





' also for abusing and assaulting *Samuel Dunn*, a Juryman on the said Coroner's Inquest, and for various other Instances of Misbehaviour.

' Which said Charges have been fully supported : We, the said Representatives, do therefore charge the said *Peter Hopkins* with the Offences and Misdemeanors following :

' First, That in the Month of *June or July*, in the Year 1783, *Jacob Bockover*, one of the Coroners of the County of *Sussex*, being in the due Execution of his Office, holding an Inquest over a dead Body, the said *Peter Hopkins* then being a Justice of the Peace of that County, endeavoured by Threats and Persuasions to turn said Coroner and the Jury out of the Line of their Duty, using such Abuses and Prophanity of Language as was highly derogatory to his Office, and did stop, and prevent the said Coroner and Jury proceeding in a legal Manner.

' Secondly, That said *Peter Hopkins*, among other his Attempts to interrupt and obstruct the Proceedings of the said Jury, did assault, beat, and otherwise abuse and mal-treat *Samuel Dunn*, one of the said Jury.
