The Casino Revenue Fund now stands at over five million dollars.

As result of a \$23,535,460 win by Resorts International Hotel during the month of August, \$1,874,837 was added to the State's Casino Revenue Fund, boosting the total to \$5,040,096.

The August figures show increases in the casino's win over July at all table games and all varieties of slot machines.

During August, a total of \$61,330,037 was dropped at the table games, of which the casino won \$12,568,769 or 20 percent. The casino won \$10,966,691 from the slot machines. This was 14 percent of the slot handle of \$78,332,902.

Since the opening of the casino on May 26, Resorts International has won a total of \$63,101,202 in casino play. The breakdown was \$33,165,600 from table games and \$29,935,602 from the slot machines.

During August, Resorts won \$7,384,899 in blackjack out of a drop of \$32,997,557 (22%), \$2,472,816 at craps out of a drop of \$17,635,682 (14%), \$1,098,119 at roulette out of a drop of \$4,349,278 (25%), \$723,281 at Big Six out of a drop of \$1,267,134 (57%) and \$889,654 at baccarat out of a drop of \$5,080,386 (18%).

Resorts won \$179,418 at the nickel slot machines, out of a handle of \$1,012,095 (18%). At the quarter machines, the win was \$5,318,293 out of a handle of \$33,706,953 (16%), while at the dollar machines, the casino won \$5,468,980 out of a handle of \$43,613,854 (13%).

A pair of million dollar days in September helped boost the Casino Revenue Fund to \$6,618,908.

On September 3, the Sunday of the Labor Day weekend, the Resorts International Casino won \$1,091,492. Two weeks later, on Saturday, September 16, the casino won \$1,033,698.

During September, the casino reported a total win of \$19,735,146. Of this total, \$10,991,984 was won at table games and \$8,743,162 from slot machines.

From May 26, the day the casino opened through September 30, Resorts won a total of \$82,836,348. The breakdown was \$44,157,584 from table games and \$38,678,764 from the slots.

The only previous million dollar day came on July 22, when the casino won \$1,025,337.

During September, Resorts won \$5,909,596 at Blackjack out of a drop of \$29,816,502 (20%); \$2,731,954 from craps out of a drop of \$16,357,109 (17%); \$992,468 from roulette out of a drop of \$3,958,773 (25%); \$635,839 from Big Six out of a drop of \$1,081,372 (59%); and \$722,127 at baccarat out of a drop of \$3,439,482 (21%).

Resorts won \$142,812 from the nickel slot machines out of a handle of \$1,066,824 (13%); \$4,281,610 from the quarter slots out of a handle of \$27,827,670 (15%) and \$4,318,740 from the dollar slots out of a handle of \$31,415,706 (14%).



A report has been filed with the New Jersey Casino Control Commission, recommending a civil penalty of \$5,000 be assessed against Resorts International, in connection with Count Two of Complaint No. 78-2 in the original 20 complaints against the casino.

The hearing for this complaint was not completed until recently because a witness for the Division of Gaming Enforcement was not available at the time of the original hearing.

Count Two of Complaint No. 78-2 dealt with an improper credit transaction at baccarat table number three on May 29, 1978 at approximately 10:50 p.m.

According to the complaint, a customer was provided with chips prior to signing the check credit form. The Division also charged that the Vice President for Casino Operations for Resorts, Walter I. Rogers, witnessed the transaction.

Commissioner Kenneth N. MacDonald, who served as hearing examiner, found Resorts guilty of the improper credit transaction, but recommended that no action be taken against Rogers in this matter.

"I am unable to find," MacDonald stated in his report to the Commission, "as a fact that Mr. Rogers was consciously aware of the improper credit transaction as alleged in the complaint."

MacDonald recommended a fine of \$5,000, with \$4,000 suspended, conditioned upon further compliance with the Commission's accounting and internal controls. The report must be approved by the full Commission.

The Casino Revenue Fund in New Jersey now stands at \$8,089,110. This is eight per cent of Resorts International's gross revenue of \$101 million for the period between May 26 and October 31, 1978.

During the month of October, the win from slot machine play dropped by more than a million dollars, compared to the previous month, however, the win at the table games during October increased slightly over September.

The casino reported a total win of \$18,527,522 during October. The win from table games was \$11,055,390, out of a drop of \$56,088,951 (20%). The win from the slot was \$7,472,132 out of a handle of \$54,577,347 (14%).

During October, Resorts won \$6,010,211 at blackjack, out of a drop of \$30,225,017 (20%); \$2,794,961 at craps out of a drop of \$16,990,119 (16%); \$1,181,352 at roulette out of a drop of \$4,095,206 (29%); \$534,007 at big six out of a drop of \$948,313 (56%) and \$534,859 at baccarat out of a drop of \$3,830,296 (14%).

From the slot machines, Resorts won \$161,348 from the nickel variety out of a handle of \$1,161,263 (14%). From the quarter slots, Resorts won \$3,778,589 out of a handle of \$24,547,157 (15%), while the dollar slots produced a win total of \$3,532,195 out of a handle of \$28,868,927 (12%).

The New Jersey Casino Control Commission will conduct a hearing into nine complaints brought against Resorts International Hotel, Inc., by the Division of Gaming Enforcement.

The hearing will be held Monday, Dec. 11, 1978, in the Commission offices in Atlantic City, located on the second floor of the Arcade Building, Tennessee Avenue at the Boardwalk, beginning at 10 a.m.

Commissioner Kenneth H. MacDonald has been designated as hearing examiner in this matter by Chairman Joseph P. Lordi.

Three of the complaints were filed in July and the other six in October.

A summary of the complaints follows:

78-22: On June 26, 1978, the distribution of chips between the blackjack tables in Pit Number 6 was conducted without the utilization of Request, Fill or Credit slips, reflecting this distribution.

78-23: On June 7, 1978, three blackjack dealers in Pit Number 5 did not individually count the table inventory after the pit boss had counted the inventory.

78-24: On three separate dates in June (3, 4 and 29), the pit boss in Pit Number 6 was supervising more than 12 blackjack, roulette, Big 6 or baccarat tables, or a combination thereof, at the same time.

78-25: This complaint charges Resorts, Walter I. Rogers (vice president for casino operations) and James Carr (casino manager). The

complaint charges violations of the statutes and regulations as to the organizational structure of the casino and as to slot change booth operations that permitted the loss of nearly \$180,000. It also charges that Resorts and Rogers misrepresented to the Commission under oath the status of the organizational structure and the adequacy of the staff of the casino. It also asks the Commission to consider Rogers' suitability to licensure.

78-26: This complaint charges Resorts with the employment of persons not licensed by the Commission.

78-27: This complaint charges Resorts with failing to follow proper internal control procedures, thereby permitting the theft of a tray containing \$14,260 worth of chips.

78-28: This complaint charges Resorts with doing business with four casino related ancillary firms not licensed by the casino.

78-29: This complaint charges Resorts with doing business with 11 unlicensed ancillaries.

78-30: This complaint charges Resorts with continuing the course of conduct involving the improper extension of credit and other violations that have already resulted in the imposition of \$40,000 in fines upon the casino.

The Casino Revenue Fund in New Jersey stands at \$9,520,378. This is eight per cent of Resorts International's gross revenue of \$119 million for the period between May 26 and Nov. 30, 1978.

A pair of million dollar days, plus two near-million dollar days helped Resorts take in \$17,890,860 during November. The million dollar days came on the 11th (\$1,014,662) and the 24th (\$1,121,027). The 24th, incidentally, was the Friday of the Thanksgiving Day weekend. This now brings the total of million dollar days to five since the casino opened.

On the 4th of November, the casino took in \$998,839 and on the 25th, the win was \$970,677.

During November, Resorts won \$5,408,133 in blackjack out of a drop of \$30,954,413 (17%); \$2,995,159 in craps out of a drop of \$16,890,116 (18%); \$1,086,693 in roulette out of a drop of \$4,069,814 (27%); \$531,221 in big six out of a drop of \$934,214 (17%) and \$674,781 in baccarat out of a drop of \$3,894,197 (17%).

From the slot machines, Resorts won \$185,845 from the nickel variety out of a handle of \$1,203,321 (15%); \$3,820,106 from the quarter machines out of a handle of \$25,483,249 (15%) and \$3,188,922 from the dollar machines out of a handle of \$25,624,385 (12%).

The total table game win was \$10,695,987 out of a drop of \$56,742,754 (19%), while the win from slots was \$7,194,873 out of a handle of \$52,310,955 (14%).

Members of the public who have any information relevant to the specific issue concerning whether Resorts International Hotel, Inc., should be awarded a permanent casino license are urged to submit a written summary of such information to the New Jersey Casino Control Commission.

Upon receipt of these statements from the public, the Commission staff will forward them to the interested parties, namely the Division of Gaming Enforcement and Resorts International Hotel, Inc. The parties will review each statement and will determine whether they wish to contact the individual and to call him or her as a witness at the hearing.

All witnesses called by the parties at the Resorts International hearing must testify under oath and be subject to cross-examination. Members of the public will not be permitted to testify at the hearing unless called by one of the interested parties.

The hearing is scheduled to begin January 8, 1979 and will be held in the Commission's Atlantic City offices, located on the second floor of the Arcade Building, Tennessee Avenue at the Boardwalk.

.In order to provide an adequate opportunity for the parties to review and assess each summary, it is urged that they be submitted as quickly as possible.

"The public always has the opportunity to participate and express views at our regular Commission meetings," Commission Chairman Joseph P. Lordi explained, "but the upcoming hearing is deemed to be quasi-judicial and it would not be appropriate to permit members of the public to voice statements into the record, unless such statements are relevant to the specific issue before the Commission. There are very important rights at stake.

"The Commission has already received," Lordi continued, "numerous requests from individuals who wish to speak out on whether casino gambling is good or bad for New Jersey. But that is not the issue. The voters, through the 1976 referendum, and the Legislature, through the passage of the Casino Control Act, have already decided that issue. The Commission's task now is to determine whether Resorts International Hotel, Inc., qualifies for a permanent casino license."

A recommended report filed with the New Jersey Casino Control Commission calls for fines totaling \$144,000 to be levied against Resorts International Hotel, Inc.

Four days of hearings for the nine civil complaints filed against Resorts International by the Division of Gaming Enforcement were held in Atlantic City the week of Dec. 11, 1978. Kenneth N. MacDonald, a member of the Commission, served as hearing examiner and signed the report which is released today.

The full Commission will discuss MacDonald's report at tomorrow's regularly scheduled meeting in Trenton. (State Museum Auditorium, 10 a.m.).

Of the \$144,000 in fines which MacDonald recommended, his report assesses \$123,000 in fines to be paid immediately (after the Commission's final approval) and suspends \$21,000.

Two officials of Resorts International were fined individually. Walter I. Rogers, vice president of casino operations, was fined \$2,000 and James Carr, casino manager, was fined \$500. Rogers and Carr were fined for their participation in the count of slot booth currency on June 6, 1978.

MacDonald points out in his report that most of the complaints relate to events which occurred in the first weeks of operation of the casino. "There is no charge here and no evidence of any criminality," MacDonald said. "The remaining charges which have been established may be described as technical, but not insignificant," he added.

Included in the recommendation of the new fines is the imposition of \$13,000 in fines, which were originally suspended when the first 20 civil complaints against Resorts International were approved by the Commission.

These matters involve nine civil complaints filed by the Division of Gaming Enforcement (hereinafter the "Division") charging Respondent Resorts International Hotel, Inc. (hereinafter "Resorts"), a temporary casino permittee, with violating various provisions of the New Jersey Casino Control Act, N.J.S.A. 5:12-1, et seq. and various Regulations adopted by the New Jersey Casino Control Commission (hereinafter the "Commission"), N.J.A.C. 19:40 et seq.<sup>1</sup> Additionally, one of these complaints<sup>2</sup> charges Respondent Rogers and Carr with certain of such violations. Mr. Rogers is Resorts' Vice President of Casino Operations, and Mr. Carr is Resorts' Casino Manager.

At the outset I must state that these matters should be viewed in their proper context. For the most part these complaints relate to events which occurred during the first weeks of operation of the first casino to open its doors in this jurisdiction. As this record clearly shows, conditions in the casino during those first weeks were less than optimal. Several factors contributed to those conditions. First, the response of the public to the first legalized casino on the East Coast was overwhelming. Patron demand from opening day on May 26, 1978 and continuing throughout the summer months surpassed everyone's wildest dreams. At the same time, in several areas there was a critical shortage of licensed personnel. This shortage was attributable at least in part to the length of time required to complete the extensive background investigations which the law demands. Many of the personnel who were licensed lacked extensive experience. Others were impressed into service performing functions for which they had little or no training. And finally, the entire operation commenced under a complex and comprehensive body of internal and accounting control regulations<sup>3</sup> which were not adopted by the Commission until the day on which the casino opened. These regulations are far more demanding than those of other jurisdictions which permit casino gaming, and contain some requirements which are novel even to those who are experienced in the casino industry.

As the undisputed testimony in the record indicates, within a few days after the casino opened it became apparent to Resorts' management that under the circumstances described above

Resorts could not comply with the letter of each and every regulation of the Commission.<sup>4</sup> Resorts at that juncture had to make some practical business decisions. The company chose to serve the public as best it could, with the knowledge that it was in violation of several Commission regulations, and with the apparent hope that conditions would improve with the steady addition of licensed personnel, with increased space and facilities, and with experience.

This is the proper perspective for these complaints. There is no charge here and no evidence of any criminality. The most serious of the charges in these complaints, which allege misrepresentations made to the Commission, have not been established. And none of the violations which have been established herein indicate that Resorts has abused the privilege granted by the Commission to operate a casino in this State.

The remaining charges which have been established may be described as technical, but not insignificant. This is not meant to demean the importance of the violations which have been proven, but merely to keep them in their proper context. Some of these violations are serious and fully warrant the severe monetary sanctions imposed. These violations exemplify the need for strict enforcement of Commission regulations, lest public confidence in the gaming industry and in the regulatory process be eroded. I hasten to add that the failure of Resorts to affirmatively advise the Commission of the slot booth discrepancy<sup>4a</sup>, cannot be condoned. Although I have found this failure to constitute neither a violation nor a willful attempt to mislead the Commission, this omission is not in keeping with the spirit of the Act.

RECOMMENDED SANCTIONS

After having given due consideration to the standards<sup>120</sup> relating to appropriate sanctions<sup>121</sup> set forth in the Casino Control Act, to the circumstances and context in which these violations occurred and to the oral and written arguments of the parties with respect to sanctions and mitigation, I recommend that the Commission impose the following sanctions:

Complaint No. 78-25

First Count

Part I - For failing to maintain its slot booths on an imprest basis during the first two weeks of casino operations in violation of N.J.A.C.19:45-33(a), a civil penalty of \$5,000.

Part II - For permitting improper inter-booth transfers of assets from June 18 to July 14, 1978 in violation of N.J.A.C. 19:45-32(a) (7), a civil penalty of \$5,000.

Part III - For failing to record which personnel were assigned to which particular booths during the first seven weeks of casino operations in violation of N.J.A.C. 19:45-10(a) (2), a civil penalty of \$5,000.

Part IV - For failing during the first weeks of casino operations to compare slot booth assets with recorded accountability therefor, and for permitting insufficient documentation to accompany the exchange

of assets between booths in violation of N.J.A.C. 19:45-32(a) (7), N.J.A.C. 19:45-43(a) (1) and N.J.A.C. 19:45-2A(b), a civil penalty of \$5,000.

Part V - As to Resorts:

1. For failing to count slot booth currency during the first two weeks of casino operations, in violation of N.J.A.C. 19:45-14(a), and N.J.A.C. 19:45-10(a) (2) (iv), a civil penalty of \$5,000.
2. For permitting Respondents Rogers and Carr to participate in the count of this slot booth currency in violation of N.J.A.C. 19:45-10(a) (2) a civil penalty of \$5,000.

As to Rogers: For participating in the count of slot booth currency on June 6, 1978 in violation of N.J.A.C. 19:45-10(a) (2) (iii), a civil penalty of \$2,000.

As to Carr: For participating in the count of slot booth currency on June 6, 1978 in violation of N.J.A.C. 19:45-10(a) (2) (iii), a civil penalty of \$500.

Part VI - For various record-keeping inadequacies during the first several weeks of casino operations which rendered it unable to determine the cause of the \$179,195.01 discrepancy, a civil penalty of \$10,000.

Second Count

Part I - As to Resorts: For Rogers' direction of wage increases for casino cage employees in violation of N.J.A.C. 19:45-10(b) (2), N.J.A.C.

19:45-10(c) and N.J.A.C. 19:45-1 (relating to the principle of segregation of incompatible functions), a civil penalty of \$5,000.

As to Rogers: For directing wage increases for casino cage employees in violation of N.J.A.C. 19:45-10(b)(2), N.J.A.C. 19:45-10(c) and N.J.A.C. 19:45-1 (relating to the principle of segregation of incompatible functions), a letter of censure to be made part of his permanent file.

Part II - For failing during the first seven weeks of casino operations to maintain a functioning internal audit department in violation of N.J.A.C. 19:45-10(c)(2), a civil penalty of \$5,000.

Part III, IV and V - For failing during the first seven weeks of casino operations to adhere to its own submitted system of internal and accounting control, for failing to maintain a plan of organization sufficient to provide effective safeguarding of assets, and for failing to provide a system of internal control which sufficiently segregated incompatible functions, (based upon the activities referred to in Counts I and II) in violation of N.J.A.C. 19:45-2A, N.J.A.C. 19:45-10(a)(2) and N.J.A.C. 19:45-10(b)(2), a civil penalty of \$5,000.

Complaint No. 78-26

First Count - For employing in its casino operation twelve persons as casino employees at times when these persons did not held valid casino employee

licenses, a civil penalty of \$10,000.

Second and Third Counts - For employing in its casino hotel operation seventeen persons as casino hotel employees at times when these persons did not hold valid casino hotel employee licenses, a civil penalty of \$1,000.

Complaint No. 78-27

For the failure on June 4, 1978 of cage personnel to conduct an inventory of chip containers resulting in the inability to determine responsibility for the missing chip tray containing \$14,260 in chips, in violation of N.J.A.C. 19:45-29(g), a civil penalty of \$10,000.

Complaint No. 78-28

For the transaction of business with four unlicensed companies which had not been approved by the Commission in violation of N.J.A.C. 19:41-11.3(g), a civil penalty of \$4,000.

Complaint No. 78-29

For transacting business with eleven unlicensed companies which had not been approved by the Commission in violation of N.J.A.C. 19:41-11, a civil penalty of \$11,000.

Complaint No. 78-30

First Count - For permitting on September 23, 1978, a floorman to verify player credit with the cashiers' cage, in violation of N.J.A.C. 19:45-23(g)(1) a civil penalty of \$5,000, of which \$2,000 is to be

paid immediately and \$3,000 is suspended, conditioned upon future compliance with this regulation.

Second Count - For the failure on September 20, 1978 of certain named individuals to sign the slot win sheet in violation of N.J.A.C. 19:45-41(i)(6), imposition of the \$4,000 civil penalty suspended pursuant to Complaint No. 78-5,<sup>122</sup> plus a civil penalty of \$5,000, of which \$2,000 is to be paid immediately and \$3,000 is suspended, conditioned upon future compliance with this regulation.

Third Count - For failure on September 20, 1978 of the cage cashier representative to conduct an independent count verification of each bill accepted from the count team, in violation of N.J.A.C. 19:45-3(i)(1), imposition of \$1,000 of the civil penalty suspended pursuant to Complaint No. 78-6.<sup>123</sup>

Fifth Count - For permitting on September 14, 1978 someone other than the dealer primarily assigned to a particular gaming table to count the contents of the table inventory and agree that count to the opener, in violation of N.J.A.C. 19:45-20(c), a civil penalty of \$5,000, of which \$1,000 is to be paid immediately and \$4,000 is suspended conditioned upon future compliance with this regulation.

Sixth Count - For failing to require on September 4, and September 13, 1978 that all members of the count team sign the master game report in violation of N.J.A.C. 19:45-31(h) (10), a imposition of the \$4,000 civil penalty suspended pursuant to Complaint No. 78-17<sup>124</sup>, plus a civil penalty of \$5,000 of which \$2,000 is to be paid immediately and \$3,000 is suspended conditioned upon future compliance with this regulation.

Seventh Count - For failing to connect an alarm device to the entrance of the count room in violation of N.J.A.C. 19:45-30(b) (3), imposition of the \$4,000 civil penalty suspended pursuant to Complaint No. 78-20<sup>125</sup> plus a civil penalty of \$5,000.

Complaint No. 78-22

For distributing chips among blackjack tables on June 26, 1978 in violation of N.J.A.C. 19:45-22(a) a civil penalty of \$5,000, of which \$1,000 is to be paid immediately and \$4,000 is suspended conditioned upon future compliance with this regulation.

Complaint No. 78-23

For the failure on June 7, 1978, of three dealers to separately re-count the table inventory and agree that count to the opener in violation of N.J.A.C. 19:45-20(c), a civil penalty of \$5,000, of which \$3,000 is to be paid immediately and \$2,000

is suspended conditioned upon future compliance with this regulation.

Complaint No. 78-24

For permitting on June 3, 4 and 29, 1978 pit bosse to supervise more than a total of twelve tables in violation of N.J.A.C. 19:45-11(a) (6) (ii), a civil penalty of \$5,000, of which \$3,000 is to be paid immediately and \$2,000 is suspended conditioned upon future compliance with this regulation.

Additionally, as to all violations found in this Report and Recommendation with regard to all Respondents a letter of censure is to be issued which shall be made part of the Respondent permanent files.

The Casino Revenue Fund has gone over the \$10 million mark. During December, Resorts International Hotel, Inc. grossed \$14,818,715 from the casino to raise the total from May 26th through the end of 1978 to \$133,673,445.

The exact amount in the Casino Revenue Fund as of Dec. 31 was \$10,693,876.

During December, the casino won \$4,844,988 in blackjack out of a drop of \$31,902,816 (15%); \$2,768,055 in craps out of a drop of \$15,513,679/ \$1,071,770 in roulette out of a drop of \$3,945,341 (27%) \$388,191 in big six out of a drop \$710,860 (55%) and \$509,265 in baccarat out of a drop of \$3,258,159 (16%). The total for table games was \$9,582,269 out of a drop of \$55,330,855 (17%).

In slot play, the casino won \$179,484 from nickel machines, out of a handle of \$1,253,949 (14%); \$2,737,717 from quarter machines out of a handle of \$17,407,134 (16%); \$2,319,245 from dollar machines out of a handle of \$18,834,927 (12%). The total for slots was \$5,236,446 out of a handle of \$37,496,010.



The Casino Revenue Fund added \$1,090,302 during January as the result of a "win" of \$13,628,774 reported by Resorts International Casino Hotel during the first month of 1979.

Since the lone casino in Atlantic City opened last May 26, the total in the Casino Revenue Fund has increased to \$11,784,178. This is eight per cent of of Resorts International's total win of \$147,702,219.

The Legislature has decided to temporarily use the money in the Casino Revenue Fund to help pay for the prescription drug program for senior citizens.

A significant drop is noted in the January figures as far as the win percentage by the casino for blackjack is concerned. It dropped to 10 per cent in January, compared to a range of 15 to 23 per cent in the previous months of the casino's operations. During January, Resorts International reported that many professional card counters were visiting the casino and took steps to prohibit them from playing blackjack after they were identified.

During January, the casino won \$8,343,675 from table games, out of a drop of \$57,090,742. From slot machines, the win was \$5,285,099 out of a handle of \$38,551,742.

The Casino Revenue Fund now stands at \$12,969,748 thanks to a stronger showing at the Resorts International Hotel Casino in February as compared to January.

Casino gross revenues fell to \$13,628,774 in January, but bounced back to \$14,819,620 in February, despite three fewer calendar days. There were no million dollar days at Resorts during February, but on three dates -- Feb. 10, 17 and 18 -- it came very close.

On February 10, the casino's win was \$984,391 and on the Washington's Birthday weekend, the win was \$913,665 on Saturday the 17th and \$837,520 on Sunday the 18th. The last big snowstorm arrived that weekend and many hotel guests were unable to leave the city as scheduled.

The win percentage from blackjack, which dropped to 10 percent in January when the card counter controversy became known, climbed back to 18 percent during February. The win from blackjack was \$4,744,595 out of a drop of \$25,820,905.

Resorts won \$3,001,726 (21%) in craps out of a drop of \$14,134,837; \$892,322 (24%) in roulette out of a drop of \$3,728,495; \$448,980 (56%) in big six out of a drop of \$796,144; and \$566,372 (17%) in baccarat out of a drop of \$3,239,541.

The nickel slots produced a win of \$166,758 out of a handle of \$1,226,205 (14%). The win from quarter slots was \$2,692,226 (15%) out of a handle of \$17,482,272 while the win from dollar slots was \$2,306,641 (12%) out of a handle of \$18,783,485.

The total casino revenue for Resorts since its opening on May 26, 1978 is \$162,121,839. This averages out to \$581,081 per day. The state's average share comes to \$46,487 per day.

Spring arrived early in Atlantic City and the best barometer to use is to check the casino revenue figures for March at Resorts International Hotel, Inc.

During March, Resorts posted a win of \$20,557,806, the best showing since the record of \$23,535,460 was set last August. The total casino win since May 26, 1978 through the end of March is \$182,629,645.

The state's share (eight per cent) goes into the Casino Revenue Fund. It now stands at \$14,610,372.

During March, the average daily win to the casino was \$663,155, an increase of 25% over the previous month.

The average figures for the 10 months and six days of operation show the casino's daily win at \$589,128 and the state's daily share at \$47,130.

Resorts won a million dollars on March 17 (\$1,007,233) and came very close on two other occasions during the month.

Resorts reported a win of \$12,285,871 from all table games, out of a drop of \$65,708,753 (19%). The slot machines produced a win of \$8,271,935 out of a handle of \$59,525,448 (14%).

From table games, Resorts won \$6,222,558 at blackjack out of a drop of \$35,861,443 (17%); in craps the win was \$3,544,139 out of a drop of \$19,534,172 (18%); in roulette the win was \$1,139,373 out of a drop of \$4,633,605 (25%); in big six the win was \$642,422 out of a drop of \$1,120,152 (57%); and in baccarat the win was \$737,379 out of a drop of \$4,559,381 (16%).

Nickel slots produced a win of \$200,525 out of a handle of \$1,531,660 (13%). Quarter slots produced a win of \$4,463,419 out of a handle of \$28,586,195 (16%). Dollar slots showed a win of \$3,607,991 out of a handle of \$29,407,593 (12%).

Resorts International Hotel, Inc., posted its second best month in April, boosting its gross casino revenue to \$204,042,422 and the state's eight per cent share to \$16,323,393.

The money in the Casino Revenue Fund is to be used to help senior citizens and disabled persons in the form of property tax and utility bill relief, but the Legislature has not as yet worked out the mechanics for distributing these funds. However, some of the money is being used temporarily to help fund the prescription drug program for senior citizens.

The New Jersey Casino Control Commission reported today that Resorts International won \$21,412,777 during April. The only month which was better since the casino opened last May 26, was August, when Resorts won \$23,535,460.

During April, the average win was \$713,759, and last month's good showing raised the average daily win figure back over \$600,000 (to \$600,124) for the 11 months and six days of operation of the state's first casino.

Resorts reported a win of \$12,804,809 from all table games, out of a drop of \$61,240,603 (21%). From slot machines, the win was \$8,607,968 out of a total handle of \$61,808,608 (14%).

In blackjack, Resorts won \$6,422,012 out of a drop of \$31,720,604 (20%). In craps, the win was \$3,675,063 out of a drop of \$19,748,329 (19%). Roulette play produced a win of \$1,243,645 out of a drop of \$4,572,606 (27%). In bix six, the win was \$614,866 out of a drop of \$1,095,764 (56%) and in baccarat, the win was \$849,223 out of a drop of \$4,112,300 (21%).

Nickel slots produced a win of \$182,172 out of a handle of \$1,455,737 (13%). The win from twenty five cent slots was \$4,735,344 out of a handle of \$30,499,184 (16%) while dollar slots produced a win of \$3,690,452 out of a handle of \$29,853,687 (12%).

During April, the Commission conducted a test period at the casino with the cooperation of Resorts International, under which the minimum wagers at blackjack, craps and roulette tables were based on a percentage of authorized tables instead of open tables.

After one year and six days of operation, the Resorts International Hotel Casino has produced almost \$18 million for the State's Casino Revenue Fund.

During that period the casino grossed \$224,566,620 and the State's eight per cent share came to \$17,965,330.

The Legislature is expected to decide later this year on how that money should be distributed to senior citizens and disabled persons. A portion of the money is now being used to help pay for the prescription drug program for senior citizens in New Jersey.

The New Jersey Casino Control Commission reported today that Resorts International grossed \$20,524,198 in casino revenues during May. This was slightly down from the April figure of \$21.4 million.

The average daily win since the casino opened on May 26, 1978 is \$605,300 and the average daily share to the state is \$48,424.

During May, Resorts won \$11,491,979 from table games out of a total drop of \$62,939,656 (18%). From the slot machines, Resorts won \$9,032,219 out of a total handle of \$64,947,132 (14%).

In blackjack, Resorts won \$5,691,279 in May out of a drop of \$33,981,837 (17%). In craps, the win was \$3,586,907 out of a drop of \$19,835,989 (18%). In roulette, the win was \$1,123,748 out of \$4,413,935 (25%). In big six, the win was \$483,759 out of a drop of \$872,537 (55%), while in baccarat the win was \$606,286 out of a drop of \$3,835,358 (16%).

In slot play, the nickel machine produced a win of \$193,535 out of a handle of \$1,148,001 (13%); the quarter machines won \$5,023,499 out of \$32,179,860 (16%) and the dollar machines won \$3,815,185 out of \$31,287,271 (12%).

The opening of the Boardwalk Regency, the second Atlantic City casino, helped boost the New Jersey Casino Revenue Fund close to the \$20 million mark. The exact total through the end of June is \$19,793,003.

Resorts International posted its second best month in June with a win of \$22,024,825.

Boardwalk Regency was open for five days in June on a limited basis and reported a win of \$821,090. This includes the slot machine play during the play nights which preceeded the opening.

The best month for Resorts came in August, 1978, when the casino won \$23,535,460.

Boardwalk Regency was permitted to open its casino on June 26, 1979, with only 44 of 95 tables and 943 of 1,431 slots open for play. The hours of casino operation were limited to one shift, 5 p.m. to 2 a.m.

These restrictions will stay in place until a sufficient number of licensed employees are available. The Casino Control Commission is scheduled to meet again on July 11 and may consider amending the Certificate of Operation if a sufficient number of additional employees are licensed.

The Boardwalk Regency Casino's credit department is not operating at the present time due to the lack of licensed personnel.

During June, Resorts won \$12,532,104 at table games and \$9,492,721 from the slot machines. Boardwalk Regency, during its five nights of operation, won \$247,541 from table games and \$573,549 from the slot machines.

The Casino Revenue Fund, helped by the opening of Atlantic City's second casino, now stands at \$22,622,196. A portion of this money has been used to help finance the prescription drug program for senior citizens.

(The State Senate is expected to take up a bill today which would start the Lifeline program by using money from the Casino Revenue Fund to pay for utility bill credits, up to \$100).

Resorts International reported its best month since it opened its casino doors in May, 1978. During July, Resorts won \$24,876,788. This averages out to \$802,477 per day and tops the previous monthly high total of \$23,535,460, registered in August, 1978.

The Boardwalk Regency, which opened its casino doors on June 26, recorded a July win of \$10,563,148, a daily average of \$340,746. The Boardwalk Regency had opened in June with limited hours (9 per day) and with about half of the gaming tables and two-thirds of the slot machines in operation. On July 13, the Commission increased the hours to full operation and the tables to 50, out of a possible 95. On August 4, all 95 tables and 1,431 slot machines were permitted to be operational. The use of credit play is still prohibited at Boardwalk Regency, until additional employees are licensed.

Resorts International has 127 tables and 1,354 slot machines in operation.

The two casinos in Atlantic City won a total of \$42.2 million during the month of August, Joseph P. Lordi, Chairman of the New Jersey Casino Control Commission, reported today. The Casino Revenue Fund now stands at \$25,993,469.

Resorts International reported its second best month in its history with a total of \$23,825,295. The only month which was better for Resorts was July when the "win" was \$24.8 million.

Boardwalk Regency, operated by Caesars World, posted a "win" of \$18,440,594 during August. Boardwalk Regency opened its casino doors on June 26 on a limited basis and was permitted by the Commission to go to full operation as of August 4.

Since its opening on May 26, 1978, Resorts International has won a total of \$295,093,528. This includes a deduction of \$650,000 for bad debts over the 15 months of operation. This is only a small fraction of the four per cent permitted under the Casino Control Act.

During the 463 days Resorts was open, through August 31, the average daily win was \$637,351. During August, the daily average was \$768,558.

Boardwalk Regency's total earnings to date are \$29,824,833. This averages out to \$445,147 per day over the 67 days. The August average was \$594,858.

During August, Resorts won \$12.3 million at table games, out of a drop of \$64 million. From the slot machines, Resorts won \$11.4 million out of a handle of \$82.7 million. Boardwalk Regency won \$10.09 million from the tables out of a drop of \$62 million and \$8.3 million from the slots out of a handle of \$64.3 million.

The Casino Revenue Fund, the dedicated fund to aid eligible senior citizens and disabled persons, now stands at \$33,443,780, according to an announcement today from Joseph P. Lordi, Chairman of the New Jersey Casino Control Commission.

The amount in the Revenue Fund jumped almost \$7.5 million over the totals as of last month. The reason for the large increase is that Governor Byrne signed the legislation, increasing the tax on casinos to 12 per cent, while two or three are in operation. This tax was retroactive to July 1, 1979.

When the fourth casino opens, the tax will drop to 10 per cent and when the fifth casino opens, it will revert to eight per cent.

During September, the two casinos, Resorts International and Boardwalk Regency, won more than \$36 million. Resorts posted a monthly win total of \$19,558,839, a daily average of \$651,961. Boardwalk Regency won \$16,658,477, a daily average of \$555,282.

Since it opened its casino doors on May 26, 1978, Resorts has won \$314.6 million, averaging out to \$638,240 for the 493 days through the end of September.

Boardwalk Regency has been open 97 days from June 26, 1979 through September 30, 1979, winning a total of \$46.4 million, averaging to \$479,209 a day.

During September, the two casinos were very close at winning at the table games, \$10.3 million for Resorts and \$10.1 million for Boardwalk Regency. Resorts did better at the slot machines, winning \$9.2 million, against \$6.4 million for Boardwalk Regency.

The two operating casinos in Atlantic City topped the \$30 million mark for combined gross casino revenue in October for the fourth consecutive month.

Resorts International won \$18,311,317 during the month, while Boardwalk Regency reported casino winnings of \$14,911,724.

The State of New Jersey collected \$3.9 million in October, bringing the Casino Revenue Fund total to \$37.4 million since casino gaming began in New Jersey in May, 1978. The Casino Revenue Fund aids eligible senior citizens and disabled persons in the form of utility bill relief. In addition, some funds from this account go into the general fund to free other money for the prescription drug program for the same eligible senior citizens and disabled persons.

During October, Resorts International deducted \$199,163 for uncollectible patron checks. The daily average win for Resorts was \$584,263, compared to \$481,023 for the Boardwalk Regency, a slightly smaller casino.

The total to date show that Resorts International has won \$332.7 million during the 524 days it has been open, for a daily average of \$634,924. Boardwalk Regency has won \$61.3 million during 128 days, for a daily average of \$478,906.

Boardwalk Regency has been authorized by the New Jersey Casino Control Commission to operate 95 gaming tables and 1,431 slot machines. Resorts International has 127 tables and 1,640 slots.

The Boardwalk Regency reported casino gross earnings of \$15,820,889 during November, while Resorts International posted a casino win of \$18,226,073.

The Regency figure was approximately \$900,000 higher than the previous month. The Resorts total was approximately \$85,000 less than in October.

The daily averages for both casinos were higher in November because of one less day than October. The daily average win in November for Resorts was \$607,536, while the Regency daily win was \$527,363.

The Regency's total casino gross revenue for 1979 is \$77,215,924. The average for the 128 days is \$448,708. Resorts has now grossed \$217,766,312 for 1979, plus \$134,073,445 in 1978. The grand total for Resorts is \$351,839,757. From this total, Resorts has subtracted \$866,442 for bad debts, including \$17,279 during November. The adjusted total of \$350,973,315, when divided by the 554 days Resorts has been open through the end of November, produces a daily win of \$635,526.

The Casino Revenue Fund, which will help some 400,000 eligible senior citizens and disabled persons with a \$100 credit on their utility bills this winter, now stands at \$41,809,599. This total includes a recent payment by Resorts of \$319,392, the slot machine excess win calculation. Following a hearing on the interpretation of the 83 per cent

pay back on slot machines, the Casino Control Commission ruled that Resorts did keep \$290,588 which should have been returned to patrons in the period of May to August, 1978. The three casino hotels in Atlantic City reported combined gross casino revenue earnings of \$30.3 million for December. This is almost double the revenue reported by Resorts International for December, 1978.

For the past month, Resorts International reported total casino revenues of \$15,179,436, a daily average of \$489,659. Boardwalk Regency's earnings were \$14,067,299, a daily average of \$453,784. Park Place, which opened its doors officially on December 29, won \$1,251,559 for the three days it was open, plus the five play days in which the slot machines were open to the public.

The totals for 1979 show that Resorts won \$232,945,748. After deducting \$655,908 for uncollected patron checks, Resorts paid taxes to the state on the balance, \$232,289,840.

The Boardwalk Regency was open for 189<sup>days</sup> during the past year. It won \$91,283,223. After deducting \$345,000 for bad debts, the gross casino revenue total is \$90,938,223. The daily averages for the two casinos for the year show Resorts at \$636,410 and Boardwalk Regency at \$481,155.

During 1979, the casinos paid \$34.4 million to the State's Casino Revenue Fund, which was established to aid senior citizens and disabled persons. Some 400,000 eligible senior citizens and disabled persons will receive a \$100 credit on their utility bills this winter. In 1978, Resorts paid \$10.7 million into the fund. Since casino gaming first began in New Jersey, the State has collected \$45.1 million.
