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Report of the State Librarian.

Hon. Foster M. Voorhees, Governor of New Jersey:

DEAR SIR—In compliance with the requirement, the following statement of the condition of the State Library is respectfully submitted:

On November 1st, 1899, the number of books, pamphlets, magazines and newspapers was reported to be 52,171. The additions made during the year ending October 31st, 1900, numbered 2,915, as follows:

On May 25th there were returned to the Superintendent of Documents, at Washington, seventy-four duplicates of Government publications, making the net gain for the year 2,841, and the number of books and pamphlets in the Library at the date of this report, 55,012. Besides the accessions enumerated there are 2,440 volumes which were purchased for or given to the Traveling Libraries, a statement concerning which is given in this report. The increase during the past year exceeds by 591 the greatest number of accessions heretofore reported—in 1895, when there were 2,322 additions made.

Of the annual appropriation of \$3,000 for the purchase and care of books, \$1,409.77 was expended for law books and law magazines, and while there was a decrease of nearly \$400 in the expenditures on this account, there is a gain of more than one hundred volumes in the number of law books bought. The expenditures for additions to the General Library amounted to \$1,188.83; for subscriptions to newspapers and magazines, \$104.70, and for binding and repairing, \$296.70.

Notable in the list of additions to the Library during the year is the file of the "New Jersey Gazette," the first newspaper printed in the State. Its publication was begun in Burlington, in December, 1777; and in March, 1778, the printing office was removed to Trenton by Isaac Collins, the publisher, where the "Gazette" was continued, with several interruptions during the Revolutionary War, until November, 1786, when it was discontinued. The State Library owned an incomplete file of the paper. From the two a complete one has been made, and by direction of the Library Commission an advantageous exchange of the duplicates was arranged with Princeton University for books needed in the State Library.

An important gift during the year was made by the late John L. Murphy of twenty-seven bound volumes of the "Trenton Federalist" and the "New Jersey State Gazette," published during the earlier years of the century, and of the "State Gazette" from 1840 to 1861; and Francis B. Lee contributed twelve volumes of the "Trenton True American" from 1801 to 1826. The importance of the contributions lies in the fact that the State Library had no complete newspaper files covering the time up to about 1840, and Mr. Lee's gift nearly completes the Library's file of the "True American,"

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while Mr. Murphy's supplements it and covers the missing years. There is still a gap between the time of the suspension of the "New Jersey Gazette," in 1786, to 1801; but as the dealers in old books have an adage that "all missing books and papers turn up once in ten years," there is encouragement for the hope that in time the State may possess an unbroken newspaper record of its history from 1777 to the present time.

Other gifts worthy of special notice were thirty-nine pamphlets containing Cantor Lectures on Science, from the Society for the Encouragement of Arts, &c., London, England; annual reports of the Ocean Grove Association from 1880 to 1899; thirty-five reports of the proceedings of the New Jersey Grand Lodge, I. O. O. F., and thirty-two reports of the proceedings of the Grand Encampment of Patriarchs, from Lewis Parker, of Trenton; and thirteen reports of the proceedings of the New Jersey Department of the Grand Army of the Republic, from H. L. Hartshorn, of Camden, and Capt. E. C. Stahl and E. P. Southwick, of Trenton.

The publishers of seventy-three of the newspapers of the State furnished their journals to the Library, and contributions of valuable books and pamphlets were also made by the following: William Nelson, Paterson; Princeton University; William H. A copy of the "Journal of the Votes and Proceedings as well of the Committee of Safety, at a Sitting in January, 1776, as the Provincial Congress of New Jersey, at a Sitting at New Brunswick, began January 31, and continued to the second day of March following," was acquired during the year. There were 321 books and pamphlets relating to New Jersey added to the Library since the date of the last report; of these 203 were contributed and 118 purchased.

A list of the books and pamphlets in the General Library, relating to New Jersey, is appended to this report in the hope that it will prove a useful aid in securing those which we lack.

The increase over last year in the expenditures for books for the General Library was due entirely to the purchase of the "New Jersey Gazette" file, but in the exchange which is to be made the Law Library will be largely benefited. Of the total amount spent for books, \$1,336.27 was for continuations of series already in the Library—\$1,065.17 for the Law department and \$271.10 for the General Library.

The need of a new catalogue of the contents of the Library is continually felt. As suggested last year, the card system will be preferable, based on either the Decimal or the Expansive classification. Because of the expense which must necessarily be incurred, it will be impossible to procure such a catalogue without aid from the Legislature. When once installed, there would be no cost for keeping it up, beyond the trifling expense for the cards upon which the titles are written.

A new case has been placed in the office of the Librarian during the year. In it are kept some of the older and more valuable books which it would be difficult to replace, and which were in constant danger on the open shelves accessible to the public.

TRAVELING LIBRARIES.

The interest in the traveling libraries continues. Since the date of the special report to the Legislature in February last, fourteen more of the libraries have been made up and sent out, making forty-two in

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operation at the date of this report. Applications for four more have been received, and will be filled as soon as the cases can be made. There has been expended on this account during the year, \$2,215, which includes \$215 received in fees from applicants, and which the Commissioners of the State Library, by an amendment of the regulations, made available for use in the work. On November 1st, 1900, there were 2,440 books belonging to the traveling libraries, 527 having been contributed by clubs connected with the New Jersey Federation of Women's Clubs, and by officers, directors and committees of the Federation, and seventeen by a New York publishing firm. The contributors, in addition to Miss Mary McKeen, Mrs. W. A. Roebling, Mrs. Charles B. Yardley and the Isaac H. Blanchard Company, who were mentioned in the February report, have been: The Rasores Club, Plainfield, 70 volumes; Charlotte Emerson Brown Club, East Orange, 52; Montclair Chapter, Daughters of the Revolution, 43; Monday Atternoon Club, Plainfield, 33; the Officers and Board of Directors of the New Jersey Federation, 70; Wednesday Afternoon Club, Montclair, 52; Fortnightly Jaunts Club, Madison, 55; Forestry Committee of the Federation, 34; Wednesday Morning Club, Cranford, 52. Information has been received that contributions of books for two more libraries will be made during the winter.

The libraries are now in use in all of the counties except Camden, Hudson, Middlesex, Ocean and Union. One was sent to Pensaukin, Camden county, in December, 1899, but when it was returned in July there was a request that none be sent in exchange, as there was Sifficulty in finding any one willing to serve as librarian. Cape May county has five of the libraries, at Tuckahoe, Wildwood, Holly Beach, Seaville and South Dennis; Hunterdon has four, at Rosemont, Stock-

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ton, Three-Bridges and White House; Monmouth, four, at Freehold, Manasquan, Eatontown and Fair Haven; Warren, four, at Blairstown, Belvidere, Washington and Asbury; Bergen, three, at Rochelle Park, River Vale and Oradell; Sussex, three, at Branchville, La Fayette and Hamburg; Cumberland, two, at Shiloh and Roadstown; Essex, two, at Belleville and Millburn; Gloucester, two, at Glassboro and Bridgeport; Mercer, two, at Lawrenceville and Titusville; Passaic, two, at Pompton and Bloomingdale; Salem, two, at Woodstown and Pennsgrove; Somerset, two, at East Millstone and Bellemead; Atlantic county has one at Pleasantville, Burlington one at Pemberton, and Morris one at Port Oram.

Three of the four applications that are soon to be filled are from Somerset county (North Branch, Liberty Corner and Raritan), and one is from Allendale, Bergen county. It is quite evident, from the letters of inquiry received, that the people in some parts of the State have not yet learned about the Traveling Library law. No attempt has been made by the Commissioners of the State Library to create a demand for the libraries, but the work has been limited to filling the applications that have been received. Several applications have been made by study clubs for libraries made up of works on special subjects, but as the appropriation has been barely sufficient to supply the demand for the general collections, it has been deemed inadvisable to make up any of the special libraries, the applications for which came from cities which apparently were not within the contemplation of the Traveling Library law.

Thirty-two libraries have been out and have been returned. Three of the number have made two round trips. The following table shows the statistics taken, so far as report has been made. The columns represent the number of the library, the town in which it was located, the volumes of fiction read, the volumes on all other subjects, the total number, the number of readers, the average of books read by each, and the greatest number of times a single book was read:

The table shows that the greatest popularity of the libraries was at Shiloh, Branchville, Blairstown, Pennsgrove, Bridgeport, Pemberton, Hamburg, Belvidere and Washington, where all of the books in the libraries have been read and the circulation has been large. As was expected, the popular taste runs largely to fiction, and in some of the towns that have returned libraries but few volumes of the other classes of books have been circulated. This has been notably the case at River Vale and Rochelle Park, in Bergen county, and at Holly Beach, You are Viewing an Archived Copy from the New Jersey State Library

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in Cape May county. In one of the libraries thirty-four books had not been read; in another, twenty-nine; in others, sixteen, fourteen, thirteen, twelve and eleven.

The books are well cared for, and during the past year but one has been lost and one unnecessarily damaged. Both the loss and damage were made good voluntarily by the persons responsible.
