To His Excellency, Joel Parker, Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

Sir:—I have the honor to submit the following report of this department for the year 1874:

Office Business.—The daily business of the office has been transacted as promptly during the year as the necessary searches asked for could be properly made.

War Register.—The revision and correction of proof-sheets of the "Official Register of the Officers and Men of New Jersey in the War of the Rebellion" still occupies much of our time. The re-examination of each record is made in the most critical way, and I hope, before the close of another year, to announce the issue of the work. I am sure all will admire the neat style in which it is printed, and the complete and I trust faultless roster of all the soldiers and sailors credited to this State in the late war.

National Cemeteries.—In the year 1867 I first called the attention of the departments at Washington to the very incorrect way in which the lists ("Rolls of Honor") of soldiers of the Union Army buried in National Cemeteries were being published. I thought that it would have been better, before these mortuary records were given to the printer, or cut upon headstones, that they should have been sent to the Adjutant Generals of States for correction. After urging this matter strongly, at various times, upon the proper officials, a request was made by them last year for an examination of the thirty volumes which they had issued, and I

commenced the search for all the names of New Jersey Volunteers among the three hundred thousand dead. For many months I have devoted all the time I could personally give from other duties to the necessary research. I do sincerely trust that the dead of other States, as recorded in these official volumes, is not as faulty as that of New Jersey. So easy was it for a German clerk in a hospital to write N. J. as N. Y., that I find New York gaining credit in two hundred and twenty-three known cases for the dead of our State. To examine all the dead as recorded of New York for dead Jerseymen has been a task you can readily imagine, no light one. The return I made on the thirteenth of the present month to the War Department shows that two thousand and sixtyfive men of New Jersey Volunteers have been recognized. Of these but two hundred and seventy-two are given correct, leaving the balance, seventeen hundred and ninety-three, as recorded in error. In the four large cemeteries of Arlington, Fredericksburg, Military Asylum, and Andersonville, I recognized the names of seven hundred and one Volunteers of New Jersey, and but forty records were correct. As the result of these labors, I am pleased to find that the work was appreciated at the War Department, that the headstones of these heroic dead will now be erected, correctly inscribed, and I trust a new and revised edition of these "Rolls of Honor" will be issued.

War of 1812.—I have obtained during the year complete rolls of the men who served during the War of 1812. It is a valuable addition to the files of this office.

Pennsylvania Insurrection.—A careful research has also brought to light among some old records the original muster rolls of the New Jersey Troops who marched into Pennsylvania in 1794 to crush the Whiskey Insurrection. These documents are of value to the military history of our State, and will be found of interest to many Jersey families and to the antiquarian.

War Records.—Prior to 1861 but few files of the war records of this State were accessible. I may now state with some pride that this office now contains the military record of all the soldiers and sailors of New Jersey, who served in the French War, the Revolutionary War, Pennsylvania Insurrection of 1794, War of 1812, Mexican War, and War of the Rebellion. This record covers a period in our country's history from 1756 to 1866. I can furnish, by a law of the State, without cost on application, certificates of record under the official seal as proof of service in any of these wars. I would respectfully call your attention to the danger of destruction by fire, to which the records of the office are at all times liable. It would be impossible to replace a large proportion

of these documents, and they should be preserved from the risk to which they are subject. But a slight expense would render this room perfectly fire proof.

Pensions.—Under the provisions of "An act for the relief of soldiers and sailors of this State in the war of one thousand eight hundred and twelve," approved March 12, 1874, granting the sum of one hundred dollars per annum to all the soldiers and sailors of this State who served in the War of 1812, and the widows of any such soldiers and sailors, it was made my duty to receive the evidence of service furnished in each case, to file it in this office, to examine the same, to be satisfied that such service was really performed, and thereupon to certify the application for pension to the Comptroller of the Treasury. You will be surprised when I state that out of the large number of cases presented I have had already to certify under the law two hundred and three applications for pension. Of these but twenty-seven are soldiers or sailors, and one hundred and seventy-six are widows of soldiers or sailors.

Soldiers' Orphans.—By an act entitled "An act for the benefit of the Soldiers' Orphans of the State of New Jersey," approved March 11, 1874, I was instructed to furnish over my official signature and seal of this office to each of the soldiers' or sailor's orphans now or heretofore residing in the Soldiers' Orphans' Home of this State, situated in the city of Trenton, a certificate on parchment, setting forth the letter of the company, the number of the regiment, branch of service, corps, division and brigade in which the father of such orphaned child served or was serving at the time of his receiving the wounds or wound, or incurred the disability resulting in his death. From the designs submitted to me for this certificate, calling to my aid the good taste of the lady Managers of the Home, I selected the sketch made by the Hon. John A. O'Neill, the excellent engraver of Hoboken, N. J., and these testimonials are at this date nearly completed. I am sure they will carry out perfectly the full intention of the law, and will in future years be a constant reminder of the bounty of the State, as well as the patriotic sacrifice made by their fathers.

National Guard.—The National Guard of this State now consists of sixty-seven (67) companies of infantry, two (2) companies of Cavalry, and two (2) companies of Artillery. The force is complete as allowed by law, except three (3) companies of colored Infantry as yet unorganized.

The parades and inspections of the military force have all been held as required by law. The annual parade and review of the First Brigade took place at Newark, May 5th, and of the Second

Brigade at New Brunswick, June 15th.

The United States Government have adopted a revised system of infantry tactics, with tactics assimilated thereto for cavalry and artillery. This new system, now in use in the Regular Army, has been ordered for the instruction of the National Guard of our State, and the different organizations have been furnished with copies of the work.

It would be of great benefit to the service if some proper place could be procured and held by the State as a range to perfect the men in the use of the breach-loading rifle soon to be furnished by the United States. Although the drill of the soldier by company and battalion is indispensable, it is also very important that he should attain a proper proficiency in firing the weapon which he is required to handle. I respectfully call your urgent attention to the need the troops have for some ground for target practice.

While I desire here to thank you for the courtesy which I have always received from you in the transaction of my official duties, I must also, at the close of your administration, express the feeling and place on record the thanks of the soldiery of the State for the zeal you have ever shown in their behalf. The force, never in more effective condition than it is to-day, is certainly a source of pride to you as well as credit to the Commonwealth. This is fully attested by the praise which they receive both in and out of the State. It may have cost much money to get them in this condition; it should cost less to continue it, but a strike in our iron mines or a riot at our shipping or railroad termini might in a few moments prove that the expenditure was cheap. But a few months ago, when an outbreak was threatened in one of our large cities, the civil authorities were able to hold in check and finally subdue a crowd of riotous men, six times their number, threatening disturbance at a point where ten million dollars worth of combustible property awaited shipment to the west. These men knew perfectly well that immediately after the telegraphic summons of the sheriff two regiments of men would have surrounded them, and within the hour the bayonets of the rest of the First Brigade would have been on Long Dock. It is clearly the duty of the State to protect property from the destructive hands of the mob. It is equally their duty to defend from the fury of rioters, a willing worker, who wishes to earn an honest living. He is entitled to all the protection the civil power can give him, and in their default he should have the military to defend him.

The report of the Assistant Adjutant General, Chief of Enrolling

and Drafting, has been received, and is herewith presented.

The report of the Inspector General, with the returns of Brigade Inspectors of the National Guard, is annexed, to which you are rererred for special information as to its numbers and general efficiency.

GENERAL:—I have the honor to report that the estimated number "of persons between the ages of eighteen (18) and forty-five (45) years, who are liable to perform military duty" in this State, at this date, is one hundred and thirty-four thousand two hundred and tifty-seven (134,257.) This constitutes the reserve militia of the State. It is divided by counties:

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REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR GENERAL.

State of New Jersey.
Inspector General's Office,
Elizabeth, October 31st, 1874.

General:—I have the honor to transmit to you herewith the Company Muster and Inspection Rolls of sixty Companies of white Infantry, seven Companies of colored Infantry, two batteries of Artillery, and two troops of Cavalry, together with Consolidated Inspection Returns of each Regiment or Battalion, and a Consolidated Return of the entire National Guard, with the exception of the General Officers and the General and State Staff, and to report as follows:

The National Guard of the State is composed of the organiza-

tions above enumerated.

The seven companies of colored Infantry compose the Eighth Regiment, and are known as Companies A, B, C, D, E, H, and I, all of which companies are fully up to the standard required by the law, and at the Inspection the Regiment had the largest average present of any regiment, viz.: 39.14 enlisted men per company answered to their names.

The remainder of the National Guard is divided into two Bri-

gades.

The First Brigade, Brigadier General Plume commanding, is composed of one Battery of Artillery, viz.: Battery "A," and thirty-four companies of Infantry, which are designated and organized as follows:

Companies A, B, C, D, E, and F, of the First Regiment. Companies A, B, C, D, E, and F, of the Second Regiment. Companies A, B, C, D, E, and F, of the Fourth Regiment. Companies A, B, C, D, E, F, G, and H, of the Fifth Regiment.

Companies A, B, C, D, and E, of the Ninth Regiment. And Companies A, B, and C, of the Second Battalion.

The Second Brigade, Brigadier General De Hart commanding, is

composed of one Battery of Artillery, Battery "B," two troops of Cavalry, Troops "A," and "B," and the remaining twenty-six companies of Infantry, divided as follows:

Companies A, B, C, D, E, F, G, and II, of the Third Regiment. Companies A, B, C, D, E, F, and G, of the Sixth Regiment. Companies A, B, C, D, E, F, and G, of the Seventh Regiment.

And Companies A, B, C, and D, of the Fourth Battalion.

The organizations comprised in the First Brigade include one hundred and fifty-nine officers and one thousand six hundred and eighty-five enlisted men. The Second Brigade has one hundred and thirty-three officers and one thousand four hundred and twenty-four enlisted men, and the eighth regiment of colored troops has twenty-six officers and three hundred and seventy-eight enlisted men, making a total of three thousand eight hundred and five officers and enlisted men.

The two Batteries of Artillery are very efficient organizations, especially Battery "A," which is entitled to honorable mention, not only for its inspection, at which sixty one members were present,

but for its discipline, drill and military appearance.

Both troops of Cavalry have, during the past year, greatly im-

proved, and are now very creditable companies.

Of the entire Guard, two thousand six hundred and thirty-eight were present at Inspection, and one thousand one hundred and sixty-seven were absent, a far too great proportion of whom were

reported absent without leave.

The law requires that every company of Infantry shall have at least forty enlisted men, and that the State appropriation shall be paid only to such companies as have the required minimum, and as it is impossible for an inspecting officer to determine whether those reported as absent without leave are bona fide members of the company, I respectfully recommend that the State appropriation be withheld from all such companies as make up their minimum by including any who are absent without leave.

The average of enlisted men present at inspection in the Infan-

try organization was as follows:

In the First Regiment, Company D is entitled to special mention as an efficient and well disciplined Company, which paraded for inspection with three officers and forty-six enlisted men. Companies B and C are fine organizations, which paraded, including

officers, with forty members each.

Company A, First Regiment, paraded only twenty eight-enlisted men, four others having been properly accounted for; but as to make up its minimum of forty there are included eight of the absent without leave. I recommend that its annual appropriation be withheld, unless those so reported as absent without leave are by name certified to the Adjutant General's office as bona fide members of the company by the commanding officer thereof.

Company E reports but thirty-eight enlisted men, thirty-two of

whom were present at inspection.

Company F inspected but one officer and thirteen enlisted men, and reports twenty-seven enlisted men absent without leave. I recommend that the company be disbanded and its members transferred to and consolidated with Company E, and that upon such consolidation the appropriation be allowed to Company E for the ensuing year.

In the Second Regiment, Company "C" only is up to the standard, and as to Companies B and E, each of which make up the minimum required by law, by including eight of those reported absent without leave. I recommend the same course I have above suggested in the case of Company A of the First Regiment.

Companies A, D and F, of the Second Regiment, all fall far short of what companies in the National Guard should be, and upon their rolls report as part of their minimum number as follows:

Company A, eighteen absent without leave. Company D, twelve absent without leave. Company F, twenty-two absent without leave.

I respectfully suggest that the annual appropriation of the last three companies be withheld until those absentees are properly accounted for, and that in case it shall appear that the said companies, or any of them, have not the requisite number of bona fide members, that then and in that case they be consolidated.

In the Third Regiment I respectfully recommend that Company "D" be disbanded, as it falls short of the minimum, having only on its rolls thirty-five enlisted men, including twelve reported

absent without leave.

Companies F, G and H, of the Third Regiment, only make up the minimum by including absentees without leave as follows:

Company F reports nineteen absent without leave. Company G reports nine absent without leave. Company II reports five absent without leave.

As to the two latter companies, I respectfully recommend that the same course be taken as suggested above with reference to Company A, First Regiment, and as to Company F, which paraded but nineteen men, I recommend that its appropriation be withheld, and the company disbanded or consolidated.

Companies C and E, Third Regiment, are among those entitled to be favorably reported on, and Companies A and B are very fair.

In the Fourth Regiment, Companies D and E are especially fine companies, each parading for inspection over forty men. Company A paraded thirty-five members, and Company C having no officers, inspected thirty-three men present. Company F, however, reports too many absent without leave, having inspected but twenty-eight enlisted men present, seventeen are reported absent without leave, twelve of which number are necessary to make up the minimum required. Company "B," inspecting but eighteen men, reports thirty-three absent without leave. It seems useless to keep up skeleton companies in view of the fact that the law only allows sixty companies of Infantry in addition to the colored troops, especially when a number of large and fine companies can readily be raised at localities where there are no troops, and when so frequently we are obliged to refuse companies that are really raised, and anxious to be admitted to the Guard. With reference, then, to Companies B and F, Fourth Regiment, I recommend that a special inspection be had for the purpose of ascertaining whether or not it would be advantageous to consolidate those two companies.

In the Fifth Regiment Company "A" takes the lead, and is entitled to mention among the fine companies. But I regret that the membership in the remaining companies is so small. Companies B, C, D, E, and F, have on their rolls just the minimum number, while Companies G and II only exceed the minimum by two, and although Company "C" inspected thirty-four enlisted men, and Companies B, E, F, and II, thirty men each, and Company D twenty-eight men, yet they all make up their minimum (except Company B) by including certain absent without leave, as follows:

Company "C" includes six absent without leave. Company "D" includes seven absent without leave. Company "E" includes eight absent without leave. Company "F" includes ten absent without leave. Company "G" includes eleven absent without leave. Company "H" includes five absent without leave. As to Companies C, D, E, and H, I recommend the same course as that above suggested to be pursued towards Company A, First Regiment, and as to Companies F and G, I recommend a special inspection for same reason suggested in the case of Companies

B and F of the Fourth Regiment.

In the Sixth Regiment Company "A" bears off the palm, having paraded for inspection three officers and forty-six enlisted men, out of a total of forty-nine; the three absentees having been absent with leave. The reports from Companies B and C are also very flattering to them, they having paraded over forty members each, and Company "F" inspected forty-three enlisted men. Company "E" paraded over thirty-five strong, while Companies D and G each inspected over thirty enlisted men; but Company D unfortunately shows upon its rolls a membership of only thirty-eight enlisted men, of which number six were absent without leave. The annual appropriation for that company, therefore, is by law required to be withheld.

To Company "A," of the Seventh Regiment, must be given the credit of having forwarded model rolls in all their details, but in numbers they did not equal, at the inspection, any of the other companies in the Regiment to which they belong, and in which the average present of enlisted men at inspection was greater than in any other, except the Eight Regiment. Companies B and G, closely emulated by Companies C, E, and F, as well as Company "D," are all a credit to the National Guard, and all were out in

full force at the annual inspection.

In the Ninth Regiment, Company E is a model for promptness, having inspected forty-five enlisted men. Company "D," likewise, is entitled to credit, while Companies "B" and "C" paraded over thirty-five enlisted men each, but Company "A" must take the same course as Company "A" of the First Regiment, having made up its minimum upon the rolls by including therein eight of its absentees without leave.

In the Second Battalion Companies "A" and "B" are both entitled to honorable mention, but Company "C," having included in its minimum five enlisted men absent without leave, although it paraded thirty-four enlisted men at inspection, must await its appropriation for the same reason suggested as to other companies above.

In the Fourth Battalion, Company "D," having a membership of but forty-two enlisted men, paraded for inspection forty-one men, while Company "A" and Company "B" both paraded with very full ranks. Company "C" is fair, but by no means equal to the other companies of the battalion.

Of the sixty companies of Infantry—

Eight inspected present over forty enlisted men.

Eleven others inspected present over thirty-seven enlisted men. Seven others inspected present over thirty-five enlisted men. Six others inspected present over thirty-three enlisted men. Ten others inspected present over thirty enlisted men. Ten others inspected present over twenty-five enlisted men. Two others inspected present twenty-four enlisted men. Three others inspected present twenty enlisted men.

Three companies fell below twenty present, and those three companies were Companies F, First Regiment; "F" Second Regiment, and "F" Third Regiment.
