A student’s SGP falls between 1 and 99 and can be grouped into three levels: **Low Growth: Less than 35** **Typical Growth: Between 35 and 65** **High Growth: Greater than 65**

If the student growth percentiles for all students in the school are ordered from smallest to largest, the median student growth percentile (mSGP) for the school is the percentile in the middle of that list. 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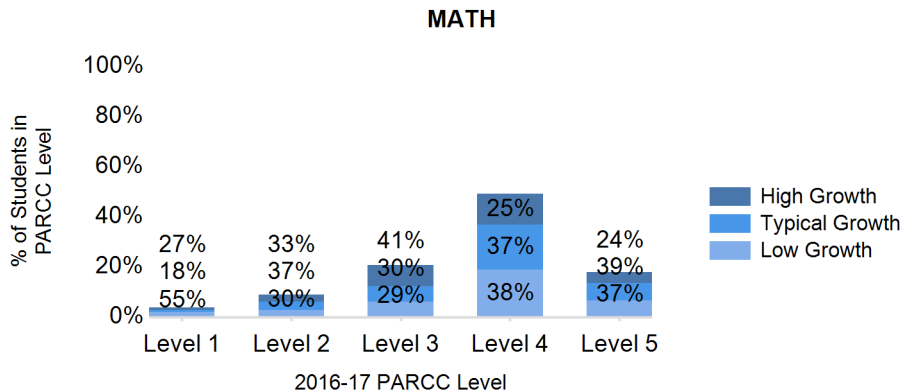
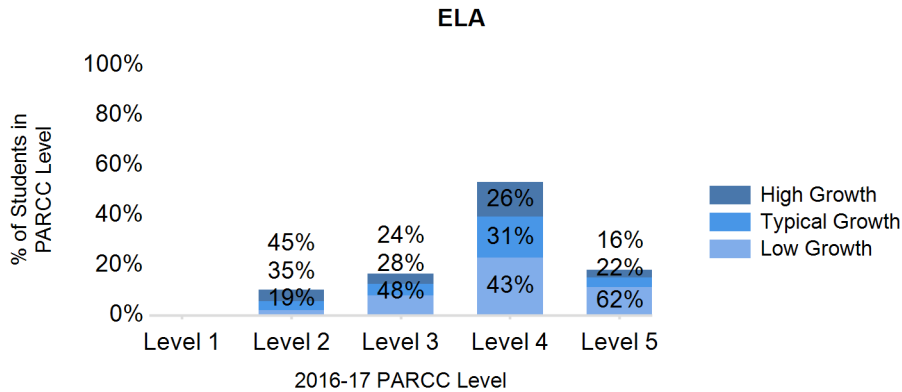

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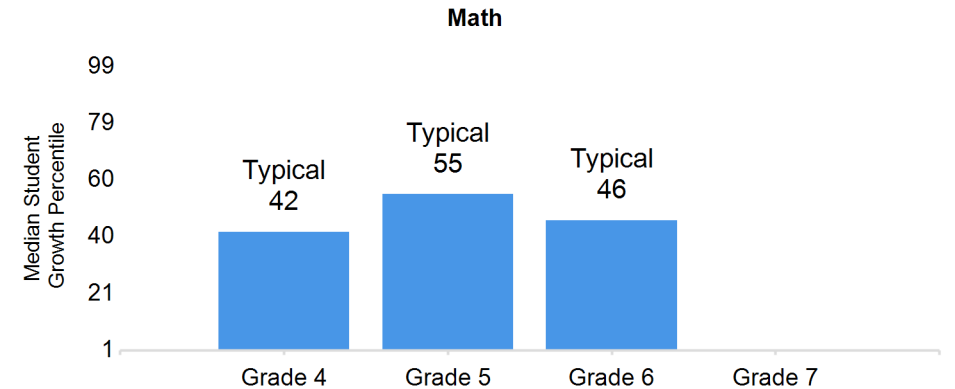
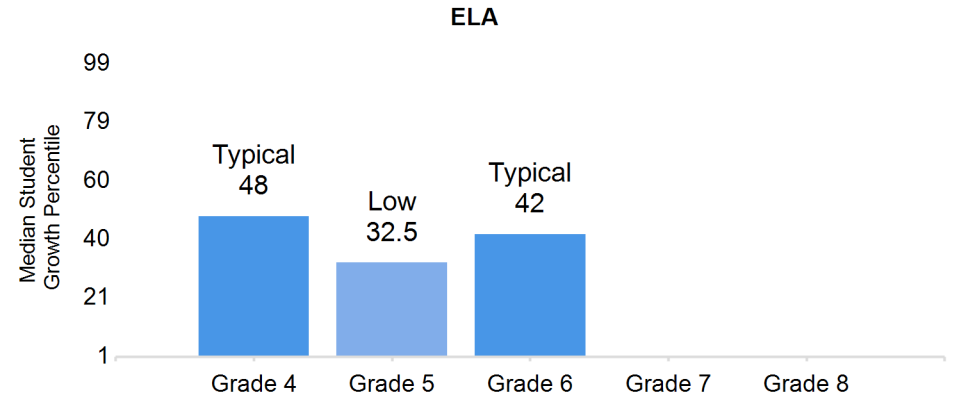
**Student Growth by Performance Level**

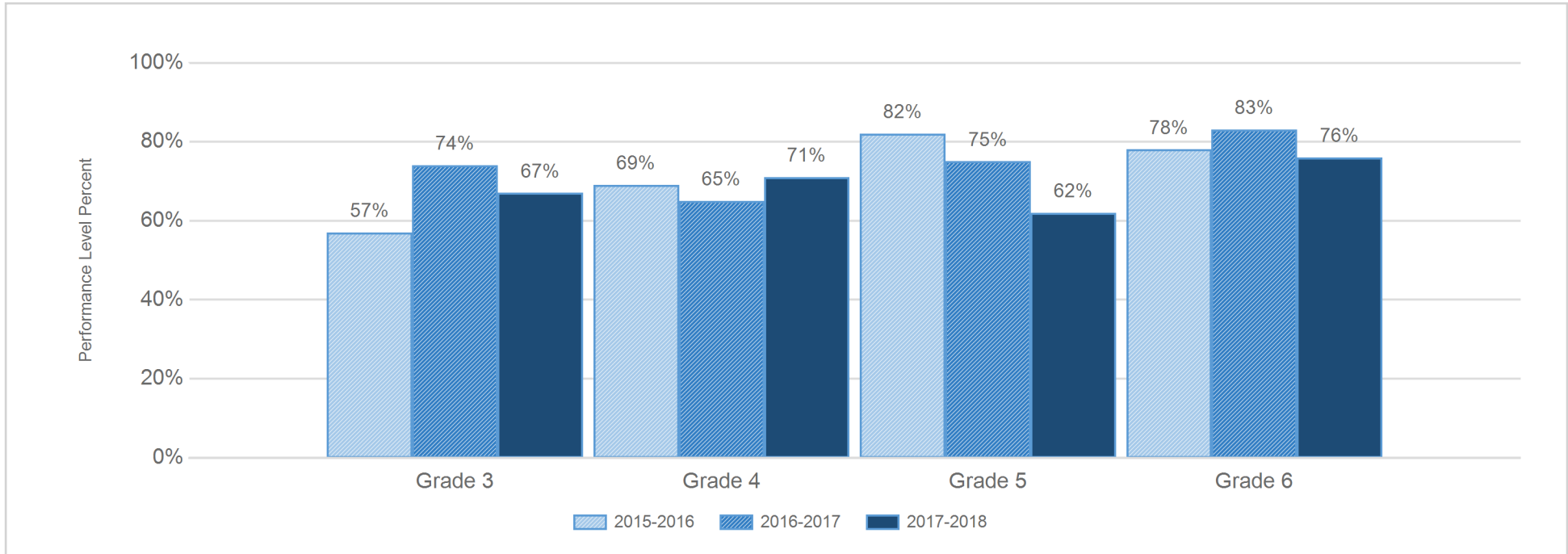

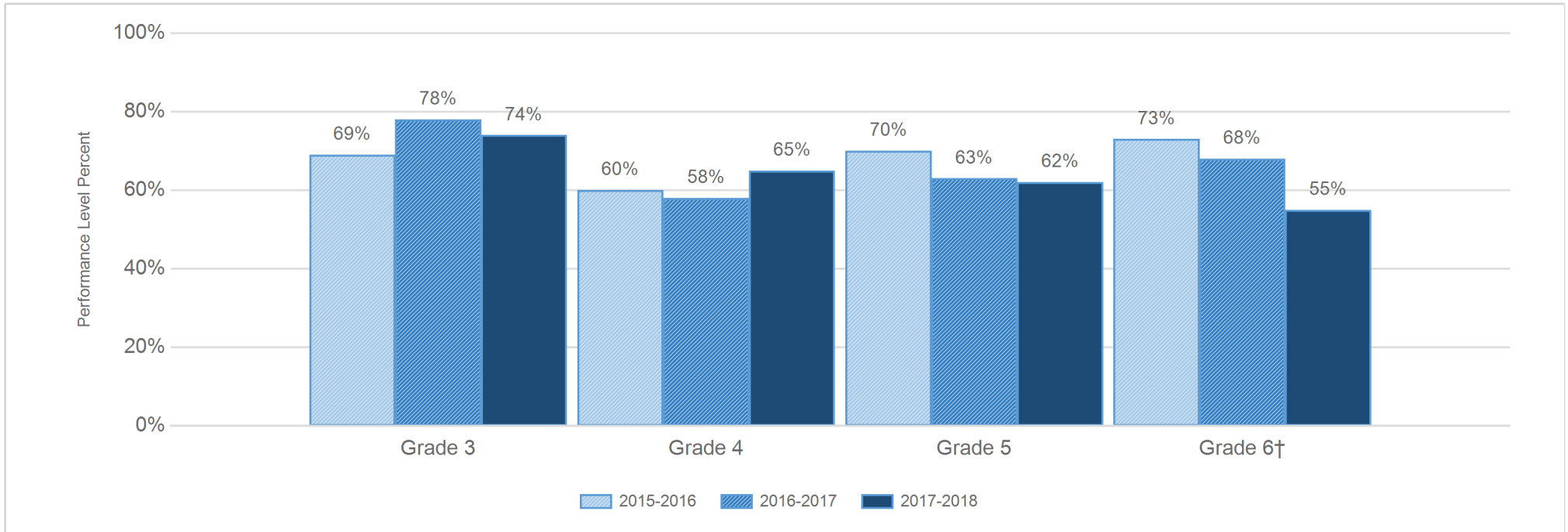

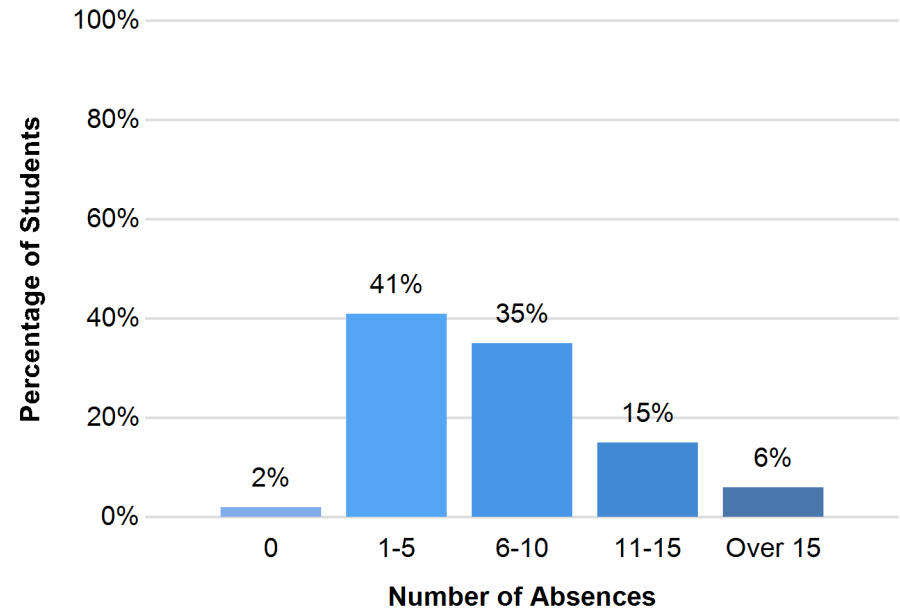

This graph shows the percentage of K-12 students by the number of days they were absent during the school year.





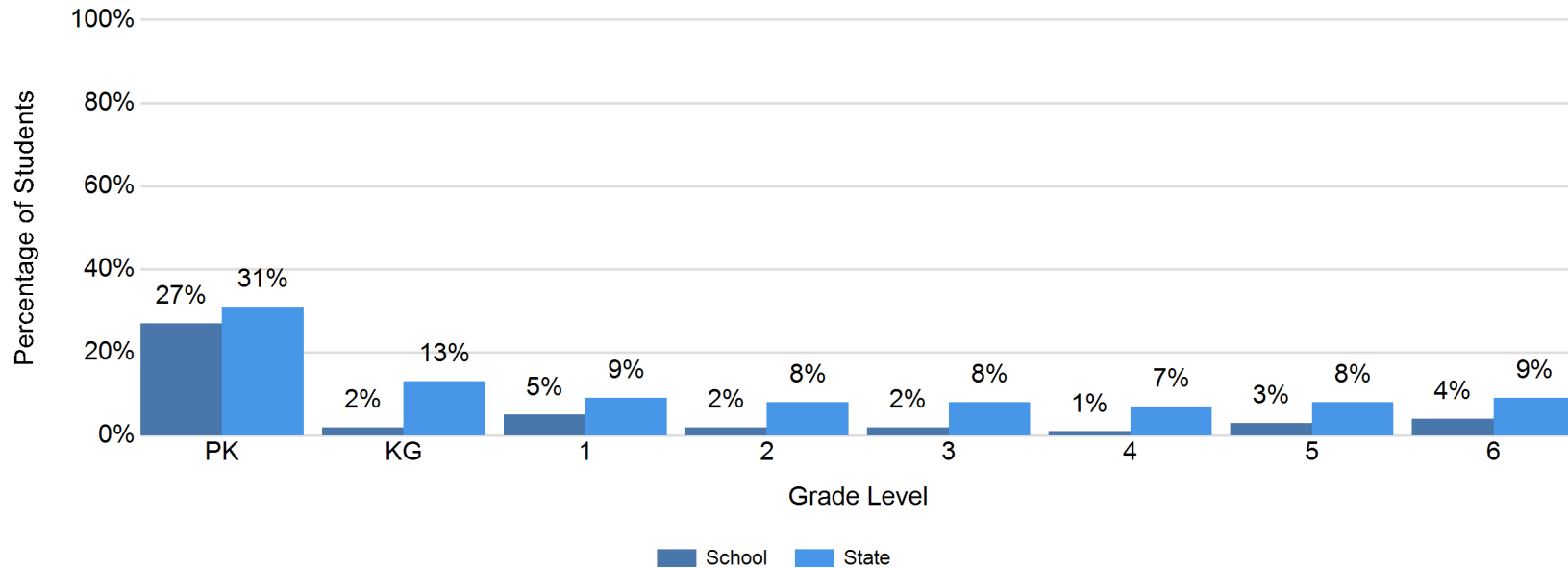

The school features science labs for our upper elementary students, a library media center, gym, cafeteria, band room, art room, etc. The school uses a security system to ensure the safety of our students and staff that includes an extensive monitoring system.
