REPORT.

Office of the Quartermaster General, Trenton, November 30, 1863.

To His Excellency Joel Parker, Governor of the State of New Jersey:

SIR:—I have the honor to transmit the following report of the operations of the Quartermaster's Department of this State for the

past year:

It has devolved upon the State to provide and issue the clothing, camp and garrison equipage, ordnance and ordnance stores to all new organizations of troops mustered into the United States service, as well as to recruits for old regiments; to provide for the transportation of troops from the place of recruitment to the place of muster, and subsistence of new regiments until the completion of the regimental organization and muster into the United States service.

The operations of the past year, up to July, were confined to clothing and equipping recruits for old regiments. On the 10th day of June last authority was granted to your excellency by the President to raise five regiments of infantry and two of cavalry by voluntary enlistments in lieu of drafted men, under the provision of General Order No. 75. This order provides for the turning over stores for clothing, equipping and subsisting volunteers by the different departments of the Federal Government to the State authorities, when it was desired by the Governors of States, for issue to troops agreeably with the regulations, and accounted for to the proper bureau of the War Department.

Stores were thus obtained for recruits for old regiments in the field, and for the Thirty-fourth, Thirty-fifth, and in part for the Second Cavalry. In order to encourage the recruiting service in July last, when the business was almost at a stand for want of proper encouragement, a uniform was adopted different from that furnished by the United States Quartermaster's Department, for the Thirty-third Regiment, recruited under the management of Col. Mindil, late of

the Twenty-seventh Regiment.

This regiment was recruited to the maximum and mustered into the United States service at less expense compared with that of other regiments previously recruited, and in about four weeks, an incredible

short time considering the difficulties and discouragements interposed

by the advocates for the enforcement of the conscription law.

The Thirty-fourth and the Thirty-second, or Second Cavalry, were clothed with the regulation uniform, the Thirty-fifth with what is known as Hawkins' Zouave uniform, drawn from the United States clothing department at New York.

Rendezvous were opened simultaneously at Trenton, Beverly, Newark, Freehold and Flemington, Post Quartermasters appointed at each to facilitate the clothing and equipment of the regiments, and to pay the premium of two dollars to the recruits themselves on arrival at rendezvous, or to the person who should bring the recruit into rendezvous. Clothing, camp and garrison equipage were turned over to these officers in bulk upon their requisitions and receipts, who issued the clothing to the recruits as fast as they were mustered into service upon clothing receipt rolls, and camp and garrison equipage to the officers upon their requisitions and receipts. These vouchers are returned to the arsenal as sub-vouchers to the accounts of the Quartermaster to account for the issues.

Funds were placed in their hands for the payment of premiums. Premiums were paid upon company receipt rolls, signed by the recrnit himself, or the person receiving the premium, and witnessed by an officer. This receipt roll is the voucher for the payment in the settlement with the United States. The following officers were appointed Quartermasters and disbursing officers at the several rendezvous,

with the rank of Captain:

Joseph Sterling, at Trenton.

Benjamin F. Carter, at Beverly.

A. B. Baldwin, at Newark.

James A. Perrine, at Freehold.

Israel Wells, at Flemington.

Garret D. Van Reipen, at Hudson City.

The Second Cavalry and Battery D were rendezvoued at Trenton, the Thirty-fourth at Beverly, the Thirty-third Regiment. except Co.'s G and F, at Newark, the Thirty-sixth at Freehold, the Thirty-fifth at Flemington, and Batteries C and E, and Companies G and F of the Thirty-third Regiment, at Hudson City.

After the departure of the Second Cavalry for the seat of war the Thirty-fourth Regiment was removed to Trenton. The Thirty-sixth Regiment was consolidated with the Thirty-fifth Regiment, and trans-

ferred to Flemington.

The several rendezvous were opened and closed up as follows:

The premiums advanced by the State will be re-imbursed by the disbursing officer of the United States, so soon as he has been able to complete his examination of the premium rolls by a comparison with the muster rolls of the companies returned to the Adjutant General's Office, in order to ascertain the amount due the State from the U.S. for the number of men mustered into service at regimental muster. The provisions of General Order No. 74 which regulate the payment of premiums, direct that it shall be paid either to the person bringing the recruit, or to the recruit in person, in case he presents himself, as soon as the recruit has been inspected by the surgeon and mustered into service. General Order No 75 provides for the appointment by the Governor of the State to facilitate the organization of new regiments of volunteers, in addition to the staff officers, "one second lieutenant for each company who shall be mustered into the service at the commencement of the organization who shall have authority to muster in recruits as they are enlisted."

Under this authority, second lieutenants of muster were appointed and mustered into service for this purpose, and the payment of the two dollars premium was made to the recruit or the person bringing the recruit into rendezvous immediately upon the inspection and acceptance of the examining surgeon, and the enlistment and muster of

the recruit into service by the second lieutenants.

By a recent decision of the accounting officers of the War Department, the premiums were not intended to be paid until the completion of the organization and inspection and muster of the regiment.

The effect of this decision is to make the payments made to recruits before regimental muster, unauthorized; and the State must therefore lose the amounts paid to those who desert, die, or are promoted between the original muster and the completion of the regimental organization. Immediately upon this decision being made known, an order was issued from this office to stop the further payment of premiums. The amount paid by the State to this class of persons has not been as yet ascertained, but it is believed that it cannot exceed one thousand dollars.

The State advanced the premiums to the Twelfth, Thirteenth, Fourteenth, and Fiftcenth regiments recruited in 1862, under the order above referred to, and she was reimbursed for the entire amount without deducting from the pay rolls for those persons that had died, de-

serted, or been promoted before muster.

There has been no change in the orders under which the payments were made, but simply a change in the War Department of the auditing officers who entertain different views upon the proper interpretation of the language of the order from his predecessor. Under the circumstances it is believed that upon a proper representation of the facts of this case, the War Department will allow the entire

amount advanced by the State.

In the recruitment of the Second Regiment of Cavalry, it was thought that if the regiment could be mounted by companies as soon as they were recruited and mustered into service, it would encourage the recruiting service, and the expenditure of so large an amount would necessarily benefit the people of the State by making a market for horses, hay and grain. With a view to these advantages, by your excellency's directions, I asked authority of the Quartermaster-General of the United States, to purchase the necessary number of horses to mount the regiment, which was promptly granted by him and upon certain conditions the State would be re-imbursed for the advance. For the particulars of this correspondence, you are referred to Statement A. of the appendix to this report.

Under the authority granted, I purchased one thousand one hundred and eighty-four horses, with the seventy-four previously purchased for Chapin's Battery, for service in Pennsylvania, referred to in the correspondence. The regiment being required for active service in the west, it was ordered to take the field unexpectedly, before it had been recruited to the maximum number, and therefore did not require this number of horses. One thousand and seventy-six horses were turned over to the Quartermaster of the regiment, and have been paid for by the Quartermaster-General of the United States, agreeably to the terms of his letter, amounting to the sum of one

hundred and fifty thousand six hundred and forty dollars.

The expenses of the ordnance stores (enumerated in Statement P.) furnished by the State to the Second Cavalry, by authority of the Ordnance Department, has been re-imbursed by the United States, amounting to the sum of forty-six thousand and forty-two dollars and

ninety-three cents.

The barracks at Camp Perrine were turned over to the Quarter-master's Department of the United States in October, 1862. They were required in July for the use of detachments from regiments in the field ordered to this State to take charge of drafted men. Their occupancy for volunteer organizations was temporary. It therefore became necessary on the part of the State authorities to vacate them. The Second Cavalry was removed in August last, about two miles from Trenton, to suitable grounds rented for that purpose. The camp was named Camp Parker; the troops were put in A tents; temporary sheds were erected as promptly as possible for quarter-master and commissary stores, guard-houses and for shelter of horses.

These sheds were erected with a due regard to economy, the cheapest quality of lumber used, and they were put together as loosely and roughly as possible, having regard to safety and their removal with

the least possible waste and injury to the lumber.

This expenditure was considered absolutely necessary by the Colonel of the regiment and the Veterinary Surgeon, for the proper care and treatment of horses with the ordinary diseases incident to all large collections. It is believed it saved the Government a very considerable loss in horses which could not have been treated successfully if exposed to the cold storms of that season of the year, and before they had become hardened to exposure.

The eleven regiments of nine months' volunteers returned to this State in June last, to be mustered out of service. They were severally

quartered as follows:

Twenty-first and Twenty-Second, at Trenton.

Twenty-third, Twenty-fourth, and Twenty-fifth, at Beverly.

Twenty-sixth and Twenty-seventh, at Newark. Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth, at Freehold. Thirtieth and Thirty-first, at Flemington.

Under the provisions of General Orders No. 111 series of 1863, regiments leaving the field on account of the expiration of their term of service, were permitted to take their arms and accourtements to the place of discharge to be delivered up to the Governor of the State, or to the officers appointed by him to receive them and to be held

subject to re-issue.

The following persons were appointed to receive the arms: Joseph Sterling, at Trenton; Frank Snowden, at Beverly; Silas C. Halsey, at Newark; Philip J. Ryall, at Freehold; Robert W. Roberts, at Flemington. They were instructed to have the property to be turned over and receipted for carefully inspected by competent assistants, to ascertain the condition of the property, and to prepare the invoices and receipts, with the true condition of the property stated. Statement G shows the property received, and its condition.

These arms have been cleaned and repaired, and are in condition for re-issue to troops hereafter mustered into the United States service. The Thirty-third, Thirty-fourth and Thirty-fifth Regiments were armed with these muskets. An accurate account has been kept

of the expense of cleaning and repairing them.

The quartermasters' stores received from these nine months' regiments have been turned over to Capt. John Whipple, Quartermaster U. S. A., in accordance with instructions received from the Quartermaster General of the army, and receipted for by him. A detailed account of the same will be found in Statement G.

The act of May 10, 1861, authorizes the Governor to cause the arms now belonging to the State to be so altered as to be effective. I have continued the repairs and alterations from flint-lock to percussion of all arms as were worth the expense, as fast as the limited machinery and

tools at the Arsenal would permit. This has furnished the State militia but a poor supply of a very inferior arm, not at all equal to the demands of the service, nor meeting the expectations of military men. The necessity for a first-class arm for the use of the militia has long been felt, but the great expense necessary to provide such a supply has postponed any action under the act of the Legislature above referred to authorizing the purchase of ten thousand stand. The rebel raid into Pennsylvania developed the fact that the State was unprovided with well organized, armed and disciplined militia for an emergency.

In compliance with your instructions relative to the purchase of arms for the State of New Jersey, for that purpose I visited the city of New York in June last, when I called upon Captain S. Crispin, of the United States Ordnance Department, the purchasing officer of the War Department, in order to obtain the best information as to the quality and price of the various foreign made arms in the market, and the relative value as compared with the United States musket, Springfield model, calibre 58, made by contract for the United States government, and such other information as might be of use pertain-

ing to the responsible trust committed to me.

Your directions were to purchase the best arms that could be had, and to be governed by the act of the Legislature of May 10th, 1861,

as to the number to be purchased.

To Captain Crispin I am under great obligations for the useful information he was enabled to impart by reason of his large experience in this business, and his knowledge of the quality of the different arms in the service. He kindly gave me the services of his principal inspectors of ordnance, who furnished me a detailed report of all the samples of the different arms offered to this State, foreign as well as domestic, and the result of their examination of arms showed that the best and most serviceable arm for the State was the United States Springfield rifled musket, calibre 58. The second best arm for the service, as it approximates in calibre very nearly to the regulation musket, is the Enfield rifled musket. At this time a good quality of Enfield rifled musket was held at from fifteen dollars to sixteen dollars and fifty cents per musket, subject to a duty of thirty per cent., which, with the cost of storage and the difference in exchange, the duties being paid in gold, made the price of an Enfield musket at from twenty-one dollars and seventy-five cents to twenty-three dollars and ninety-five cents per musket, according to quality.

After a conference with Captain Crispin upon the quality and serviceability of the several kinds of arms offered to me for examination, and by his advice, on the 11th of July I gave to Messrs. Schuyler, Hartley & Graham, of New York, two orders, one for two thousand five hundred, and another for one thousand five hundred Springfield rifled muskets, model of 1863, and manufactured by the Colt's Patent Fire Arms Co., of Hartford, Connecticut, predicated upon two differ-

ent samples furnished by them. The order, dated July 11th, will be

found in Statement B of the appendix to this report.

Subsequently I revoked the order given to these parties for the one thousand five hundred rifled muskets, Springfield model, in consequence of failure on their part to deliver the muskets within the

time, and equal in quality to the sample arm.

On the 9th day of September, I gave to the Trenton Arms Company, a similar order for one thousand muskets at sixteen dollars and fifty cents per musket, delivered at the State Arsenal free of expense, which have been received and paid for, agreeably to the terms of the order. On the 21st day of October, an additional order for one thousand muskets was given to the same parties, deliverable on or before the 1st of January, 1864. On the eighth day of October, I gave to Messrs. Perkins and Livingston, of New York, Agents for the Middletown Manufacturing Company, an order for two thousand two hundred upon similar terms and conditions with the last order referred to, at sixteen dollars and fifty cents per musket, delivered free of expense at the State Arsenal.

These arms have been delivered to the Arsenal, one thousand five hundred of the same have been accepted and paid for, and the balance

is at this time in the hands of the inspector.

Every arm before being received and paid for is taken apart and carefully inspected by a competent person appointed for that purpose. In the course of the examination of these arms, the inspector rejects a great number of parts; I have allowed the contractors in every instance to replace the parts rejected for defects with perfect parts, thereby securing an arm entirely free from defects in all their parts.

It is believed that the contracts above referred to were made upon the most favorable terms for the interest of the State. They have undoubtedly secured the very best arm for service, one that corresponds in calibre to the arm adopted by the Ordnance Bureau for the United States Army, and interchanges in all their parts with the

government musket and with each other.

On the 7th day of July, I gave Messrs. Emerson and Silver, of this place an order for the furnishing of the following arms, viz., one thousand cuvalry sabres at six dollars; three hundred artillery sabres at five dollars; two hundred non-commissioned officers' swords at five dollars.

These arms were to be equal in quality, workmanship and finish to similar arms adopted as the standard by the Ordnance Department, and subject to inspection before being received or paid for. Messrs. Emerson and Silver are making their deliveries at this time and furnishing swords entirely satisfactory in quality and finish.

I addressed communications in the month of August to the principal manufacturers of artillery carriages and caissons, inviting estimates and proposals for furnishing the State with gun-carriages, caissons, battery wagons and traveling forges. On the 15th day of August, I conclued a contract with F. W. Parmenter, Esq., of Troy, for furnishing the State the following carriages, viz.; eighteen gun-

carriages at three hundred and five dollars each; twenty-four caissons at three hundred and five dollars each; six battery wagons at three hundred and five dollars each; six traveling forges at three hundred and five dollars each. For the terms of this contract you are referred

to Statement B. of the appendix of this report.

I addressed communications repeatedly during the past year to the principal manufacturers of cannon, inviting proposals for manufacturing and furnishing this State the requisite quantity of artillery. Replies have been received declining to enter into any engagements owing to the pressing demands for ordnance stores for the United States Government. The only parties that I could prevail upon to receive orders for artillery, were S. J. Reeves Esq., Vice President of the Phænix Iron Company, and James F. Ames Esq., of Chicopee, Massachusetts. The former agreed to furnish and deliver one six gun battery, of three inch rifled guns, at three hundred and fiftyseven dollars each, and the latter to execute an order for two batteries of three inch rifled guns, bronze, at forty-five cents per pound, to be delivered as soon as the state of their orders with the United States Government would permit. Statement C. in appendix will show the quantity and kind of ordnance and ordnance stores purchased and contracted for during the past year and the rate paid or to be paid upon the delivery of the stores. When this property is received it is believed that the State will have an ample supply of arms of the very best quality, sufficient for all purposes of home defence, and to meet any reasonable demand on the part of the United States Government for any emergency.

The companies recruited under your Excellency's authority for the organization of a State Rifle Corps, have been armed with the rifled musket, United States Springfield model. But six companies of the fifty companies authorized to be recruited, have so far completed their organizations as to entitle them to be armed and accounted by the

State.

There are several companies now in progress of formation which will be ready for their arms at an early day. This organization has not met with that favor with the military, nor the encouragement

which was expected for it.

The act of 1860, requires uniform companies to provide an armory for the safe keeping of the arms before being furnished with arms. This is a very heavy tax upon the individual members of companies, in addition to the expense of providing a uniform and the loss of time in the performance of military duty, making it too oncrous a charge upon a class of young men who would otherwise gladly connect themselves with military companies. An armory is indispensable to every military organization as a place of meeting for drill and military instruction, and the care and preservation of the public property against loss or damage. It is very desirable in order to encourage the formation of military companies and establish them upon a more permanent footing, that some suitable provision should be made by

the Legislature, for the defraying some part of their expenses either in the way of armory rent or a certain amount of clothing to every company to be kept as company property for military use. The National Guard of New York, in addition to the large private contributions and patronage receives a full and complete suit of uniform, upon the condition of the performance of certain military service.

In response to your Excellency's proclamation of June 17th, for volunteer militiamen for service in Pennsylvania, the following companies responded and reported at the Arsenal for clothing and equip-

age, ordnance and ordnance stores in the following order:

Capt. William R. Murphy, Company A, National Guard of Trenton.

Capt. George F. Marshall, Company B. of Trenton.

Capt. James C. Manning, Company C, Union Light Infantry, of Trenton.

Capt. Hiram Hughes, Company D, of Lambertville. Capt. George Gage, Company E, of Morristown. Capt. William J. Roberts, Company F, of Newark. Capt. J. F. Laumaster, Company G, of Mount Holly. Capt. Timothy Colvin, Company H, of Newark. Capt. Joseph A. Yard, Company I, of Trenton.

Capt. John R. Chapin, Rahway Light Artillery, Rahway.

There will be found in the appendix, statement Q, a detailed statement of clothing and equipage, arms, and accourrements furnished by the State to these companies. These companies not having been mustered into the service of the United States, the entire expense connected with this service devolved upon this State. It is as follows:

These troops were armed with State arms and no charge is therefore made for them, except for those unavoidably lost or destroyed.

I have been particular in keeping an accurate account of the expenses for this service, in order to make a claim against the United States Government as incident to the suppression of the rebellion.

The following amounts have been expended during the year ending the 30th of November as stated under the several heads for recruiting, subsisting, clothing, and transporting the troops of this State, mustered into the service of the United States, and ten companies of militia mustered for service in Pennsylvania.

Statement D contains an account of clothing, camp and garrison equipage, hospital stores, ordnance and ordnance stores, serviceable and unserviceable, horses and wagon train, &c., remaining in the State arsenal on the 30th of November, 1863.

for the year ending November 30th, 1863.

Statement F the quantity and kind of clothing, camp and garrison equipage, hospital supplies, ordnance and ordnance stores received upon requisitions on the different bureaux of the War Department, under the provisions of General Order No. 75, for issue to the troops of this State mustered into the service of the United States.

Statement G the stores of every kind received from elveen regiments of nine months' men upon their return to this State to be mustered

out of the service of the United States.

Statement II contains the number and kind of stores turned into the arsenal by the Thirty-fourth, Thirty-fifth, Second Cavalry, &c.

Statement I shows the number, quality and condition of the stores turned in by the militia companies upon their being mustered out of service upon their return from service in Pennsylvania.

quantity and kind of articles furnished by each.

Statement L contains a full and particular account of issues of clothing and equipage to the Thirty-second or Second Cavalry, Thirty-third, Thirty-fourth and Thirty fifth Regiments, and Batteries C, D and E, to mustering officers for issue to recruits, Provost Marshals for drafted men, and others.

Statement M camp and garrison equipage furnished recruiting of-

ficers for recruits of regiments in the field.

Statement N camp and garrison equipage issued to the Thirty-second or Second Cavalry, Thirty-third, Thirty-fourth and Thirty-fifth Regiments, and Batteries C, D and E, and recruiting parties.

Statement O quartermaster and hospital stores issued from the ar-

senal to new organizations and recruiting parties.

Statement P the ordnance and ordnance stores issued to the Thirty-second or Second Cavalry, Thirty-third, Thirty-fourth and Thirty-fifth Regiments, recruiting parties and others.

Statement Q clothing, camp and garrison equipage, quartermaster stores, ordnance and ordnance stores issued to militia companies for

service in Pennsylvania.

Statement R contains the number and kind of arms and accountements received from disbanded and other military companies for the year ending the 30th of November.

Statement S the arms and accountrements issued to uniform companies of this State, upon their giving bond according to law, for the

above period.

Statement T shows the names of all persons from whom articles have been purchased, and the amounts paid to each under the several descriptions of expenditures incident to the recruiting, organizing, equipping, &c., of troops mustered into the service of the United States, and the militia service of this State.

STATEMENT A.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY, OFFICE OF THE QUARTERMASTER-GENERAL TRENTON, July 27th, 1863.

General M. C. Meigs, Q. M. Gen., U. S. A., Washington, D. C.

GENERAL: - This State is engaged in the recruitment of a veteran regiment of cavalry, under authority of the War Department of the 10th of June last, and under the requirements of General Orders Nos. 75 and 105, series of 1862.

His Excellency the Governor, instructs me to request you to authorize him to purchase the necessary number of horses to mount the regiment before leaving the State. We have on hand a lot of very fine horses purchased for a State battery for service in Pennsylvania, under the call of the Governor of that State, which we desire to turn over to the regiment at once for improvement in horsemanship.

We are willing to advance the money necessary to purchase the horses, with the understanding that the State is to be re-imbursed from your department upon the receipt of the Colonel commanding the regiment, after being mustered into the service of the United States. He instructs me to assure you that in the purchase contem-

plated, the public interests will be assiduously consulted.
