New Jersey's nonfarm wage and salary employment advanced by 2,200 during June, reaching a seasonally adjusted level of 3,257,900. The initially reported employment level in May was revised from 3,258,600 to 3,255,700, based on more complete data.

Employment increased by 167,800 over the 18-month period since the recession bottom was reached in December 1982. However, the sharp monthly increases recorded during 1983 have slackened somewhat during the past few months.

Nonmanufacturing employment continued its upward trend, climbing by 3,300 in June to a seasonally adjusted record level of 2,527,200. Retail trade and services, each up by 1,400, contributed to the gain, as larger than expected increases occurred throughout most segments of both industries. A small over-the-month increase was also recorded in finance/insurance/real estate.

Employment in construction decreased by 600 during June, as summertime hiring fell short of seasonal expectations. Nevertheless, construction employment remains, during the first half of this year, at its highest level since 1973.

Manufacturing employment decreased on a seasonally adjusted basis by 1,100 from May to a June level of 730,700. The decline was concentrated primarily in the nondurable goods sector with food and apparel dropping by 700 and 600 respectively, as less than expected increases were scattered throughout all segments of both industries.

Activity throughout the rest of the factory sector remained relatively stable over the month. Employment in the chemical industry recorded the largest gain, up by 300 during June.

After seasonal adjustment, the average factory workweek of manufacturing production workers dropped by 0.2 hours during June to 41.5 hours, reflecting reduced overtime. However, the workweek approached the average for the year, which was 41.6 hours. Department analysts venture that the strong workweek level suggests the possibility of a near-future upturn in manufacturing employment.

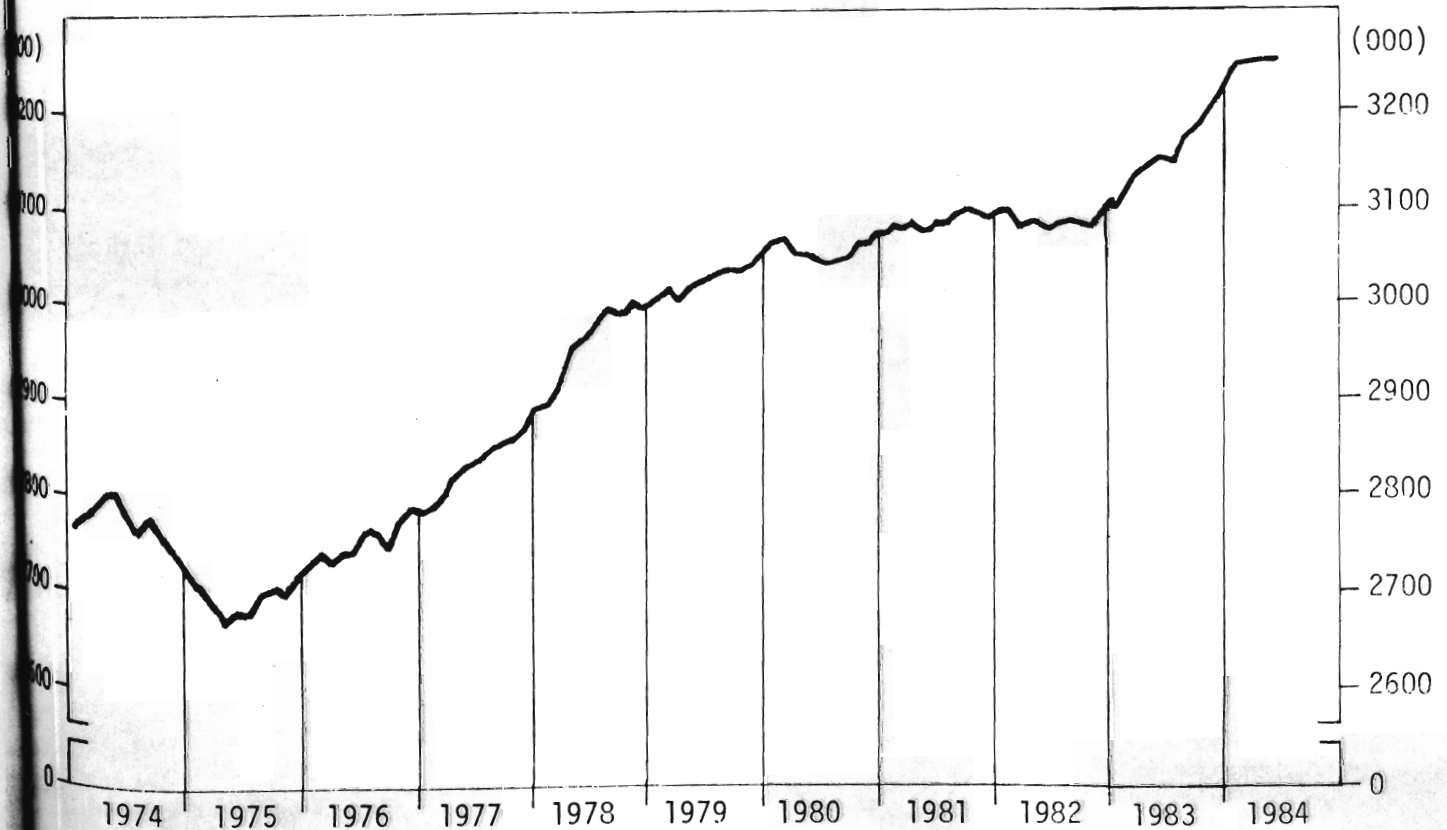

Labor Area Comments (Not Seasonally Adjusted)

Total nonagricultural wage and salary employment increased in all ten of New Jersey's major labor areas during June. Five areas recorded increases that were as much as or more than seasonally expected, while five areas registered increases that were slightly less than anticipated. The largest over-the-month gain was registered in the Newark Labor Area. The increase of 11,600 during June was mainly concentrated in services, trade, and government. The Jersey City Labor Area recorded the smallest increase, up by only 500, with manufacturing responsible for most of the gain.

TECHNICAL NOTES

Nonfarm Wage and Salary Employment

Employment data refer to persons on establishment payrolls who received pay for any part of the pay period which includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude proprietors, the self-employed, unpaid family workers, farm workers, and domestic workers in households. Salaried officers of corporations are included. Government employment covers only civilian employees; federal military personnel are excluded.

Persons on an establishment payroll who are on paid sick leave (when pay is received directly from the firm), on paid holiday or paid vacation, or who work during any part of the pay period but are unemployed or on strike during the rest of the period, are counted as employed. Not counted as employed are persons who, during the pay period which includes the 12th, are laid off, on leave without pay or on strike for the entire period, or who are hired but do not work during the period.

Average Hours and Earnings

Hours and earnings data are derived from reports of payroll and man-hours for production and related workers in manufacturing. When the reported pay period exceeds one week, the payroll and man-hour figures are reduced to a weekly basis.

Average hourly earnings for manufacturing are on a "gross" basis, reflecting not only changes in basic hourly rates, but also such variable factors as premium pay for overtime and shift work, and changes in output of workers paid on an incentive plan. Excluded from average earnings are irregular bonuses, retroactive items, payments of various welfare benefits, and payroll taxes paid by employers.
