To His Excellency Robert S. Green, Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

SIR: I have the honor to submit the following report of this department for the year 1889:

It is with much emotion that I seat myself at the desk and take the pen of my life-time friend to write an official document, which, had he lived a few short days, it would have been his duty to prepare. I will then be pardoned, I am sure, in placing on record at this time, and in this place, the sense of personal loss I feel in the death of General Perrine, who for nearly half a century was a prominent figure in the military service of this State. I shall here bear my witness to his untiring zeal and ability in the discharge of the duties of Quartermaster-General during the long period of the Civil War, to his strict honesty of purpose and of life in all his varied responsibilities, to his unswerving truthfulness in every word he uttered, to his great personal and moral courage in every act of his official and private life.

He died on Tuesday morning, September 24, 1889, at his residence in this city.

By General Orders No. 15, dated October 3, 1889, from the Adjutant-General's office, I was assigned by you in addition to my duties as Adjutant-General to the position of Acting Quartermaster-General until further orders. This office also required me to perform the duties of Acting Commissary-General, of Acting Paymaster-General and Acting Chief of Ordnance.

ORDNANCE DEPARTMENT.

Since the last annual report most of the arms in the possession of the National Guard have undergone thorough repair at the State

Arsenal, and, although by reason of continuous service for a period of nearly fifteen years they are hardly adapted for fine and accurate work on the Rifle Range, they are now in fairly good condition, as will be seen by reference to the abstract of the annual returns in the appendix.

We have made but slight addition to our stock of Springfield breech-loading rifles during the year. We purchased twenty Springfield rifles of the model of 1879 of a New York firm with which to complete the armament of the new company of infantry located at Dover; and we drew on requisition from the United States forty of the model of 1884 for the use of the State team in practice and competition during the Interstate match at Sea Girt. By reference to Statement C in appendix it will be seen that there are not sufficient breech-loading Springfield rifles in store to arm a company of infantry. We also drew from the general government one thousand (1,000) sets of new accoutrements of the regulation pattern, for which the State furnished the necessary belt and cartridge box plates and bayonet scabbard attachments with the letters "N. J." substituted for "U. S." With these we are prepared to replace accoutrements rendered unfit for use by long service. The property issued to Company A, Sea Coast Artillery, disbanded (G. O. No. 9, H. Q. N. G. N. J.), has been returned to the State Arsenal. During the year arms and accoutrements have been issued, as required by law, to two newly-organized companies of infantry attached to the National Guard as follows: One company located at Atlantic City attached to the Sixth Regiment as Company F, (G. O. No. 2, H. Q. N. G. N. J.,) sixty-two stands of arms and accoutrements. One company located at Dover attached to the First Regiment as Company G, (G. O. No. 8, H. Q. N. G. N. J., May 22, 1889,) sixty-three stands of arms and accoutrements.

The light and easily-handled breech-loading Howitzers and Gatling guns may now be classed as the serviceable artillery of the State. The smooth bore "Napoleons" and the 3-inch Griffin (rifled) guns are practically useless for the present needs of the National Guard, and with the exception of two batteries of six pieces of each kind, retained for use at headquarters during encampments, or for any extraordinary emergency, might be advantageously disposed of, with caissons, limbers, etc., by sale or exchange. In the appendix will be found a list of ordnance and ordnance stores of obsolete patterns at the Arsenal. There is in store at the Arsenal a large quantity of boxes containing the New Jersey exhibits from New Orleans, also a lot of shoes, shoe findings, etc., perfectly worthless, stored in the Arsenal by the prison authorities.

These articles occupy nearly 4,000 square feet of room that could be advantageously used for the proper storage of military stores, and I respectfully urge their immediate removal. I have made an examination of this property and would respectfully suggest that an immediate survey and sale be ordered of everything in the list not considered upon such survey absolutely necessary for the military purposes of the State.

We continue the manufacture at the Arsenal of all ammunition expended in rifle practice and held in reserve at headquarters of the different regimental and battalion organizations for use in case of active service.

CLOTHING, CAMP AND GARRISON EQUIPAGE AND QUARTERMASTER'S STORES.

With the exception of two hundred (200) common tents of the new pattern received from the United States during the year, the number and condition of tents of all kinds belonging to the State are about the same as stated in the last report. It will require about two hundred and fifty dollars to put the tents in a serviceable condition from the damage incident to the wear and tear of the late encampment. All other camp and garrison equipage and Quartermaster's stores, tin ware, stoves, cooking utensils, tools, etc., are in good condition and ready for immediate use. We have issued during the year to the several organizations of the National Guard a large number of new uniforms. They were issued just previous to the parade in New York city, in April last, on the occasion of the Washington Inaugural Centennial, and added greatly to the splendid showing of the New Jersey troops.

The present system of furnishing uniforms, by which the companies pay one-half the cost by deductions from the annual appropriations, is somewhat complicated and but imperfectly understood by officers of the National Guard.

I think that the view of this subject taken by the late Quartermaster-General and published in his last report an excellent one. He then said :

It seems but mere justice to the companies that the State should relieve them from this expense for uniforms only worn in its service. A refusal to supply these uniforms free of cost to our National Guard, shows a lack of appreciation of its services, and tends to seriously depress those already enrolled, and to discourage others from enlisting, and to crush out any military spirit they possess. The efficiency, spirit and strength of a volunteer militia is in the exact ratio of its generous recognition by the State. Were these men armed, *uniformed* and equipped entirely at the expense of the State and general government, as they ought to be, we would have an

admirable, efficient body of citizen soldiery, which could be fully relied upon in any emergency, and of which every good citizen of the State would be justly proud. Should uniforms be furnished at the expense of the State, captains of companies should be charged with the number issued to them for the men of their respective companies, and they should be responsible to the State for them. They ought not, in justice, be charged with uniforms issued to men who afterwards desert and carry their uniforms away, but the law should be made so strict that every loss in any other manner should be paid for by a deduction from the annual appropriation.

ARMORIES.

Substantial, roomy and well-appointed armories, insuring safe depositories for the property of the State while in possession of military organizations, continue to be one of the urgent needs of the National Guard.

ENCAMPMENT.

The third annual encampment of the First Brigade at the State Camp Ground at Sea Girt, July 8 to 13, for discipline and good results in instruction in the manual of arms and the varied and sometimes arduous duties of the camp, and for the watchful attention given to the care and preservation of State property by the officers and enlisted men of the Brigade, is entitled to the highest praise, and fully deserving of the commendation bestowed upon it by experienced military officers of our own and neighboring States.

The beauty of location of this camp and the many natural advantages of this site for encampments of the National Guard have been fully set forth in former reports, and it is not necessary to refer to them here.

Some of the mess halls have been enlarged, and a new commissary store house built to replace the one destroyed by the storms of last winter. The storms were unusually severe and destructive, and, in addition to the damage to the buildings mentioned, many other frame structures were injured to an extent involving large and additional expenditures for labor and materials to put them in thorough repair.

The reports received at this office of the Post Quartermaster, Major James S. Yard, and the Post Commissary, Major Cyrus F. Loutrel, unite in speaking of the satisfactory manner in which they were enabled to make the issues of stores from their respective departments, by reason of the commendable manner in which the Military Store-keeper and the Brigade, Regimental and Battalion Quartermasters discharged their important duties. This good con-

duct tended greatly to lighten the cares and labors of the Quartermaster-General's Department and promoted alike the comfort and welfare of the officers and men of the First Brigade.

The subsistence furnished was excellent in kind and abundant, and although the First Brigade had a larger number of men in camp than ever before, not a single complaint was heard either as to the quality or quantity of the supplies.

As soon as the purchase of these grounds by the State is finally completed, we will be prepared to avail ourselves of the provisions of the act of Congress approved May 19, 1882, and make requisition on the Secretary of War for "two heavy guns and four mortars with carriages and platforms" for a sea-coast battery for the proper instruction and practice of the militia in heavy artillery drill. The law also says: "A suitable battery for these cannon will be constructed; and for said construction and the transportation of said cannon, etc., the sum of five thousand dollars is hereby appropriated for supplying each State that may so apply."

The value of such a battery for the uses of a State having so extensive a sea front as our own cannot be overestimated.

The Rifle Range at Sea Girt is now second to none in the country. The improvements made last fall in clearing the range of stumps of cedar trees and undergrowth and levelling and grading the ground, which was afterward sowed with grass seed and rye, were entirely satisfactory, and the Range now presents one level and unbroken surface of green sward, pleasant to the eye and free from obstructions of any kind. This work was done under the personal supervision of General Perrine, and has fully repaid the State for the labor and money expended thereon by the increased facilities it affords for better results in rifle practice.

The targets have been backed at a proper distance by cribs of a sufficient height to serve as a stoppage for the balls, and to prevent the glare of the sun from the sand bank on the sea-shore. They were filled with sand and braced with iron. These cribs were rendered necessary by reason of the continuous shifting, from the action of the wind and storms, of the sand behind the targets and the consequent danger from accident during the practice on the range. There has also been erected at the 500-yard firing point a pavilion affording grateful shelter for soldiers while awaiting the call to practice, and accommodations for spectators.

STATE ARSENAL.

The dwelling is now occupied as a residence by the Military Store-keeper. This is a very good arrangement, as communication

with the store-keeper and access to the building can be had at all times in case of any possible emergency. There is also a night watchman employed for the grounds and buildings. The dwelling-house also contains the offices. Some of the buildings are now undergoing slight repairs, the most important of which is a tin roof for the old stone building adjoining the dwelling. The buildings generally are much dilapidated and are fast going to decay, and it would be an unwise expenditure of money to remodel them with a view to permanency, as in the event of the ground now occupied by the Arsenal being required for uses of the State Prison, which is only a question of a few years, it will be necessary to erect a new Arsenal better adapted to the present requirements of the State, and more accessible to the railroad for the purposes of loading and shipping military stores. The expenses for the year for fuel and repairs have been seven hundred and two dollars and sixty-five cents (\$702.65.)

EXPENSE ACCOUNT.

In the appendix will be found a statement of the expenses of the year given in detail. They have been classified under the several heads of "National Guard," "Arsenal Account," "Militia Office Account" and "Encampment."

NATIONAL GUARD.

Under this head appears the item of \$29,849.42, for appropriations for armory rent. This is made up of the amounts allowed to company and headquarter organizations in lieu of uniforms, drill rooms, armory rent, etc., under act of March 9, 1869. The item of \$19,293.25 is for the pay of troops, under act of May 11, 1886, of the First Brigade, for services at the late encampment. From this amount should be deducted a balance of \$55.25, turned over to the Comptroller after the payment of the troops, leaving a net amount of \$19,238.

The item of \$29,477.04 is for uniforms furnished during the year under act of March 10, 1880, and May 25, 1886. One-half the cost of these uniforms is paid by the companies in two consecutive stoppages of one-fourth from the annual appropriation.

ARSENAL ACCOUNT.

Under this head the principal item is \$6,156.18. This is for the pay of the regular employes of the arsenal, including the salary

of the Military Storekeeper. The item for freight, \$1,071.41, is unusually large this year, as it includes an item of \$559.96 paid to the P. R. R. properly chargeable to the Gettysburg account, an oversight of the auditing officers of the Treasury. The item for Ordnance and Ordnance Stores, \$2,289.34, and Camp and Garrison Equipage and Quartermaster's Stores, \$2,202.73, include all purchases, and are available either for use of the National Guard or the Militia when called into active service.

ENCAMPMENT.

Under this head are included all moneys expended for the general expenses of the State Camp and Rifle Practice during the year, and includes all bills paid upon warrants of the Comptroller and the sums drawn in gross by the Quartermaster-General.

INDEPENDENT MILITARY COMPANIES.

There have been no issues of arms to independent military companies during the year. The following named companies have returned the State property issued to them by authority of the Legislature :

May 3, 1889, Lincoln Zouaves, Jersey city, 80 stands of arms and accoutrements.
September 3, 1889, Co., A, Colored Infantry, Trenton, 50 stands arms and accoutrements.

ARMS LOANED TO MILITARY ACADEMIES AND SCHOOLS.

The only issue during the year was :

November 28, 1881, Glenwood Military Institute, Matawan, 36 stands arms and accoutrements.

DEPARTMENT OF NEW JERSEY, GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC.

In the appendix will be found a statement of property in the possession of Posts of the Grand Army of the Republic, loaned to them under and by virtue of the act of Legislature entitled, "An Act Concerning Veteran Organizations," approved Feb. 27th, 1879. There was no general encampment of the Grand Army in this State during the year.

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STATE WAR CLAIMS.

Nothing has been done in the matter of State war claims of New Jersey against the United States, and, as stated in the report of last year, there is no probability of any further allowances from the general government on these accounts.

PAYMASTER-GENERAL'S ACCOUNT.

The amount paid to officers and enlisted men of the First Brigade, National Guard, for six days' encampment at Sea Girt, July 8th to 13th, 1889, was nineteen thousand two hundred and thirty-eight dollars (\$19,238).

The usual difficulty and consequent delay was experienced this year by reason of names on the pay-rolls not agreeing with the records nor with the quarterly returns of June 30th, 1889, and which had to be explained by supplemental certificates before the Adjutant-General would certify to the rolls. Company commanders should carefully compare the signatures on the pay-rolls with the names on their retained copies of the quarterly returns and see that they agree therewith in every particular. A little timely attention to these details would insure the prompt payment of every man.

DEDICATION OF NEW JERSEY MONUMENTS AT GETTYSBURG.

All bills contracted through this office for this account have been paid. The disbursements during the year have been as follows :

I know of no outstanding bills chargeable to this account.

WASHINGTON INAUGURAL CENTENNIAL.

Considerable labor devolved upon this department under Joint Resolution, No. 5, "to enable the State of New Jersey to take part in the Centennial celebration of the inauguration of George Washington as President of the United States." This resolution provided for transportation and subsistence for not only the National Guard, but also such representation of the Grand Army of the Republic as would turn out as Post organizations to take part in the reception of the President of the United States at Elizabeth, and in the military parade in New York City on April 29th and 30th, respectively. Circular letters were prepared and sent to the various Post Commanders of the G. A. R., authorizing them to provide for transportation and for one meal (dinner) for their respective organizations. Superintendents of transportation of the different roads were notified that commandants of regiments, battalions and companies, and also Commanders of posts of the Grand Army of the Republic holding State orders were authorized to make the necessary arrangements for transportation to and from their respective points by regular or special trains to enable them to reach Elizabeth and New York in time to participate in the Centennial ceremonies. In addition to these general arrangements, Capt. William B. E. Miller, Department Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic of New Jersey, was given full authority to arrange for special trains through South Jersey and other parts of the State remote from starting points on the main line of the Pennsylvania Railroad and the Central Railroad of New Jersey to enable them to reach these points in time to take the "specials" scheduled to reach Elizabeth at the early hour of 6 A. M., April 29th, 1889.

About sixty-five Posts aggregating nearly three thousand veterans availed themselves of the invitation extended to them by the State, and were present at the ceremonies at Elizabeth.

The matter of subsistence for the Grand Army of the Republic was easily arranged by making an allowance for commutation for one meal on each of these days at the rate of thirty cents per man. Bills for subsistence were made out by each organization on blanks prepared and sent out from this office, and paid upon the certificate of the Commander of the Post and attested by the affidavit of the Post Quartermaster. Everything worked smoothly and the organizations were landed at an early hour in Elizabeth and marched past the President of the United States in splendid form. The President and party, together with many State officers and distinguished guests, reviewed them from a stand erected for the purpose adjoining the Governor's residence on Jersey street. After acting as an escort to the President to Elizabethport, where he took the boat for New York city, the veterans remarched to Elizabeth for dinner provided for them at the different hotels and restaurants. After this meal they took the cars again and were transported to their respective homes throughout the State without an accident of any kind.

By direction of the Governor transportation was also issued to Companies D, F and H of the Third Regiment, which Companies, together with Companies C and E, and Gatling Gun Co. A, participated in the parade in Elizabeth.

The arrangements for the transportation and subsistence of the National Guard, on the occasion of the military parade in New York City on April 30th, were almost identical with those for the veterans. Companies F, H and K of the Sixth Regiment, from Atlantic City, Cape May and Vineland, respectively, were rendezvoused at Camden on the night of April 29th, from which point, together with the Woodbury and Camden Companies of the Sixth Regiment and Gatling Gun Company B, they took a special train at an early hour, on the morning of the 30th, taking up the Beverly and Burlington Companies of the Sixth Regiment, and the Trenton Companies and outlying Companies of the Seventh Regiment, (except Companies E and G), en route. Company E, Seventh Regiment was met at Monmouth Junction. Company G, Seventh Regiment, rendezvoused at the Armory of the First Regiment in Newark, on the night of the 29th of April, where accommodations were provided for them by this department. The entire Third Regiment took this same train at Elizabeth, at which point it arrived at about seven o'clock in the morning. It then proceeded on its way to Jersey City, without further stoppage, except to

receive Company G, Seventh Regiment at Newark. Upon arriving at Jersey City this Brigade was safely transported by ferry boats to New York City. The First Brigade was transported by regular or special trains as arranged by the Brigade Commander, and crossed the river at Jersey City at points designated in orders of the Major-General to the Brigade Commander.

As a matter of convenience and to avoid confusion, horses and grooms were transported on the night of the 29th of April.

An allowance for commutation of meals was fixed at the following stated rates :

Breakfast-----	20 cents per man.
Dinner-----	30 cents per man.
Supper-----	20 cents per man.

With the exceptions of Companies F, H and K, Sixth Regiment and Company G, Seventh Regiment, which were allowed the breakfast and supper rations, the only allowance was the dinner ration for the entire Division. An allowance of four dollars for a wagon for carrying rations, and one hundred dollars for music was made for each organization. The Iron Steamboat Company's boat, Taurus, was chartered at a cost of \$250 for the purpose of returning the Second Brigade from the foot of 55th street, New York, to the depot of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company at Jersey City. The organizations of the First Brigade were returned by ferry boats to the different points in Jersey City nearest to the points from which they were to take their respective trains. These movements of the entire Division of our Guard were made, notwithstanding the immense regular traffic over the different routes leading into Jersey City, in a manner reflecting the highest credit on the officers having charge of the arrangements for transportation, and demonstrates the celerity with which a large force of our citizen soldiery could be massed at any given point at short notice, should their services ever be unhappily required to quell any riotous disturbance in our own or adjoining states.

RECEIPTS FROM THE UNITED STATES.

In the appendix will be found a statement of the receipts of ordnance and ordnance stores and camp and garrison equipage from the United States during the year, chargeable on account of quota due this State for arming and equipping the Militia. On July 1, 1889, there was standing to the credit of the State of New Jersey on this account, nine thousand two hundred and ninety-

one dollars and thirty-three cents (\$9,291.33). Since this statement stores to the value of five hundred and sixty-five dollars and thirty-six cents (\$565.36) have been drawn upon requisition, leaving a balance of eight thousand seven hundred and twenty-five dollars and ninety-seven cents (\$8,725.97).
