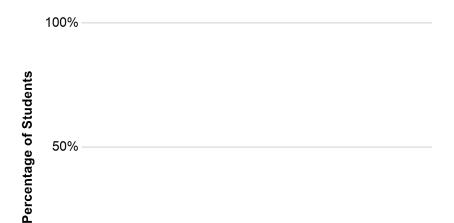
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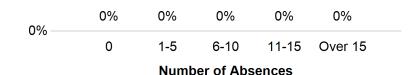

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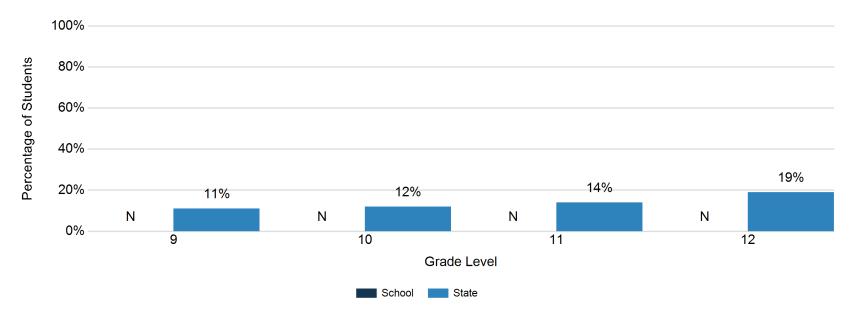

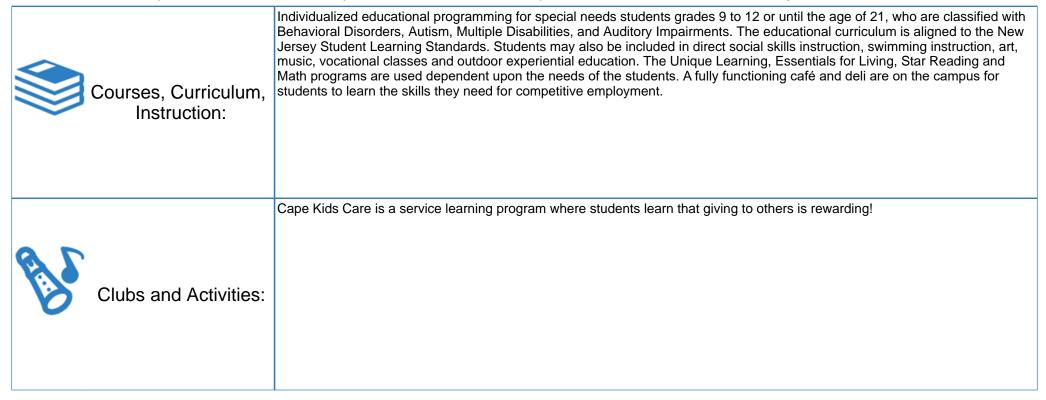
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Postsecondary Information:

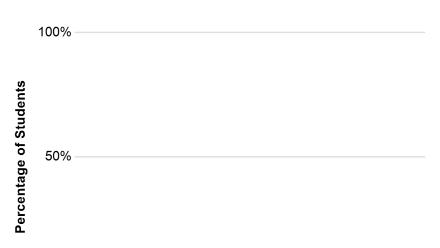

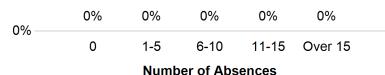

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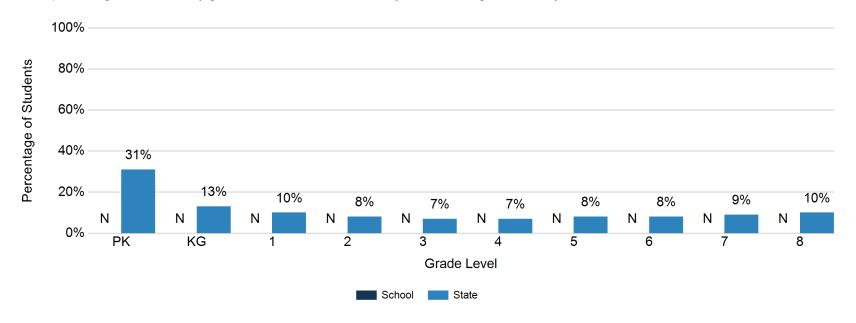

Students may also be included in direct social skills instruction, swimming instruction, art, music, vocational classes and outdoor experiential education. The Unique Learning, Essentials for Living, Fountas and Pinnell, Orton Gillingham, Star Reading and Math programs are used dependent upon the needs of the students. A fully functioning café and deli are on the campus for students for pre-vocational skill development.



4 H Club open for all students in grades K-8. Cape Kids Care is a service learning program where students learn that giving to others is rewarding! Various school wide events are held to promote awareness, recognition of accomplishments, informational, celebrations and socialization.



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Student Health and Wellness:

There is a full time nurse assigned to each school in our district for medical support. In addition, Ocean Academy offers an individualized breakfast and lunch program to support student dietary needs, counseling, and direct social skills support. Calming and sensory rooms assist our students with Autism and Behavioral Disabilities to self-regulate behaviors. A Substance Awareness Coordinator is also available to our students.

Ocean Academy has an array of technological tools available to our students including internet accessible computers, Chromebooks, Smart Boards, augmentative communication devices, assistive technology devices and educational software. These tools enable our students to experience success while accessing the curriculum. Methods and strategies are developed by each teacher in consultation with a district case manager and BCBA in order to most effectively meet each student's needs in a particular discipline. Music and art are incorporated into the elementary curriculum of all programs. Teaching tolerance has been successful through theme based, grant supported activities in the arts.
