

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Annual Report

Hon. Leon R. Taylor, Speaker of the Assembly and Acting Governor of New Jersey:

DEAR SIR—The New Jersey Public Library Commission respectfully submits the following report of its operations during the past year:

As in the past, its work has been carried on under the serious handicap of lack of room to which reference was made in the last annual report.

The appended table shows 202 libraries with 48 branch libraries, making a total of 250 library centers. Thirty-one libraries listed in the table of 1911 do not appear in the present table. Four of these have been consolidated with larger libraries, and four which were listed separately on former tables are here noted as branch libraries.

As all grange libraries are now separately considered the eight formerly included which were strictly grange libraries, have been omitted. This list being intended to show only libraries directly serving the general public; either in a reference or circulating capacity, fifteen school, society and institutional libraries which appeared on former lists have not been included.

Returns made to the Commission show that these 250 library centers have circulated about 8,000,000 books during the year.

The statistics of circulation are the only ones it is possible to give, but these do not afford an adequate idea of library conditions in the State. Never has there been so general and widespread interest in library affairs among the people as seems to prevail throughout the State at the present time. Libraries are awakening to their wider opportunities and are trying to extend their work in all directions.

The meetings of the New Jersey Library Association have been better attended in the past few years than ever before. Librarians in different parts of the State are joining hands to help each other, and so library interests of New Jersey are becoming a welded whole. Great aid has been rendered to the Commission in its work by individual libraries.

BOOKS BOUGHT AND DISCARDED.

There have been purchased by the Commission during the year 4,983 books and pamphlets, at a cost of \$5,032.37, the average cost per book being \$1.01½. The policy of buying adult fiction and juvenile books in re-enforced binding has been continued, the resulting durability having more than justified the ten per cent. increase in the cost of such books. Books so bound are guaranteed for one year from date of purchase. They have been found on the shelves with binding as sound as when put into circulation, after having been issued forty-eight times, while books not re-enforced have had to be rebound or discarded after fifteen issues. This re-enforcement not only saves rebinding and keeps books in constant circulation, but also saves many books it would otherwise be necessary to discard, as when the sewing breaks while a book is at a traveling library station, pages are often lost before it is returned to the Commission office.

The books discarded during the year numbered 2,734. Many of these books had been in service four or five years and had been rebound in some instances the second time. None of them had been purchased in re-enforced binding. The discarded books were sent to Chester, the Glen Gardner Tuberculosis Sanitarium, Branchville, Phillipsburg, Frenchtown, Pleasant Grove, Naughright, Farmingdale Preventorium, Pittstown, Elmer, Watsessing, Califon, Monmouth Memorial Hospital, Sergeantville, Shiloh, and the Convict Camp.

The net gain to the book collection this year is 2,249 volumes. As 2,050 books were needed to make up forty-one new libraries put into operation, but 199 books were actually added to the stock available for serving stations already established. The working collection for

traveling libraries now numbers 22,761. Five hundred and eighty-five books were rebound, at a cost of \$139.50.

OFFICE WORK.

In addition to the work necessary in selecting, ordering, cataloguing and preparing for circulation the 4,983 books purchased, much labor and time has been devoted to enlarging, rounding out, and indexing the collection of book lists, club and study programs, handbooks, and library aids of various kinds filed in the Commission office for the benefit of the libraries of the State. These programs and aids are in constant demand and form a most valuable part of the Commission equipment. Demands for them come not only from libraries, but from women's clubs, schools, mothers' clubs, and many other organizations. A large number of programs and bibliographies have been made up in answer to requests for such material on subjects which were not among those in the Commission file. Duplicates of these have been filed for future use.

The Commission has co-operated with the Woman's Work Committee of the State Grange in selecting subjects for study and has compiled bibliographies to cover these subjects. Three subjects, with bibliographies, have been sent each quarter by the Woman's Work Committee to the one hundred and thirty-one granges in the State.

The work of aiding libraries, through correspondence, with advice and instruction concerning technical methods, library economy, and administration has shown steady growth. Although this necessitates a large amount of correspondence, many visits are saved, and the Commission is kept in close touch with libraries in the State. The privilege of sending reference questions to be looked up in the State Library is much appreciated, such questions averaging about forty-five a week. This is not to be confused with "special loans," as it refers only to questions that can be answered by correspondence and do not require the sending of books.

The special collections of picture books, poetry, sources for stories and story telling, and comparative editions, have been kept up and have been used at round tables and by libraries with excellent results. In addition to the collections owned by the Commission, sev-

eral picture collections have been borrowed from Newark and loaned to smaller libraries for receptions, anniversaries, children's day, etc.

SPECIAL LOANS.

As special loans, 2,423 books have been sent out. This is by many considered the most valuable work done by the Commission, as it enables the smallest library to supply the needs of its town and is a means of supplying books for serious study and research to people in rural communities. The cost of this work is comparatively small, as the books are borrowed in many instances from larger libraries in this and other States.

TRAVELING LIBRARIES.

The traveling library service has been extended to forty-one new centers, making the total number of stations now served 323. Eight hundred and twenty-four libraries, containing 41,200 books, have been sent out during the year, at a cost of \$624.74 for transportation. The average number of exchanges made by a station during the year is two and one-third. A book circulates four times, on an average, at a station; this gives a circulation of 164,800 from the 323 stations which, added to the circulation through special loans, makes a total of 167,223 for the State. These libraries are stationed in small country stores, private homes, granges, halls, post-offices, and country school houses. The predominant demand is for books of fiction, useful arts, travel and biography. Sixteen of these stations are exclusively for study clubs.

FREE DISTRIBUTION.

A considerable amount of valuable free material has been distributed to libraries in the State during the year. This included the most important of the pamphlet laws issued during the year, New Jersey documents of more than ordinary interest, "Best books of 1912," "Buying list for small libraries," and "Index to Wills, Inventories, etc., in office of Secretary of State," volumes 1 and 2.

ILLUSTRATED LECTURE.

One hundred and twenty-five slides have been collected illustrating the topography, people, industries, and educational agencies of

the State of New Jersey. Statistics and historic facts relating to them and kindred matters have been tabulated as material for a lecture. This lecture was first given at Atlantic City before the New Jersey Library Association, and since then has been in demand not only by libraries but by granges, schools, clubs, etc., and has awakened a great deal of interest in libraries and education. Whenever it is given in one town, calls come from places in the same vicinity asking for the privilege of having it delivered for the benefit of the local library.

LIBRARY EXTENSION.

One hundred and sixty-three visits have been made by the Chairman and Organizers of the Commission, at an expense of \$656.52. Over two-thirds of these visits were made upon the specific requests of librarians, boards of trustees, town councils, and others interested in library development.

Netcong, Hackettstown, Toms River, Cliffside, Oradell, Haworth, Avon, Bradley Beach, Sewaren, South Amboy and Highland Park are new libraries, and Ridgefield Park has re-established its library, the old one having been destroyed by fire over a year ago. The Millville library has been changed from a subscription to a free library and Belmar, Glen Ridge and Verona have become tax-supported.

Eight libraries have been organized, four reorganized, and one partially so. One library has been given one hundred dollars for first purchase of books. Eight granges have started reference collections in their grange halls, and seven new reading circles have been started in rural communities, making a total of sixty-nine such circles started under the supervision of the Commission.

An increasing number of addresses on library extension and books and reading have been given upon request before schools, granges, clubs, library associations, farmers' institutes, teachers' institutes, parents' and teachers' associations, and other audiences.

SUPERVISION OF SCHOOL LIBRARIES.

During the last regular session of the Legislature bills were passed making the Commissioner of Education an ex-officio member of the Commission and transferring the supervision of school

libraries from the Department of Public Instruction to the Commission. An appropriation to cover incidental expenses and the salary of an extra office assistant for one year was asked for. It was intended during this year to work out an efficient system for the development of school libraries and for the closer supervision of those already in existence. The appropriation was not made and the Governor, in consequence, did not sign the bill of transference. Before these bills were introduced, letters outlining the plan and asking for approval and suggestions were sent to every city and county superintendent in the State and to many other teachers and librarians. These caused expressions of general interest and made evident the desire among school men for the carrying out of some such plan. The Organizers of the Commission have talked before teachers at the Warren, Hunterdon, Sussex, Ocean and Burlington county institutes and have found among them the same interest and eagerness for aid in book selection, reading lists, free material, the use of traveling libraries, etc. With its present appropriation the Commission cannot undertake this school work, since its proper development would necessitate the employment of an additional assistant with special qualifications and training, and the crowded and inadequate quarters now occupied by the Commission would seriously hamper such an undertaking. The great need of this work is fully recognized and the Commission is willing and ready to undertake it if the money be provided.

ROUND TABLES.

Round tables for the discussion of library interests have been held in Newark, Burlington, Perth Amboy, Englewood, Hightstown, Summit, Passaic and Plainfield. These meetings have by intention been small and informal. Of the 122 librarians and trustees who attended, 57 had never before been present at a library meeting. The Commission was represented at all but one of these round tables.

BOOKS IN FOREIGN LANGUAGES.

The demand for books and book lists in foreign languages has increased within the past year. The buying of these books has been restricted and not many are sent at any one time to one place. The North American Civic League for Immigrants has made and placed

at the disposal of the Commission lists in all the immigrant languages. These lists, from so authoritative a source, are an invaluable aid.

INSTITUTIONAL LIBRARIES.

Traveling libraries have been sent to the Woman's Reformatory, State Home for Girls, School Department of the State Prison, Rahway Reformatory, the Monmouth, Salem, Ocean and Bergen County jails and the Convict Camp. This department is worthy of the enlargement an added appropriation would make possible.

BULLETIN.

Upon the request of the New Jersey Library Association, the Library Bulletin is now being mailed to each member of the Association, this being one of the privileges of membership. Many people in the State interested in educational work and many outside the State have asked to be put on the mailing list, which now numbers over six hundred. The Commission is indebted to librarians in New Jersey and elsewhere for many contributions which have increased its usefulness.

SUMMER SCHOOL.

The sixth annual session of the New Jersey Summer School and Library Institute is to be held for five weeks, beginning early in June, in the Asbury Park Public Library. The usual course in elementary library science will be given. The last week will be devoted to work with children and will be under the personal direction of Miss Clara W. Hunt, who is in charge of work with children in the Brooklyn Public Library.

The Commission desires to call attention to the excellent service rendered to the State by the Organizers, and to record its appreciation of the good work of the present assistant.


