

John Cooper, Esquire, made and subscribed the Assirmation required by Law, before the said Jonathan Deare, Esquire, and took his Seat in Council.

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Jonathan Deare, Esquire, took and subscribed the Oaths required by Law, before Robert Morris, Esquire, one of the Members of this House, and took his Seat in Council.

The House adjourned till Three o'Clock in the Afternoon.

That Mr. Condie, Mr. Ogden and Mr. Jenkins, or any two of them, be a Committee for the present Session, to join a Committee of the House of Assembly on such publick Accounts as may be referred to them during the Sitting of the Legislature; that the said Committees settle and report all Accounts for the Payment of which, when settled, Provision is already made by Law; and that they deliver all others to the Committee of the House of Assembly, appointed to bring in a Bill for defraying incidental Charges.

Resolved,

That notwithstanding this Committee view with Concern the unequal Terms of the Articles of Consederation between the several States; and notwithstanding the Objections lately stated and sent to Congress on the Part of this State, are founded in Justice and Equity, and feveral of them of the most essential Moment to the Interest thereof; yet maturely confidering the urgent Necessity of acceding to the Confederacy; that every separate and detached State Interest ought to be postponed to the publick Good, and firmly relying that the Candour and Justice of the several States will, in due Time, remove the Inequality which now fubfifts;

To the UNITED STATES in CONGRESS ASSEMBLED.

The Representation of the LEGISLATIVE-COUNCIL and GENERAL ASSEMBLY of the State of New-Jersey,

Sheweth,

THAT we are fully convinced the Circumstances of the Times render a further Provision for the Subsistence and Comfort of the Army of the United States indispensably necessary, but are of Opinion the Mode adopting to essentially this Purpose is very improper, and will be productive of injurious Consequences: The several States are each forming a separate Plan of supplying to their own Troops such Necessaries as they think most adviseable, nearly at Prices current when the Army was established, and stipulating in their Favour such other Privileges and Advantages as may in a considerable Degree make good the Contract under which they entered the Service at the Commencement of the War. These Regulations, various, unequally advantageous, and formed upon different Principles, must, in their Practice and Operation, produce Discontents, Murmurings, and perhaps still worse Essects—Resignations among the Officers, and Desertions among the Men.

Further, while each State thus supports a System of its own, the whole Expence is greatly and unnecessarily increased; for although it be paid by the State separately, and not out of the Continental Treasury, it is still a general Expence, and the Wages which each State must pay on purchasing for, and issuing to, their respective Troops, would be Double or Treble their Proportion of the Sum which would procure the Whole purchased and issued to the Army at large. If a Provision were made by Congress, we would also suggest the exceeding Difficulty under which this State must labour in carrying their Part of this divided Mode of Supply into Execution. The Means of Importation are not in our Power, and Purchases on the Continent must be made at a Distance, and under every other Disadvantage. To the Congress these Things would be more practicable in many Cases, only a great Quantity of the same Articles would be necessary, and they might be procured in the same Line in which the Army is now supplied. Every Expence which may be necessary for the Comfort and Supply of those who devote themselves to the publick Service, we are chearfully willing, to the utmost of our Proportion, to defray; but mean not to recommend or even approve in the slightest Degree any Kind of Establishment, or particular Emolument for Life. These, to say Nothing more, were no Part of the original Contract: They cannot be demanded or loped for on any equitable Principles.

By a Refolution of Congress of the 15th of March last, all Officers, Non-commissioned Officers and Soldiers, now belonging to the Corps of Light-Dragoons and Artillery, and Infantry, and the Corps of Artillery Artificers already commissioned and enlisted, not being Part of the Eighty-eight Battalions, are to be considered as Parts of the Quotas of the several States to which they belonged, or may belong when commissioned or enlisted, and credited accordingly: Part of two Regiments of Horse, one now in the Eastern States, the other in Pennsylvania; two Companies of Artillery at separate Parts; Part of two of the Sixteen Additional Regiments now on different Stations, besides Artillery Artificers now employed at different Places, were commissioned or enlisted from this State. If we are credited with these, it will by them be expected that we provide for them; if it is not done, the Officers will resign, and the Privates defert; and to do it, seems absolutely impracticable upon any particular State System; and even supposing it possible, the Transportation and Wages which must be given for procuring it, done at so many different Parts, would be out of all usual Proportion to the Value of the Articles supplied. For the above Reasons, with many others, with which we think it unnecessary to detain Congress, we carnessly entreat that they would adopt a Mode of making such further Provision for the Army as they may think just and adequate; a Mode which by comprehending the Whole, will remove all Danger of partial Distinction, which will be less difficult and less expensive than the Mode excepted against, and which will produce that Satisfaction without which the

Service can never be generally agreeable to those engaged in it, or fully beneficial to the Nation.

The Memorial of William Alexander, Earl of Stirling, fetting forth, that feveral Parts of his Real Estate were, at the Commencement of the War, mortgaged for Debts due to Persons who have since joined the Enemy; that several other Parts were, and still are mortgaged to Persons residing in this State, and the State of New-York; and praying that the Legislature of this State will give him Leave to bring in a Bill for vesting the Whole of his Real Estate, in New-Jersey, in two or more Trustees, and enabling them to sell the fame, or a sufficient Part thereof for the Discharge of his Debts, &c. which was read, and ordered a fecond Reading.

A Petition and Remonstrance of fundry Officers of the first Regiment of the New-Fersey Brigade, was read, and referred to the Committee of both Houses in Conference.

To the UNITED STATES in CONGRESS ASSEMBLED:

The Representation and Petition of the LEGISLATIVE-COUNCIL and GENERAL ASSEMBLY of the State of New-Jersey,

Sherveth,

THAT, by a Resolution of Congress of the 9th of March last, the Infantry of the United States is directed to be composed for the ensuing Campaign, of Eighty Battalions.— That the feveral States are therein required to make up and compleat their respective Battalions to their full Complement by Draughts, or in such other Manner as they may think proper; and that they have their Quotas of Deficiencies ready to take the Field, and to march to fuch Place as the Commander in Chief shall direct without Delay.

That, by a Refolution passed in the Month of December, 1777, it is recommended to the several States to supply the Officers of their respective Troops with sundry Articles of

Clothing at certain Rates.

That the Legislature of this State are taking the necessary Measures to comply with the Requisition above-mentioned; and have already in Part furnished Clothing to the Officers of the Regiments belonging to the Brigade of the State, as recommended; but that they find themselves greatly at a Loss from any Communications made to them by Congress, to ascertain precisely what is intended by their Quota of Troops in the Service of the United States.

For that, by a Resolution of Congress respecting the Legion raised by the Count Polaski, fuch Recruits as have been or may be enlifted in the same in this State, are to be credited to the Quota thereof; and by another Resolution of the 15th of March last, all Officers and Soldiers now belonging to the Corps of Light-Dragoons and Artillery and Infantry, and the Corps of Artillery Artificers, not being Part of the Eighty-eight (now Eighty) Battalions apportioned to this State, be confidered as Part of the Quotas of the several States to which they belonged, when commissioned or enlisted.

It is therefore the Defire and Petition, that Congress will order the necessary Information in what Manner the Credit above-mentioned is to be made: Whether they are to look upon the Parts of the Corps mentioned in the above Refolutions, which have been raised in this State, or any particular Kind of them, as to be reckoned in compleating their three Regiments of Infantry to the Establishment of May, 27th, 1778; and also, that the Returns directed by the Resolution of the 15th of March last, none of which,

To the UNITED STATES in CONGRESS ASSEMBLED.

The REPRESENTATION of the LEGISLATIVE-COUNCIL and GENERAL ASSEMBLY of the State of New-Jersey, on Behalf of the faid State, Sheweth,

HAT amidst the promising Prospects of an happy Issue of the present War, and of the Establishment of the glorious Freedom and Independence of these United States, we feel the most painful Anxieties from the State of the Continental Finances, which

threatens not only Embarrassinent, but Ruin to the publick Measures.

In a Crisis so alarming, it becomes Freemen not to consume their Time in unavailing Murmurings and Complaints, but to interest themselves in devising Means to remedy the Grievance, and, if possible, avert the impending Mischies. We do not mean to detain Congress upon the Causes to which the great and growing Depreciation of our Paper Currency is to be ascribed, but to express our Sense of the Necessity of immediately adopting Measures to check the increasing Evil, and for restoring and rendering permanent the publick Credit.

If we calculate for a Year to come from the Events of a few Months past, the Increase of Prices and publick Debts must appear truly alarming; the latter perhaps will exceed the Reach of common Computation, and the former rise to the utter Destruction of our Paper Currency. The Money ceasing to circulate, and perishing in the Hands of the unfortunate Possessor, all Business must necessarily stagnate for Want of a circulating Medium, and the inevitable Ruin of Multitudes, if not of these United States, take Place.

To avoid Evils fo truly deplorable, we conceive that every posible Exertion ought to be made, and that Nothing short of a Regulation of Prices, generally adopted, and effectu-

ally carried into Execution, will prove sufficient.

As to the Impracticability of this Measure, so much urged by Speculators, Monopolizers and others, whose Minds are vitiated and poitoned by similar Views of unreasonable Gain, and those who wish to ruin our Money in order to conquer us in that Way, it has not the similar Degree of Weight with us, because we are very clear that it does not exist. If the Measure is practicable in one State it is also in another, and of Course may be carried through the Union; and that it is practicable in one State we are sure, because it has been adopted and carried into Execution in the State we have the Honour to represent. And indeed we most sincerely lament the Part some of the other States acted on this very interesting and important Occasion. Had they come into the Regulation when this State did, and persevered in it as faithfully as this State would have done, our Affairs would probably have worn a very different Aspect from what they now do, and the Debt with which we are faddled, not have arisen to the enormous Sum which now appears.

If then all other Measures however wise and salutary, will prove insufficient to work the Salvation of our Currency, without a Regulation of Prices to compel the disaffected and avaricious to conform to what is equitable and consistent with the publick Sasety; and if this Regulation, in order to answer the End proposed should be general and uniform; we conceive that it ought to originate with Congress, and be thence distinged through the Union. Was it to take its Rise in any other Quarter, its being either general or uniform could hardly be expected. If your Honourable Body take the Matter up, and form a general System or Plan of Regulation, and recommend it to the several States, in Terms as forcible as the Necessity of the Case will bear, we have the most pleasing Apprehensions that

it will, without Delay, take Place in the fullest and amplest Manner.

It is impossible indeed for us to entertain so unsavourable an Opinion of the Justice or publick Virtue of our Sister-States, as to doubt their Compliance. For although artful designing Men may raise plausible Objections against any Measure, however wise or essential to the publick Safety it may be, and indeed are accustomed so to do, whenever a Measure is proposed that happens to thwart their or their Connections Views of Interest or Ambition; yet the Necessity of this we now propose is so obvious, and exceedingly pressing, that if Congress should put it in the Line of Success we have mentioned, we think no State, or even Individual, not greatly desicient in publick Virtue and common Honesty, can think of opposing.

It may however be objected, in order to prevent its being taken up, that as several of the States refused, or rather declined, to regulate under a former Recommendation of Congress, it is not to be supposed that they will now come into the Measure. But this Objection we presume will appear to have but very little Weight when it is considered, that at the Time when that Recommendation went forth, the Necessity of a Regulation did not appear one thousandth Part as evident and pressing as it now does. Multitudes who were then strenuously opposed to the Measure, are now as auxious to see it take Place. They are convinced that Taxation, during the Continuance of the War, without a Regulation

of Prices, will not have any fensible Effect for remedying the Evils we complain of.

Every Vender, say they, will raise upon the Articles he has for Sale, in order the better to enable him to pay his Tax; and thus Prices will go on rising, our Money depreciating, and our Debt increasing, until we become a ruined and a wretched People.

With Regard to the Mode of regulating, we would beg Leave to observe, that if Prices should be fixed at any certain Standard, not to descend, we fear it will answer no very

valuable Purpose.

Those who would wish to break through the Regulation, will only need to withhold what they have for Sale, and the Business will be done; the Scarcity will soon compel the Publick to yield to their Avarice. Nor will they run any Risque of Loss in withholding; the Chance will be altogether in their Favour. But if Prices are reduced by moderate and regular Gradations, and at certain short Periods, the Case will be different; this will operate like a falling Market, it will induce People to exhibit to Sale whatever they may have to spare, in order to avoid the Loss that must necessarily attend a contrary Conduct, and perhaps to take less than even the regulated Prices, thereby to quicken the Sale of their Goods. Thus will many Articles become plenty that now appear scarce; our Money will daily appreciate, and our Expences diminish, until the publick Credit is again restored, and our Affairs fixed upon a fase and permanent Footing. Farmers, and every other Order of Men will exert themselves to get Something to sell, because they will expect to receive Something for it of Value.

Having thus let forth some of our Ideas and Apprehensions respecting the present State of our Money, and what we conceive is further to be expected, unless Something spirited is done to check the Current of Depreciation; we shall now conclude, with intreating Congress once more to take the Matter up, and use their utmost Endeavours to set on

Foot, and extend through the Union, a general Regulation of Prices.

GENTLEMEN,

HE Legislative-Council and General Assembly of the State of New-Jersey, beg Leave to congratulate you on being so far advanced in the fourth Year of our Independence; on the many Successes of the present Campaign; and the glorious Prospect we now have of putting a speedy and happy End to the present distressing and unnatural War, and of settling our Liberty and Independence on a firm and lasting Basis. Nothing seems to be now wanting to effect this but Virtue among ourselves. We are forry to be obliged to observe, that amongst all these flattering Prospects, Ruin seems be rushing in upon us from another, from a once unsuspected Quarter.

The amazing Depreciation of the Continental Money for a Year past is truly aftonishing, and threatens us with inevitable Destruction, if a speedy Stop be not put to its rapid Progress; for it is a Truth too self-evident for Insidelity itself to doubt, that if the Depreciation should continue in the same Proportion but a little longer, our National Debt will exceed all Computation, and what is perhaps yet worfe, the Money will ceafe to circulate, and our Army must either be disbanded, or reduced to the Necessity of carving out their own Subfishence: In either Case Consequences must ensue, which make us

shudder but to think of.

Many are the Schemes proposed for preventing so fatal a Catastrophe. Publick Loans, Taxation, and a general Regulation and Limitation of Prices, we look upon as the most likely to have the defired Effect. Loans may prove a useful temporary Expedient to supply the present Exigences; Taxation in its Nature slow, and its Effects require Time to be fufficiently felt; in Aid of which we would therefore propofe a general Regulation and Limitation of the Prices to be taken for every Kind and Article of Labour, Manufacture and Trade, either by afcertaining the Number of Prices current at some past Period, to

be a Standard for the Future, or for particularizing at what Rates the most material and necessary Articles of Life shall be fold; and also the Profits to be made on all Articles imported. This we conceive to be the only immediate and safe Method of stopping that Torrent which threatens shortly to overwhelm us. Many and great Struggles have, at different Times, been made in various Parts of the Union to effect this desirable Purpose; all of which being partial, have sallen short of the End proposed, which we conceive they must ever do, unless the Matter becomes general throughout the States; to accomplish which we have represented the Utility, the Urgency, and even the Necessity of the Measure, to Congress; requesting them to adopt and recommend to the several States they represent, some general and equitable Plan for that Purpose, hoping that if you see the Matter in the same Light in which we view it, you will join with us in a similar Representation; and that you will communicate to the Legislature of this State, your Sense and Determination on so important and interesting a Subject; and likewise any Plan which you may have adopted, or shall adopt for so salutary a Purpose.

If an Application to Congress should not appear to you eligible, or when made, should not have the desired Effect, we stand ready to join in any other Measure which may be

adequate to the End proposed.
