

GENERAL MATTERS

TO HIS EXCELLENCY ROBERT B. MEYNER:

In 1960 the activity of the Board of Public Utility Commissioners again showed a marked upturn.

During this year the State's population increased to over 6,000,000, continued to spread into new community developments and stimulated the creation of vast new industrial and commercial facilities and the expansion of existing plants.

As a result, the demand for new and extended service from utility companies continued to grow at an ever-increasing rate. Between 1953 and 1960 the volume of water supplied by private utilities increased by 34%; telephone use increased by 57%; electrical output grew by 67%; and the distribution of natural and manufactured gas, now used widely for home heating, swelled by 140%.

To hold a firm regulatory rein on this surge of activity the Board and its staff were taxed to the utmost. Formal proceedings brought forth 1264 decisions and orders of the Board, a 16% increase over 1959, and a 101% increase over 1953. The volume of informal matters and general regulatory activity expanded in like proportion. Yet the Board's staff numbered slightly less than in 1959 and was only 12% larger than in 1953.

In addition to its regular duties, the Board was able to complete several projects having broad scope and effect. After two years of study, public hearings, and consultation with utility and public representatives, it completed and published in October the first compilation and revision of its Regulations since the creation of the Board in 1910.

At the direction of the Governor, the Board took up a study of Title 48 ("Public Utilities") of the New Jersey Revised Statutes and in December, after public hearings and lengthy conferences with the utility industry, delivered its own recommended revision of the statute to the Governor.

During the year the Board also undertook a re-examination of its Rules of Practice, Administrative Orders and Suggested Procedures which had been put into effect on January 1, 1959. Again after public hearing, and after the receipt and evaluation of comments from utilities and other interested parties, in December it adopted a revision of the said Rules, Orders and Procedures to become effective January 30, 1961.

In addition, the Board, after public hearings, adopted new,

modernized Uniform Systems of Accounts for electric, gas and water utilities, and revised the Systems for telephone and autobus utilities.

In spite of the heavy current workload and special undertakings, the Board has been able, through an effective calendar control system, to keep its caseload situation completely current to the apparent satisfaction of litigants, lawyers and the general public.

Under the new schedule of fees and charges authorized by the Legislature on the recommendation of the Board, it is anticipated that revenues to be received by the Board in fiscal 1961 will total \$376,000 as compared to \$74,000 in 1953.

HIGHLIGHTS

A continuing interest in the safety of the public resulted this year in several striking advances in railroad safety. The Board's activities included the issuance of orders directing the installation of safety devices at drawbridges and reviews of proposed signal changes. To prevent a recurrence of the "runaway train" incidents of last year, it issued a general order requiring the locking of unattended locomotives.

The Board is continuing its general survey and inspection of the 2365 public grade crossings in the State and in 1960 published two interim general reports on its progress. The improvement of protection for the public at such crossings is expected to be sharply improved in the future by the enactment of Chapter 152, Laws of 1960, which authorizes payment by the State of 85% of the cost of such protection.

The Board's grade crossing elimination program has recently been at a standstill awaiting the allocation of funds by the Legislature. Nine crossings have been ordered eliminated at an estimated cost of \$21,820,716. Chapter 153, Laws of 1960 authorizes the transfer of \$2,000,000 annually from motor fuel tax receipts for grade crossing purposes, and the Board urges that the Legislature make specific appropriation of this amount and such further funds as it may find it possible to furnish.

The discontinuance of passenger train service by the New Jersey railroads continues to be of major concern to the Board. No changes have been made in the Federal Transportation Act of 1958 which destroys most of the Board's power, but the State has recaptured for the Highway Department at least partial control, by means of the recent legislation which authorizes service contracts between the railroads and the State for the continuation of passenger service. All passenger lines in the State have entered into such contracts except the New York, Susquehanna and Western and the Lehigh Valley Railroads, which have begun actions before the Interstate Commerce Commission to dis-

continue all their passenger service, and the Pennsylvania-Reading Seashore Lines, which has instituted similar proceedings before this Board. The Board is actively opposing the Interstate Commerce Commission actions with the limited legal means within its power, and is still conducting hearings in the Pennsylvania Reading Seashore Line case.

In August the Board decided a rate case involving Public Service Electric and Gas Company which affected the electric and gas bills of 80% of the population of the State. This case required 96 public hearings which resulted in 7664 pages of transcript and over 300 exhibits in the record. As against the utility's request for increased revenues of \$36,316,400, the Board permitted an increase of \$10,163,000, amounting to approximately 3% increase in existing rates to be charged to the public.

In an interesting opinion, the Appellate Division on December 23, upheld the Board's power to order automatic grade crossing signals at a crossing never formally dedicated to public use nor authorized by the Board itself, but in fact used for sixty years by the public as a thoroughfare across the right of way.

IMMEDIATE AND FUTURE NEEDS

As has been seen, the Board's personnel roster has not kept pace with the Board's increased workload. This is an acute situation since many key staff members are approaching retirement age and the Board has not had sufficient personnel to allow for broad and intensive training of replacements. Added personnel will require additional space and the Board hopes that future budgets of this Department will reflect these two basic requirements for the efficient performance of the Board's statutory duties.

The Board's recommendations for the improvement of its own performance and the better regulation of utilities are embodied to a great extent in its recommended revision of Title 48, previously referred to. It is hoped that the Legislature will see fit to give prompt and careful consideration to the passage of this greatly needed legislation.

Appropriation of funds for additional grade crossing eliminations is of primary importance to the safety of the public and it is urged that the Legislature implement Chapter 153, Laws of 1960 at its coming session.

ACCOUNTS AND FINANCE

The principal responsibilities of this Division are the examination of financial and operating reports of utilities, and the investigation of petitions for approval of security issues, mergers and sales of property.

The Board has always required that the utilities make annual and other periodic reports in order that the State and the public may have available properly classified, meaningful and intelligible accounting data for the proper regulation of the industries under the Board's jurisdiction. In addition, these reports make possible valuable research by this and other Divisions of the Board, and form the background against which the Division investigates applications for approval of specific financial transactions.

Dollar Value of Securities Issued

The continuing increase in the demand for all types of utility services is reflected by the increase in the aggregate dollar value of utilities' security issues approved by the Board during 1960, amounting to 87% over the similar figure in 1959. Debt issues (bonds, notes, etc.), increased by more than 60%.

Cost of Capital

The tendency toward increase in the cost of new capital has not lessened to any appreciable degree during 1960, and slightly higher costs were incurred in a few instances. However, the larger utilities, engaged in giant construction programs, did find it possible to issue securities at a decrease in cost, if the issue was timed properly. The year reflected significant fluctuations in financing costs, with a rise at the end of the year.

ENGINEERING

This Division is charged with all technical matters pertaining to all utilities except railroads. This includes appraisal studies, investigations and recommendations pertaining to adequacy and safety of service, accuracy of meters, depreciation rates, rate base determinations, investigation of both formal and informal complaints concerning utility service, the processing of petitions for sale or lease of property and for the exercise of eminent domain.

The Service Inspection Section of this Division handled approximately 1160 informal complaints concerning utility service and analyzed approximately 600 reports which the utilities are required to file with the Board.

Property sales investigated by this Division and approved by the Board had a total value of \$5,746,004. The table below summarizes this type of activity for the years 1957-1960 inclusive:

Due to the constant expansion of the electrical generating and transmission facilities in the State, the Division's responsibilities have equally increased in the field of investigating and approving petitions for the right to exercise eminent domain to acquire rights of way for transmission lines. The increased use of gas for residential use has intensified the Board's continuing studies of specifications for, and testing of, gas pipelines. A nuclear reactor generating project at Saxton, Pennsylvania, under construction by New Jersey Power & Light Company and Jersey Central Power & Light Company, approved last year by the Board, is progressing toward completion scheduled for November, 1961 and provides a keen focus of interest for the professional personnel of this Division.

LEGAL

The Deputy Attorneys General assigned to the Board advise and represent the members and staff of the Board in all legal matters. The following is a summary of the regular work of the legal staff:

The Attorneys represented the Board in appeals from Board decisions and in other Court actions brought by or against the Board, advised on pending legislation affecting the Board's activities, and participated in the formulation of the Board's recommended revision of Title 48, the compilation of the Board's Regulations and the revision of its Rules of Practice, Administrative Orders and Suggested Procedures.

MOTOR CARRIERS

This Division handles all matters pertaining to the Board's responsibility for adequacy and safety of autobus operations. The following table summarizes the principal activities of the Division.

During 1960 the bus utilities of the State added a total of 543 new autobuses, costing over \$20,000,000, to their capital equipment, an increase of 105% over the number purchased in 1959.

One of this Division's principal accomplishments during the year was a complete revision of the Administrative Order embodying the Board's specifications applying to autobuses, which imposes more stringent requirements for the safety and convenience of the traveling public.

RAILROADS

This Division during 1960 processed 127 formal railroad cases, and participated in 148 other cases involving sales of railroad land. It also investigated 2,504 complaints and queries regarding railroads and related service. A total of 3,347 passenger, freight and express tariffs were examined and were either accepted for filing or were referred to the Board for formal proceedings.

Due to the legislation placing contracts for railroad service in the hands of the Highway Department, the Board's direct jurisdiction over such service has been limited to those three railroads which have not entered into such contracts. These three railroads, having initiated proceedings for the discontinuance of all their service, the Division is closely studying the effect upon the public convenience and necessity.

The Division continues its inspections and studies for the prevention of grade crossing accidents, and such accidents have shown a gratifying decrease in each of the three past years. There were 9 deaths from grade crossing accidents in 1960 as opposed to 24 in 1959. A summary of the major activities of this Division follows:

During 1960 this Division participated in 364 formal rate proceedings, the heaviest workload since the formation of the Division. The following table summarizes the action taken by the Board in these proceedings:

The Division advised the Board in the Public Service Electric and Gas Company rate case, which culminated in a decision by the Board that the company was entitled to a rate of return of 6.25% on a rate base of \$1,068,600,000.

Bus fares were intensively studied in the case of Public Service Coordinated Transport, decided on February 17, 1960 and which granted an increase of 1¢ on certain intrastate routes resulting in increased revenues of \$1,470,778. One of the major issues decided at the hearing took the form of a direction by the Board that the company

depreciate its city-type buses on a 12-year instead of the previous 10-year basis. The Board then found that the fare increase was not excessive and permitted it to become effective April 17, 1960.

Rates for water from private companies were an important factor in this Division's work. The most extensive studies were made on a petition by the Commonwealth Water Company for an increase of 25% in its rates. This company, operating in Essex, Morris and Union Counties, serving approximately 48,000 customers, was vigorously opposed in the proceeding by rate counsel appointed by the Attorney General. The Board limited the amount of the increase to 12.6%.
