Tuesday, January 13, 1987

Inauguration of the 202nd Legislature.

At 12:29 p.m. this being the time and place appointed by the Constitution for the assembling of the Legislature, the Senate was called to order by John J. McCarthy, Secretary of the Senate.

Invocation by Reverend Frank McLaughlin, Pastor of St. Francis DeSales Church, Barrington.

The session was opened with prayer by Reverend. Frank McLaughlin, Pastor, St. Francis DeSales Church, Barrington.

Mr. McCarthy recognized Mr. Ewing of Somerset County.

Mr. Ewing nominated Mr. Hurley of Cumberland County for the office of temporary President. There being no other nominations, Mr. McCarthy called for the vote. It being unanimous he declared Mr. Hurley elected to the office of temporary President.

Mr. Hurley (Temporary President) recognized Mr. Lynch of Middlesex County. Mr. Lynch moved to proceed to the election of a temporary Secretary.

Mr. Contillo placed in nomination as temporary Secretary, John J. McCarthy.

Mr. Cardinale seconded the nomination.

Mr. Hurley, after calling for any other nominations, hearing none, called for the vote. It being unanimous, declared Mr. John J. McCarthy elected to the office of temporary Secretary.

SENATE BILL No. 584 (OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I am returning Senate Bill No. 584 (OCR) with my objections, for reconsideration.

This bill requires that every new vehicle or combination of vehicles using air brakes have an automatic emergency stopping system to operate in the event of a failure in the primary brake air system. The bill includes a chart setting forth emergency system requirements. The chart and accompanying text was derived from federal regulations setting minimum standards for brake performance.

I commend the sponsor for his introduction of this legislation which addresses the need to establish requirements for the brake systems on the larger trucks on our highways. However, I am compelled to return this bill with my recommendations for reconsideration because inadvertently an error was made in the transplanting of the federal regulations into this legislation. The standards used in this bill are for primary as well as secondary brake systems while this legislation only deals with requirements for backup brakes. The amendments I am proposing delete the erroneously placed standards for primary brake systems and instead contain the correct standards applicable to backup brake systems found in 49 CFR 393.52.

Therefore, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 584 (OCR) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section 1, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I am returning Senate Bill No. 2204 with my objections for reconsideration.

The bill amends and supplements the New Jersey Gross Income Tax Act to provide that pension and annuity recipients may voluntarily request the withholding of the New Jersey Gross Income Tax from their retirement payments. I agree with the purpose of this bill.

The amendment I am recommending will change the effective date of the bill in order to provide public and private retirement plans with a sufficient period of time to implement the changes this bill makes to current law.

Therefore, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 2204 and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 4, Section 8, Line 1: After "immediately" delete "and" insert ", except that section 1 shall"

Page 4, Section 8, Line 1-2: After "applicable" delete "on the first day of the third month following enactment"; insert "to payments made within tax years beginning after December 31, 1987"

Dear Senator Russo and Assemblyman Hardwick:

Enclosed for filing with the Senate and General Assembly this day is a Reorganization Plan for the restructuring of certain functions of the Department of Environmental Protection involving solid and hazardous wastes. This Plan is hereby transmitted and filed with you in accordance with the provisions of the "Executive Reorganization Act of 1969," P.L. 1969, c.203 (C.52:14C-1 et seq.).

Pursuant to the provisions of the Executive Reorganization Act, I am charged from time to time with responsibility of examining the organizational structure of State government for the purpose of determining whether or not changes in that structure could lead to a better and more efficient operation of State government. As I had said in the past, those who serve in government have a continuing obligation to scrutinize our functions and responsibilities and to reorganize our operations when doing so can result in savings and a more efficient government.

As you know, matters involving solid and hazardous waste have been a high priority on our State agenda for some time now. The degree of consciousness and sensitivity to our solid and hazardous waste problem in acute within all levels of government, the general public and the business and industrial community. While hazardous waste has been an identified area of concern in environmental protection and public health for some time, it has recently expanded into new areas such as real estate, insurance and banking and finance. It has affected property values, raised liability questions and made the cleanup of our hazardous waste sites a foremost concern of our citizens.

Similarly, as you well know, the need for adequate and environmentally sound solid waste facilities in this State is a great need at the present time. The establishment of a separate Division of Solid Waste Management as would be accomplished by this Reorganization Plan, will provide a stronger direction on solid waste management issues for both government and public purposes.

This Reorganization Plan focuses principally upon the realignment of the existing Division of Waste Management into three separate divisions. The Division of Hazardous Waste Management will deal with privately funded hazardous waste cleanup projects. The

Divisions of Hazardous Site Mitigation will deal with publicly funded hazardous waste cleanup projects. Finally the Division of Solid Waste Management will oversee the planning, regulatory, involving solid waste management.

In my view, the realignment described above will maximize the effectiveness, efficiency and productivity of our waste management programs. In short, the changes set forth in this Reorganization Plan, while not abolishing any existing functions, will insure a more efficient and effective government.

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 2820 (Assembly Reprint) without my approval.

This bill would create the General Revenue Sharing Replacement Fund for monies received from the tax amnesty program that is contemplated by legislation already conditionally vetoed by me, Passed again by the Legislature, and signed into law with my recommendations.

This bill stipulates that from the General Revenue Sharing Replacement Fund \$67.6 million would be appropriated to municipalities for their loss of federal revenue sharing, with each municipality receiving a proportional share of what it has lost.

My action in signing a conditional veto of the tax amnesty legislation contained in Assembly Bill No. 823 makes impossible the distribution of tax amnesty proceeds as stipulated in this bill. As I have stated repeatedly, our tax administrators have advised that \$50 million is a responsible estimate of the amount of revenue not already anticipated from ordinary tax enforcement that tax amnesty will produce in the 1988 Fiscal Year from the taxes which flow to the General Fund without restriction or to the Property Tax Relief Fund. In short, the funding sources for this bill does not exist.

Has the Legislature repealed Chapter 304 of the Public Laws of 1985 (the Ford bill), I would have been willing to consider aid to municipalities and counties for replacement of lost revenue sharing funds from the proceeds of a tax amnesty program. It became clear, however, that the Legislature was unwilling to repeal the Ford bill, leaving me with no choice but to provide assistance to the neediest municipalities by funding the Distressed Cities Program through tax amnesty proceeds. The action of the Legislature also forces me to veto Assembly Bill No 3758, which would have provided aid to counties from tax amnesty proceeds.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 2820 (Assembly Reprint) without my approval.

SENATE BILL NO. 905 (2ND OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 905 (OCR) without my approval.

This bill establishes certain presumptions under the offense of theft by deception regarding home repair contracts. The purpose of the bill is to ease the State's burden in proving deception in cases involving home repair contracts by allowing deception to be presumed upon the proof of certain enumerated conditions. This bill provides that theft by deception with respect to a home repair contract shall be presumed where the contractor receives a substantial part of the contract price prior to the provision of goods or services, and fails to substantially perform under the contract. The presumption takes effect when the contractor removes himself permanently from his business location so that the homeowner cannot locate him by reasonable means, or fails to respond to at least three properly addressed inquiries.

I return this bill without my approval because I believe that this bill is unnecessary; the deceptive practices of home repair contractors are presently criminalized pursuant to the general provisions governing theft by deception, N.J.S.A. 2C:20-4. Furthermore, this bill is inconsistent with the comprehensive nature of the Code of Criminal Justice. The Legislature drafted Title 2C to avoid the myriad of specific and narrowly drawn criminal statutes which were found in Title 2A and which have since been repealed.

I do not believe it is appropriate to enact piecemeal amendments concerning specific, isolated problems in light of the Legislature's enactment of a comprehensive criminal code. Finally, this bill arguably is unconstitutional because it creates certain presumptions which effectively shift onto the defendant the prosecutor's constitutional burden to prove every element of the offense beyond a reasonable doubt. Specifically, the bill states that "deception" shall be presumed if certain, specified facts are proven, although there is not necessarily a rational relationship between the facts to be proved and the presumption to be drawn.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 905 without my approval.

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SENATE BILL No. 906 (2ND OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section 1, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I am returning Senate Bill No. 906 (2nd OCR) with my objections, for reconsideration.

Senate Bill No. 906 (2nd OCR) would amend the law governing the Consolidated Police and Firemen's Pension Fund (CPFPPF) to increase the benefit granted to surviving spouses of CPFPPF members who die while in active service, but not in the line of duty, and to the surviving spouses of CPFPPF retirees. The survivorship pension would be increased from 25% to 50% of the CPFPPF member's average salary. Senate Bill No. 906 (2nd OCR) would also increase the minimum annual survivorship pension for surviving spouses from \$2,500.00 to \$4,500.00. The bill would also require the State to pay all pension and cost of living allowance (COLA) costs arising from the enactment of this act.

I support an increase in the survivorship benefit for surviving spouses of CPFPPF members. Surviving spouses of CPFPPF members have not received an increase in their percentage survivorship benefit since 1967 and in their minimum annual survivorship benefit since 1974. Many CPFPPF surviving spouses are currently living below the poverty level. Most do not receive Social Security benefits. An increased benefit will allow these surviving spouses to live out their remaining years with dignity.

While I support the concept expressed within Senate Bill No. 906 (2nd OCR) I must return Senate Bill No. 906 (2nd OCR) and recommend that the bill be amended in several areas. The amendments will restore rights to surviving children who may be disabled and resolve possibly insurmountable administrative problems inadvertently created by this legislation. The amendments will also ensure that the responsibility of paying for the benefit provided by Senate Bill No. 906 (2nd OCR) will be fairly apportioned.

I accept the Legislature's judgment that the survivorship pension for surviving spouses of CPFPPF members should be increased from 25% to 50% of a member's average salary.

In conjunction with this amendment, I also concur with the Legislature's recommendation that the increase in the minimum annual survivorship pension be increased from \$2,500.00 to \$4,500.00. Although applicable to all CPFPPF surviving spouses,

the minimum annual survivorship pension is designed to provide a reasonable survivorship pension to surviving spouses who were receiving survivorship benefits on or before April 1, 1967. The percentage survivorship pension of 25% of a member's average salary was established in 1967 and is applicable to survivorship pensions granted after April 1, 1967.

I am advised that these two amendments will provide the majority of CPFPF surviving spouses with an annual benefit in the area of \$7,500. This is the least we can do for this deserving group, especially because so many of them do not receive Social Security benefits.

However, Senate Bill No 906 (2nd OCR) must be amended to remove an amendment made in the Senate Revenue, Finance and Appropriations Committee concerning the date on which the percentage survivorship pension will be effective. The Senate Committee deleted the current effective date of April 1, 1967 and inserted an effective date of April 1, 1940. As discussed above, the date of April 1, 1967 has been the date upon which the Division of Pensions has depended for almost 21 years to calculate survivorship benefits for CPFPF surviving spouse's survivorship pension will be calculated, at this time, would cause severe administrative problems for the Division. In many instances, the Division's administrative problems would be insurmountable because the Division would not have the data that is necessary to recalculate many survivorship benefits for surviving spouses who commenced receiving survivorship benefits on or before April 1, 1967.

I recommend that the April 1, 1940 effective date be deleted and that the April 1, 1967 effective date be reinserted.

I recommend that the provision be reinstated granting to surviving children of CPFPF retirees a survivorship pension, where there is also a living surviving spouse who has not remarried. Under current law, one surviving child will receive a survivorship pension of 15% of the retiree's average salary at retirement and, if there are two or more surviving children, they will receive 25% of the retiree's average salary. While it is unlikely that deceased CPFPF retirees will leave minor children, it is entirely likely that a retiree could leave or has left one or more disabled children. The benefit provided to surviving children under current law will be quite helpful for the support of a surviving, disabled child and, accordingly, should be restored.

I am concerned about the provisions of Senate Bill No. 906 (2nd OCR) requiring the State to pay all costs associated with the bill.

I do not have a problem with the provision requiring the State to pay any additional cost arising from an increase in the survivorship pension granted to surviving spouses. I am advised that pursuant to the funding arrangement established in 1953, only the State currently has an obligation to pay pension obligations for CPFPF retir-

ees, surviving spouses and other beneficiaries. Local government's obligation expired in 1984.

However, I cannot support the provision of Senate Bill No. 906 (2nd OCR) requiring the State to pay any additional cost arising from increases in the COLA paid to surviving spouses as a result of the increase in the survivorship pension provided in the bill. The responsibility for paying the COLA associated with pension benefits granted to CPFPPF retirees, to surviving spouses and to other beneficiaries has always been the responsibility of the local employer. As such, shifting to the State any cost associated with the COLA is unjustified and sets an undesirable precedent.

Moreover, requiring local governments to pay any cost associated with increases in the COLA is an equitable division of responsibility between the State and Local governments for paying for the benefits provided in Senate Bill No. 906 (2nd OCR). I am advised that the annual fiscal impact associated with an increase in the COLA should be commensurate with the annual fiscal impact associated with the increase in the survivorship pension granted to CPFPPF surviving spouses by Senate Bill No. 906 (2nd OCR).

Finally, I recommend that Senate Bill No. 906 (2nd OCR) be amended to include surviving spouses of CPFPPF members who died in the line of duty, to ensure that these surviving spouses will also receive an increase in survivorship benefits. In its current form, Senate Bill No. 906 (2nd OCR) applies only to surviving spouses of CPFPPF members who died in active service, but not in the line of duty, and to surviving spouses of CPFPPF retirees. I see no reason for excluding surviving spouses of CPFPPF members who died in the line of duty. I must assume that the failure to include these surviving spouses was no more than an inadvertent oversight.

Additionally, I am advised that it is also unclear whether the increase in survivorship benefits granted to surviving spouses of certain members of the PFRS by Chapter 393 of the Public Laws of 1985 applies to surviving spouses of PFRS members who died in the line of duty. The PFRS also covers municipal uniformed officers and is the successor pension system to the municipal pension funds that were consolidated when the law creating the CPFPPF was enacted in 1953. I recommend that PFRS law be amended to ensure that surviving spouses of PFRS members who died in the line of duty will continue to receive the 40% increase in survivorship benefits granted to other eligible surviving spouses pursuant to Chapter 393 of the Public Laws of 1985.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 906 (2nd OCR) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Title, Line 3: After "[and]," INSERT ", and the pensions of certain widows and widowers of members of the Police and Firemen's Retirement System,"

Page 1, Title, Line 4: After "R.S. 43:16-3" INSERT ", R.S. 43:16-4 and R.S. 43:16A-10"

Page 2, Section 1, Line 25: After "children]" INSERT "for the use of herself or himself, to continue during her or his widowhood, plus 15% of such salary payable to one surviving child or plus 25% of such salary to two or more surviving children"

Page 2, Section 1, Line 32: DELETE "1940" INSERT "1967"

Page 2, Section 1, After Line 45: INSERT new sections as follows:

"2. R.S. 43:16-4 is amended to read as follows:

43:16-4. (a) Upon the receipt of proper proofs of the death of a member who shall have lost his life while on duty, there shall be paid to his widow or dependent widower a pension of [?] 70% of the member's average salary, for the use of herself or himself and the children of the deceased member, to continue during her or his widowhood; if there is no surviving widow or dependent widower or in case the widow or dependent widower dies or remarries, 20% of the member's average salary will be payable to one surviving child, 35% of such salary to two surviving children in equal shares and if there be three or more children, ? of such salary will be payable to such children in equal shares; if there is no surviving widow, dependent widower, or child, 25% of the member's average salary will be payable to one surviving dependent parent or 40% of such salary will be payable to two surviving dependent parents in equal shares.

(b) The changes in benefits provided by subsection (a) of this section shall apply only to pensions granted after April 1, 1967; provided, however, that any pension in an amount less than [\$2,500.00] \$4,500.00 per annum presently being paid or to be paid in the future, pursuant to R.S. 43:16-4, to a widow of a policeman or fireman who lost his life while on duty, shall be increased to [2,500.00] \$4,500.00 per annum.

(c) The State shall pay the additional pension costs arising from the increase from ? to 70% in the proportion of a member's average salary payable as a pension to that member's surviving spouse pursuant to the provisions of this section of this 1987 amendatory and supplementary act.

3. R.S. 43:16A-10 is amended to read as follows:

10. (1) Upon the death of a member in active service as a result of an accident met in the actual performance of duty at some definite time and place, and such death was not the result of the member's willful negligence, an accidental death benefit shall be payable if a report of the accident is filed in the office of the retire-

ment system within 60 days next following the accident, but the board of trustees may waive such time limit, for a reasonable period, if in the judgment of the board the circumstances warrant such action. No such application shall be valid or acted upon unless it is filed in the office of the retirement system within 5 years of the date of such death.

(2) Upon the receipt of proper proofs of the death of a member on account of which an accidental death benefit is payable, there shall be paid to his widow or dependent widower a pension of [50%] 70% of the compensation, upon which contributions by the member to the annuity savings fund were based in the last year of creditable service, for the use of herself or himself and the children of the deceased member, to continue during her or his widowhood; if there is no surviving widow or dependent widower or in case the widow or dependent widower dies or remarries, 20% of such compensation will be payable to one surviving child, 35% of such compensation to 2 surviving children in equal shares and if there be 3 or more children, 50% of such compensation will be payable to such children in equal shares.

If there is no surviving widow, dependent widower or child, 25% of the compensation upon which contributions by the member to the annuity savings fund were based in the last year of creditable service, will be payable to one surviving dependent parent or 40% of such compensation will be payable to 2 surviving parents in equal shares.

In the event of accidental death occurring in the first year of creditable service, the benefits, payable pursuant to this subsection, shall be computed at the annual rate of compensation.

(3) If there is no surviving widow, dependent widower, child or dependent parent, there shall be paid to any other beneficiary of the deceased member, his aggregate contributions at the time of death.

(4) In no case shall the death benefit provided in subsection 2 be less than that provided under subsection 3.

(5) In addition to the foregoing benefits payable under subsection 2 or 3, there shall also be paid in one sum to such beneficiary, if living, as the member shall have nominated by written designation duly executed and filed with the retirement system, otherwise to the executor or administrator of the member's estate, an amount equal to 3 times the compensation upon which contributions by the member to the annuity savings fund were based in the last year of creditable service."

SENATE BILL No. 2213 (2ND OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I am returning Senate Bill No. 2213 (2nd OCR) with my objections, for reconsideration.

This bill would establish the Wastewater Treatment Facility Matching Grant Fund (Fund) in the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) and appropriate \$30 million to that Fund from the General Fund. These monies would be used to provide State matching grants to certain specified counties, municipalities, regional agencies and authorities in amounts equal to 8% of the approved costs of local sewerage projects which qualified for federal assistance pursuant to the "Sewerage Facilities Aid Program," during federal fiscal years 1984 and 1985.

There is great competition among local governmental entities in this State for those funds available for the construction and upgrading of wastewater treatment facilities. As a result, it is incumbent upon us to ensure that any State aid provided for such purpose be provided in the most effective, efficient and far-reaching manner possible.

It has long been my view that providing State assistance for local sewerage projects in the form of loans would take us further towards meeting our needs than providing such aid in the form of grants, since a steady flow of dollars would be made available thus enabling us to reach a greater number of sewerage projects.

Therefore, while I believe it appropriate that those projects which qualified for federal assistance pursuant to the "Sewerage Facilities Aid Program" receive their State assistance in the form of grants, it is my view that any further State assistance for local sewerage projects should be provided in the form of loans.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 2213 (2nd OCR) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 4, Section 2, Line 11: Add new Section "3". "While those counties, municipalities, regional agencies, and authorities listed in Section 1 of this bill shall be provided with State assistance for their sewerage facilities in the form of grants until depletion of those funds appropriated herein, any future State assistance provided for local sewerage projects shall be provided in the form of loans."

Page 4, Section 3, Line 1: Delete "3" insert "4"

SENATE BILL NO. 605 (OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 605 (OCR) with my objections for reconsideration.

The purpose of this bill is to prohibit individuals from leaving any waste or refuse container parked or unattended on or along any highway or public property without having first obtained written consent from the appropriate municipal, county or State authority possessing jurisdiction over the highway or public property. The bill also requires that the waste containers, which are commonly known as roll-off dumpsters or roll-off containers, must be equipped with flashing warning lights when parked on or along any highway. These lights are to be displayed during the hours when headlights are required by law to alert approaching drivers of the dumpsters' presence. The bill further requires that the warning lights must be of a type approved by the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles.

While I strongly support the concept of promoting safety on our State, county and municipal highways, I believe that technical amendments should be made to this bill in order to ensure its effectiveness. The bill currently requires that the warning devices to be placed on the dumpsters must be flashing lights of a type approved by the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles. Since the Division of Motor Vehicles does not have jurisdiction over this area, I believe that the Department of Transportation should be the responsible agency to determine the type of warning device to be utilized. Furthermore, the experience of the Department of Transportation has shown that the flashing warning lights required under the bill are highly prone to theft and vandalism.

This legislation, as it is now written, would create a severe safety problem if these dumpsters are placed on roadways and stripped of their warning devices. I, therefore, recommend that the bill be amended to require the utilization of yellow reflective diamond-shaped panels as a warning to motorists in place of the flashing lights.

In addition, I recommend that the legislation be amended to subject violators of its provisions to a fine not to exceed \$100 for each violation or, in default of the payment, imprisonment in the county jail not to exceed 90 days. The bill should specify that the fines will be paid over to the board or body charged with the maintenance of the road or highway upon which the violation occurs.

Therefore, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 605 (OCR) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Title, Line 2: Omit "article 5 of chapter 4 of Title 39" and insert "Title 27"

Page 1, Section 1, Line 1: After "1." insert "a."

Pages 1-2, Section 1, Line 12-26: On line 12 omit " , during the times when lighted lamps" omit lines 13-25 in their entirety and "39:4-31" on line 26 and insert "markers consisting of all yellow reflective diamond-shaped panels having a minimum size of 18 inches by 18 inches. These panels shall be mounted at the edge of the dumpster or container at both ends nearest the path of passing vehicles and facing the direction of oncoming traffic. These markers shall have a minimum mounting height of three feet from the bottom of the panels to the surface of the roadway"

Page 2, After Section 1, After Line 26: Add new subsection b. as follows:

"b. A person who is convicted of a violation of this section shall pay a fine of not more than \$100.00 for each violation. In default of the payment of a fine, imprisonment in the county jail for a period of not more than 90 days may be imposed.

The fine shall be paid over to the board or body charged with the maintenance of the road or highway upon which the violation occurs."

SENATE BILL No. 2966 (OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 2966 (OCR) with my objections for reconsideration.

This bill would amend and supplement the Municipal Land Use Law to authorize municipalities to enter into general development plans for planned developments of more than 100 acres. A general development plan would precede preliminary subdivision plan or preliminary site plan approval and, if approved by the municipality, would have vested rights against subsequent changes in municipal ordinances.

The purpose of this bill in permitting large-scale developers to obtain vested rights is acceptable given the expenditures they plan to make over the course of several years in development of their property. Unfortunately, the technique utilized by this bill is not consistent with the scheme set forth in the Municipal Land Use Law now in force in New Jersey.

The bill requires the local planning board to approve any general development plan that is complete as to certain categories of information specified in the bill, regardless of what the planning board thinks about the merits of the proposed planned development and its relationship to the municipal master plan. The planning board makes a substantive decision only on the length of the agreement. The bill goes on to stipulate that a general development plan approved in this manner should be forwarded to the governing body for adoption as an ordinance. The governing body is required to give its reasons if it rejects the general development plan but not if it approves it.

The Municipal Land Use Law, currently operative in this State, requires that a municipal zoning ordinance or amendment be substantially consistent with or designed to effectuate the land use and housing elements of the municipal master plan. Before adopting any land use ordinance or amendment, the governing body is required to provide a copy to the planning board for recommendations and identification of any inconsistencies with the master plan.

The governing body can only adopt an ordinance or amendment inconsistent with the master plan or planning board recommendations if the governing body states on the public record the reasons why the ordinance or amendment is superior to the master plan provisions or planning board recommendations and the governing body

adopts the inconsistent ordinance or amendment by a vote of a majority of its full authorized membership.

The amendments I recommend in this message provide for vested rights for general development plans upon approval by the planning board in accordance with ordinance provisions adopted by the governing body under the Municipal Land Use Law. Approval would be granted by the planning board consistent with the master plan and the zoning ordinance. Thus, my recommendations strengthen this bill by permitting vested rights for certain large-scale developers consistent with the scheme that now exists in the Municipal Land Use Law.

I am suggesting that a general development plan could include a written agreement between the municipality and the developer relating to the planned development.

I am also recommending several technical amendments to the bill, including returning to the current definition of "density" in the Municipal Land Use Law. Modification would cause confusion in other sections of the statute.

I herewith return Senate Bill No. 2966 (OCR) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Section 1, Lines 4-5: Delete "or nonresidential floor area"

Pages 3-5, Section 2, Lines 1-84: Delete section in its entirety and insert a new section: "2. Section 29.1 of P.L. 1975, c.291 (C.40:55D-39) is amended to read as follows: 29.1 An ordinance requiring approval by the planning board of either subdivisions or site plans or both may include the following:

a. Provisions for off-tract water, sewer, drainage, and street improvements which are necessitated by a subdivision or land development, subject to the provisions of section 30;

b. Provisions for standards encouraging and promoting flexibility, and economy in layout and design through the use of planned unit development, planned unit residential development and residential cluster; provided that such standards shall be appropriate to the type of development permitted; and provided further that the ordinance shall set forth the limits and extent of any special provisions applicable to such planned developments, so that the manner in which such special provisions differ from the standards otherwise applicable to subdivisions or site plans can be determined;

c. Provisions for planned development:

(1) [Setting forth any variations from the ordinary standards for preliminary and final approval] Authorizing the planning board to grant general development plan approval to provide the increased flexibility desirable to promote mutual agreement between the applicant and the planning board on the basic scheme of a planned

development [at the stage of preliminary approval] and setting forth any variations from the ordinary standards for preliminary and final approval;

(2) Requiring that any common open space resulting from the application of standards for density, or intensity of land use, be set aside for the use and benefit of the owners or residents in such development subject to section 31 of this act;

(3) Setting forth how the amount and location of any common open space shall be determined and how its improvement and maintenance for common open space use shall be secured subject to section 31 of this act;

(4) Authorizing the planning board to allow for a greater concentration of density, or intensity of land use, within a section or sections of development, whether it be earlier, later or simultaneous in the development, than in others;

(5) Setting forth any requirement that the approval by the planning board of a greater concentration of density or intensity of land use for any section to be developed be offset by a smaller concentration in any completed prior stage or by an appropriate reservation of common open space on the remaining land by grant of easement or by covenant in favor of the municipality; provided that such reservation shall, as far as practicable, defer the precise location of common open space until an application for final approval is filed, so that flexibility of development can be maintained;

(6) Setting forth any requirements for timing of development among the various types of uses and subgroups thereunder and, in the case of planned unit development, whether some nonresidential uses are required to be built before, after or at the same time as the residential uses.

d. Provisions ensuring in the case of a development which proposes construction over a period of years, the protection of the interests of the public and of the residents, occupants and owners of the proposed development in the total completion of the development.

e. Provisions that require as a condition for local municipal approval the submission of proof that no taxes or assessments for local improvements are due or delinquent on the property for which any subdivision, site plan, or planned development application is made.

f. Provisions for the creation of a Site Plan Review Advisory Board for the purpose of reviewing all site plan applications and making recommendations for the planning board in regard thereto."

SENATE BILL NO. 1852 (2ND OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I am returning Senate Bill No. 1852 (2nd OCR) with my objections, for reconsideration.

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Senate Bill 1852 (2nd OCR) would require general contractors on State construction projects to pay their subcontractors within 60 days of receipt of payment by the general contractor from the State. If the general contractor does not pay within 60 days, the general contractor would have to pay interest on the amount due and owing to the subcontractor at the prevailing prime interest rate plus 2 percent. Interest would be paid for the period beginning on the day after the required payment date and concluding on the date on which the general contractor's check for payment is drawn. The "prompt payment" requirement would only apply if the subcontractor has satisfactorily completed his work, and the State agency accepts the subcontractor's work.

I strongly support legislation which would require general contractors to promptly pay their subcontractors on State construction projects. However, Senate Bill No. 1852 (OCR) should be amended to adequately and responsibly achieve the objective of ensuring that general contractors pay their subcontractors for work which has been completed within a reasonable period of time.

First, I recommend that Senate Bill No. 1852 (2nd OCR) be amended to broaden its scope to include subcontractors who supply materials to general contractors, as well as those who have contracted with a general contractor to perform a specific task. In addition to there being a need to protect subcontractors who perform specific tasks from general contractors who withhold payments which may be rightfully due, there is also a need to protect persons who provide materials to the general contractor on State construction projects. To overlook this type of subcontractor would be unfair.

Second, while I concur in the Legislature's judgment that subcontractors must be protected from general contractors who may unreasonably withhold payment for work satisfactorily completed, I am also concerned that general contractors retain their ability to have subcontractors, where applicable, complete their work satisfactorily. Accordingly, I recommend this bill be amended to add the condition that the subcontractor must be found to be performing satisfactorily at the time payment is due. This will ensure that State construction projects are completed in an efficient and expeditious manner.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1852 (2nd OCR) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Section 1, After Line 19: INSERT new subsection as follows: "d. "Supplier" means any person who enters into a contract with a general contractor to provide materials to the general contractor."

Page 2, Section 2, Line 4: After "agency" INSERT "or a general contractor fails to pay a supplier with 60 calendar days of receipt by the general contractor of payment by the State agency for materials accepted by the general contractor, as appropriate"

Page 2, Section 2, Line 8E: After “.” INSERT new paragraph: “In the case of ongoing work on the same project for which partial payments are made, the amount of money owed by the general contractor to the subcontractor for work already completed shall only be paid to the subcontractor if the subcontractor is performing to the satisfaction of the general contractor on the required payment date.”

SENATE BILL NO. 3401

To the Senate:

I am today returning Senate Bill No. 3401 with my signature, along with certain constitutionally permitted modifications set forth in the statement appended thereto.

This budget is basically the one which I delivered to the Legislature on February 2, 1987. It is responsible and prudent. It invests wisely in our continued growth and prosperity. This budget will provide:

- A total of \$5.2 billion in State aid to ease the pressure on local property taxes, including \$3.2 billion in school aid, an increase of \$252 million from last year. This is the second largest increase in history and is by far the single largest increase in the budget. Since I have been in office we have invested \$4.5 billion in new money for education.
- An increase of over \$200 million for the Department of Human Services for a total State commitment of \$2.1 billion. These funds, together with almost \$1.5 billion in federal dollars, will permit us to expand significantly our services to the elderly, the disabled and the poor. Some of the most significant improvements to be made include:
 - the reform of our welfare system through the REACH program;
 - the initiation of a counseling program for troubled teenagers;
 - the expansion of services for over 10,000 homeless families;
 - an expansion of community services for the mentally ill and developmentally disabled; and

- the significant expansion of health care, particularly for the aged, disabled and pregnant women.
- An increase of over \$60 million for the operation of correctional facilities to meet the increase in the number of inmates incarcerated in State and county facilities.
- An increase of \$42.3 million for a total appropriation of almost \$900 million for our public colleges and universities. We are expanding our challenge grants to community colleges, Rutgers, New Jersey Institute of Technology and the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey, as well as continuing our challenge grant program for State colleges and providing additional funding to strengthen minority recruitment and retention.
- A pay-as-you-go capital program of more than \$355 million, including \$40 million for hazardous waste cleanup activities.

This budget also includes smaller but just as critical increases in State support for mass transit, treatment and research of AIDS, cultural activities, aid to families in distress, and drug education and treatment.

I appreciate the cooperation of the Legislature, particularly the Appropriation Committees of the Senate and Assembly and their respective chairmen in providing the necessary tools for State government to operate in an efficient and effective manner. They have taken my basic recommendations, fine-tuned them and added some enhancements of their own. While the Legislature and I may disagree on certain of the modifications made to this budget, the end product of their deliberations, with certain revisions I now make, is one that serves the State and its citizens well. The process has worked.

My single major disappointment in terms of long term budget planning is the absence of any Legislative agreement on a stable funding source for the maintenance of the State's natural resources and for the construction of the needed transportation projects. All agree a solution must be found and I pledge to continue to work with the Legislature to provide stable resources for these vital programs. The \$58 million appropriation for transportation projects provided in this budget together with an increase in the bonding capacity of the Transportation Trust Fund Authority will permit a transportation program of only \$323 million in State funds and \$480 million in federal funds for a total capital construction program of \$803 million for fiscal year 1988; there is no provision for subsequent years. This is a bare bones, stopgap program. We must continue our efforts to fund a permanent solution. The crisis still looms close at hand, the day of reckoning has merely been postponed. This item is reduced to \$380,000.

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However, on balance, I am most pleased to sign into law this budget for fiscal year 1988. It is a wise investment in our future and an investment which maintains the State's fiscal integrity and prudent financial practices.

SUMMARY

This appropriation bill, with my line item veto adjustments, provides a spending plan for fiscal year 1988. The total appropriation for all State funds is \$10.397 billion, an increase of approximately \$1 billion over the fiscal year 1987 adjusted appropriation.

This appropriation is less than the amount recommended by the Legislature by approximately \$61.7 million.

More than half of the budget is directed to State aid to local governments, with the largest single State aid appropriation being \$3.2 billion for aid to local school districts—\$252 million more than is currently funded. The second largest increase is \$62.5 million to provide needed health services for the poor, the elderly and the disabled. More importantly, the Medicaid appropriation will permit the State to take advantage of new federal regulations to expand further our health services for the elderly, the disabled and pregnant women.

The third largest increase is \$60 million for the operation of correctional facilities to meet the increase in the number of inmates maintained in State and county facilities. Other significant increases in the budget are for community programs for youth; for the mentally ill and for the developmentally disabled; for environ-

mental programs; for aid to distressed cities; for aid to the homeless; and for improvements in the State's welfare programs.

This budget is consistent with my belief that a budget of \$10.4 billion must have an adequate surplus. This budget provides for an undesignated fund balance in the General and Property Tax Relief Funds of \$269 million, and \$93.7 million in the Casino Revenue Fund.

I have reduced funds for the following programs in the amounts indicated for the stated reasons.

"DIRECT STATE SERVICES"

- \$50,000** Department of Agriculture
The Legislature added \$100,000 to an existing appropriation of \$431,000 for Grants to Soil Conservation Districts. An increase of \$50,000 will provide sufficient funds to expand this program.
- \$100,000** Funds for the Non-Point Source Pollution Program are eliminated. This program would be duplicative as the State Department of Environmental Protection has several pollution control programs which include non-point source pollution, as well as the enforcement powers necessary to control pollution.
- \$100,000** Funds for Agriculture in the Classroom are eliminated. The intent of this program is to interest children in farming by developing curricula toward this end. The development of curricula should be a responsibility of local Boards of Education and the State Department of Education.
- \$25,000** Department of Commerce and Economic Development
This provides funds for the Governor's Commission on International Trade. The enabling statute requires the Department to provide for incidental costs associated with the Commission's activities.
The reduced amount along with existing

- p>Departmental appropriations is sufficient to meet necessary expenses of the Commission.

- \$250,000 This provides funds for an Advanced Manufacturing Engineering Systems Center. This item is currently being reviewed by a peer review council and no final report has been submitted or definitive action taken by the Commission on Science and Technology to support this request. Any funding commitment should await the Commission's recommendation.
-
- \$1,500,000 Department of Corrections
-
- These funds were added for the Purchase of Service for Inmates Incarcerated in County Penal Facilities—Accelerated Reimbursement Program, which would reimburse the counties beginning with the eleventh day of inmate incarceration as contrasted to the current sixteenth day. This is in conflict with existing statutes and is eliminated for that reason. Any amendment to the statutes should be considered in separate legislation. Also, fifteen days is not an excessive period to allow for the State to either move the inmates to State facilities or to begin to pay.
-
- \$100,000 Department of Education
-
- The amount remaining after the veto provides funding for the Martin Luther King Jr. Commemorative Commission at a level of \$50,000 greater than provided in fiscal year 1987. Also, given that the fiscal year 1987 appropriation contained one-time funding for the establishment of a lasting memorial to Dr. King, this, in effect, provides an increase of \$100,000 for operational costs—a 66 percent increase over fiscal year 1987.

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In addition, carry forward language has been added which will make available additional resources to meet operational costs.

\$450,000 Department of Energy

This line item would provide public funding to WNET. WNET is a New Jersey based FCC licensee and has certain responsibilities and obligations as a licensee to this State.

Before State monies are made available to WNET, there should be a clear commitment on the part of WNET to fulfill its obligation to New Jersey.

\$55,000 This would fund a grant to WBGO, the public radio station in New Jersey, located in Newark. There has been a grant to WBGO for several years. In fiscal year 1986 \$60,000 was appropriated.

In fiscal year 1987 \$30,000 in capital construction funds and an operating grant of \$30,000 were appropriated. If the \$30,000 operations grant is continued this year, \$75,000 will be available for operating costs, an increase of \$45,000 over fiscal year 1987.

\$600,000 Department of Environmental Protection
These funds would be used to expand the New Jersey Pollution Discharge Elimination System (NJPDDES) program by establishing twenty (20) new positions in the compliance monitoring unit. This program is totally supported by fees derived from industrial discharge permits, and is scheduled for a fee increase in FY1988 to generate an additional \$7.0 million. The growth in fees anticipated for this program can be assigned to increase compliance monitoring activities within this program.

\$250,000 These funds would be used to expand the enforcement unit within the Worker and Community Right to Know program by establishing new positions. This program has been entirely supported by industry assessments, with \$1.2 million allocated to the Department of Environmental Protection in FY1988 to fully fund their responsibilities under the legislation. This represents an increase of \$640,000 or 53% over the FY1987 funding level.

\$650,000 These funds would be used to hire additional personnel to reduce a 500 case backlog in permit applications and increase the frequency of control inspections within the air pollution control program. The air pollution control program is presently supported from a combination of funding sources, including State, federal and fees derived from air permit applications. These air permit fees have been growing rapidly, with in excess of \$4.0 million anticipated in FY1988. This represents a \$1.0 million or 33% increase from current year levels. This growth in fees can be allocated to reduce both the permit backlog and expand the control inspections within this program.

\$448,000 This reduction reflects a contractual agreement between the Department of Environmental Protection and Trump associates for the lease of Farley Marina in Atlantic City. Since the State will no longer be obligated to provide for the maintenance and security of this marina under the terms of the contract, this decrease represents those amounts which were appropriated for this purpose.

\$25,000 Department of Health

This leaves \$75,000 for a grant to MCOSS Nursing Services, Inc. The Department of Health has \$4.5 million in the budget for maternal and child health programs. If this program requires additional support, it should apply to the Department of Health for a competitive grant.

\$50,000 This item provides a grant to the John F. Kennedy Medical Center in Edison for a compulsive gambling treatment program. The Governor's budget increased the compulsive gambling account \$75,000 to \$275,000 in fiscal year 1987. With the amount added by the Legislature, this act gives an increase of \$90,000 in fiscal year 1988 bringing the total to \$365,000.

This Center traditionally has been funded through appropriations made to the Division of Alcoholism.

\$50,000 This leaves \$50,000 for a grant to the Somerset County Council on Alcoholism. The Governor's budget includes \$4,000,000 for alcohol treatment and education to 40 facilities. Another \$8,500,000 is available from the Alcohol Education, Rehabilitation and Enforcement Trust Fund. The Somerset County Council on Alcoholism may submit an application to the Department of Health and apply for additional funding on a competitive basis.

\$1,000,000 Department of Higher Education

These funds would have provided for full funding of the Independent Colleges and University Assistance Act. This reduction leaves an appropriation of \$21,245,000 for this program which reflects an increase of

- \$3.1 million over the current year's appropriation. It increases the present level of State support from 91% to 95.5% of full funding of the formula.
- \$140,000 These funds are for a librarian and other related costs at Glassboro State College—Urban Campus. The fiscal year 1988 appropriation already provides an increase of \$907,000 for the college, from which funds can be reallocated for this purpose.
- \$250,000 These funds would be used to renovate Laboratories at the Agricultural Experimental Station; the fiscal year 1988 appropriation already includes an increase of \$750,000 to initiate the renovation project.
- \$60,000 Department of Human Services
This would provide funding to the Irvington Mental Health Center. This facility is currently one of 120 agencies under contract with the Department of Human Services to provide community mental health services and received \$166,869 in fiscal year 1987. The budget includes over \$65 million for community mental health programs. The agency should submit an application for funding to the Department of Human Services; it should not receive a direct appropriation which circumvents the grant process.
- \$86,000 This would fund additional positions for the Bureau of Special Residential Services in the Department of Human Services to be used in the youth residential centers. These positions should be included in contracts with providers of services for which funding has been included in the budget.
- \$40,000 This would provide funding in the area of early intervention with children with

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developmental disabilities in Hudson County

An appropriation of \$50,000 is included in the budget for this agency. Additional funding may be available and should be sought through the Department of Human Services' competitive grant award process.

\$250,000 This would allow the Commission for the Blind and Visually impaired to continue funding for the central nonprofit agency which implements the Commodities and Services Council and State Use Law. Assembly Bill 1826, which was recently signed into law, provided a supplemental appropriation for this program. These funds will carry forward into fiscal year 1988 to support this program.

\$70,000 This would provide a grant to Recording for the Blind. Funding for programs to assist the blind is included in the Commission for the Blind's budget. A grant may be available for these services if the agency applies to the Commission and if the proposal meets the Commission's priorities.

\$2,000,000 This budget provides substantially increased funding for expansion and development of locally-based programs offering a range of preventive and supportive services for families. County Human Services Advisory Boards' funding represents an increase of eighteen percent over fiscal year 1987.

\$25,000 This provides a specific grant for the Martin Luther King Youth Center. The budget includes \$25,000 for the Center and over \$82 million for social services, a more than nine percent increase. It is recommended that the agency apply to the Division of Youth and Family Services for a competitive grant to

- p>meet any additional needs.
- \$50,000 This provides a direct grant to Project LIFT. This project is currently funded through a \$95,000 State Aid contract. It is recommended that the agency apply to the Division of Youth and Family Services for a competitive grant to meet its needs.
- \$211,000 This funding would allow the Division of Veterans Services to establish a halfway house for homeless veterans. Funds for homeless persons are included in Community Affairs (\$3.8 million), the Division of Youth and Family Services (\$4.35 million), and in a Public Welfare initiative of \$8.7 million to prevent homelessness through Emergency Assistance. Homeless veterans may receive services through these programs.
- \$60,000 Department of State
This leaves \$60,000 for the Trenton Visual Art Center.
- \$60,000 This leaves \$75,000 for the Arts Foundation of New Jersey. Since fiscal year 1985 through fiscal year 1987, this organization has received an annual grant-award in the amount of \$15,000.
- \$25,000 Department of Transportation
This amount would supplement \$30,000 in federal assistance within the current Operation Lifesaver Program, which provides educational materials to the public concerning the hazards of freight railroad and highway crossings. New Jersey Transit will spend about \$150,000 on a commuter rail safety program in FY 1988. This is sufficient funding.
- \$200,000 Provides for a joint DOT/DEP study of the potential use of ground rubber tire as a road

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construction material. This proposal may have merit; however, feasibility studies will be available from other States and it is not necessary for New Jersey to duplicate these efforts.

"STATE AID"

DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY AFFAIRS

Many of the items listed below represent special aid to municipalities or nonprofit organizations which have no relationship to need. The allocation of State aid based upon need, as in the Distressed Cities Program, is a better way to allocate State Resources. These items have been vetoed partially or in total because the need has not been justified.

- \$325,000** This would provide an additional \$325,000 to the Relocation Assistance for Fire Victims program. This increase is based upon the local government not sharing in the relocation costs for this particular segment. This program can accomplish its goals at its current level of funding, if locals continue to participate.
- \$15,000** This would fund an anti graffiti program in the City of Camden. Many cities throughout the United States have utilized the resources of community groups and area businesses to address this program.
- \$75,000** This would provide funds to the Municipal Clerks Training Program. The training of the Tax Collectors and the Finance Officers is supported by the State because of demonstrated need. The need for the State to fund this training program has not been established.
- \$450,000** This item is reduced to \$1,750,000. The remaining appropriation is an increase of \$500,000, or 40 percent, over current funding for legal services. We are disturbed by the

fact that New Jersey's legal community contributes less than three percent of legal services overall budget. If there are to be future increases in this item there must be a corresponding demonstration of increased financial commitment on the part of the private bar.

\$50,000 These funds would be targeted for the towns of Barrington, Bellmawr and Somerville for recreational facilities. These towns should seek funding for these projects through municipal fund raising efforts.

\$100,000 A grant would be provided to the Institute for Citizen Involvement in Education at Rutgers University. A program such as this should not be budgeted in this Department because it does not coincide with the objectives of the Department of Community Affairs. This program should continue to be supported through the efforts of Rutgers and the communities involved in the program.

\$20,000 This item is reduced to \$60,000. The remaining appropriation will continue funding to La Casa De Don Pedro at the fiscal year 1987 level.

\$18,000 This item is reduced to \$50,000. This grant will be provided to ASPIRA of Trenton to provide such services as an early intervention program. This appropriation should enable this group to operate while it seeks additional private donations.

\$5,000 Department of Education
This is a direct grant to a nonprofit program that provides literacy services to adults. Given that State and federal funds are available on a competitive basis to

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- programs serving illiterate adults and Focus on Literacy is eligible to receive grants from these existing sources, direct State funding is reduced to the level provided in fiscal year 1987.
- \$500,000** The remaining funds represents an increase of \$1.5 million over fiscal year 1987 when no funding was provided and will be utilized to support those schools offering true job training programs.
- \$226,000** Funding added by the Legislature for Library Network Aid is reduced to the level requested by the Department. The remaining funds represent an increase of \$773,000 over the fiscal year 1987 level. Given the recent consolidation of area library, research library and network aid, some lowering of costs should be expected.
- \$50,000** Funding added by the Legislature for Library Development Aid is reduced to the level requested by the Department. The remaining funds represent an increase of \$400,000 over the fiscal year 1987 level which will be utilized to continue and expand the current program operations.
- \$40,000** Department of Environmental Protection These funds would provide for the rehabilitation and silt removal for Alberta Lake in Neptune Township. Additional funding should be sought from private or local government contributions. The budget contains funding for approximately 50 percent of projected costs.
- \$130,000** These funds would provide for the rehabilitation of Wesley Lake. The remaining funds should cover approximately 50 percent of estimated project costs. Additional

- p funding should be sought from private or local government contributions.
- \$100,000 These funds would provide for the repair of the outfall pipe to prevent local flooding at Lake Como. Additional funding should be sought from private or local government contributions. The budget contains funding for about one-half of the projected costs.
- \$50,000 These funds would provide for the dredging and bulkhead replacement at Sylvan Lake. The budget contains \$50,000 to be applied against the total project costs estimated at \$100,000. Additional funding should be sought from private or local government contributions.
- \$15,000 This leaves \$10,000. These funds provide for additional improvements and for the construction of a junior museum at Monmouth Museum. Additional funding should be sought from private or local government contributions.
- \$15,000 This leaves \$10,000. These funds provide for capital improvements at the Long Branch Community Club. Additional funding should be sought from private or local government contributions.
- \$15,000 This leaves \$10,000. These funds provide for capital improvements and repairs to the Manasquan Railroad Station Museum. Additional funding should be sought from private or local government contributions.
- \$15,000 This leaves \$10,000. These funds provide a direct grant to the Spring Lake Historical Society to offset operating expenses. Additional funding should be sought from private or local government contributions.
- \$5,000 This leaves \$10,000. These funds provide

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the restoration of Strauss Museum, operated by the Atlantic Highlands Historical Society. Additional funding should be sought from private or local government contributions.

\$100,000 Department of Higher Education
These funds would be used for an Urban Educational Center at Union County College. An increase of \$6.1 million is included in the FY1988 appropriation for Operating Aid to County Colleges. Union County College is eligible for funding from this source. It is not appropriate to provide a separate appropriation.

\$50,000 Department of Labor
This proposed funding for the Job Transportation program is deleted in its entirety. This program was funded in fiscal year 1982 but discontinued because of underutilization and cost inefficiencies.

\$50,000 Department of State
The District Election Worker Increase appropriation is deleted in its entirety. The Governor conditionally vetoed S. 1570 in December, 1986 which would have required the State to fund a \$25.00 increase for every district election worker. The amended version of the bill requiring counties to fund this increase became law on June 26, 1987, P.L. 1987, Chapter 151.

\$30,000,000 Department of the Treasury
This item would increase funding in the Municipal Purpose Tax Assistance Fund from \$30 million to \$60 million. The additional \$30 million, pursuant to language proposed in the bill, would not be distributed to municipalities until calendar year 1988. The

Legislature's laudable purpose in increasing MPTAF funding by \$30 million is to avoid a municipal fiscal crisis in calendar year 1988. However, this proposed increase in municipal aid is (a) not of sufficient amount to meet the likely fiscal needs of our municipalities during calendar year 1988, (b) is based on a mechanistic formula approach rather than a "needs based" approach as is our Distressed Cities program (P.L. 1987, c.75), and (c) does not provide a long range solution to the problems of municipal fiscal distress. All three components must be present in any municipal aid plan to be acceptable. So, while I commend the Legislature for acknowledging this problem and recommending a solution, the solution it has proposed is flawed and cannot be accepted.

\$6,500,000 These monies are directed to towns which have State owned property within their borders and also to municipalities who are not qualified to receive funding under MPTAF. Again, this type of funding proposal is unacceptable for the reasons stated above.

\$7,500,000 This is intended to offset local costs associated with recent amendments to the Police and Fireman's Consolidated Pension Fund (P.L. 1987, Chapter 128). Those amendments increased benefits by about \$9 million and COLA costs by \$7.5 million. In accordance with the preexisting formula, the State is responsible for benefits; the local employer for COLA costs. The cost division is permanent law and should not be altered in the Appropriations Act.

\$350,000 This would provide additional in lieu of tax payments to the Township of Ewing. Under

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a special provision, Ewing currently receives \$350,000. This amount is not prorated as are the payments to the other municipalities. Under the general formula, Ewing is entitled to receive only \$275,000 even at full funding. This item is not supported because Ewing would receive these funds above the current level and Ewing is already treated in a "special manner."

Language This language applies to the Municipal Purpose Tax Assistance Program. The language has direct correlation to the appropriation and the distribution of the \$30,000,000 in additional funds to the Municipal Purpose Tax Assistance Fund. Since the additional funds for this program have been eliminated, this section of language is no longer necessary.

Language This language is related to the additional \$6,500,000 for the Municipal Services Assistance Program that has been deleted in its entirety. Since this line item has been deleted, this language is no longer necessary.

"CASINO REVENUE FUND"

\$1,000,000 Department of Community Affairs

This deletes the recommended appropriation to the Expansion of the Meals on Wheels Program. With the recent enactment of S 2662 (P.L. 1987, Chapter 133), this same program will receive \$1.0 million from the Casino Revenue Fund. With the signing of this legislation after April 1, 1987, the funds are carried forward and can be used in fiscal year 1988, to provide these services on weekends and holidays.

DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES

The Legislature has proposed in the appropriations bill presented to the Governor to expand eligibility for the PAAD Program to approximately 6,400 persons who are classified as disabled under definitions contained in the Railroad Retirement Act, regulations of the United States Civil Service Commission and the Veterans Administration. Presently social security definitions are the criteria used to determine PAAD eligibility. The merits of this proposed program expansion should be debated in the context of separate legislation rather than included in the Appropriations Act.

\$100,000 This would provide for additional administrative costs to the Pharmaceutical Assistance for the Aged and Disabled (PAAD) program because of the proposed expansion of the program. Since the expansion is not approved the funds are not needed.

\$1,600,000 This would provide for additional prescription drugs for persons eligible for the Pharmaceutical Assistance for the Aged and Disabled (PAAD) program as a result of expansion of disability definitions. These funds are not necessary absent expansion.

\$78,000 This would provide for additional administrative costs for the Lifeline program resulting from expansion of disability definitions under the Pharmaceutical Assistance for the Aged and Disabled program (PAAD). Persons qualifying for PAAD are eligible to apply for lifeline. Since the expansion is not approved, the funds are not necessary.

\$1,452,000 This would provide for additional Lifeline credits for persons eligible for Lifeline as a result of expansion of disability definitions under the Pharmaceutical Assistance for the Aged and Disabled (PAAD) program. Persons qualifying for PAAD are eligible to apply for Lifeline. Since the expansion is not approved, the funds are not necessary.

LANGUAGE (OTHER)**Department of Community Affairs**

Language for Relocation Assistance program has been deleted. This language would have eliminated the requirements of a local match.

Department of Corrections

Language specifying that appropriated funds be used to reimburse counties for inmate incarceration beginning with the eleventh day of inmate incarceration instead of the current sixteenth day is eliminated. This language would be in conflict with an existing statute and is eliminated for that reason. Any amendment to the statute should be considered separately.

Department of Education

The Legislature proposed an either/or funding methodology which is complex and would be administratively burdensome. The veto establishes a simple formula for reimbursement, namely 75 percent of reasonable costs incurred.

Department of Environmental Protection

The amount provided from the Spill Compensation Fund for emergency response activities is reduced from \$2,000,000 to \$1,500,000, an amount sufficient to fully operate this program. The Department of Environmental Protection can continue to utilize federal and other non-State monies designated to support this program. As a result of a contractual agreement between the Department of Environmental Protection and Trump Associates for the lease of Farley Marina, the State is no longer obligated to provide for the maintenance and security of this facility. This reduction

corresponds to a decrease in the appropriation.

The deleted language will maximize the flexibility necessary for historic renovations at Waterloo Village.

Department of Labor

Language which would draw down an additional \$4 million from the Unemployment Insurance Auxiliary Fund is modified to reduce the amount to \$4,409,000. This fund may not have sufficient resources to support an additional \$4 million in fiscal year 1988 due to declining balances.

Department of Human Services

This restricts the usage of expanded low income day care funding to increase wages of day care center employees, meet staff deficiencies, and provide transportation services. Additional funding was included in the budget in order to increase the capacity of the State's day care services. This language is inconsistent with that intent and is vetoed accordingly.

This veto deletes the proposed language expanding eligibility for the PAAD and Lifeline programs. As stated above, any program expansion should be considered in the context of separate legislation.

Department of the Public Advocate

Language which requires reduced expenditures by Rate Counsel if receipts are less than anticipated is deleted. Due to utilities challenging bills and not paying, this language provision must be deleted.

Department of Transportation

Language which provides for a joint study of the use of ground tire as a road construction

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material is deleted, as the appropriation has also been deleted. The information should be obtained from other States. The total authorization of State dollars for the Transportation Trust Fund is reduced by \$135,000,000, from \$458,000,000 to \$323,000,000. This amount reflects the funding level made possible by the appropriations made in this bill and amendments to the Transportation Trust contained in S. 2210 which now awaits action by the Governor.

"GENERAL LANGUAGE"

Section 27 The budget planning documents are internal communications between the Governor and Agency Heads. They do not represent part of the Governor's formal budget submission to the Legislature. The Budget forms provided to the Office of Legislative Services include all the information required under State statute. As always, I stand ready to work with the Legislature to address the needs of our great State.

The Secretary read a communication from the Governor who has absolutely vetoed the following bills, Senate Nos. 1727, 3327, 1909, and 2710 which were then filed.

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EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

August 6, 1987

SENATE BILL NO. 1727 (OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1727 (OCR) without my approval.

This bill would prohibit the storage or disposal of radium-contaminated soil on school grounds or municipal property regularly used by a municipality for public schools, or in any building on such property which is used for instruction of children between the ages of three and eighteen, unless the municipality, by resolution or ordinance, has specifically approved of such storage or disposal.

This bill was apparently introduced in response to the fact that our Department of Environmental Protection was considering Montclair's Nishuane Park as the temporary storage site for the Montclair radon drums. The Department of Environmental Protection later rejected Nishuane Park as an appropriate site, in its professional judgment, based on objective criteria. The Legislature, nonetheless, passed this bill.

Cleaning up New Jersey's environment is one of this Administration's highest and most significant priorities. To accomplish this task, it is imperative that wastes, whether they be hazardous wastes, solid wastes, or low-level wastes, be properly treated, stored, or disposed of somewhere. Just where that somewhere must be is not an easy choice to make, either environmentally or politically. It is of necessity a choice which must be made by professionals based upon the best available scientific data.

I have consistently refused to approve legislation such as this which would mandate that areas falling within a general description may never be considered as potential storage or disposal sites, without any scientific or other evaluation of their appropriateness therefor. This bill, like others of similar intent which I have previously returned to the Legislature unsigned, would subjugate the siting process to parochial interests and political mandates. These bills would take us to a very dangerous place where sound environmental policy is sacrificed to short-sighted political considerations. I cannot, in good conscience, approve legislation which seeks to add still more obstacles to the difficult siting process.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1727 (OCR) without my approval.

SENATE BILL No. 3372 (OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 3372 (OCR) without my approval.

The bill appropriates \$1.2 million from the General Fund to the Department of Labor to maintain an office of the Division of Disability Determinations in Camden, New Jersey.

The Division of Disability Determinations is a unit of the Department of Labor which is funded entirely by appropriations in the federal budget. The Division receives applications for disability benefits from the federal Social Security Administration's local offices throughout New Jersey and then reviews and verifies the information in the application in order to make a recommendation to the Social Security office on whether to grant the disability benefits. It is primarily a mail and telephone operation, and the vast majority of the functions of the Division do not involve face-to-face contact with the disabled population which it serves.

Recent federal cutbacks have resulted in a shortfall of approximately \$1.2 million in the budget for the Division of Disability Determinations for the federal fiscal year ending September 30, 1987. This bill attempts to address that shortfall by appropriating \$1.2 million from the State General Fund to replace the lost federal appropriations.

However, this appropriation will not fully address the problem of reduced federal funding. As early as this fall, an additional \$2 million deficit will appear with the beginning of the new federal fiscal year. At that time, additional steps to either appropriate State monies or cut back on facilities and staff will be necessary. This bill solves nothing. It only postpones the problem until after the November election.

In addition, this bill does not address an even more serious difficulty in the Division of Disability Determinations. For some time, the New Jersey Division has ranked at or near the bottom in a number of performance categories when compared to other states. Closing the Camden office of the Division and combining all operations in Newark will allow the Department of Labor to focus its efforts more effectively on improving the operation of the entire Division. This improvement will benefit New Jersey's disabled community by providing prompt and fair eligibility determinations.

It is true that not all disability determinations can be made on the basis of the documentary file alone. Some personal interviewing is necessary and has been conducted in the past out of the Cam-

den office. The Commissioner of Labor has assured me that this field would will continue as before, and the disabled applicants will not be inconvenienced by the closing of this office.

In short, combining the functions of the Division in the Newark office would be a prudent managerial step at this time even without the reduction in federal funds available. The additional factor of a potential \$3.2 million shortfall over the next 15 months makes the closing of the Camden office an unpleasant necessity.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 3372 (OCR) without my signature.

SENATE BILL No. 1909 (2nd OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1909 (2nd OCR) without my approval.

Senate Bill No. 1909 (2nd OCR) would make numerous amendments to the laws governing the Newark Employees Retirement System (NERS). The amendments this bill would make include increasing the \$16,000 cap on the base salary upon which a member's retirement allowance is calculated to \$30,000, then raising the cap incrementally to \$35,000, and finally, commencing January 1, 1998, setting the cap by ordinance of the governing body of the City of Newark. This legislation would also raise employee contribution rates.

Further, this bill eliminates the requirement that a person be at least age 55 before being allowed to retire on a service retirement, and reduces from 30 to 25 the years of service required to be eligible to retire on a service retirement. This bill would also change the years of service used to determine a retiree's receipt of additional retirement benefits from between 30 to 40 years of service to between 25 to 35 years of service.

Senate Bill No. 1909 (2nd OCR) allows any employee who is at least age 60 and who has completed less than 25 years of service to

retire on a pension equal to an amount derived by multiplying the percentage that the employee's years of service bears to 25 years, times one-half the employee's salary. This legislation would also reduce the vesting period for entitlement to a deferred retirement allowance from 15 to 10 years.

The maximum survivorship benefit which would be paid to surviving spouses and/or dependent children is raised by this legislation from \$3,000 per year to \$5,000 per year, and in the event a retiree dies prior to the date on which his or her pension becomes effective without leaving any survivors, the full amount of the member's contributions would be payable to his or her estate. This bill would also liberalize the provisions for the calculation of both the ordinary disability retirement allowances and the accidental disability retirement allowances.

Under the provisions of Senate Bill No. 1909 (2nd OCR), the actuary appointed by the Pension Commission only has to make an investigation into the conduct and operation of the system every third year rather than every year.

Further, this bill would grant NERS members and certain employees of the University of Medicine and Dentistry (UMDNJ) the option to transfer from the NERS to the State-administered Public Employees Retirement System (PERS). This bill would also close the NERS to new members, so that all new employees of the City of Newark would become members of the PERS.

Finally, Senate Bill No. 1909 (2nd OCR) provides that all employees of the City of Newark, employee members of the NERS, and employees of UMDNJ who are also enrolled in the NERS, may, if otherwise eligible, continue to qualify for the retirement benefits of the NERS system, even though it has been closed to new members.

I commend the sponsor of this bill for introducing legislation that would enhance the retirement benefits of members of the NERS who have worked so very hard over the years. I am very supportive of an increase in benefits to this deserving group.

However, well after this legislation received final approval and reached my desk, the Newark Pension Commission notified this office that they objected to the enactment of this bill without substantial amendment. Specifically, Newark does not want to allow employees of the UMDNJ to transfer to the PERS, as permitted in Section II of this bill. The City has indicated that it requires the continuing contribution of UMDNJ employees to help pay for the benefits of retired members.

The City pension system also urges that the NERS be kept open. The bill currently provides that all new employees of the City must join the PERS. Again, the City needs current contributions to help

fund their system, a pension system that is, by its own admission, operating at an actuarial deficit of approximately \$27.5 million.

The Division of Pensions has urged our veto of this bill. The Division's technical concerns with the bill are numerous but their fundamental problem with this legislation is their belief that the increased benefits, in some instances far more generous than offered by the PERS, will bankrupt an already financially unsound pension system. The Division does not agree with the City's assessment that the amendments in this bill will not further increase the system's deficiency. In fact, the Newark Pension Commission has a study concluding that in addition to the existing deficiency, the amendments in this bill will annually require an additional expenditure of \$3.7 million. The Division of Pensions believes the required annual expenditure would be as much as \$7 million. A total failure of the NERS would mean the future deprivation of retirement benefits for the system's members.

The Division of Pensions does agree that the current level of benefits are unreasonably low and would support an increase in benefit levels that was coupled with a plan to place this retirement system on a sound actuarial basis to protect current and future retirees. To that end, the Division of Pensions is studying all the locally administered retirement systems in the State to determine how best to financially strengthen and more efficiently administer the remaining local systems. While this study is being concluded and recommendations are being formulated, I am instructing the Division to work closely with the Newark Pension Commission to determine whether and how increased benefits can be provided to members in the short-range without causing the eventual collapse of the system.

All concerned agree that Newark's retirement benefits should be increased. However, the major restructuring of the poorly funded and antiquated Newark retirement system contemplated by this legislation requires further study and analysis to ensure that what is meant to be a much-needed boon to the system's members does not turn out to be a catastrophe.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 1909 (2nd OCR) without my approval.

SENATE BILL NO. 2710 (OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 2710 (OCR) without my approval.

This bill supplements Chapter 3 of Title 39 of the Revised Statutes to provide that upon the application of any licensed funeral director, the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles shall issue a permit authorizing the licensee to equip the first and last vehicle in any funeral procession under his direction with a detachable flashing amber light of a type approved by the Director.

I return this bill without my approval because I believe that current law provides the proper method by which an individual or group is granted a permit to equip a vehicle with a flashing amber light.

The Legislature has granted to the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles the power to issue a permit authorizing an individual to equip a vehicle with a flashing amber light. Under current law, when the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles deems a flashing amber light permit necessary for the reasonable and safe movement of traffic he may issue this permit. Pursuant to current regulations, owners of wreckers and service-type vehicles bearing commercial registration and owners of certain snow removal or sanding equipment are considered eligible for flashing amber light permits. However, use of the flashing amber light is restricted to situations where those vehicle operators are removing or towing a disabled vehicle, providing a service to a motor vehicle on a road or highway, or engaging in snow removal or sanding operations. I am advised by the Department of Law and Public Safety that funeral processions do not pose a similar hazard to the public.

I believe that the current law, which grants to the Director of the Division of Motor Vehicles the discretion to issue permits for the display of flashing amber lights, should be maintained and should not be circumvented in the case of funeral directors or any other group. To allow otherwise would lead to a proliferation of flashing amber lights on the roadways, thus minimizing the significance of the flashing amber light.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 2710 (OCR).

SENATE BILL No. 2833 (OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I am returning Senate Bill No. 2833 (OCR) with my objections, for reconsideration.

Senate Bill No. 2388 (OCR) provides that a homeowners' association with a membership in excess of 2,500 freestanding homes, and whose primary purpose is to provide recreational facilities for not less than 6,000 individuals, is deemed to be a public entity providing a governmental function as a recreational district. The bill further provides that the association's employees and property shall be subject to the same liabilities and granted the same immunities as public entities under the New Jersey Tort Claims Act, N.J.S.A. 59:1-1 et seq., as long as the association maintains either a claims fund consisting of not less than \$250,000 plus a line of credit of not less than \$1 million, or an equivalent amount of liability insurance.

I fully recognize and appreciate the intent of the sponsors of this bill to attempt to limit the liability of the Lake Mohawk Country Club, a private community in Sparta Township which provides a number of recreational opportunities to its members but which has been unable to obtain general liability insurance for two years. However, I do not believe that the bill as written will adequately address the problems encountered by the Lake Mohawk community or other associations similarly situated and I am compelled to return this bill to the Legislature.

The most obvious problem with this bill is its extremely limited application. The requirement that it apply only to homeowners' associations with a membership in excess of 2,500 freestanding homes and which provides recreational facilities for at least 6,000 persons means that the bill will, in all likelihood, apply only to the Lake Mohawk community. I am advised that there has already been introduced into the Legislature a bill sponsored by Assemblymen Martin and Lowes which would extend the coverage of the bill to communities comprised of 700 freestanding homes and 2,000 individual members. Such a piecemeal approach to the problem is unfair to other homeowners' associations which might not meet either set of criteria and is unacceptable to me.

More importantly, the concept of declaring an essentially private organization to be a public entity under the New Jersey Tort Claims Act is simply inappropriate. The immunity granted to gov-

ernmental entities by the Tort Claims Act is based upon the duty of a public entity to (1) engage in certain activities for the benefit of the public, (2) to make policy determinations free from the threat of tort liability, and (3) to recognize competing interests in the allocation of resources. Essentially, the Tort Claims Act provides government with the freedom to govern without constant threat of suit.

Inherent in the Tort Claims Act are the notions that government will act responsibly, that government will be held to certain standards, and that government and its elected officials will be held accountable for its actions. This bill would grant the limited immunity available under the Tort Claims Act to this homeowners' association as if it were a public entity even though the association is not accountable to the public for its actions, is not held to the same standards as governmental entities and acts not in the face of competing budgetary demands but rather for the interests of a private group of individuals formed to enjoy collectively its private recreational facilities.

Conferring public entity status on this private association under the Tort Claims Act may also have some unintended consequences. For example, it is possible that rules and regulations of the Country Club could be interpreted to be "laws" of the State if the Club is considered a public entity. If they are so construed, actions by the Club or its employees, which previously would have been considered tortious acts of private parties, could be converted into actions "under color of law: and subject to redress under the federal Civil Rights Act, 42 U.S.C. §1983. At the very least, it is arguable that the Lake Mohawk Country Club would lose its status as private property and be required to permit public access. Numerous other anomalies can be postulated which could arise from the treatment of a private country club as a public entity.

Furthermore, there is serious doubt as to whether this bill will actually achieve its intended effect, that of making liability insurance coverage either more affordable or available. It is well known that municipalities have had severe difficulty in recent years in obtaining adequate liability insurance coverage, even though they have long enjoyed protection under the Tort Claims Act. It is unlikely that the Lake Mohawk Country Club would fare any better than our towns and cities in the insurance market.

However, I do recognize that Lake Mohawk and other homeowners' associations which supervise recreational activities are in a difficult position. I am therefore suggesting that this bill be amended to adopt a more reasonable approach to the problem: legislative authorization to allow this homeowners' association, and others similarly situated, to amend their certificate of incorporation or their bylaws to limit the right of members to sue the association for injuries suffered on the association's property.

The amendment to the certificate of incorporation or bylaws would apply to members and minor children of members, but would not apply to guests of the association, to whom a higher duty of

care is owed. The amendment would not prohibit suits against the association based on injuries which are the result of gross negligence or deliberate acts on the part of the association. To be effective, the amendment to the certificate or to the bylaws must be approved by at least two-thirds of the members of the association who are entitled to vote, and would apply to suits for injuries sustained on or after the effective date of the amendment.

This approach would allow the members of every homeowners' association which provides recreational facilities, not just Lake Mohawk, to decide for themselves whether to limit their own right to sue the association for injuries sustained by the members and their families. The approach is similar to that of Senate Bill No. 2510, approved on February 4, 1987, which allows stockholders of business corporations to limit their own right to sue the corporation in certain situations. I believe this approach will provide more protection to homeowners' associations which sponsor recreational activities than Senate Bill No. 2833 (OCR) in its present form, but will not unfairly limit the rights of third parties who may not be aware of restrictions on the ability to sue the association.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 2833 (OCR) and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Title, Line 2: Delete "chapter 1 of Title 59" and insert "Title 15A".

Page 1, Section 1, Lines 1-14: Delete in entirety and insert new Section 1 as follows:

"1. Any duly incorporated nonprofit homeowners' association, whose purposes include the providing of recreational facilities for its members, may include in its certificate of incorporation or its bylaws a provision that the association shall not be liable in any civil action brought by or on behalf of a member or a minor child of a member for damages as a result of any injury to the member or minor child of the member occurring on the premises of the association, unless the injury is the result of gross negligence or a deliberate act on the part of the association. Amendments to the certificate of incorporation or bylaws adopted in accordance with this act shall apply to actions for injuries sustained on or after the operative date of the amendment. No amendments to the certificate of incorporation or bylaws adopted pursuant to this act shall be effective unless approved by the vote of at least two-thirds of the members of the association entitled to vote thereon."

SENATE BILL NO. 3433

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 3433 without my approval.

This bill would prohibit the storage or disposal of radium-contaminated soil within an area designated by the Department of Environment Protection's Division of Fish, Game and Wildlife as a Wildlife Management Area. Also, any such soil may not be stored or disposed of within a Pinelands Protection Area or Pinelands Preservation Area unless the municipality within which such area lies has specifically approved of the storage or disposal by resolution or ordinance. This bill is clearly intended to exclude still another site from consideration as a potential temporary storage site for the Montclair radon drums.

The problem of where to store or dispose of the Montclair radon drums has been among the most difficult problems this State has faced for some time. Our Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), in seeking to fulfill its statutory mandate, has encountered one obstacle after another which, when coupled with the rather naive belief on the part of many that other states should be expected to deal with our wastes, have succeeded in totally frustrating attempts at a reasonable solution to this problem. Fortunately, some members of our Legislature have reacted responsibly and have argued against attempts to paralyze the sting process. Unfortunately, other legislators have taken the politically expedient route and adopted a currently popular attitude referred to as the "Not In My Backyard" syndrome.

Many months ago, the DEP proposed moving the Montclair radon drums to Vernon Township in order that the soil they contain might be blended with clean soil for later use. Shortly after this proposal was announced, a series of bills were introduced in the Legislature which would preclude consideration of the Vernon site.

Sometime thereafter, the DEP was considering Montclair's Nishuane Park as the temporary storage site for the Montclair drums. While the DEP later rejected Nishuane Park as an inappropriate site, in its professional judgement and based on objective criteria, the Legislature nonetheless passed a bill exempting that site from consideration. I filed an Absolute Veto of this bill on August 3, 1987.

Some weeks ago our Department of Environmental Protection proposed the Colliers Mills Wildlife Management Area in Jackson Township, Ocean County, as a possible temporary storage site for

the Montclair radon drums. Shortly thereafter, this bill, which would preclude consideration of the Colliers Mills site, was introduced and passed by the Legislature.

The pattern that emerges when one considers this legislative response is disheartening to say the very least, particularly when one considers that at the same time that bills such as these are introduced, their proponents are decrying the State's lack of progress with respect to the Montclair radon drums. These bills, which would exempt areas falling within a carefully tailored description from even being considered as a potential storage or disposal site, absent any scientific or other evaluation of their appropriateness therefore, are an unfortunate reflection of legislators responsive to parochial interests and political considerations. As I have said before, sound environmental policy must not be sacrificed to short-site political gains as these bills seek to do.

Siting decisions are difficult decisions, both environmentally and politically, regardless of whether such decisions involve hazardous waste, solid waste, or low-level radioactive waste. Such decisions must be made by professionals based upon the best available scientific data. I would urge that some members of the Legislature follow the lead of their more responsible colleagues and expend their best efforts in assisting these professionals as they seek to educate the public and explain the basis for their decisions.

Finally, I would suggest that these same legislators seek to adopt a more "positive" approach towards the many siting problems we face and will continue to face in the future. In my view, this would be a far more productive expenditure of their time than pursuing the passage of "exclusionary" legislation such as this since I have consistently refused and will continue to refuse to approve such bills. I believe it is time that the Legislature became part of the solution.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 3433 without my approval.

SENATE BILL No. 702 (2nd OCR)

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section 1, Paragraph 14 of the New Jersey Constitution, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 702 (2nd OCR) without my approval.

This bill amends the New Jersey Gross Income Tax Act to provide a specific definition of the term "independent contractor" to extend the class of persons eligible to include life insurance agents. The classifying of life insurance agents as independent contractors will enable these persons to exclude business expenses in the computation of taxable income.

If this bill were enacted, all life insurance agents who met the requirements of the newly defined term, "independent contractor," would be allowed to deduct their business expenses. This deduction would be permitted regardless of the actual nature of the agent's relationship to the company which he or she represent. Some life insurance agents have their office rent and staff paid by their company, and receive pensions, health insurance and other benefits.

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The Division of Taxation advises us that currently the determination of whether a life insurance agent is an employee or an independent contractor is determined by a case-by-case analysis of a number of factors regarding the relationship between the life insurance agent and the company or companies in question. These factors were enumerated by the State Tax Court in *Boudrot v. Taxation Div. Director*, 4 N.J. Tax. 268 (Tax Ct. 1982). These factors are: (1) the relationship that the parties believe they have created, (2) the extend of control exercised by the person receiving the benefit of the services over the manner and method of performance, (3) whether the person rendering the service undertook substantial cost to perform the service, (4) whether the service required special training or skill, (5) the duration of the relationship between the parties, (6) whether the person rendering the service had a risk of loss, (7) whether the person who received the benefit of the services could discharge without cause the person who performed the services, and (8) the method of payment.

It is preferable that the Division of Taxation be allowed to determine on a case-by-case basis whether life insurance agents, or any other type of salesmen, should be classified as employees or independent contractors.

However, I am calling upon the Division of Taxation to promulgate regulations setting forth that the factors enumerated by the New Jersey Tax Court shall be utilized by the Division in assessing the nature of the relationship between the salesperson and the company which he or she represents. Promulgation of this regulation will ensure that the Division of Taxation is acting consistently with the several decisions of the New Jersey Tax Court on this issue.

In enacting the New Jersey Gross Income Tax Act, the Legislature established a broad-based tax with few deductions. Unlike the federal income tax, our State system taxes gross income, not adjusted gross income. Enactment of this bill would signal a major change in our income tax system. Were the numerous individuals who earn their livings as salespersons allowed a wholesale deduction of their business expenses regardless of the actual relationship they held with the company they represented, a drastic reduction of the revenue the State receives from our income tax would result.

Accordingly, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 702 (2nd OCR) without my approval.

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I am returning Senate Committee Substitute for Senate Bill Nos. 1152 and 545 (Assembly Reprint) with my objections, for reconsideration.

This Senate Committee Substitute establishes limits on the expansion of liability in cases involving social hosts who provide alcoholic beverages to their guests. The bill also sets forth the conduct expected of social hosts, and the legal principles that shall be applied in lawsuits involving the provision of alcoholic beverages by social hosts. While I support the efforts of the Legislature to enact legislation addressing these issues, I am compelled to return this bill to the Legislature because I believe certain technical amendments must be made to the bill to achieve the laudable intent of the Legislature.

The legislative history of the Senate Committee Substitute indicates a clear legislative intent to establish an exclusive civil remedy for the negligent provision of alcoholic beverages by a social host serving a guest who has attained the legal age to purchase and consume alcoholic beverages. The legislative history further indicates that this bill is not intended to affect the current law regarding social hosts who serve individuals under the legal age to purchase and consume alcoholic beverages. Despite this intention, apparently due to errors in drafting, the bill has just the opposite effect.

Section 2a. of this bill provides that, except as set forth in the bill, no action at law shall lie against a person not required to have an Alcoholic Beverage Control license, unless the person is a social host who serves a guest who has attained the legal age for purchasing and consuming alcoholic beverages. The remainder of the bill fails to specify any rules which apply when a host serves an underaged individual. Based on this provision of this bill, neither an underaged individual served by a social host nor a person injured by an underaged guest would ever be able to bring an action to recover damages against the social host. I do not believe that this result was intended

by the Legislature. Therefore, I recommend amending Section 2a. of the bill to clarify that this bill is intended to be the exclusive civil remedy for the negligent provision of alcoholic beverages only in cases where a social host provides alcoholic beverages to an individual who has attained the legal age to purchase and consume alcoholic beverages.

I recommend that the definition of "social guest" and the use of the term throughout the bill be eliminated because it is unnecessary and causes confusion throughout the bill. Even though the term social guest is defined as someone who is visibly intoxicated, there are references throughout the bill to "a social guest who is visibly intoxicated." This is both redundant and confusing. Even more confusing is the use of the negative term "a person who is not a social guest" to refer to those who may recover from a social host.

The use of the term "a person who is not a social guest" in Section 2b., combined with Section 3., preclude recovery by a visibly intoxicated guest in all cases, even where the visibly intoxicated guest sustains injury as a result of a motor vehicle accident caused by another visibly intoxicated guest. For example, if a visibly intoxicated guest is seated in the passenger seat of a motor vehicle operated by a sober guest, perhaps a "designated driver," and another guest who is visibly intoxicated drives into the sober guest's vehicle, under the provisions of this bill, only the sober driver would be able to recover from the social host.

I do not believe the Legislature intended to preclude the intoxicated guest from recovery in this instance and, in any event, do not support such a policy decision. Because the injuries caused to both individuals in the above example arise out of another guest's intoxicated passenger from recover, while at the same time permitting the sober driver to recover. I therefore recommend amendments to Section 2B. and 3 of the bill, and recommend eliminating the definition of "social guest" and the use of the term throughout the bill. These amendments will permit all guests, whether they be intoxicated or sober, to recover from social hosts for injuries sustained as a result of the negligent provisions of alcoholic beverages to another guest. Moreover, these amendments will clearly set forth that the social guest will not be able to recover from a social host for injuries suffered as the result of alcoholic beverages provided by the social host to that particular social guest.

I also recommend technical amendments to the definitions of "visibly intoxicated" and "social host." I recommend amending the definition of "visibly intoxicated" to conform this definition to the definition of visibly intoxicated in the "New Jersey Licensed Alcoholic Beverage Server Liability Act." I recommend amending the definition of "social host" to ensure that alcoholic beverage licensees entertaining guests in their homes are afforded the protections contained in this bill.

As one of the stated purposes of this legislation is to clearly set forth the conduct expected of the social host, and the legal principles to be applied in these cases, I believe it is necessary to make technical amendments of Section 2c. As presently drafted, this section does not clearly specify the irrebuttable presumption which shall arise when there is evidence of a blood-alcohol concentration level below .10%. The clarifying amendment which I recommend will more clearly set forth the law which is intended to apply in these cases.

I also recommend amending Section 4, of the bill to provide that the negligent conduct of any party in becoming intoxicated will be considered by the trier of fact. As presently drafted, this section provides that the negligent conduct of the social guest in becoming visibly intoxicated shall be considered by the trier of fact in determining liability. I am not aware of any reason to limit the evidence presented to the trier of fact in these cases to the conduct of a guest in becoming visibly intoxicated. In these lawsuits there are often several persons alleged to have been intoxicated at the time of the accident and the jury should be permitted to consider all of this evidence in determining liability, including evidence indicating intoxication that may not have been visible.

This Senate Committee Substitute also provides the social host with relief from the inequitable application of the law of joint and several liability in these cases. The law of joint and several liability clearly causes unpredictable and inequitable liability in these and all other tort cases. This doctrine provides that when you have more than one culpable defendant, any one of them may be held liable for the full measure of damages, regardless of the degree of their responsibility for injuries suffered. Perhaps the most unfair application of this principle occurs when a truly negligent party escapes paying its share of damages and the State or a municipality, in other words, the taxpayer, pays the damages.

Recently, the Legislature passed, and I signed into law, a bill that provides licensed alcoholic beverages servers and all other individuals brought together through the fortuity of a lawsuit relief from the unfairness of the law of joint and several liability in cases brought under the "New Jersey Licensed Alcoholic Beverage Server Fair Liability act." I support the legislature's recognition of the harshness of this doctrine that requires those sharing little of the blame for injury to pay huge settlements in court judgements. Enactment of this bill reaffirms the principle of individual responsibility for one's own act. However, I believe that all other parties to a suit instituted under the provisions of this bill should also be relieved from the application of this doctrine. In order to prevent the inequitable result that the protection offered to the social host by this bill might unfavorably impact on the liability of another defendant who is minimally responsible for the cause of an accident, I am recommending that the bill be amended to eliminate the law of joint and several liability for all parties brought together in a lawsuit under this bill.

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Finally, now that the Legislature has agreed to relieve licensed purveyors of alcohol, and homeowners who serve alcoholic beverages, from the unfairness of joint and several liability, I call upon the Legislature to enact separate legislation to give the same relief to public entities, and homeowners and businesses not involved in serving alcoholic beverages. I believe that municipalities and private businesses, such as day care centers, are as deserving of this relief as servers of alcoholic beverages.

SENATE BILL No. 1566 (2nd Ocr)*To the Senate:*

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I herewith return the Assembly Reprint for Senate Bill No. 1566 (2nd OCR) without my approval.

The Assembly Reprint for Senate Bill No. 1566 (2nd Ocr) would amend the laws governing the Jersey City Retirement System to permit a liberalization of the retirement and death benefit structures. The bill would provide for an increase in the minimum pension from \$2,500 to \$3,000 per annum. The bill also provides for similar increases in survivorship benefits and alters the order of payment of benefits.

Notwithstanding the salutary intentions of the sponsors of this bill, I cannot support increasing the minimal benefits available under the Jersey City Retirement System, which at present is the most generous retirement system in the State. In February of 1985, I directed the Director of the Division of Pensions to study and develop a model for the consolidation of existing non State administered pension systems. I am particularly interested in having the recommendations of the Director of the Division of Pensions in order to determine how best to financially strengthen and more efficiently administer local retirement systems. I regard it as best for all public employees in the State to see that such systems are placed on a sound actuarial basis which protects current and future retirees. Because I strive for that end, I cannot endorse legislation which takes a piecemeal approach to the benefits authorized for members of the various locally administered retirement systems. It was for similar reasons that I vetoed Senate Bill No. 1909 (2nd OCR) on August 6, 1987.

I think all would agree that members of any publicly administered retirement system in this State should receive, even at a minimum, pensions that are in keeping with the financial times. My disagreement with this bill is merely that it takes in consideration only one retirement system. My preference is to gain the benefit of a Statewide review of this issue in order to develop a cohesive and fair Statewide approach to the issue of pension benefits.

Accordingly, I herewith return the Assembly Reprint for Senate Bill No. 1566 (2nd Ocr) without my approval.

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V. Section I, Paragraph 14 of New Jersey Constitution, I am returning Senate Bill No. 2908 with my objections, for reconsideration.

This bill would eliminate the requirement of annual criminal history record checks based upon fingerprint identification for school bus drivers. These annual fingerprint record checks conducted pursuant to current education law are intended to uncover any type of criminal conviction which would render an individual undesirable as a school bus driver. Instead, this bill would require a school bus driver to undergo a criminal history background check only upon initial employment and, importantly, the check would only be for the specific types of sexual offenses enumerated in P. L. 1986, c. 116 (c. 18A:6-7.1 et seq.) As a further check upon the qualifications of a school bus driver, the bill reinforces that school bus drivers are subject to N.J. S. 39:3-10.1, a motor vehicles statute which requires every holder of a special driver's license to furnish to the Director of Motor Vehicles satisfactory evidence of continuing physical fitness, good character and experience once every 24 months after issuance of the special license. A special license is required of every operator of a motor vehicle having the capacity of holding more than six passengers.

I have two chief concerns with this bill. First, the criminal record check conducted pursuant to P. L. 1986, c. 116 is not an adequate substitute for the more thorough criminal record search required by N.J.S.18A:39-17,18, and 19, the education statutes which this bill would repeal. These statutes require a search for any criminal conviction of an offense which would make an individual undesirable for employment as a school bus driver. On the other hand, P. L. 1986, c. 116 authorizes a criminal record search only for the very specific sexual type offenses specified. Thus, for example, P. L. 1986, c. 116 would not allow the State to search for a criminal conviction for kidnapping in a prospective bus driver's past. Clearly, kidnapping is a serious and not wholly improbable concern for the employer of a school bus driver.

School bus drivers are unlike other school employees. School children are entrusted to their sole care for significant periods of time and in locations which may be miles away from the home or

school. The absence of the community presence of the schoolhouse environment makes the school bus driver's job unique. This special job characteristic necessitates special provisions to insure the students' safety. A check for sexual type offenses alone is not enough.

My second concern with this bill lies with its failure to adequately address the need for follow-up criminal record checks. At present, education law requires an annual criminal history record search. This bill fails to provide any adequate replacement for this protection for our school children. I am simply not convinced that N.J.S. 39:3-10.1 provides sufficient reassurance that a thorough and comprehensive criminal record search is conducted by the Division of Motor Vehicles for the many drivers that fall within the category of "special license" drivers. I am reluctant to rely upon N.J.S. 19:3-10.1 to protect our school children.

Because P. L. 1986, c. 116 is not an adequate substitute for N.J.S. 18A:39-17, 18 and 19 and because this bill fails to provide for an adequate continuing check upon the fitness of school bus drivers, I cannot agree to a repeal of N.J.S. 18A:39-17, 18 and 19 at this time. I do agree, however, that the requirement of an annual fingerprint based criminal history record check is burdensome for the drivers, contractors and school districts. Accordingly, I am recommending that the provisions of N.J.S. 18A:39-17, 18 and 19 apply to regularly employed school bus drivers on a biennial basis. These statutes should also apply to newly hired school bus drivers upon initial employment.

I am concerned that there are three sets of statutes all purporting to address the issue of the fitness of school bus drivers, namely P.L. 1986, c. 116N. J.S. 39:3-10.1 and N.J.S. 18A:39-17, 18, 19 and 20. This entire area deserves study to avoid duplication between the statutes and a duplication of effort between the Division of Motor Vehicles and the Department of Education. I am convinced that this area has not received the careful attention which it deserves.

Accordingly, I direct the Commissioner of Education and the Attorney General to consult with each other and prepare a comprehensive proposal that avoids duplication of effort between the two agencies and provides for initial and recurring checks on a school bus driver's fitness which are sufficiently broad enough to handle the special potential problems associated with unsuitable school bus drivers. In addressing this issue, the proposal should also concern itself with the related issue of character checks for all categories of "special license" drivers, such as summer camp bus drivers and charter bus drivers which transport our senior citizens. In my view, the State should be as concerned with these other categories of vulnerable passengers as with the transportation of school children, although the solution may not be the same for all.

Therefore, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 2908 and recommend that it be amended as follows:

Page 1, Title, Lines 1-3: Delete "N.J.S. 18A:39-20 and repealing N.J.S. 18A:39-17, N.J.S. 18A:39-18 and N.J.S. 18A:39-19" insert "N. J.S. 18A:39-17, N.J S. 18A:39-18 and N.J.S. 18A:39-19"

Page 1, Section 1, Lines 1-7: Omit in entirety.

Page 1, Section 2, Lines 1-2: Omit in entirety.

Page 1, Section 2, After Line 2: Insert new sections as follows:

"1. N.J.S.18A:39-17 is amended to read as follows:

a. In each school year, prior to the assignment of any newly hired driver or substitute driver to any vehicle operated by the board of education of any district as a school bus, there shall be filed by the secretary of such board with the county superintendent the name, address, photograph and fingerprints of each such driver or substitute driver.

b. The filing required by subsection a. of this section shall be made on a biennial basis thereafter for any regularly employed driver or substitute driver of any vehicle operated by the board of education of any district as a school bus.

2. N. J. S. 18A:39-18 is amended to read as follows:

a. In each school year, prior to the beginning of transportation of school pupils under a contract awarded by a board of education, the contractor shall furnish to the county superintendent, the name, address, photograph and fingerprints of each newly hired driver or substitute driver to be assigned to any vehicle in the performance of his contract, except any such driver or substitute driver whose fingerprints shall have been filed by the contractor with the federal bureau of investigation. If, during the school year, the assignment of additional drivers or substitute drivers is to be made, the same information as to such drivers or substitute drivers, except any such drivers or substitute drivers whose fingerprints shall have been filed by the contractor with the federal bureau of investigation, shall immediately be furnished to county superintendent.

b. The filing required by subsection a. of this section shall be made on a biennial basis thereafter for any regularly employed driver or substitute driver assigned to any vehicle in the performance of the contractor's obligation to provide pupil transportation under a contract awarded by a board of education.

3. N.J.S. 18A:39-19 is amended to read as follows:

Such names, addresses, photographs and fingerprints (may) shall be forwarded by the county superintendent to the state bureau of identification with a request for a report on each individual concerned. If it appears from such report that any such individual has been convicted of a crime and the offense is of such character as to make it undesirable that he should act as a driver of a school bus, he shall be disqualified by the county superintendent. If the record

is of an offense not of such character necessarily to require disqualification, the county superintendent shall notify the board of education, which board shall cause an investigation of his character to be made through the local police or otherwise before his employment as a driver is approved."

SENATE BILL No. 3090

To the Senate:

Pursuant to Article V, Section I, Paragraph 14 of the Constitution, I am returning Senate Bill No. 3090 with my objections for reconsideration.

The Automobile Excess Profits Law was enacted in 1983 and was intended to provide a safeguard against the possibility that an auto insurer would reap unreasonably high profits. The Law requires any auto insurer to refund to its policyholders premiums received in excess of an amount 5% higher than the profit margin established in previous rate fillings.

In practice, the law requires an annual calculation of "actuarial gain or loss", as defined in the statute, by all automobile insurers writing at least 0.5% of the New Jersey private passenger automobile market. The filing containing this calculation, along with specified supporting information, is due by July 1 every year beginning with 1986.

The July 1 filing contains information on annual premiums, losses and expenses for each of the three previous years. By combining three years worth of experience, the effect of year-to-year fluctuations in the data is minimized. Information in the July filing is used to determine whether excess profits exist under N.J.S.A. 17:29A-5.3. However, information on investment income results is not included in the July filing and is not considered in comparing actual operating results to filed rates in order to determine whether excess profits have been generated.

Instead, any company reporting an "actuarial gain" in the July filing is required to make a second, more detailed filing which includes specific information on investment income or loss. This second filing is due no later than April 15 of the year following the July filing. A summary of the information from both the July and April filings is required to be included in the Commissioner's Annual Report. No other specific use for the investment income results in the April filing is set out in the existing law.

Senate Bill No. 3090 simply amends N.J.S.A. 17:29A-5.2(a) to require that profit and contingency factors, which are used in the rate setting process, be "determined with due recognition to investment income from funds generated by New Jersey business." Since the profit and contingency factors used in rate filings already recognize anticipated investment income on New Jersey business, the bill simply incorporates in the law what is now the existing practice. The bill therefore makes no change in existing practice either in the calculation of profit and contingency factors used in rate filings, or in the reporting of information or calculation of results under the Excess Profits Law.

It is likely that the sponsors of the bill intend that actual investment results, along with underwriting results, should be used in calculating excess profits. However, that calculation is specified in N.J.S.A. 17:29A-5.3. This bill only amends the "actuarial gain or loss" reporting provisions of N.J.S.A. 17:29A-5.2(a); it has no effect on either the "investment income" reporting provisions of N.J.S.A. 17:29A-5.2(b) or the excess profit calculation of N.J.S.A. 17:29A-5.3.

In fact, revisions to the law which would require that actual investment income be explicitly considered in calculating excess profits are rather complex and detailed, but are essential to create an Excess Profits Law which will assure that a complete and accurate assessment of profits and losses is presented by insurers. I am therefore recommending a number of changes in Senate Bill No. 3090 which will more effectively address the sponsors' goal of requiring explicit consideration of investment income in the excess profits calculation. I am also recommending some procedural revisions which will clarify aspects of the existing law and make it easier to administer. To accomplish this, it is necessary to repeal the existing Excess Profits Law and substitute a new version. The major changes are discussed below.

First, and most importantly, the proposed changes add the difference, positive or negative, between actual investment income results and anticipated investment income (from the previously-approved rate filing) to underwriting income in determining whether excess profits have been received by the insurer. This will produce a more accurate representation of profits. If the actual results (both from underwriting and investment) exceed anticipated results by more than a certain percentage (5% of premium under current law), the excess must be returned to policyholders.

An adjustment should be made to recognize the statistical fluctuations inherent in filings made by smaller insurance companies. Under current law, the same 5% margin of operating results over filed rates is used for all insurers, large or small.

Due to the phenomenon described by mathematicians as the "law of large numbers," the experience of companies insuring many cars tends to be more stable than that of companies insuring few. This is intuitively apparent when one considers the relative impact of a single claim on the experience of a company insuring 10 cars versus a company insuring 10,000 cars. Although in the long run a small company's ratio of losses to premium might be the same as that of a large company, the small company would tend to show an excess profit more frequently. This would hold in varying degrees according to the sizes of the companies, even if the smaller company's long-run experience was somewhat worse.

Since it is not intended that large companies should, in the long run, return proportionately less to policyholders than small companies for equal experience, some procedure should be established to take this phenomenon into account.

The proposed revisions establish a sliding scale for determining excess profit, based on the relative size of an auto insurance company's New Jersey business. The relative size of a company's business, or market share, will be measured as a percentage of the total voluntary market automobile insurance premiums received by that company. The smallest companies (writing less than 0.25% of the premium in the voluntary market) would be permitted to retain unanticipated profit equal to as much as 10% of premium, instead of the current 5% before an excess profit is declared.

Companies with a market share greater than or equal to 0.25% but less than 0.50% could keep as much as an amount equal to 7.5% of premium.

The current 5% standard would remain for companies writing 0.5% of the market or more, but less than 1%.

The largest companies, writing 1% or more of the market each, would face a stricter excess profit standard than under current law. Those companies could keep unanticipated profit equal to only 2.5% of premium. Any excess must be returned to policyholders.

Since this change addresses the statistical fluctuations inherent in a small company's body of experience, the limitation in the current law that excess profits reports must be filed only by companies writing more than 0.5% of the New Jersey market has been removed. Under the revised law, all companies must file and be subject to excess profits refunds.

Another significant change recommended for reconsideration concerns the treatment of losses and loss adjustment expenses. Un-

der current law, insurers annually file an estimate of what the final settlement value of losses will be, evaluated as of the year of the filing. Because some types of claims (particularly liability claims) can take up to seven years or more to settle, the "ultimate" loss cost for a given policy year cannot be known with any significant degree of accuracy for nearly seven years. However, the current law requires the filing of updated loss estimates for only the previous three years. If those estimates are later changed as more claims are resolved, the revised information is not considered in evaluating profits.

The proposed revisions require the reporting of updated loss information for each of the seven years preceding the date of filing. In addition, changes to the loss estimates for the first four years of the seven year period will be accounted for by use of an annual "development adjustment." In this way, overstatement of anticipated losses by insurers will not enable them to avoid excess profits liability.

In addition to these substantive changes, a number of procedural and administrative revisions are recommended.

The law currently provides for submission of two reports, one on July 1 that sets forth actuarial and financial information and includes market share and excess profits information, and one on the following April 15 which sets forth additional financial information and actual investment income information. The recommended changes would combine all of this information into one filing to be made annually on July 1. This change is necessary in order to include information on actual investment income in the calculation of excess profits.

Another change would require companies to give the Insurance Department certain financial data, such as premiums written and premiums earned, for only the year preceding the filing, rather than for three years. Information affected by this revision does not change from year to year once it is reported for a given year. The Department already has data from previous years on file and can use previously-filed data for its three-year review. Requiring the filing of the same information every year for three consecutive years, as under current law, is wasteful and burdensome. As noted above, however, data which is subject to variation, such as estimated losses, must be updated every year for the previous seven years.

Furthermore, the Excess Profits Law should provide a straightforward, uniform bookkeeping procedure to account for the transfer of funds to and from insurers by the New Jersey Automobile Insurance Risk Exchange. Such transactions are not expressly addressed by the current law. The recommended changes require payments made to and received from the Exchange to be separately identified and reported. Payments made by insurers will be treated as expenses, and receipts will be treated as adjustments reducing the amount of losses.

In addition, insurers will no longer be able to shield profits by filing a combined report for all members of a holding company system. Every insurer will be required to report its profits and losses independently, and losses in one subsidiary will not be permitted to offset profits in another subsidiary.

Lastly, for ease of review, the recommended amendments will combine data for similar lines of coverage in order to reduce the reporting categories from six to four. Bodily Injury Liability and Personal Injury Protection coverages will continue to be reported separately. Property damage liability and uninsured/underinsured motorist coverages will be combined into "Other Liability." Comprehensive and collision coverages will be reported jointly as "Physical Damage." This change will ease the compilation and reporting burdens on insurers as well as on the Department.

Therefore, I herewith return Senate Bill No. 3090 and recommend that it be amended as follows:

"AN ACT concerning financial disclosure and excess profits by automobile insurers, amending P.L. 1944, c. 27 (C.17:29A-1 et seq.) and repealing P.L. 1983, c. 357 (C. 17:29A-5.1 through 17:29A-5.5)."

Page 1-3, Section 1, Lines 1-72: Delete in entirety and insert new sections as follows:

"1. As used in this act:

a. "Actual investment income" means that portion income generated by investment of policyholder-supplied funds.

b. "Actuarial gain" means the remainder obtained by subtracting the allowance for profit and contingencies from underwriting income.

c. "AIRE charges" and "AIRE compensation" mean amounts paid to or received from the Automobile Insurance Risk Exchange pursuant to Section 16 of P.L. 1983, c. 362 (C.39:6A-22).

d. "Anticipated investment income" means that the amount obtained by multiplying earned premium by the percentage of premium representing investment income and used in the insurer's rate filings to calculate the allowance for profit and contingencies.

e. "Calendar-accident year" means the period from January 1 to December 31, during which, in the appropriate context:

(1) premium or investment income was earned;

(2) expenses were incurred; or

(3) accidents occurred which resulted in losses, loss adjustment expenses or AIRE compensation.

f. "Car year" means the unit of exposure equivalent to the insuring of one automobile for twelve months, two automobiles for six months each, etc.

g. "Commissioner" means the Commissioner of Insurance.

h. "Development adjustment", for a given calendar-accident year, means the difference obtained by subtracting:

(1) the sum of

(a) losses and loss adjustment expenses

for that calendar-accident year,

developed to an ultimate basis and

evaluated as of March 31 of the year

preceding the year in which the Profits

Report required by section 2 of this

act is due; plus

(b) AIRE compensation for that calendar-

accident year, developed to an

ultimate basis and evaluated as of

March 31 of the year in which the

Profits Report is due.

from

(2) The sum of

(a) losses and loss adjustment expenses

for that calendar-accident year,

developed to an ultimate basis and

evaluated as of March 31 of the year

in which the Profits Report is due,

plus

(b) AIRE compensation for that calendar-

accident year, developed to an ultimate

basis and evaluated as of March 31 of

the year preceding the year the year in

which the Profits Report is due;

i. "Excess investment income" means the remainder obtained by subtracting the anticipated investment income from the actual investment income earned by the insurer.

j. "Insurer" means an entity authorized or admitted to transact private passenger automobile insurance business in New Jersey, but does not include the New Jersey Automobile Full Insurance Un-

derwriting Association created pursuant to P.L. 1983, c. 65 (C. 17:30E-1 et seq.).

k. "Market share" means the proportion that an insurer's written premium for New Jersey private passenger automobile insurance business in the voluntary market during the three calendar years immediately preceding the date the Profits Report required by section 2 of this act is due bears to the total written premiums of all insurers in that market during those three calendar years.

l. "Private passenger automobile insurance business" means direct insurance on private passenger automobiles as defined in Section 2 of P.L. 1972, c. 70 (C. 39:6A-2), excluding personal excess liability insurance and insurance on commercial vehicles.

m. "Total actuarial gain" means the sum of the actuarial gains for the three calendar-accident years immediately preceding the due date of the Profits Report required by section 2 of this act, less the development adjustments for the calendar-accident year immediately preceding the due date of the Profits Report and ending with the fourth calendar-accident year immediately preceding the due date of the Profits Report.

n. "Underwriting income" means the remainder obtained by subtracting the sum of losses developed to an ultimate basis, loss adjustment expenses developed to an ultimate basis, and other expenses exclusive of UCJF assessments, from the sum of premiums earned and AIRE compensation developed to an ultimate basis.

o. "UCJF assessments" means amounts paid by insurers to the Unsatisfied Claim and Judgment Fund pursuant to Section 3 of P.L. 1952, c. 174 (C.39:6-63).

p. "UCJF reimbursements" mean amounts received by an insurer from the Unsatisfied Claim and Judgment Fund as a result of excess medical expense benefit payments by the insurer pursuant to Section 2 of P.L. 1977, c. 310 (C.39:6-73.1).

2. a. Each insurer, except those exempt from filing pursuant to section 4 of this act, shall annually file with the commissioner, on or before July 1 of each year, a Profits Report containing the information and calculations required by this section. The information shall be provided with respect to the insurer's New Jersey private passenger automobile insurance business separately for each of the following coverages and for all such coverages combined:

(1) Personal Injury Protection, including all options;

(2) Bodily Injury Liability, reported at total limits;

(3) Other Liability, consisting of property damage liability and uninsured and underinsured motorist coverages, all reported at total limits;

(4) Physical Damage, consisting of comprehensive and collision coverages, including all deductibles.

A separate Profits Report shall be filed for each insurer in an insurance holding company system. Data and information in a Profits Report shall not be combined for more than one insurer.

b. The Profits Report shall contain the following information for each of the seven most recent calendar-accident years, with an evaluation date as of March 31 of the year in which the Profits Report is due:

- (1) Losses paid;
- (2) Losses developed to an ultimate basis;
- (3) Loss adjustment expenses paid;
- (4) Loss adjustment expenses developed to an ultimate basis;
- (5) AIRE compensation received;
- (6) AIRE compensation developed to an ultimate basis;

c. The Profits Report shall contain the following information for the calendar-accident year ending December 31 immediately preceding the date the Profits Report is due:

- (1) Premiums written;
- (2) Premiums earned;
- (3) Other expenses, itemized separately as follows:
 - (i) Commissions and brokerage fees;
 - (ii) Taxes, licenses and fees;
 - (iii) AIRE charges;
 - (iv) UCJF assessment;
 - (v) Other acquisition costs and general expenses;
 - (vi) Policyholder dividends, including any excess profits refunded or credited to policyholders;
- (4) Allowance for profit and contingencies calculated by multiplying the premiums earned by the profit and contingency factors authorized for use with the insurer's approved rate filings.
- (5) Anticipated investment income;
- (6) Actual investment income; and
- (7) UCJF reimbursements received.

d. The Profits Report shall include a clear and explicit calculation of each of the following items:

- (1) Underwriting income for each of the three calendar-accident years immediately pre-
ceding the date of the Profits Report;
- (2) Actuarial gain for each of the three
calendar-accident years immediately pre-
ceding the date of the Profits Report;
- (3) Excess investment income for each of the
three calendar-accident years immediately
preceding the date of the Profits Report;
- (4) Development adjustment for each of the four
calendar-accident years specified in sub-
section m. of section 1 of this act;
- (5) Total actuarial gain;
- (6) Excess profits; and
- (7) Market share expressed as a percentage.

3. Excess profits shall exist if for the three calendar-accident years immediately preceding the date the Profits Report is due, the sum of an insurer's total actuarial gain and excess investment income for all private passenger automobile coverages combined exceeds the following percentages of earned premiums;

- (1) For insurers having a market share of
1% or more 2.5%
- (2) For insurers having a market share
greater than or equal to 0.50% but
less than 1.00% 5.0%
- (3) For insurers having a market share
greater than or equal to 0.25% but
less than 0.50% 7.5%
- (4) For insurers having a market share
less than 0.25% 10%

4. An insurer having fewer than 150 car years of exposure in New Jersey during the three calendar-accident years immediately preceding the date the Profits Report is due shall file a certification to that effect, in lieu of all other requirements of this act.

5. If the commissioner finds that an insurer has excess profits, the insurer shall establish, subject to the approval of the commis-

sioner, a fair, practicable, and nondiscriminatory plan for the refund or credit to policyholders of the excess profits.

6. An insurer shall file the Profits Report, including all incidental calculations, in the formats and media to be prescribed by the commissioner.

7. If, after examination thereof, the commissioner finds that any information or calculation contained in a Profits Report filed by an insurer contains, results in or is based upon aberrant, unusual or irregular data, utilization of data, judgments or assumptions, the commissioner shall issue an order to the insurer, directing that such information or calculation be altered in a manner necessary to eliminate the effect of such aberrant, unusual or irregular data, utilization of data, judgments, or assumptions.

8. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this act, the commissioner may require the submission of any other data and information he deems relevant or appropriate for evaluating the profits of an insurer.

9. The commissioner shall promulgate regulations that he deems necessary to implement the provisions of this act.

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CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW JERSEY

ARTICLE IV. JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 1. The Supreme Court, the Appellate Division, the Superior Court, the County Courts, and the Justices of the Peace, shall be the judicial department of the State.

SECTION 2. The Supreme Court shall be composed of the Chief Justice and six Justices, who shall hold office for the term of years provided by law.

SECTION 3. The Appellate Division shall be composed of five Justices, who shall hold office for the term of years provided by law.

SECTION 4. The Superior Court shall be composed of one Justice in each county, who shall hold office for the term of years provided by law.

SECTION 5. The County Courts shall be composed of one Justice in each county, who shall hold office for the term of years provided by law.

SECTION 6. The Justices of the Peace shall be elected by the people in each township, and shall hold office for the term of years provided by law.

SECTION 7. The Justices of the Peace shall have such powers and duties as may be provided by law.

SECTION 8. The Justices of the Peace shall be subject to removal by the Supreme Court.

SECTION 9. The Justices of the Peace shall be subject to discipline by the Supreme Court.
