To His Excellency, Joseph D. Bedle, Governor, and Commander-in-Chief:

SIR: I have the honor to submit the following report of this Department for the year 1876:

Office Business.—As I stated in my report last year, so I again repeat, that there is a daily increase in the number of searches of military records, required by men who have served in the various wars of the country, or the families of the soldiers and sailors referred to. Our office records are remarkably complete and very valuable, and undoubtedly should be more carefully protected from fire than they are at present.

Pensions.—In accordance with the supplement approved April 21, 1876, to the "Act for the relief of soldiers and sailors of this State in the war of one thousand eight hundred and twelve," providing that no pensions shall hereafter be paid to widows of deceased soldiers and sailors as shall have again married, I certified to the Comptroller of the Treasury that twenty-one (21) persons were in receipt of pension who had re-married, and their pensions were accordingly canceled.

National Guard.—The National Guard of this State is now composed of sixty two (62) companies of Infantry, two (2) com-

panies of Cavalry, and one company of Artillery.

During the past year one new company of Infantry, Company F, Ninth Regiment, has been organized. One company of Infantry, Company G, Sixth Regiment, and one company of Artillery, Battery B, Second Brigade, have been disbanded.

Consolidation.—During the year a consolidation of the Fourth Battalion and Sixth Regiment of Infantry has been made by the Division Commander. Company A, Fourth Battalion, was made Company G, Sixth Regiment. Companies B and C, Fourth Battalion, together made Company I, Sixth Regiment; and Company D, Fourth Battalion, made Company K, Sixth Regiment. Also, Companies C and D, and Companies E and I, Eighth Regiment, were consolidated.

Resignations.—The number of commissioned officers resigned during the year is forty-eight (48), and thirty (30) officers have been retired by the Division Commander. In addition thereto, twelve (12) commissions have been canceled, according to law, on account of removal from the State or failure to equip.

Discharges.—During the year thirty-four (34) enlisted men have been honorably discharged, on account of expiration of term of service.

Orders.—General orders have been issued from this office approving of the use of the revised system of Upton's Tactics for the several arms of the service; on the death of ex-Governor Charles S. Olden; permission for the military forces of other States to pass and re-pass through this State during the present year; and the authority for the National Guard to go into an encampment.

Centennial.—At the parade in Philadelphia on the Fourth of July, Company C, Third Regiment, by your permission, joined the "Centennial Legion," and acquitted themselves with great credit on that occasion. On the 20th of October, the entire Second Brigade, consisting of 1,320 officers and men, marched through the Centennial Exhibition Grounds, at Philadelphia,

and received, as they deserved, great encomiums for their drill and soldierly appearance.

Parades.—On the 27th day of November, 1875, the Fourth Regiment was detailed as Guard of Honor, as the remains of the late Vice President Wilson passed out of the State at Jersey City.

On the occasion of the Centennial Celebration at Princeton, June 27th, the Second and Seventh Regiments were selected to

participate in the ceremonies

Encampment.—An encampment of the First and Second Brigades was ordered June 13th, to take place at Trenton, from the 5th to the 15th of July, inclusive. A piece of ground was immediately selected by the Division Commander, the Quartermaster General, Brigadier General of the First Brigade, and myself, which, at the time, possessed all the natural advantages of a good camp. With ordinary summer weather, and an average amount of rain, the camp would not only have been suitable, but attractive. The First Brigade went into camp on the evening of the 5th of July, and so continued until the ninth of July, when it was broken up by your order. The extreme heat and drought had by this time destroyed the sod which covered the place when the camp was located. The heat was so very intense that the men began to suffer from severe and alarming prostration, and the encampment, of necessity, had to be abandoned. This result is to be deplored, as a fair opportunity would otherwise have been afforded for a complete camp of instruction, for the drill of the separate brigades, and for the bringing them together for the first time in one Division.

Active Service.—On the evening of January 7th, rumors of an anticipated riot at a railroad crossing near Hopewell, in Mercer county, came to your notice, and still later, a request for a military force was made by the Sheriff of the county. At midnight, Companies A, B, C, D and G, Seventh Regiment, were ordered to the place. They responded with great promptness, and arrived there about an hour before daylight. By your telegraphic order, the force took possession of the disputed district, and all apprehension of dangerous conflict immediately ceased. A legal decision in the case was soon after received, and the destruction of much property and many lives was averted.

Calls are generally made upon you for troops at executions. On the 27th of October, Company B, Sixth Regiment, was detailed for that duty at May's Landing, Atlantic county, and arrived there in time to prevent the escape of the criminals.

The report of the Assistant Adjutant General, Chief of Enrolling and Drafting, has been received, and is herewith

presented.

The report of the Inspector General, with returns of Brigade Inspectors of the National Guard is annexed, to which you are referred for special information as to its numbers and general efficiency.

REPORT OF ASSISTANT ADJUTANT GENERAL.

General:—I have the honor to report that the estimated number "of persons between the ages of eighteen (18) and forty-five (45) years, who are liable to perform military duty" in this state, at this date, is two hundred and forty-eight thousand one hundred and twenty-seven (248,127). This number is ascertained on the basis of the last census (1875), and includes the number of colored persons liable for military duty, which partly accounts for the considerable increase over the number stated in my last report. This constitutes the reserve militia of the state. It is divided by counties:

REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR GENERAL.

STATE OF NEW JERSEY,
INSPECTOR GENERAL'S OFFICE,
ELIZABETH, Dec. 23d, 1876.

GENERAL:—I have the honor herewith to submit my annual report of the condition of the National Guard, together with muster and inspection rolls of each company, and consolidated inspection returns of each regimental or battalion organization.

Exclusive of the State and General Staff, the aggregate strength of the entire Guard consists of 3,903 officers and men, of which number 1,893 compose the First Brigade; 1,698 the Second Brigade, and 312 belong to the Eighth Regiment (colored). In pursuance of requirements of the National Guard Act, Colonel L. R. Barnard was detailed to inspect the Eighth Regiment, on the 3d day of October last, at Camden, at which time five companies, viz.: "A," "B," "D," "E," and "H," were mustered and You will notice from the returns, that the field and staff did not parade for inspection, and from the report to these Headquarters of Colonel L. R. Barnard, dated November 4th, 1876, which I have also the honor herewith to forward, it would appear that while all of the companies are in strength above the minimum, yet they are of no value to the State. Colonel Barnard reports: "I would recommend the total disbandment of the organization as a useless expense to the State; there is no drill in them, and no one seems capable of instructing."

If that course is pursued it will be a saving of \$2,800 in appropriations, besides costs of transportation, wear, and use of arms

and equipments.

The First Brigade, commanded by General Plume, is composed of four regiments, one battalion, and one battery of artillery.

The Battery, "A," is deserving of special mention, having

paraded for inspection 4 officers and 62 enlisted men.

There are in the brigade 31 companies of infantry, distributed in the four regiments and the battalion as follows:

Companies A, B, C, D, E, F, G, and H, of the First Regiment. Companies A, B, C, D, E, and F, of the Fourth Regiment. Companies A, B, C, D, E, F, G, and H, of the Fifth Regiment. Companies A, B, C, D, E, and F, of the Ninth Regiment. And Companies A, B, and C, of the Second Battalion.

The aggregate strength of the brigade is one hundred and forty-five officers, and seventeen hundred and forty-eight enlisted men, and there were paraded for inspection one hundred and twenty-eight officers, and thirteen hundred and eighty-three men.

One new company of infantry, viz: Company "F," of the Ninth Regiment, has been organized during the year, which paraded for inspection with two officers and forty enlisted men.

The average per company of enlisted men present at inspection, in the thirty-one companies of infantry of this brigade, is forty-two.

The average of the different organizations composing the bri-

gade having been as follows:

The Fifth Regiment, 47 enlisted men per company.

The First Regiment, 44 " " " "
The Ninth Regiment, 39 " " " "
The Fourth Regiment, 38 " " "

And the Second Battalion, 40 enlisted men per company.

All of the companies of the First Regiment, except Company H," made a very fine appearance upon the annual inspection, and from the returns, the deficiency in numbers of Company "H" appears to be made up by a large number of men being reported as absent, sick, or with leave. Company "C," parade 57 members; Company "D," 54; Company "G," 51; Company "E," 48; Company "B," 47; Company "F," 44; Company "A," 39; and Company "H," 33; the last two thus reducing the average for the regiment.

All of the companies of the Fourth Regiment are up to the standard required in numbers, Company "E" having paraded the largest company; but I must call your attention to the fact that Company "A" paraded with 39 enlisted men under the command of the Second Lieutenant, the Captain, First Lieutenant, and 18 enlisted men being returned as absent without leave. The absence of the enlisted men is not suprising, if such an example is set by their

officers, but it would seem to call for an investigation.

All of the companies of the Fifth Regiment have shown themselves to be efficient organizations, and the regiment as a body paraded 410 members, out of a total membership of 466. Company "E" having 3 officers and 55 enlisted men, had not a single absentee; Company "F" having 3 officers and 51 enlisted men, had but one absentee; Company "G" with a total membership of 51, paraded 49; Companies "C" and "H," though having a larger membership, paraded 3 officers and forty-eight enlisted

men each, while Companies "D," "B" and "A," paraded respect-

ively 46, 43 and 42 enlisted men.

Companies D, C, F, B and E, of the Ninth Regiment, all paraded with full ranks, and in the order above specified are entitled to credit, but Company A appears to fall behind the others, inasmuch as its minimum of enlisted men required by law can only be made up by including in its aggregate some of those reported as absent without leave, and it further appears by the certificate of its commanding officer, that the average attendance at the drills during the past year has been but 20 men.

Before the annual appropriation is allowed that company, I would recommend that a special inspection be held to ascertain

what the real efficiency of the company may be.

The three companies, A, B and C, composing the Second Battalion, are still as they have been for several years past, worthy of great praise for their drill, discipline, their military appearance, and the care which they take of their arms and accourrements, and are in all respects fully up to the standard.

The Second Brigade, commanded by General DeHart, consists of two companies of cavalry, Troop "A" and Troop "B," and twenty-six companies of infantry, which are designated as follows:

Companies A, B, C, D, E, F, G and H, of the Third Regiment. Companies A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I and K, of the Sixth Regiment.

And Companies A, B, C, D, E, F, G and H, of the Seventh

Regiment.

Since the last annual inspection, Battery "B" of Artillery, formerly attached to this brigade has been disbanded, as also has been the Fourth Battalion, the four companies of which have been consolidated and attached to the Sixth Regiment, which

now having ten companies last year had but eight.

The two companies of cavalry are maintained at considerable expense to the State, and it can hardly be said that the State reaps any benefit or could reap any benefit from them in return, unless the little service they can render as orderlies when the troops are encamped should be considered an equivalent for the expenditure of \$2,500 per year. Company B, or Troop B, was inspected by the Brigade Inspector, and from its return shows two officers and thirty-three enlisted men for duty, with two enlisted men absent with leave, thus falling below the minimum required by law. Troop "A" appears to have been inspected by its own Captain, a very improper thing, although in this instance the Captain will not be charged with partiality, as he reports as follows:

"ELIZABETH, N. J., October 9th, 1876.

" Lieutenant-Colonel, D. B. Murphy:

"Colonel:—I send you by mail (3) muster rolls, filled as required. The troop was inspected by me, as you ordered. I would, as Captain, of this troop, recommend it to be disbanded; it's only putting the State to expense. * * * * * * You know how the saddles, &c. looked when you last inspected the company—they look worse now. * * * * * * * * * I think the sooner the troop are ordered to return articles issued by the State the better.

The inspection return itself accounts for two officers and nineteen enlisted men for duty, two enlisted men absent with leave, and one officer and thirty-two men absent without leave. For the reasons above set forth, I respectfully recommend that both of the cavalry organizations be forthwith disbanded, the property of the State carefully collected, and thus the annual

appropriations saved for other more worthy objects.

The effect of disbanding inferior organizations is shown satisfactorily in the returns from Companies A and B, of the Third Regiment. Both the old companies were broken up after the annual inspection last year, in accordance with the recommendation contained in my last annual report, and in their places we have now two fine newly organized companies. Company "A" having paraded on inspection three officers and forty-eight enlisted men. and Company "B" showing an efficient strength of two officers and forty-nine enlisted men. Company "C" and "D," of the Third Regiment, are both useful and strong companies, Company "C" having paraded at inspection three officers and forty five enlisted men, and Company "D" two officers and forty-six enlisted men.

I regret that Company "E" should detract from the average of the regiment, by its showing upon the returns. Its present at inspection was but thirty-one enlisted men, and to count the minimum required by law it is necessary to include a large

number who are reported as furloughed.

It appears that the Third Regiment was not inspected by the Brigade Inspector as required by law, but by Captain Winn, an aid to the Brigade Commander. He reports Company "E" as follows: discipline, "fair;" military appearance, "bad;" accoutrements, "bad;" clothing, "bad." In view of that report, I would recommend that the annual appropriation of the company

be withheld, until by a special inspection it be ascertained whether the company is worthy of the bounty of the State. Companies "F" and "G" are barely up to the standard, while as to Company H which is reported as only "fair," owing to its large number of absentees, I must recommend that the same course be adopted as I have above suggested for Company "E."

The average per company of enlisted men present at inspection, in the twenty six companies of the Second Brigade, was

38 men.

In the Third Regiment it was 38 men.

"Sixth "37 "

Seventh "39 "

All of the companies of the Sixth Regiment are up to the standard required by law, as to numbers. The only company, however, deserving of special credit for its strength and promptness, as shown by the inspection returns, is Company K, which, out of a membership of fifty-three enlisted men, paraded fifty-one for duty at the annual inspection, the two absentees

being absent with leave.

All of the companies of the Seventh Regiment are up to the standard required, except Company C, which inspected but thirty men present for duty, and makes up the minimum required by law by including its absent without leave. I recommend that its annual appropriation be withheld until either by a special inspection or by some other means it can be satisfactorily ascertained whether those absentees are bona fide members of the company, or mere paper soldiers, who would be of no service to the State in case of emergency. Companies H, F, G, D and B, are all entitled to honorable mention, both for their strength and discipline. Company H has three officers and forty-two enlisted men, every one of whom were present at inspection. Company F paraded forty-nine enlisted men, but three were absent, two of them detained by illness. Company G paraded forty-seven enlisted men, and Companies D and B forty enlisted men each.

The aggregate of the First Brigade, by the report of last year, exclusive of General and Staff, was 138 officers and 1,613 enlisted men—total, 1,751; and this year it is 145 officers and 1,748 enlisted men—total 1,893; showing an increase of 142 men. Last year the strength present at inspection was 1,414, and this

year it is 1,511, showing an increase of 97 men.

The aggregate of the second Brigade, by the last report, exclusive of Battery B, now disbanded, was 129 officers and 1,570 enlisted men—total, 1,699; and this year it is 118 officers and 1,580 enlisted men—total, 1,698; showing a gain of 10 enlisted men, and decrease of 11 officers. Last year the strength present at inspection, exclusive of Battery B, was 1,107 men, and this year it is 1,144 men, showing an increase of 37 men.

The Eighth Regiment (colored) shows a decrease in the aggre-

gate of 30 men from report of last year.

The report of last year showed that there were in the National Guard 58 companies of Infantry, exclusive of the colored troops, and that they paraded at inspection 211 officers and 2182 enlisted men, making a total of 2393 men. This year there are but 57 companies of Infantry, exclusive of colored troops, and they paraded at inspection 217 officers and 2316 enlisted men, making a total of 2533 men, an increase of 140 effective men in a lesser

number of companies.

The disbandment of Battery B during the past year, has saved to the State \$1,000 in the National Guard appropriation, besides a large amount in incidental expenses, and if now the inefficient organizations be dispensed with viz.: the two troops of cavalry, the Eighth Regiment, as recommended by Colonel Barnard, and the four weak companies of infantry above specified in my report, an immediate additional saving to the State can be made of six thousand dollars, besides what it expends for the transportation, hire of horses for parades and encampments, and other incidentals and supplies for those particular organizations, and at the same time the efficiency of the National Guard will not be crippled, but rather augmented by the change. I would further suggest that as an additional means of increasing the efficiency of the Guard, the amendment of 1870, fixing the minimum for the companies of infantry at forty enlisted men be repealed, so that the minimum shall hereafter be fifty enlisted men to a company, as was provided in the original act. The result would be to weed out inefficient organizations, and strengthen the remaining ones at a great saving to the State. And even if nothing were saved the companies would all be rendered of more value to the State for the same outlay of money.

I might here add that of the fifty-three companies of infantry which by these returns are shown to come up to the requirements of the law as it is at present, thirty-four are up to what would be the requirements in case such change were made, and of the remainder a number are nearly up and speedily would be

in case such a spur were given them.
