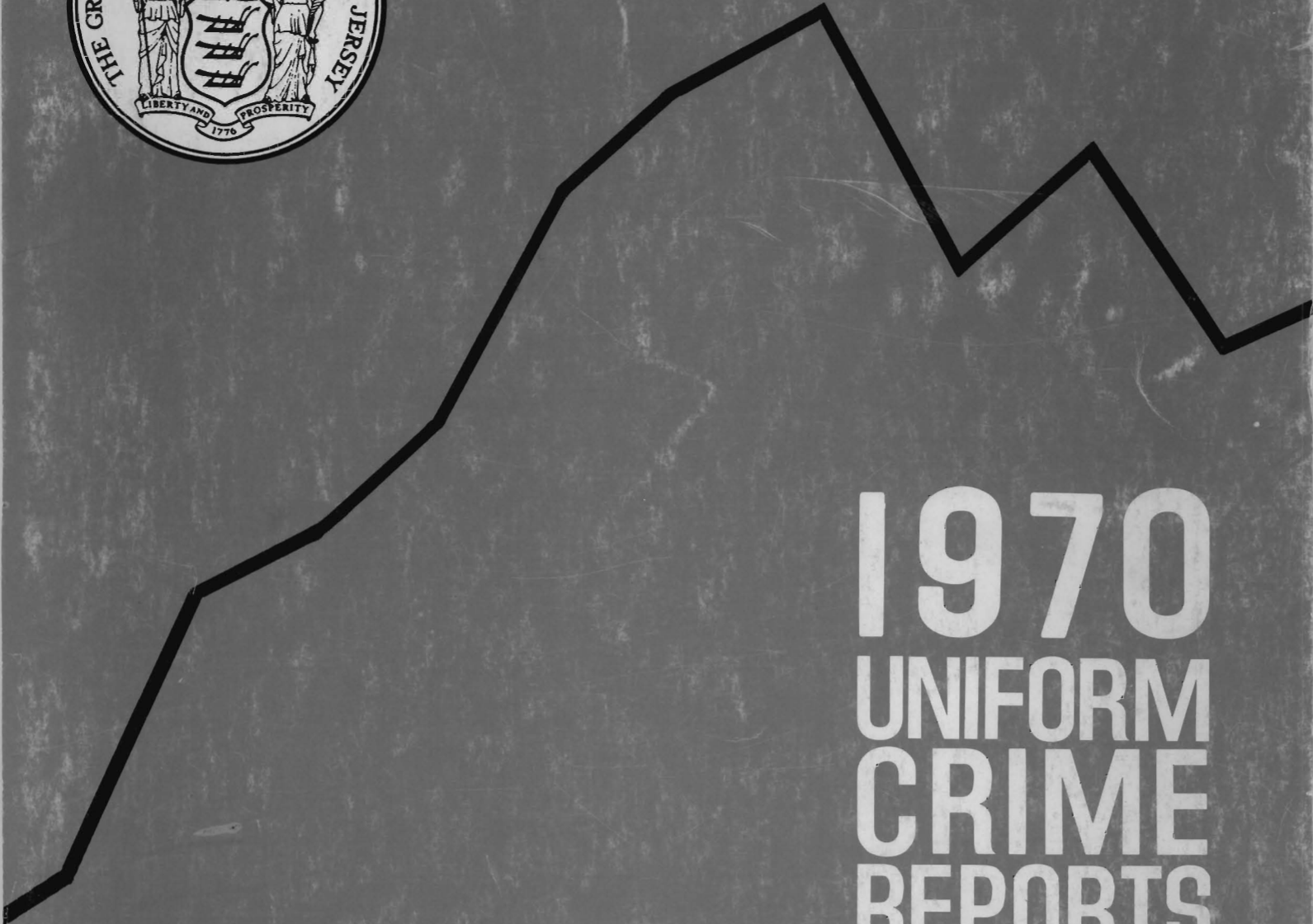

To the Honorable William T. Cahill, Governor of the State of New Jersey; the Honorable Raymond H. Bateman, President of the Senate, and Honorable Members thereof; and the Honorable Barry T. Parker, Speaker of the General Assembly, and Honorable Members thereof:

Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 52:17B-5.5, there is hereby respectfully submitted the fourth annual report on information gathered and collated under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, inaugurated on January 1, 1967, which provides a comprehensive compilation and analysis of crime statistics for New Jersey.

As noted the past three years, New Jersey's effort in this area predated the Report of the President's Commission on Law Enforcement and the Administration of Criminal Justice, which urged the creation of such state systems. FBI officials, in discussing this system with members of our State Police, have described it as a model of its kind.

It would, of course, be impossible to compile this Report without the cooperation of New Jersey's municipal, county, state and other law enforcement agencies, 589 of whom contributed to this effort in 1970. It is with appreciation to these dedicated public servants, and in the interests of more effective law enforcement for all the citizens of New Jersey, that this fourth annual Uniform Crime Report is

# THE NEW JERSEY UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING SYSTEM

## DEFINED

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System involves the uniform compilation, classification, and analysis of crime statistics reported by all police agencies of the state pursuant to guides and regulations prescribed by law.

The statute which established the Uniform Crime Reporting System (N.J.S.A. 52:17 B-5.1 et seq) empowers the Attorney General to collect, gather, assemble, and collate information which would be of assistance in the proper administration of criminal justice. The Attorney General and the New Jersey State Police (the agency designated by the Attorney General to establish the Uniform Crime Reporting System), in an attempt to achieve uniformity with the FBI reporting system and to establish a broad base for the collection of data involving anti-social behavior, and other relevant information with respect thereto, have defined the word "crime" to include acts which technically within our State are not considered crimes. In this reporting system the word "crime" includes some "disorderly persons offenses." It also includes in a category entitled "all other offenses" violations of municipal ordinances. References to the relevant tables which set forth the Class I and Class II offenses contained in this report clearly indicate what is covered.

## PURPOSE

Effective law enforcement requires the coordination of law enforcement activities within and among political subdivisions. Special attention must often be devoted to a selective and concentrated effort both areawide, as well as in terms of a specific pattern and type of criminal behavior. Selective and coordinated enforcement becomes possible only when the type and volume of crime can be analyzed on the basis of accurate information comprehensively developed and systematically collated.

Information revealing the location, frequency, and nature of crime is essential to this purpose. It is for these reasons that New Jersey's Uniform Crime Reporting System was developed.

## DEVELOPMENT

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Law was enacted on May 16, 1966 and became effective January 1, 1967. Responsibility for the establishment, direction, control and supervision of the Uniform Crime Reporting System was assigned to the Attorney General of the State. After passage of the law, the Attorney General, as provided by the statute, designated the New Jersey State Police as the agency to collect, gather, assemble and collate information from the law enforcement jurisdictions within the state.

Prior to the enactment of the law, the New Jersey State Police conducted research and study of crime reporting systems then operational throughout the country. Study results established that adoption of a reporting program paralleling that of the federal system of Uniform Crime Reporting would be the soundest approach toward

development of a state system. The obvious advantage found in the adoption of the federal system included the desirability of having compatible state and federal systems, thereby allowing absorption of state crime data into that at the national level.

The Committee on Uniform Crime Reporting of the New Jersey State Chiefs of Police Association has served the program in an advisory capacity since 1966. The contributions made by this committee have proven invaluable and, indeed, insured the success of the program. This body continues to work closely with the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit of the New Jersey State Police to improve further the quality of reporting and to recommend additional program standards, policies and procedures.

During the development phase of the program a study of the federal and various state systems of crime reporting revealed the importance of a sound internal police records system, if accurate crime statistics were to be forthcoming. Upon recognition of this factor, the State Police revised completely their method of internal reporting in order to meet the requirements of the Federal System of Uniform Crime Reporting. This step not only hastened program development but also proved invaluable throughout the operational phase.

Education of contributors to the program in the areas of mechanics, methods and concepts must be a constant operational requirement, if continued system adherence and valid statistics are to be expected. This vital need is satisfied by the personal contact between the seven state troopers assigned as field representatives to the program, and the contributors to the system.

The difficult and important task of maintaining close liaison is obvious when it is realized that services now are extended by the New Jersey State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit, through its field representatives, to the 589 law enforcement agencies of the state. Although each contributor to the program is supplied with the "Uniform Crime Reporting Guide" describing system procedures and mechanics, personnel changes within reporting departments and program refinements make the educational phase a continuing one.

As an adjunct to the program, the New Jersey State Police has offered its revised method of internal reporting to those police departments who wish to adopt it. In all cases of report adoption and record up-dating, assistance is rendered by the field representative who provides the necessary guidance and instruction. The personal contact between the field representative and the contributor not only serves as a rapid means to resolve areas of report error, but also provides the opportunity to discuss other areas of mutual interest, thus providing an additional communication link between municipal, county and state law enforcement agencies.

## PROGRAM EVALUATION

The scope of mandatory crime reporting in New Jersey extends far beyond the stated purpose of the initial program. The compilation and publication of an annual report, which identifies and offers analysis of the extent

and nature of crime on a state, regional, county and municipal level, may be considered an end in itself. However, practical application of such data must be made before the program can be judged substantive.

Police executives throughout the state are making increased use of this data in administrative, planning and operational determinations for their respective jurisdictions. During 1970, the State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit rendered operational assistance to municipal police agencies by providing individual analysis of statistics as they related to specific crime problems and for use in identifying necessary police manpower and equipment needs. Program requirements have also increased police efficiency in the areas of reporting and record keeping. Examples of program application, as discussed here, aid police in their day to day operations and contribute toward the constant effort of upgrading the quality of police services in the community.

The State Law Enforcement Planning Agency, which was established in August of 1968 to conform with the provisions of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968, has the responsibility of improving law enforcement throughout the state. Since its inception, in all of its determinations as to application of allocated funds, this agency has used analyzed crime data obtained through the Uniform Crime Reporting program. The establishment of crime rates on regional, county and municipal levels with identification of specific crime problems allows the agency to construct priorities, formulate plans and implement these plans to the benefit of the state and all units of local government. This administrative application of such crime data illustrates the far reaching effect the program has on all efforts to combat crime in the state.

The New Jersey National Crime Information Center Terminal (NCIC) maintained by the State Police at West Trenton, links law enforcement of the state with a computerized nationwide index of crime and criminals in Federal Bureau of Investigation headquarters, Washington, D.C. This service is rendered to the police agencies of the state in the interests of increasing police efficiency in dealing with the mobility factor of crime.

A statewide computerized law enforcement information system for New Jersey is now in the final stage of development. Upon completion, this system will interface with other regional systems and the National Crime Information Center in Washington, D.C., thus making state, regional and national layers of data concerning crime and the criminal rapidly available to the police of the state. While such an information system is indeed desirable and necessary, it must be stated that successful interchange of information is based on common crime classifications, definitions and data elements. These vital components have already been formulated through the uniform classifications and definitions found in the Uniform Crime Reporting Program. The need for comprehensive arrest records and court dispositions has long been recognized in law enforcement. Such information is necessary to identify recidivists, and evaluate the effectiveness of the actions of police, courts and other agencies of criminal justice.

Recognition of this need in New Jersey led to a comprehensive study of existing methods of collecting

and analyzing data pertaining to persons entering the criminal justice system by arrest. Study results disclosed that pertinent data pertaining to persons arrested was fragmented and, in many cases, insufficient to serve the needs of police, courts, correction and rehabilitation agencies. The positive identification of a person charged with a criminal offense and his subsequent experience within the criminal justice system is vital to any effort in measuring the effectiveness of those agencies which comprise that system.

A coordinated effort by the Attorney General, Administrative Director of the Courts and a State Police Crime Study Committee established the Court Disposition Reporting Program, whereby all data pertaining to persons charged could be collected, collated, analyzed and rapidly disseminated to the various law enforcement agencies concerned. The State Police was given legislative responsibility for program administration and, in practice, functions in conjunction with the Administrative Director of the Courts.

Program responsibility with respect to police agencies lies in the identification of a defendant through fingerprinting and submission of other pertinent data at the time of arrest. Fingerprints are submitted to the State Bureau of Identification for purposes of positive identification and search for prior record. Other defendant data is returned to the court of jurisdiction for program submission by the court upon disposition of the charge. Disposition data is furnished by the clerk of each court through which the defendant passes.

County prosecutors provide additional data through the submission of indictment and accusation information as it relates to specific defendants. This process makes possible the documentation of final and interim dispositions, allowing for identification of the defendant's status at every level of criminal justice. In this manner, the program supplies meaningful data to all administrative units of the criminal justice system for use in objective evaluation of existing procedures and planning of more efficient methods of operation where the need exists.

The need for field services to provide guidance and direction to contributors becomes apparent when it is realized that almost 1,200 police prosecutive court and correctional units contribute under the program. This need is satisfied by the personal contact provided by the six field representatives assigned to the Court Disposition Reporting Unit of the State Police. Questions regarding program procedures and mechanics are resolved at each level of submission, thus insuring the accuracy of data submitted.

The Court Disposition Reporting System provides offender tracking capabilities necessary for full participation in the soon to be implemented National Crime Information Center Computerized Criminal History (CCH) File. State Police personnel have had an active role in the design of this file.

Criminal history information collected through Court Disposition Reporting also provides the base data for a system of offender-based transactional statistics currently under development. These statistics will provide meaningful information to administrative units, such as, procedures, offender fall-out and recidivism. Statistical analysis should provide insight to functional "problems".

The increased awareness for proper in-pur of identification/disposition information now provides a comprehensive data base for use by all contributors. This, combined with improved methods of dissemination will provide a more efficient and rapid exchange of meaningful information between the police, prosecutors, courts, and correctional agencies of this state.

The Court Disposition Reporting System has gained national recognition and, tailored to meet the specific needs, is in the process of being implemented in the states of Michigan and Florida.

Crime related programs designed to serve law enforcement and increase the overall efficiency of the criminal justice system in the state require extensive planning and coordination. The State Chiefs' Association has rendered valuable assistance in these areas, thereby contributing toward the development of the National Crime Information Center System and the Court Disposition Reporting Program, in addition to their continuing status in the Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

Since 1967 many states have studied the New Jersey system for adoption within their respective states. Five of these, presently have ongoing programs based on the New Jersey system and many more of the remaining states are in the process of implementing similar programs.

The element of compatibility of crime statistics between state and federal programs is vital, and evaluation must include consideration of the degree of that compatibility. The Uniform Crime Reporting Unit of the State Police has worked closely with the members of the Federal Bureau of Investigation who administer the National Uniform Crime Reporting Program. Invaluable aid and assistance has been given by the FBI which resulted in the New Jersey program being totally compatible with that of the national program. This compatibility allows absorption of state crime data into the national system without lengthy and costly conversion processes.

On January 1, 1969, the FBI, who have collected National Uniform Crime Reports in the states and counties since 1930, eliminated the direct collection of National Uniform Crime Reports from the police of New Jersey. This procedure change followed a two-year evaluation of the New Jersey program by the FBI and resulted in an agreement wherein uniform crime reports for each municipality of the state are now being submitted to the national program by the State Police. This working relationship, which was coordinated through the Chiefs of Police Association, State Police and the FBI, is a direct result of the interest and cooperation of the law enforcement agencies of the state in the Uniform Crime Reporting program.

#### **FACTORS RELATED TO CRIME**

It has long been noted there are numerous factors, environmental and others, which have an important bearing on the scope and intensity of crime. As an adjunct to the statistical compilation and analysis of crime reported herein, special attention is devoted to certain of these factors.

To understand further the nature and scope of crime in various sections of the state, a section entitled "Profiles of

Incorporated Municipalities in New Jersey" appears in this publication as it did in the first annual report of 1967. The profile information set forth in the areas of population, density rates, population growth since 1960, all relate to the year 1970, as do the urban, suburban, rural characterizations, given land areas and industrial populations.

Factors considered within profiles are those which are out of police control, but which may affect a community's crime rate and which may vary from community to community. The presence of these factors are noted in order that the resulting crime statistics may be reviewed in a more fair and equitable manner. The effect of these factors on a community's crime rate is not easily determined, but they are set forth for the purpose of alerting the reader to their existence in varying degrees in all New Jersey communities.

#### **REFINEMENT OF THE SYSTEM**

The collection of meaningful data to supplement that which is normally collected is a vital element of the system. This supplemental information regarding crime and the criminal enters the system by way of special surveys and samplings. Periodic collection of such information enables better identification of specific crime problems and those factors which contribute to them. Analysis of refined information and dissemination to contributors provides additional intelligence upon which more effective police action can be based.

Special statewide surveys taken in previous years have dealt with the important mobility factor of crime and the specific offense of robbery. The results of the mobility study served as an indicator of the effect the criminal mobility can have on the crime experience of the community and the contribution it makes toward police problems in the control of crime. Robbery analysis, based on that special survey, better identified the nature of the crime, its impact on society and the robbery perpetrator.

The collection of refined information relative to crime was continued in 1969 through a one month "Special Auto Theft Survey" conducted in August of that year. The auto theft problem, although not unique to New Jersey, has grown to major proportions and its continuing growth suggests serious consequences for the individual and the community.

A statewide arrest survey on the vital issue of "Drug Abuse and Crime in New Jersey" was conducted during the month of August, 1970. For the first time a meaningful correlation was established between these two major problems. Further survey data and resulting analysis are contained elsewhere in this report.

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program of New Jersey, in its fifth year of operation, is now recognized as an effective vehicle to increase the efficiency of police operations in every municipality of the state. The System was originally designed to fulfill the need for accurate crime statistics for use in police administration, planning and operations. In its current status it does answer these needs to a great degree, but has not yet reached full potential as an operational tool.

On July 15, 1970, the New Jersey State Police, Uniform Crime Reporting Unit, through the New Jersey Law Enforcement Planning Agency, was awarded a

\$30,000 Discretionary Grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, U.S. Department of Justice. The funds are for the purpose of assisting in the expansion of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

Based on the current Uniform Crime Reports submitted by the police departments throughout the state, a monthly "feedback" report will be disseminated to each contributor to the program. This "feedback" report will present an accurate account of the status of crime in each municipality of the state. The report will contain information as to the type and time of criminal operations and crime targets, as well as the volume and trend of crime within each municipality. In addition to comparing the current month with the same month of last year, further analysis will be done for a current cumulative monthly total compared to the same period of last year. A trend for two prior years within the same crime categories will also be established.

On January 1, 1971, a six month Pilot Program involving sixty-eight municipalities with a population of 25,000 or more, will be undertaken. Upon the success of this Pilot Program, the full operation involving all municipalities in New Jersey will commence.

In the interest of satisfying a national, as well as a state need for uniformity, completeness, and accuracy in crime statistics, every report submitted under the system is prepared in triplicate by the contributor. One copy is retained by the contributor and the remaining copies are submitted to the State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit which in turn forwards a copy to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for inclusion in the National Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

Statistical comparisons set forth in this publication relate to that crime data collected in the state during the years 1967 through 1970. These comparisons are shown in an attempt to measure the extent, fluctuation and distribution of serious crime in New Jersey. The New Jersey system is based on 100 percent reporting coverage and, therefore, not only projects a crime picture for the entire state but, inclusion in the national program, makes a valuable contribution to the measurement of crime in the country as well.

## OBJECTIVES

Uniform Crime Reporting in New Jersey, as a program parallel to the National Uniform Crime Reporting System, sets forth objectives similar to those of the federal program. Basically, the System was designed to fulfill the need for accurate crime statistics for use in police administration, planning and operations. Additionally, the Program provides the public with information regarding general statewide crime conditions as well as the documentation of crime data for students of the criminal process.

The attainment of these objectives is accomplished by the following program procedures:

- (1) An attempt is made to measure the extent, fluctuation and distribution of serious crime in the state through the use of a Crime Index consisting of seven selected offenses reported to police or coming directly to their attention.
- (2) The total volume of all types of criminal offenses is compiled as they become known by police arrests.

- (3) Since the above are also measures of law enforcement activity, related data are collected to demonstrate the effectiveness of enforcement activities, available police strength, and significant factors involved in crime.

## COLLECTION OF CRIME DATA

As required by statute, all law enforcement agencies in the state submit crime reports to the program. During the year 1970, offense and related supplementary information, as well as arrest and disposition data, were received from 446 organized municipal police departments, 82 special part-time municipal police departments and the New Jersey State Police who provided the necessary information for the 39 municipalities without local police services.

In addition to the above agencies, arrest and disposition data were received from the state's 21 county prosecutors' and sheriffs' offices, two county police departments and eight county park police departments. In order to incorporate all New Jersey law enforcement under the system, the following state agencies with law enforcement responsibilities were included: New Jersey Marine Patrol, Division of Fish and Game, Division of Motor Vehicles, Division of Alcoholic Beverage Control, Division of Weights and Measures, Division of Shell Fisheries, and the Bureau of Parks and Forest Fire Service. This amounts to 589 enforcement agencies reporting.

## METHOD

Reported offenses are related to the municipality in which they occur, rather than to the agency which may investigate, arrest or otherwise in some manner, dispose of the case. The clearance, in every case, is attributed to the municipality in which the offense occurred, even though the arresting agency may not be the department originally reporting the offense. Each contributing agency is responsible for compiling its own reports. The Uniform Crime Reporting Guide, which is supplied to all contributors, outlines reporting procedures in detail and is complete with examples and illustrations. Field Representatives provide additional instruction and clarification when required.

Municipal law enforcement agencies report the number of known offenses according to the following categories:

- (1) Homicide (Murder, Manslaughter and Accidental Death)
- (2) Forcible Rape
- (3) Robbery
- (4) Assault
- (5) Breaking and Entering
- (6) Larceny-Theft
- (7) Auto Theft

This count is determined from a record of all criminal complaints received by the police from victims or other sources or discovered by the police during their operations. Complaints determined by police investigation to be unfounded are eliminated from this count. The number of "offenses known" in each crime category is reported without regard to whether anyone is arrested, stolen property is recovered, local prosecutive policy, or any

other consideration. Municipal law enforcement agencies also report the total number of these crimes cleared by arrest. A separate category is made for crimes cleared by the arrest of persons under 18 years of age. Certain other analytical data pertaining to specific crime categories are also reported, including, for example, total adult and juvenile arrests made during the month.

Annual report forms contain data such as the number of persons arrested for all criminal offenses with respect to age, sex and race of the offender, as well as an accounting of persons formally charged, their bail data, and dispositions. Police employee data are also collected annually, including the number of police killed and assaulted.

In summary, the presentation of this report, "Crime in New Jersey," reflects the compilation of the seven serious "offenses known to police," arrests of persons under 18 years of age and 18 years of age and over, and the ultimate disposition of those persons charged. This data is then related to the State of New Jersey as a whole, by population groups, designated crime reporting regions of the state, individual counties and, with respect to offense occurrence, to the municipality.

#### VERIFICATION PROCESSES

An obvious concern in the collection of crime statistics from 589 enforcement agencies throughout the state is the uniformity of data received. Program aids such as guides and instructions do not necessarily guarantee the accuracy and correctness of the reports submitted by the contributors. Additional controls are therefore necessary.

Each report received by the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit is recorded and examined for mathematical accuracy and, possibly more important, for reasonableness as to interpretation of offense classifications. Fluctuations from levels established by previous reports submitted by the contributor become subject of inquiry as to reason for variations. Improper classification, changes in reporting procedures or actual change are identified in this manner. Errors of a minor nature are corrected by direct telephone contact with the contributors, while all other errors are resolved by a personal visit by a field representative to the reporting agency. These personal contacts are invaluable to the accuracy of the system. Field representatives are engaged in a constant educational effort and, as such, provide a vital link between the program and the reporter.

During 1970, field representatives made 3,900 personal contacts for field corrections, answered requests for reporting assistance, clarification of "feedback" information. A Uniform Crime Reporting orientation lecture is presented to each class of municipal police officers attending the Municipal Police Academy at Sea Girt.

#### CLASSIFICATION OF OFFENSES

Uniformity in reporting under the New Jersey system is based upon the proper classification of offenses by police. The adoption of the federal system of reporting included the utilization of the offense classifications of that system. Law enforcement in this state has made accurate application of those classifications in the reports submitted to the program.

In view of the need for compatibility with the federal

system, "offenses" under the program are not distinguished by designation of "high misdemeanors," violations of the Disorderly Persons Act or municipal ordinances. The explanation of offense classifications may vary slightly with those employed at the federal level because the language used is familiar to law enforcement in this state. However, the major categories of offense classification remain the same as those employed nationally.

#### OFFENSE CLASSIFICATIONS

- (1) Homicide
  - 1a. Murder — The unlawful killing of a human being with malice aforethought.  
General rule — Any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault or commission of a crime.
  - 1b. Manslaughter — The unlawful killing of a human being, by another, without malice aforethought.  
General rule — The killing may result from the commission of an unlawful act or from a lawful act performed with gross negligence. Traffic deaths may be classified as such when due to gross negligence of someone other than the victim.
  - 1c. Accidental Death—Non traffic—The death of a person resulting from his own gross negligence, mishap, or the negligence of another not sufficient in degree to classify the act as manslaughter.  
General rule—Any death *not* resulting from murder, manslaughter, suicide or natural causes is classified as accidental. Deaths resulting from traffic accidents on public trafficways are excluded.
- (2) Forcible Rape
  - 2a. Rape by force—The carnal knowledge of a female forcible against her will. General rule—Forcible rape of a female, but excluding carnal abuse (Statutory Rape) or other sex offenses.
  - 2b. Assault to rape—Attempts—All assaults and attempts to rape.
- (3) Robbery—The felonious and forcible taking of the property of another, against his will, by violence or by putting him in fear. Includes all attempts.  
General rule—Robbery differs from larceny in that it is aggravated by the element of force or the threat or force.
  - 3a. Armed Robbery—Any weapon—Any object so employed as to constitute force or the threat of force is to be considered a weapon. This includes firearms, knives, clubs, brass knuckles, blackjacks, broken bottles, acid, explosives, etc. Also cases involving possible pretended weapons or when the weapon is not seen by the victim, but the robber claims to have it with him, constitutes armed robbery due to instilling fear.
  - 3b. Strong Armed—No weapon—Includes muggings and similar offenses where no weapon is used, but strong arm tactics are employed to deprive the victim of his property. This is

limited to hands, fists, feet, etc. As in armed robbery, all attempts are included.

- (4) Assaults—An assault is an attempt or offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do physical injury to another.

General rule—All assaults will be classified in the following categories, excluding assaults with intent to rob or rape.

- 4a. Gun—All assaults and attempted assaults involving the use of any type of firearms. (Revolvers, automatic pistols, shotguns, zip guns, rifles, pellet guns, etc.)
- 4b. Knife or cutting instrument—All assaults and attempted assaults involving the use of cutting or stabbing objects. (Knife, razor, hatchet, axe, cleaver, scissors, glass, broken bottle, dagger, ice pick, etc.)
- 4c. Other dangerous weapon—All assaults or attempted assaults when any other object or thing is used as a weapon. (Clubs, bricks, pick handles, bottles, explosives, acid, lye, poison, scalding water and cases of attempted drownings, burnings, etc.)
- 4d. Hands, fists, feet, etc.—Atrocious—Assaults which are of an atrocious nature when hands, fists, feet, etc. are used. To be classified as atrocious assault, the attack must result in serious personal injury.
- (5) Breaking and Entering—Unlawful entry or attempted forcible entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny.  
General rule—Any unlawful entry or attempted forcible entry of any dwelling, house, attached structure, public building, shop, office, factory, store house, apartment, house trailer, warehouse, mill, barn, other building, ship or railroad car.  
Note: For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, breaking, entering and larceny are classified only as breaking and entering, the larceny is excluded. Breaking and entering of a motor vehicle is classified as larceny.
- 5a. Forcible entry—All offenses where force of any kind is used to enter unlawfully a locked structure, with intent to steal or commit a felony. This includes entry by use of a master key, celluloid or other device that leaves no outward mark but is used to open a lock. Concealment inside a building, followed by the breaking out of the structure is also included.
- 5b. Unlawful entry—No force—Any unlawful entry without any evidence of forcible entry.
- 5c. Attempted forcible entry—When determined that forcible entry has been attempted.
- (6) Larceny Theft (Except auto theft)—The unlawful taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership.  
General rule—All larcenies and thefts resulting from pocket-picking, purse snatching, shop lifting, larceny from auto, larcenies of auto parts and accessories, theft of bicycles, larcenies from buildings,

and from coin operated machines. Any theft that is not a robbery or the result of breaking and entering is included. Embezzlement, larceny by bailee, frauds or bad check cases are excluded.

- (7) Auto theft—The larceny or attempted larceny of a motor vehicle.  
General rule—Thefts and attempted thefts of a motor vehicle. This includes all vehicles which can be registered as a motor vehicle in this state. Excludes where there is a lawful access to the vehicle, such as a family situation or unauthorized use by others with lawful access to the vehicle. (Chauffeur, employees, etc.)
- (8) Other assaults—Not atrocious—Assaults and attempted assaults which are not of an atrocious nature and are simple and minor in nature.
- (9) Arson—Willful or malicious burning with intent to defraud. Include attempts.
- (10) Forgery and counterfeiting—Making, altering, uttering, or possessing or attempts to make, alter, utter or possess with intent to defraud. Anything false which is made to appear true.
- (11) Fraud—Fraudulent conversion of another's money or property by false pretenses. Includes bad checks, except forgery and counterfeiting.
- (12) Embezzlement—Misappropriation or misapplication of money or property in trust to one's care, custody or control.
- (13) Stolen Property—Buying, receiving, possessing—Buying, receiving and possessing stolen property and attempts.
- (14) Malicious Mischief—Willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement or defacement of property without consent of the owner or persons having custody or control.
- (15) Weapon carrying, possessing and etc. — All violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers and attempts.
- (16) Prostitution and Commercialized vice—Sex offenses of a commercialized nature and attempts. Such as prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, procuring or transporting women for immoral purposes.
- (17) Sex offenses — Except forcible rape, prostitution and commercialized vice—Statutory rape, offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like. Also include attempts.
- (18) Narcotic Drug Law — Offenses relating to narcotic drugs, such as unlawful possession, sale or use. Does not include: Failing to register as user or federal offenses.
- (19) Gambling — Promoting, permitting, or engaging in gambling.
- (20) Offenses against family and children — Non support, neglect, desertion, or abuse of family and children.
- (21) Driving under the influence — Driving or operating any motor vehicle while drunk or under the influence of liquor or narcotics.

- (22) Liquor Laws — State or local liquor law violations, except “drunkenness” and “driving under the influence.” Excludes federal violations.
- (23) Drunkenness or intoxication.
- (24) Disorderly conduct — Breach of the peace. (Disorderly persons).
- (25) Failure to give good account — Vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc.
- (26) All other offenses — All violations of state and local laws except classes 1-25.
- (27) Suspicion — Arrest for no specific offense and released without formal charges being placed.
- (28) Curfew and loitering laws (Juveniles) — Offenses relating to juveniles of local curfew or loitering ordinances, where such laws exist.
- (29) Runaways (Juveniles) — Limited to juveniles taken into protective custody under provisions of local statutes as runaways.

## CRIME FACTORS

Statistics gathered under the Uniform Crime Reporting Program are submitted by the law enforcement agencies of New Jersey and project a statewide view of crime. Awareness of the presence of certain crime factors, which may influence the resulting volume and type of statistics presented, is necessary if fair and equitable conclusions are to be drawn. These crime influencing factors are present, to some degree, in every community and their presence affects, in varying degrees, the crime experience of that community. Attempts at comparison of crime figures between communities should not be made without first considering the individual factors present in each community.

Crime, as an outgrowth of society, remains a social problem of grave concern and the police are limited in their role to its suppression and detection. As stated by the President's Commission on Law Enforcement and Administration of Criminal Justice in their report *The Challenge of Crime In A Free Society* — (1967—Page 92) — “But the fact that the police deal daily with crime does not mean that they have unlimited power to prevent it, or reduce it, or deter it. The police did not create and cannot resolve the social conditions that stimulate crime. They did not start and cannot stop the convulsive social changes that are taking place in America. They do not enact the laws that they are required to enforce, nor do they dispose of the criminals they arrest. The police are only one part of the criminal justice system; the criminal justice

system is only one part of the government; and the government is only one part of society. Insofar as crime is a social phenomenon, crime prevention is the responsibility of every part of society. The criminal process is limited to case by case operations, one criminal or one crime at a time.” Set forth below are some of the conditions which will, by type and volume, affect the crime that occurs from place to place:

- Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan area of which it is a part.

- Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex and race.

- Economic status and mores of the population.
- Relative stability of population, including commuters, seasonal, and other transient types.
- Climate, including seasonal weather conditions.
- Educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.

- Effective strength of the police force.

- Standards governing appointments to the police force.

- Policies of the prosecuting officials and the courts.
- Attitude of the public toward law enforcement problems.

- The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.

## STATE, COUNTY AND MUNICIPAL PROFILES

The presentation of state, county and municipal profiles in this section is offered for the purpose of projecting, for the consideration of the reader, a group of recognizable factors which may affect the amount and type of crime that occurs from community to community. Selection of the areas of information to be related to individual municipalities was based on the immediacy and completeness of data available.

Population statistics presented here and throughout this publication, with respect to the 1970 census, population growth since 1960, and given land area in square miles by political subdivision, were obtained from the Division of Planning and Research, Office of Business Economics. Estimated densities for 1970 and character of municipalities by urban, suburban and rural classifications were compiled by the Division of State and Regional Planning, Department of Community Affairs.

The industrial population for 1970, as supplied by the Division of Employment Security, Department of Labor and Industry, represents that employment in the

community covered by the New Jersey Unemployment Compensation Law as of July 1969. Excluded generally are those persons who are self employed, agricultural labor and state, county and municipal employees.

As a result of the 1970 census of population, additional population characteristics were made available for use in this publication. The added factors deal with the age, sex and race of the inhabitants of the state and individual counties. (Table 22)

Certain other socio-economic factors, present in varying degrees in all communities, may have an influence on resulting crime rates. Obvious difficulties in the identification, documentation and measurement of these factors, however, precluded their application in this report.

Those factors presented were listed to affirm their existence within the county and community and to provide a base for consideration in the evaluation of that community's crime experience. (Tables 1 through 21)

## PROFILE OF NEW JERSEY

New Jersey is situated between the major industrial markets of New York and Philadelphia and can be classified as the "Crossroads of the East". The geographic location of the state has been a major factor in its growth and development. The many miles of super-expressway facilities within the state connect New Jersey directly with the neighboring states of New York, Pennsylvania and Delaware. Additionally, New Jersey as a corridor state, accommodates large volumes of traffic from both the eastern and western part of the United States.

The state is politically comprised of 21 counties which contain 567 incorporated municipalities. The 1970 census population figure of 7,168,164 represents an 18 percent increase since 1960. Nationally, New Jersey, although 46th in size, ranks eighth in population and first as the most densely populated state in the country. In addition to this density of 954 persons per square mile, New Jersey still has many miles of rural area or sparsely settled communities. The areas of density show a heavy concentration around the major urban centers and those areas most accessible for commuting.

No more than a decade ago many counties were sparsely populated, but due to many growth factors are now contributing to the 18 percent increase in density, 1970 over 1960. Ocean County, the largest increase at 93 percent since 1960; Sussex County at 57 percent; Morris, 47 percent; Burlington, 44 percent; Somerset, 38 percent; Monmouth, 37 percent; Middlesex, 35 percent; Hunterdon, 29 percent; Gloucester, 28 percent and Cape May County, a 23 percent increase.

Within the counties, more dramatic increases occurred in specific municipalities, as shown in Tables I through 21. The trend of this rapid growth in populations of the suburb and rural areas has resulted in the loss of some city populations. Much of the loss has occurred from urban re-development or renewal programs but to a great degree have been absorbed by the outlying suburbs or rural areas.

The unique image New Jersey presents for consideration is not only the result of the many and varied factors within its own boundaries, but also the complex elements of the megalopolis of which it is a part.

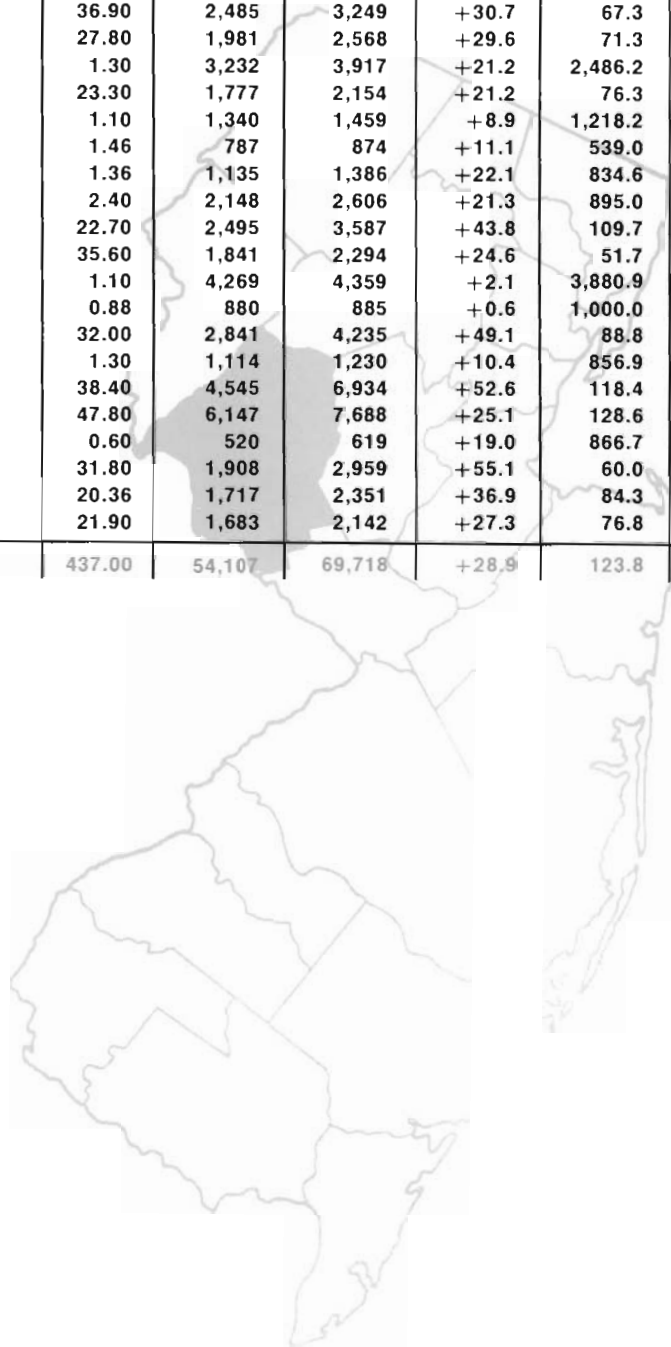

## NEW JERSEY CRIME INDEX—1970

In this section, tabulations presented in tables and charts indicate the extent, fluctuation and distribution of crime for the state as a whole, reporting regions, counties, population groups and individual municipalities. The Crime Index, consisting of seven serious offenses, is used as a measure. Offenses are counted as they become known to law enforcement agencies. Crime classifications used in the index are: murder, forcible rape, robbery, atrocious assault, breaking and entering, larceny (\$50.00 and over) and auto theft.

Although the total number of criminal acts that occur are unknown, those that are reported to police provide the first means of a count. All crimes do not readily come to the attention of police nor are all crimes of sufficient importance to be significant in an index, and further, not all important crimes occur with enough regularity to be meaningful in an index. With these considerations in mind, the above crimes were selected as a group to furnish some measure of the crime problem in New Jersey.

The volume of crime in a state, region, county or municipality is subject to those crime influencing factors set forth elsewhere in this publication. Crime rates are constructed from estimates of current permanent

population. The important transient population factor, although present in every community in varying degrees, cannot be measured in all instances and therefore is not included in the establishment of a crime rate. The existence of this factor, however, should be considered when reviewing the tabulations presented in this section.

The establishment of the base year New Jersey Crime Index for 1967 provided a foundation which allows year to year comparison of like data to be made. Specific areas of comparison presented in this publication are in respect to variances of offense volumes, rates, clearances and related information. Fluctuations in arrest volumes, rates and supplementary arrest information are also included in the tabulations shown.

### CRIME AND POPULATION

Crime rates relate the incidence of crime to population. More specifically, a crime rate should be considered as a count of victims. The risk of victimization arises from crime-population computations and provides a numerical result for consideration. Crime influencing factors, which are complex in nature and exist in varying degrees in all areas, are not incorporated in the determination of a crime rate.

## **1970 CRIME STATISTICS FOR NEW JERSEY**

## STATE OFFENSE DATA

### VOLUME

During 1970, a total of 196,618 Crime Index offenses were reported to law enforcement agencies of New Jersey. In 1967 the Index figure was 139,500, a 41 percent increase when compared to 1970. The crimes in this group represent the most common problem to law enforcement and the municipality. They are serious crimes by their nature, volume or frequency of occurrence. Basically, they can be categorized as violent crimes, such as murder, forcible rape, robbery and atrocious assault, or as crimes of nonviolent nature, such as breaking and entering, larceny \$50 and over in volume, and auto theft. (Tables 23, 24 and Chart 1)

The violent crimes as a group make up over 10 percent of the Crime Index total and rose almost 20 percent since 1969, with murder up almost 11 percent, forcible rape 2 percent, robbery almost 26 percent and atrocious assault a little over 13 percent. Each of the nonviolent crimes also recorded an increase, thereby contributing to the slightly over 11 percent rise in this group of offenses which represent over 89 percent of the Crime Index total. Breaking and entering was up over 9 percent, larceny \$50 and over in value increased almost 16 percent, and auto theft rose over 7 percent. (Table 25, Charts 2 and 3)

It is desirable to point out the percent of distribution of offenses within the Crime Index. Breaking and entering accounted for almost 38 percent of the total index, and over 42 percent of all nonviolent crime. Although breaking and enterings are the most common within the Index, there has been a steady decrease in their involvement since 1967. On the other hand, larceny over \$50 has consistently increased its involvement since 1967. Within the violent crime category, robbery recorded the highest at 59 percent, and over 6 percent of the total Crime Index. Additionally, robbery has steadily increased its involvement since 1967.

### RATES

Crime rates relate the incidence of crime to the resident population. It is a fact that the risk of becoming a victim of crime in New Jersey is increasing and that the growth in the population alone cannot account for these increases. Other factors which may contribute to the volume and type of crime in a given jurisdiction are not incorporated here, but are shown in the profile section of this publication.

The 1970 crime rate was established at 2,742.9 victims for every 100,000 inhabitants. This represents almost a 14 percent increase over 1969 and over a 39 percent increase since 1967.

The rate for the violent crime group was computed at 287 victims for every 100,000 inhabitants, over a 21 percent increase since 1969. Within the violent category, robbery again reflected the greatest involvement of victims, over 169 for every 100,000 residents. The nonviolent crime rate was established at almost 2,456 victims for every 100,000 inhabitants, a 13 percent increase over 1969. Although breaking and entering

within this group continues to contribute the most victims to the overall crime rate, almost 1,041 per 100,000, larceny \$50 and over, recorded the highest single rise for nonviolent crimes over 1969, almost an 18 percent increase.

### CLEARANCES

For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a crime is cleared when police have identified the offender, have evidence to charge him and actually take him into custody. Solutions of crimes are also recorded in exceptional instances when some element beyond police control precludes formal charges against the offender, such as the victims refusal to prosecute or local prosecution is declined because the subject is being prosecuted elsewhere for a crime committed in another jurisdiction. The arrest of one person can clear several crimes or several persons may be arrested in the process of solving one crime.

The police of New Jersey cleared by arrest, 13.6 percent of all Index offenses reported to them in 1970. This clearance rate, when compared to the 15.7 solution rate reported by police in 1967, represents a substantial 13 percent decline in the clearance rate. The 1970 solution rate remains somewhat static when compared to the 1968 and 1969 case solution rate. However, this year represents the first time since the Uniform Crime Reporting Program began, that the solution rate has not decreased from year to year. Over 39 percent of all the violent crimes reported to police in 1970 were solved, comparison with the 1969 clearance rate of 40 percent reveals a slight decrease, but when compared to the almost 50 percent solution rate of 1967, a more severe problem evolves. Almost 11 percent of the nonviolent or property type offenses were solved in 1970. When compared to 1969 little change is noted, but almost a 12 percent decline has been recorded since 1967.

When considering the violent and nonviolent crimes individually in the area of solution rates for 1970, it was determined that police were successful in solving almost 76 percent of the murders, almost 59 percent of the reported forcible rapes, a little over 20 percent of all robberies, almost 68 percent of the atrocious assaults, almost 13 percent of the breaking and enterings which revealed the largest increase in solutions over 1969, a 6 percent increase, over 9 percent of the larcenies \$50 and over were cleared, and over 8 percent of all reported auto thefts.

The fact that the clearance rate for violent crimes as compared to nonviolent crimes is much greater, can be attributed to certain factors. Nonviolent crime volume is much greater than that of violent crime and police investigation is understandably more intense when investigating a violent crime. In addition, the element of confrontation between the victim and perpetrator of violent crimes prompts a witness identification of the perpetrator, thus contributing to the higher rate of solution.

## JUVENILE CLEARANCES

In 1970, almost 37 percent of all Crime Index offenses cleared in New Jersey involved persons under 18 years of age, almost a 9 percent increase over 1969. Since 1967 this means of measuring the degree of criminal involvement for those of the young age group has disclosed over a 17 percent increase.

Almost 17 percent of all violent crime solutions in 1970 involved juveniles under 18, as compared to almost a 14 percent rate of involvement in 1969. This increase of juvenile involvement in violent crimes recorded over a 21 percent increase over 1969, and over 54 percent since 1967.

Almost 46 percent of all nonviolent crime solutions in 1970 involved juveniles. The rate of involvement, when compared to the 1969 and 1967 rate, disclosed over 8 percent and 14 percent increases respectively.

The juvenile involvement in Index offenses individually, reflected that almost 7 percent of the murders solved during 1970 involved persons under 18, over 13 percent of the rapes, over 30 percent of the robberies, almost 11 percent of the atrocious assaults,

breaking and enterings over 47 percent, larcenies over \$50, over 52 percent, and auto theft 44 percent. All the Crime Index offenses recorded increases over 1969, with the exception of auto theft, which disclosed an 8 percent decrease in juvenile involvement. Larceny \$50 and over recorded the highest increase, at almost 59 percent, and robbery second with an increase of almost 36 percent since 1969 for involvement of juveniles under 18. (Chart 4)

## STOLEN PROPERTY VALUE

The value of all property stolen in 1970 was reported at almost \$99 million, an 11 percent increase over 1969 figures. This dollar value represents the proceeds of all robberies, breaking and enterings, larcenies and auto thefts reported by New Jersey police during 1970. Auto thefts reported during the year accounted for 83 percent of the total value of property stolen in 1970. Although police recoveries reduced this loss by over 35 percent, the remaining unrecovered portion represents a loss of almost \$64 million to the victims. (Table 26)

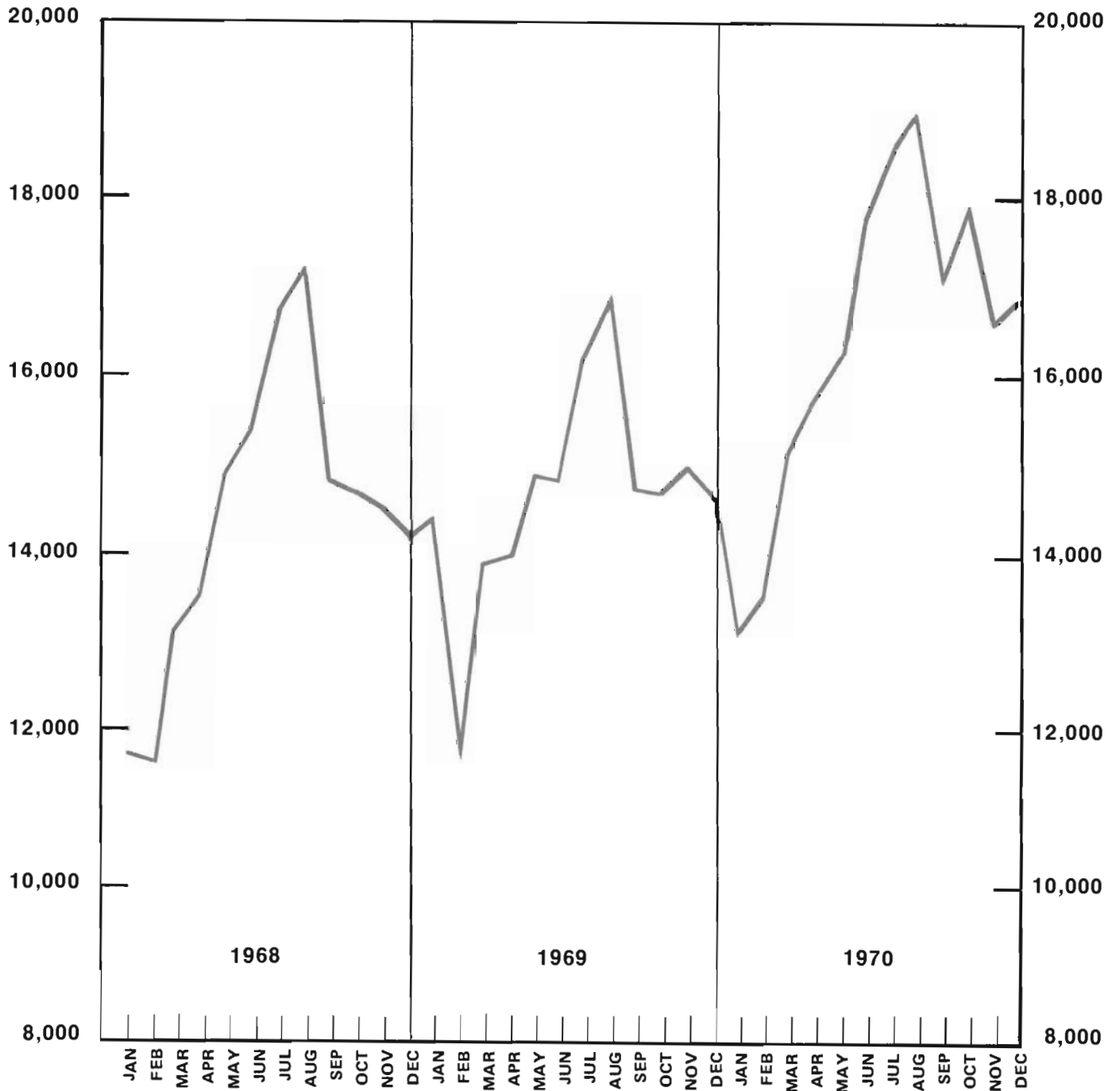

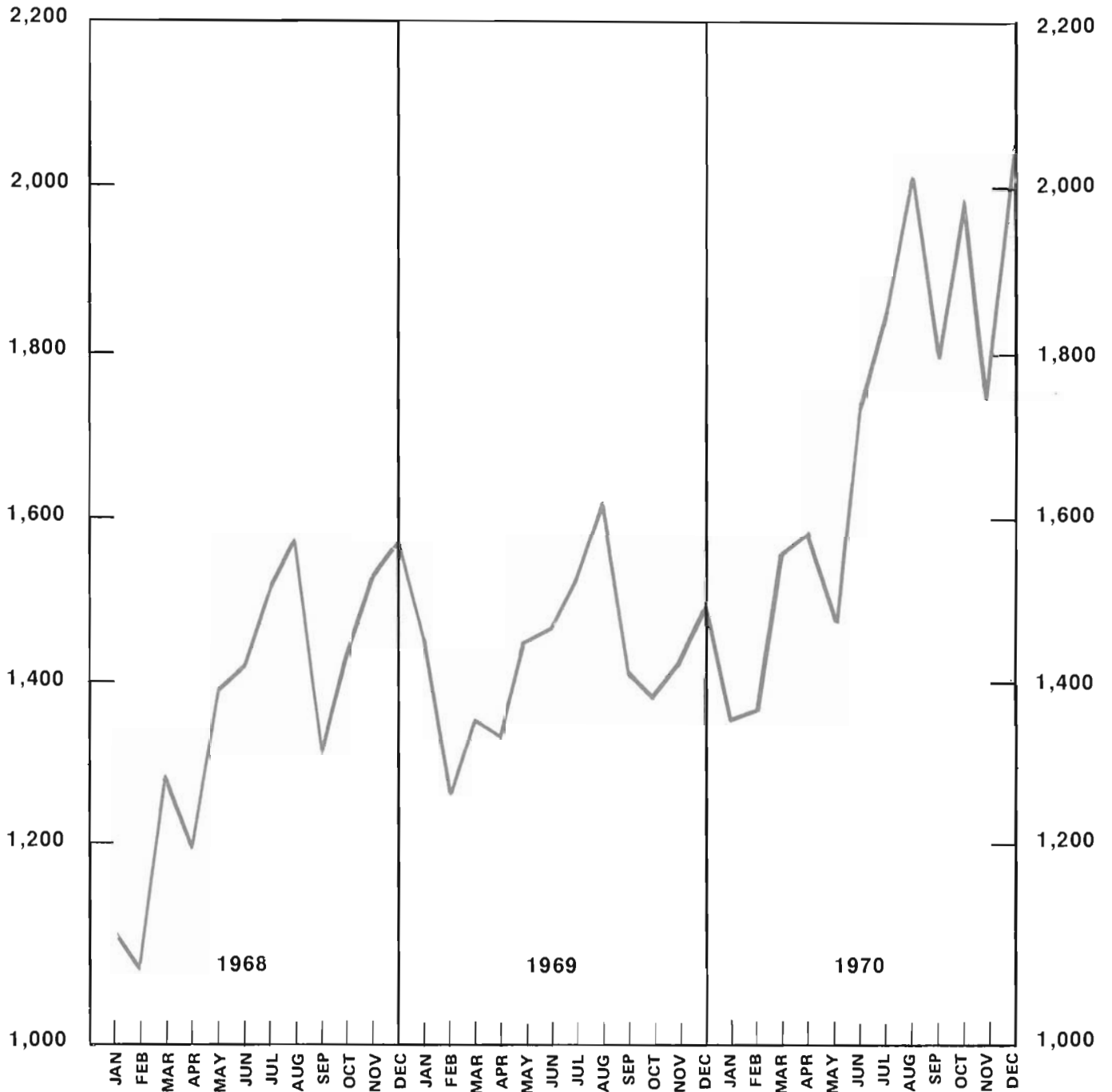

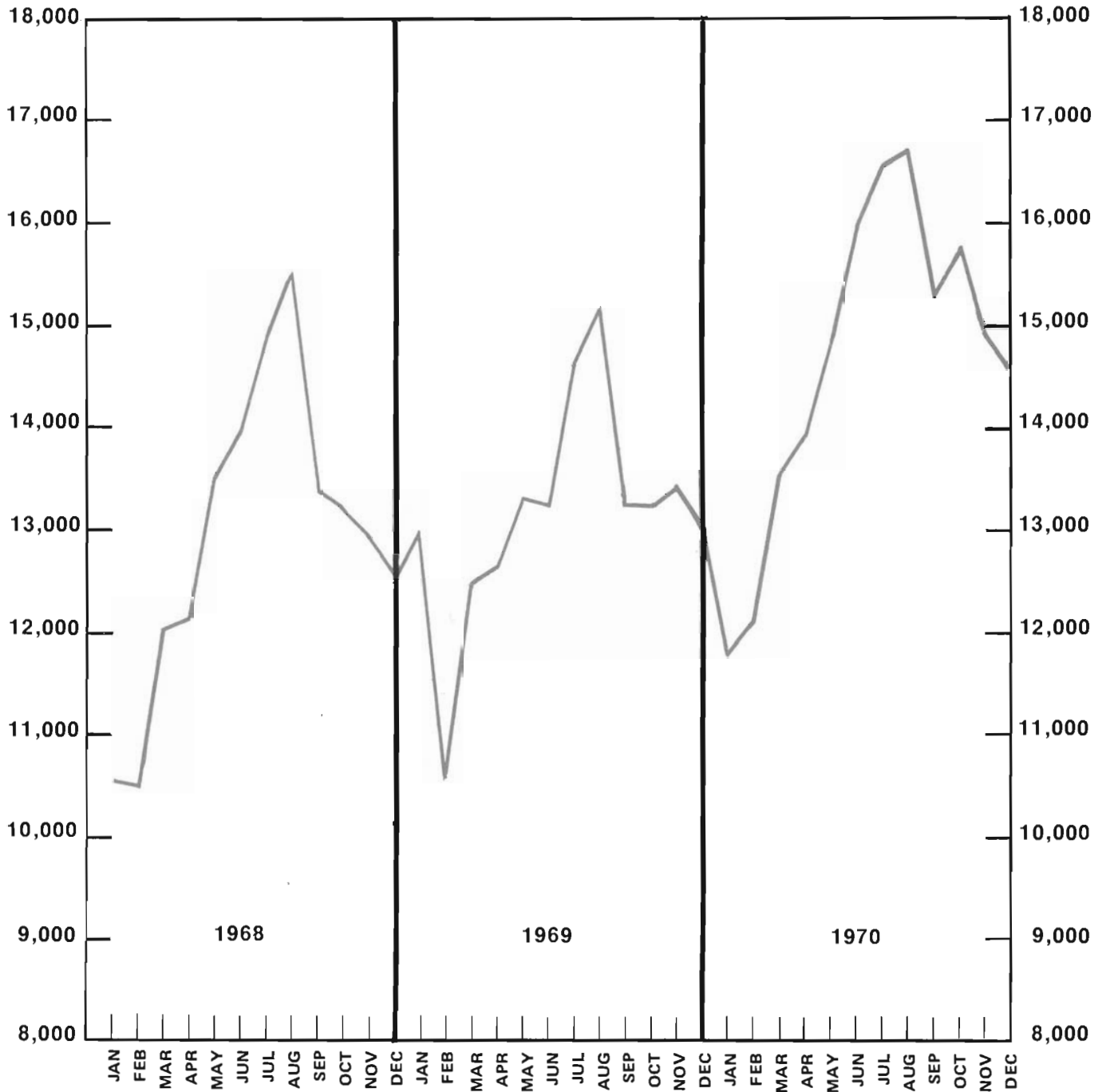

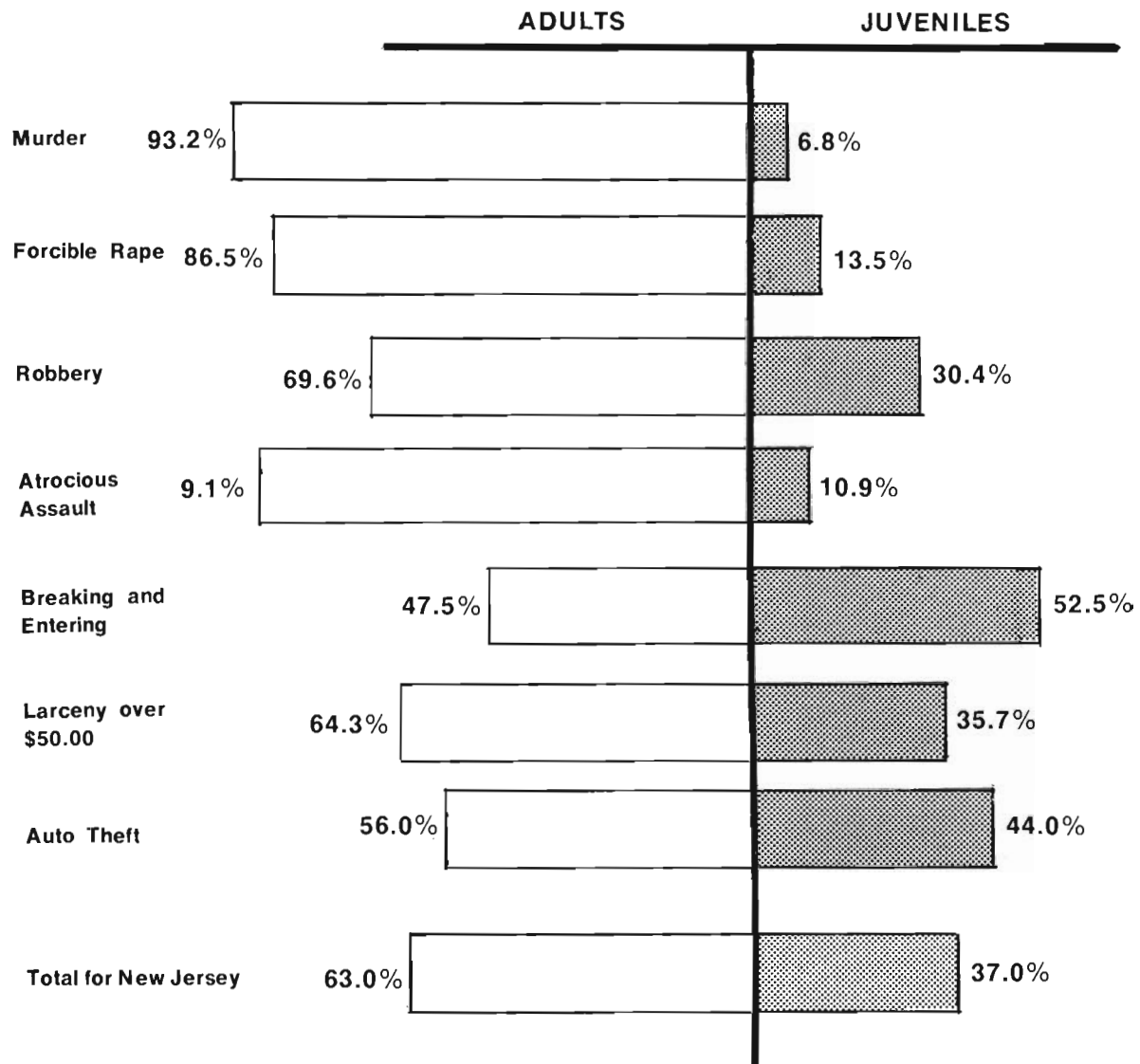
### VIOLENT CRIME BY MONTH 1968 - 1969 - 1970

## MURDER

Murder is defined as the unlawful killing of a human being with malice aforethought. Any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault or commission of a crime is included. This Index offense is scored by police on the basis of their investigation without regard to findings of a court or jury or the decision of a prosecutor. Traffic deaths, caused by the negligence of someone other than the victim, are not included here, but are counted under manslaughter. Attempts to kill and assaults to kill are scored as atrocious assaults and not as murder. Suicides, accidental deaths, and justifiable homicides are also excluded.

### VOLUME AND RATE

A total of 405 murders were reported by the law enforcement agencies of the state. When compared to the 366 murders in 1969, a numerical increase of 39 murders or a rise of almost 11 percent is disclosed. Murder accounted for two-tenths of 1 percent of all Index offenses reported in 1970, and has been the same since 1967.

In 1970, there were 5.7 victims per 100,000 population, up from the 5.0 in 1969, a 14 percent increase in the murder rate.

### MURDER ANALYSIS

Whenever a murder is reported to the System, a supplementary report must be submitted by the reporting law enforcement agency. Pertinent information including age, sex and race of the victim, weapon used to commit the offense, and circumstances or motive which led to the crime, is among the data collected. Place of occurrence, relationship of victim to perpetrator, and day of week are also included.

The frequency of murder during 1970 was highest during the four month period of June through September. Monthly highs were identical for June and August with 42 occurrences reported.

Murder, by day of week, is depicted in Chart 5, which reveals Saturday as having the highest rate of incidence, when almost 26 percent of the total murders occurred that day. Almost 42 percent of all murders reported were perpetrated during the two day period of Friday and Saturday.

In 1970, almost 79 percent of the murder victims were male, a 10 percent increase over 1969. Victim analysis by race disclosed that 58 percent were Negro and 42 percent were White, over a 9 percent increase in the Negro victim distribution since 1967. Analysis by age shows that the 20-39 year age group had the largest distribution of victims, almost 51 percent, and the largest number, 19 percent, falling in the 20 to 24 age group.

In the area of known perpetrators, the adult male-female ratio of involvement disclosed that adult males were identified as known perpetrators in almost 79 percent of all murders solved, and adult females in almost 13 percent of the murders. Male juvenile perpetrators accounted for over 7 percent, and female juveniles the remaining 1 percent. Table 27 depicts murder victims by age, sex and race.

Weapon usage by the perpetrators of murders, disclosed that firearms were used in over 47 percent of all murders, a decrease from the 49 percent recorded in 1969. Within the firearm category, handguns were the

most predominant weapon used, an 84 percent involvement, and also represented 40 percent of all weapons employed in murder for 1970. The use of the cutting or stabbing weapon represented almost 26 percent of all murders. Personal weapons such as hands, fists and feet were used in almost 11 percent of all murders, with the remaining 16 percent being attributed to the use of other weapons, including blunt objects, such as clubs and hammers, poison, arson, etc. (Chart 6)

Almost 43 percent of all murders occurred in private residences, as in prior years, represents the predominant location for this type of crime. In most cases police are powerless to prevent this type of murder, and this is made apparent by the type of circumstance or motive involved. A majority of the murders, 64 percent, were committed by relatives or persons acquainted with the victim. Further analysis revealed that almost 17 percent of all the murders were perpetrated by a member of the immediate family group, and more specifically almost 12 percent of the total murders involved spouse killing spouse.

As pointed out above, 64 percent of the murders occurred between acquaintances, the remaining 36 percent, of course, were between persons unknown to each other. From the latter group, in most cases, comes the percentage of murders committed as a result of the commission of a crime. These are murders resulting from robberies, sex crimes, gangland slayings and other felonious activities. This type of circumstance or motive accounted for almost 39 percent of the total murders for 1970. Within this "felony" group, robbery accounted for 52 percent of the murders, and over 18 percent of all known murder circumstances. Since 1969, the involvement of robbery as a motive for murder has increased over 85 percent. As a part of the robbery motive analysis, it was disclosed that second to the private residence location, as the favorite spot for murders, streets or highways accounted for almost 34 percent of the murders by type of location, this has a direct relationship to robbery on the street which has accounted for 58 percent of all robberies committed in 1970.

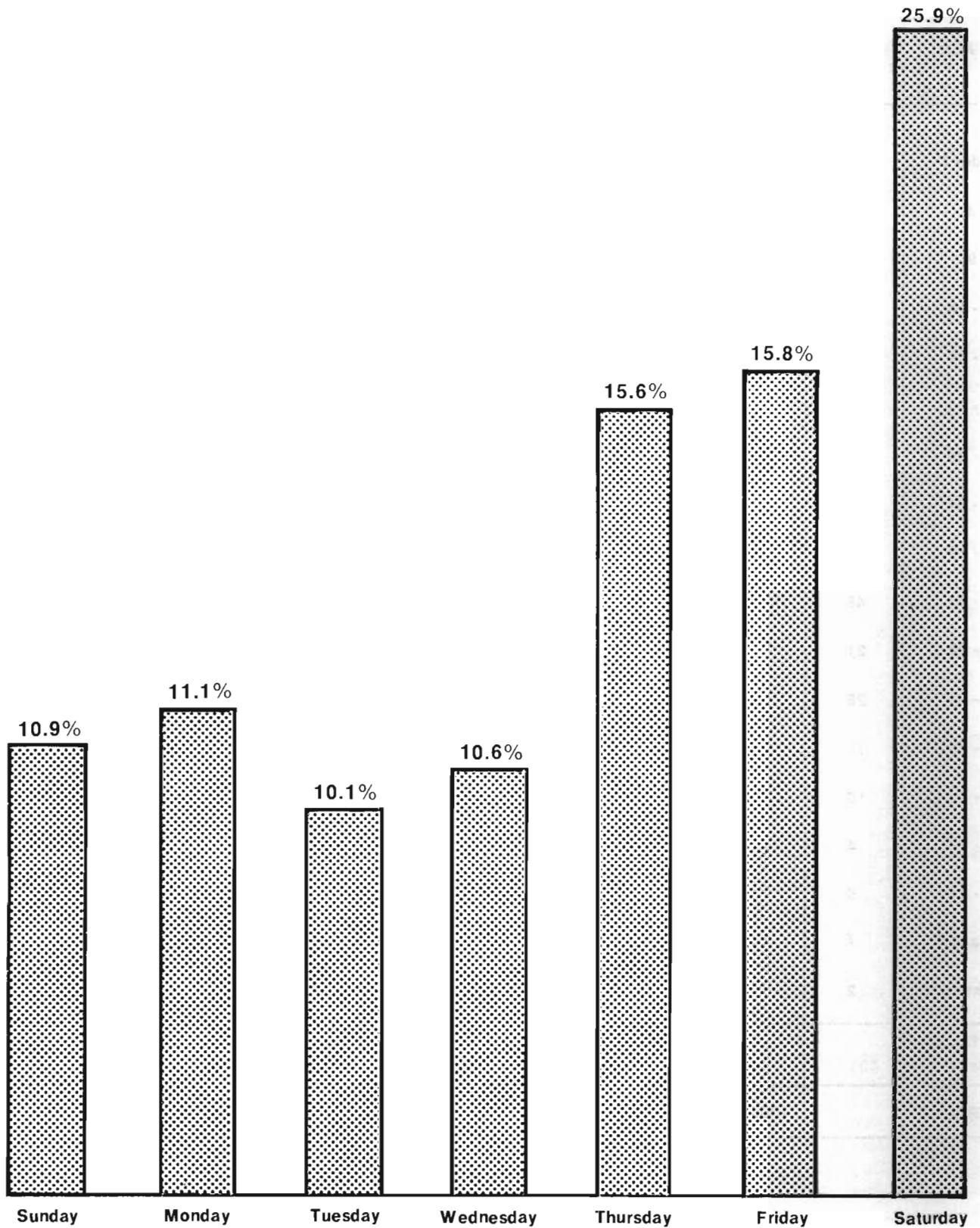
Altercations or quarrels between the victim and perpetrator, including lovers quarrels, money quarrels, drinking quarrels, etc., accounted for 60 percent of all murders reported in 1970. Individually, the lovers quarrels was highest, an 11 percent involvement in the total killings recorded.

### CLEARANCES

Law enforcement in New Jersey was successful in clearing or solving a little over 3 of every 4 murders committed in 1970. This high solution rate, as compared to other Index offenses, becomes evident when the circumstances of this heinous type crime are considered, and this high clearance rate is shared by police universally. When compared to the 1969 solution rate of 74.6, almost a 2 percent increase evolves, and over a 4 percent increase has developed since 1967.

Those murders solved which involved persons under 18 years of age accounted for almost 7 percent of all murder cases cleared. This degree of juvenile involvement, although small in volume, reflects an upward trend when compared to the 1967 juvenile solution rate of 4.5 percent.

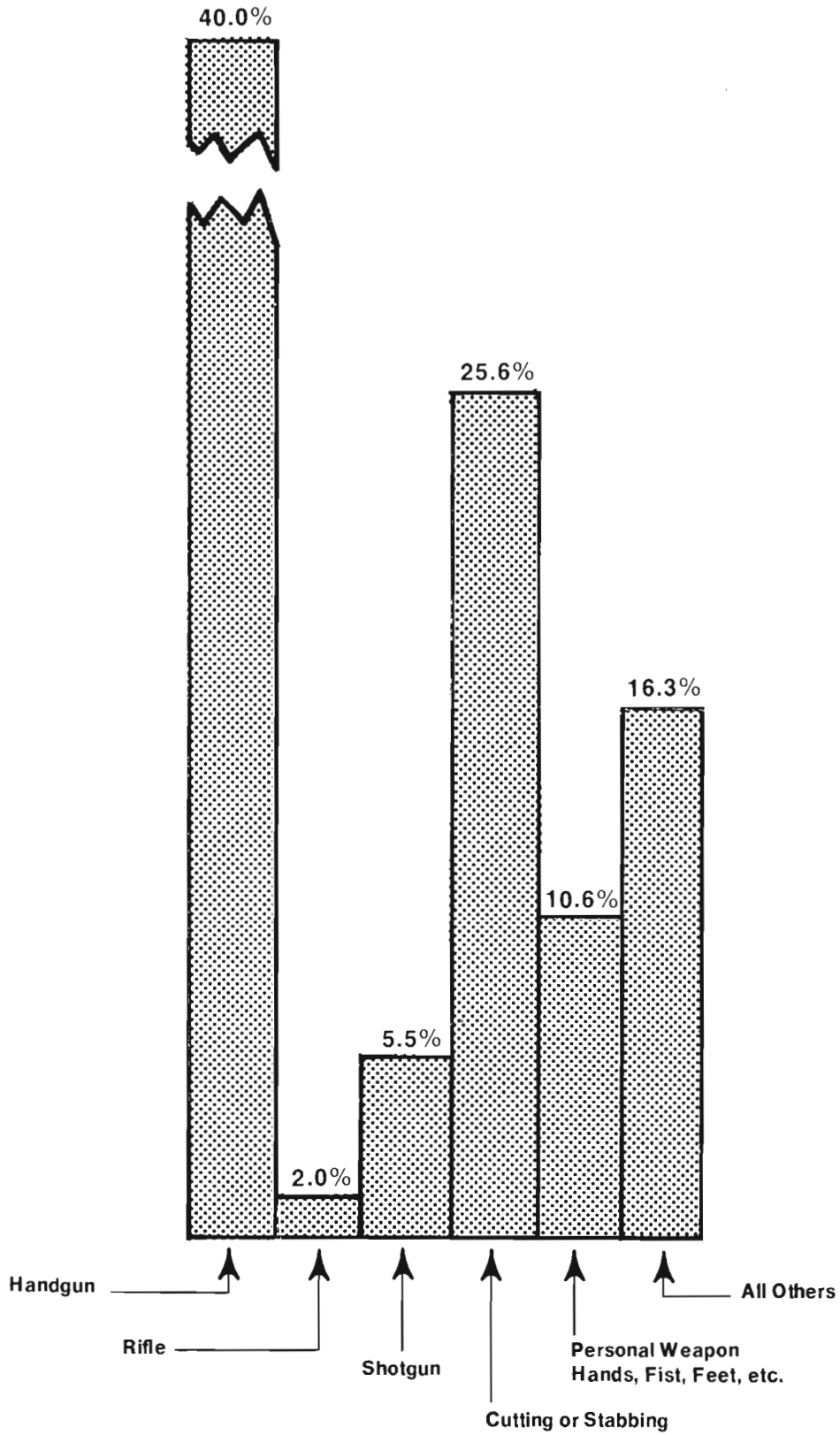
### MURDER BY DAY OF WEEK, 1970

## FORCIBLE RAPE

Forcible rape is defined as the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. All assaults and attempts to rape are counted, but carnal abuse, rape without force (statutory rape) and other sex offenses are not included.

### VOLUME AND RATE

During 1970, there was a total of 928 forcible rapes reported to the police of the state. Numerically, the volume increased by 17 offenses over 1969, a trend increase of almost 2 percent. The trend for reported rapes has been increasing since 1967, reflecting a 35 percent increase since that time. This offense accounted for over 4 percent of all violent crime and one half of one percent of the total Crime Index. The latter statistic has remained static since 1967.

The crime rate which equates the number of crimes per unit of population is actually a victim risk rate. In 1970, 13 out of every 100,000 persons in this state were reported forcible rape victims. The availability of 1970 census population data allows for the calculation of a forcible rape rate based on female population alone. For every 100,000 females in New Jersey, 25 were victims of this violent crime. Since 1967, the forcible rape crime rate for all persons has increased 34 percent.

### ANALYSIS OF RAPE

The months of June and September recorded the highest rape volumes, at 103 and 100 respectively. The period, June through September, accounted for almost 40 percent of the total forcible rapes reported.

More than 7 out of every 10 offenses reported in this crime class were actual rapes by force while the remainder were attempts or assaults to rape. The victims of this violent crime, in many cases, are hesitant in reporting the offense to police due to the fear and/or embarrassment of the victims when the possibility of a court appearance confronts them, or the effect it may have on their reputation when the facts become known. Additionally, there is difficulty in establishing the act of force when there is the presence of a prior relationship between victim and perpetrator. Due to the usual clandestine nature of this offense, it occurs most often out of reach of police patrols. The offense of forcible rape, because of the above factors, is probably the most under-reported crime within the Crime Index. However, crime counts in this publication must be limited to the actual offenses established by police investigation.

### CLEARANCES

In 1970, almost 59 percent of all forcible rapes were solved. Little change was noted, 1970 over 1969, but 1970 over 1967 revealed almost a 3 percent decrease in solutions. More than 13 percent of all rape clearances during the year involved persons under 18 years of age, no significant change over 1969.

## ROBBERY

Robbery is defined as the felonious and forcible taking of the property of another against his will, by violence or by putting him in fear. The element of personal

confrontation is always present in this crime. Under the Program, all assaults or attempts to rob are included. Robberies are reported in two general categories, armed — any weapon (when any object is used as a weapon) and strong arm which includes muggings and similar offenses where no weapon is used, but strong arm tactics are employed.

### VOLUME AND RATE

During the calendar year 1970, a total of 12,147 robberies were reported by the police of the state, an increase of 2,488 offenses over 1969. This figure represents almost a 26 percent increase over that period. This significant volume increase also amounts to a 110 percent rise over 1967 counts, and is the highest individual offense increase within the Crime Index. These reported offenses for 1970, make up over 6 percent of the total Crime Index for New Jersey and 59 percent of all violent crimes as a group.

The robbery rate for 1970 was almost 28 percent higher than for 1969, at 169 victims for every 100,000 persons of the state's population.

### ANALYSIS OF ROBBERY

Monthly supplementary information, which reveals the nature of robbery, is collected under the Program for the purpose of gaining further insight regarding this serious crime. Identification of the most frequent "targets" of robbery is accomplished by classification of the type of location at which the crime was perpetrated and whether or not the offender was armed.

During 1970, the armed robber was responsible for committing over 52 percent of the total robberies reported, with the remaining robberies being of the "unarmed" or mugging type. Since 1968, the distribution of armed robberies, as compared to the strong arm type, has decreased almost 10 percent.

Since 1967, the quarterly period of October through December reflected the greatest frequency of robbery. The highest individual monthly volume was recorded in December, 1,303 robbery offenses, with October second, at 1,205 offenses.

Street robberies accounted for 58 percent of all robbery offenses, and second was robberies of business establishments (commercial houses), almost a 15 percent involvement. Since 1967, the largest trend increases have been in the area of gas or service station robberies, up 138 percent, with residence robberies second, up almost 122 percent, and third street robberies, up almost 121 percent. (Chart 7)

The total value of property loss to victims of robbery amounted to over \$4.5 million, which amounts to an average loss per victim of \$374. Street or highway robberies reflected the highest category for total property value, a loss of over \$2 million. Bank robberies, the lowest rate of incidence, reflected the highest average loss, \$12,404. (Table 28)

The impact of this violent crime on the victim cannot be measured in terms of money or property value alone, as it has been pointed out in the murder section of this publication, robbery was the motive for 18 percent of all murders committed in 1970. In addition, a special robbery survey conducted in November of 1968 disclosed that during the survey month, 326 of the 989 robbery victims received injuries.

**CLEARANCES**

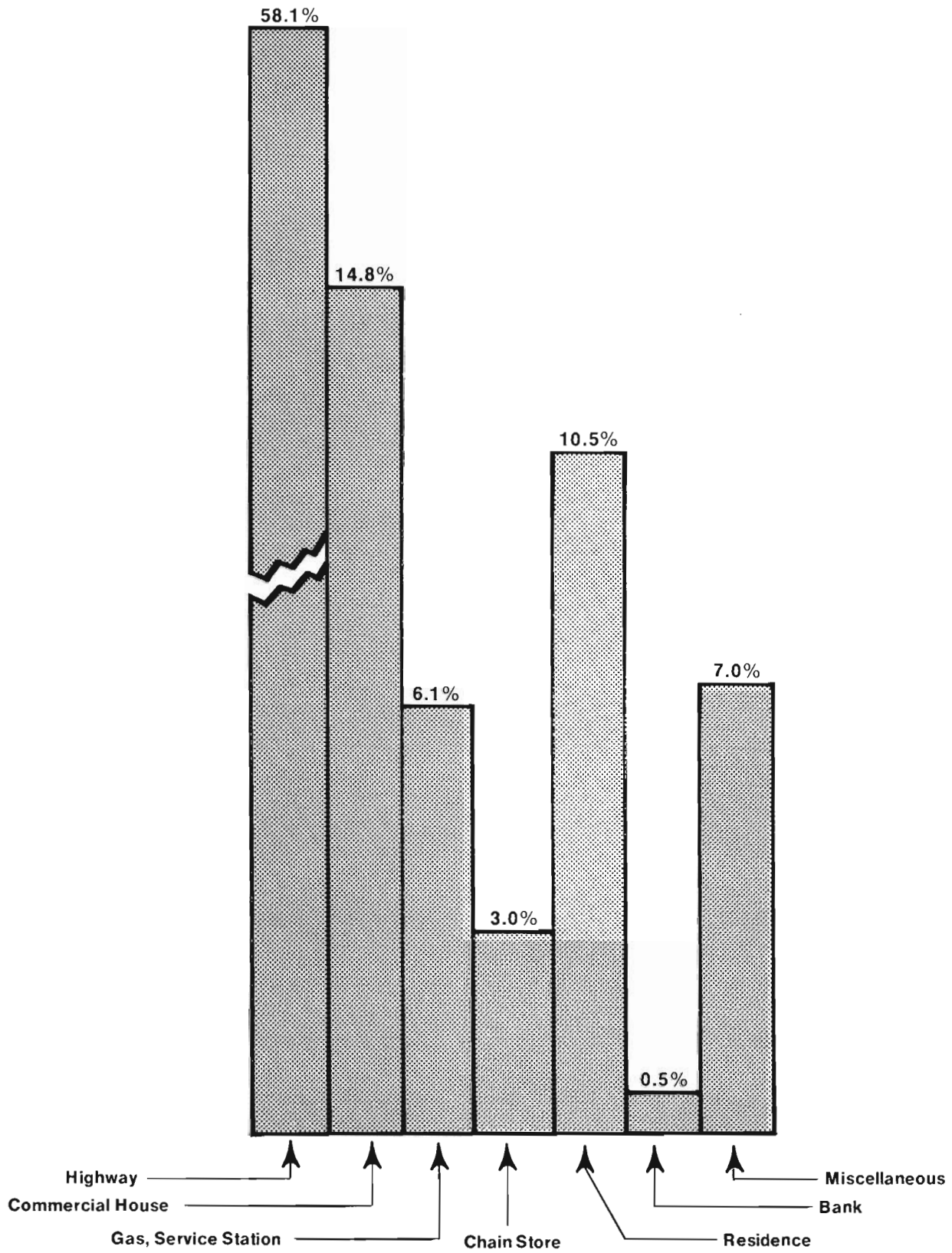
During the year 1970, police solved slightly over 20 percent of all robbery offenses reported to them, a decrease of almost 5 percent compared to 1969. Almost 7

of every 10 robberies which were cleared involved persons 18 years of age and over. A decrease in adult involvement is noted, while the juvenile involvement in robbery solutions increased by 36 percent, 1970 over 1969.

## ATROCIOUS ASSAULT

Atrocious Assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is an attempt or offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do serious physical injury to another. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that any injury result when a gun, knife or other weapon is used, which would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed.

### VOLUME AND RATE

The police of New Jersey reported a total of 7,103 atrocious assaults for the year 1970. This is an increase of 828 offenses over the previous year. This crime against the person made up almost 4 percent of the Crime Index offenses, and contributed over 34 percent to the violent crime group total.

In 1970, 99 out of every 100,000 persons in New Jersey were reported victims of atrocious assault. This figure represents an increase of 15 percent in the rate of victimization when compared to 1969.

### WEAPON ANALYSIS IN ATROCIOUS ASSAULT

The use or attempted use of a dangerous weapon in an assault or the serious injury inflicted by hands, fists or feet, separates this Index offense from those assaults categorized as "simple" and not atrocious in nature. The victim of an actual assault of this type may suffer serious injury or permanent disability. Also, all assaults to kill and attempts to kill are recorded in this area. Most atrocious assaults, as in murders, occur within the family or among neighbors and acquaintances.

Knives or other cutting instruments were used in over 37 percent of the assaults, blunt objects or other dangerous weapons recorded almost a 23 percent involvement, and over 22 percent with personal weapons, such as hands, fists and feet. Firearms were used as a weapon in over 17 percent of all atrocious assaults reported during 1970. When compared to 1969 this figure represents almost a 3 percent decrease. (Chart 8)

### CLEARANCES

New Jersey law enforcement agencies were successful in solving almost 68 of each 100 atrocious assault cases reported in 1970, over a 5 percent increase above the rate for 1969. This relatively high clearance rate follows that of other crimes against the person. Offenses solved by the arrest of persons under 18 years of age amounted to almost 11 percent of the total cases solved, with the remaining 89 percent involving adults over 18 years of age. When compared to the 10 percent involvement of juveniles in atrocious assault cases solved during 1969, a 9 percent increase evolves.

## BREAKING AND ENTERING

Under this program, breaking and entering is defined as an unlawful entry or attempted forcible entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny.

Data collection for this offense is further categorized as to forcible entries, unlawful entries (where no force is used) and attempted forcible entries.

## VOLUME AND RATE

During the year 1970, a total of 74,606 breaking and enterings were reported by police. This offense still remains the most voluminous within the Index, as it contributes almost 38 percent to the overall offense counts for the year. As a part of the nonviolent group, breaking and enterings contributed over 42 percent to that group's total. As previously mentioned, volumewise, breaking and entering is the most prevalent crime within the Index, however, there has been a steady decrease in the involvement of this crime. Since 1967, this offense has decreased almost 13 percent in its percent distribution within the Crime Index.

During 1970, there were almost 1,041 victims for each 100,000 inhabitants of the state. This victim rate for breaking and entering increased over 11 percent since 1969, and remains the highest within the Crime Index.

### ANALYSIS OF BREAKING AND ENTERING

There were no outstanding peak periods of the year for this offense when comparing seasonal fluctuations. However, July and August were the individual monthly highs for breaking and enterings, with October and December closely behind.

In 1970, 80 percent of all breaking and enterings reported involved forcible entry, and 11 percent involved cases of unlawful entry where no force was used. The remaining 9 percent were attempts to forcibly enter. The percent involvement of these classifications within the breaking and entering offense has remained exactly the same since 1968.

In 55 out of every 100 breaking and enterings, a private residence was the target, with the remaining 45 being targets of a nonresidential nature. Over 55 percent of these "resident" crimes occurred during daytime hours when homes or apartments are left unattended. Again, where the time of occurrence could be determined, it was learned that over 89 percent of the nonresidential offenses occurred at night, when business volume is at a low. Since 1967, the selection of the residence over other breaking and entering targets has increased over 16 percent. These unattended apartments and homes, especially those found in the daytime, contribute to this 16 percent increased involvement in "resident" breaking and enterings.

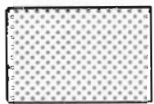
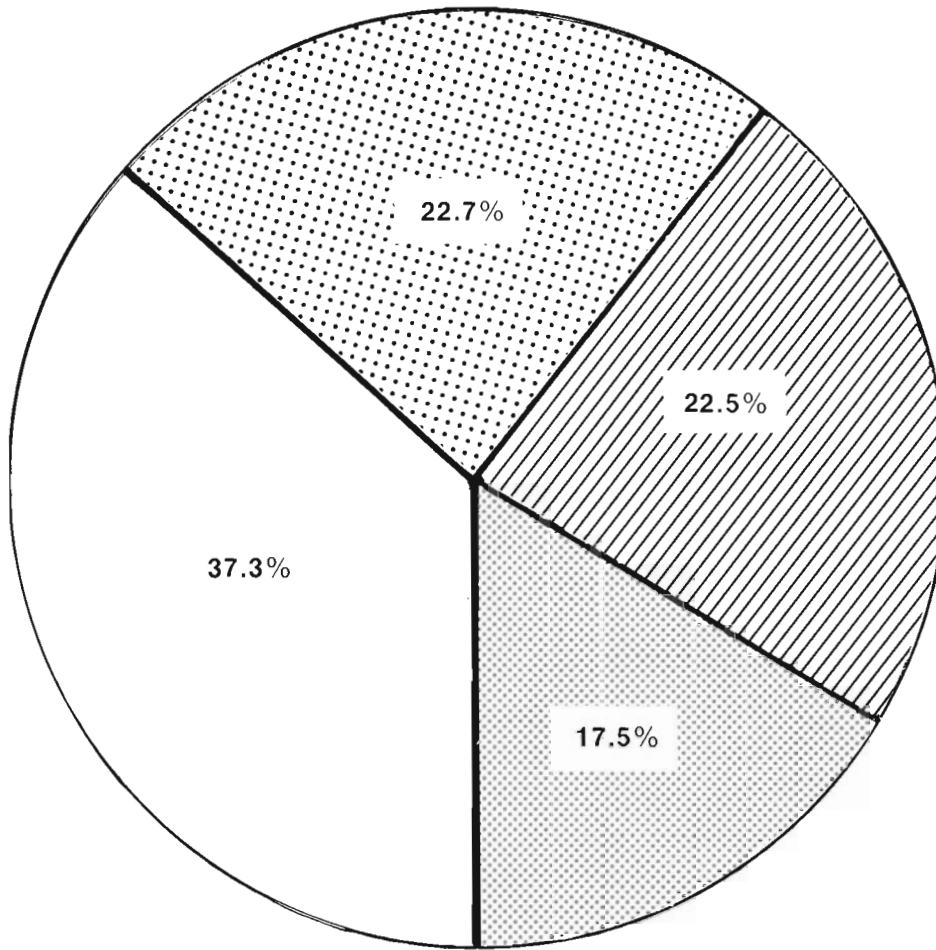
In 1970, victims of breaking and enterings suffered an economic loss of over \$31 million, with an average dollar loss of \$417 per offense. Breaking and enterings of residences accounted for over \$18 million with the remaining \$13 million loss attributed to nonresidence or commercial targets. (Table 29)

### CLEARANCES

The volume of this offense presents the police with a serious enforcement problem which is made more difficult in some jurisdictions by the lack of sufficient personnel to act as a deterrent, or even to properly investigate and thus provide successful solutions to these crimes.

The police solution rate for breaking and entering offenses was computed at almost 13 percent, nearly a 6 percent increase over 1969. Juveniles were involved in over 52 percent of all such case solutions in 1970. This

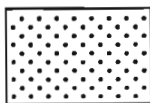
**ATROCIOUS ASSAULT

offense involves more persons under 18 years of age than any other offense within the Crime Index. When

considering those crimes solved, and when compared to 1969, this represents an almost 17 percent increase.

## LARCENY—THEFT

The definition of larceny-theft, as provided under this program, is the taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership. All larcenies and thefts resulting from pocket-picking, purse-snatching, shoplifting, larcenies from autos, thefts of auto parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc. are included here. Embezzlement, unlawful conversions, larceny by bailee, frauds or bad check cases are not included.

The Crime Index offense of larceny includes only those thefts where the value of the goods stolen is \$50 or more, therefore, the volume and rate considered here does not include larcenies less than \$50.

### VOLUME AND RATE

There were 61,486 offenses of larceny \$50 and over reported during the year 1970. This figure represents an almost 16 percent increase over 1969, and is second only to breaking and entering as the most voluminous offense within the 1970 Crime Index. In 1970, larceny made up over 31 percent of the total Crime Index and has steadily been increasing its percent distribution within the Index. This fact becomes evident when you consider that in 1967, larceny \$50 and over accounted for only 26 percent of all the offenses within the Crime Index, a 19 percent increase since that time.

The larceny offenses reported, when related to population, discloses a 1970 rate of almost 858 occurrences per 100,000 population. This represents a significant percentage increase in rate of almost 18 percent over 1969, and almost 70 percent since 1967.

### ANALYSIS OF LARCENY-THEFT

As in 1969, offense frequencies were highest in the summer months of June, July and August, representing 30 percent of all larcenies \$50 and over reported in 1970.

The following analyses considers all larcenies, regardless as to the value and all types of larcenies identified in this section will differ in volumes depending upon the opportunity for theft offered in a given area.

In 1970, victims of this offense suffered a total loss of over \$121 million with an average loss of \$182 per larceny. It must be noted that many offenses in this category, particularly where the value of the stolen property is small, never is reported to the police.

As previously mentioned, the dollar value placed on property stolen in thefts determines whether or not a

larceny becomes a Crime Index offense. The rising cost of living and the increased demand for more expensive commodities does influence the larceny \$50 and over trend. This dollar valuation has been the subject of discussion by the committee on Uniform Crime Records of the International Association of Chiefs of Police.

Fixing a new dollar valuation does not seem to solve the problem, for in a few years the economic conditions may again change.

The identification of larceny by type, without relation to dollar loss, suggests a more realistic approach toward establishing the crime experience in this category. For example "street larceny," which includes pocket-picking, purse-snatching, thefts from auto, automobile accessories, thefts from coin-operated machines and "all other" larceny, showed an increase of over 11 percent as a group, when, compared to 1969. These "street thefts" generally occur within reach of police patrols, and this type of analysis enables the proper deployment of patrols as a deterring factor. In addition, larcenies from autos and auto parts and accessories, as a group, represented almost 40 percent of the total larcenies reported in 1970. When auto theft is added to this "auto" group, it is noted that at least 32 percent of all offenses within the Crime Index involved motor vehicles.

When considering individual "types" of larceny, thefts from autos, which is usually from inside the vehicle, represented almost 22 percent of the larcenies reported in 1970. Larceny of auto parts and accessories was second with an almost 18 percent involvement and thefts from buildings third with an over 17 percent contribution.

The dollar loss to victims of larcenies was almost \$22 million. The average value of goods and property reported stolen from these victims was \$182. Larceny from autos accounted for over \$5.6 million, representing a \$262 average loss to each victim. (Table 30)

### CLEARANCES

The nature of larceny which is sometimes described as "sneak thievery," or "unobserved thefts," creates a lack of witnesses to this voluminous crime, thus making it extremely difficult for law enforcement officers to solve. In 1970, only a little over 9 percent of the larcenies \$50 and over reported to police were solved. Since 1969, a 3 percent decrease has been noted.

Those larceny offenses cleared by the arrest of persons under 18 years of age accounted for almost 36 percent of the total solutions, representing a significant increase from the 33 percent juvenile involvement in 1969.

## AUTO THEFT

In Uniform Crime Reporting, auto theft includes all thefts and attempted thefts of a motor vehicle. This includes all vehicles which can be registered as a motor vehicle in this state. This definition excludes taking a motor vehicle for temporary use, such as a family situation, or unauthorized use by others having lawful access to the vehicle.

### VOLUME AND RATE

In 1970, a total of 39,943 motor vehicles were reported stolen to the police of New Jersey, compared to 37,173 thefts in 1969. The numerical increase of 2,770 offenses represents a rise of over 7 percent. Auto theft makes up over 20 percent of the total Index offenses and almost 23 percent of the nonviolent crime group.

The rate for auto theft in 1970 rose from 510 victims in 1969 to 557 victims per 100,000 population. This rate increase is up over 9 percent since 1969, and up almost 33 percent since 1967.

### ANALYSIS OF AUTO THEFT

The crime of auto theft has been documented primarily as a crime of opportunity. In most cases, it's the youthful offender who finds the automobile easily accessible for his immediate transportation needs and usually the vehicle is ready to drive away or the ignition is easily compromised. A prior study conducted under the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, disclosed that in 2,352 auto theft cases studied during the month of August 1969, 46 percent of the vehicles were left unlocked, and 17 percent of all the victims left the keys in the vehicle.

The summer months of June, July and August recorded the highest quarterly volume during the year 1970, with June registering the individual monthly high.

In 1970, the total stolen value of automobile thefts almost reached the \$42 million mark. This figure represents a little over 42 percent of the total value of all property stolen during the year. The average value of a stolen auto was \$1,044 at the time of the theft. The police of New Jersey recovered 70 percent of the value of all

stolen vehicles, which left a \$12.5 million loss to the victims. (Chart 9)

As previously mentioned, the analysis of auto theft alone does not completely measure the special problem caused by the availability of the auto as a target for larceny of auto parts and accessories and larcenies from autos (from inside the vehicle). New Jersey, although 46th in physical size, is ranked about 8th nationally in total motor vehicle registration, add to this the hundreds of thousands of motor vehicles which annually enter New Jersey from other states, then a true picture of motor vehicle volumes in the state emerges. During 1970, a total of 87,697 offenses involving motor vehicles were reported to police, this represented a loss of almost \$50 million to the victims.

### CLEARANCES

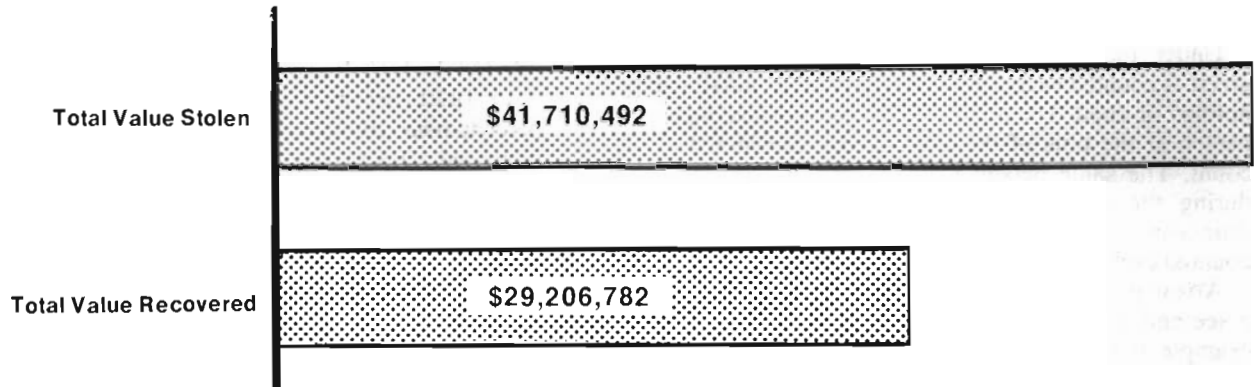
The special auto theft survey which was conducted during the month of August 1969, documented certain factors which contribute to the low solution rate of auto theft cases, such as, 70 percent of the offenses occurred during the hours of darkness and over 45 percent of the motor vehicles were stolen from streets of residential areas. These two factors contribute to the lack of any witness to the theft.

Law enforcement agencies of the state were successful in solving only a little more than 8 percent of all auto thefts reported to them during the year. This clearance rate, the lowest of all Index offenses, represents an almost 12 percent decrease over 1969.

Although the recovery of a vehicle does not clear or solve the offense, the owner does benefit by the return of his vehicle. Almost 3 out of every 4 vehicles reported stolen were recovered by police. This high rate of recovery can be attributed to the fact that most vehicles are stolen for the purpose of transportation. In 1970, almost 66 percent of all such recoveries occurred in the municipality in which the theft took place. (Chart 10)

In 1970, persons under the age of 18 were involved in 44 percent of the total auto theft cases solved. This year represents the lowest involvement of juveniles since 1967, and for the first time auto theft is not the leader within the Crime Index for juvenile involvement.

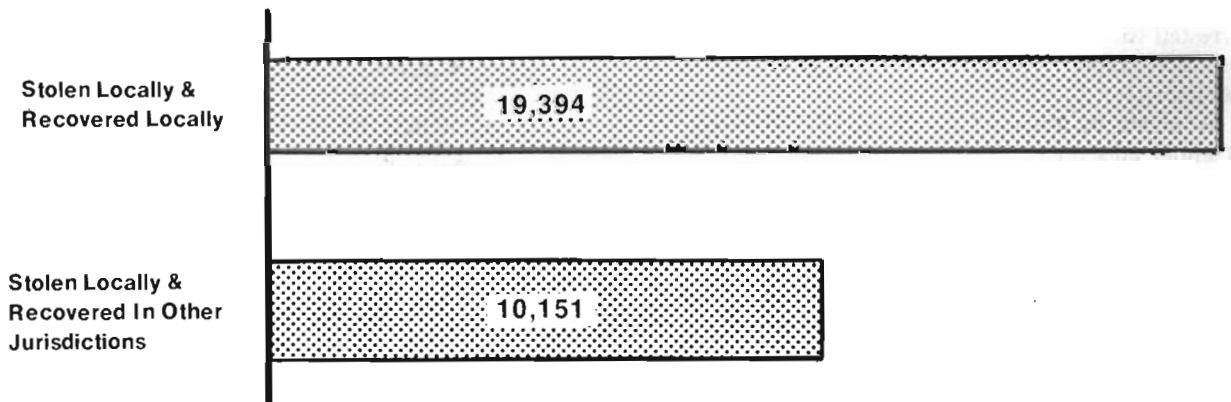
### AUTO THEFT VALUE 1970

## STATE ARREST DATA

During the year 1970, law enforcement in the state reported a total of 250,606 arrests for all criminal acts. Based on the 1970 population of New Jersey, there were 35 arrests for every 1,000 persons, a 12 percent rise from the 31 arrests per 1,000 inhabitants in 1969. (Table 31)

Under the Uniform Crime Reporting Program, an arrest is counted each time a person is taken into custody, notified or cited. The number of charges placed against a person at the time of the arrest is not considered in the count. The same person may be arrested several times during the year for similar offenses, as in cases of drunkenness or other disorderly conduct charges, and is counted each time he is arrested.

Arrest practices and emphasis do vary from place to place and within a municipality from time to time. For example, the volume of police arrests for certain unlawful conduct such as drunkenness or loitering violations is particularly influenced by this irregularity in arrest practices. On the other hand, murder, robbery and other arrests for serious crimes are more likely the result of standard procedures. In either case, arrests are used as a measure of law enforcement activity, and within certain limitations it can gauge criminality.

When a person under 18 years of age commits an offense and the circumstances are such that if the offender were an adult an arrest would be made, then the arrest is counted. It must be remembered that arrest counts do not reflect the specific number of persons arrested since one person may be arrested several times during the year.

### PERSONS ARRESTED

The arrests of persons for Crime Index type offenses made up 18 percent of the total arrest figure for 1970. Arrests of persons under 18 years of age accounted for more than half of the arrests of this type. Juvenile involvement, by arrest, was greatest in the nonviolent crime categories of breaking and entering, larceny and auto theft, and represented 57 percent of that group's arrest total. As in 1969, almost 8 of every 10 persons arrested for those offenses in the violent crime category (murder, rape, robbery and atrocious assault) were adults.

Analysis by race, of those persons arrested for all criminal acts during the year, discloses that 65 percent were White, 34 percent were Negro and the remaining 1 percent were of other races. Arrest involvement, by race, for those serious offenses within the Crime Index, revealed that 54 percent of all those arrested were White, 45 percent were Negro with the remaining 1 percent being of other races. Persons arrested for crimes of violence within the Index (murder, rape, robbery and atrocious assault) reflect that 63 percent were Negro, 36 percent White, and the remaining 1 percent distributed among other races. The use of the crime of murder as an indicator for victim information, by race, for crimes of violence results in the identification of 64 percent of all murder victims in 1970 being Negro.

The arrests for nonviolent crimes of breaking and

entering, larceny and auto theft, revealed that by race, 58 percent were White, 41 percent Negro, with the remaining 1 percent being distributed among other races. (Tables 32, 33 and 34)

### ARREST TRENDS

In 1970, arrests for all crimes increased almost 10 percent over 1969. Arrests for Index type offenses also increased 10 percent during the same period, with an almost 30 percent increase since 1967. Within the Index, violent crime arrests rose almost 17 percent and non-violent crime arrests were up almost 9 percent over 1969.

Arrest increases, 1970 over 1969, recorded within individual Index offense categories were led by a 20 percent rise in robbery arrests, 17 percent for atrocious assault, followed by larceny, up 12 percent, murder up 10 percent and rape by almost 1 percent.

Volume decreases were noted for auto theft, the only decrease within the Index, a 4 percent drop since 1969.

As in previous annual comparisons, arrests for Narcotic Drug Law violations reflected the highest individual rise for the year, a volume increase of almost 72 percent. Since 1967, this type of arrest has increased from 5,045 to 22,941 arrests, an astounding 355 percent increase. Further analysis regarding this major social problem facing New Jersey, as well as the nation, is discussed in the section "Drug Abuse and Crime," where its relationship to "other crime" is dealt with. (Chart 11) In addition, a Uniform Crime Reporting Survey publication entitled "Drug Abuse and Crime in New Jersey," disclosing the degree of that correlation was released on June 1, 1971.

A review of some other relatively high percent increases in individual arrest categories disclosed an almost 47 percent increase in prostitution and commercialized vice. In addition, fraud arrests were up over 26 percent since 1969. (Table 35)

### ARREST ANALYSIS BY AGE

During 1970, adult arrests rose by over 9 percent while juvenile arrests had an overall increase of over 11 percent. For the period 1967-1970, police arrests for all criminal acts have increased a little over 40 percent. During the same period adult arrests increased almost 33 percent while juvenile arrests were up more than 55 percent. (Table 36)

Juveniles continue to show increasing arrest involvement in violent crime. Adult arrests increased almost 14 percent while juvenile arrests for the violent crimes of murder, rape, robbery and atrocious assault increased over 27 percent since 1969. Juvenile involvement in violent crime arrests, 1970 over 1967, disclosed an increase of almost 100 percent while adults were up over 34 percent.

Further analysis as to the arrest involvement of young age groups for the year disclosed that 15 percent of all those arrested were under the age of 15, 36 percent were under the age of 18 and 51 percent were under 21. As a

further indication regarding the degree of serious crime involvement of juveniles it was noted that more than 4 of every 10 persons arrested for robbery were under 18, up from the 3 out of every 10 in 1969. Almost 6 of every 10 persons arrested for breaking and entering were juveniles, and over half of those arrested for larceny-theft were persons under 18 years of age. More than 6 of every 10 persons arrested for auto theft were of the young age group.

Arrests for Narcotic Drug Law violations revealed over a 55 percent involvement on the part of persons under 21 years of age. A further breakdown disclosed that over 32 percent were in the age bracket of 18 to 20 years of age, while almost 13 percent were 16 years of age or under. Additional analysis of the young persons 17 through 21 years of age disclosed that these young persons in their last year of high school or of college age contributed 51 percent to the total arrests for Narcotic Drug Law violations in 1970.

A matter for serious concern is the recent increase in the criminal arrest involvement of the young age groups, however, the adults still record the highest involvement in the total arrest picture. Arrest of those persons 18 years of age and over represented 64 percent of all arrests reported in 1970. Adult arrests for violent crime comprised almost 77 percent of that group's total arrest figure, which includes arrests for murder, rape, robbery and atrocious assault. (Table 37)

#### ARREST ANALYSIS BY SEX

In 1970, almost 86 percent of all persons arrested were male. Female arrests rose by over 18 percent while male arrests increased almost 9 percent over 1969.

Although female arrests represent only slightly over 14 percent of the total arrest figure, since 1967 they have increased over 65 percent, while male arrests have increased almost 37 percent for the same period.

Female arrests within the violent crime category accounted for over 9 percent of that total, which includes over a 13 percent rate of involvement in atrocious assault arrests and slightly over 10 percent for murder. In the nonviolent crime category, arrest of females accounted for over 14 percent of the total arrests recorded. The primary female involvement was reflected in arrests for larceny, here almost a 22 percent involvement was determined. When only Index type arrests are considered, females reflected over a 13 percent involvement.

Although male arrests for Narcotic Drug Law violations account for almost 87 percent of the total, female arrests increased over 102 percent over 1969, while male arrests were up almost 68 percent for the same period. (Table 38 and 39)

#### DRUG ABUSE AND CRIME

In recent years the relationship between drug abuse and crime has been of deep concern to both law enforcement and society. Estimates of the number and types of crime attributed to the illegal use of drugs have been, in many instances, undocumented and without

factual basis. The importance of accurately identifying this relationship prompted the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit of the New Jersey State Police and the New Jersey State Chiefs of Police Association, to formulate a special survey dealing with the issue.

The survey, conducted statewide during the month of August 1970, used as a base each person arrested for any offense (except traffic) during that month. Before the survey began, State Police Field Representatives conducted statewide seminars and meetings to familiarize all law enforcement agencies with the mechanics and objectives of the survey. Additional control and verification existed during the survey month and at the time the survey was received at the administrative office of the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit. The survey forms submitted for each person arrested during the survey month were checked individually for completeness, accuracy, and feasibility of inter-related data. Incomplete or incorrect survey forms were returned to the contributor for adjustment and resubmission.

A brief summary of the survey results are presented here for the purpose of providing the reader with some of the more important observations which resulted from the survey. Comparison with other surveys or studies conducted under the broad title of "drug abuse and crime" should not be attempted unless all facets of data and data evaluation utilized in this survey are duplicated. Complete results and analyses are contained in the publication "Drug Abuse and Crime in New Jersey."

#### SURVEY SUMMARY

Almost 19 percent of the 22,418 persons arrested for all offenses (except traffic) during the survey month were identified as drug abusers.

More than 57 percent of the 4,177 drug abusers were associated with offenses other than those of a narcotic or drug nature.

\*\*\*  
More than 24 percent of all those arrested for robbery during the month of August 1970, were identified as drug abusers.

\*\*\*  
Over 22 percent of the 4,177 drug abusers arrested were found to have committed an offense for the purpose of purchasing drugs for their own use.

\*\*\*  
The incidence of "hard" drug usage, when related to specific age groups, reflected the following: Juveniles 14 and under, reflected a 7 percent involvement in the opium or cocaine (heroin) category; drug abusers within the age category 15 through 17, a 16 percent involvement; young adults 18 through 20, a 29 percent ratio and adults 21 and over, a 49 percent degree of "hard" drug involvement.

\*\*\*  
Almost 46 percent of the 4,177 drug abusers arrested did not reside in the community in which the offense took place. Further analysis revealed that 14 percent of the drug abusers arrested were from states other than New Jersey.

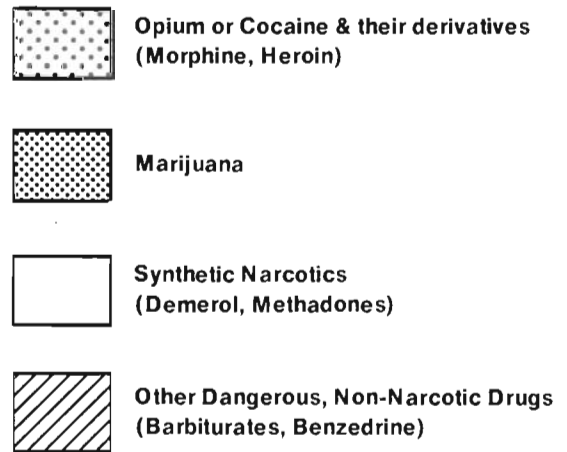
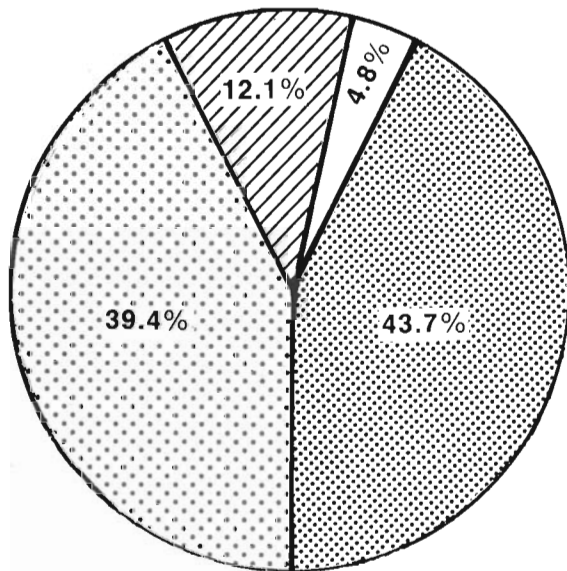

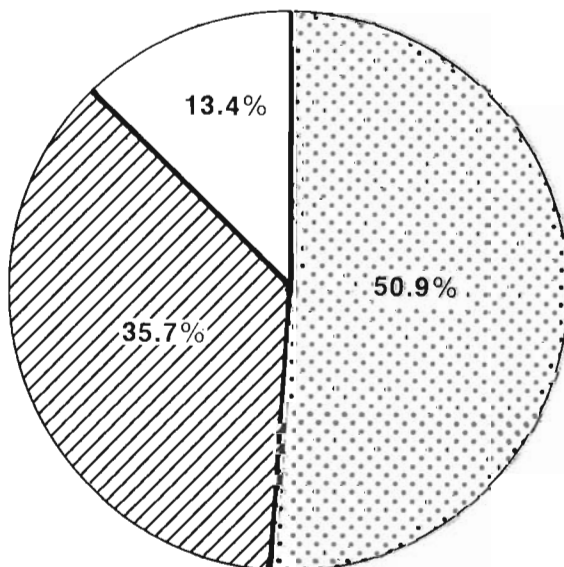

## PERSONS CHARGED

The disposition made of those persons arrested and formally charged in a court of jurisdiction is of great interest to the police administrator. Knowledge as to the quality of the police investigation, case preparation and presentation, may be gained from the subsequent dispositions of those cases which reach the court level. (Table 40)

In 1970, 85 percent of all persons arrested for Crime Index type offenses were turned over to the courts. Those adults charged with Crime Index offenses were found guilty by the courts in a little over 72 percent of all cases presented.

It must be recognized that not all persons who are arrested are turned over to the courts for prosecution. There are various reasons for this: Failure of the victim to cooperate or appear at time of trial, as victims of rape, is one reason for failure to prosecute effectively those persons arrested. Lack of sufficient evidence to support a charge and evidence obtained which discloses the arrested person did not commit the offense, are additional reasons for an arrested person not being brought to trial. For example: Almost one-half of all juveniles arrested were handled by the individual law enforcement agencies, without a formal charge against them or referring them to juvenile authorities. Police methods in handling juveniles differ throughout the state, but in this section all tables concerning juveniles refer to those who were arrested and turned over to juvenile authorities in connection with specific criminal offenses. (Table 41)

In 1970, slightly more than 44 percent of the murder defendants were either acquitted or their cases were dismissed at some prosecutive stage. Forcible rape recorded the highest rate of acquittal or dismissal with only a little over 4 of every 10 defendants found guilty as charged. Slightly over 48 percent of the atrocious assault defendants were acquitted or had their cases dismissed.

When all crime categories are reviewed, it is noted that convictions remain high in the following offense categories: An 89 percent rate of conviction was recorded for offenses against family and children, which includes desertion and nonsupport. Conviction for prostitution and commercialized vice, an offense involving morality, was computed at 88 percent. Offenses involving alcoholic beverages recorded a high conviction rate, with driving under the influence at 93 percent, and drunkenness at 89 percent.

Of those persons charged with Crime Index offenses and whose cases reached the court level, almost 10 percent were found guilty of a lesser crime and 28 percent were acquitted or dismissed. The highest percentage of

persons found guilty on the original charge in 1970 was in the larceny-theft category, where 91 percent of all defendants were convicted as charged. This was followed by breaking and entering, where almost 88 percent of the defendants were found guilty on the original charge. Those found guilty of the offense charged in the remaining Index offenses were recorded as follows: Murder, 87 percent; robbery, 85 percent; auto theft, 81 percent; atrocious assault, 65 percent; and rape, 66 percent. The offenses where the highest percentage of defendants were convicted of a lesser charge were atrocious assault, 18 percent and forcible rape, almost 14 percent.

In almost 42 percent of the Crime Index type offenses, where formal charges were preferred, the offender was referred to juvenile court. This juvenile referral percentage has remained substantially the same since 1967. Those referred to juvenile court were the highest in the auto theft category, at 62 percent and breaking and entering with 52 percent referrals. The remaining young people referred to juvenile court for Index type offenses revealed 42 percent of the larceny, 32 percent of robbery, 17 percent of the rape, 14 percent of the atrocious assaults and 11 percent of the murders. Arson, at 57 percent and malicious mischief, at 55 percent recorded the highest percentage of juvenile referrals for Non-Index type offenses in 1970.

As in prior years, disposition data for 1970 discloses that acquittals or dismissals are greater in the violent crimes of murder, rape, robbery and atrocious assault, than in the nonviolent crimes of breaking and entering, larceny and auto theft. Dismissal or acquittal for the violent crimes was reported at over 46 percent for 1970. The dismissal or acquittal rate for those crimes of a nonviolent nature was over 21 percent for the same period.

All the above data discloses the results of cases after police have arrested and formally charged the adult offender. The remaining cases are pending court action, or undecided cases at the year's end, are classified as pending and are carried from year to year until a disposition is furnished by a court of jurisdiction. For the year ending 1970, over 45,790 cases remain pending according to information supplied police by the various courts of New Jersey.

A final review of all crime categories discloses that over 25 percent of all adults tried by the courts were either acquitted or their cases were dismissed at some prosecutive level. Those referred to juvenile court represented over 21 percent of the total persons formally charged for all crime categories. (Table 42)

## BAIL INFORMATION

As an adjunct to the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Program, information regarding the bail experience of those persons charged by police is collected annually from the law enforcement agencies of the state. Measurement of this bail experience provides a base for consideration regarding the equity of bail in the administration of criminal justice within the state, as well as information regarding the initial status of those persons charged.

The categories of "Released in Bond or Bail", "Released on Own Recognizance", "Committed in Default of Bail", and "Committed Without Bail" are recorded by police as the information becomes known to them. This bail information, in most cases, must be obtained by police from the court and relates only to the first opportunity an arrested person has to post bail. A person may be committed in default of bail and then later post bail and be released. However, the status would be reported as "Committed in Default."

The law enforcement agencies of the state reported bail information regarding 143,590 persons for the year 1970. This figure represents almost a 90 percent portion of all those adults formally charged by police, and is the base used in all analyses presented.

Bail information regarding those adults charged with Crime Index type offenses discloses that almost 43 percent were released in bond or bail, 36 percent were committed in default, 15 percent were released in their own recognizance and 6 percent were committed without bail.

Bail information regarding those persons charged with the commission of a crime of violence, which includes murder, rape, robbery and atrocious assault,

discloses that 39 percent were released in bond or bail, 38 percent were committed in default of bail, 13 percent were committed without bail and 10 percent were released on their own recognizance.

Persons charged with nonviolent crimes, which includes breaking and entering, larceny-theft and auto theft, experienced the following initial bail status: Released in bond or bail, 44 percent; committed in default of bail, 35 percent; released on own recognizance, 17 percent and committed without bail, 3 percent. It is interesting to note that the percentage of those persons charged with a nonviolent crime who were committed in default of bail, represents 35 percent, very close to that of those persons charged with a violent type crime and committed in default, which represents 38 percent.

During the year 1970, the total bail experience of those persons charged by police is reflected in the 46 percent who were released in bond or bail, 26 percent released on their own recognizance, 24 percent committed in default of bail, and the 3 percent who were committed without bail.

The comparison of the total 1970 bail information with that of 1967, reflects significant changes in certain areas. By way of example, in 1967 the percentage of adults charged with offenses were committed without bail in almost 5 percent of all cases. The 1970 experience in the same area reflected that 3 percent were committed without bail, a rate decrease of 9 percent. The bail disposition area of "Released on Own Recognizance" has also reflected a change since 1967. In 1970, those persons who were released on their own recognizance accounted for over 26 percent of all dispositions. Compared to the less than 22 percent distribution figure of 1967, over a 20 percent increase is noted. (Table 43)

## CRIME STATISTICS BY GEOGRAPHIC REGION AND COUNTY

The presentation of criminal statistics by geographic regions of New Jersey, and by counties within the respective regions, is made for the purpose of further analysis of crime within the state. The type and volume of crime will vary from place to place as do the influencing factors which contribute to a crime rate. Recognition of these variances, through identification, helps provide a more equitable base for consideration. (Tables 44 through 62 and Charts 13 through 16.)

Geographic groupings by county, as shown in this section, were made using the following criteria: One, location in the state in relation to outside influence, (e.g. large urban centers); two, their general character, (e.g. urban or openness); three, the presence of major urban cores within individual counties. Employing these criteria the state was divided into four regions.

The Northwest Region contains Sussex, Warren and Hunterdon Counties. The region is primarily a rural area because of its distance from the two major metropolitan centers of New York and Philadelphia, as well as the absence of any major core cities.

The Northeast Region contains the eight counties of Bergen, Morris, Passaic, Essex, Hudson, Union, Somerset and Middlesex. The character of this region is a suburban-urban mix. The most densely populated urban

areas of the state and the nation with their complex problems are located within this region. The major urban cores are Newark, Jersey City and Paterson with surrounding suburban areas; but, of course, on the larger scale the region is oriented towards the New York metropolitan center. The industrial complex of the state is centered in this region as is more than 64 percent of the state's population.

The Southwest Region contains the four counties of Mercer, Burlington, Camden and Gloucester. The character of this area, is also a suburban-urban mix. The urban cores within the region are Trenton and Camden with surrounding suburban development, but the entire region is oriented towards the Philadelphia metropolitan center.

The Southeast Region contains the six counties of Monmouth, Ocean, Atlantic, Cape May, Cumberland and Salem. The general character of this region is rural except for the large resort area stretching along the Atlantic coast. The major center for this region is Atlantic City. The resident population of the resort counties within this region is dramatically supplemented during the summer season resulting in urban-like problems not normally associated with a "rural" classification.

## NORTHWEST REGION

### CRIME VOLUME AND RATE

The police of the Northwest Region reported a total of 2,843 Crime Index offenses during the year 1970. When compared to 1969, this represents a 17 percent increase in reported offenses for the Northwest Region. Almost 5 percent of all offenses reported were of the violent crime group, which includes murder, rape, robbery and atrocious assault. Over 95 percent of all crimes reported were of a nonviolent nature which include breaking and entering, larceny \$50 and over and auto theft.

Variations in crime counts for the region, 1970 over 1969, included an 11 percent increase in both atrocious assaults and breaking and entering. The largest increase was found in larcenies \$50 and over, up over 36 percent.

The greatest frequency of crime occurrence for the region was recorded in the two month period of July and August. The second two month high was found in the months of October and November. The individual yearly high was reached in July, and the low during the month of May. (Chart 13)

During 1970, there were almost 1,286 victims of Index Crime for each 100,000 inhabitants of the region. Although this represents the lowest rate for any region within the state, it still disclosed an increase of almost 13 percent when compared to 1969, and over a 28 percent upward trend since 1967. The violent crime rate of almost 60 per 100,000 inhabitants reflected an increase of almost 2 percent when compared to 1969. The nonviolent crime rate grew to 1,226 victims per 100,000, an increase of over 13 percent for the same period.

### CLEARANCES

Law enforcement agencies of this region were

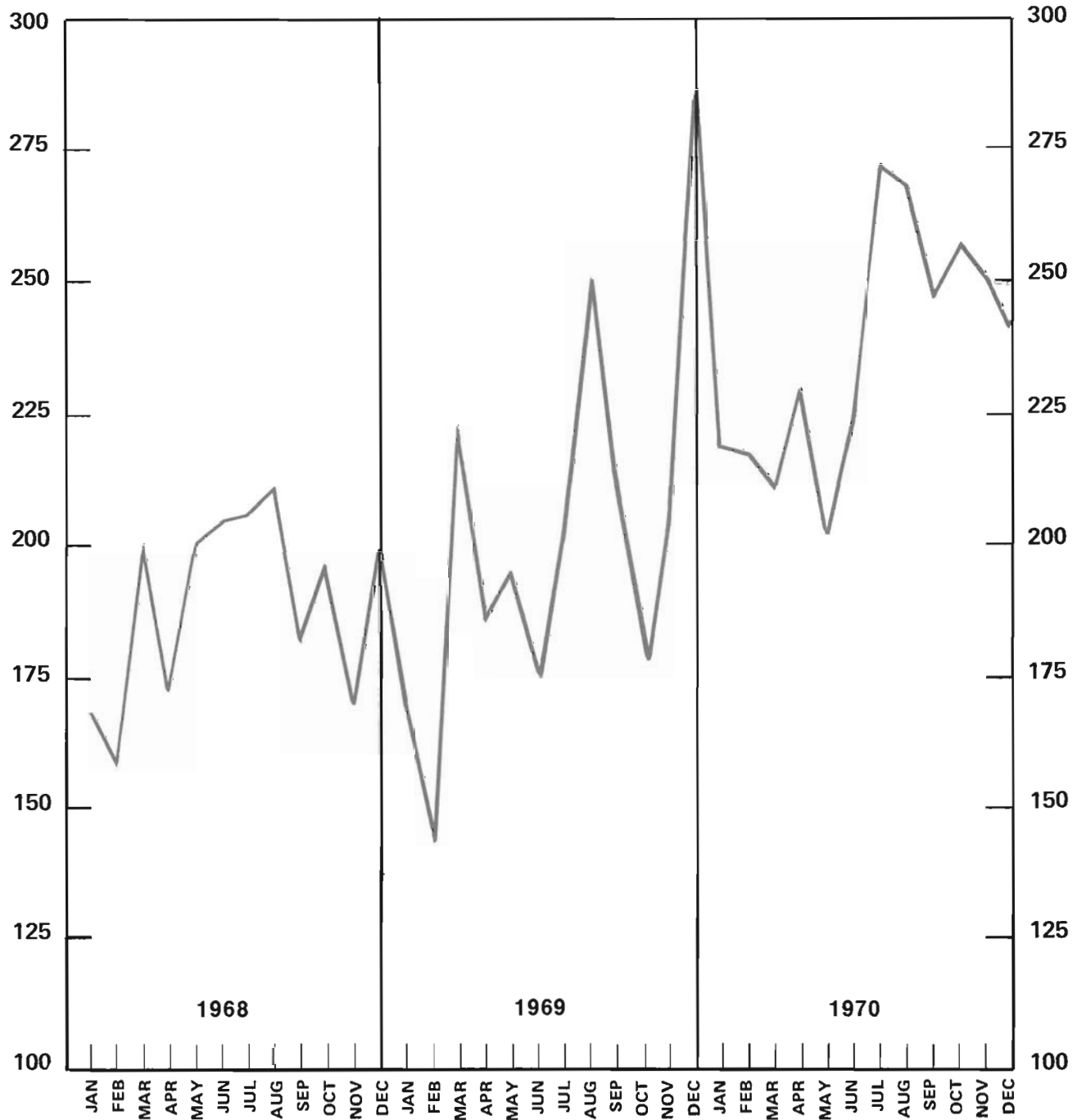
successful in solving over 16 percent of all Crime Index offenses reported to them during 1970. This clearance rate represents a decrease of almost 5 percent in the rate of solutions over 1969. As with other regions of the state, the percentage of solutions for those crimes of a violent nature far exceeded that for those crimes of the nonviolent group. The four murders occurring in this region were all solved, almost 3 of every 4 rape cases were cleared, and 8 out of 10 atrocious assault offenses were solved. Nonviolent crime solutions were highest in the auto theft category where almost 3 of every 10 cases were reported solved.

### PERSONS ARRESTED

In 1970, a total of 4,050 persons were arrested for all crimes in the Northwest Region. This arrest figure discloses an upward trend of over 14 percent when compared to 1969, and over a 51 percent increase over 1967. Over 18 percent of all the arrests were for the serious Crime Index offenses. Within these arrests, 8 percent were for violent crimes, and the remaining 92 percent being arrests for the nonviolent property type crimes. The highest volume of persons arrested for an individual offense within the Index occurred in the category of breaking and entering, where more than 45 percent of the total arrests were found.

The number of juvenile arrests for all crimes within the region represented 29 percent of the total arrest picture. The arrest of persons under 18 years of age made up almost 55 percent of the total arrests for serious Index crime, with more than half of these being arrested for breaking and entering, larceny or auto theft. Juvenile arrests for all crimes within the region were up almost 11 percent, while adult arrests disclosed almost a 16 percent rise over 1969.

## NORTHEAST REGION

A total of 127,825 Crime Index offenses were reported for the densely populated Northeast Region during the year 1970, almost a 10 percent increase from the 116,314 reported in 1969. This high crime volume for a region which houses more than 64 percent of the state's population, represents 65 percent of the total Index offenses reported for the entire state.

The violent crime group of murder, rape, robbery and atrocious assault accounted for 12 percent of the Index total. Almost a 20 percent increase in volume was noted for the period 1969 through 1970. The nonviolent group of breaking and entering, larceny \$50 and over and auto theft comprised the remaining 88 percent, and reflected almost a 9 percent increase when compared to 1969. There were significant increases in certain crime categories, 1970 over 1969. Robbery was up more than 25 percent and murder rose over 17 percent within the violent crime group, while larceny-theft in the nonviolent group, increased well over 11 percent.

By month, the highest crime volume was recorded during June with the low reflected during January. As in 1968 and 1969, the seasonal high was recorded during the summer period of June through August. A three year monthly crime frequency trend for the region is shown in Chart 14.

The Northeast Region crime rate for Index offenses was computed at 2,774 victims per 100,000 population, over a 12 percent increase in the regional crime rate computed for 1969. Since 1967, the victim rate has increased almost 39 percent from the 1,997 victims per 100,000 inhabitants recorded during that period.

### CLEARANCES

In 1970, the police of this region were successful in solving almost 14 percent of all Crime Index offenses reported to them. This solution rate represents a slight increase over the percentage of case clearances reported in 1969. In the violent crime group, police were successful in solving almost 75 percent of the murders, 66

percent of the atrocious assaults, over 58 percent of the rapes and 20 percent of the robberies. Clearances for those crimes of a nonviolent nature, were considerably lower than for those of the violent crime group. Solutions for breaking and enterings occurred in 12 percent of all cases reported. Larcenies were solved in 10 percent of all instances, and auto theft, a little over a 7 percent clearance rate.

### PERSONS ARRESTED

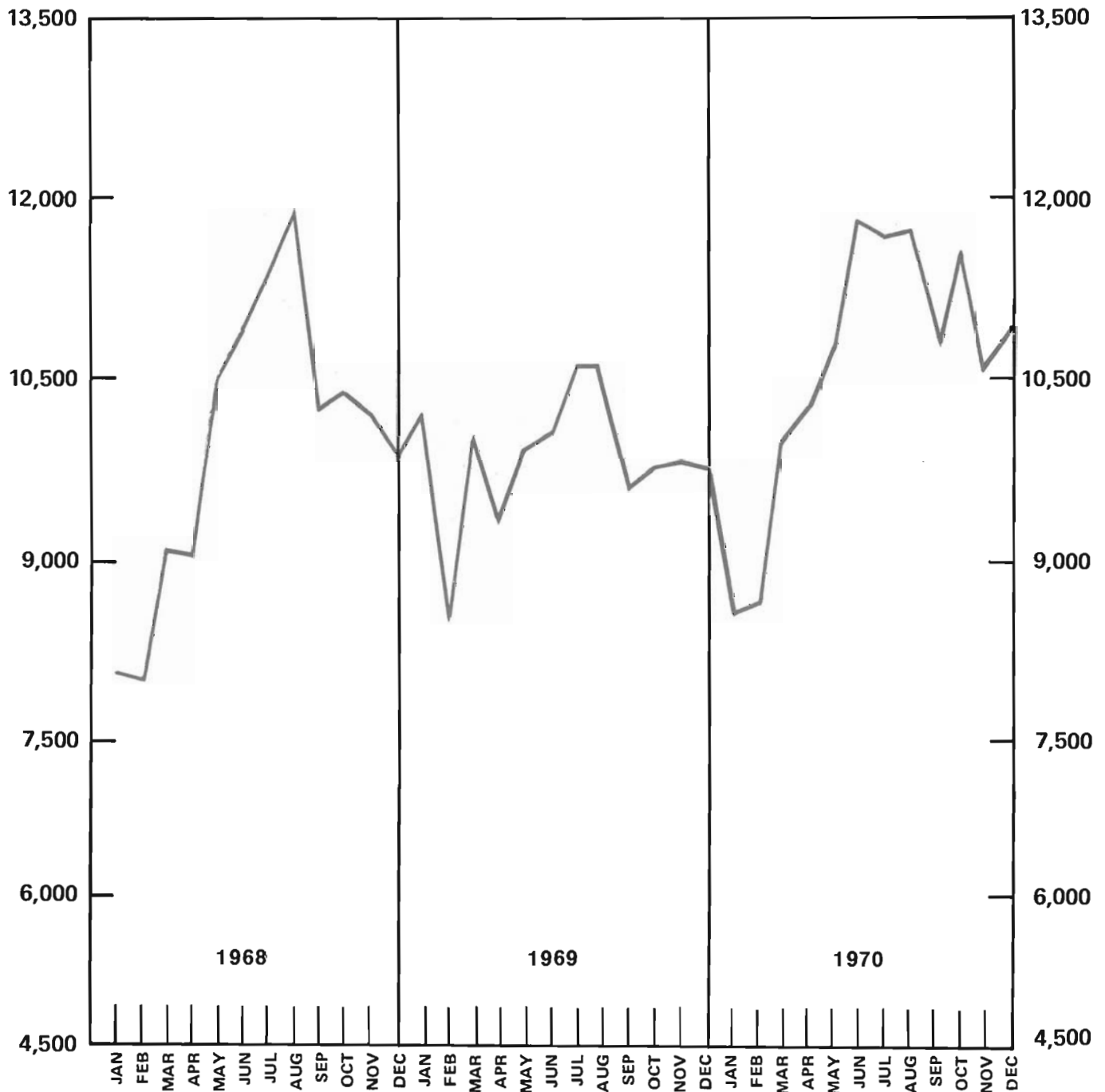
The police of the Northeast Region reported a total of 152,844 persons arrested for all crimes during the year 1970, over a 10 percent increase in arrest activity since 1969.

Arrests of persons for crimes within the Crime Index amounted to 29,253 or 19 percent of the total arrests recorded for the region. Arrests for the violent crimes, as a group, made up almost 22 percent of all arrests for Index offenses, with the remaining 78 percent of arrests being for the nonviolent property type offenses.

Larceny-theft offenses recorded the highest individual arrest count within the Index, the more than 14,000 arrests represented over 48 percent of all arrests recorded for Index type offenses during the year.

The 59,735 juveniles arrested for all crimes in the Northeast Region represent almost a 39 percent portion of the total arrest figure for the region. This arrest involvement of persons under 18 years of age was again higher in this region than any other region of the state. When compared to 1969, over a 10 percent increase in the volume of juvenile arrests is noted. One-half of those persons arrested for serious crime were under the age of 18. Juvenile involvement, by arrest, was predominantly in property crime, where 62 percent of all persons arrested for auto theft, 57 percent of those arrested for larceny, and almost 56 percent of all arrests for breaking and entering, were of the young age group. Juvenile involvement, as to specific crimes of violence, was noted in robbery, over a 37 percent implication.

## SOUTHWEST REGION

### CRIME VOLUME AND RATE

The police of the Southwest Region reported 35,488 Crime Index offenses during the year 1970, a percentage rise of almost 19 percent over 1969 counts. This region experienced the largest increase in Index offenses of any of the four regions. The violent crime group of murder, rape, robbery and atrocious assault, represented a little over 8 percent of all Index crimes reported, and also reflected an increase of over 17 percent since 1969. Robbery, within this violent group, disclosed over a 22 percent increase, 1970 over 1969. A slight decrease was noted for forcible rape offenses within this same group.

Nonviolent crime volumes contributed the remaining 92 percent to the total Index count, almost a 19 percent volume rise over 1969. Significant volume increases were noted for breaking and entering and auto theft, a little over 13 percent and almost 23 percent respectively. Increases for these two offenses for this region were highest among all four regions of the state. In addition, the largest individual offense variance for the Southwest Region was the 24 percent increase in larcenies \$50 and over.

The greatest volume of crime occurred, as in previous years, during the last quarter of 1970, October through December, with the individual high being recorded in December.

Region crime volumes, when related to population, resulted in a victim risk rate of 2,825 victims for every 100,000 inhabitants of the Southwest Region, up over 21 percent from the 2,326 victim rate recorded in 1969.

### CLEARANCES

Almost 12 percent of all Index offenses reported to the

police were solved during the year 1970, the lowest solution rate recorded for any of the four regions. Clearances for those crimes of the violent group occurred in almost 35 percent of all such cases reported. Successful solutions were made in almost 85 percent of the murders, 67 percent of the atrocious assaults, 56 percent of the rapes and over 15 percent of the robberies.

Nonviolent crime clearances occurred in almost 10 percent of all cases reported to the police of the Southwest Region. Solution was provided in almost 12 percent of the breaking and enterings, 8 percent of the larcenies and 8 percent of the auto thefts reported.

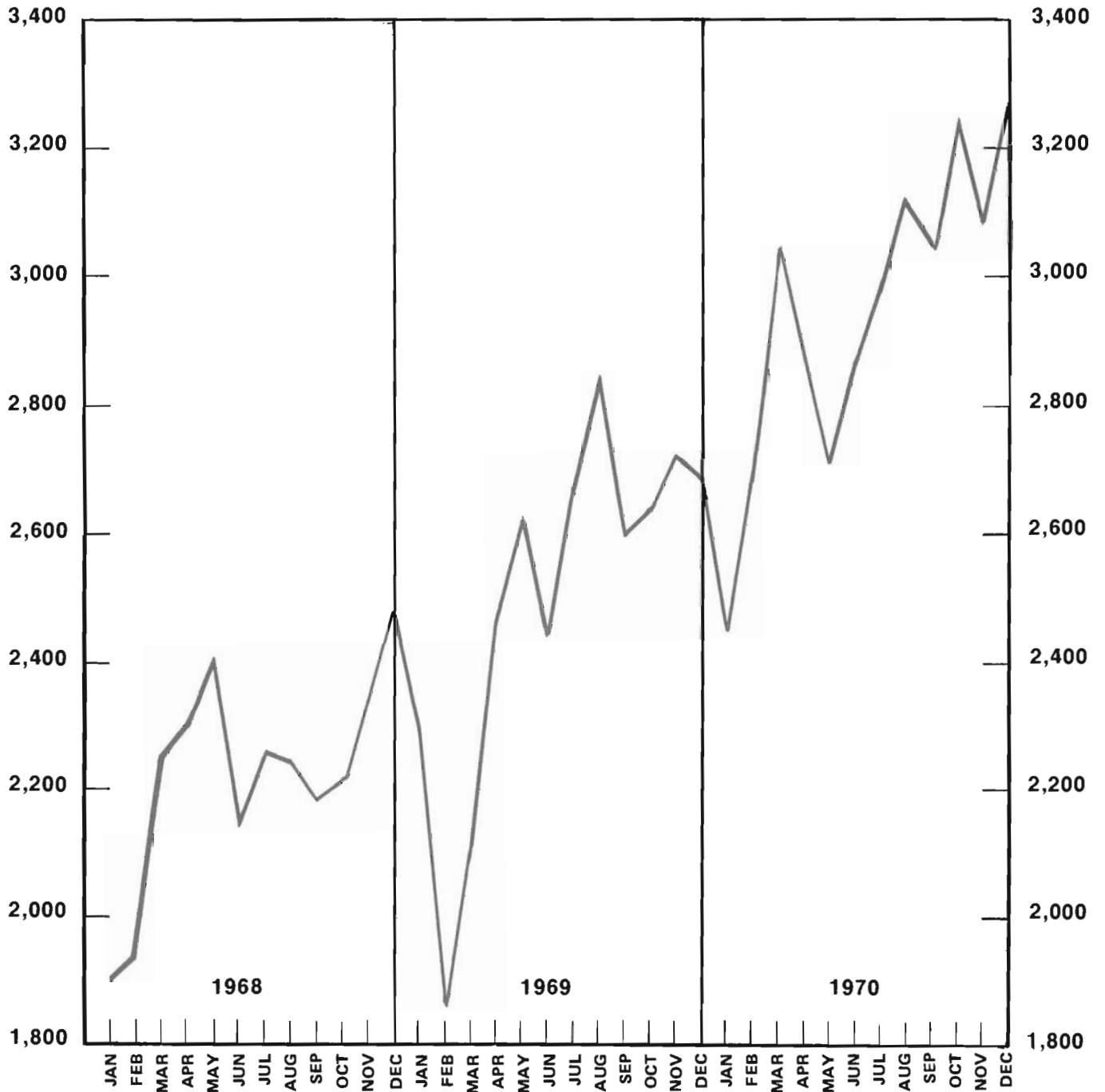
### PERSONS ARRESTED

The police of this region reported a total of 43,973 persons arrested for all crimes during the year, a volume increase of almost 14 percent since 1969.

Arrests for those serious offenses of the Crime Index represent almost a 19 percent portion of all arrests reported. Over 15 percent of all arrests for offenses within the Index were for the violent crimes of murder, rape, robbery and atrocious assault. Arrests for nonviolent crimes made up the remaining 85 percent of all Index type arrests, with the greatest distribution being in the larceny category, where almost 46 percent of this group's arrests were accounted for. Arrests for violent crime increased by 20 percent during the year, while nonviolent crime arrests rose over 22 percent.

The arrests of those persons under 18 years of age, during 1970, represents over a 20 percent increase from the 12,405 juvenile arrests reported in 1969. For the same period, adult arrests for all crimes disclosed an 11 percent increase from the 26,187 arrests reported in 1969.

## SOUTHEAST REGION

### CRIME VOLUME AND RATE

A total of 30,462 Crime Index offenses were reported to the police of the Southeast Region during the year 1970, over a 13 percent increase from the 26,891 offenses reported for 1969.

Over 9 percent of the serious crimes reported were of the violent type, and the remaining over 90 percent of the crimes reported were of the nonviolent property nature. Violent crime increased over 17 percent, while nonviolent crime increased almost 19 percent, 1970 over 1969.

Substantial increases were noted in individual crime categories, 1970 over 1969. Robbery and atrocious assaults recorded rises of 38 and 15 percent respectively, the highest increases when compared to other regions for the same offenses. Larceny-theft of the nonviolent group revealed over a 22 percent increase for the same period. The only decrease was noted in murder offenses, almost a 4 percent decrease since 1969.

The highest crime volumes were recorded during the third quarter of the year, July through September, with the largest individual counts reported during the month of August. This summer season rise is expected in a resort oriented area, such as the Southeast Region, and its effect on the reported annual crime experience for this region reflects the degree of this influence as shown in Chart 16.

The resulting crime rate for the Southeast Region, almost 2,810 victims for every 100,000 persons within the region, reflects an increase of almost 12 percent, 1970 over 1969.

### CLEARANCES

Law enforcement in the Southeast Region cleared by arrest slightly over 15 percent of all Crime Index offenses

reported to them during the year, up from the 1969 solution rate of over 14 percent.

Clearances for those crimes of a violent nature occurred in over 39 percent of all such cases reported to police. Solutions were reported in almost 75 percent of the atrocious assaults, over 67 percent of the murders, over 61 percent of the forcible rapes and almost 28 percent of the robberies. As with the other regions of the state, the percentage of nonviolent crimes solved was considerably lower than that of the violent crime group, here almost an 11 percent clearance rate was computed. Solution rates for breaking and entering and auto theft were identical, slightly over a 15 percent clearance rate. Larcenies \$50 and over experienced almost a 9 percent solution rate during 1970.

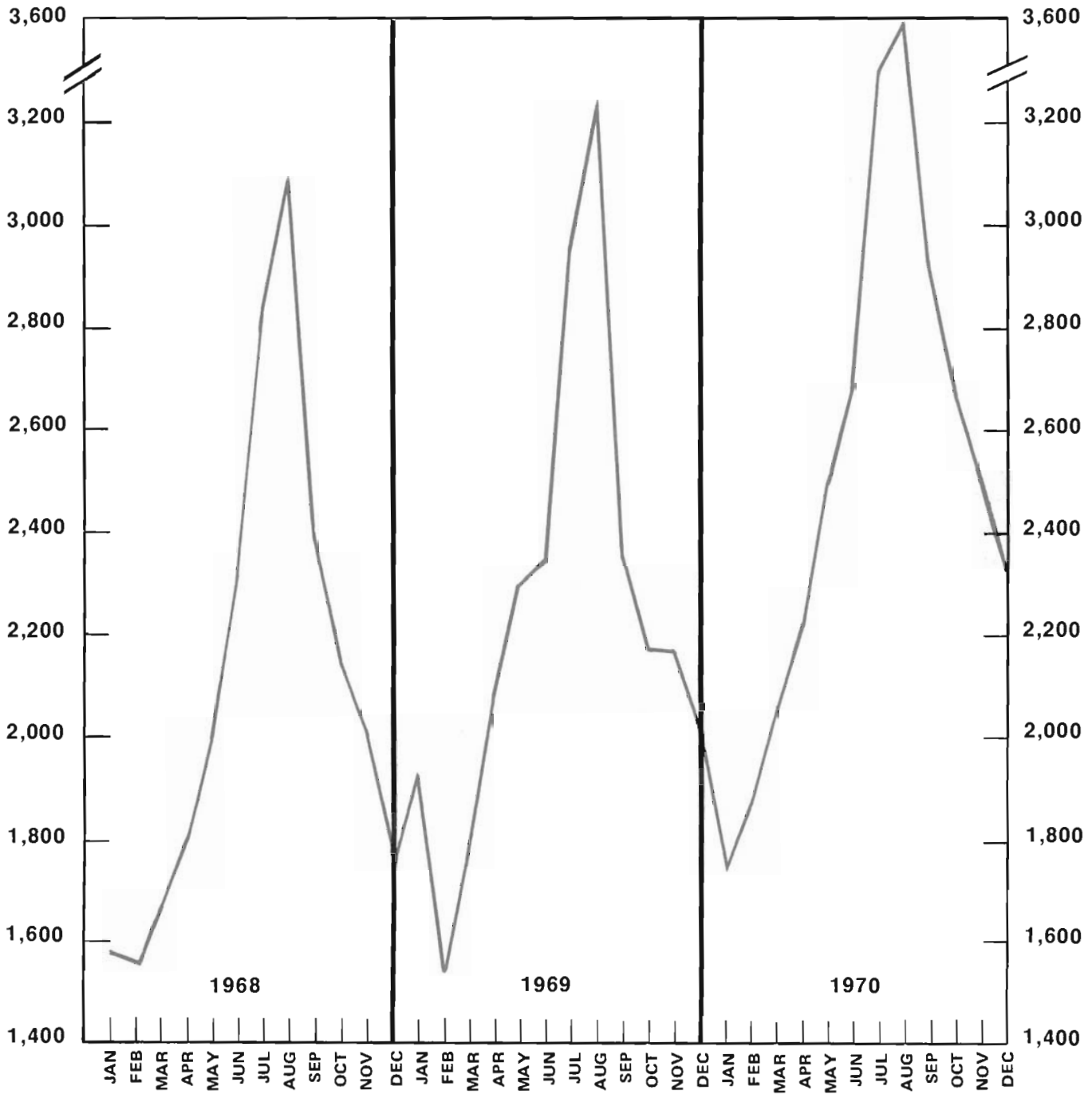
### PERSONS ARRESTED

The police of this region reported a total of 47,550 persons arrested for all crimes during the year, an increase of almost 6 percent over the 44,956 arrests reported in 1969.

Arrests for those serious Crime Index offenses represent slightly over a 16 percent portion of all arrests reported, with a distribution of 16 percent for violent crime and the remaining 84 percent for those crimes of a nonviolent property nature. The 1970 volume of arrests for violent crime increased almost 15 percent since 1969, while nonviolent crime arrest volumes rose over 5 percent when compared to the previous year.

During 1970, there were 14,680 persons under 18 years of age arrested for all crimes, as compared to 32,870 adults arrested during the same period. Juvenile arrests increased slightly over 11 percent from the 13,205 arrests reported in 1969, while adult arrests increased over 3 percent since 1969.

## POPULATION GROUPS

The presentation of crime statistics by population groups was made for the purpose of projecting, for consideration, the relative crime experience of communities of varying populations. Although the individual municipalities within the various groups may be geographically separated, their inclusion into a specific group was predicated by the similarity in population with the other municipalities within the group. Municipalities within the same group may differ widely when all factors are considered but they do share the common bond of population size. The grouping of communities in this manner allows recognition of variances in the crime volumes, rates and clearances between the established groups. (Table 63)

## MUNICIPAL OFFENSE DATA

The 1970 offense data provided in this section is shown as it relates to the incorporated New Jersey municipality in which the offense occurred and is based on the individual contribution of crime statistics by the respective police jurisdictions of the state.

The isolation of offenses by place of occurrence, as shown in Table 64, makes possible the projection of a more accurate statistical picture of the individual community's crime experience. Additionally, this

approach has provided a sound base for offense computation and analysis by county, region, population group and state. This application has been made, in varying forms, in all of the preceding offense information shown.

The statistical tables which follow offer numerical counts of all offenses reported during 1970, also a "Crime Index Total" column, which is used to compute the crime rate of a municipality, has been included.

## POLICE EMPLOYEE DATA

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program of New Jersey incorporates the collection of pertinent data relating to the police of the state. Information regarding police employee strength, distributions, assaults against law enforcement officers and circumstances surrounding the killings of police officers are discussed in this section.

Individual listings of municipal police departments for the organized police departments of the state are shown in Table 65. Although the Uniform Crime Reporting Law did not become effective until January 1, 1967, the municipal police departments of New Jersey voluntarily submitted data for 1966. Any references made to that year are based on these submissions.

### POLICE EMPLOYEE TRENDS

In 1970, the number of municipal police employees of New Jersey (including civilian personnel) increased to 15,637 from the 14,807 reported in 1969, representing a percentage increase of almost 6 percent. The Southwest Region registered the largest gain, over 31 percent, and the densely populated Northeast Region, the smallest, slightly over 4 percent.

When comparing 1970 individual county volumes for municipal police employees, an extensive range of variances emerge for the period 1970 over 1969. All counties reflected an increase, with Warren County's numerical increase of 9 representing a 17 percent increase, while Atlantic County's increase of 13 police employees represented almost a 3 percent increase.

### POLICE EMPLOYEE RATES

During 1970, the number of municipal police employees (including civilian personnel) for every 1,000 inhabitants of the state increased to 2.2 per 1,000, up from the 1969 rate of 2.0 per 1,000 residents. This rate increase of 10 percent, 1970 over 1969, and the almost 16 percent increase since 1967, is relatively small when we consider the rise in the criminal and noncriminal demands placed upon the police of New Jersey.

The Southwest Region of the state experienced a significant increase in the number of police employees per 1,000 permanent residents, the 1970 rate of 2.1 reflected a 40 percent increase from the 1.5 rate per 1,000 in 1969. The 1970 rate of 0.7 per 1,000 in the Northwest Region, when compared to the 0.6 rate of 1969, reflected almost a 17 percent increase in the police employee rate. The rate for the Southeast Region rose from 1.9 per 1,000 to 2.0 per 1,000, slightly over a 5 percent increase since 1969. The populous Northeast Region recorded slightly over a 4 percent increase, 1970 over 1969, up from the 2.3 rate in 1969 to the 2.4 rate per 1,000 in 1970. (Chart 17)

### CIVILIAN EMPLOYEES

In 1970, almost 9 percent of the 15,637 police employees were civilians, an 11 percent increase over 1969. Within regions, the ratio of civilian municipal police employees varied from 7.5 in the Southwest Region to 9.3 in the Southeast Region.

The personnel of each department differ as to the demands and responsibilities placed before them. Many police officers are fully occupied with clerical tasks and are not free to perform active police duties. This current upward trend in employing civilians in police departments to perform clerical duties, is in line with the thinking of many police administrators who recommend the use of civilians in this capacity, thus freeing the sworn personnel for actual police related service.

### POLICE OFFICERS

In 1970, the number of full time municipal police officers in New Jersey increased to 14,287 from the 13,591 recorded for 1969. This volume increase represents almost a 6 percent increase over 1969 counts.

The number of full time municipal police officers for each 1,000 persons of the state rose to 2.0 in 1970, up from the 1.9 rate per 1,000 recorded in 1969. This increase represents slightly over a 5 percent rise in rate, 1970 over 1969. Since the 1966 rate of 1.7 police officers per 1,000 residents, the rate of growth has been less than dramatic, with under an 18 percent increase.

Regionally the number of full time municipal police officers for each 1,000 residents ranged from 0.6 per 1,000 in the Northwest Region to 2.2 in the Northeast Region. Individual county rates ranged from 0.4 in Hunterdon County and 3.3 per 1,000 inhabitants in Cape May County. (Chart 17)

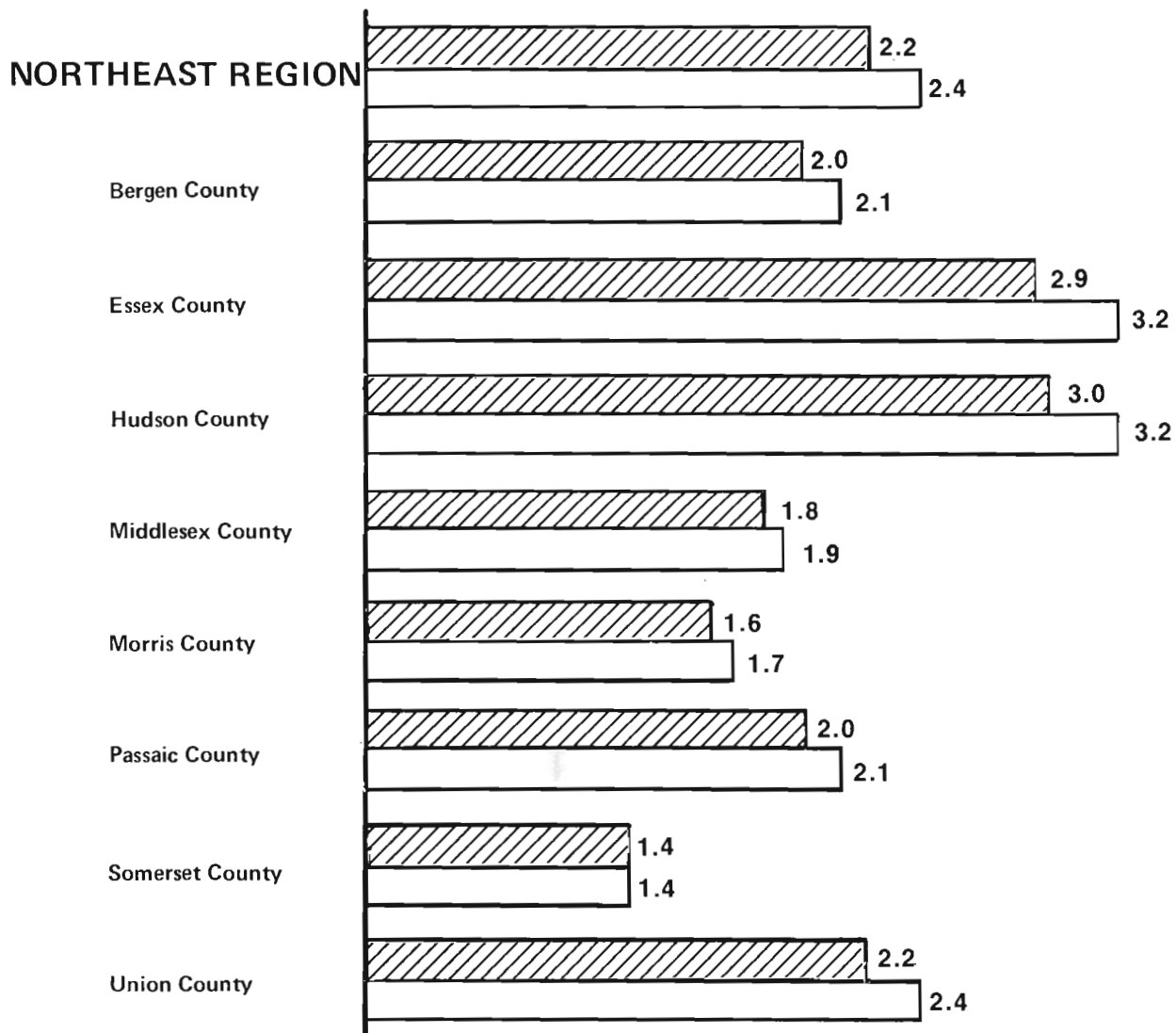
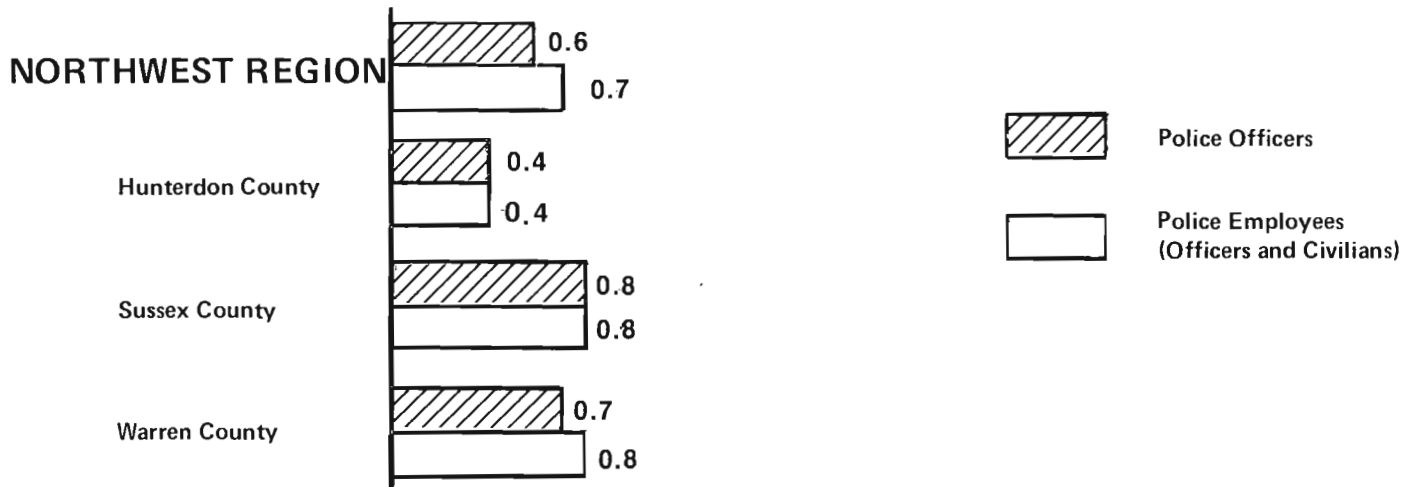
The police employee rates per 1,000 population presented here should not be construed as being recommended ratios. The determination of police strength for any municipality or jurisdiction should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. These factors, as crime, vary in type and degree from place to place. Some examples are seasonal populations, geographic location, density and composition of the population.

### COUNTY POLICE, SHERIFFS AND PROSECUTORS

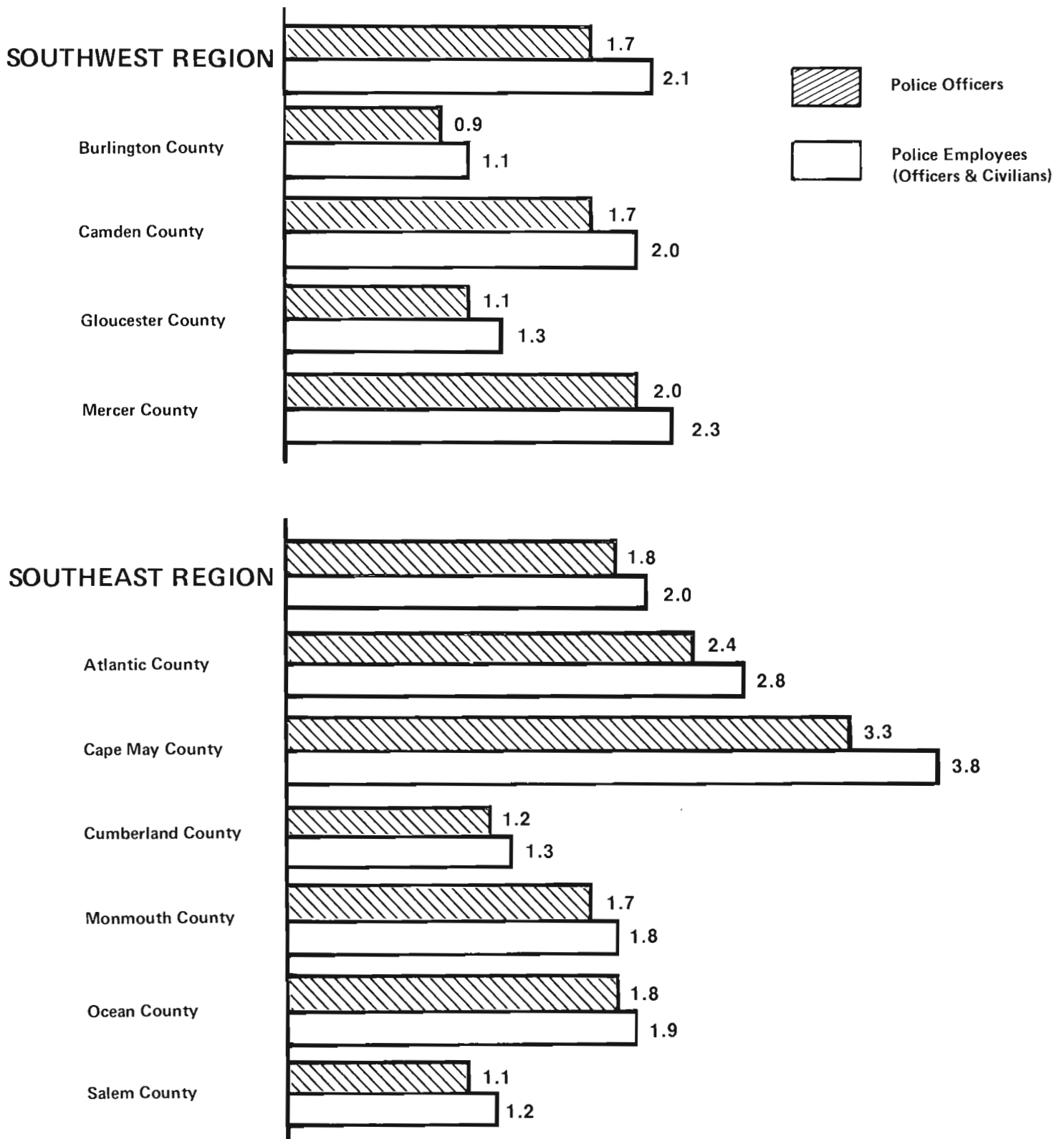
The functions of county law enforcement officers vary widely throughout the state. The operations of one sheriff's department may be limited exclusively to civil areas and the administration of the county jail, or they may be actively involved in criminal matters throughout the county. County police departments are varied in their activities as well, in that some are responsible for total enforcement throughout the county while others may have as their primary mission the policing of county parklands. The responsibilities of county prosecutor's officers include criminal investigation, trial preparation, court presentation and special probes. Because of the difference in the types of police service rendered, rates for county law enforcement agencies are not presented here.

The county law enforcement agencies of the state employed a total of 2,492 police employees during the year 1970. This figure represents over a 9 percent increase in the police employees reported for the year 1967. (Table 66)

Over 23 percent of all persons employed by county law enforcement agencies during 1970 were civilians. The increase in the number of civilian personnel, 1970 over 1969, amounted to almost 11 percent, while sworn personnel decreased slightly over 6 percent.

### STATE POLICE

The New Jersey State Police is empowered to provide all phases of law enforcement throughout the state. It also renders police services, upon request, to all the law enforcement agencies in the state. No rates are used due to the variations in the nature and extent of the police services performed by the State Police.

The State Police in 1970 employed a total of 2,024 employees. Of these, 23 percent were civilians, and the remaining 77 percent were sworn personnel. The 2,024 State Police employees, both sworn and civilian, are dispersed throughout the state, therefore making it even more difficult to compute State Police employee rates by region or county.

The total number of State Police employees increased slightly over 9 percent since 1969. Included in this increase was almost a 13 percent rise in the number of civilian employees, and slightly over an 8 percent increase in sworn personnel.

### POLICE KILLED AND ASSAULTED

The killing or assault of a police officer has an effect on society which reaches far beyond the overt act. Such occurrences constitute an immediate threat to the well-being of the community and a serious breach of the internal security of the country. Today, a young man who considers a career in law enforcement must also consider the very strong possibility of being killed or assaulted by a member of the very same society he is sworn to protect. This deplorable situation should be a subject of serious public concern for, in truth, an attack on a police officer is an attack on society. The violence directed against law enforcement officers acting in the line of duty is clearly demonstrated by the following information.

### POLICE KILLED

During 1970, three New Jersey police officers lost their lives as a result of criminal action directed against them.

Analysis of these murders disclosed that one officer, off duty, was slain while attempting to halt a robbery in progress, one was killed by a sniper while responding to a reported fire and the remaining officer was murdered when he attempted to question two suspicious persons.

Weapon circumstances surrounding the slaying of the three police officers were identical, in that a firearm was the instrument of death in all cases. A handgun was the weapon employed in one police murder, a shotgun in another and a rifle was used in the remaining murder. Since 1966, all but one of 13 New Jersey police officers slain in the line of duty have died as a result of gunshot wounds.

### ASSAULTS ON POLICE

There were 2,113 assaults against municipal police officers reported during 1970, a 12 percent increase over 1969 counts. Since 1966, assaults on police officers have

increased almost 77 percent, thus presenting New Jersey law enforcement with a serious problem which has grown to major proportions.

Every police officer who is assaulted does not suffer personal injury, however, almost 40 percent of all the police officers attacked during 1970 did sustain physical injury to one degree or another. Those assaults resulting in physical injury to the police officer are frequently followed by loss of duty time by the officer.

The 1970 rate of police officers assaulted in the state was computed at 14.8 assaults for every 100 municipal police officers. When compared to the 1969 rate of police assaults, 13.9 per 100, the risk of a New Jersey police officer becoming the victim of an assault rose more than 6 percent. Since 1966, the police assault rate has increased over 46 percent. Assault and injury rates are shown by population group in Table 68 for the purpose of projecting the comparative assault experience of police in communities of varying populations.

### WEAPONS USED

In 1970, personal weapons, such as hands, fists and feet, were used in over 86 percent of all assaults on police officers. Other dangerous weapons, such as clubs, bricks, jack handles, etc., were used in slightly over 9 percent of all police assaults, while firearms and knives reflected an involvement of almost 3 percent and 2 percent, respectively. (Chart 18)

### TYPE OF ACTIVITY

The police services performed by enforcement agencies vary widely, and are governed by the nature of the demands for this service in both criminal and noncriminal activities. Analysis by the type of service being rendered, which resulted in the assault of a police officer, provides an indication as to the degree of jeopardy in which the officer may be placed when faced with a given situation.

As in prior years, the greatest frequency of assaults on police occurred while the officer was attempting to effect an arrest, almost a 28 percent involvement. Response to disturbance calls, such as tavern quarrels, family disputes, etc., accounted for slightly over 25 percent, assaults by persons detected during the commission of a criminal act or who were fleeing the scene of a crime, over a 14 percent involvement.

Those assaults on police who were summoned to the scene of a civil disorder made up almost 9 percent of all assaults reported, and police assaulted while investigating suspicious persons or circumstances over 5 percent. The police officers assaulted who were engaged in transporting prisoners made up over 4 percent of all assaults reported, and the handling of berserk or deranged persons accounted for 3 percent of the total. The remaining percentage occurred in activities other than those described. (Chart 19)

### CLEARANCES

Although an assault upon a police officer is a high misdemeanor in this state, police charged only slightly over 42 percent of the persons arrested with this serious crime. The remaining 58 percent were charged under the less severe misdemeanor or nonindictable section of the law.

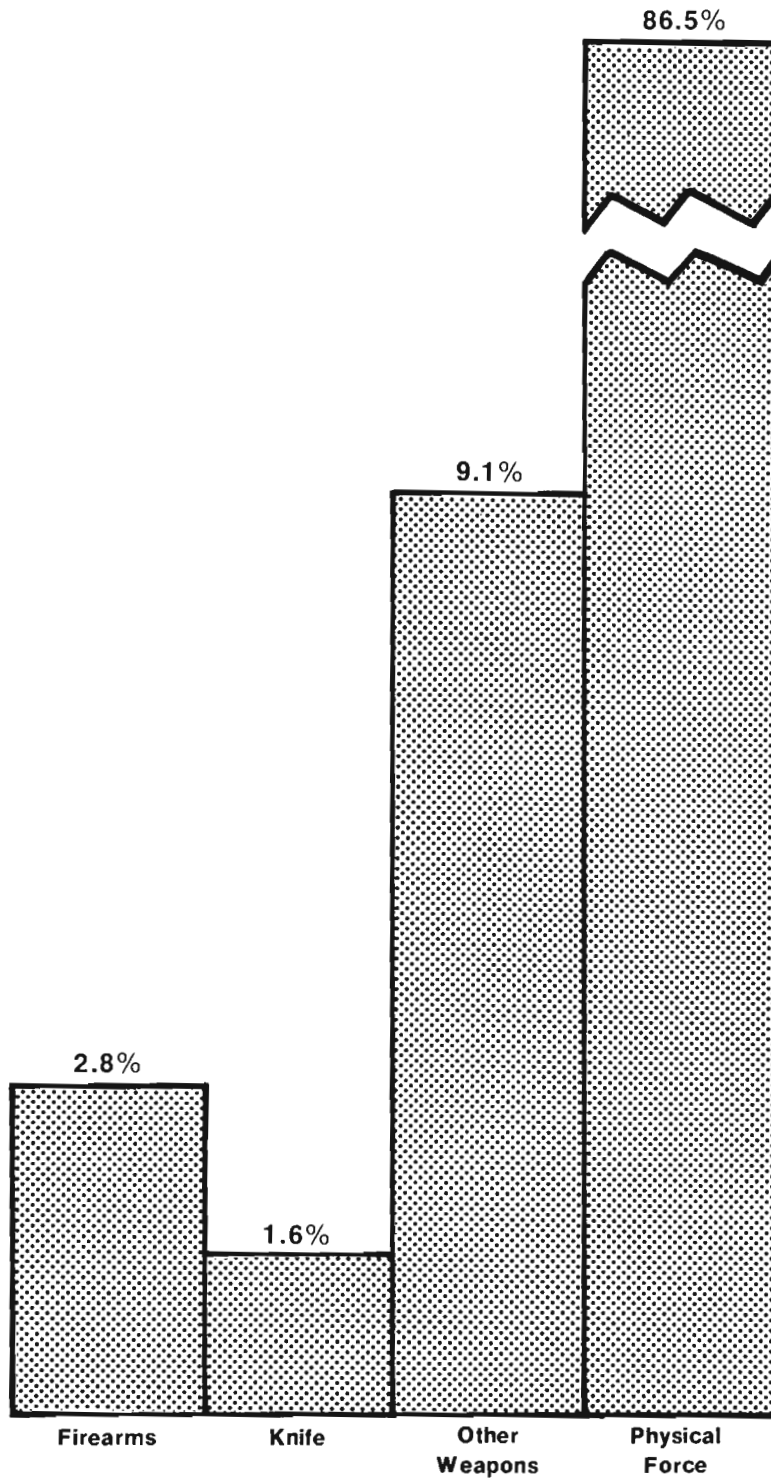

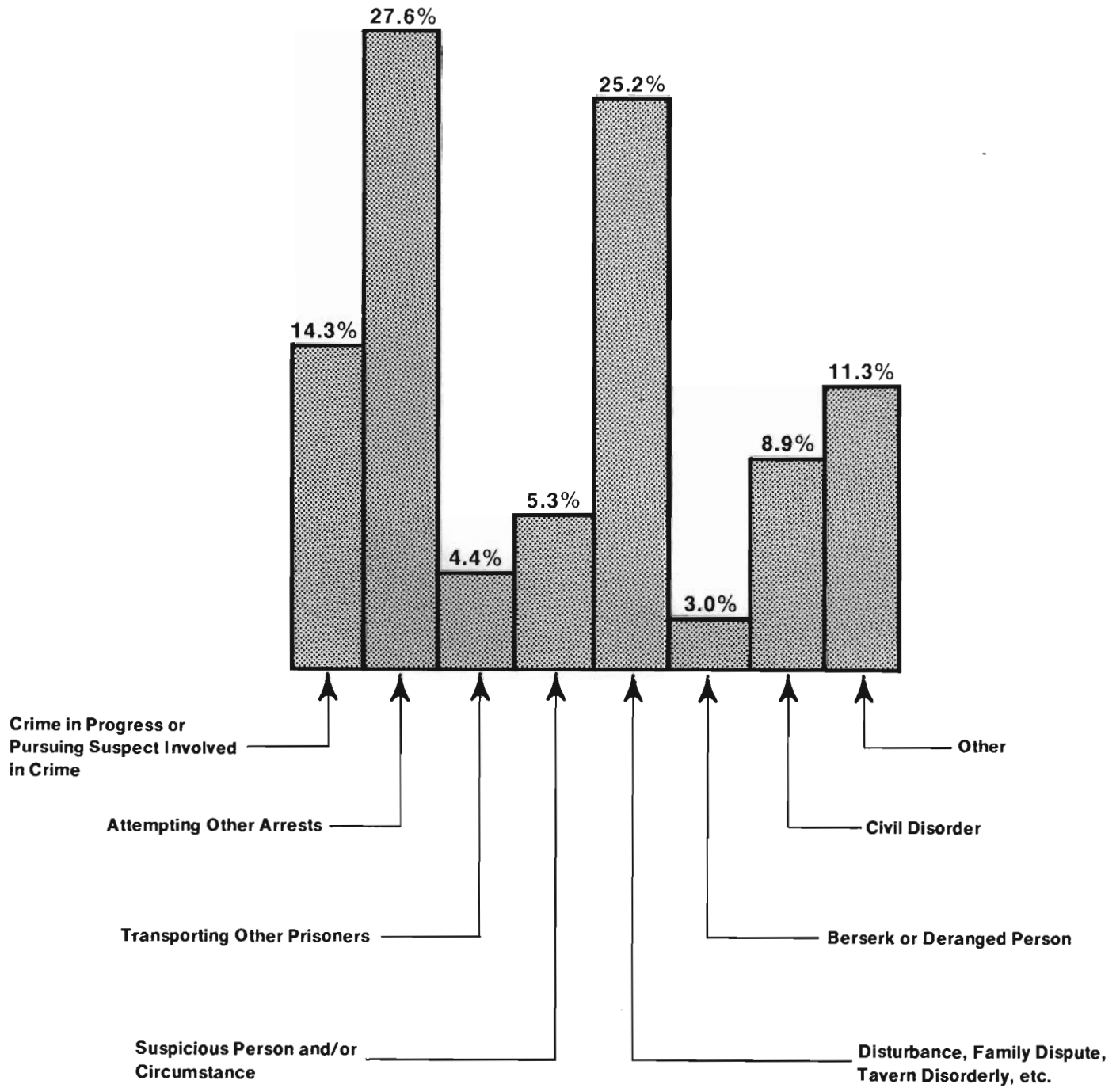
