levels of care in outpatient settings. These services include individual, group and family counseling and include access to support services. Joint case planning and case conferencing between the DYFS caseworker and the treatment provider are an essential component to this initiative.

DYFS also purchases additional residential beds on a per diem basis from two licensed programs. While contracted beds will be utilized first, DYFS is committed to purchasing on an as needed basis residential treatment services for any youth whose treatment plan identifies that this service is needed.

An RFP is scheduled to be awarded during the SFY 09 that will increase the number of contracted beds for adolescent treatment. These slots will increase overall capacity for adolescents from 106 to 142.

#### **CHILD WELFARE REFORM PLAN/PARENTS WITH CHILDREN INITIATIVE**

The Child Welfare Reform Plan/Parents with Children Initiative provided for the expansion of existing DAS substance abuse treatment services for parents

and their children under the supervision of DYFS. This initiative provides residential (residential treatment services are provided for a minimum of six (6) months to include a woman with an average of two (2) children), outpatient variable level of care and methadone outpatient variable level of care treatment.

Expansion of programs serving mothers, fathers and their children has been a priority. First priority is given to referrals made by the Child Protection Substance Abuse Initiative (CPSAI) drug abuse counselor located in the local DYFS offices following the established protocol. Second priority is given to self-referrals ("walk-ins") or referrals made by various sources (Probation, court, other providers, etc.) of women who are under DYFS supervision. Third priority is given to eligible women with dependent children who are in need of treatment and who are not under DYFS supervision. All priorities include pregnant women. Treatment is family-centered and is both gender and trauma-specific. During this fiscal year, 48 IOP slots for fathers with dependent children were added to the overall treatment array provided to DYFS families. These slots are geographically located throughout the state where the greatest need has been identified by DYFS. Substance abuse treatment and other therapeutic interventions are provided to address issues of domestic violence, sexual and physical abuse, relationships and parenting. These services are enhanced with case management, childcare, transportation, and referrals to services in the community. DYFS keeps all cases that are participating in this initiative open for the duration of treatment, and its ultimate goal is the reunification of these families.

In SFY 09, approximately \$1.53 million additional dollars were offered in an RFP from DCF/DYFS through the Department of Human Services, Division of Addiction Services (DAS), for expansion of Child Welfare substance abuse slots for adolescents and adults. These awards will include eight (8) intensive outpatient slots including housing and case management/wraparound services for women and their dependent children ranging from birth through age twelve; nineteen (19) IOP slots for adolescents and seventeen (17) adolescent female long-term residential beds.

#### **AHS HOSPITAL CORPORATION**

This program provides substance abuse assessments, examinations and urinalysis for families under DYFS supervision in Morris County.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$793,014 (State)**

### **HUNTERDON PREVENTION RESOURCES**

This program provides substance abuse assessments, in-home urinalysis or testing in the Hunterdon DYFS office for families under DYFS supervision residing in Hunterdon County.

**Funding Amount and Source: Open Purchase Agreement (State)**

### **TRINITAS HOSPITAL**

This program provides substance abuse assessments, case management support and treatment referrals for families under DYFS supervision in Union County.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$56,848 (State)**

### **NEW HOPE FOUNDATION**

This program provides inpatient adolescent residential substance abuse treatment facilities located in Secaucus (males & females) and in Marlboro (males only). This program serves adolescents statewide who are under DYFS supervision.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$1.2 Million (State)**

### **CAPE COUNSELING SERVICES**

This program provides outpatient substance abuse counseling services. This program is for adolescents under DYFS supervision in Cape May County.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$9,118 (State)**

### **RECOVERY SERVICES – LIGHTHOUSE**

This program provides residential in-patient substance abuse treatment for adolescents who are Atlantic County residents under DYFS supervision.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$13,577 (State)**

### **CUMBERLAND COUNTY ALCOHOL TREATMENT SERVICES**

This program provides outpatient substance abuse counseling to Atlantic

County resident adults referred by the DYFS District Office.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$73,630 (State)**

#### **VINELAND RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT CENTER (DYFS)**

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# DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS

**Department/Agency Mission Statement:** The mission of the New Jersey Department of Corrections is to ensure that all persons committed to the state correctional institutions are confined with the level of custody necessary to protect the public and that they are provided with the care, discipline, training, and treatment to prepare them for reintegration into the community.

**Current/Future Plan:** The following Plan represents substance abuse programs offered by the New Jersey Department of Corrections on an on-going basis. Therefore, plans are to increase and/or augment the same when and where financially feasible and programmatically appropriate.

## Treatment Information

### Division of Programs and Community Services

#### OFFICE OF DRUG PROGRAMS

#### **NJ DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS IN-PRISON THERAPEUTIC COMMUNITY SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER TREATMENT PROGRAM**

In the Therapeutic Community (TC) model, substance abuse/dependence is viewed as a disorder of the whole person, one that necessitates extensive changes in lifestyle and self-identity to overcome the negative affect of chemical dependency and the resulting criminal behavior. The treatment is designed to equip the resident with requisite coping skills and techniques that will assist him/her to remain drug/alcohol free upon reintegration into society. In general, most residents spend nine (9) to twelve (12) months in a prison-based Therapeutic Community (TC) program. However, it may be necessary to require a longer stay depending on the rate of treatment progress and other factors relevant to the resident's capacity to remain void of substances upon societal reintegration. Institutional matriculation is the first phase of the substance use disorder treatment continuum.

**Service Information:** This program serves incarcerated individuals who have been identified as having a substance use disorder. Recommendations for treatment placement are made based on a

number of factors inclusive of (1) assessment of the offender's level of drug/alcohol abuse, (2) treatment need, (3) criminal history, and (4) other key elements that contributed to the offender's substance abusing behavior which gravitated into criminality. Offenders with the most severe addiction issues and who meet the Department's treatment eligibility criteria are referred to one of the prison-based Therapeutic Community (TC) Programs.

The New Jersey Department of Corrections (NJDOC) allocates a total of 1,421 beds (1,361 male, 60 female), distributed among ten (10) programs located in seven (7) correctional institutions. Service locations by institution and county are as follows: Riverfront State Prison – Camden, Southern State Correctional Facility and Southwoods State Prison – Cumberland, Northern State Prison – Essex, Edna Mahan Correctional Facility/Women and Mountainview Youth Correctional Facility – Hunterdon, Garden State Youth Correctional Facility – Burlington. Five hundred forty-one (548) beds are allocated to service the youth population who are between the approximate ages of 18 to 26 years, and the remaining eight hundred and seventy-three (873) beds service the adult population ages 26 and above, inclusive of the female population

**Outcome Measures** - outcome data is collected and reported as needed and/requested. The Office of Drug Programs receives daily and monthly bed fill statistics from the several programs and monitors bed-vacancies regularly. The complete Addiction Severity Index (ASI) assessment is administered to all residents admitted to the program at the institutional level, and random urinalysis are conducted throughout the program experience. A part of this random selection includes testing of residents upon entry to and exit from program treatment. Residents receive a minimum of twenty (20) hours per week of hands-on treatment during their tenure in the therapeutic community.

The NJDOC is currently engaged in a formal outcome study of Therapeutic Community participation in collaboration with Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey.

The average length of time an inmate is placed on the waiting list(s) varies from institution to institution and is contingent upon the rapidity of inmate matriculation. However, conservatively it is less than six months.

## **NEW JERSEY DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS ALTERNATIVE SUBSTANCE ABUSE AWARENESS AND EDUCATION PROGRAM – LIVING IN BALANCE (LIB)**

The Living In Balance (LIB) program is a research-based program designed as a practical didactic system for conducting sessions on drugs and the disease of addiction from an educational perspective with individuals who abuse or are addicted to alcohol and other drugs of abuse. The LIB Component serves as an alternative to the traditional Therapeutic Community (TC) concept and is designed to provide addiction education and relapse prevention techniques that address the disease of addiction and further supports the recovery process. Specifically, LIB targets that segment of the inmate population who are ineligible for TC treatment placement based on the Department's established criteria.

The Living in Balance program is delivered through a variety of interactive client worksheets in which each client worksheet constitutes a living in balance program session. The programmatic design is structured in a manner that requires reading and retaining information and that is evidenced via written exercises geared toward reinforcement and retention of substance abuse education and preventive measures.

The LIB schematic structure is divided into twelve core client worksheet sets, representing twelve core client sessions. These sessions encompass basic addiction terminology, substances of abuse, triggers and relapse prevention techniques, the co-relation between sex and substances of abuse, and emotional components of addiction and recovery. Also, there are twenty-one supplemental components that focus on self-help and twelve-step program facilitation, stress reduction techniques, social and family issues, compulsive sexual behaviors, grief and loss, as well as other topics that impact and/or influence abusive or relapse behavior. Upon completion of the LIB Program, participants are issued a Certificate of Completion. A centralized file of all participants completing the program is maintained. The pilot program was implemented at Northern State Prison in Newark, New Jersey and currently is on-going at East Jersey State Prison, Edna Mahan Correctional Facility for Women, and Mid State Correctional Facility.

Plans are to implement the LIB program throughout our correctional institutions to the inmate population identified as having a substance use disorder, but are ineligible for the traditional therapeutic community construct. Additionally, it is critically important to implement this program at those institutions that do not house a therapeutic community or offer

any type of substance abuse programming. The LIB program is a unique means that can be offered to those offenders found guilty of violating the Department's zero-tolerance policy. To this end, the LIB program has a strong message regarding relapse education and prevention and as such will afford this category of inmate the opportunity to address their drug behavior and subsequent criminal lifestyles.

The duration of the LIB Program is twelve weeks and the waiting list varies based on inmate application and time eligibility.

### **NEW JERSEY DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS MUTUAL AGREEMENT PROGRAM**

Mutual Agreement Program (MAP) is a formal cooperative agreement between the New Jersey Department of Corrections (NJDOC) and the Department of Human Services (DHS) that offers substance abuse services via state-licensed, residential community-based agencies throughout New Jersey for community based treatment of inmates. Currently, the Mutual Agreement Program contracts with four (4) community-based substance abuse treatment facilities.

In order to receive inmates for treatment placement via the Mutual Agreement Program, these agencies must hold the requisite licensure granted by the Division of Addiction Services, Department of Human Services and must comply with the conditions established by the New Jersey Department of Corrections and the Department of Human Services.

**Service Information:** Inmates who participate in MAP must be approved for community release by meeting established requirements as follows: 1) be in full minimum custody status, 2) obtain medical and psychological clearance and 3) cannot have any non-permissible warrants, detainers or open charges. Additionally, MAP placements are usually of six month duration, and upon completion thereof further treatment is provided via assignment to a residential halfway house facility or paroled.

Conceivably, the predominant MAP client population is male; however, females from the women's institution are also eligible for participation. The four (4) MAP contract agencies are located in Essex, Mercer and

Passaic counties. Program duration is 180 days/6 months. Current total bed capacity is forty (40).

**Outcome Measures** - the Department is planning to examine the effectiveness of all Mutual Agreement Programs by data collection indicators such as recidivism, relapse and employment of program graduates. Program evaluation and assessment of activities to ascertain adherence to stated policies as well as the accomplishment of goals is facilitated through the submittal of required reports of the contracted agency.

### **NJ DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS COMMUNITY-BASED PROGRAM HALFWAY HOUSE FACILITIES**

In addition to the two (2) Assessment and Treatment Centers (see below), the Department of Corrections contracts with private agencies for 1928 beds in 19 residential community release programs throughout the State. Many of these programs provide substance abuse awareness and relapse prevention services, while others provide employment and/or educational services. These programs espouse a structure of strict discipline while designed with a focus on preparing the offender to re-enter society. Of necessity, they are closely supervised so as to assure the highest levels of security as well as accountability by and for the offender population.

**Service Information:** Candidates eligible for participation in Residential Community Programs-Halfway House and substance abuse support facilities are inmates who are approved for community release and have successfully completed the assessment process. Additionally, they must be of full minimum custody status, have medical clearance, receive a favorable psychological evaluation, satisfactory institutional adjustment, and have less than 18 months remaining toward the completion of their maximum sentence or parole eligibility. For those identified as having a significant substance use disorder, this assignment typically represents the third phase of treatment and is designed to build on the prison-based TC continuum step-down as well as Assessment Center exposure.

The population served is predominantly male (1,666 male, 227 female for a total complement of 1,928 beds). The average program duration is approximately seven (7) months. The programs are located in Burlington,

Camden, Essex, Hudson, Hunterdon, Mercer, Middlesex, Passaic and Union counties.

**Outcome Measures** - the Office of Drug Programs, in consort with other relevant Departmental offices, develops appropriate training for facility staff on an ongoing/as needed basis in areas of drug/alcohol treatment, inmate accountability and urine monitoring. To this end, an examination of the effectiveness of Halfway House programs is conducted via a number of mechanisms. Most significant to the measurement of program effectiveness is data collection with respect to recidivism, relapse and employment of program graduates. In addition, on-site program observation and monitoring is on-going in order to assure programmatic compliance as mandated by Department of Corrections' policies and procedures, rules and regulations.

The number of inmates on the waiting list varies from month to month based on the classification process, but is minimal.

#### **NJ DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS COMMUNITY BASED PROGRAMS – ASSESSEMENT CENTERS**

All male and female inmates, once approved for community release, must matriculate through the Assessment Center prior to assignment to a Halfway House. These Centers conduct a comprehensive battery of risk/need assessments to determine community readiness, community placement, and to substantiate continued substance use disorder treatment needs or support services initially identified by prison-based treatment professionals. In the furtherance of service-need identification, the centers also administer various tests and/or evaluations to ascertain offender social service needs (education, employment, housing and medical).

**Service Information:** The offender must meet the requirements for community release as established by the Department of Corrections in order to move from the institution to the Assessment Center. These requirements are consistent with and the same as those required for halfway house consideration. For those inmates identified as having a significant substance use disorder, this assignment designed to build on

the prison-based Therapeutic Community continuum experience so as to further prepare the offender for community reintegration, represents the second phase of substance use disorder continuum.

This program serves 722 males and 94 females (capacity) from two locations and the duration is one (1) to three (3) months. Inmates who remain less than three months are usually those who are paroled prior to the three month completion requirement.

**Outcome Measures** - the Department is planning to examine the effectiveness of both Assessment Centers by reviewing indicators such as recidivism, relapse and employment of program graduates. In addition, an ongoing assessment will be conducted through the review of required programmatic reports submitted by the contract vendor to determine whether stated goals are accomplished.

The number of inmates on the waiting list varies from month to month based on the classification process, but is minimal.

## **NEW JERSEY DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS ALTERNATIVE PROGRAMMING SUBSTANCE ABUSE AWARENESS AND EDUCATION PROGRAM –**

### **PROJECT INSIDE - SUBSTANCE ABUSE EDUCATION AWARENESS AND INFORMATION INITIATIVE**

The Project Inside Substance Abuse Education Awareness and Information Initiative is a collaborative between the Offices of Drug Programs and Educational Services. It is a college-level program that specifically targets offenders twenty six years of age and under. The pilot was implemented in January, 2007 at the Garden State Youth Correctional Facility. This college oriented program is structured into three components as follows: Component I Addiction – Identification and Definition; Component II – Commonly Used Street Drugs (especially those prevalent in New Jersey); Component III – Drugs and the Brain. This is a thirty-six hour presentation of six week duration, two hours (2 hrs.) per week, twelve hours (12 hrs.) of independent study and homework assignments, and twelve hours of Journal documentation.

**Service Information** - the program is geared toward the youthful offender (26 years and under) enrolled in the Project Inside College Program. Moreover, it is designed to provide preventive education and information so as to circumvent future drug involvement whether usage or sales that further gravitates into criminality.

Upon completion of the program, the inmate is presented a Certificate of Completion. The goal of this initiative is to impart research-based educational information with respect to the negative affects of drugs and addiction to the youthful offender so as to plant preventive concepts that might attenuate any future substance abusing behavior that leads to criminal behavior. Additionally, it is the aim of the Office of Drug Programs to provide a diversity of programming for inmates who do not meet criteria for the traditional therapeutic community constructs. In this regard, the Substance Abuse Education Awareness and Information Initiative is viewed as beneficial toward institutional/community release requirements of program participation. It is also an alternative method of offering preventive education to those offenders found guilty of violating the Department's zero-tolerance policy.

**Outcome Measures** – the Office of Drug Programs is maintaining a current list of program completions for follow-up comparative analysis as these inmates are released to determine the existence of recidivism.

At this juncture there is no waiting list as inmates are selected based on their matriculation in the Project Inside College level program.

### **ENGAGING THE FAMILY – (Parenting and Substance Abuse Initiative)**

The New Jersey Department of Corrections was one of a few states selected by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' to participate in a pilot that seeks to promote healthy marriages and responsible fatherhood. Hence, the grant awarded will support the project entitled "Engaging the Family in the Recovery Process - An Innovative Approach for the Max-Out Offender." The program focuses on an underserved population, specifically those who will max-out (complete their sentence) while still incarcerated. The initial pilot construct was designed to reconnect and strengthen families upon the offender's reintegration into society.

**Service Information** – The program is designed to engage the spouse and/or children of offenders in dialogue and activities geared toward ending the criminal and subsequent addictive lifestyle of the offender and their loved ones. The overall goal of the program are threefold: (1) to strengthen marriage and family relationships of the incarcerated offender, (2) enhance the well-being of children of incarcerated fathers and (3) motivate and prepare incarcerated fathers to maintain a lifestyle abstinent of drugs so as to attenuate further gravitation toward criminality. To this end, case managers will develop treatment goals and a treatment plan with the offender prior to release.

The uniqueness of this initiative is centered on integrating the constructs of drug treatment, specifically the Living in the Balance Program (LIB) into parenting workshops. Utilizing research-based education and information, the offender and family is exposed to a reinforcement of parenting skills, knowledge and techniques geared toward strengthening the family bond. This exposure culminates with the case manager establishing specific links to social and drug treatment services in preparation for release. Additionally, the case manager will continue to be a resource to the ex-offender and the family upon societal reintegration as it relates to referral and networking resources.

**Outcome Measures** – As part of the grant, the N.J.D.O.C. has contracted with the College of New Jersey to conduct a process and outcome evaluation. The New Jersey project has also been selected to be part of a national outcome evaluation. To this end, the Office of Drug Programs will maintain requisite data with respect to those offenders participating in the program, completing the programs and co-relate this information with those who recidivate. Additionally, ODP will work in consort with relevant agencies both internal and external to the Department, to ascertain the offender's success as it relates to maintaining family ties as well as to abstain from subsequent drug involvement.

The Engaging the Family Program has been in existence for two years operating under a five year grant allocation. Upon entering its third year, the program has been implemented at three institutional sites, Northern State Prison, Southwoods State Prison and Garden State Youth Correctional Facility. The current program duration is six month cycles. However, four month cycles are under consideration as this would allow for more programs to be implemented and thereby availing the same to a larger complement of inmate-participants and their families.

Recruitment of program participants is on-going, and as such a waiting list has now been established. And, while many of the inmates seeking to participate in the program are not time eligible (must be within six months of maxing out); they will be fused into the program as they meet eligibility criteria.

### **Community Based Relapse Prevention**

**Service Information** – The Relapse Prevention Program is designed for inmates returned from community-based agencies for the use of drugs. Specifically, it affords inmates the opportunity to address issues of relapse and/or continuing in the recovery path by providing skills and tools that empowers them to recognize and avert triggers that leads to use.

Although, the program is facilitated under the auspices of the C4 Committee, and managed by the Office of Drug Programs, the physical location and subsequent operation of the Relapse Prevention Program is in the Assessment Centers. The C4 Committee interviews inmates returned from Community-based facilities for drug-related offenses. This Committee further determines the appropriate reassignment based on the offense which occasioned the return consistent with their current custody level. A representative from the Office of Drug Programs is present to assure that inmates returned for drug related offenses (i.e., 204a, 552a or zero-tolerance) are referred to the Assessment Center Relapse Prevention Program.

**Outcome Measures** - the Office of Drug Programs maintains a list of program participant-referrals for follow-up. A comparative analysis will be conducted as these inmates are released to determine program effectiveness and its relationship to recidivism.

At this juncture there is no waiting list since inmates are referred to the Relapse Prevention Program when they are seen by the C4 Committee and meet custody requirements for matriculation in the community.

Department/Agency Mission Statement: The New Jersey State Board of Education, in collaboration with the Department of Education, establishes policy and provides leadership in the development of exceptional learning opportunities for New Jersey's public school students for the purpose of enabling them to obtain a superior education.

1. To ensure that student assessment is integral to the teaching and learning of subject matter as presented in the Core Curriculum Content Standards (CCCS).

4. Expand and improve the pool of qualified teachers and administrators. Prepare teachers to effectively teach both the child and the subject.

### DIVISION OF STUDENT SERVICES

#### **FEDERAL SAFE AND DRUG-FREE SCHOOLS AND COMMUNITIES ACT FORMULA GRANTS TO ALL LOCAL EDUCATIONAL AGENCIES**

The capacity for local school response to behavioral, social-emotional and health problems is supplemented by federal funding provided specifically for school substance abuse and violence prevention activities. Under the Federal *Safe and Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act* (SDFSCA) program (Title IV-A of the *No Child Left Behind Act*), a total of \$7.3 million dollars was provided through the New Jersey Department of Education (NJDOE) to local school districts for this purpose in 2007-2008. While the NJDOE was able to leverage carry-forward funds for a 5.3% increase in the total amount provided to LEAs in 2007-2008, the Federal allocation represented a 24% reduction in Federal funding provided under the SDFSCA for the 2006-2007 school years. This funding decrease dramatically reduced the fiscal resources available to schools and the NJDOE for responding to substance abuse and other school safety and

security needs. An additional *15% reduction* in Federal SDFSCA funds has been announced for 2008-2009, with little possibility of the availability of carry forward funds to offset the additional decrease. As a result, there is an anticipated *40 percent decrease* over the 2006-2007 allocation, for an approximate total reduced federal allocation of \$5.1 million in 2008-2009.

The SDFSCA is the NJDOE's sole source of funding dedicated to support all local educational agencies (i.e., school districts, charter schools, private, non-profit schools) in New Jersey in the development, implementation and evaluation of comprehensive programs and activities which are coordinated with other school and community-based services and programs, and that are designed to: (1) foster safe and drug-free learning environments (grades K-12) that support academic achievement; (2) be consistent with the Principles of Effectiveness, per Section 4115(a)1 of Title IV, Part A; (3) prevent or reduce violence, the use, possession and distribution of illegal drugs, and delinquency; and create a well-disciplined environment conducive to learning, which includes consultation between teachers, principals and other school personnel to identify early warning signs of drug use and violence and to provide behavioral interventions as part of classroom management efforts; and (4) include activities which promote the involvement of parents in the activities or programs; promote coordination with community groups and coalitions and government agencies and distribute information about the local education of agency's needs, goals and programs funded under Title IV, Part A. School district applications for these formula funds are submitted as part of the No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB) – Consolidated Formula Sub grant to foster coordination and effective use of NCLB and other school resources.

**Service Information:** The target population served was all public and nonpublic school students in New Jersey in grades K-12 (ages 5-17). The number served was 1,158,176 (566,687 ages 12 and under and 591,489 between 13 and 19 years of age), in 21 counties\*.

## **SOCIAL NORMS PROJECT**

This cooperative initiative between the NJDOE and the Center for Addiction Studies, Rowan University is designed to use established social psychological principles concerning the influence of group norms on individual behavior to reduce student alcohol, tobacco and other drug use in participating high schools and student bullying, harassment and intimidation in participating middle schools. The project is based on the research literature and the successful implementation of the social norms approach in New Jersey colleges by the New Jersey Higher Education Consortium. The project, initiated in the 2005-2006 school year, provided a third year of services in the in the 2007-2008 school year.

**Service Information:** In the 2007-2008 school year, 15 high schools and 19 middle schools, representing all three regions (i.e., north, central, south) of the state and diverse settings (i.e., urban, suburban, rural), received services and participated in the Social Norms Project. All schools will benefit from the dissemination of project findings at the conclusion of the project.

## **DEVELOPING SAFE AND CIVIL SCHOOLS: A COORDINATED APPROACH FOR SOCIAL-EMOTIONAL AND CHARACTER DEVELOPMENT**

Reports of the research literature document that when social-emotional and academic learning both become part of schooling, students are more likely to remember or use what they are taught and are less likely to engage in high-risk behavior. In response to these important findings, the NJDOE is collaborating with Rutgers University and the Collaborative for Academic and Social and Emotional Learning to implement a project intended to assist participating school staff in fully integrating social-emotional learning throughout the educational program and organizing existing resources, programs and services to create strong social and emotional learning conditions.

Participating school districts and schools received assistance in selecting, developing and implementing projects based on findings derived from a needs assessment. The intent is to reduce at-risk student behavior, develop positive learning climates and improve academic performance

among students in participating schools. The project was initiated in the 2005-2006 school year and continued through the 2007-2008 school year.

**Service Information:** The target population was all school districts, but priority was given to schools identified for corrective or other action through the NJDOE's Collaborative Assessment for Planning and Achievement (CAPA) because the findings from the CAPA process indicate applicable educational vulnerabilities. In 2007-2008, working relationships were established among 193 participating school districts and their school staff, experts from the national Collaborative for Academic Social and Emotional Learning and New Jersey experts with demonstrated experience in creating well-coordinated and effective SEL conditions in schools to support project initiatives.

#### **TITLE IV-A AND UNSAFE SCHOOL CHOICE OPTION TRAINING AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE PROJECT**

This cooperative initiative between the NJDOE and the Center for Applied Psychology, Rutgers University is designed to assist the NJDOE in fulfilling the statutory requirements of Title IV-A (the SDFSCA) and the Unsafe School Choice Option (Title IX, Part E, Subpart 2, Section 9532) of the No Child Left Behind Act. The project assists the NJDOE by increasing its capacity to provide schools and NJDOE staff with technical assistance, training services and support for resource development for the successful implementation of the requirements under Title IV-A and the Unsafe School Choice Option (USCO) Policy. The assistance and supportive resources are provided to schools utilizing federal Title IV-A funds and schools determined by the NJDOE to be persistently dangerous or in early warning status and special services schools identified under the USCO Policy. The project was initiated in the 2005-2006 school year and continued through the 2007-2008 school year.

**Service Information:** All school districts and nonpublic schools that accepted or benefited from Title IV-A funds and schools identified under the USCO Policy as either persistently dangerous or in early warning status and NJDOE staff who provided support to schools for Title IV-A and the USCO Policy.

**BETTER USE OF DATA IN PREVENTION PLANNING COUNTY FORUM SUPPORT PROJECT**

This cooperative initiative between the NJDOE and the Center for Applied Psychology, Rutgers University was designed to assist the NJDOE in fulfilling the requirements of a grant received from the United States Department of Education (USDOE) to improve the quality of data used in the planning and evaluation of programs developed by local school districts for the prevention of violence and alcohol, tobacco and other drug abuse. The project involved local- and county-level educators and county-level community agency staff responsible for prevention programming in the promotion of the use of quality data in prevention program planning via day-long county forums.

**Service Information:** County forums were held in six counties in 2007-2008.

**HARASSMENT, INTIMIDATION AND BULLYING**

To assist school districts in developing the required harassment, intimidation and bullying policies, the authorizing statute (N.J.S.A. 18A:37-13 et seq.) required the NJDOE to develop and issue a model policy applicable to grades kindergarten through twelve. The NJDOE's model policy was developed and disseminated in December 2002 and revised in April 2006 and again in April 2007. Regulations (N.J.A.C. 6A:16-7.9) regarding harassment, intimidation and bullying were adopted by the State Board of Education in August 2005 and readopted in September 2006 as part of the re-adoption of N.J.A.C. 6A:16, Programs to Support Student Development.

### **PARTNERSHIPS IN CHARACTER EDUCATION PROGRAM**

In 2002, New Jersey was one of only five states to receive a four-year federal grant award under the Partnerships in Character Education Program (Title V, Part D of the No Child Left Behind Act). Under this grant, New Jersey created the New Jersey Center for Social and Character Development (formally the New Jersey Center for Character Education) at the Center for Applied Psychology in the Graduate School of Applied and Professional Psychology at Rutgers, The State University. The creation

of the New Jersey Center for Social and Character Development (NJCSCD) provided the leadership necessary to maximize New Jersey's ability to guide schools in adopting evidence-based programs and strategies.

The NJCSCD continued to serve as a primary partner in the provision of technical assistance, services and resources to schools in support of social and character development under the 2006-2010 Federal Partnerships in Character Education Program (PCEP) grant. This four-year, \$2.7 million grant program enables the NJDOE to fully incorporate character education into the mainstream of changes that are occurring in school-based curriculum standards and student services by: 1) increasing the capacity of New Jersey school systems to implement and sustain social-emotional and character development programs in the context of current state reform efforts; and 2) evaluating the impact of social-emotional and character development programs on the social inclusion of students with disabilities, a population of students that previous efforts have not adequately addressed.

**Service Information:** The target population includes all public school districts on an ongoing basis, and targeted school districts involved in the pilot and evaluation projects; ten (10) and twelve (12) schools respectively.

## **MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT BETWEEN EDUCATION AND LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICIALS**

As set forth in the regulations on *Law Enforcement Operations for Substances, Weapons and Safety* (N.J.A.C. 6A:16-6), school districts are required to establish memorandums of agreement with local law enforcement authorities. The agreements, which are reviewed and signed annually by local education and law enforcement officials, form the basis for sharing information between education and law enforcement representatives and sets parameters for law enforcement investigations on school grounds. The agreements must be consistent with the format and content established by the Attorney General and the Commissioner of Education, known as the *Uniform State Memorandum of Agreement between Education and Law Enforcement Officials* (MOA).

In November 2007, the Attorney General and the Commissioner of Education issued a revised MOA, which includes new information on school safety and security, including information on school security plans and training; gang threats, recruitment and information sharing; harassment, intimidation and bullying, offenses involving computers, hazing, reports of child abuse or neglect, law enforcement units, inquiries regarding law enforcement operations, stationhouse adjustments, notification of arrests or charges filed against school personnel, notification of emergencies and School Violence Awareness Week. ## **NEW JERSEY STUDENT HEALTH SURVEY**

In 2004-2005, the NJDOE first conducted the bi-annual New Jersey Student Health Survey (NJSHS) among a sample of public school students. This survey, which is based on the Youth Risk Behavior Survey sponsored by the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), asks students to self report on their actions and attitudes in six areas that are highly related to preventable, premature injury or illness. Concerning alcohol, tobacco, marijuana and other drug use, the survey includes questions on age of first use, 30-day use and lifetime use, use on school property, sale of drugs, and perceived harm. Concerning violence, the survey includes questions on carrying a weapon, carrying a gun, having been in a physical fight, having personal property stolen or damaged at school, having been hit by a boyfriend or girlfriend, having been forced to have sex and trying to commit suicide. Some questions are asked every other survey administration.

The findings are used by state agencies for planning, program assessment and federal reporting. Reports of findings are distributed to school staff and published on the NJDOE Website. The spring 2007 survey of the NJSHS was administered to a random sample of 1,670 students in grades 9-12 in 29 high schools. The results of the 2007 survey will be available in spring 2008. It is anticipated that survey information for grades 7-8 will be

obtained from the PRIDE survey administered by the Division of Addiction Services, New Jersey Department of Human Services and the Youth Tobacco Survey administered by the New Jersey Department of Health and Senior Services.

## **ELECTRONIC VIOLENCE, VANDALISM AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE REPORTING SYSTEM**

Pursuant to *N.J.S.A. 18A:46* and *N.J.A.C. 6A:16-5.3*, school staff who witness or who have knowledge of an incident of violence, vandalism or substance abuse must file a report of the incident with the school principal and the district must annually report all incidents to the NJDOE. The Commissioner of Education is required to annually report all incidents to the Legislature and the Governor. In addition, the superintendent of the district is required to provide a summary of all such incidents annually at a public hearing, pursuant to *N.J.S.A. 18A:36-5.1*.

The Commissioner's report provides the Legislature with data in four broad categories of incidents: violence, vandalism, weapons and substance abuse. This report also notifies the Legislature and the public of the actions taken by the Commissioner, the State Board of Education and the NJDOE to address the problems indicated in the data. The Commissioner's report to the Legislature as well as on-line reports of school, district and state summary data from the EVVRS are available at <http://www.state.nj.us/njded/schools/vandv/index.html>.

Since the 1999-2000 school year, school districts have been recording their incidents of violence, vandalism and substance abuse over the Internet on the Electronic Violence and Vandalism Reporting System (EVVRS) accessible through <http://homeroom.state.nj.us/>. To promote consistency in reporting, the NJDOE, in conjunction with the New Jersey Network (NJN), produced a program in DVD format that assists in bringing districts in line with one another in their interpretation of incident definitions (i.e., in what to report over the EVVRS). The 17-minute program explains the purpose and operation of the EVVRS and dramatizes the kinds of incidents that should be reported on the system. Together with a revised set of

incident definitions and scenarios, the video will encourage uniformity in the application of standards for reporting.

**Service Information:** The target populations reported were: 1) student offenders of violence, vandalism or substance abuse and 2) victims (staff and students). The materials were designed for use by all school staff.

## CHIEF OF STAFF

**SCHOOL SAFETY AND SECURITY** - The NJDOE's School Security Unit, in accordance with N.J.S.A. 52:17B-4.7, provided gang education seminars for school administrators, in collaboration with the Attorney General's Office. The training seminars focused on teaching school administrators to recognize signs of gang involvement or activity. The seminars are offered annually in each county, updating school administrators on new and emerging information on gangs and their impact on schools and the community.

In support of the Governor's Internet Safety Initiative, the NJDOE partnered with the Attorney General's Office to design and provide enhanced Internet Safety training to teachers and school administrators. Six train-the-trainer sessions, offered statewide, covered the topics of cyber bullying, the potential dangers of social networking sites and gambling sites, the behavioral traits of sexual predators and the methods they use to lure potential victims. All participants were provided with resources for providing trainings to parent groups, students and school personnel in their communities.

## **GOVERNOR'S SAFE STREETS AND NEIGHBORHOODS PLAN - DELINQUENCY PREVENTION SUBCOMMITTEE**

The NJDOE is assisting in the development and implementation of the Governor's Safe Streets and Neighborhoods Plan by participating on the Prevention Coordinating Council, the Coordination of Resources Subcommittee, the Empowering Communities Subcommittee and the Blueprints for Safe Streets and Schools Conference Planning Subcommittee. This multi-level, multi-agency initiative has identified prevention, intervention, enforcement and re-entry mechanisms, best practices and resources to help reduce the criminal behavior of youth, including gang-related activities. As a part of this comprehensive initiative, the NJDOE is coordinating with the Juvenile Justice Commission, the Administrative Office of the Courts, the Department of Children and Families and the Department of State to develop a truancy prevention and intervention initiative intended for implementation in the 2008-2009 school year; implement a conference titled *Blueprints for Safe Streets and Schools Conference: The Governor's Conference on Delinquency Prevention*; and assist with a dropout prevention initiative in 2008-2009.

## DIVISION OF EDUCATIONAL STANDARDS AND PROGRAMS

### **CORE CURRICULUM CONTENT STANDARDS**

New regulations (N.J.A.C. 6A:8) for Core Curriculum Content Standards (CCCS) in Comprehensive Health and Physical Education were adopted by the State Board of Education on April 7, 2004. The CCCS in Comprehensive Health and Physical Education (CHPE) contain specific indicators under Standards 2.3 (Alcohol, Tobacco and Other Drugs), 2.1 (Health Promotion and Disease Prevention - wellness concepts and skills), 2.2 (Personal, Interpersonal and Life Skills - health enhancing personal, interpersonal and life skills) and 2.4 ( Human Sexuality and Family Life – physical, emotional and social aspects of human relationships and sexuality) that require public schools to teach substance abuse and

violence prevention skills, including media resistance, peer pressure resistance, peer leadership, problem solving, conflict resolution and stress management. Topical strands infused in each of the CCCS in CHPE help teachers locate specific content and skills related to substance abuse and violence prevention skills. The standards are further defined by progress indicators at grades two, four, six, eight and twelve.

*The Curriculum Framework for Health and Physical Education (1999)*, which can be found at <http://www.state.nj.us/njded/frameworks/chpe/index.html>, includes 140 suggested sample lessons for educators to use to address topics related to violence prevention and positive social and emotional development. The New Jersey CCCS in CHPE provide an age-appropriate and culturally sensitive focus that helps students develop the knowledge and skills that lead to healthy, active lifestyles.

Additionally, the NJDOE developed and disseminated a CCCS program in CD format which links new activities to the standards, including the Comprehensive Health and Physical Education standard. ## **SUBSTANCE AWARENESS COORDINATOR CERTIFICATION**

In April 2005 the New Jersey State Board of Education amended the Educational Services Certificate requirements (N.J.A.C. 6A:9) for the substance awareness coordinator (SAC) endorsement issued by the New Jersey State Board of Examiners. The endorsement authorizes the holder to perform the functions of a SAC, as set forth in N.J.S.A. 18A:40A-18, in grades preschool through 12. The amended regulations expand the eligibility requirements to increase the types of professionals who may apply to obtain the endorsement, increase the clock hours for the required curriculum and expand the required areas of study.

## SUICIDE PREVENTION

In support of *N.J.S.A. 18A:6-111*, which requires all public school teaching staff members to complete at least two hours of instruction in suicide prevention as part of their required 100 clock hours of professional development, the NJDOE issued guidance for fulfilling the professional development requirement. The guidance also addressed the provision in the statute requiring that the New Jersey Core Curriculum Content Standards for Comprehensive Health and Physical Education be revised to include suicide prevention. ## OFFICE OF STATE BUDGET AND ACCOUNTING

### DRUG ABUSE EDUCATION FUND PROJECT

Per the provisions of *N.J.S.A. C.2C:43-3.5* and *N.J.S.A. C.54A:9-25.12 et seq.*, a Drug Abuse Education Fund (D.A.E.F.) was established from portions of taxpayer-designated refunds and penalties assessed against individuals adjudicated or convicted of certain crimes. The resources accumulated in the fund are appropriated annually to NJDOE for distribution to non-governmental entities for the use of law enforcement personnel in providing drug abuse education to students in grades K-12 on a statewide basis. Under the appropriation for these statutory

provisions, the NJDOE issued funds to D.A.R.E. New Jersey, Inc. for the sixth year of services for the 2007-2008 school year.

## DIVISION OF STUDENT SERVICES

### **INTERVENTION AND REFERRAL SERVICES INITIATIVE**

The Intervention and Referral Services (I&RS) Initiative supports implementation of the I&RS regulations (N.J.A.C. 6A:16-8) by providing technical assistance to districts for the establishment of building-based multidisciplinary problem-solving teams (grades K-12). These teams are designed to assist students who are experiencing learning, behavior or health difficulties, and to assist staff members who have difficulties in addressing students' learning, behavior or health needs.

The technical assistance provided by the NJDOE includes a comprehensive *Resource Manual for Intervention and Referral Services*, which is available at: <http://www.state.nj.us/njded/students/irs/>, and the provision of training to prepare building administrators and building-based teams to implement the I&RS regulations. Approximately 844 building-based teams have been trained since April 2000, including 124 teams trained (372 school staff) in the 2007-2008 school year. Approximately 220 school staff who were added to their school's I&RS teams also were provided training in the 2007-2008 school year. In addition to providing annual training in I&RS team practices, the NJDOE has provided supplemental training programs to 230 I&RS team members since 2005-2006, with 170 being trained in 2007-2008, in response to the results of a professional development needs survey conducted in the spring of 2006. A new four-part series in video and DVD formats and accompanying flyer was disseminated to all school districts in 2005-2006.

### **INTERVENTION AND REFERRAL SERVICES TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE PROJECT**

This cooperative initiative between the NJDOE and The Richard Stockton College of New Jersey is designed to assist the NJDOE in increasing its capacity to provide technical assistance, consultation, professional development, networking and materials development and dissemination services to support school building and school district staff in the effective implementation of *N.J.A.C. 6A:16-8*, Intervention and Referral Services (I&RS) and the NJDOE's best practices in support of *N.J.A.C. 6A:16-8*.

### **INTERVENTION AND REFERRAL SERVICES DATA COLLECTION PROJECT**

The NJDOE collaborated with the Kean University (KU) to assist the NJDOE in carrying out a data and other information collection project designed to gather facts from public school districts and school buildings on the degree, quality and effects of the implementation of the regulations at *N.J.A.C. 6A:16-8*, Intervention and Referral Services and the NJDOE's best practices model for implementing the I&RS regulations. The project was designed to provide the NJDOE with information for planning programs, services, materials and other activities to support each public school building in New Jersey in establishing and maintaining an effective coordinated system, using a multidisciplinary team approach, for the planning and delivery of intervention and referral services to assist students who experience learning, behavior or health difficulties and to assist staff who experience difficulties in addressing student's learning, behavior or health needs, in accordance with the regulations at *N.J.A.C. 6A:16-8*.

**Service Information:** All schools with staff who participated in the NJDOE's I&RS training program (approximately 720 schools statewide), and a statewide sample of elementary schools, middle schools and high schools whose staff did not participate in the NJDOE's I&RS training program.

### **RANDOM TESTING OF ALCOHOL AND CONTROLLED DANGEROUS SUBSTANCES**

Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 18A:40A-25, the New Jersey State Board of Education adopted regulations at N.J.A.C. 6A:16-4.4, Voluntary policy for random testing of student alcohol or other drug use, in November 2007. The regulations apply only to districts that choose to adopt a policy for the *random testing of alcohol and controlled dangerous substances* of the district's students in *grades nine through twelve*, who participate in extracurricular activities or who possess parking permits. These rules implement the Governor's and Legislature's desire for establishing parameters for implementing random drug testing as a means to deter drug use and for the early detection of student's with drug problems so that counseling and rehabilitative services may be offered.

### **UNSAFE SCHOOL CHOICE OPTION POLICY**

As a condition for the NJDOE and public school districts to receive funds under the federal *No Child Left Behind Act* (NCLB), the NJDOE was required to establish and implement a statewide policy requiring that students attending persistently dangerous schools or who become victims of violent criminal offenses while in or on the school grounds that they attend be allowed to transfer to a safe public school within the local educational agency. The NJDOE's policy was adopted by the State Board of Education in June 2003 and reissued in July 2008. All local

educational agencies must comply with the provisions of the policy, as appropriate.

**Service Information:** The target population was schools identified under the USCO Policy by the NJDOE as being persistently dangerous or at risk of becoming persistently dangerous, and victims of violent criminal offenses in all schools with grades K-12.

This program provides literature and pamphlets regarding TB to clients at Alcohol and Drug Abuse Treatment Centers. Materials Provided to TB Program at no cost by CDC or TB Regional Training and Medical Consultation Centers.

### Division of HIV/AIDS Services (DHAS)

#### **HIV/AIDS**

The DHAS supports the provision of HIV prevention services to injecting drug users (IDU) through the Patient Incentive Programs (PIPs). PIPs, located at drug treatment centers in Newark, Trenton, Asbury Park and Atlantic City, provide community outreach, HIV counseling, testing and referral services, HIV health education/risk reduction behavior change programs, and free drug treatment to hard to reach IDUs who would otherwise not be in treatment. Female sex partners of IDUs receive HIV prevention services through two specialized HIV Prevention for Women (HIP4W) programs located at healthcare provider agencies in Trenton and Newark.

### Division of Family Health Services

#### **PERINATAL ADDICTION PREVENTION**

The six Maternal and Child Health Consortia are funded to provide regional risk reduction coordination for women of childbearing age. The major objectives of the Perinatal Addictions Prevention Project include providing professional and public education, encouraging all prenatal providers to screen their patients for substance use/abuse and developing a network of available resources to aid pregnant substance abusing women.

The risk-reduction coordinators in each of the consortia provide these services. They also provide information, training, advocacy and support for programs that serve families of children adversely affected by prenatal alcohol and drug exposure. The Coordinators work with staff from the six Centers of Excellence throughout the State. Children who have been affected by drugs and/or alcohol are referred to these Centers for appropriate services.

**Service Information:** During the 2008 grant year, approximately 25% of the pregnant women throughout the state were screened for alcohol and/or drug use during their pregnancy. The majority of these screenings were done in hospital clinics. The results of these screenings show that approximately 12% of the pregnant women say that they consumed alcohol in the month before they knew that they were pregnant. Because most women do not know they are pregnant during the first month, those babies were exposed to alcohol. Similarly, when women were asked if they had smoked cigarettes in the month before they knew they were pregnant, over 11% responded that they had smoked. This is a decrease of 7% compared to the women who had been screened during the three previous years. If a screening reveals risk behavior, it results in the women receiving prevention education, being referred for substance abuse assessments or entering treatment when appropriate.

Programs designed to educate the general public about the risks of substance use during pregnancy have reached 7,600 women and men during 180 offerings. There were 160 programs offered to raise awareness of the treating professionals and encourage their participation in the universal screening project.

### **TB INTERVENTION**

This program provides materials (syringes, antigens) to Alcohol and Drug Abuse Treatment Centers for Mantoux tuberculin skin testing of clients. The funding utilized to provide these TB testing materials are provided by the state, but recordkeeping does not exist to determine the value of the TB testing materials supplied to Alcohol and Drug Abuse Treatment Centers. If latent TB infection is detected through these screening activities, referrals may be made to TB clinics funded by the Program. These clinics are funded by both state and federal sources, but there is no mechanism to determine

the costs associated with services provided specifically for referrals from Alcohol and Drug Abuse Treatment Centers.

### **HIV SPECIALISTS**

This program is no longer existence.

### **CARE & TREATMENT I**

The DHAS supports individual, group, family and youth group counseling, residential substance abuse treatment and outpatient substance abuse treatment.

**Service Information:** Outpatient and residential substance abuse treatment services were provided to intravenous drug users and persons with HIV. A total of 79 individuals received outpatient substance abuse services and 4 received residential services. Treatment providers were located in four New Jersey counties including Burlington, Camden, Gloucester and Salem.

### **CARE & TREATMENT II**

The DHAS supports individual, group substance abuse counseling, methadone maintenance treatment, residential substance abuse treatment counseling and ambulatory outpatient medical care.

**Service Information:** Outpatient and residential substance abuse treatment services as well as methadone maintenance were provided to intravenous drug users and persons with HIV. A total of 56 individuals received outpatient substance abuse counseling services, 13 received residential services and 69 persons were provided with methadone maintenance and 19 received outpatient medical care. Treatment providers were located in five New Jersey counties including Atlantic, Cape May, Mercer, Monmouth and Ocean.

### **FAS (FETAL ALCOHOL SYNDROME) DIAGNOSTIC CENTERS**

A statewide network of six Regional FAS Diagnostic Centers has been established whose purpose is to provide diagnosis and treatment of children with FASD (Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders.) The regional centers are strategically located throughout the state and housed within state funded hospital-based Child Evaluation Centers. In addition, the Centers provide both community education and professional and allied health training related to early detection and treatment of FAS. Attendance at 34 programs during this past fiscal year was approximately 800 consumers and professionals. Staff from the Diagnostic Centers participated in the fall conference titled Women's Health-Addiction, Trauma and Hope through the FAS Task Force. In addition representatives from the Centers are participating in the development of a statewide media campaign focused on prevention and the development of a web site [www.beintheknownj.org](http://www.beintheknownj.org).

**Service Information:** During Fiscal Year 2008, 7,000 children were screened for FAS, 71 were identified with FAS and 69 have been identified with FASD. To date, 21,000 children have been screened for FAS through the Diagnostic Centers. A multidisciplinary team completes an evaluation and then develops a comprehensive report and intervention plan that is discussed with the family. Members of the team include: developmental pediatrician, licensed psychologist, physical and occupational therapists, speech pathologist, social worker and family counselor. This treatment plan may include the following: diagnosis of medical and psychosocial conditions, treatment referrals to community resources, out patient services and school-based programs, medical and/or behavioral monitoring and case management and counseling which include family support, behavior modification and education planning. During this year, 206 children have received complete evaluations. The six centers have developed a standardized screening tool for identifying children at risk. In addition a standard four digit diagnostic grid developed by the University of Washington is used make a diagnosis of FAS. Performance indicators used were delete previous two words insert developed have resulted in increased screening of children utilizing the standard tool and the identification of children with a diagnosis of FAS using the University of Washington diagnostic guide.

## Division of Epidemiology, Environmental And Occupational Health Services

### **TB TREATMENT SUPPORT**

TB education/training is made available for providers of care to substance abusers who work in various centers throughout the state; medication is provided for treatment of active disease and latent TB infection; and field follow-up occurs for an individual who was overdue for examination, treatment and/or clinic appointment, and for directly observed therapy of new cases among substance abusers. The funding for these field services is often provided by health service grants funded by both federal and state sources. It is not possible to determine the amount of funding that is used specifically to provide services for individuals also served by Alcohol and Drug Abuse Treatment Centers.

Technical assistance is provided and policies and procedures regarding TB control activities are developed. These services are provided by TB Program staff funded by both state and federal sources. It is not possible to determine the time and effort of these employees specifically for Alcohol and Drug Treatment Centers.

## Division of Family Health Services

### Comprehensive Tobacco Control Program (CTCP)

On July 1, 2008, the CTCP was transferred to the Division of Family Health Services due to internal reorganization of the NJ Department of Health and Senior Services.

New Jersey's \$3 billion funding shortfall required the state to make many difficult decisions in order to balance the FY 2009 budget. Unfortunately, one of these decisions was a \$2.4 million reduction in the \$11 million Comprehensive Tobacco Control Program (CTCP) budget.

This budget reduction has required making some difficult cuts to CTCP programs and at the same time maintaining the vital and effective programs that do the most to advance our mission to reduce death, sickness and disability among New Jersey residents who use tobacco or are exposed to second-hand smoke.

In response to program planning and evaluation, CTCP will now be focused to better reflect the goals established through the CTCP statewide planning process and reflect the priorities of the CDC:

- Increase cessation
- Reduce tobacco acceptability
- Decrease tobacco-related disparities
- Decrease involuntary exposure to second-hand smoke

The information provided in this report cover the year 2008 to include programmatic and budgetary changes.

#### **1. Community Partnerships:**

This unit is responsible to manage the tobacco prevention programs located within all 21 counties in NJ (now named as "Community Partnerships for a Tobacco Free New Jersey"). Additionally, it also administers the NJ GASP, Mom's Quit Connection from the Southern New Jersey Perinatal Cooperative, the American Cancer Society, the City of Vineland Health Department-Outreach Mobile project and the New Jersey Prevention Network-Tobacco Training Institute.

New programming will focus on three key public health approaches to community empowerment for tobacco control: community mobilization, media and counter marketing efforts, and policy action. These efforts will provide productive linkages among key county stakeholders to improve access to cessation services and reduce involuntary exposure to Second Hand Smoking (SHS). This public health model is bringing together a multi-disciplinary team of community agencies, health organizations, and government agencies to improve the environmental health in New Jersey.

Funding for the 21 Community Partnerships was not reduced. The Outreach Program for physicians (Institute of Medicine and Public Health) was terminated. The tobacco Training Institute funding was reduced.

## 2. Youth and School Programs

REBEL has been a high school based, youth empowerment model wherein REBEL members were educated about the harms of tobacco use and the manipulative marketing tactics of the tobacco industry. Members were given a voice and the skills to make positive changes in their schools and communities. Through this model, members became agents of change working to affect the social norm among their peers.

The goals and current priorities are intended to shift the program's focus from a youth empowerment model to a youth activism model. The shift transitions the program from one that creates individual agents of change, to one that changes the environment in which the teen agents of change primarily function: the schools. This shift in programming will engage youth leaders to change social norms among their peers regarding tobacco use through the following specific actions:

**FY 08-09 Primary Short-term Outcome:** Implementation of 100% comprehensive school policies within participating REBEL schools. The grantee will work to promote and facilitate the adoption and/or implementation of effective tobacco-free school policies.

**FY 08-09 Primary Process Objectives Related to Long-term Outcomes:** Target outreach to non-REBEL members within participating REBEL schools and the associated community to increase their knowledge of the harms of tobacco use and the marketing tactics of the tobacco industry.

Target outreach to non-traditional schools and community based organizations to increase services to disparately served populations of youth

While being able to maintain the Youth/REBEL programs in all 21 counties, funding was reduced by 80%. CTCP will continue to provide funding for one Youth Cessation program (one was terminated). The REBEL University program was terminated as well as the REBEL Magazine and all REBEL Statewide activities.

**3. Treatment & Cessation Programs:**

The New Jersey Quitnet, Quitline and Quitcenters are three unique free or low cost treatment options for smokers in New Jersey. Since New Jersey began this three way program in 1990, several states have reached out and are now offering the same mix as pioneered by New Jersey. The CTCP will continue offering the following services.

➤ **New Jersey Quitline:**

This is a toll-free (1-866-NJSTOPS) telephone based counseling service offering services from brief advice to an extensive one-on-one telephone counseling with counselors trained by American Cancer Society (new contractor). .

➤ **NJ Quitnet**

This is a free web-based resource that offers a wide variety of online resources. In addition to information on various pharmacotherapy and methods of quitting, the site offers tools to plan the quit and an online follow-up that meets the client's needs. There is a trained counselor available who answers questions, usually within 24 hours. The chat room is a feature that has grown each year. It is available 24/7 and there are usually participants available around the clock

➤ **NJ Quitcenters**

NJ Quitcenters provide comprehensive individual assessments in a face-to-face counseling environment. There are 7 (seven) currently funded Quitcenters:

- Virtura Hospital (Burlington County)
- UMDNJ – New Brunswick (Middlesex County)
- Shore Memorial Hospital (Atlantic County)
- UMDNJ-Mercer/Trenton (Mercer County)
- Saint Barnabas-South (Ocean County)
- Saint Barnabas-North (Essex County)

**UMDNJ Tobacco Dependence Program**

**The CTCP also provides funds to the UMDNJ** for the provision of tobacco training and related services to providers and the public in general. This program was reduced by 40%.

#### **4. Tobacco Age of Sale Enforcement (TASE)**

This unit is responsible to assure a non-compliance (selling tobacco to minors) violation rate of less than 20% as mandated by the federal Center for Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment (SAPT). Through 81 participating Local Health Department (LHDs) and TASE inspectors (for those areas not participating in the program), random, unannounced compliance check inspections of licensed retail tobacco vendors are conducted throughout the year.

CTCP has a Memorandum of Agreement with the Department of Human Services-Division of Addiction Services (DAS). This MOU includes specific procedures on how the CTCP/TASE program will coordinate efforts with the DAS since the non-compliance rate is still linked to DAS federal block grant funding. It also delineates those specific support services that DAS provides to TASE related to the drawing of the sample, data collection and reporting. Because the drawing of the retailers sample and LHD grant agreements were completed by April 2008, funding for this year remains the same.

#### **5. Health and Communications**

The Comprehensive Tobacco Control Program's public awareness and media campaigns reach New Jersey's diverse population through a combination of media strategies that encourage youth to refrain from smoking and motivate adults who smoke to quit.

Due to a drastic reduction in the media budget (75%), the CTCP health communication program will only focus in the following:

- Public relation outreach to promote of the NJ Quit Services as well as to promote youth tobacco prevention and advocacy.

## **6. Research and Evaluation**

The Research and Evaluation Unit of the Comprehensive Tobacco Control Program provides statewide surveillance and program evaluation to the CTCP. Surveillance of tobacco trends in all population continues to be extremely important to monitor prevalence and trends in use of all tobacco products. Program evaluation is important to CTCP to measure the effectiveness of the programs and activities that CTCP provides state-wide. The CTCP continues to work with the University of Medicine and Dentistry – School of Public Health, Tobacco Surveillance and Evaluation Research Program as the external evaluator to the program.

# DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES

**Department/Agency Mission Statement:** The Department of Human Services is dedicated to providing quality services that consistently meet or exceed expectations with the goal to protect, assist and empower economically disadvantaged individuals and families, and people with disabilities to achieve their maximum potential. We strive to ensure a seamless array of services through partnerships and collaborations with communities statewide. We seek to promote accountability, transparency and quality in all that we do.

## Core Functions

- Serve as a safety net for low income people through the TANF, GA, Food Stamps, child support and emergency shelter programs. Help people transition toward greater independence and self sufficiency.
- Provide health care coverage for low income, aged, blind and disabled people.
- Operate state institutions and provide residential and community based supports and/or treatment to people with developmental disabilities, mental illness and substance abuse so they can live in the most independent situation possible and achieve quality of life, wellness and recovery.
- Communicate effectively with the public, the media, consumers of Human Services and DHS staff. Provide equal access to public information within the purview of this department to all interested citizens.
- Effectively manage the Human Services' budget, maximize revenue, ensure fiscal integrity and maintain the public trust.
- Assure a sufficient workforce that is competent and diverse in both state and contracted services.
- Develop and formulate public policy related to human services in collaboration with community partners, stakeholders and government leaders to address identified local and state issues and priorities.
- Ensure that all Department services are carried out with quality, efficiency, safety, fiscal integrity and dignity for the people we serve.

## Prevention Information

### Division of Addiction Services

#### **THROUGH THE MEDIA**

The Partnership for a Drug-Free New Jersey creates awareness and develops prevention media to impact schools, families and workplaces.

**Service Information:** Services include information dissemination to youth, parents, educators, the media, prevention, and education and other activities that also relate to their "Drug Free Workplace Programs. Recent initiatives focused on medication abuse and underage drinking.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$1,055,905 (State)**

#### **MIDDLE SCHOOL PEER TO PEER PROJECT**

Created in response to results from the New Jersey middle school drug and alcohol survey, the New Jersey Peer to Peer is a statewide, school-based program designed to develop leadership capacity and reduce substance use among middle school students. In participating schools, teams of seventh and eighth grade student leaders meet with adult mentors each week using a structured curriculum. Weekly training sessions emphasize team-building, leadership development, and learning about substances, including tobacco, alcohol, marijuana, inhalants, and designer drugs. Once trained, students lead interactive workshops with peers, parents, and faculty on topics such as substance abuse prevention, conflict resolution, problem solving, and parent-child communication.

**Service Information:** Services were provided in 100 schools to to approximately 9000 Middle School students (5<sup>th</sup> to 8<sup>th</sup> grade) and 250 adult members combined in all 21 New Jersey counties. Services include mentoring, recreation, information dissemination, prevention education and other activities.

**Funding Amount: \$30,000 (Federal)**

## **SPORTS, VIOLENCE AND ADDICTIONS “PARENTING AN ATHLETE”-**

This is a pilot project with St. Barnabas Prevention Institute to reach coaches and parents regarding youth sports, violence and the addiction connection.

**Service Information:** Prevention education was provided to 79 parents and 33 Parent Coaches.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$105,591 (Federal)**

## **ROWAN UNIVERSITY – SOCIAL NORMS PROJECT**

Through Rowan University and the College Consortium, this project provides education, programming, and environmental strategies that address the use of alcohol and tobacco on college campuses.

**Service Information:** Services were provided to approximately 26,500 (there aren't even 207,000 college students in NJ) college students, teachers/administrators and others. Services included information dissemination, prevention education, and substance abuse prevention related trainings for various groups. The project also developed and distributed substance abuse prevention-related media (print and video) and provided guidelines to successfully develop and promote activities as alternatives to social events that include alcohol

**Funding Amount and Source: \$497,514 (Federal)**

## **CENTER FOR CHILDREN AND FAMILIES -YOUTH AGING OUT OF FOSTER CARE**

In response to the overwhelming aging out population from the DYFS foster care system, Keys to Achieving Resilient Transitions (KART) aims to prevent and decrease substance abuse and to increase self-esteem, conflict-resolution skills and goal-setting skills among youth aging out of foster care.

**Service Information:** An 8 to 16 session Keys to Innervations (KIV) program is facilitated statewide at various residential aging-out residential locations across New Jersey to approximately 90 young adults.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$179,401 (Federal)**

## **COMMUNITY BASED PRIMARY PREVENTION GRANTS**

In response to the Unification Plan developed with each county, 48 contracts were awarded to provide science-based primary substance use prevention

programming in all 21 counties. The goal of each contract was to reduce the risk factors identified during the county planning process. Additionally, agencies provided intensive services in high-need communities to indicated populations such as at-risk youth, children of substance abusers and/or special populations, such as older adults.

**Service Information:** Prevention services were provided to 120,118 members of the targeted populations in all 21 counties. Services included prevention education, alternative activities, parenting classes, hotline services, and other activities. Performance indicators varied depending on individual contract objectives.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$6,298,070 (Federal)**

### **PRIMARY PREVENTION RESOURCE CENTERS**

A network of Local Resource Centers in the 21 counties provide information dissemination and prevention education to the general population of the specific county of location, including specific information on party drugs including heroin and methamphetamine. Additionally, a statewide conference is funded that outreaches to drug and alcohol professionals, law enforcement and the community-at-large.

**Service Information:** 49,906 New Jersey residents from all 21 New Jersey counties were served by county-based resource centers. Services provided included information dissemination, prevention education and other activities as needed. Over 18,000 pieces printed materials distributed.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$2,255,717 (Federal)**

### **STIGMA REDUCTION**

The many New Jersey residents with an alcohol or drug addiction, as well as those who are in recovery from this disease, routinely encounter stigma and discrimination. Existing policies, laws, practices and misplaced perceptions undermine acceptance of addiction as a treatable disease and health condition and restrict access to appropriate health care, employment, housing, and public benefits. NCADD- New Jersey provides extensive education and public information to help reduce the incidence of stigma related to alcoholism or drug addiction.

**Funding Amount: \$606,000 (Federal)**

## **WISE**

The WISE Program is a wellness and prevention program targeting older adults, which is designed to help them celebrate healthy aging, make healthy lifestyle choices and avoid substance abuse. It provides educational services to older adults on topics including nutrition and exercise, medication use, stress management, depression and substance abuse.

**Service Information:** WISE promotes health through education concerning high-risk behaviors in older adults. Since the program was launched in 1996, prevention programs presented by WISE Volunteers have reached over 40,000 individuals.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$202,000 (Federal)**

## **CHILDHOOD DRINKING**

This is a statewide initiative that includes a coalition of key stakeholders who focus on reducing underage and childhood drinking. All 21 New Jersey counties have developed local coalitions to promote awareness and support educational programs for children and their parents.

**Service Information:** Education activities for K-3 students were delivered to 2100 students and 1000 parents. Over 150 Town Hall meetings were held along with 21 county meetings to increase community awareness of the problem. Over 8000 people were in attendance.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$1,015,000 (Federal)**

## **STRENGTHENING FAMILIES**

This evidence-based parenting program is age specific focused and provides skill development for both parent and child with built in practice sessions to support competency in skill achievement. There are incentives for parents, children and agencies providing the program to retain maximum attendance.

**Service Information:** Fifty-four (54) community-based agencies have provided this program to 1,200 families statewide for SFY 2008. This skill development program is offered in all 21 counties to target populations such as DYFS involved families, court involved families, school-based families, and indicated high risk families.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$2,279,410 (Federal)**

**COMPULSIVE GAMBLING**

This contract provides statewide assessment, treatment, prevention and hotline services through the Council on Compulsive Gambling. The Council offers counseling services provided by certified treatment providers and offers a state of the art curriculum with videos for middle school and high school students and their parents. A statewide conference is held yearly to focus on special populations and gambling such as women, older adults and adolescents.

**Service Information:** The hotline received approximately 20,000 calls and the website generates 80,000 hits monthly. The Council delivered 50 presentations to schools, and 334 people received treatment.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$956,130 (State)**

**WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT**

New Jersey, not unlike other States across the country, is faced with an addictions treatment and prevention workforce crisis. Not only are there not enough counselors to staff treatment agencies, but nationally, there is an extremely high employee turnover rate of counselors. In addition, the formal education pipeline is too small to supply the projected national need for 5,000 (some sources cite 8,000) counselors to keep up with the demand. In order to ensure the quality, the effectiveness, and the availability of services, a training initiative was established in September 2006 to increase and enhance the addiction workforce in the State of New Jersey. The New Jersey Prevention Network (NJPN) was awarded the three year contract beginning in September 2006. Through this project, scholarships to attend Certified Alcohol and Drug Counselor (CADC) training for staff working in addiction treatment agencies were offered at 12 geographically diverse sites throughout New Jersey. Instructors are master's level clinicians and are approved to teach courses by the Addiction Professionals Certification Board of New Jersey (APCBNJ). In addition, scholarships were offered for other immersion and specialized trainings such as, the Certified Clinical Supervisor (CCS) and the Certified Prevention Specialist (CPS). NJPN also provided the mandated Ethical and Legal Standards recertification course for CADCs and Licensed Certified Alcohol and Drug Counselors (LCADCs).

**Service Information:** For the contract year 2006-2007, NJPN has provided 527 training classes for 824 unduplicated students. Thirty-seven students have

completed all 270 hours of the educational requirement for a CADC in New Jersey and a total of 15 students have become fully licensed.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$1,000,000 (Federal)**

## Division of Medical Assistance and Health Services

### **MANAGED CARE**

Mental health and substance abuse services, for alcohol and drug abuse, are obtained through regular Medicaid. The HMOs are only responsible for providing mental health and substance abuse services (except for partial care and partial hospital services) to enrollees who are clients of the Division of Developmental Disabilities. HMO enrollee handbooks describe how to get mental health and substance abuse services.

The State's contract with HMOs, that provide health care services to Medicaid and NJ Family Care beneficiaries, provides that the HMOs identify relevant community issues and the health education needs of their enrollees. This includes smoking cessation programs, which must have targeted outreach to adolescents and pregnant women, as well as prevention and treatment of alcohol and substance abuse.

Although mental health and substance abuse services are furnished through regular Medicaid, the HMOs have the responsibility for screening and identifying enrollees with substance abuse service needs and for providing them with referrals to appropriate providers.

Managed care enrollees who require special health care services, including substance abuse service, may request care management services through the HMO that will help coordinate care and link the enrollee to needed services.

**Service Information:** The HMOs offer counseling and pharmaceutical management for smoking cessation to all managed care enrollees. This may include participation in disease management programs or the *Quitting Matters* program. In addition, HMO participating providers are advised to counsel patients about smoking cessation. Some HMOs also produce educational materials about the hazards of second-hand smoke inhalation.

## Office for Prevention of Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities

### **PREVENTION OF FETAL ALCOHOL SPECTRUM DISORDERS AND OTHER PERINATAL ADDICTIONS EDUCATIONAL GRANTS PROGRAM**

**Service Information:** The Office for Prevention of Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities (OPMRDD) funds grants to educate the community about the effects of prenatal exposure to alcohol, drugs and nicotine upon developing fetuses. These funds are also used to support Pregnant Pause events in every county annually. Targeted educational programs focus on specific audiences, including high school students, pregnant women, and staff and clients of substance addiction treatment centers. An estimated 500,000 persons receive information about perinatal addictions annually through these grants.

**Funding Amount and Source: Grants totaling approximately \$200,000 are implemented annually. (State funds)**

### **FETAL ALCOHOL SPECTRUM DISORDERS TASK FORCE**

**Service Information:** The Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders (FASD) and other Perinatal Addictions Task Force, a committee of the Governor's Council on the Prevention of Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities, is an interagency body composed of representatives of state agencies, the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey, the Perinatal Addictions Program Coordinators, the FASD Diagnostic Centers, and community agencies. The Task Force is responsible for producing and disseminating a five year plan to educate and prevent perinatal addictions. The Task Force has implemented a three year media campaign, Be in the k**NO**w, to educate New Jersey citizens about not drinking, smoking or taking drugs during pregnancy. The Task Force has implemented an interactive website, [beintheknownj.org](http://beintheknownj.org), which provides information about perinatal addictions and direct links to treatment services and the FASD Diagnostic Centers.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$60,000 of state funds are used to support the FASD Task Force activities.**

## THE ADDICTION HOTLINE OF NEW JERSEY

The Addiction Hotline of New Jersey provides a statewide, 24-hour information and referral line disseminating information about prevention, intervention and support resources for New Jersey residents with concerns about the use of Alcohol and Other Drugs of Abuse. The hotline provides referral information to over 30,000 calls a year. The Hotline maintains an educational website capable of handling traffic of 14,000 site hits per year. Interpreters are provided for callers whose native language is not English. DAS plans in SFY 2009 to expand our Information and Referral Hotline services to one that can provide pre-treatment assessment, motivational counseling and case management/care coordination which can better engage and support individuals who reach out in search of help.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$195,264 (State and Federal)**

### Treatment

## Division of Addiction Services

### DRUG COURT

Drug Court is a cooperative initiative between the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) and DAS which commenced in 2002. This agreement allows the AOC to transfer treatment funding to DAS who then secures and implements a complete continuum of care for Drug Court offenders sentenced in New Jersey Superior Court. Drug Court participation is voluntary and statutorily controlled. Fifteen vicinage Drug Courts function within the existing Superior Court structure to provide treatment along the full continuum of care and diversion opportunities for offenders who otherwise may be incarcerated in State prisons for drug related offenses. Research shows there is only 14% recidivism after 5 years in this program.

**Service Information:** New Jersey Drug Court has 297 pre-paid long term (6 months) slotted beds with 9 residential treatment providers. Currently these beds are assigned to each of the 15 vicinages. Each bed costs \$24,353 per year. Drug Court also has over 120 Fee-for-Service providers in their network with modalities including short term residential, halfway house, medication assisted treatment, IOP, partial hospitalization and outpatient treatment. In SFY 2009, approximately \$24 million is dedicated for treatment through the Drug Court program as a jail diversion strategy.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$20,392,795 (State)**

### **MUTUAL AGREEMENT PROGRAM (MAP)**

In SFY 2008, DHS/DAS continued to oversee the Mutual Agreement Program (MAP), an Inmate/Parolee Rehabilitation Project implemented through a Memorandum of Agreement with the Department of Corrections (DOC), the State Parole Board (SPB) and the Division of Addiction Service (DAS). This funding is a combination of direct appropriations to DAS transferred from the DOC and SPB. These funds supported an initiative which funded a fee for service network which offered long term residential and halfway house treatment beds for parolees and long term residential for inmates pending parole. Additionally, the program funded six (6) specialized outpatient programs for parolees.

**Service Information:** MAP provided substance abuse treatment opportunities for state inmates under the supervision of DOC who are in need of drug and alcohol treatment and who are pending release to the community, as well as SPB parolees with drug and alcohol problems. Treatment services are delivered at licensed community-based alcohol and drug treatment programs.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$3,477,029 (State)**

### **THE JUVENILE JUSTICE TREATMENT INITIATIVE**

DAS, through a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) with the Juvenile Justice Commission (JJC), allotted funds to treat adolescents who had been committed to a state juvenile institution and adolescents placed on probation. This initiative allows for coordinated planning and joint funding of services to juvenile offenders. DAS funded 63 out of the 71 residential adolescent substance abuse treatment beds. The remaining eight (8) beds were supported by a transfer of funds from the JJC. Of the 63 beds funded by DAS, 53 were reserved for JJC referred offenders and 10 were designated as juvenile offender (non-reserved) beds, available for use by the JJC, courts or probation.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$2,044,550 (State)**

### **SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT AND REHABILITATION SERVICES**

DAS strives to ensure equitable client access to drug and alcohol treatment services and engagement in appropriate Levels of Care (LOC) as determined by the ASAM PPC-2R guidelines. Comprehensive substance abuse treatment services are provided statewide through contracts with licensed facilities.

**Service Information:** DAS' substance abuse treatment service continuum of care for adults and adolescents is structured according to four major phases of treatment: I. Inpatient Treatment, II. Outpatient Treatment, III. Pre-Treatment Recovery Support, and IV. Post Treatment Recovery Support. Many providers offer specialized programs for women, children and adolescents, which are consistent with the LOC classification but include additional services appropriate to these populations.

- I. DAS' inpatient treatment services include six levels of care of varying intensity
  - 1) Sub-Acute Detoxification (ASAM PPC-2R level III.7 D)
  - 2) Sub-Acute Enhanced Medically Managed Detoxification (ASAM PPC-2R level III.7 D), this level include the ability to treat the following:
    - a) individuals with co-occurring disorders
    - b) pregnant women
    - c) poly-addicted persons including those addicted to benzodiazepines
    - d) individuals who may or may not be on opiate replacement therapy
    - e) clients with non-life-threatening medical condition(s)
  - 3) Short-Term Residential (ASAM PPC-2R level III.7)
  - 4) Long-Term Residential Treatment (ASAM PPC-2R level III.5)
  - 5) Halfway House Services (ASAM PPC-2R Level III.1)
  - 6) Residentially Assisted Partial Care (ASAM PPC-2R Level III.1)
- II. DAS' outpatient treatment service includes six levels of care of varying intensity:
  - 1) Early Intervention (ASAM PPC-2R level 0.5)
  - 2) Outpatient (ASAM PPC-2R level I)
  - 3a) Intensive Outpatient (IOP) (ASAM PPC-2R level II.1)
  - 3b) Methadone Intensive Outpatient (MIOP) (ASAM PPC-2R level II.1)
  - 4) Day Treatment/Partial Hospitalization (ASAM PPC-2R level II.5)
  - 5) Ambulatory Detoxification (ASAM PPC-2R level II.D)
  - 6) Opioid Maintenance Therapy (OMT) (ASAM PPC-2R level I)
- III. Pre-treatment Recovery Support - See under Intervention section
- IV. Post-treatment Recovery Support is the coordination of personal, family, and community resources to achieve the best possible quality of life. It can range from Oxford Houses, which are peer-led group recovery homes, to low level contact such as quarterly telephone conversations to high level contact such as coaching, depending on support needed. Support for involvement of recovering persons in self-help groups such as Alcohol Anonymous and Narcotics Anonymous is also routinely provided as part of recovery planning, beginning in treatment and continuing upon discharge.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$44,736,091 (Federal and State)**

**Needle Exchange Treatment Initiative (NETI)**

Through funding legislated through the Bloodborne Disease Harm Reduction Act, DAS has developed the NETI. This initiative includes mobile medication units with corresponding outreach, office based services and case management, as well as supportive housing, sub-acute enhanced medically managed detoxification, vouchers for other treatment services, and an evaluation of the project.

DAS has expanded opioid maintenance treatment through the use of Mobile Medication Units. In SFY 2008, DAS purchased five mobile medication units. Via an RFP, the mobile units are being utilized by contracted agencies to provide methadone maintenance, suboxone detoxification, induction and maintenance and corresponding office based services six days per week to intravenous drug users. The mobile medication units prioritize the provision of pharmacological treatment to individuals in cities and towns that have no access and/or limited access to methadone and suboxone treatment.

The NETI includes a pilot housing program modeled on Housing First and). This supportive housing program will provide supportive housing services for 62 people (31 at each location) with substance abuse problems who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless , and includes rental subsidies and support services. Through an RFP process, 2 agencies were contracted in SFY 2008 to begin providing these services.

Ten sub-acute enhanced medically managed detoxification beds were developed via an RFP in SFY 2008. Two providers were awarded contracts to develop these beds for priority use of clients involved in the mobile medication units.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$ 5,179,540 (State)**

**GROUP RECOVERY HOME LOAN FUND**

Funding is provided to Oxford Houses to provide administrative and programmatic oversight of the statewide network of peer-led group recovery homes in New Jersey. This funding is provided only for the maintenance of the 73 existing homes in New Jersey. the 73 existing homes .

Oxford Houses are democratically run, self-supported, drug-free living environments for clients needing housing during or post-treatment. No direct treatment or clinical services are provided within these homes, however, all

individual members attend 12-Step meetings and may be encouraged to utilize outside professionals whenever such utilization is likely to enhance recovery from alcoholism.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$157,962 (Federal and State)**

## **COUNTY COMPREHENSIVE ALCOHOL AND DRUG ABUSE SERVICES**

The Alcohol Education, Rehabilitation and Enforcement Fund (AEREF) is a non-lapsing, revolving fund through which the twenty-one counties receive annual allocations to plan and deliver comprehensive addiction services based on county-identified need. These dedicated funds are annually disbursed to the counties by formula, with a twenty-five percent match requirement. The funds support county-wide needs assessment, planning, coordination and provision of addiction services for indigent adult and adolescent county residents. Addiction services include: education, prevention, treatment and rehabilitation services, and aftercare services.

Direct state appropriations supplement dedicated funds to the counties for expanded treatment and rehabilitation services, aftercare services, linkage services, and detoxification services.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$16, 428,344 (State)**

## **CHILD WELFARE/ADOLESCENT TREATMENT**

The Child Welfare Reform Plan Initiative provides a coordinated network of specialized substance abuse treatment services in licensed facilities targeted to adolescents with first priority to those under the supervision of the Division of Youth and Family Services (DYFS). Services include long-term residential treatment that provide a structured recovery environment, combined with professional clinical services designed to address addiction and living skill problems for adolescents with substance abuse diagnosis who require longer treatment stays to support and promote recovery. Thirty (30) beds are available for adolescents to receive these services. Intervention focuses on reintegrating into the greater community with emphasis on education and vocational development.

One hundred twenty eight (128) slots are available to adolescents needing variable levels of care in outpatient settings. In SFY 08 there was an expansion of Child Welfare (CW) adolescent (male/female) treatment services. Twenty-two (22) intensive outpatient slots were made available. In SFY 09, again was an

expansion of Child Welfare (CW) treatment services of 19 intensive outpatient slots for adolescents (male/female). These services include individual, group and family counseling and include access to support services. Joint case planning and case conferencing between the DYFS case worker and the treatment provider are an essential component to this initiative.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$2,781,147 (State)**

## **TREATMENT SERVICES FOR ADOLESCENTS**

The Division funds 214 long-term residential treatment beds, nine (9) short-term treatment beds and 31 partial care beds for adolescents in licensed facilities. Of these, 67 beds were reserved for adolescents under the jurisdiction of the Juvenile Justice Commission (JJC). Long-term residential treatment provides a highly structured recovery environment, combined with professional clinical services designed to address addiction and living skill problems for adolescents with substance abuse diagnosis who require longer treatment stays. Short-term residential services provide highly structured environment, combined with a commensurate level of professional services, designed to address specific addiction and living skills problems for youth who are deemed amenable to intervention through short-term treatment. Partial care treatment provides a broad range of clinically intensive treatment services in a structured environment for a minimum of 30 hours per week, during day or evening hours. Treatment includes substance abuse counseling, educational and community support services. Programs have ready access to psychiatric, medical and laboratory services.

An additional \$76,888 is dedicated to youth in long-term residential programs with co-occurring disorders.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$9,070,277 (Federal and State)**

## **PREGNANT WOMEN/WOMEN WITH DEPENDENT CHILDREN (PW/WDC) INITIATIVE**

This initiative provides a coordinated network of specialized substance abuse treatment services targeted to pregnant women and women with dependent children (PW/WDC). Services include methadone maintenance, residential, halfway house, and outpatient level of care services. Programs are required to provide gender specific services that address the needs of this population such as: primary medical care for women, referrals for prenatal care; primary pediatric care i.e., immunizations for their children; trauma informed and trauma specific substance abuse treatment using the "Seeking Safety"

program, and other therapeutic interventions for women to address issues of relationships, sexual and physical abuse and parenting; therapeutic interventions for children in custody of women in treatment which may, among other things, address their developmental needs, their issues of sexual and physical abuse, and neglect; case management, transportation and child care to ensure that women and their children have access to these services. Additional services include aftercare, linkages, assistance with housing, and recovery management.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$8,685,281 (Federal)**

### **CHILD WELFARE/WOMEN WITH CHILDREN INITIATIVE**

The Child Welfare/Women with Children Initiative provides substance abuse treatment services to women and children under the supervision of DYFS. Services include residential treatment (a minimum of six (6) months to include a woman with an average of two (2) children), halfway house, intensive outpatient and methadone intensive outpatient level of care treatment. First priority is given to referrals made by the Child Protection Substance Abuse Initiative (CPSAI) drug abuse counselor located in the local DYFS offices following the established protocol. Second priority is given to self-referrals ("walk-ins") or referrals made by various sources (Probation, court, other providers, etc.) of women who are under DYFS supervision. Third priority is given to eligible women with dependent children who are in need of treatment and not under DYFS supervision. All priorities include pregnant women. Treatment is family-centered and is both gender and trauma-specific using the "Seeking Safety" program. Substance abuse treatment and other therapeutic interventions are provided to address issues of domestic violence, sexual and physical abuse, relationships and parenting. These services are enhanced with case management, childcare, transportation, linkages, referrals to services in the community as well as recovery supports and management. DYFS keeps all cases that are participating in this initiative open for the duration of treatment, with the ultimate goal of family reunification.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$7,914,929 (State)**

### **CHILD WELFARE/FATHERS WITH CHILDREN INITIATIVE**

An expansion of the Child Welfare programs in 2008 included new services for fathers with children under the supervision of DYFS. Four licensed substance abuse treatment providers were awarded contracts to provide intensive outpatient level of care treatment and methadone intensive outpatient treatment. Referrals are made by the CPSAI drug counselor located in the DYFS

local offices following established protocol. Services are reflective of the specialized needs of fathers and their dependent children and include substance abuse treatment and other therapeutic interventions that are family-centered, individual, family and group counseling, flexible evening and weekend treatment services to accommodate work schedules, parenting classes, Strengthening Families Program, vocational and education services, therapeutic interventions for children in custody of fathers that can address developmental needs, sexual and physical abuse and neglect. These services are enhanced with case management, transportation, linkages, referral to services in the community as well as recovery supports and management. DYFS keeps all cases open for the duration of treatment with the ultimate goal of family reunification.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$ 773,656 (State)**

### **PREVENTION AND TREATMENT SERVICES FOR DEAF, HARD OF HEARING AND DISABLED INDIVIDUALS**

This funding provides for prevention, education, treatment, intervention, communication accessibility, and advocacy services for the population of individuals who are Deaf, hard of hearing, and disabled.

**Service Information:** Communication accessibility is coordinated to provide interpreters or Computer Assisted Real-Time Translation (CART) for individuals who are Deaf and hard of hearing seeking substance abuse treatment at any level of care. Funding is provided for assessment, case management, mobile counseling, outpatient treatment, housing placement and outreach via culturally Deaf staff for this population of individuals in need of substance abuse treatment. Also provided is funding for case management and outpatient substance abuse treatment services, focusing on recovery for individuals who may have physical and developmental disabilities, to include but not limited to traumatic brain injury, fetal alcohol syndrome, epilepsy, and other physical or developmental disabilities. Other funding currently goes to offer prevention and education regarding substance abuse risk factors, early intervention, advocacy and referral resources for disability service providers, substance abuse treatment agencies, consumers, and clients.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$655,241 (Federal and State)**

### **SOUTH JERSEY INITIATIVE (SJI)**

This initiative targets adolescents (ages 13-18) and young adults (ages 18-24) from eight (8) counties (Ocean, Atlantic, Burlington, Camden, Gloucester, Cape

May, Salem and Cumberland). It provides a continuum of care that includes methadone maintenance, detoxification, residential, halfway house, and outpatient treatment services.

**Service Information:** During SFY 2008, over 2,040 individuals (ages 13-24) were serviced by the initiative. Sixty-four percent (64%) of the funds were used for residential services for adolescents and young adults, thirty-six percent (36%) was used for outpatient services.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$3,618,423 (State)**

### **CO-OCCURRING SERVICES- JOINT INITIATIVES**

A variety of co-occurring substance abuse and mental health services are provided statewide through contracts by the Division of Addiction Services (DAS) and Division of Mental Health Services (DMHS).

1) The Detoxification Initiative is an initiative funded by DAS and DMHS for four (4) licensed residential sub acute detoxification facilities for 14 bed slots throughout the state to serve persons with co-occurring disorders referred through DMHS screening centers.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$522,776 from DAS, \$522,776 from DMHS (State)**

2) DAS funds co-occurring substance abuse treatment in four traditional Mental Health agencies.

University Behavioral Healthcare has a partial care program providing services to a population of individuals with co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$123,139 (State)**

Preferred Behavioral Healthcare of NJ employs a substance abuse Counselor to provide co-occurring services for individuals with co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders in the agency's partial care program.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$30,784 (State)**

Greater Trenton Behavioral Healthcare provides case management services for co-occurring clients with mental health and substance abuse disorders in Mercer County.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$92,350 (State)**

Care Plus NJ Inc. provides outpatient services to co-occurring mental health and substance abuse clients.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$87,007 (State)**

3) DMHS funds Maryville Alcoholism rehabilitation center to provide residential substance abuse treatment to clients referred from Ancora and Trenton Psychiatric Hospitals.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$190,125 (State)**  
**Also reported in DMHS section**

## **INTEGRATED CO-OCCURRING INITIATIVE AT DAS**

1) To advance the integration of mental health services into the drug abuse treatment programs. This initiative provides funding for the psychologist, the psychiatrist, and the advanced nurse practitioner.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$1,530,899 (State and Federal)**

2) Residential co-occurring treatment services are provided at Sunrise House, Daytop and New Hope to serve adolescents and young adults with mental health and substance abuse disorders.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$181,681 (State)**

## **HIV/AIDS SERVICES**

The Division funds for Early Intervention Services (EIS) and HIV Specialist positions at 19 substance abuse treatment facilities statewide. Services are available in areas of the state that have the greatest need for these services.

**Service Information:** In SFY 2008, HIV/AIDS services are available at 19 substance abuse treatment facilities throughout the state providing outpatient treatment to include on-site intensive medical care, counseling, case management, referral, and drug treatment services. Services for HIV disease at these sites

include pre- and post-test counseling, as well as the availability of HIV testing for all clients. Additional funding dedicated goes both toward the implementation of rapid HIV testing at the abovementioned 19 DAS-funded substance abuse treatment facilities and directly to the Public Health and Environmental Laboratories (PHEL) to ensure that continued HIV testing and other laboratory support services are provided to the participating HIV EIS clinics.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$2,338,977 (Federal)**

### **DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE (DUI) INITIATIVE**

New Jersey has set aside \$7.5 million to support the treatment of financially indigent residents of New Jersey who have been convicted of Driving under the Influence (DUI). These treatment funds, which cover the full range of the continuum of care throughout the state, became available in November 2005. Financially indigent drunk drivers can receive the appropriate level and duration of treatment warranted, thus reducing the incidence of recidivism and ultimately creating safer highways. There are 132 DAS licensed affiliated providers in the DUII network providing all levels of treatment services. From November 2005 through June 1, 2008 there were approximately 4,600 intoxicated drivers served under this initiative.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$7,125,00 (State)**

### **NEW JERSEY ACCESS INITIATIVE (NJAI)**

New Jersey was awarded a grant in response to the Access to Recovery voucher program opportunity, part of the President's faith based initiative. SFY 08 was the final full year of this program with services ending by August 1, 2008. The program provided outpatient, intensive outpatient, medication assisted treatment, co-occurring, medical and dental services as well as an array of recovery supports.

**Service Information:** 8,865 total clients received services over the four years of the program

**Funding Amount and Source: \$6,366,024 (Federal)**

## Division of Medical Assistance and Health Services

Medicaid reimburses for drug and alcohol treatment for both inpatient and outpatient hospital services and services provided at independent clinics, as well as other non-clinical, non-hospital services.

Within this report we expanded drug and alcoholism abuse diagnosis coverage to include secondary, as well as primary diagnoses. For this reason, the numbers of recipients and payments for their services have increased over the previous fiscal years' figures.

### **INDEPENDENT CLINIC SUBSTANCE ABUSE SERVICES**

The highest utilization of services was for outpatient hospital services.

**Service Information:** The population served was 17,085. It included three (3) groups: 1) children 21 and under (2,463); 2) adults 22-64 (14,505); and 3) adults 65 and over (117). 1,637 of these children were female; 826 were males. 8,607 of the adults in the 22-64 age grouping were females; 5,898 were males. In the 65 and over age group, 43 were females; 74 were males. The largest racial group in each of the three (3) population groups is African-American.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$32,392,811.74 (Federal and State)**

### **INPATIENT HOSPITAL ALCOHOL AND DRUG DEPENDENCE TREATMENT SERVICES**

Inpatient substance abuse services are combined both for alcohol and drug dependence.

**Service Information:** A total of 16,699 people were served. Of these, 5,334 were children 21 and under; 11,287 were adults 22-64; and 78 were adults 65 and over. The number of female children, 21 and under, who received services was 3,422 and the number of male children serviced was 1,912. Within the 22-64 age grouping, 7,527 females and 3,760 males received services. 34 females and 44 males received services in the 65 and over age group. The largest racial group in each of the three (3) population groups was Caucasian.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$10,352,120.27 (Federal and State)**

### **OUTPATIENT HOSPITAL ALCOHOL TREATMENT AND OUTPATIENT HOSPITAL DRUG TREATMENT**

This program offers outpatient hospital treatment services for alcohol and drug abuse. Data for these services are combined.

**Service Information:** A total population of 4,779 received services. Children, 21 and under, serviced, totaled 640. Within the adult age groups, 4,104 adults 22-64 and 35 adults 65 and over received services. 50% of the children serviced were female and 50% were male. 2,085 adult females and 2,019 adult males received the services within the 22-64 age grouping. Within the adult age group 65 and over, 9 females and 26 males received services. The largest racial group in each of the three (3) population groups follows: 1) Caucasian; 2) Caucasian; and 3) African-American, respectively.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$36,157,114.80 (Federal and State)**

## **NON-CLINICAL AND NON-HOSPITAL SERVICES**

This program includes but is not limited to: ambulance transportation, physician visits, and psychotherapy services.

**Service Information:** The number of people served was 27,323. Services were provided to 3,405 children ages 21 and under; 22,527 adults ages 22-64; and 1,391 adults ages 65 and over. 2,379 of the children who received services were female; 1,026 were male. Within the adult 22-64 age group, 12,127 recipients were female; 10,400 were male. 599 of the adults in the 65 and over group were female; 792 were male. The largest racial group in each of the three (3) populations serviced was 1) African-American; 2) Caucasian; and 3) Caucasian, respectively.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$16,662,382.99 (Federal and State)**

# Division of Mental Health Services

## **RESIDENTIAL ALCOHOL AND DRUG REHABILITATION**

The Division of Mental Health Services (DMHS) contracts with two (2) residential rehabilitation centers:

Turning Point in Verona is under contract to provide 20 beds to DMHS agencies for individuals with severe and persistent mental illness and substance use disorders. The program has moved from the former site in

Verona and are providing services to the DMHS population at St Clare's in Boonton until further notice.

Maryville in Williamstown provides beds for use by Ancora Psychiatric Hospital and Trenton Psychiatric Hospital to serve as a step down service for individuals in need of residential rehabilitation for alcohol and drugs.

**Service Information:** Both are 28-day alcohol and drug rehabilitation centers.

**Funding Amount and Source: Turning Point: \$1,335,239 State; Maryville: \$190,125 (State)**

## **PARTIAL CARE**

Partial care provides a highly structured program with an emphasis on life skills for individuals in the community with severe and persistent mental illness who need services at a level higher than outpatient treatment. Within all partial care programs are individuals who have co-occurring substance use disorders, but programs within this level of care differ in their dual disorders approach. Some partial care programs provide specialized tracks, some provide specialized groups and others are designed to specifically meet the needs of individuals with these co-occurring disorders. Partial care programs typically provide medication monitoring and education as part of their service.

**Funding Amount: Included within \$16.8 million state appropriation for partial care services and within the Medicaid fee-for-service reimbursements.**

## **NEW VIEWS TREATMENT PROGRAM**

New Views is a private non-profit agency, providing services to individuals under commitment to Greystone Park Psychiatric Hospital. The agency provides specific co-occurring disorders interventions. Services are provided both on wards, and at a central location. Length of stay in the program depends on clinical need.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$824,685 (State)**

## **SCREENING**

Screening is the point at which emergent care is provided in the mental health system. There is at least one (1) screening center in each county. Screening centers provide emergency assessment, crisis stabilization, referral and in some

cases mobile outreach to individuals with severe and persistent mental illness. An average screening episode is approximately eight (8) hours in duration. Not all screening centers have the capacity to hold individuals overnight for stabilization.

**Funding Amount: Included within the \$49.6 million state appropriation for screening/emergency services.**

## **TRAINING**

DMHS provides statewide training on co-occurring mental illness and substance use disorders directly from Central Office and through contracted agencies. Training is provided to agency staff and directly to consumers. All Central Office training sessions are approved by the Addiction Professionals Certification Board of New Jersey. Topics presented range from beginning clinical technique, topics for wellness, recovery and life management, advanced best practice models.

**Funding Amount: \$172,732 (State)**

## **DETOX PROJECT**

DMHS and DAS jointly fund 14 beds statewide to serve as a diversion to state hospital admission for individuals who present in screening centers with co-occurring mental illness and substance use disorders.

**Service Information:** Service utilization database maintained and updated by DAS

**Funding Amount: \$522,776 from DAS, \$522,776 from DMHS (State)**

**Note: Also reported in DAS section**

## **INPATIENT PSYCHIATRIC HOSPITALIZATION**

The mental health system has many resources throughout the state for inpatient treatment for individuals who have severe and persistent mental illness and are in need of a high level of service, highly structured programming and 24 hour supervision for stabilization. Within the system, inpatient treatment is provided in State and County Hospitals, Community Mental Health Centers and “free

standing” hospitals. Within all of the hospitals, there are individuals in treatment who also have co-occurring substance use disorders.

**Funding Amount: Included within the state and/or county appropriations and insurance fee payments for inpatient care.**

## **OUTPATIENT**

DMHS has a large network of agencies statewide that provides outpatient treatment to individuals with severe and persistent mental illness. Agencies that provide this level of care include Community Mental Health Centers, free-standing outpatient agencies, and satellite programs.

**Funding Amount: Included within the \$51.5 million state appropriation and insurance fee reimbursements for outpatient services.**

## **CASE MANAGEMENT**

DMHS provides case management both through specific agency contract and as one element of services that are offered in agency based treatment. Clinical case management consists of advocacy, referral, follow-up, and intervention both within the mental health system and across several different systems of care to meet identified needs. As with all DMHS services, this element of care has a primary target population of individuals with severe and persistent mental illness.

**Funding Amount: Included within the \$23.6 million state appropriation and the Medicaid fee reimbursements for case management services.**

# Division of Family Development

## **WORK FIRST NEW JERSEY SUBSTANCE ABUSE INITIATIVE (WFNJ/SAI)**

The Work First New Jersey Substance Abuse Initiative (WFNJ/SAI) was implemented in 1998 through collaboration among the Divisions of Family Development (DFD), Division of Addiction Services (DAS) and Division of Medical Assistance and Health Services (DMAHS). The SAI combines public health and managed care principles to provide substance abuse services for eligible Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) and General Assistance (GA)

clients. Consistent with the goals of WFNJ, the SAI uses an employment directed approach to address substance abuse as a barrier to work activities.

The SAI is operational statewide. It has two key components: (1) a managed care model of Assessment and Case Management services, and (2) prior authorization fee-for-service treatment offered by providers in the SAI Provider Network.

As part of an ongoing collaboration with the Department of Children and Family Division of Youth and Family Services, DFD has partially funded an expansion of the Child Protective Substance Abuse Initiative (CPSAI). Additionally, SAI implemented cross-systems Intensive Case Management for TANF and GA parents with active child welfare cases.

The statewide client flow totals for TANF and GA clients in FY 2008: (1) unduplicated (initial) referrals, completed assessments and treatment entries were 4,573, 4,160 and 2,811 respectively; and (2) duplicated numbers (e.g., volume of clients) for the same categories were 9,053, 6,911 and 5,107. The average episodes of care per client is approximately three (3), but the range is between one (1) and eight (8) episodes.

The Division of Family Development has partnered with researchers from The National Center of Addiction and Substance Abuse at Columbia University (CASA) to independently evaluate the SAI Intensive Case Management (ICM) model for TANF clients. The research evaluation will assess clients' employment and recovery outcomes along with the economic and health costs to state. It is anticipated that the findings will guide DHS and national policy on implementing cost-effective best practices which ensure fiscal and clinical integrity and help families/clients transition toward greater independence and self-sufficiency.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$6.3 million for the expanded CPSAI; \$8.0 million for SAI Care Coordination and Intensive Case Management services; \$23 million for SAI treatment services (Combined State and Federal Funding).**

# DEPARTMENT OF LAW AND PUBLIC SAFETY

## *PREVENTION INFORMATION*

### DIVISION OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE CONTROL:

#### **"DANGERS OF UNDERAGE DRINKING" BILLBOARD/CALENDAR INITIATIVE**

This Statewide initiative is designed to encourage middle school students and their parents to work together to create images and messages depicting the dangers of underage drinking, to be used on calendars and billboards Statewide.

**Funding Amount: \$25,000**

**Funding Source: Federal**

#### **"DANGERS OF UNDERAGE DRINKING" RADIO PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT**

In response to increasing concerns about alcohol use among middle school students and the critical role parents play in helping to combat underage drinking at this age, this initiative will educate both students and parents about the dangers of underage drinking. Specifically, middle school students throughout the State will be asked to create written 30 second radio public service announcements that "talk" directly to parents about the role they play in preventing underage alcohol use.

**Funding Amount: \$20,000**

**Funding Source: Federal**

#### **COPS IN SHOPS/UNDERCOVER OPERATIONS**

Cops in Shops is a Statewide initiative designed to combat underage drinking by bringing local undercover police officers and retail liquor establishments together to both prevent the illegal purchase of alcohol by underage individuals and to stop adults from purchasing alcohol for people under the legal age. With Undercover Operations, police officers working undercover as patrons in retail consumption establishments, conduct operations identifying underage purchasers as well as those who serve them.

**Funding Amount:\$146,000**

**Funding Source: Federal**

### **COLLEGE SUMMIT ON UNDERAGE DRINKING**

The main purpose of this program is to host an annual Statewide conference for representatives from New Jersey colleges and universities to discuss the pervasive problems related to underage drinking in the college environment and to develop strategies best suited to each college community. Most recently in the spring of 2008, the one-day conference focused on college and community collaboration in the prevention of underage drinking and how to sustain long-term involvement.

**Funding Amount:\$35,000**

**Funding Source: Federal**

### **LOCAL COMMUNITY-BASED EFFORT TO PREVENT UNDERAGE DRINKING**

The Local Community-Based Coalition to Prevent Underage Drinking program will seek to address the issue of underage drinking through a community effort involving parents, including PTA/PTO groups, youth, including SADD or other similar organizations, educators and community members, through the use of town hall meetings, parental programs and peer leadership groups.

**Funding Amount:\$65,000**

**Funding Source Federal**

### **LOLLANOBOOZA**

Lollanobooza provides college students with a chance to engage in alcohol-free activities and programs. This event provides a social outlet that does not support the consumption of alcohol, while reinforcing the positive messages given to students during their orientation week and throughout their college years, regarding underage drinking.

**Funding Amount:\$5,000**

**Funding Source: Federal**

## **FATAL VISION GOGGLES**

The Fatal Vision Goggles program is designed to inform young people about the dangers of alcohol and the effects on perception and body control. Specifically, Fatal Vision goggles give young people the opportunity to experience firsthand the potentially fatal consequences of alcohol impairment. These goggles serve as a critical tool for schools and substance abuse organizations to use when addressing the issues of underage drinking and driving.

**Funding Amount: \$26,000**

**Funding Source: Federal**

## **TELEVISION PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENTS**

The Division of Alcohol Beverage Control ran a 30-second Television Public Service Announcement (PSA) entitled, "Proms and Alcohol Don't Mix", during the 2008 prom season. The PSA was created by high school seniors through a contest that is designed to increase the awareness about the dangers of underage drinking. The spot ran on cable channels, such as MTV, BET and Comedy Central. In addition, the Division will run its, "Down the Shore" PSA during the 2009 summer months. The PSA was designed to inform young people of both the consequences and dangers of underage drinking and that underage drinking will not be tolerated in New Jersey. The 30-second TV announcement will run during shows that typically attract a younger viewing audience.

**Funding Amount: \$25,000**

**Funding Source: Federal**

## DIVISION OF STATE POLICE

**EMPLOYEE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (EAP)** The general purpose of the New Jersey State Police Employee Assistance Program is to help those individuals with persistent behavioral or personal problems that affect work performance. The program provides training, prevention, information, confidential professional assistance and subsequent referral services. The total budget for the EAP program is \$652,100. The amount below is the amount spent on Prevention Information. There is also 10% of the budget allocated for Intervention and Referral Information.

**Funding Amount: \$65,000**

**Funding Source: State**

### **YOUTH LEADERSHIP SAFETY PROGRAM**

The purpose of this program is to address the evolving issues of community oriented policing in our urban areas, schools and communities. The purpose of the Youth Leadership Safety program is a collaborative effort designed to offer an educational safety awareness curriculum in the classroom as a means to recognize and prevent natural and created pressures that may harm or influence our children.

The program delivers preventive measures to heighten those protective components with a specific emphasis on family, school and community bonding strategies. These strategies focus on the development of social competence, communication skills, respect, responsibilities, decision making, conflict resolution, a sense of purpose and selective positive alternatives. The lessons taught by the law enforcement officer extend and reinforce the instructional content on substance abuse and anti-social behavior prevention being taught by the regular classroom teacher. The use of sworn, street-experienced, trained law enforcement officers has proven to be a highly effective strategy in helping provide credible education for students in drug abuse, violence and gang prevention.

**Funding Amount: \$3,469,935**

**Funding Source: State**

## NEW JERSEY RACING COMMISSION

### **PREVENTION, EDUCATION & TREATMENT PROGRAMS FOR THE BENEFIT OF COMPULSIVE GAMBLING**

Beginning in FY 2004, the New Jersey Racing Commission began assessing the racing industry on an annual basis and forwarding funds to the Department of Health and Senior Services. These funds are used by that Department for prevention, education and treatment programs for compulsive gambling.

**Service Information:** Outcome measures include behavioral intentions, attitudes and knowledge.

**Funding Amount:**\$200,000

**Funding Source:** Dedicated (Assessed to Racing Industry)

### **RANDOM URINE TESTING**

The New Jersey Racing Commission administers a random urine test program for jockeys, grooms, drivers and racing officials. Samples are tested by laboratories staffed by State Police personnel for the presence of controlled dangerous substances. New Jersey racetrack and horse owners fund this program. This mandated program pays for the lab fees related to the services provided by the State Police on site. A specific evaluation and treatment program is required.

**Service Information:** Outcome measures include attitudes, reduced risk factors and increased protective factors.

**Funding Amount:**\$300,000

**Funding Source:** Dedicated (Assessed to Racing Industry)

### **RANDOM BREATHALYZER TESTING**

The New Jersey Racing Commission staff administers a random Breathalyzer test to race participant's= jockeys, grooms, drivers and racing officials. New Jersey racetrack owners fund this program. Participants in violation would be fined or have their Racing Commission license suspended.

**Service Information:** Outcome measures include attitudes, reduced risk factors and increased protective factors.

## DIVISION OF HIGHWAY AND TRAFFIC SAFETY

### DWI ENFORCEMENT PROGRAMS

The "Over the Limit, Under Arrest" crackdown was conducted on December 2, 2007 – January 2, 2008 and again from August 15 – September 1, 2008 to raise public awareness about the danger of impaired driving through increased enforcement and media activities. While the Division invited all 490 police agencies to participate in the initial campaign, 82 departments were awarded overtime grants. The remaining agencies were asked to support the crackdown with their own resources. In addition to the enforcement effort, the Division used earned media to deliver the message. A Statewide press release was issued to print and broadcast media and police department grantees were also asked to engage their local media in reporting the initiative. Both activities generated strong newspaper and radio coverage around the State. The crackdown resulted in 2,038 DWI arrests. Police agency participation was also strong with 333 (70%) taking part in the campaign. In addition, the participating police departments issued 12,316 and 4,407 speeding and seat belt summonses respectively. While the crackdown's focus was on impaired driving, motorists were also reminded of the State's commitment to proper restraint and observing posted speed limits.

The second "Over the Limit, Under Arrest" driving campaign was conducted from August 15 to September 1, 2008. The law enforcement community conducted high-visibility checkpoints and roving patrols during the campaign. Media events were conducted to raise awareness of the campaign. Highlights of the two-week campaign included participation by over 400 police agencies and over 1,600 DWI arrests were made.

## **TRAINING**

The Alcohol/Drug Test Unit (ADTU) coordinators continued to train new breathalyzer operators at five-day Breathalyzer Operator Courses in 2008. There are currently over 10,000 certified breathalyzer operators in the State. The ADTU coordinators re-certified breathalyzer operators, conducting one-day re-certification classes. ADTU coordinators also trained police officers in DWI identification, apprehension, processing and prosecution at the Standardized Field Sobriety classes. Additionally, the ADTU re-certified officers at one-day Standardized Field Sobriety Test refresher courses.

The ADTU coordinated the Drug Evaluation Classification/Drug Recognition Expert training program. This training enabled police officers to classify operators of motor vehicles as being under the influence of one or more of seven categories of drugs other than alcohol.

## **COLLEGE/HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAMS**

The College of New Jersey hosted its 7th Statewide Peer Institute in 2008. The event serves to train peer educators and leaders from New Jersey colleges and the tri-state area to become peer educators on their respective campuses. Programs were also developed with the campus police force and Ewing Township Police Department to address alcohol and other drug related issues. Police from both agencies worked collaboratively to patrol off-campus housing areas and popular student gathering spots.

Stockton College sponsored alcohol/drug education workshops on campus emphasizing risks associated with alcohol/drug abuse and driving. In addition, personnel from local taverns and restaurants were trained on how to prevent drunk driving by student customers. The prevention program included an intensive three-hour training session leading to certification from Stockton College and regular communication with local restaurants and taverns to offer confidential counseling programs to students that are experiencing problems with drinking and driving.

Funds were provided to New Jersey City University to address the link between substance abuse, irresponsible behavior and highway safety among university and high school students in the Jersey City area. The program focused on strengthening the relationship between university and inner city high school students through interactive role modeling

exercises and a peer education training program. A highway safety outreach program on the New Jersey City University campus, consisting of presentations, information tables with resources on substance abuse and highway safety and a peer mentoring high school program was developed. Peer educators were used to reach student groups in elementary, middle and senior high schools as well as to conduct community outreach with local social service agencies.

The Rutgers Comprehensive Alcohol and Traffic Education and Enforcement Program focused on helping to reduce the number of people killed or seriously injured in crashes caused by impaired drivers. The program combined community prevention efforts in law enforcement with innovative educational and community outreach activities on campus. A series of supplemental enforcement programs were scheduled, which included DWI stops and the comprehensive Check for 21 Program. The education component provided training resources for police officers to disseminate materials throughout the Rutgers community. Rutgers police officers also received training on alcohol and drug abuse prevention training techniques. Police officers served as mentors and conducted drug and alcohol abuse education programs for the campus population.

### **DRUNK DRIVING ENFORCEMENT FUND**

The Drunk Driving Enforcement Fund establishes a \$100.00 surcharge on each conviction for drunk driving. Monies in this fund are distributed to municipalities and to State, county and interstate law enforcement agencies. The purpose is to increase enforcement of the laws pertaining to drinking and driving. Each law enforcement agency whose officers make arrests leading to DWI convictions and imposition of the surcharge is entitled to grants representing its proportionate contribution to the fund.

Municipalities, the Division of State Police, interstate law enforcement agencies and county law enforcement agencies apply to the Division to use Drunk Driving Enforcement Fund monies for additional DWI enforcement patrols and any appropriate measures pertaining to other DWI activities as approved by the Director of the Division of Highway Traffic Safety.

A total of \$3.6 million was made available to law enforcement agencies during State Fiscal Year 2008 (July 1, 2007 B June 30, 2008) in an effort to reduce alcohol-related fatalities and crashes.

## JUVENILE JUSTICE COMMISSION

### FATAL VISION GOGGLES

The Juvenile Justice Commission participates in the "Enforcing the Underage Drinking Laws Grant Program" through the use of Fatal Vision Goggles. This program increases the knowledge and understanding of youth both in correctional and non-correctional settings, about the laws, consequences and experience of being under the influence of alcohol using simulator goggles and supportive classroom materials.

## DIVISION OF STATE POLICE

### **EMPLOYEE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (EAP)**

The general purpose of the New Jersey State Police Employee Assistance Program is to help those individuals with persistent behavioral or personal problems that affect work performance. The program provides training, prevention, information, confidential professional assistance and subsequent referral services. The total budget for the EAP program is \$652,100. The amount below is the amount spent on Intervention and Referral Information.

### NEW JERSEY RACING COMMISSION

#### **ON-SITE ALCOHOL AND OTHER DRUG COUNSELING**

The Backstretch Benevolent Fund provides funding, on occasion, to support salaries of an on-site (racetrack) alcohol and other drug counselor for an expanded group of backstretch personnel. The funding amount varies.

### DIVISION OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE

#### **RESIDENTIAL SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT (RSAT) FOR STATE PRISONERS GRANT PROGRAM – NO RETURN I**

The Department of Corrections utilizes these funds to support a 160 bed therapeutic community treatment program located at the Garden State Youth Correctional Facility. This program is designed to address the treatment needs of the State's youthful offender.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$75,377 (Federal), \$25,126 (State)**

#### **RESIDENTIAL SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT (RSAT) - CUMBERLAND COUNTY LOCAL JAIL-BASED TREATMENT PROGRAM**

The Cumberland County Alcohol and Drug Abuse Services will implement a jail-based RSAT program for inmates housed within the Cumberland County Department of Corrections. There will be four 12 week cycles providing substance abuse treatment to approximately 96 inmates per year. The program will provide alcohol and drug related education; relapse prevention sessions; group therapy and other services.

**Funding Amount and Source: \$43,703 (Federal), \$14,568 (County)**

## JUVENILE JUSTICE COMMISSION

### JUVENILE ACCOUNTABILITY BLOCK GRANT (JABG)

The purpose of the JAIBG Program is to provide states and units of local government with funds to develop programs to promote greater accountability in the juvenile justice system. Funds are available for 11 program areas, one of which is substance abuse.

### COMPREHENSIVE SUBSTANCE ABUSE ASSESSMENTS

Comprehensive substance abuse assessments are conducted on youth entering the Juvenile Justice Commission. The Commission has contracted with the Mercer Council on Alcohol and Drug Addiction for the services of two Certified Alcohol and Drug Counselors. Information compiled through the use of customized assessments is correlated with the American Society of Addiction Medicine=s Adolescent Patient Placement Criteria (ASAM-PPC-2R) for use in determining level of care.

### ALPHA META

The JJC Residential Substance Abuse Program at New Jersey Training School for Boys, Jamesburg (NJTSB) provides treatment, placement, aftercare referral and evaluation to participants of this 52 bed, residential Therapeutic Community. An administrator coordinates all aspects of substance abuse treatment. Substance abuse counselors provide assessment, case management, counseling, aftercare referral and follow up. A substance abuse program liaison interfaces with NJTSB classification to ensure proper referrals to the Substance Abuse Program, coordinates transfers to programs in the community and provides follow up case management for all juveniles placed in community programs and aftercare services. Drug testing is done two times per month on a random basis and additional testing for cause is done in order to maintain a drug free environment.

## **DEVELOPING OPPORTUNITIES AND VALUES THROUGH EDUCATION AND SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT (D.O.V.E.S)**

This JJC Residential Substance Abuse Program for Females, located in Valentine Hall, provides treatment, placement, aftercare referral and evaluation to participants of this 17-bed, residential Therapeutic Community. (Two beds are designated for relapse intervention.) And administrator coordinates all aspects of substance abuse treatment. Substance abuse counselors provide assessment, case management, counseling, aftercare referral and follow up. Gender specificity is paramount. Participants are also provided the opportunity to learn various skills to assist with job searches as well as health related issues such as first aid, Planned Parenthood and parenting skills.

## **NJ DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND SENIOR SERVICES-CONTRACTED BEDS**

Through a memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between the Department of Health and the Juvenile Justice Commission (JJC), substance abuse rehabilitation services are provided by the Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS), Division of Addiction Services, to juvenile substance abusers under the custody and care of the Commission. The Commission has the use of 61 beds and reimburses the DHSS for eight beds via the MOA. JJC also has access to 793 treatment bed days for young adults at the Discovery House Program. The following programs utilize the DHSS= services: Integrity in Newark, Integrity in Secaucus, and New Hope in Marlborough, New Hope in Secaucus, and Newark Renaissance B Treatment and Discovery House.

## **JJC RESIDENTIAL COMMUNITY HOME (RCH): CAMPUS RCH**

Campus RCH, located in Camden County, is the Commission=s original substance abuse treatment program which serves up to 40 male residents. It utilizes the principles of cognitive-behavioral and motivational therapies, supported by a customized social learning curriculum within a Therapeutic Community milieu.

**Funding Amount:** \$1,000,000

**Funding Source:** State

**JJC RESIDENTIAL COMMUNITY HOME (RCH): OCEAN RCH**

Ocean RCH, located in Ocean County serves up to 40 male residents. It utilizes the principles of cognitive-behavioral and motivational therapies, supported by a customized social learning curriculum within a Therapeutic Community milieu.

**Funding Amount:** \$900,000

# DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

**Department/Agency Mission Statement:** With a commitment to the highest standard of customer service, we will ensure the opportunity for employment at fair wages in a safe environment; enhance the quality of the State's labor force and labor market activities; stimulate economic growth; promote labor management harmony; and administer income support services to unemployed or disabled workers.

## Prevention Information

### Labor Relations and Human Resources

#### **EMPLOYER HUMAN RESOURCES SUPPORT SERVICES**

From January through July, the HR Support unit, with expert trainers from Partnership for a Drug-Free New Jersey, conducted "Substance Abuse in the Workplace" seminars for employers in New Jersey to assist in the development of sound and legal policies that prevent, identify and properly deal with substance abuse among employees and job applicants. The unit also provided confidential assistance to individual employers to help them deal effectively with their respective workplace substance-abuse issues.

**Service Information:** This program was open to employers of New Jersey. The HR Support Services group was not involved in gathering any type of data on the companies' employees or the intervention and assistance efforts on the companies' part. The unit only provided educational and informative seminars and individual assistance to help employers deal effectively with their respective workplace substance-abuse issues.

**Funding Amount:** Funding for this program was part of the Division's operations.

## Intervention & Referral Information

### Workforce New Jersey

#### **WORKFORCE NEW JERSEY**

There is a partnership between One-Stop Programs and Services, Work First, Department of Labor and Workforce Development (LWD) and the Substance Abuse Initiative (SAI) whereby referrals are made to the SAI by LWD counselors and interviewers. During outpatient substance abuse treatment or upon completion of inpatient treatment, the Work First NJ registrant is referred to the LWD for job placement and other employability development services such as job seeking skills training, work experience, etc.

**Service Information:** The target population for this ongoing program is Work First NJ participants.

**Funding Amount:** Funding for this program is part of the Division's operations.

## Division of Vocational Rehabilitation Services

### VOCATIONAL REHABILITATION SERVICES

Vocational Rehabilitation Services is a statewide program that provides counseling, case management and individualized vocational rehabilitative services to individuals with disabilities, some of whom are substance abusers, to enable them to obtain and maintain employment. Services provided also include appropriate referrals to other agencies.

**Service Information:** This program serves individuals whose substance abuse prevents them from holding a job, and who can benefit from intervention. In Fiscal Year 2008, which ended on September 30, 2008, the total number of participants served was 1,292. In Fiscal Year 2007, the number of participants served was 2,072.

**Funding Amount:** Funding for this program is part of the Division's operations.

## Work/Life and Employee Assistance Programs

### WORK/LIFE AND EMPLOYEE ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

The Department's Employee Assistance Program (EAP) provides confidential employee assistance services to LWD employees with a variety of personal issues and concerns including drug and/or alcohol abuse, compulsive gambling and/or a family member's substance abuse. Services provided by the EAP include problem identification and assessment, referral and follow-up services. The program also provides supervisory training and consults with management on ATOD-related situations. EA services have been shown to decrease absenteeism, workers' compensation claims, grievances and workplace injuries and increase productivity.

**Service Information:** This program serves employees and management of the Department of Labor and Workforce Development.

**Funding Amount:** Funding for this program is part of the Department's administrative operations.

## DEPARTMENT OF MILITARY AND VETERANS' AFFAIRS

**Department Mission Statement:** The New Jersey Department of Military and Veterans Affairs' mission is to provide trained and ready forces prepared for rapid response to a wide range of civil and military operations, while providing exemplary services to the citizens and veterans of New Jersey.

## New Jersey National Guard

### **RED RIBBON CAMPAIGN**

The National Guard is actively involved in the Aviation Role Model Program, an initiative in which Army National Guard pilots on drug free life style, education and physical education.

**Service Information:** The New Jersey National Guard, DEA and the New Jersey Prevention Network distributed an estimated 24,000 red ribbons to schools, law enforcement agencies and community-based organizations with the goal of bringing awareness of the current drug problem to the forefront. This program served 3,776 students in grades 5-12 located in Sussex and Union counties. The program is measured by the number of information brochures, red ribbons, videos and CD ROMs distributed, as well as the number of students that were reached through drug awareness presentations.

**Funding Amount: 60,500**

**Funding Source: Federal**

### **YOUTH CAMPS – NJ NATIONAL GUARD – COUNTERDRUG TASK FORCE**

The New Jersey National Guard and D.A.R.E. New Jersey, as well as other local law enforcement agencies, reduce risk factors by rewarding youth that have repeatedly shown an adherence to a drug free lifestyle. The selection criteria is rigid, but students that are recommended and selected are encouraged to continue their healthy life choices.

**Service Information:** This program served 98 children in grades 5 and 6 as well as 15 children in grades 7 and 8. Both male and female students were equally represented in grades 5 and 6. There were more males than females in the older grades. In grades 5 and 6, all 21 counties were represented. In grades 7 and 8, Essex, Hudson, Monmouth,

Ocean, Passaic and Sussex counties were represented. This program is an alternative activity. The program is measured by the number of participants.

**Funding Amount: 50,000**

**Funding Source: Federal**

### **DRUG AWARENESS EDUCATION**

The New Jersey National Guard provides drug awareness education in an attempt to develop students' individually held values and knowledge about drugs and society. The program is designed to demonstrate how our personal values and the choices we make impact drug use.

**Service Information:** Three thousand five hundred sixty six students in grades 5-12 from Bergen, Burlington, Camden, Essex, Hudson, Middlesex, Ocean, Passaic, Sussex and Union counties participated in this program. The program is measured by the number of students reached and schools visited throughout New Jersey.

**Funding Amount: 140,000**

**Funding Source: Federal**

### **STAY ON TRACK**

The New Jersey National Guard provides the Stay on Track program to Middle School students, their teachers, and their families. Stay on Track primary focus is to provide a curriculum of materials and supplemental products to reduce future substance abuse by reinforcing the drug-free commitment of America's youth through Cognitive Development, Social Skills Development, and Emotional Development.

**Service Information:** The New Jersey National Guard will implement the Stay on Track in Burlington and Sussex counties, two of the twenty one counties it's first year of inception. The program will serve 600 children in grades 6<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup>, and 8<sup>th</sup> through 12/45-minute lessons in school classrooms, after-school settings and other school and youth-organization settings. Stay on Track contributes directly to Middle Level National Learning Standards for students in Health, Life Sciences and Language Arts. The program uses instruction and assessment that enhance optimal physical, mental, social, and emotional development of students necessary for lifelong health and learning.

**Funding Amount: 150,000**

# DEPARTMENT OF PERSONNEL

## Employee Advisory Services

Established in 1973, the Employee Advisory Service (EAS) is one of the longest-running government Employee Assistance Programs (EAP) in the nation with more than three decades of experience. Through contracts, it provides employee assistance services to all but one State Department of the Executive Branch; 13 State Commissions or Boards; the New Jersey Judiciary; 5 New Jersey Colleges or Universities; 12 Municipal and County Agencies; and two Non-Profit Agencies. This is approximately 75,000 employees who are located throughout the state.

The Employee Advisory Service is a Division of the New Jersey Department of Personnel. The statutory authorization for EAS (NJSA 11A: 6-26(b)) was enacted on September 25, 1986. Counseling and referral services are available to employees and employees' immediate families regarding difficulties which affect the employee's job performance and/or overall well-being. EAS uses the standard employee assistance program model of interview, assess and referral which incorporates components of prevention, intervention and assisting into treatment services. As part of its EAP services to agencies, EAS oversees and approves all State Department's Workplace Violence Plans and provides technical and policy assistance on these matters. In addition, EAS counselors assess and recommend appropriate clinical or remedial action regarding individual workplace violence incidents.

The Employee Advisory Service is proactive in assisting the State Health Benefits Program (SHBP) with the selection of medical insurance providers. EAS evaluates the insurance providers on their performance of delivering mental health services to government employees. EAS works closely with all individual medical providers to ensure that clients obtain the optimal benefits allowed under the plan.

EAS is also the project coordinator of the state contract for drug and alcohol testing for employees who are required to maintain a Commercial Driver's License. Any employee that has tested positively for drugs or alcohol must be seen by EAS for an assessment/evaluation. Once treatment is provided, EAS contacts the employer to

have the employee re-tested to return to work. EAS is able to provide educational seminars on substance abuse and addiction related to Federal CDL regulations.

The main office of EAS is currently located at 200 Woolverton Street, Trenton, New Jersey. Four full-time counselors and several counselor-affiliates (screened, hired and paid by EAS) provide services on a statewide basis.

The Employee Advisory Service maintains an active client base of approximately 2,400 employees and holds over 4,200 individual and group sessions annually.

**Funding is provided by direct State Appropriations and Revenues Received.**

## HISTORY OF COMMUNITY ACTION

Community Action was the cornerstone of the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964, which was passed as part of President Lyndon B. Johnson's "War on Poverty" embodying the radical idea that the poor know best what their problems are and how best to allocate resources to correct them. Originally, Community Action Agencies (CAAs) were given "local initiative" funds to support locally designed and administered programs through the federal Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO) to combat poverty in their communities. These included Head Start, Family Planning, Community Health Centers, Legal Services, VISTA, Foster Grandparents, Economic Development, Neighborhood Centers, Summer Youth Programs, Adult Basic Education, Senior Centers, Congregate Meal Preparation and many others.

In 1974, under President Gerald Ford, the Community Services amendments were passed the OEO was dismantled and replaced with the Community Services Administration (CSA).

In 1981, the Economic Opportunity Act was rescinded and the CSA was abolished, under the Reagan Administration. In its place, came the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG), which delegated responsibility for the administration of CAAs to the states.

### **GOALS AND OBJECTIVES**

The CSBG program provides assistance to States and local communities, working through a network of CAAs to alleviate the causes and conditions of poverty in communities, the revitalization of low-income communities, and the empowerment of low-income families and individuals to become fully self-sufficient. CSBG-funded programs create, coordinate, and deliver a broad array of programs and services to low-income individuals. Agencies receiving funds under the CSBG program are required to provide services and activities addressing employment, education, better use of available income, housing, nutrition, emergency services and/or health.

### **STATE ADMINISTRATIVE AGENCY**

The New Jersey Department of Community Affairs (DCA) is designated to administer the Community Services Block Grant under the provisions of Public Law 97-35, Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1981 (OBRA); Public Law 98-668, Human Services Re-authorization Act of 1986; July 6, 1982, Federal Register, "Block Grant Programs: Final Rules;" October 13, 1987, Federal Register, amendment to the "Block Grant Programs: Final Rules;" Public Law 101-501, Augustus F. Hawkins Human Services Re-authorization

Act of 1990; P. L. 103-252, Human Services Amendments of 1994 and the Poverty Income Guidelines as required under Section 673(2) of the Act. The DCA funds twenty-six agencies that have successfully administered a wide variety of community programs.

The CSBG program will provide a range of services and activities having a measurable and potentially major impact on the causes of poverty in New Jersey. The activities will be directed toward assisting low-income participants and families. A common theme among the local service providers is the active participation of the low-income community, in tandem with public officials and leaders of the private sector, in the design and implementation of programs. The mission of the State Office of Community Action is to work with the Community Action network of New Jersey to promote family self-sufficiency and healthy communities for low-income people residing in the state. Through the use of Results Oriented Management and Accountability (ROMA) (*a tool that manages results and measures success*) outcomes the State will be able to measure the impact of CSBG programs and how they impact the low-income population.

### **NEW JERSEY CSBG GOALS AND OBJECTIVES**

The DCA will utilize funds appropriated for the CSBG program to provide for the implementation of the following goals and objectives which address the overall CSBG purpose and which meet the requirements of Section 672 of the CSBG Act. Following each objective are measurable methodologies that outline the specific activities to be undertaken by staff to accomplish the stated objectives.

#### **Goal 1: Self Sufficiency**

Provide direction and services that increase the number of individuals who become Self-sufficient

**Objective:** Increase the resource base of programs designed to eliminate poverty therefore increasing the quality and quantity of programs targeting underserved families and individuals.

#### **Methods:**

- Seek and identify additional funding sources that will complement services provided under the CSBG program
- Fund programs which complement the services provided by CSBG eligible entities
- Utilize ROMA and standardized Logic Models to determine benchmarks of client/family self sufficiency

## **Goal 2: Improve Community Conditions**

Facilitate improvement of the conditions which low-income people live

**Objective:** Increase the resource base for development of projects designed to improve communities and neighborhoods therefore enhancing the quality of living conditions for underserved families and individuals.

### **Methods:**

- Fund programs that seek to fill identified gaps in service delivery
- Fund programs which complement the services provided by CSBG eligible entities
- Fund projects designed to address identified community needs
- Utilize ROMA standardized Logic Models to determine the impact of CSBG programs on communities and neighborhoods

## **Goal 3: Collaboration**

Provide direction and resources that increase collaboration among other community based providers, state agencies, local and county governments.

**Objective 1:** Respond to local and statewide needs and conditions through the strengthening of communities' ability to coordinate resources and activities designed to eliminate poverty.

### **Methods:**

- Coordinate a minimum of four meetings annually between the New Jersey Community Action Association and CSBG Staff, allowing time to network, share ideas, and collaborate on similar or complementary projects
- Collaborate with other statewide and local initiatives that share the vision of eliminating poverty by participating in forums, attending relevant meetings, and sharing information on an on-going basis, to improve linkages to service providers on the state and local levels
- Staff will develop feasible mechanisms for sharing information gleaned from participation in statewide and local forums with CAP agencies and other State sponsored programs on a regular basis
- Identify and disseminate information regarding funding opportunities to CAP agencies and other community partners, as appropriate

**Objective 2:** Ensure that CAP agencies are complementary of other community partners in offering a range of comprehensive services for low-income families and individuals, in an attempt to create measurable impacts on the causes of poverty in the community leading to self-sufficiency for underserved families.

**Methods:**

- Inventory and assess social service programs provided within the State through the development and continued maintenance of a comprehensive uniform database
- Fund programs that seek to fill identified gaps in service delivery

**Objective 3:** To increase the participation of community members in an effort to empower residents to respond to the unique problems and needs within their communities.

**Methods:**

- Assess the needs of targeted neighborhoods and low-income families to identify gaps in services
- Collaborate with interested municipalities to develop comprehensive strategic plans designed to address identified needs
- Fund projects designed to address identified needs
- Replicate, as appropriate, programs that have demonstrated effectiveness. The State will use the joint meetings between the Office of Community Action and the New Jersey Community Action network to showcase “Best Practice” models governing programs, service delivery, and the effective/cost efficient administration of the CSBG grant

**Goal 4: Data Collection and Analysis**

Strengthen the organizations' ability to collect and analyze data and to use that information for the purposes of strengthening and improving programs and achieving measurable outcomes.

**Objective 1:** Implement the 12 National Indicators that require CSBG funded Community Action Agencies to report on outcomes that occur as a result of services provided. Standardized Logic Models have been developed to collect data on a uniform basis so reporting accurately reflects program delivery and reporting on CSBG funded activities and programs using CSBG leveraged funds. Software has been disseminated to Community Action Agencies so that data collection is compiled uniformly, thus

producing reports and data that better reflect the conditions of poverty (and its' amelioration) in the state.

**Methods:**

- Implement the 12 National Indicators through the use of standardized Logic Models and ROMA
- Provide agencies with training necessary to report on the 12 National Indicators
- Provide technical assistance on outcomes-based reporting

**Objective 2:** Distribute annual outcomes data to interested parties for the purposes of strengthening and improving programs.

**Methods:**

- Require Community Action Agencies to submit quarterly reports utilizing the 12 National Indicators which are compiled for the annual report. Prepare an Annual Report on the CSBG program and distribute to interested parties

**Goal 5: Needs Assessment/Capacity Building**

Increase, develop, and strengthen programs and services that address the problems identified in the communities' needs assessments.

**Objective:** Develop and implement innovative and effective community-based strategies attacking the causes and effects of poverty by requiring agency needs assessments as an instrument to determine programs and services.

**Methods:**

- Assess the needs of targeted neighborhoods to identify gaps in services
- Collaborate with interested municipalities to develop comprehensive strategic plans designed to address identified needs
- Fund projects designed to address identified needs
- Replicate, as appropriate, programs that have demonstrated effectiveness

**POVERTY GUIDELINES**

Section 673(2) requires the use of the poverty guidelines as an eligibility criterion for the CSBG program. Therefore, client eligibility for those portions of programs and services funded under CSBG contracts are to be determined utilizing as a maximum 125% of the Poverty Income Guidelines. The poverty income guidelines are issued each year in the Federal Register by the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). The guidelines are a simplification of the poverty thresholds used for administrative purposes.

## **A Perspective Of The Municipal Alliance Program**

To prepare for the upcoming 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Governor's Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse (GCADA), the Planning Committee initiated this paper as a way of detailing the establishment and development of the Municipal Alliance Program. The paper will especially focus on the legislative intent involved in the creation of the Alliance Program, the collaborative governance process which links state, county and municipal governments, and incorporating evidence based prevention science into the Alliance Program while maintaining its culture of volunteerism.

### **Historical Overview**

The renowned anthropologist Margaret Mead once said "A small group of thoughtful people could change the world. Indeed, it is the only thing that ever has." That sentiment captures the underlying and fundamental premise responsible for the establishment of the Municipal Alliances.

On March 27, 1989, an act establishing the Governor's Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse was approved by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey (PL 1989, Chapter 51). The legislature found and declared that the disease of alcoholism and drug abuse were major health problems facing the residents of our great state and that an independent coordinating, planning, research and review body be established to focus on these problems. In addition, an Alliance to prevent alcoholism and drug abuse was formed to unite the communities of New Jersey in a coordinated and comprehensive effort utilizing county, municipal and volunteer resources to address not only the symptoms but the root causes of alcoholism and drug abuse.

Nearly two decades later, the Governor's Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse has formed 403 Alliances with 527 participating municipalities throughout the 21 counties, which provide over 3,700 prevention programs and activities. Using strategies established by the Center for Substance Abuse Prevention the allocations statewide are categorized as follows: 56.2% in Education programs; 22.7% in Alternatives; 11.5% in Communication; 5.5% in Collaboration; 3.6% in Early Intervention; .3% in Policy; and .2% in Enforcement.

The Municipal Alliance Program has earned national awards from Parents' Resource Institute for Drug Education, Inc. (PRIDE) and Community Anti-Drug Coalitions of America (CADCA), for being an outstanding state network of community based prevention efforts. The Office of National Drug Control Policy recognized the Governor's Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse and the Municipal Alliance Program as once of "America's best kept secrets".

New Jersey is the only state to have maintained a sustained volunteer prevention effort. Over 7,000 volunteers dedicate their time, energy and commitment to the largest anti-substance abuse community coalition effort in the country. Municipal Alliance programs have involved more than \_\_\_\_\_ participants and reached more than \_\_\_\_\_ residents in community education efforts.

Funding for the Municipal Alliance Program is provided by Drug Enforcement Demand Reduction (DEDR) fines. These fines are collected from persons convicted of drug related offenses. The Legislature intended the funds be returned to New Jersey's communities to help develop substance abuse prevention activities.

### **Grassroots and Collaborative Governance**

Successful prevention efforts require both local and broad-based support. Support must be local because the community is best situated to determine its needs and how to help its own citizens. It must be broad-based because the problems communities face are diverse and the resources needed to face them are great. Municipally based Alliances change the social norms of their communities. Monumental success was evidenced throughout the 1990s when Municipal Alliances got local ordinances adopted to curb tobacco use long before there was state law. In the last few years, Municipal Alliances are tackling the critical issue of underage drinking in much the same way.

Collaborative governance is the heart of the Alliance Program. What do we mean by this? It's simple, the state GCADA, the county Local Advisory Committees on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse (LACADA), County Alliance Steering Subcommittee and the Municipal Alliance Committees (MAC) are citizen advisory committees that use inclusive, deliberative and consensus-oriented approaches to planning, problem solving, and policymaking.

New Jersey has a twenty four year history in locally based, citizen driven planning and implementation for alcoholism services. It began with the adoption of P.L. 1984, Chapter 531, which established the Local Advisory Committees on Alcoholism (LACA) in every county. The statute also designated the County Alcoholism Coordinator as the authority in the county and established the AEREF (Alcohol Education, Rehabilitation and Enforcement Fund) that was to be disbursed to the counties to fund education, prevention, intervention and treatment efforts.

P.L. 1989, Chapter 51, the law that created the GCADA, expanded the county LACAs to include responsibility for planning county based drug abuse services (LACADAs), as well as creating County Alliance Steering Subcommittees (CASS). Each CASS reviews the proposals submitted by the municipalities. The approved municipal alliance proposals are included in the County Alliance Plan which is submitted to the GCADA.

Participation on the LACADA, CASS and MAC involve representatives from local government local government, education, health, law enforcement, the business community, parents, youth, recovering alcoholics and drug addicts and other members of the community. Collaborative governance is central to all phases of this process. Citizens rather than experts or bureaucrats play a direct role in helping to guide decentralized decision-making, and the solutions reached are often better supported and more likely to be achieved.

In the early years of the Alliance Program, the GCADA adopted rules and guidelines for the Alliance Program providing a basic framework within which the counties and municipalities operated. Each County Alliance Steering Subcommittee and Local Advisory Committee on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse could adopt more stringent guidelines as long as they did not conflict with those issued by GCADA. In keeping with what GCADA saw as the legislative intent behind the Alliance Program, it's review process had room for flexibility and often times allowed waivers from the guidelines in favor of deferring to local authorities. For instance, the GCADA until recently held the position that if a municipality believed strongly in a particular program or activity that could not be funded with DEDR funds the use of cash match as a viable alternative.

In the last decade and a half national research in the area of prevention has developed an important body of work documenting the most effective processes to follow as well as which programs work and which don't.

### **Prevention Unification Model and Evidence Based Practices**

In 1996, the GCADA along with the DAS and the Counties embarked on a collaborative prevention planning process known as *Prevention Unification*. A working committee of representatives of all three entities developed a consensus-based process which would improve prevention services for at-risk individuals, families and communities statewide.

Municipal Alliances and Counties determine and measure the risk and protective factors of their communities. The risk and protective factor framework is based on the research of J. David Hawkins and Richard F. Catalano who have identified four domains (individual, family, school and community) within which risk and protective factors can be assessed.

Prevention Unification begins with community and county data collection and needs assessment; it proceeds to consensus-building and priority-setting based on the needs and resources identified. Unification establishes funding priorities that are used to guide municipal alliance activities and prevention programs supported by the county and state funds.

The first step of the Prevention Unification process involved the municipal alliances completing a needs assessment, an examination of the significant findings and the setting of priorities. This step is followed by the County process involving a broad cross-section of representatives that complete the County needs assessment, prevention resource inventory, and sets county priorities. The County priorities are then used to inform the Division of Addictions allocation of community based prevention services.

The GCADA has incrementally modified the Municipal Alliance guidelines in each successive planning cycle to tighten the parameters on the use of DEDR funds in order to have the Alliance Program implement evidence based practices. Unfortunately, we lost the opportunity to be further ahead due to extending the last two plans (2000-2002) and 2005-2007) for two years (03-04) and one year (08) respectively at the request of the Division of Addiction Services.

### **Current Activities**

However, the collaboration with the Attorney General's Office and the Crime Prevention Strategy led the GCADA to adopt significant changes to the MAC Guidelines issued for the 2009-2011 applications. The new guidelines will ensure that all Municipal Alliances receiving more than \$10,000 in DEDR funds will have to implement evidence based program as listed on a national registry or they must document and measure the effectiveness of their programs. Additionally, the annual renewal process for Municipal Alliance plans is changing to require evaluation of effectiveness in order to be renewed – automatic plan renewals with only having to submit requests for changes is a thing of the past.

The GCADA is committed to providing the resources necessary to train the County and Municipal Alliances in all facets prevention planning, implementation and evaluation. The GCADA is also mindful that the majority of the Municipal Alliances are fueled by local volunteers and part time coordinators, not paid prevention professionals. The GCADA has held sacred the belief that local volunteers, in conjunction with community stakeholders, can change the conditions and the social norms in their neighborhoods and municipalities. The GCADA recognizes that targeted and specific prevention initiatives are necessary for special populations and problems; however, alcoholism and drug abuse problems would overrun our communities without locally-based environmental change advocates.

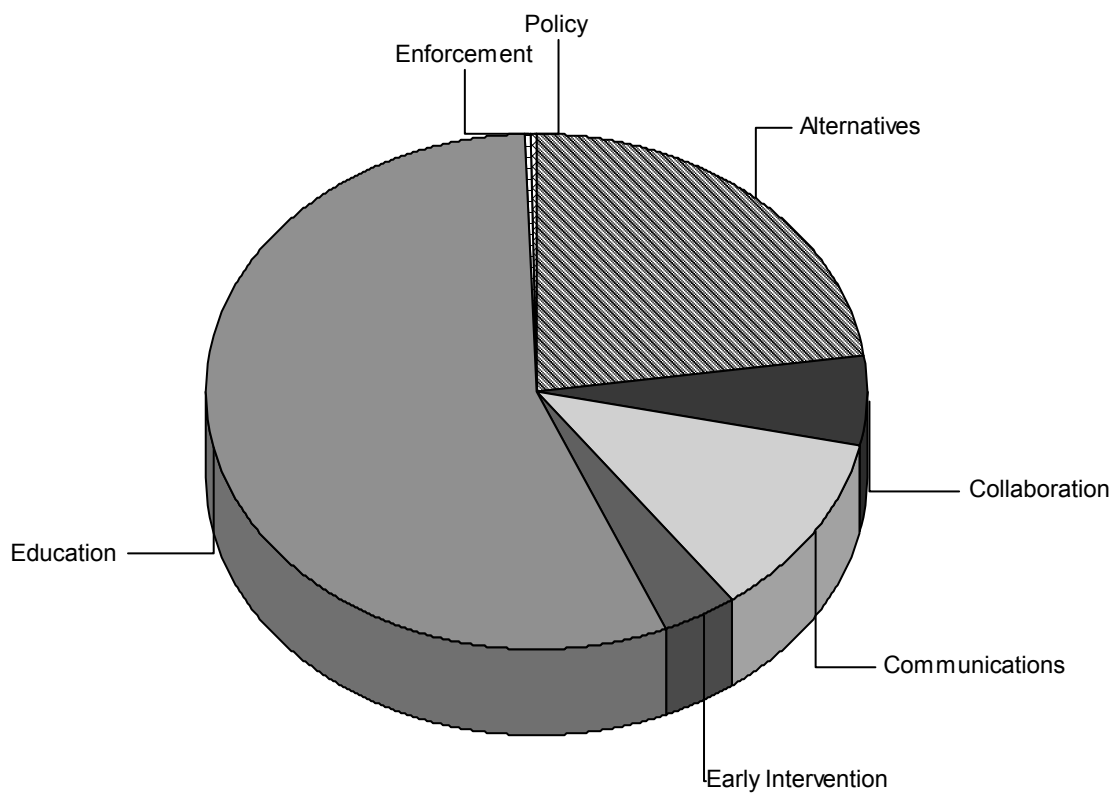

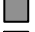

# Percentage of Programs by CSAF Strategy

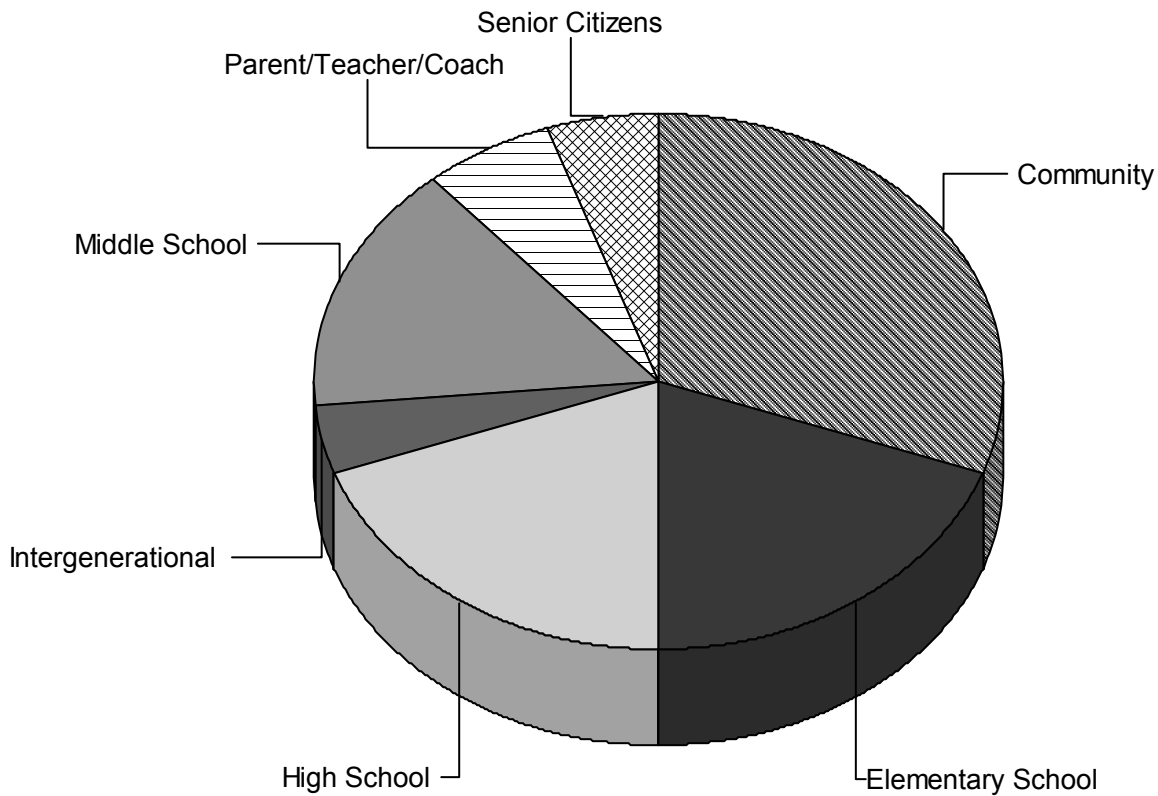

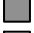
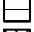
