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# Section One

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## **SYNOPSIS: UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING PROGRAM**

# THE NEW JERSEY UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING SYSTEM

## DEFINITION

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System is based upon the compilation, classification, and analysis of crime data reported by all New Jersey police agencies in accordance with the regulations prescribed by law.

## DEVELOPMENT

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Law (N.J.S.A. 52:17 B-5.1 et. seq.) was enacted on May 16, 1966, and became effective January 1, 1967. Responsibility for the establishment, direction, control, and supervision of the Uniform Crime Reporting System was assigned to the State's Attorney General. The Attorney General authorized the New Jersey State Police to collect and collate the crime data received from law enforcement agencies within the state.

At the request of the Attorney General, the New Jersey State Police researched crime systems in operation throughout the nation in order to establish a firm foundation from which to grow. The most logical approach was the paralleling of the federal crime reporting system. There was a distinct need for a compatibility feature that would enhance both the state and federal systems through the data entry at both levels.

This compatibility has, as its nucleus, the standard classification of offenses established by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Regardless of the label placed on a particular offense in the various states' systems, *i.e.*, felony, misdemeanor, disorderly persons, if the incident meets the federal standard it will be reported as an offense.

The terms "crime" and "offense" are used interchangeably in this publication, and refer to an act committed in violation of a law which is reportable under the guidelines of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

The New Jersey State Chiefs of Police Association has served the program in an advisory capacity since 1966. The contributions of this association have proved valuable to the success of the program. This association works in close harmony with the State Police as a means of improving the quality of reporting through recommended program standards, policies and procedures.

## COLLECTION OF CRIME DATA

As required by statute, all law enforcement agencies in the state submit monthly and annual summary crime reports to the program. During the year 2002, offense and arrest data were received from 479 full-time municipal police departments, two (2) part-time municipal police departments, and the New Jersey State Police (acting as the reporting agent for the 75 municipalities without local police services). In addition to the 479 full-time municipal police departments there are ten (10) police departments contracted by other municipalities.

In addition to the above agencies, arrest data was received from the state's twenty-one (21) prosecutors, sheriffs' departments, two (2) county police departments, and three (3) county park police departments. In order to incorporate all New Jersey law enforcement agencies under the system, the ten (10) other state agencies with law enforcement responsibilities, excluding state police, as well as thirteen (13) college campus police departments were incorporated within the program. Collectively, a total of 552 law enforcement agencies submit the reports to the New Jersey State Police.

## METHOD

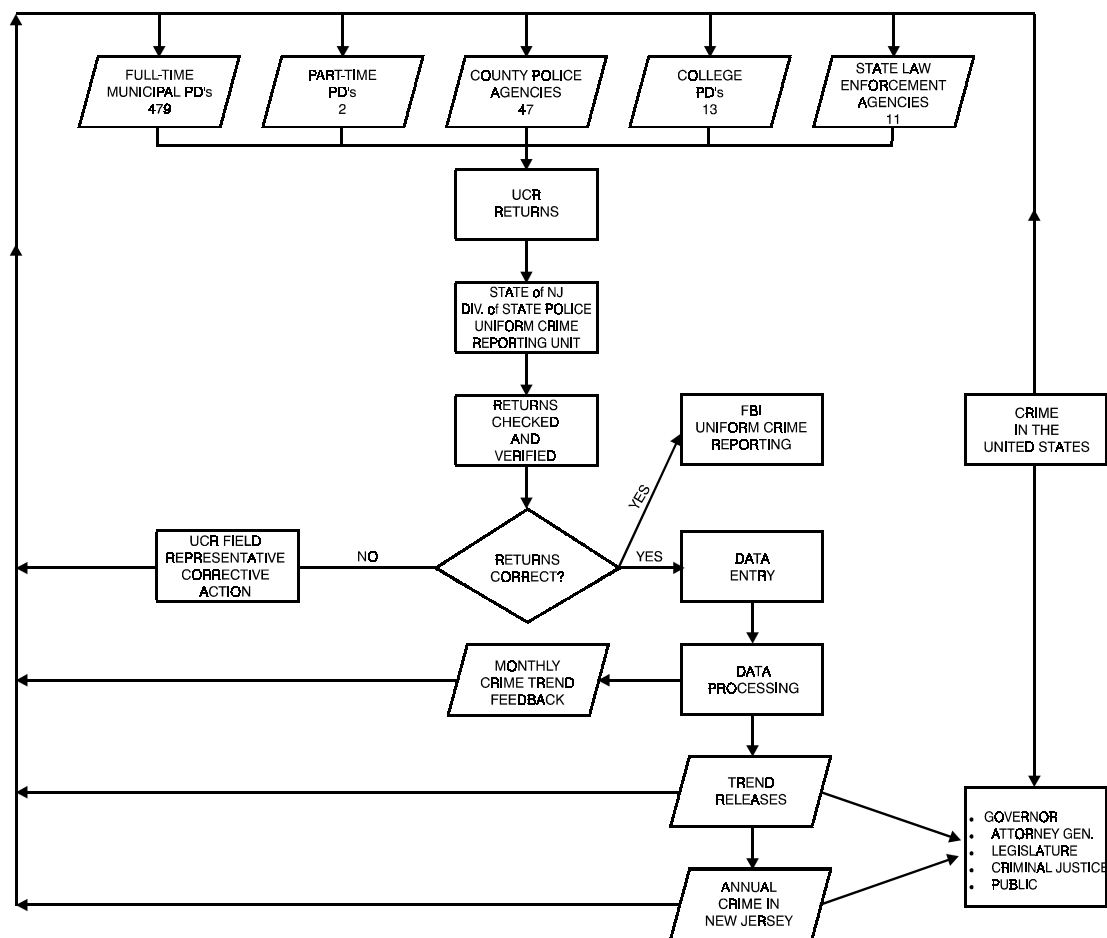
A State of New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Guide has been distributed to all contributors. It outlines reporting procedures in detail, and is complete to the extent of providing examples and illustrations. Field representatives provide additional instruction and clarification when required.

All reported offenses are related to the municipality in which they occur rather than to the agency which may conduct the investigation. The clearance is credited to the municipality in which the offense occurred. Each contributing agency is responsible for compiling its own reports. Law enforcement agencies report the number of known offenses according to the following categories: Homicide (Murder and Manslaughter), Rape, Robbery, Burglary, Larceny-Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Arson. The "Crime in New Jersey," and the Federal Bureau of Investigation's "Crime in the United States" publications exclude manslaughters, simple assaults,

and arsons from the “Index” offenses. These are further referred to as “violent” and “nonviolent” crimes as graphically illustrated in Section VII under “Municipal and County Offenses and Demographic Data,” and Section II, “State Summary and Offense Analysis.”

All reported offenses are compiled from a record of all criminal complaints received by police from victims or other sources, or discovered by the police during routine operations. Complaints determined to be unfounded are eliminated from this count. Analytical data pertaining to specific crime categories are also reported, *i.e.* total adult and juvenile arrests made during the month. Police killed or assaulted and arson data are also collected monthly. Police personnel information is submitted on an annual basis.

## **VERIFICATION PROCESSES**

The uniformity and accuracy of data gathered from contributors must be safeguarded through various ways. Although guidelines and instructions are provided to each contributor, they are not the panaceas for the accuracy being sought.

The reports received by the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit are recorded and examined for mathematical accuracy and reasonableness of the interpretation of the offense classifications. Improper classifications, changes in reporting procedures, or actual change are identified in this manner. Errors of a minor nature are corrected by direct telephone contact with the contributors, while all other errors are resolved through a personal visit by a field representative to the reporting agency.

Further verification is accomplished through the analysis of statistical data accrued from the reports submitted. Fluctuations in crime rates noted from previous submissions are verified by the field representatives through their municipal counterpart.

## **FUNCTION**

Police executives make use of this data in administrative, planning, and operational determinations for their respective jurisdictions. The State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit provides assistance to municipal police agencies through the individual analysis of statistics as they relate to specific crime problems within their jurisdiction. Police executives also use this data for identifying personnel and equipment needs. The Uniform Crime Reporting Program requirements not only have increased police efficiency in reporting and record keeping areas, but have helped police in their day to day operations.

Although the data collected on the offenses of manslaughter and simple assault are not presented in the annual report, they are required for the federal system. Data for these offenses is processed and provided for research purposes.

# PROFILE OF NEW JERSEY

New Jersey is situated between the major industrial markets of New York and Philadelphia. The geographic location of the state has been a major factor in its growth and development. The many miles of interstate roadways within the state connect New Jersey directly with the neighboring states of New York, Pennsylvania, and Delaware. Additionally, New Jersey roadways accommodate large volumes of traffic as a corridor for commerce and travelers from throughout the United States.

The state is geographically composed of 21 counties which contain 566 incorporated municipalities. Nationally, New Jersey, although 46th in size, ranks ninth in population and first as the most densely populated state in the country. In addition to this density of 1,122.6 persons per square mile, New Jersey still has many miles of rural areas and sparsely settled communities. The areas of density are concentrated around the major urban centers and those venues most accessible for commuting.

## STATE, COUNTY AND MUNICIPAL PROFILES

The presentation of state, county and municipal profiles in this section is offered for the purpose of projecting, for the consideration of the reader, a group of recognizable factors which may affect the amount and type of crime that occurs from community to community. Selection of the areas of information to be related to individual municipalities was based on the immediacy and completeness of data available.

Population statistics presented here, and throughout this publication, were obtained from the Department of Labor, Division of Labor Market and Demographic Research.

Character of municipalities by urban, suburban and rural classifications, and square miles, were initially compiled by the Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning, and will continue to be used for comparative purposes. Following is a list of categories used and a description of each category.

- URBAN CENTER      Densely populated with extensive development.
- URBAN SUBURBAN      Near an urban center but not as extremely developed and more residential areas.
- SUBURBAN      Predominantly single family residential, within a short distance of an urban area.
- RURAL      Scattered small communities and isolated single family dwellings.
- RURAL CENTER      High density core area with surrounding rural municipalities.

Certain other socioeconomic factors present in varying degrees in all communities may have an influence on resulting crime rates. Obvious difficulties in the identification, documentation and measurement of these factors, however, precluded their application in this report.

Those factors presented were listed to affirm their existence within the county and community and to provide a base for consideration in the evaluation of that community's crime experience.

### RESORT MUNICIPALITY CRIME RATES

On July 10, 1998, section 4 of P.L. 1966, c37(C.52:17B-5.4) was amended to require the Uniform Crime Report to include, in addition to the regular statistics, an alternative calculation that takes into account the seasonal population of resort municipalities.

The Department of Labor has been mandated to determine which municipalities qualify as resort municipalities and certify their annual mean population (which includes seasonal population estimates.)

# CRIME FACTORS

In order to provide a meaningful statistical profile of crime within the State of New Jersey, each law enforcement agency must provide the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit with data that depicts specific crimes that are occurring within their jurisdiction. There is a need for compatibility with the National Uniform Crime Reporting System and, therefore, categories of offense classifications used within the state are identical with those of the National System. This results in equitable conclusions being drawn from the data submitted.

Reported Part 1 offenses and arrests are recorded in the municipality where they occurred, regardless of the outside investigative agency which may investigate, arrest, or otherwise dispose of the case.

The factors which influence crime rates are dependent upon characteristics of the community. When attempting to interpret the crime statistics presented herein, one should be aware of the social structure and factors that lead to or cause criminal behavior.

Crime rates in this publication are based on the stable population of the municipality. Municipalities that experience high population increases due to special events or commuters or with high seasonal populations, may indicate a higher crime rate per one thousand than may be normal for a municipality their size. A separate section provides statistics for resort municipalities using crime rates which include seasonal populations.

Set forth below are some factors which, by type and volume, will affect the crime rate that occurs from place to place:

- Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan areas of which it is a part.
- Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex and race.
- Economic status, including job availability, and mores of the population.
- Relative stability of population, including commuter, seasonal, and other transient types.
- Climate, including seasonal weather conditions.
- Cultural conditions, such as educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.
- Effective strength of law enforcement agencies.
- Administrative and investigative emphases of law enforcement.
- Policies of other components of the criminal justice system (*i.e.*, prosecutorial, judicial, correctional, and probational).
- Crime reporting practices of the general citizenry.
- Attitudes of the public toward crime reporting.
- The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.
- Cooperation of adjoining and overlapping police agencies.



# THE POLICE POINT OF VIEW

The New Jersey State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit surveyed various police agencies of the state, attempting to ascertain their opinion concerning factors contributing to the increase or decrease of specific crimes in their municipality. One of the goals of the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit is to assist police in reducing crime by first identifying its extent, type and location. The following viewpoints are offered with the expectation of reaching this goal.

## ROBBERY

### Decreases:

- More stringent sentencing requirements under the State Criminal Code.
- Advanced technology in communications has led to increased exchanges of information between police departments.
- Highly visible foot patrols being deployed in commercial areas and densely populated residential areas.
- Use of Anti-crime Unit in high robbery areas.

### Increases:

- Resort areas have shown an increasing seasonal population.
- Our highly mobile society provides easy access to areas which were previously difficult to reach.

## BURGLARY

### Decreases:

- Better deployment of police personnel, such as highly visible foot patrols in high density crime areas, and increased patrols during probable time and at probable locations of burglaries.
- More stringent sentencing requirements under the State's Criminal Code have been a deterrent.
- Crime Prevention Programs are being stressed in many communities and citizens have been taking a more active part by reporting suspicious persons or circumstances.

### Increases:

- Extreme increases in population in certain areas have led to new housing in suburban and rural areas.
- Husband and wife are both working; leaving homes frequently unoccupied for long periods of time.

## LARCENY

### Decreases:

- Public awareness programs contribute to the decrease in thefts from parked vehicles.
- Improved or additional lighting deters criminal acts from occurring in parking areas.
- "Safe Streets" Programs and Anti-crime Units have been established in many communities.

**Increases:**

- Shoplifting is a theft that police have little or no control over. Store security forces are under the control of the store administration, and their policies vary from strict enforcement, arrest and prosecution, to only a warning. Policy change has been directed toward prosecuting the offenders rather than warning them, causing to some extent an increase in the number of shoplifting offenses reported to the police.
- Certain types of property such as tape decks, radar detectors and radios are popular and present resale opportunities.
- Youth gang activity on the increase resulting in thefts from motor vehicles.

**MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT****Decreases:**

- Stronger sentencing of career criminals has been effective.
- Modern ignition systems and anti-theft devices act as a deterrent.
- Better lighting in parking lots has helped decrease motor vehicle thefts.

**Increases:**

- The tremendous replacement cost of auto parts has contributed significantly to the increase in motor vehicle thefts for the purpose of auto parts resale.

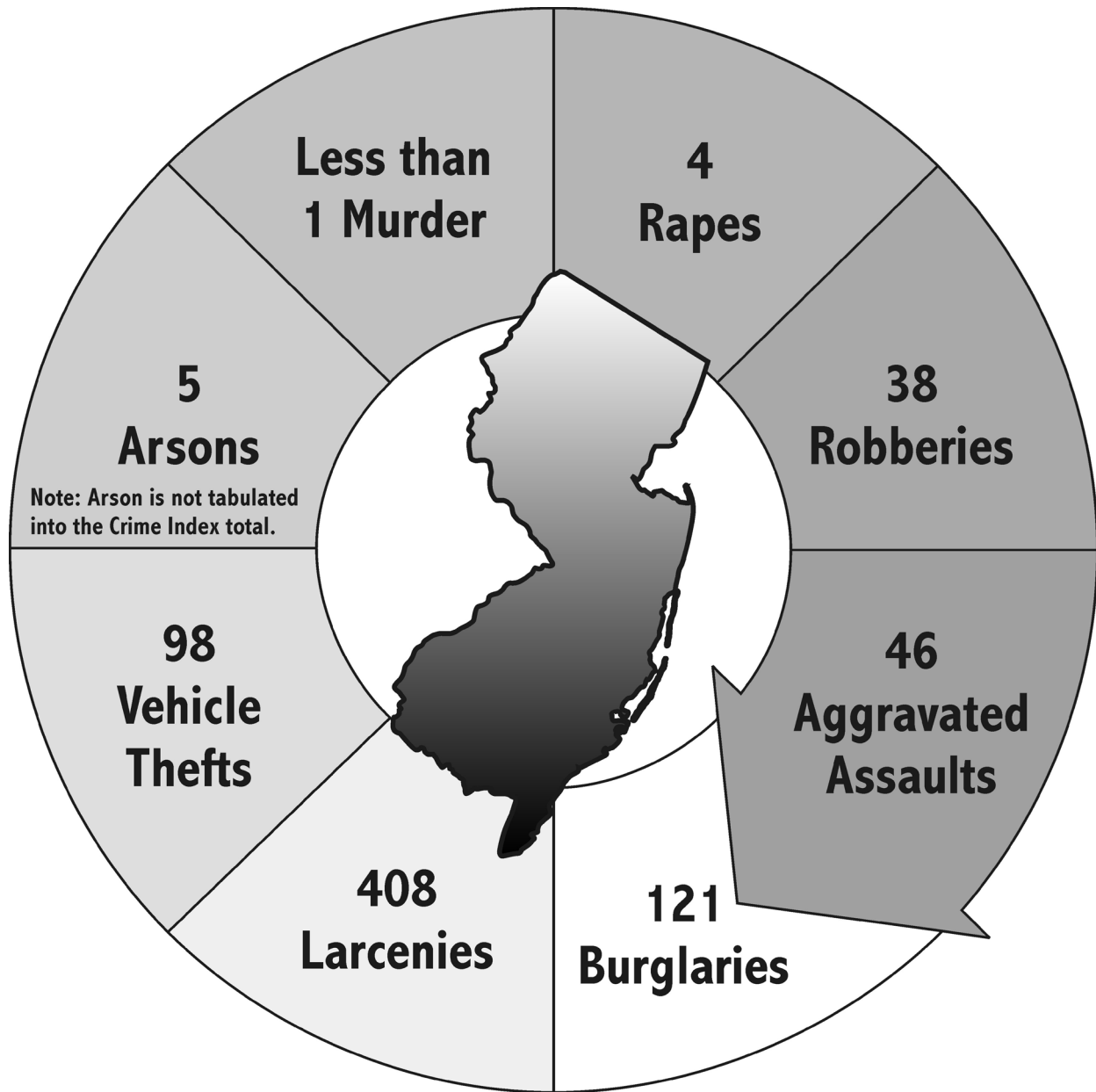


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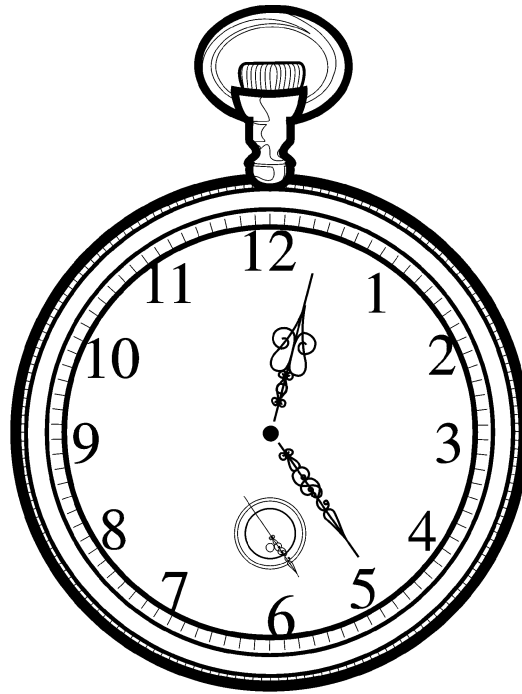

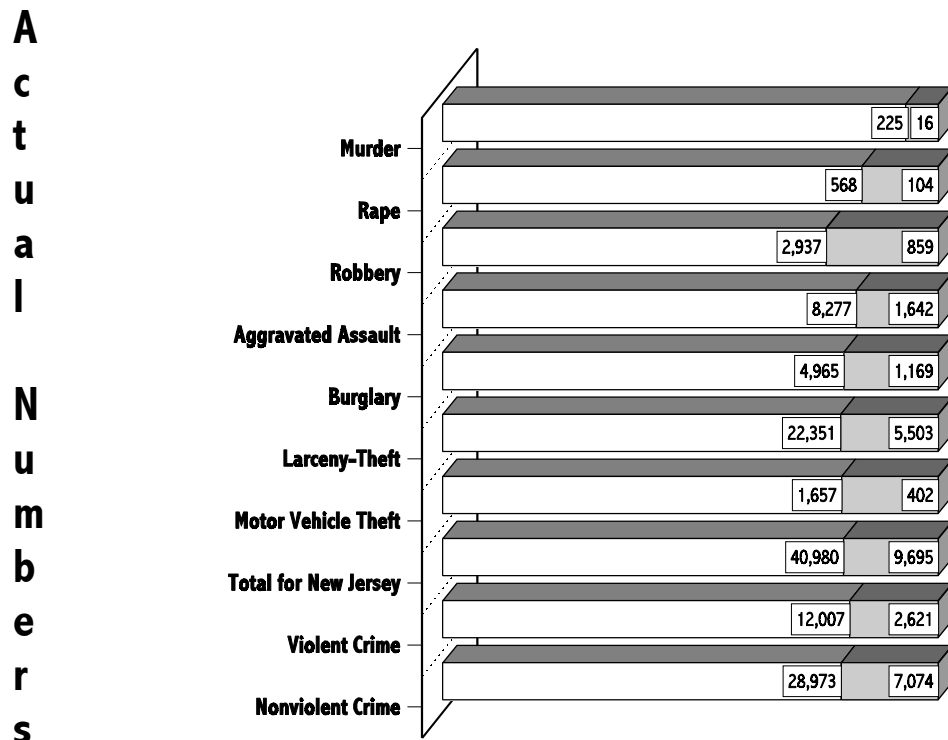

# STATEWIDE CRIME SUMMARY - 2002

## CRIME INDEX – VOLUME/RATE

- There were 261,080 Index offenses in 2002, a four percent decrease compared to 2001.
- The crime rate of the state is 31.0 victims for every 1,000 permanent inhabitants, a decrease of five percent compared to 2001.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- August with 25,220 offenses reported, recorded the highest incidence of Crime Index offenses while February was the lowest with 18,119 offenses.
- The total value of property stolen amounted to \$498.5 million in 2002, a decrease of four percent from 2001.
- Value of property recovered was \$186.7 million, resulting in a recovery rate of 37 percent.
- Stolen motor vehicles accounted for 61 percent of stolen property and 92 percent of the recovered property value.

## CRIME INDEX ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 52,446 persons were arrested for Index offenses, which represents a two percent decrease compared to 2001.
- Adult Index arrests decreased two percent and juvenile Index arrests decreased two percent.
- Crime Index arrests accounted for 13 percent of the total arrests in 2002.
- Males accounted for 74 percent of the Crime Index arrests and females accounted for 26 percent.
- Fifty-eight percent of the Index arrests were white, 40 percent were black and the balance were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 18 percent of the arrests for Index offenses.
- Police cleared 19 percent of the Index offenses and juveniles accounted for 19 percent of those clearances.

# VIOLENT CRIME SUMMARY

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 32,286 violent crimes reported in 2002, a two percent decrease compared to the violent crimes reported in 2001.
- Violent crimes accounted for 12 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The violent crime rate decreased three percent to 3.8 victims for every 1,000 permanent inhabitants.

### **ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS**

- The highest number of violent crimes were reported in July with 3,031 offenses while the lowest number was reported in February with 2,179 offenses.
- The value of property stolen as a result of violent crime was \$11.5 million.

### **ARRESTS/CLEARANCES**

- Arrests for violent crime offenses decreased one percent to 15,604.
- Violent crime arrests accounted for 30 percent of the Index arrests and four percent of the total arrests during the year.
- Adult arrests for violent crime decreased two percent while juvenile arrests decreased less than one-half of one percent.
- Adults accounted for 79 percent of the violent crime arrests while the remaining 21 percent were juveniles.
- Males were responsible for 83 percent and females for 17 percent of the violent crime arrests.
- Fifty percent of those arrested were black, 49 percent were white and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 19 percent of the arrests for violent crimes.
- Forty-five percent of all violent crimes were cleared and juveniles accounted for 18 percent of those clearances.

## **NONVIOLENT CRIME SUMMARY**

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, Larceny-Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft.

### **VOLUME/RATE/TREND**

- There were 228,794 nonviolent crimes reported in 2002, a five percent decrease compared to the 240,244 reported in 2001.
- Nonviolent crime accounted for 88 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The nonviolent crime rate decreased five percent to 27.2 victims per 1,000 inhabitants in 2002.

### **ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS**

- The largest number of nonviolent crimes were reported in August with 22,195, while the lowest number was reported in February with 15,940.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of nonviolent crime amounted to \$487.0 million.

### **ARRESTS/CLEARANCES**

- There were 36,842 nonviolent crime arrests, this represents a decrease of three percent when compared to 2001.
- Nonviolent crime arrests accounted for 70 percent of the Index arrests and nine percent of the total arrests during 2002.
- Juveniles were responsible for 26 percent of the nonviolent crime arrests and adults 74 percent.

- Adult nonviolent crime arrests decreased three percent, while juvenile arrests decreased two percent.
- Males represented 70 percent and females 30 percent of persons arrested for nonviolent crime.
- Sixty-two percent of all persons arrested for nonviolent crimes were white, 36 percent were black and two percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 17 percent of the arrests for nonviolent crimes.
- Sixteen percent of all nonviolent crimes reported were cleared in 2002, and juveniles accounted for 20 percent of those clearances.

## **TOTAL ARREST SUMMARY**

- There were 403,187 persons arrested in 2002, which represents a two percent increase compared to 2001.
- The arrest rate for 2002 increased two percent to 47.9 persons arrested per every 1,000 inhabitants.
- Adult arrests increased two percent to 339,301 and juvenile arrests decreased two percent to 63,886 in 2002.
- Adults accounted for 84 percent and juveniles 16 percent of the total state arrests.
- Persons under 21 years of age accounted for 29 percent of all arrests.
- Males accounted for 79 percent and females 21 percent of the total persons arrested during the year.
- Fifty-eight percent of the total persons arrested in 2002 were white, 41 percent were black and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 15 percent of the arrests.

## **POLICE OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED SUMMARY**

- There were no police officers feloniously killed in the line of duty during 2002.
- New Jersey reported 3,296 police officers assaulted in the line of duty in 2002.

# CRIME IN NEW JERSEY, UNITED STATES AND THE NORTHEAST REGION

- The Crime Index in New Jersey decreased four percent, while the Northeast Region decreased three percent overall. The United States Crime Index decreased by less than one-half of one percent overall.
- Violent crime in New Jersey decreased two percent, while the Northeast Region decreased three percent overall. Violent crime in the United States decreased by one percent overall.
- Nonviolent crime in New Jersey decreased five percent, while the Northeast Region decreased three percent overall. Nonviolent crime in the United States remained virtually the same when compared to the 2001 figure.

# MURDER

## DEFINITION

Murder is defined as the unlawful killing of a human being with malice aforethought. Any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault, or commission of a crime is included. This Index offense is counted by police on the basis of their investigation without regard to findings of a court, jury or the decision of a prosecutor. Attempts to kill, are scored as aggravated assaults and not as murder. Suicides, accidental deaths, negligent manslaughters, and justifiable homicides are not counted, nor reflected in the murder classification.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- In 2002, there were 341 murders reported to law enforcement agencies in the state in 2002, the same amount as reported in 2001.
- Murders accounted for one-tenth of one percent of the reported Index offenses, and one percent of the violent crime.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- The age group of 20-24 accounted for 18 percent of all murder victims.
- Firearms were used in 61 percent of the murders, knives or cutting instruments in 19 percent, blunt objects in seven percent and physical force in eight percent.
- Twenty-nine percent of the offenders were friends or acquaintances of the victim, while 13 percent were relatives, and 16 percent were strangers.
- Felony murders accounted for 11 percent of all murder circumstances. Robbery was the motive in 92 percent of the 37 felony murders.
- Sixty-five murders were recorded on Saturday for the high, while Friday was the lowest, with 37.
- February recorded the highest number of murders, with 34, while June recorded the lowest with 23.
- Forty percent of the murders occurred on highways or streets, 22 percent in multi-family or apartment dwellings, and 20 percent in single family dwellings.
- The total value of property stolen because of murder amounted to \$22,000.
- Drug-related and/or alcohol related arguments accounted for eight percent (26) of all murder circumstances.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 255 persons were arrested for murder in 2002, a two percent decrease compared to 2001.
- Adult murder arrests decreased less than one-half of one percent (from 236 to 235) and juvenile arrests decreased 20 percent (from 25 to 20).
- Sixty-three percent of persons arrested for murder were black, 36 percent were white, and the balance were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 21 percent of the arrests.

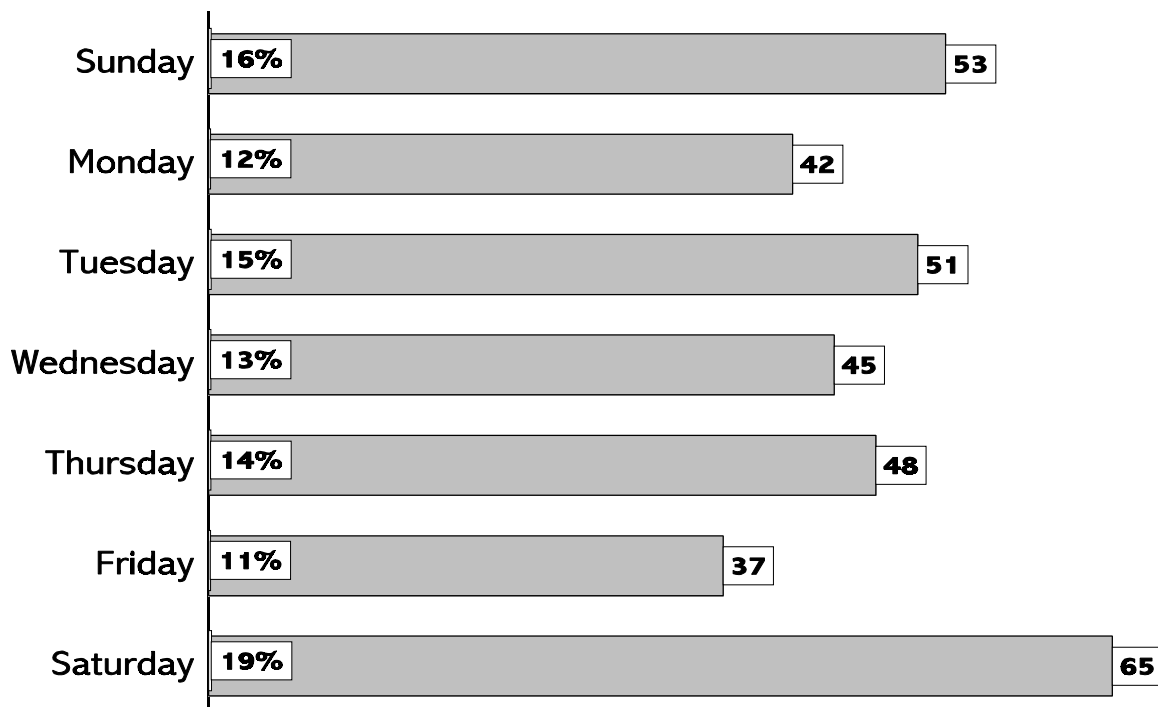
- Seventy-one percent of the murders were cleared in 2002 (241 out of 341). Juveniles accounted for seven percent of those cases cleared.
- Males accounted for 90 percent and females 10 percent of those arrested for murder.

## MURDER BY DAY OF WEEK



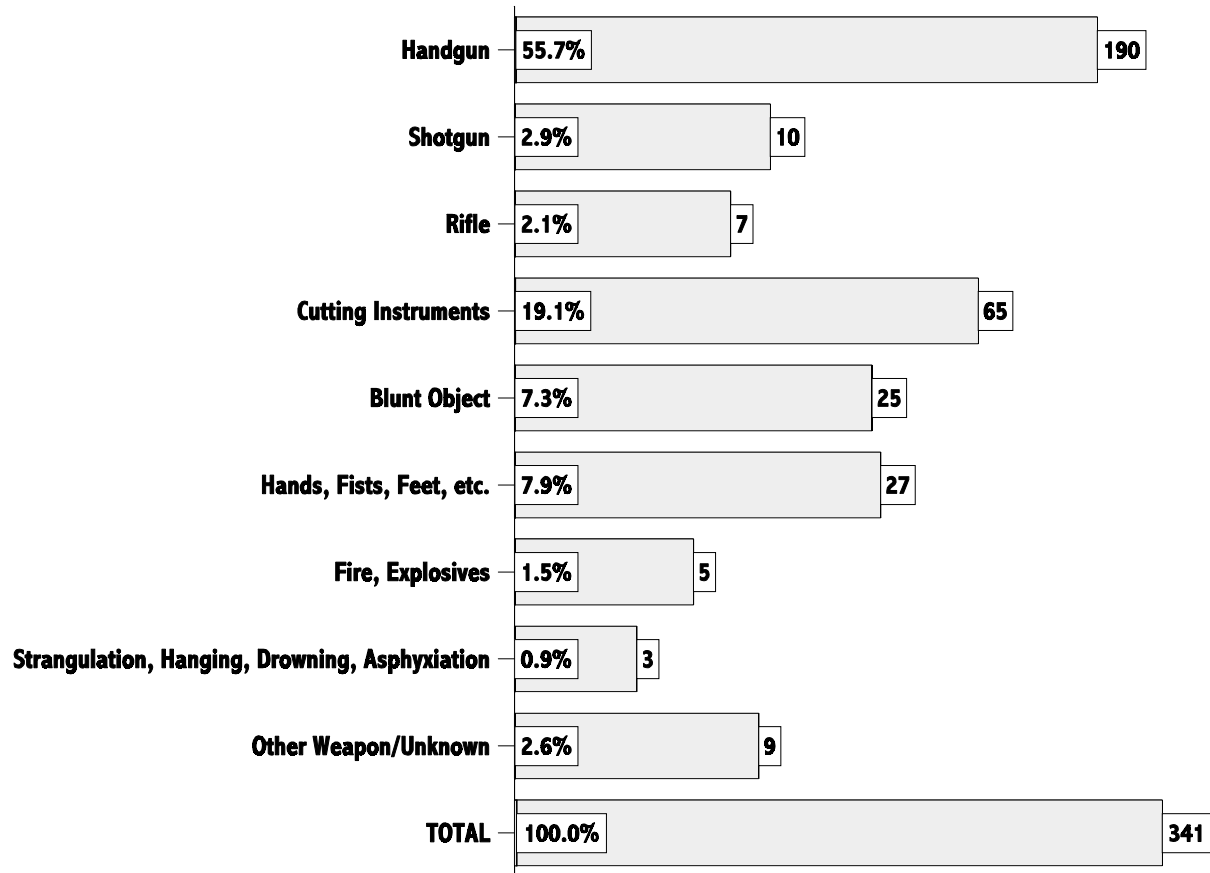

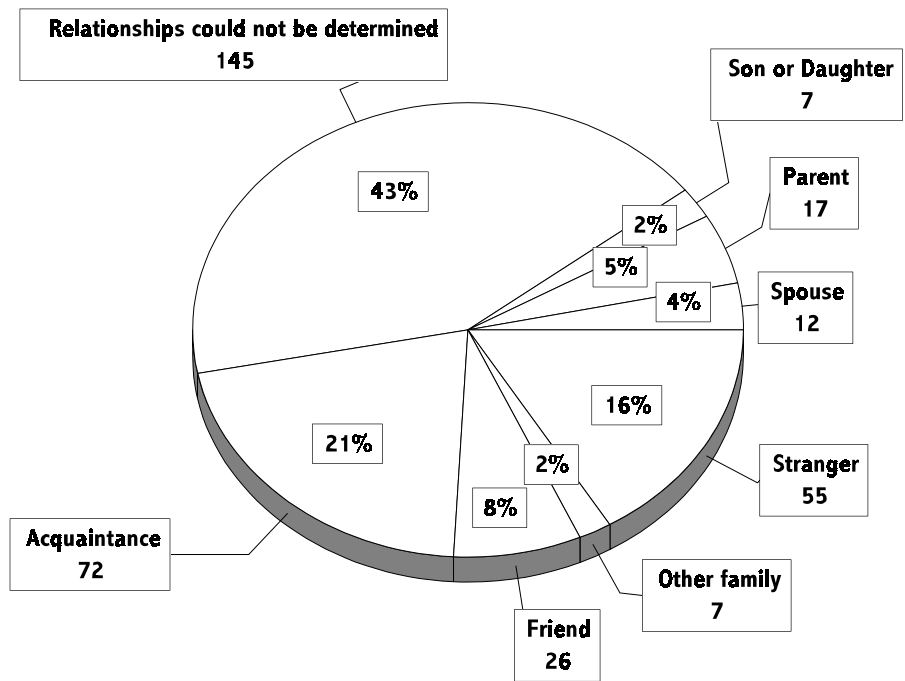

# MURDER — DISTRIBUTION BY TYPE OF WEAPON



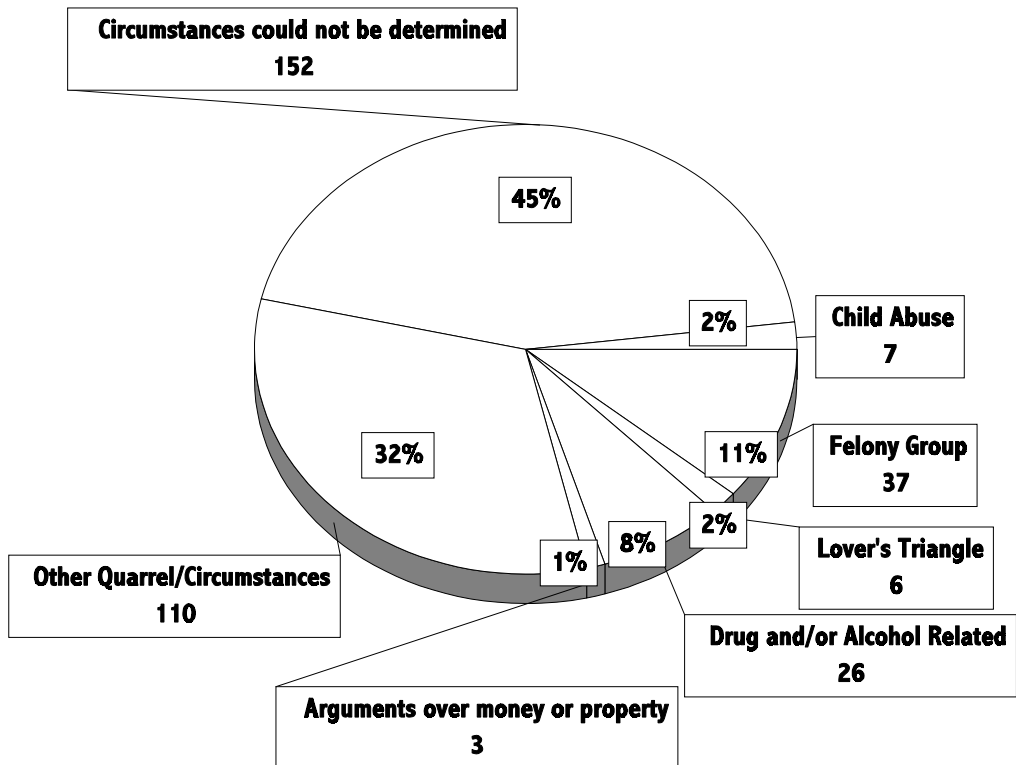

# RELATIONSHIP OF MURDER VICTIMS TO OFFENDER



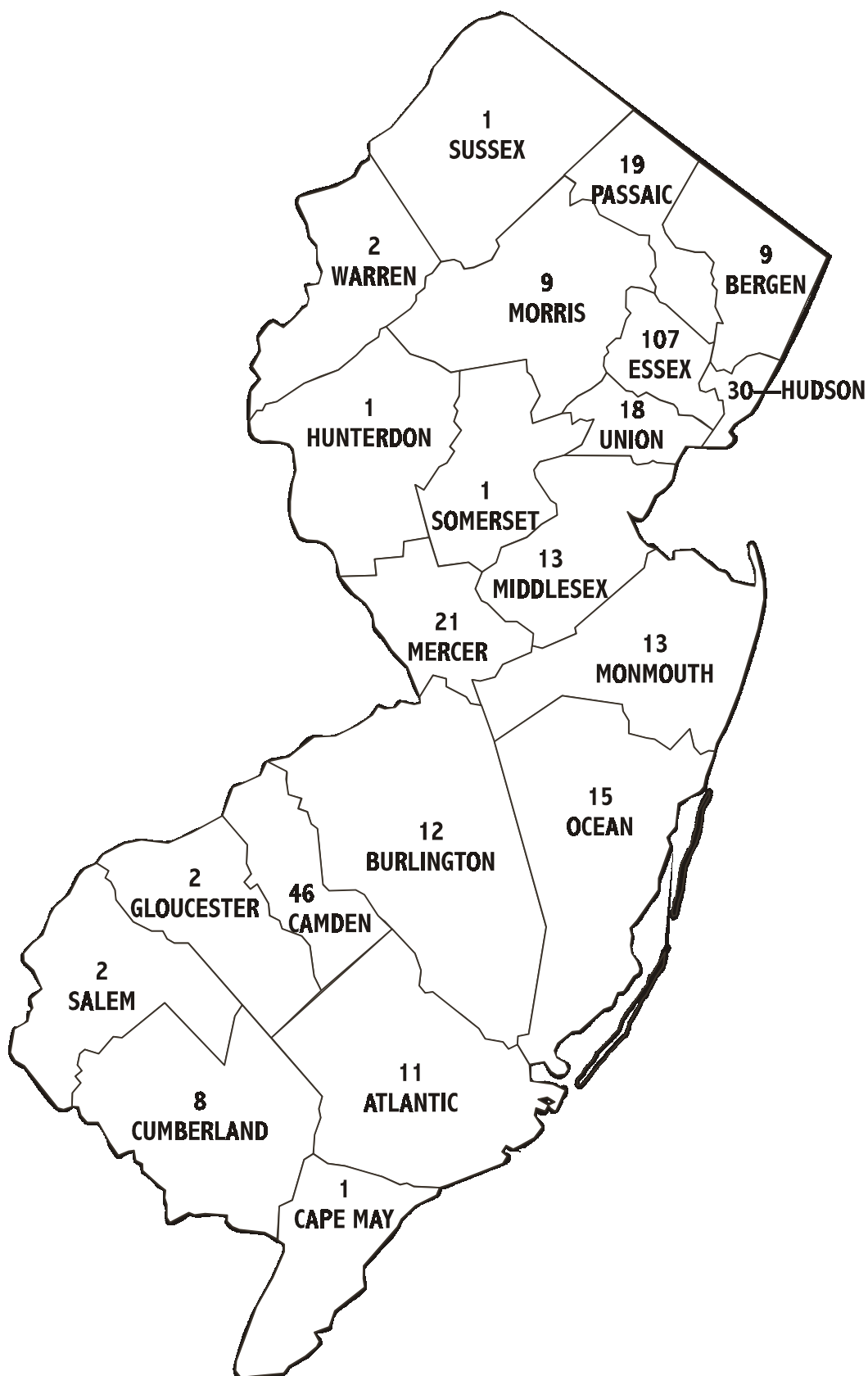

# RAPE

## Definition

Rape is defined as the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. All assaults and attempts to rape are counted, but carnal abuse, rape without force (statutory rape) and other sex offenses are not included.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 1,348 reported rapes in 2002, an increase of six percent compared to the 1,277 in 2001.
- Rape accounted for one-half of one percent of the total Crime Index and four percent of all violent crimes.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Ninety-two percent of the rapes were forcible, the remaining eight percent were attempts to rape.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of rape amounted to \$12,805.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 663 persons were arrested during 2002, a 13 percent increase compared to 2001.
- Adult rape arrests increased nine percent, while juvenile arrests increased 27 percent.
- Fifty-five percent of the arrested perpetrators were white, 44 percent were black and the balance were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 21 percent of the arrests.
- Thirty-one percent of all persons arrested for rape were between 25 and 39.
- Fifty percent of all rape cases were cleared in 2002. Juveniles accounted for 15 percent of those cases cleared.

# ROBBERY

## Definition

Robbery is defined as the felonious and forcible taking of the property of another, against his will, by violence or by putting him in fear. The element of personal confrontation is always present in this crime. Under the program, all assaults or attempts to rob are included.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 13,987 robbery offenses in 2002, a one percent decrease compared to 2001.
- Robbery accounted for five percent of the total Crime Index and 43 percent of all violent crime.
- The robbery rate was 1.7 victims per 1,000 population.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Highway robberies accounted for 62 percent of all reported robberies.
- Bank robberies increased six percent and convenience store robberies increased four percent.
- Total value of property stolen during robberies amounted to \$11,472,084.

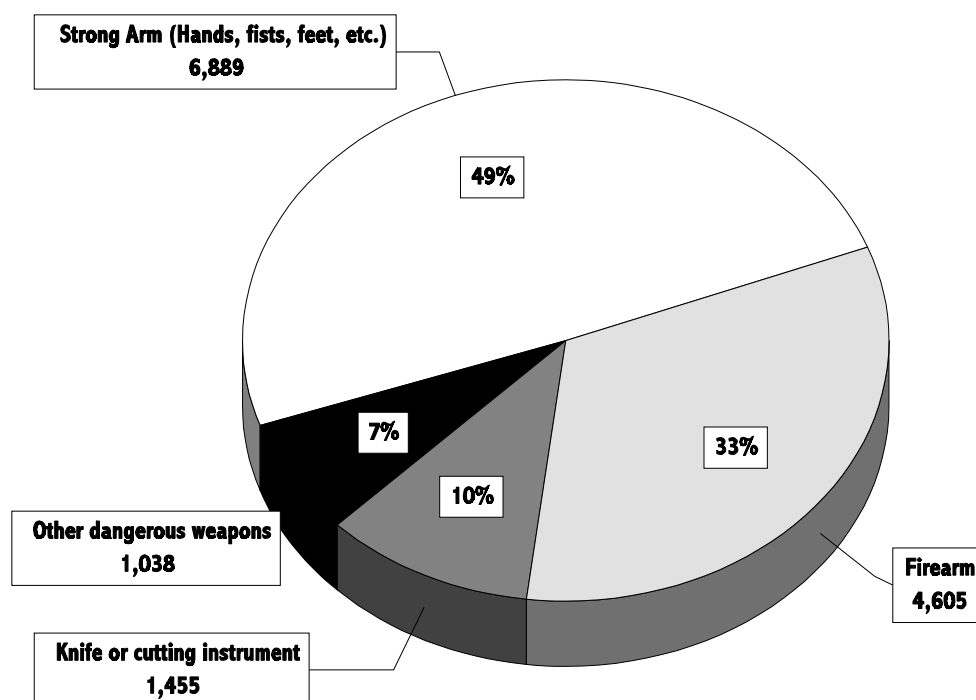
## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 4,269 persons were arrested for robbery in 2002, a five percent increase compared to 2001.
- Adult robbery arrests increased four percent, while juvenile robbery arrests increased eight percent.
- Males accounted for 90 percent and females 10 percent of the robbery arrests during 2002.
- Sixty-one percent of all persons arrested for robbery were black, 38 percent were white and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 18 percent of the robbery arrests.
- Twenty-seven percent of the robbery cases were cleared and juveniles accounted for 23 percent of those clearances.

# CARJACKING

- Carjacking is a form of robbery; therefore, further analysis is provided in this section for 2002.
- There were 452 carjacking offenses reported to the police; 19 were determined to be unfounded, leaving a total of 433 carjackings, involving 515 victims, including passengers.
- Carjackings decreased 10% when comparing 2002 to 2001.
- Eighty-seven of the 566 municipalities in New Jersey reported carjackings.
- Firearms were involved in 52% (224) of all carjackings. Twenty-one percent (47) of the firearms used were assault firearms. Shootings were involved in four percent (18) of all carjackings.
- New Jersey registered vehicles represented 90% (389) of all carjackings. Ford, with 12% (52), was the most frequently carjacked vehicle make, while 2001, with 10% (42), was the most frequently targeted vehicle year.
- Fifty-five percent (236) of all carjacked vehicles were recovered. The average value of a carjacked motor vehicle was \$11,889.
- Carjackings occurred in a residential area 46% (199) of the time. The hours of darkness (6:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.) accounted for 67% (290) of all carjackings.
- Twenty-five percent (109) of all carjackings were witnessed.
- The most frequent victim age group was 20-24, which accounted for 20% (104) of the victim total (515). Seventy-two percent (373) of all victims were male. Fifty-two percent (269) of all victims were white.
- The total number of offenders was 747. Insufficient analysis information was supplied on 22% (161) of the offenders. Of all known offenders (586), 20-24 was the most frequent offender age group and accounted for 44% (259). Ninety-five percent (559) of all known offenders were male. Eighty percent (466) of all known offenders were black.
- Juveniles accounted for 15% (10) of the total arrests for carjacking (65), while adults accounted for 85% (55).
- November had the highest number of offenses with 47 accounting for 11% of all reported carjacking offenses.
- Sunday recorded the highest number of offenses, accounting for 20% (87) of all reported carjackings.
- Region I, which consists of Essex, Hudson, and Union counties, accounted for 66% (286) of all reported carjackings.
- No murders were reported in 2002 as the result of carjacking.
- Eleven percent (46) of all carjackings (433) were cleared by arrest.

# AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

## Definition

Aggravated assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting system, is an attempt or offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do serious physical injury to another. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a firearm, knife, or other weapon is used which could result in serious personal injury if the crime was successfully completed.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 16,610 reported aggravated assaults in 2002, a decrease of four percent when compared to 2001.
- Aggravated assault accounted for six percent of the total Crime Index and 51 percent of all violent crimes.
- The rate for aggravated assault decreased to 2.0 victims per 1,000 population.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Physical force (i.e. hands, fists, and feet) was used in 31 percent, and other dangerous weapons (i.e. clubs, bricks, tire irons, etc.) were used in 33 percent of all reported aggravated assaults.
- Firearms were used in 15 percent of all aggravated assaults committed.

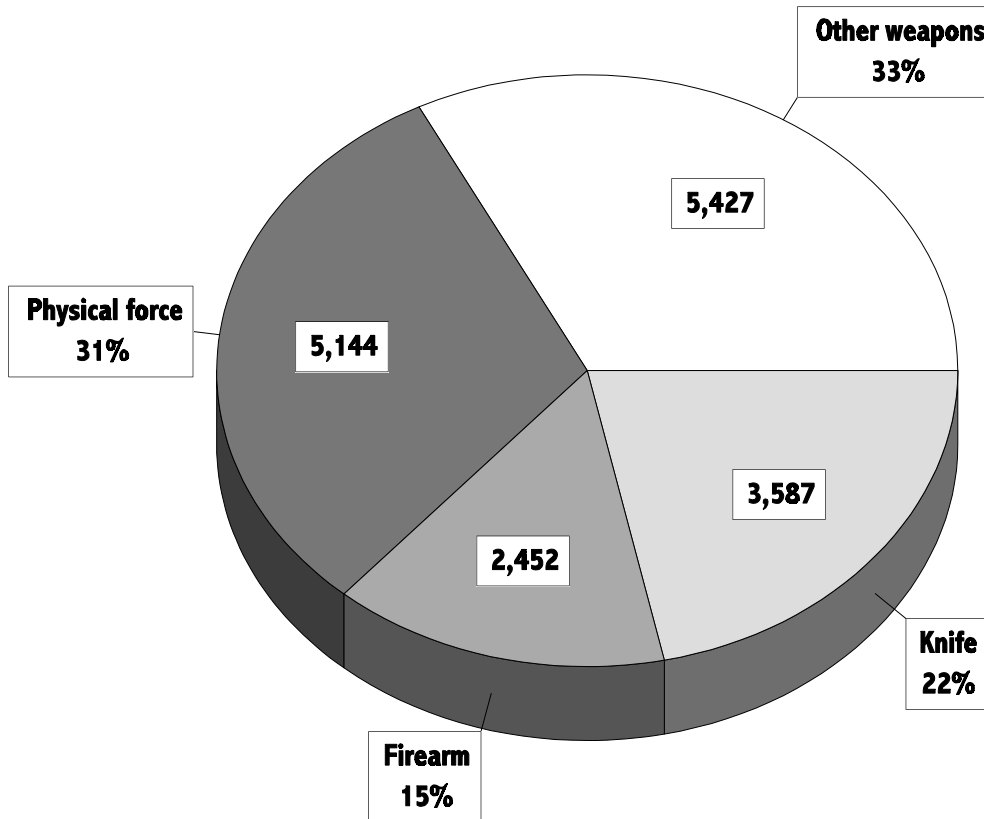
## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- There were 10,417 persons arrested for aggravated assault in 2002, a five percent decrease compared to 2001.
- Adult arrests decreased four percent, while juvenile arrests decreased six percent.
- Males accounted for 80 percent, and females 20 percent of the aggravated assault arrests.
- Fifty-three percent of the persons arrested for aggravated assault were white, 46 percent were black and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 19 percent of the arrests.
- Sixty percent of all aggravated assault cases were cleared; juveniles accounted for 17 percent of those clearances.

# BURGLARY

## Definition

Under this program, burglary is defined as an unlawful entry or attempted entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny. Data collection for this offense is further categorized as forcible entry, unlawful entry (where no force is used) and attempted forcible entry.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 44,035 reported burglary offenses in 2002, a decrease of six percent.
- Burglary accounted for 17 percent of the total Crime Index and 19 percent of all nonviolent crimes.
- The burglary rate per 1,000 population decreased seven percent to 52 in 2002.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Sixty-three percent of all burglaries involved forcible entry, 26 percent were unlawful entry where no force was used and the remaining 11 percent were attempts to forcibly enter, during 2002.
- Residences were targets in 68 percent of the reported burglaries.
- Fifty-four percent of the nonresidential burglaries are known to have occurred between the hours of 6:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.
- Stolen property as a result of burglary statewide, amounted to \$64.3 million, for an average loss of \$1,460.
- The average loss as a result of residential burglaries was 1,377 and of nonresidential burglaries was 1,638.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Burglary arrests decreased less than one-half of one percent with 6,672 persons arrested.
- Adult arrests decreased two percent while juvenile arrests increased five percent.
- Males accounted for 91 percent, and females nine percent of the burglary arrests.
- Juveniles accounted for 30 percent of all burglary arrests.
- Sixty-four percent of burglary arrests were white, 35 percent were black and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 17 percent of the arrests.
- Fourteen percent of the burglaries statewide were cleared and juveniles accounted for 19 percent of those clearances.

# LARCENY-THEFT

## Definition

The definition of larceny-theft, as provided under this program, is the taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership. All larcenies and thefts resulting from pocketpicking, purse-snatching, shoplifting, larcenies from motor vehicles, thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc., are included here. Embezzlement, unlawful conversions, larceny by bailee, frauds or bad checks are not included.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 148,918 larcenies reported in 2002, a decrease of four percent compared to the 155,825 in 2001.
- Larceny accounted for 57 percent of the total Crime Index and 65 percent of all nonviolent crimes.
- The rate for larceny decreased to 17.7 victims per 1000 population in 2002.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Thefts of motor vehicle parts and accessories and thefts from motor vehicles, collectively accounted for 29 percent of all larceny-thefts reported.
- Thefts From Buildings decreased nine percent in 2002, when compared to 2001.
- Pocket-picking decreased three percent in 2002, when compared to 2001.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Larceny-theft arrests decreased four percent in 2002, with 28,591 persons arrested.
- Juvenile arrests decreased five percent and adult arrests decreased three percent in 2002.
- Males accounted for 64 percent, and females 36 percent of the larceny arrests.
- Sixty-two percent of all persons arrested for larceny were white, 36 percent were black and two percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 18 percent of the arrests.
- Nineteen percent of the larcenies were cleared, with juveniles accounting for 20 percent of those clearances.

# MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

## Definition

In Uniform Crime Reporting, motor vehicle theft includes all thefts and attempted thefts of a motor vehicle. This includes the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle which is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the surface and not on the rails. This definition excludes taking a motor vehicle for temporary use, such as family situation, or unauthorized use by others having lawful access to the vehicle. The motor vehicle theft category includes the subheadings of autos, trucks and buses, and other vehicles (motorcycles, mopeds, etc.)

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 35,841 motor vehicle thefts reported in 2002, a decrease of five percent compared to the 37,651 in 2001.
- Motor vehicle theft accounted for 14 percent of the total Crime Index and 16 percent of all nonviolent crimes.
- The motor vehicle theft rate of 4.3 victims per 1,000 population represents a decrease of four percent when compared to 2001.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Motor vehicles represented 61 percent of the total value of property stolen during 2002.
- Total value of stolen motor vehicles amounted to \$304.2 million during the year.
- The average value of a stolen motor vehicle was \$8,487.
- Recovered vehicle values totaling \$172.2 million represent 92 percent of the total value of recovered property.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

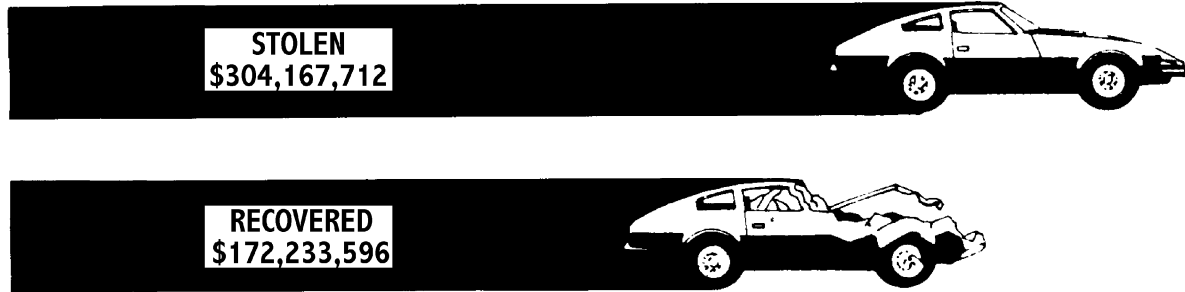
- A total of 1,579 persons were arrested for motor vehicle theft, this represents an increase of 10 percent compared to 2001.
- Juvenile arrests increased 14 percent and adult arrests increased eight percent.
- Males accounted for 89 percent, and females 11 percent of the motor vehicle theft arrests.
- Fifty-five percent of all persons arrested for motor vehicle theft were white, and 44 percent were black and the balance were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 17 percent of the arrests.
- Six percent of motor vehicle thefts were cleared in 2002; juveniles accounted for 20 percent of those clearances.

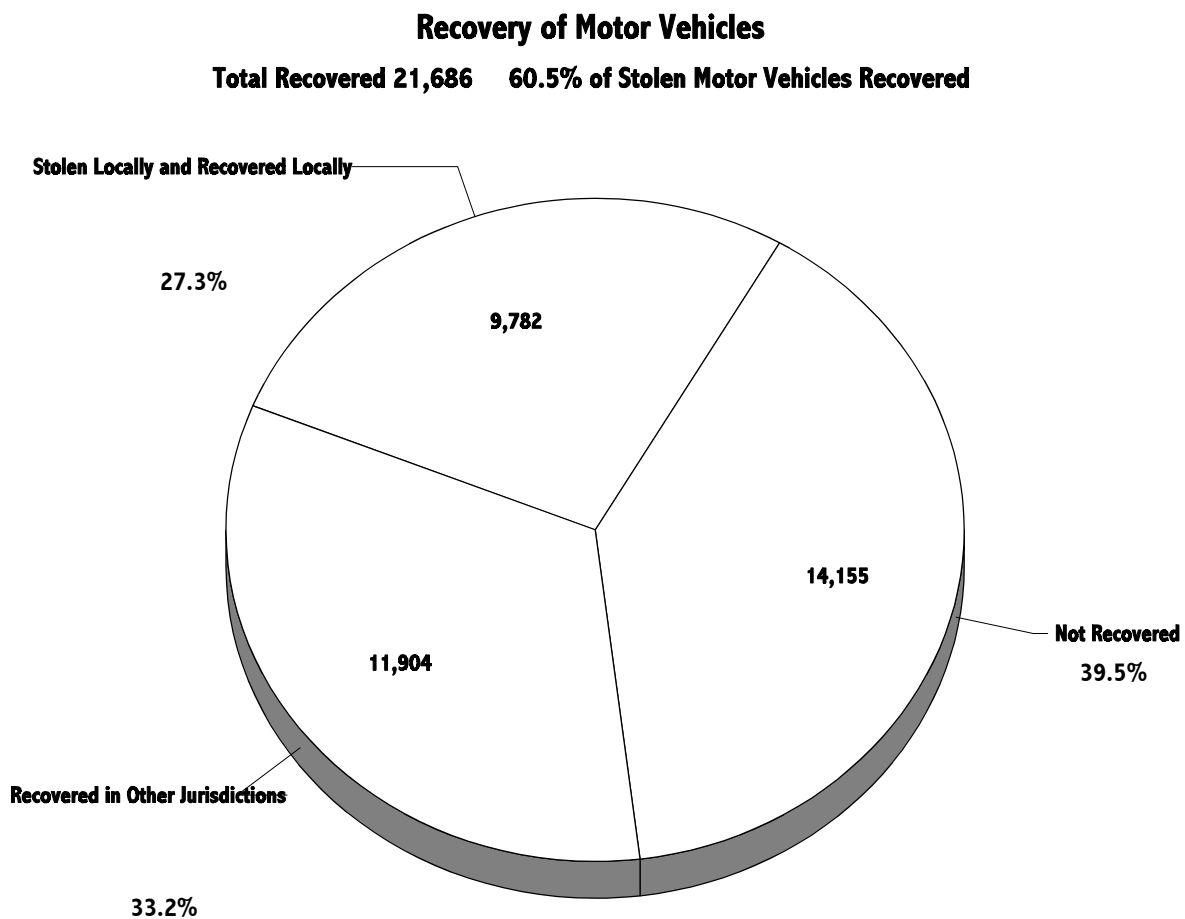


# MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT VALUES

# ARSON

## Definition

Arson is defined by the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting program as any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling, house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arsons. Fires of suspicious or unknown origins are excluded.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 1,835 reportable arsons in 2002, which represents a decrease of 16 percent compared to 2,196 in 2001.
- The arson rate dropped to 0.2 victims per 1,000 population, a decrease of 33 percent compared to 2001.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Forty-one percent of the arsons were structures, with residences accounting for 25 percent.
- Mobile property, including motor vehicles, accounted for 39 percent of the arsons in the state.
- Other property (timber, crops, etc.) accounted for 20 percent of the reported arsons.
- The total value of property damage due to arson amounted to \$27.6 million for an average dollar value loss of \$15,050.
- The average residential loss was \$29,228 while the average loss to industrial/commercial structures was \$61,466.
- The average loss to mobile property was \$6,210.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Arson arrests numbered 457 in 2002, representing a nine percent decrease.
- Adult arrests decreased 15 percent while juvenile arrests decreased three percent.
- Males accounted for 87 percent, and females 13 percent of the arson arrests.
- Juveniles accounted for 59 percent of the arson arrests.
- Seventy-one percent of the persons arrested for arson were white, 27 percent were black and two percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 11 percent of the arrests.
- The arson clearance rate was 22 percent, and juveniles accounted for 46 percent of those clearances.

# ARREST SUMMARY FOR NON-INDEX OFFENSES

## MANSLAUGHTER

### Definition

The unlawful killing of a human being, by another, through gross negligence. Arrests relating to traffic fatalities are included.

- There were 28 arrests reported by law enforcement agencies for manslaughter during the year, a decrease of 15 percent when compared to 2001.
- Adults accounted for 89 percent and juveniles accounted for 11 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 96 percent of the arrests and females four percent.
- Fifty-four percent of the persons arrested were white, 43 percent were black, and the balance were other races.
- The hispanic ethnic origin accounted for seven percent of the arrests and 93 percent were non-hispanic.

## SIMPLE ASSAULT

### Definition

Simple assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is an assault or an attempted assault where no weapon is used and which does not result in serious or aggravated injury to the victim.

- There were 32,428 simple assault arrests in 2002, representing a decrease of two percent when compared to 2001.
- Of the total, 19 percent were juveniles and 81 percent were adults.
- Males accounted for 74 percent and females 26 percent of the persons arrested for simple assault.
- Sixty-three percent of the persons arrested were white, 36 percent were black, and one percent were other races.
- Seventeen percent of the persons arrested were hispanic and 83 percent were not of hispanic origin.

## ARSON

### Definition

Under this program, arson is defined as the willful or malicious burning, or attempting to burn, with or without intent to defraud; a dwelling, house, building, ship or vessel, motor vehicle or aircraft, contents of building, personal property of another, etc..

- There were 457 arrests reported for arson offenses, a nine percent decrease compared to 2001.
- Juveniles accounted for 59 percent and adults 41 percent of persons arrested for arson.
- Eighty-seven percent of the total arson arrests were males while 13 percent were females.
- Seventy-one percent of the persons arrested were white, 27 percent were black, and two percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 11 percent of those arrested and non-hispanics accounted for 89 percent.

# FORGERY AND COUNTERFEITING

## Definition

The definition of forgery and counterfeiting is the making, altering, uttering or possessing or attempting to make, alter, utter or possess, with intent to defraud, anything false which is made to appear true.

- There were 2,084 arrests reported during the year for forgery or counterfeiting, a 16 percent increase compared to 2001.
- Adults accounted for 96 percent and juveniles accounted for four percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 71 percent of the arrests and females 29 percent.
- Sixty-three percent of the persons arrested were white, 35 percent were black, and two percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 25 percent of the arrests and 75 percent were non-hispanic.

# FRAUD

## Definition

In Uniform Crime Reporting, fraud is the fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. This includes bad checks, confidence games, etc., except forgeries and counterfeiting.

- There were 5,732 arrests reported during the year for fraud, a five percent decrease compared to 2001.
- Adult arrests represented 98 percent and juveniles two percent of the persons arrested.
- Males accounted for 63 percent and females 37 percent of the persons arrested for fraud.
- Sixty-six percent of the persons arrested were white, 31 percent were black, and three percent were other races.
- Thirteen percent of the persons arrested were hispanic and 87 percent were not of hispanic origin.

# EMBEZZLEMENT

## Definition

The definition of embezzlement is the misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.

- There were 186 persons arrested for embezzlement, a 20 percent increase compared to 2001.
- Ninety-two percent of those persons arrested were adults and eight percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 63 percent and females 37 percent of the persons arrested for embezzlement.
- Sixty-five percent of the persons arrested were white, and 31 percent were black, and the four percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 22 percent of those arrested and non-hispanics accounted for 78 percent.

# STOLEN PROPERTY

## (Buying, Receiving, Possessing)

### Definition

Included in this class are all offenses of buying, receiving, and possessing stolen property, as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.

- In 2002, there were 6,986 arrests reported for stolen property, a decrease of 10 percent compared to 2001.
- Of the total, 72 percent were adults and 28 percent were juveniles.
- Eighty-five percent were males and 15 percent were females.
- Fifty-seven percent of the persons arrested were black, 42 percent were white, and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 20 percent of the arrests and 80 percent were non-hispanic.

# CRIMINAL/MALICIOUS MISCHIEF

### Definition

Criminal/Malicious mischief is defined as the willful destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of property without consent of the owner or persons having custody or control.

- There were 8,233 arrests for criminal/malicious mischief, a decrease of one percent compared to 2001.
- Of the total, 52 percent were adults and 48 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 86 percent and females 14 percent of the arrests.
- Seventy-three percent of the persons arrested were white, 26 percent were black, and one percent were other races.
- Fourteen percent of the persons arrested were hispanic and non-hispanics accounted for 86 percent.

# WEAPONS: CARRYING, POSSESSING, etc.

### Definition

Under this program, this offense includes all the violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing, and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers, and attempts.

- There were 5,759 arrests reported for weapon offenses, an increase of seven percent when compared to 2001.
- Of the total, 71 percent were adults and 29 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 91 percent and females 9 percent of those arrested.
- Fifty-two percent of the persons arrested were black, 47 percent were white, and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 17 percent of those arrested and 83 percent were non-hispanic.

# PROSTITUTION AND COMMERCIALIZED VICE

## Definition

Prostitution and commercialized vice are sex offenses of a commercialized nature and attempts. Included in this category are prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, procuring or transporting women for immoral purposes, etc..

- There were 2,744 prostitution and commercialized vice arrests during 2002, representing an increase of 33 percent when compared to 2001.
- Adults accounted for 99 percent, and juveniles one percent of the arrests.
- Thirty-four percent were males and 66 percent were females.
- Fifty-seven percent of the persons arrested were white, 39 percent were black, and four percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 24 percent of those arrested and 76 percent were non-hispanic.

# SEX OFFENSES

## Definition

Sex offenses, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Program, do not include rape, prostitution and commercialized vice. Included in this class are offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like; attempts are also included.

- There were 2,105 sex offense arrests during 2002, representing a increase of eight percent when compared to 2001.
- Adults accounted for 78 percent, and juveniles 22 percent of the arrests.
- Ninety-seven percent were males and three percent were females.
- Sixty-eight percent of the persons arrested were white, 29 percent were black, and three percent were other races.
- Twenty-five percent of the persons arrested were hispanic and 75 percent were not of hispanic origin.

# DRUG ABUSE VIOLATIONS

## Definition

Under the program, drug abuse violations are defined as the unlawful sale/manufacturing/possession/use of the below listed narcotics and drugs:

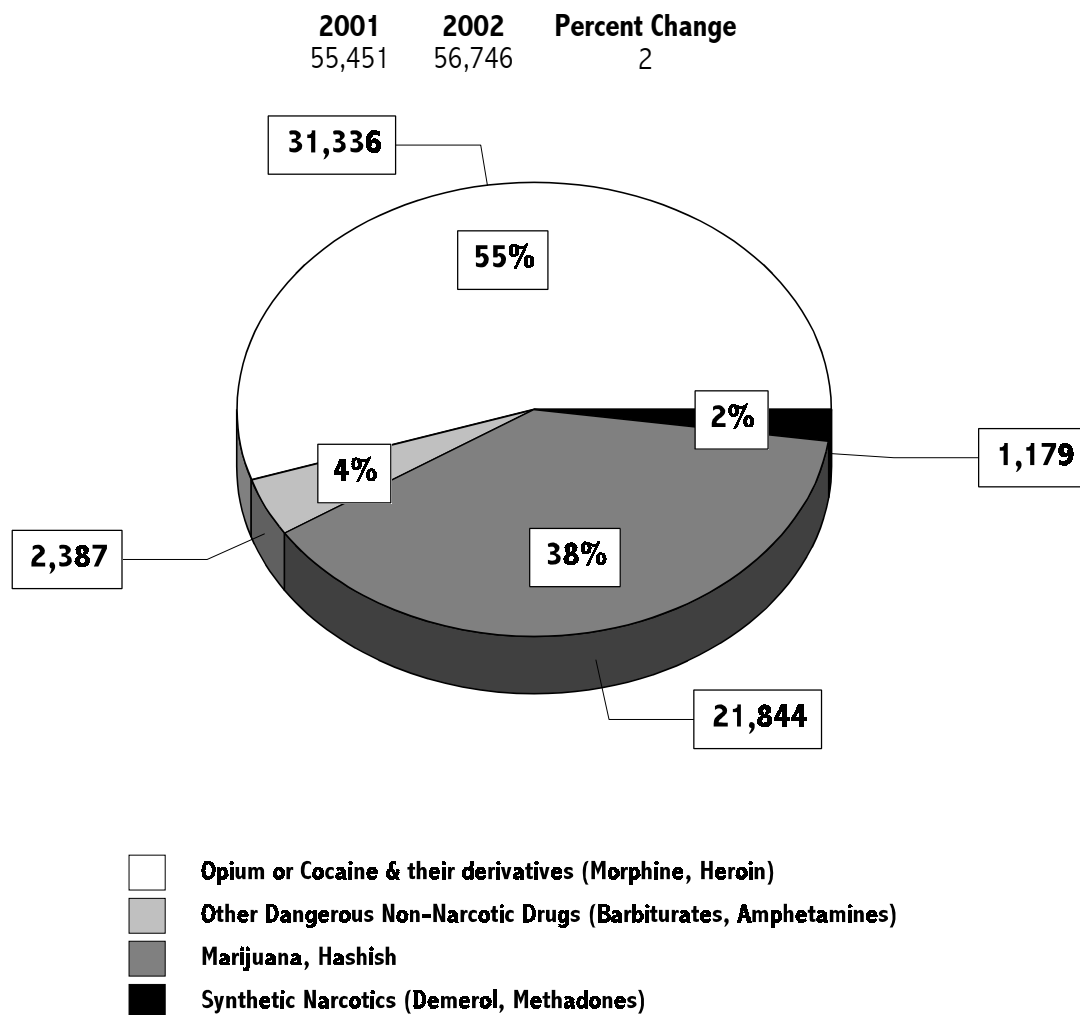
- a. Opium or Cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine).
- b. Marijuana, hashish, etc.
- c. Synthetic narcotics—manufactured narcotics which can cause true drug addiction—(demerol, methadones).
- d. Other—dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, amphetamines, hallucinogens).

- There were 56,746 arrests reported by the law enforcement agencies of the state for drug abuse violations, an increase of two percent when compared to 2001.
- Adults accounted for 87 percent and juveniles 13 percent of the arrests.

- Thirty-five percent of persons arrested for drug abuse violations were under the age of 21.
- Males accounted for 85 percent of all the arrests while females accounted for the remaining 15 percent.
- Fifty-one percent of the persons arrested were white, 49 percent were black, and less than one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 13 percent of those arrested and 87 percent were non-hispanic.
- Arrests for possession/use of drugs accounted for 69 percent of the arrests, and the remaining 31 percent were for the sale/manufacturing of drugs.
- Arrests for opium or cocaine and their derivatives represented 45 percent of the possession/use category and 77 percent of the sale/manufacturing category. Overall, they accounted for 55 percent of the total drug abuse violation arrests.

## TOTAL ARRESTS FOR ALL DRUG ABUSE VIOLATIONS

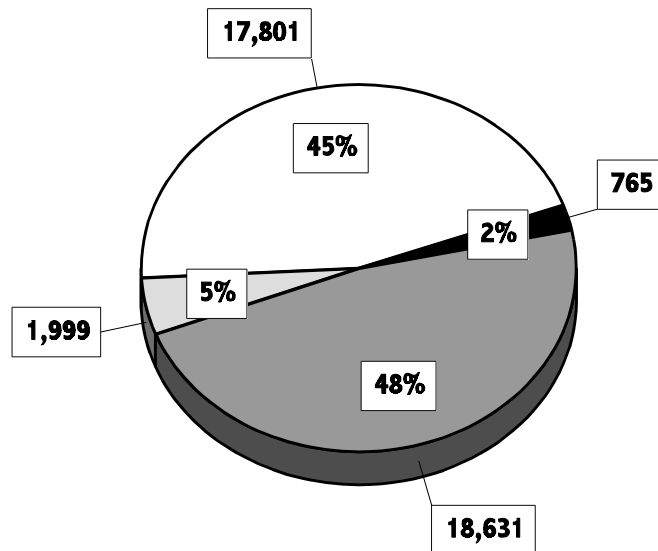

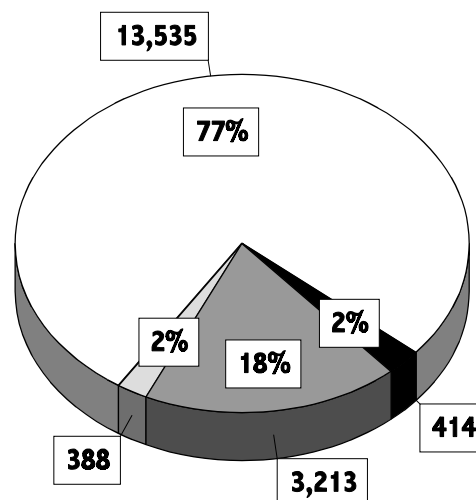

# GAMBLING

## Definition

Gambling violations are defined as the promoting, permitting or engaging in illegal gambling.

- There were 715 gambling arrests reported during 2002, resulting in a decrease of 23 percent compared to 2001.
- Eighty-seven percent of the arrests were adults and 13 percent were juveniles.
- Males represented 88 percent and females 12 percent of the gambling arrests.
- Sixty-two percent of the persons arrested were black, 34 percent were white, and four percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 17 percent of the arrests and 83 percent were non-hispanic.

# OFFENSES AGAINST FAMILY AND CHILDREN

## Definition

The definition of offenses against family and children is the nonsupport, neglect, desertion or abuse of family and children.

- There were 16,370 arrests for offenses against family and children during 2002, representing a decrease of less than one-half of one percent from 2001.
- Less than one-half of one percent of the arrests were juveniles, and nearly 100 percent were adults.
- Males accounted for 88 percent and females 12 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-three percent of the persons arrested were white, 47 percent were black, and less than one-half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 11 percent of the arrests and 89 percent were not of hispanic origin.

# DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE

## Definition

Under the New Jersey Crime Reporting Program, the offense of driving under the influence is defined as the driving or operating of any motor vehicle while drunk or under the influence of alcohol or narcotics.

- There were 28,139 arrests reported for driving under the influence in 2002, a decrease of three percent compared to 2001.
- Ninety-nine percent of the arrests were adults and only one percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 83 percent of the arrests while females accounted for the remaining 17 percent.
- Eighty-eight percent of the persons arrested were white, 10 percent were black, and two percent were other races.
- Sixteen percent of the persons arrested were hispanic and 84 percent were non-hispanic.

# LIQUOR LAWS

## Definition

Included in this category are state or local liquor law violations, with the exception of “driving under the influence.”

- There were 10,926 arrests reported for liquor law violations, a decrease of five percent from the previous year.
- Adults were responsible for 72 percent of the arrests while the remaining 28 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 78 percent of the liquor law arrests while females accounted for the remaining 22 percent.
- Eighty-seven percent of the persons arrested were white, 12 percent were black, and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 9 percent of those arrested and 91 percent were not of hispanic origin.

# DISORDERLY CONDUCT

## Definition

In this category are placed all charges of committing a breach of the peace (disorderly person).

- There were 23,814 arrests reported for disorderly conduct, a decrease of four percent from the previous year.
- Adults were responsible for 73 percent of the arrests while the remaining 27 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 79 percent of the disorderly conduct arrests while females accounted for the remaining 21 percent.
- Sixty-one percent of the persons arrested were white, 38 percent were black, and the balance were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 15 percent of those arrested and 85 percent were not of hispanic origin.

# VAGRANCY

## Definition

In this category are persons charged with vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc..

- There were 2,237 arrests in this category, an increase of nine percent from the previous year.
- Adults were responsible for 95 percent of the arrests while the remaining five percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 67 percent and females accounted for the remaining 33 percent of arrests in this category.
- Fifty-seven percent of the persons arrested were black, 42 percent were white, and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 15 percent of those arrested and 85 percent were not of hispanic origin.

# ALL OTHER OFFENSES

## Definition

Included in this category are all violations of state and local laws, except those offenses that can be categorized into one of the specific crime classifications previously mentioned.

- There were 134,797 arrests reported for all other offenses, an increase of seven percent from the previous year.
- Adults were responsible for 94 percent of the arrests while the remaining six percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 81 percent of the arrests while females accounted for the remaining 19 percent.
- Fifty-three percent of the persons arrested were white, 46 percent were black, and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 14 percent of those arrested and 86 percent were not of hispanic origin.

# CURFEW AND LOITERING LAW VIOLATIONS

## Definition

In this category are juvenile arrests made for violations of local curfew or loitering ordinances.

- There were 5,688 arrests reported for curfew and loitering law violations, an increase of three percent from the previous year.
- Males accounted for 75 percent and females accounted for the remaining 25 percent.
- Fifty-seven percent of the persons arrested were black, 43 percent were white, and less than one half of one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 26 percent of those arrested and 74 percent were not of hispanic origin.

# RUNAWAYS

## Definition

For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, this category is limited to juveniles taken into protective custody, under provisions of local statutes, as runaways.

- There were 4,567 runaway arrests reported, an increase of five percent from the previous year.
- Females accounted for 59 percent of the arrests while males accounted for the remaining 41 percent.
- Fifty-three percent of the persons arrested were black, 46 percent were white, and one percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 22 percent of those arrested and 78 percent were not of hispanic origin.

- The crime rate was recorded at 35.1 victims for every 1,000 inhabitants, a decrease of nine percent compared to the previous year.
- Murder decreased 34 percent while rape increased 30 percent.
- Total value of property stolen in Passaic County amounted to \$30.7 million, of which 47 percent was recovered.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- There were 21,626 persons arrested during the year, an increase of 11 percent when compared to 2001.
- Adult arrests increased 10 percent and juvenile arrests increased 16 percent, when compared to 2001.
- The total clearance rate for Index offenses was 17 percent; juveniles were responsible for 17 percent of those cases cleared.

# SALEM COUNTY

## VOLUME/RATE

- During 2002 there were 1,710 Index crimes reported to law enforcement agencies of the county, representing a nine percent increase compared to the previous year.
- Violent crime increased 41 percent and nonviolent crime recorded a five percent increase compared to the previous year.
- For every 1,000 persons 26.6 were victims of Index offenses, a nine percent increase compared to 2001.
- Rape decreased 36 percent while aggravated assault increased 34 percent.
- The dollar loss of stolen property amounted to \$1.6 million; the recovery rate was 26 percent.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Police arrested 4,725 persons for criminal offenses during the calendar year 2002, a four percent decrease compared to the previous year.
- Adult arrests decreased four percent and juvenile arrests decreased five percent.
- The total clearance rate for Index offenses was 26 percent; juveniles were responsible for 28 percent of those cases cleared.

# SOMERSET COUNTY

## VOLUME/RATE

- Agencies reported 5,311 Index offenses in 2002, a less than one-half of one percent decrease when compared to 2001.
- Violent crimes increased six percent while the nonviolent crime category decreased one percent.
- The crime rate per 1,000 inhabitants was 17.9, the same as the previous year.
- Rape decreased 19 percent and motor vehicle theft decreased 14 percent.
- The dollar loss from the commission of Index crimes totaled \$11.7 million, with 29 percent being recovered.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Total arrests for 2002 were 8,037 persons, a four percent increase compared to the previous year.
- Adult arrests increased six percent and juvenile arrests reflected a three percent decrease.
- The total clearance rate for Index offenses was 20 percent; juveniles were responsible for 22 percent of those cases cleared.

# SUSSEX COUNTY

## VOLUME/RATE

- Law enforcement agencies reported 1,661 Index offenses during the year, a decrease of 12 percent.
- Violent crime increased 22 percent while the nonviolent crime group decreased 14 percent.
- For every 1,000 inhabitants, 11.5 were victims of crime.
- Burglary decreased two percent while aggravated assault increased 36 percent.
- Property stolen as a result of Index crimes amounted to \$1.9 million, of which 21 percent was recovered.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- There were 4,885 persons arrested during the year, a seven percent increase when compared to 2001.
- Adult arrests increased nine percent and juvenile arrests increased one percent.
- The total clearance rate for Index offenses was 26 percent; juveniles were responsible for 21 percent of those cases cleared.

- During 2002 there were 19,547 Index crimes reported, representing a decrease of three percent compared to 2001.
- The category of violent crime showed an increase of one percent and the category of nonviolent crime showed a decrease of four percent.
- A victimization rate of 37.4 persons per 1,000 inhabitants reflected a three percent decrease over 2001.
- Murder decreased 10 percent while rape increased 60 percent.
- Total stolen property values amounted to \$50.5 million during the year; of this total, 56 percent was recovered.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Total arrests for 2002 were 21,917 persons, a two percent increase compared to the previous year.
- Adult arrests increased five percent and juvenile arrests reflected a 10 percent decrease.
- The total clearance rate for Index offenses was 15 percent; juveniles were responsible for 17 percent of those cases cleared.

# WARREN COUNTY

## VOLUME/RATE

- Agencies reported 1,584 Index offenses in 2002, a seven percent decrease when compared to 2001.
- Violent crimes decreased five percent and the nonviolent crime category decreased seven percent.
- The crime rate per 1,000 inhabitants was 15.5 a decrease of seven percent.
- Burglary decreased nine percent and larceny-theft decreased six percent.
- The dollar loss from the commission of Index crimes totaled \$1.6 million, with 28 percent being recovered.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Total arrests for 2002 were 3,989 persons, a seven percent increase compared to the previous year.
- Adult arrests increased seven percent and juvenile arrests reflected a five percent increase.
- The total clearance rate for Index offenses was 27 percent; juveniles were responsible for 23 percent of those cases cleared.

# CRIME INDEX FOR POPULATION GROUPS – 2002

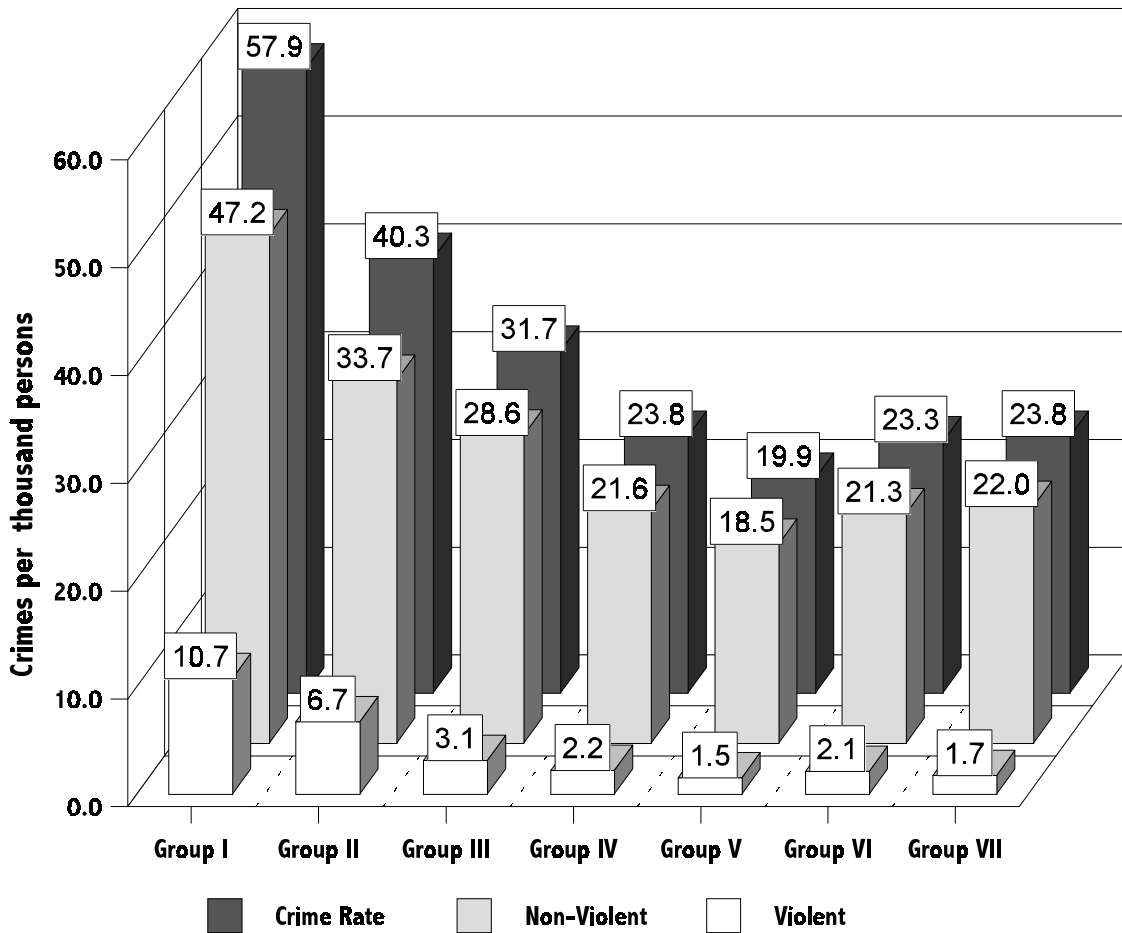
The presentation of crime statistics by population groups was made for the purpose of projecting, for consideration, the relative crime experience of communities of varying populations. Although the individual municipalities within the various groups may be geographically separated, their inclusion into a specific group was predicated by the similarity in population with the other municipalities within the group. Municipalities within the same group may differ widely when all factors are considered, but they do share the common bond of population size. The grouping of communities in this manner allows recognition of variances in the crime volumes, rates and clearances between the established groups.

# CRIME IN THE CITIES

This section deals with serious crimes reported in the large urban cities of the state. These cities represent 19 percent of the population and historically account for one third of the reported Crime Index of the state.

This analysis involves the latest ten-year period 1993-2002 and endeavors further to identify crime trends in these urban areas.

The cities included in this analysis were initially categorized as urban municipalities (i.e., densely populated with extensive development) by the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning, and will continue to be used for comparative purposes.

The criteria used in the selection of these cities were (1) classified as urban character and (2) have a population of 50,000 or more inhabitants.

For further comparative analysis, the urban cities were subdivided into two distinct groupings.

Group number one consisted of the state's six largest urban centers with populations of 80,000 or over and is categorized as "Major Urban."

The second group included the "Major Urban" and the additional urban communities with populations of 50,000 or more inhabitants, and is referred to as the "Urban 15."

### Percent Change

- During the ten-year period 1993/2002, the Crime Index in New Jersey has decreased 31 percent, while the "Urban 15" cities decreased 36 percent and the six major urban cities decreased 42 percent.
- Violent crime in the state decreased 35 percent, the 15 urban cities decreased 42 percent and the six major cities decreased 51 percent.
- Nonviolent crime in the state decreased 30 percent, the "Urban 15" decreased 34 percent and the six major cities decreased 39 percent.

### Distribution:

- Six major urban centers—Camden, Newark, Jersey City, Trenton, Paterson and Elizabeth—collectively represent 11 percent of New Jersey's total population. These same urban centers, during the period 1993 through 2002 accounted for 24 percent of the state's total crime.
- "Major Urban" centers from 1993 through 2002 accounted for 43 percent of all violent crime and 22 percent of the nonviolent crimes in the entire state.
- The 15 urban municipalities represent 19 percent of the state's total population.
- "Urban 15" municipalities accounted for 35 percent of New Jersey's total Crime Index. Violent crime was 57 percent of the state total, while nonviolent crime was 32 percent of the state total during this ten-year period.
- Sixty-four percent of all robberies reported occurred in the "Urban 15" cities during this ten-year period.

# STREET CRIME

There has never been a clear-cut definition for street crime within the criminal justice system. The nation's clearinghouse for the collection and dissemination of criminal statistics, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, has no criteria in the categorization of specific crimes to be designated or defined as "street crimes." More and more this media term has been confused with the violent crime group of murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.

Although any particular crime can and does occur on the street, this analysis, because of reporting constraints within the Uniform Crime Reporting System, is limited to defining street crimes as those offenses which occur, or are most likely to occur, on streets, highways, parking lots, etc.. These crimes include highway robbery, purse-snatching, theft from autos, theft of auto parts and accessories, theft of bicycles, and motor vehicle thefts. All are crimes against property and only one, highway robbery, falls in the violent crime group.

- During the ten-year period 1993-2002, the "Urban 15" cities accounted for 40.9 percent of the street crimes in the state.
- Three out of every four highway robberies occurred in the "Urban 15" during the ten-year period.
- More than half of all motor vehicle thefts during the survey span occurred in these 15 urban municipalities.
- Thirty-nine percent of all purse-snatchings during the survey span were perpetrated in the "Urban 15" cities.
- Highway robbery and larceny of motor vehicle parts and accessories were at their lowest levels during 2002, in this ten-year period.
- The accompanying table reflects percent distribution of street crime for the "Urban 15" cities for the years 1993-2002.

# Section Eight

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## RESORT MUNICIPALITIES

As required by P.L. 1998, c. 50, annual mean population estimates for resort municipalities in New Jersey have been used in the preparation of per capita crime statistics.

These estimates were prepared based upon the methodology prescribed in P.L. 1998, c. 50 using the latest available municipality estimates of year-round population from the U.S. Bureau of the Census. Please note that these resort population estimates should only be used for crime statistics purposes. While they fulfill the requirements of the law, the seasonal components of these estimates are not a complete measure of seasonal population because they include only those living in rental housing units or in vacant year-round housing. Not counted are the many day visitors and persons who occupy campgrounds, hotels, motels or bed and breakfast establishments or who stay with friends or relatives.

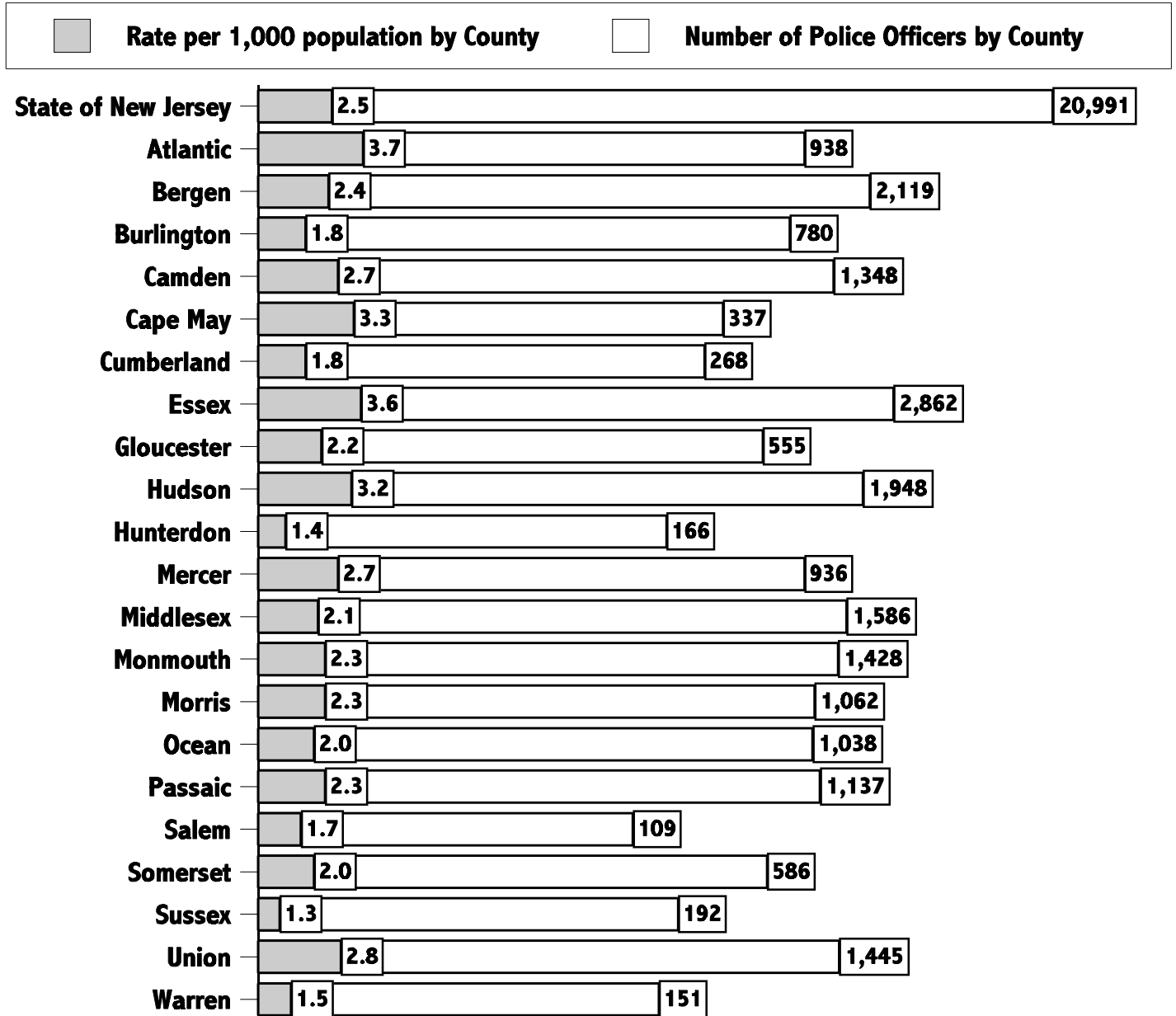

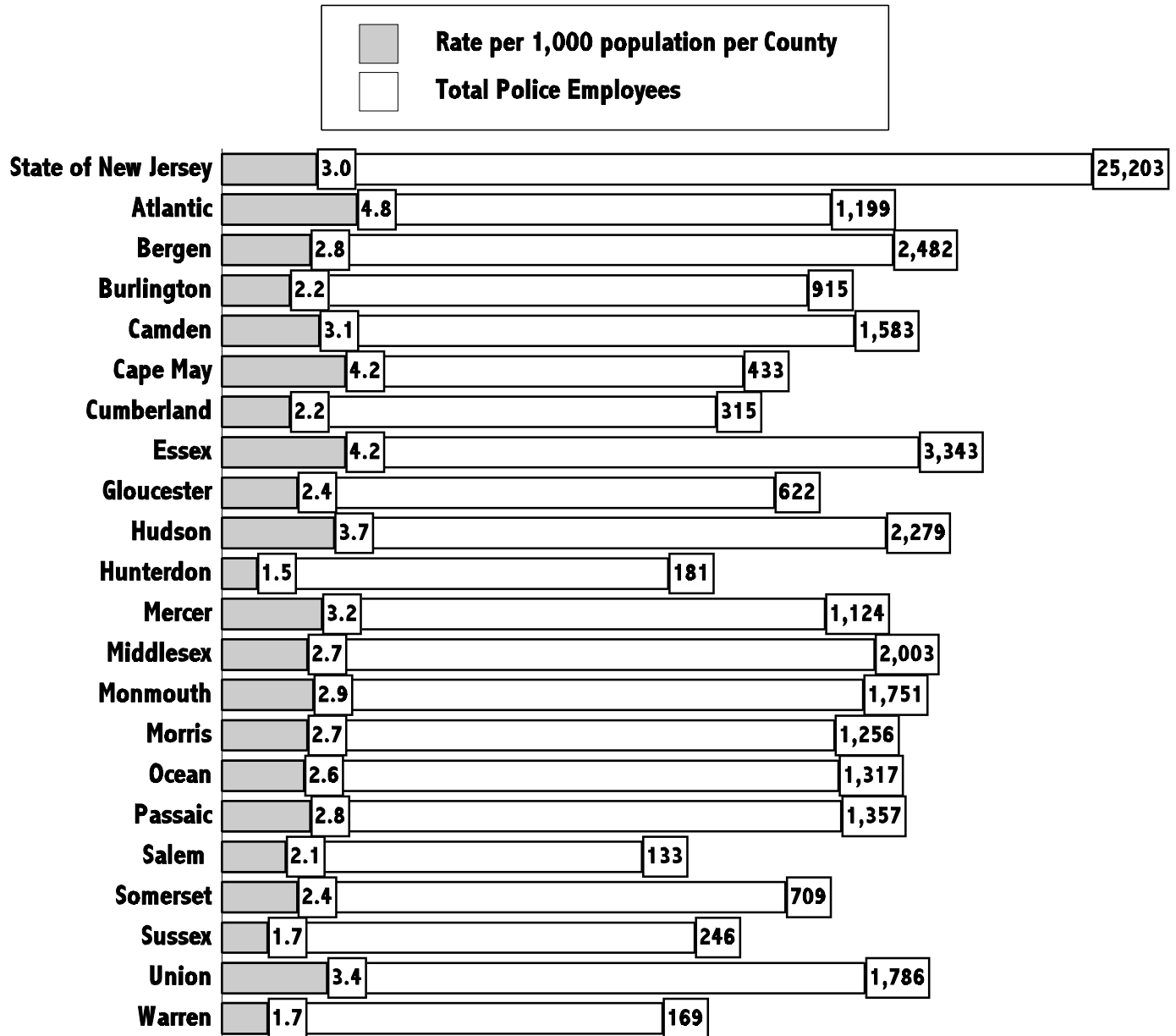

# POLICE EMPLOYEE DATA

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program of New Jersey incorporates the collection of pertinent data relating to the police of the state. Information regarding police employees strength and trends are discussed in this section.

Individual listings of full-time state, county, university and college police departments are shown in tables within this section. Listings of municipal police departments will be found in Section VII.

The determination of police strength for any given area or municipality should be subject for serious consideration. Such consideration, however, should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. For example, the increased need for police service in a municipality which has a highly mobile or seasonal population differs from a municipality which has a relatively stable population. Some other factors, discussed elsewhere in this publication, relate to size, density of population, geographic location, character, and proximity to metropolitan areas. The tables and charts shown in this section should not be interpreted as recommended strength for any given municipality.

## TOTAL POLICE EMPLOYEES

Total police employees are defined as the total number of full-time police officers and civilian police employees (clerks, dispatchers, mechanics, etc.) employed by all law enforcement agencies in the state.

- During 2002, there were 48,018 full-time police employees in New Jersey. This represents a decrease of four percent compared to the 50,105 full-time police employees in 2001.
- The number of full-time police officers decreased less than one half of one percent, from 38,113 in 2001 to 38,108 in 2002.
- The number of full-time civilian employees decreased 17 percent, from 11,992 in 2001 to 9,910 in 2002.
- Seventy-nine percent were sworn officers and the remaining 21 percent were civilian employees.

## MUNICIPAL POLICE EMPLOYEES

This category consists of the number of police employees, including civilian personnel, employed full-time by municipalities of the state.

- During 2002, there were 25,203 municipal police employees, an increase of less than one half of one percent compared to the 25,091 in 2001.
- For every 1,000 inhabitants of the state there were 3 municipal police employees.
- Essex County reported the largest increase in municipal police employees, an increase of 3 percent (84 employees).
- Atlantic County recorded the highest police employee rate; 4.8 per 1,000 population; (this rate is computed on the static population and does not take into account the large influx of seasonal and recreational population).
- Hunterdon County recorded the lowest police employee rate of 1.5 per 1,000 population.



The personnel of each department differ as to the demands and responsibilities placed before them. Many police officers are fully occupied with clerical tasks and are not free to perform active police duties. Employing civilians in police departments to perform clerical duties is in line with the thinking of many police administrators who recommended the use of civilians in this capacity. Thus, freeing the sworn personnel for actual police-related services.

- There were 4,212 municipal civilian police employees in 2002, an increase of one percent compared to the 4,165 in 2001.
- Seventeen percent of all municipal police employees were civilians.

## MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS

This includes the number of sworn police officers employed full-time by municipalities of the state. The police employee rate per 1,000 population presented here should not be construed as recommended ratios. The determination of police strength for any municipality should be based on the numerous factors that create the need for police services. These factors, as crime, vary in type and degree from place to place. Some examples are: seasonal population, geographic location, density and composition of the population.

- There were 20,991 full-time municipal police officers in 2002; this represents an increase of less than one half of one percent when compared to the 20,926 full-time municipal police officers in 2001.
- The number of full-time municipal police officers was calculated at 2.5 per 1,000 population; this represents no change when compared to 2001.
- Sworn officers represented 83 percent of all municipal police employees.
- Camden County recorded the largest numerical increase (32) which represented a two percent increase of municipal police officers.
- The largest numerical decrease occurred in Hudson County, a decrease of 16 municipal police officers, or one percent.
- Atlantic County, with 938 police officers per 1,000 inhabitants, recorded the highest rate of full-time municipal police officers. (This rate is computed on the static population, and does not take into account the large influx of seasonal and recreational population).
- Sussex County recorded the lowest rate of full-time municipal officers with one police officer per 1,000 population.

## OTHER POLICE (State Agencies)

In addition to the State Police, there are ten other state agencies reporting to the system. These agencies consist of: NJ Forest Fire Service, Division of Parks & Forestry, Department of Corrections, Department of Human Services, Division of Criminal Justice, Division of Fish and Game, Office of Weights and Measures, Palisades Interstate Park, Port Authority NY/NJ, and NJ Transit Police. No rates were computed due to the variations in the types of police services rendered, and their statewide jurisdictions.

- Together, these agencies reported a total of 11,267 full-time employees; an increase of one percent compared to the 11,170 police employees in 2001.
- There were 7,910 sworn police officers in 2002, an increase of less than one-half of one percent compared to the 7,899 in 2001.
- Seventy percent were sworn personnel, while the remaining 30 percent were civilians.

## COUNTY POLICE, SHERIFFS AND PROSECUTORS

The functions of county law enforcement vary widely throughout the state. The operation of one sheriff's department may be limited exclusively to civil areas and the administration of the county jail, or they may be actively involved in criminal matters throughout the county.

County police departments are varied in their activities in that some are responsible for enforcement throughout the county, while others may have as their primary mission the policing of county parklands. The responsibilities of county prosecutors' officers include criminal investigations, trial preparation, court presentation and special probes. Because of the difference in the types of police service rendered, rates for county law enforcement agencies are not presented here.

- County law enforcement agencies reported a total of 8,995 full-time police employees in 2002; a decrease of less than one half of one percent compared to 9,020 in 2001.
- There were 6,088 full-time sworn police officers employed by county agencies in 2002. This represents a decrease of two percent compared to 6,191 in 2001.
- County police agencies reported 2,907 civilian police employees in 2002; an increase of three percent compared to 2,829 civilian employees in 2001.
- Sworn personnel accounted for 68 percent while the remaining 32 percent were civilians.

## STATE POLICE

The New Jersey State Police is empowered to provide all phases of law enforcement throughout the state. It also renders, upon request, police services to all the law enforcement agencies in the state. No rates are used due to the variations in the nature and extent of the police services performed by the State Police.

- The New Jersey State Police reported 3,982 full-time police employees; a decrease of two percent compared to 4,044 in 2001.
- State Police employed 2,735 officers in 2002, this represented an increase of less than one half of one percent when compared to 2,727 in 2001.
- The State Police reported 1,247 civilian employees in 2002; a decrease of five percent over the 1,317 reported in 2001.
- Sworn personnel accounted for 69 percent and civilians represented 31 percent of the total State Police employees.

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## **LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS KILLED & ASSAULTED SUMMARY**

# POLICE OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED

The killing or assault of a police officer has a deleterious effect on society that reaches far beyond the overt act. Such occurrences constitute an immediate threat to the well-being of the community and serious breach of the internal security of the country. Today a young person who considers a career in law enforcement must also consider the very strong possibility of being killed or assaulted by a member of the very same society they are sworn to protect. This deplorable situation should be a subject of serious concern, for in truth, an attack on a police officer is an attack on society. The violence directed against law enforcement officers acting in the line of duty is clearly demonstrated by the following information.

## POLICE FELONIOUSLY KILLED

### VOLUME/TREND

- In 2002, no police officers were feloniously killed while in the performance of their duties.

## ASSAULTS ON POLICE OFFICERS

Police assault statistics are important to the police administrator who attempts to identify the causative factors of this type of criminal activity. Many factors contribute to police assaults, and circumstances vary from place to place. Identifying specific reasons for these assaults is therefore extremely difficult. The following information illustrates the frequency of these events, and any attempt at analysis of these assaults should include consideration of the unique variables present in each jurisdiction. Due to the broad field of services performed by many state and county police agencies, no assault rates are computed for total police officers.

### VOLUME/TREND

- There were 3,296 police officers assaulted in 2002, an increase of one percent when compared to the 3,253 in 2001.

### ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Twenty-nine percent (944) of the officers assaulted sustained injury.
- Personal weapons, such as hands, fists and feet were used in 82 percent (2,693) of all police assaults.
- Twenty-seven percent of police assaults occurred when officers responded to disturbance calls.
- Fifteen percent of the assaults on police officers occurred during the 2-hour period of 8:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.

### CLEARANCES

- The police of New Jersey were successful in clearing 96 percent of the assaults directed at them.

# ASSAULTS ON MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS

## VOLUME/TREND

- A total of 2,981 municipal police officers were assaulted during 2002, a two percent increase compared to the 2,937 assaulted in 2001.
- The assault rate, for every 100 municipal officers, was 14.2, a one percent increase compared to 2001.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Twenty-seven percent of the municipal officers assaulted sustained injury.
- Personal weapons, such as hands, fists and feet were used in 82 percent of all municipal police assaults.
- Twenty-nine percent of the municipal police assaults occurred when officers responded to disturbance calls.
- Attempting Other Arrests accounted for 17 percent of municipal police assaults.

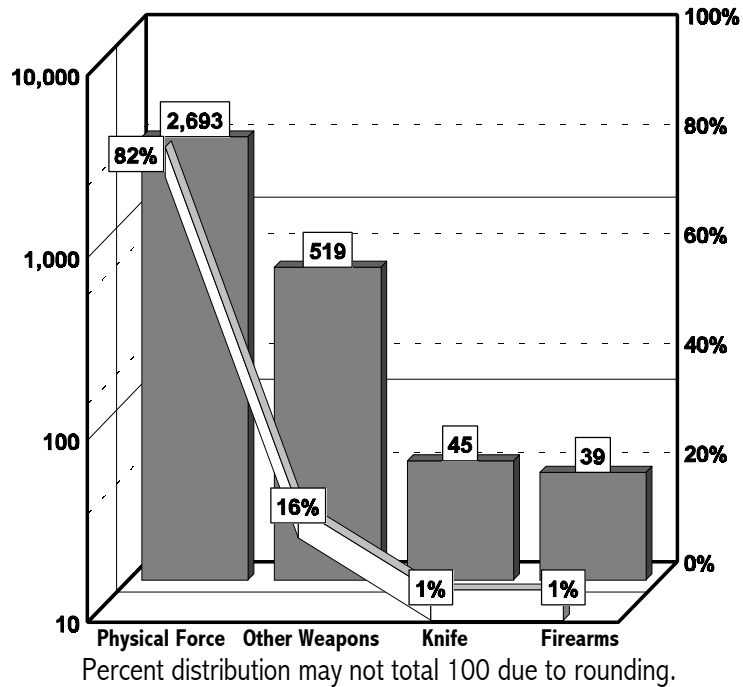
# OTHER POLICE OFFICERS ASSAULTED

The following law enforcement agencies are dealt with separately and are not included when computing municipal assault rates; the services performed by these agencies vary greatly from the functions of municipal police agencies.

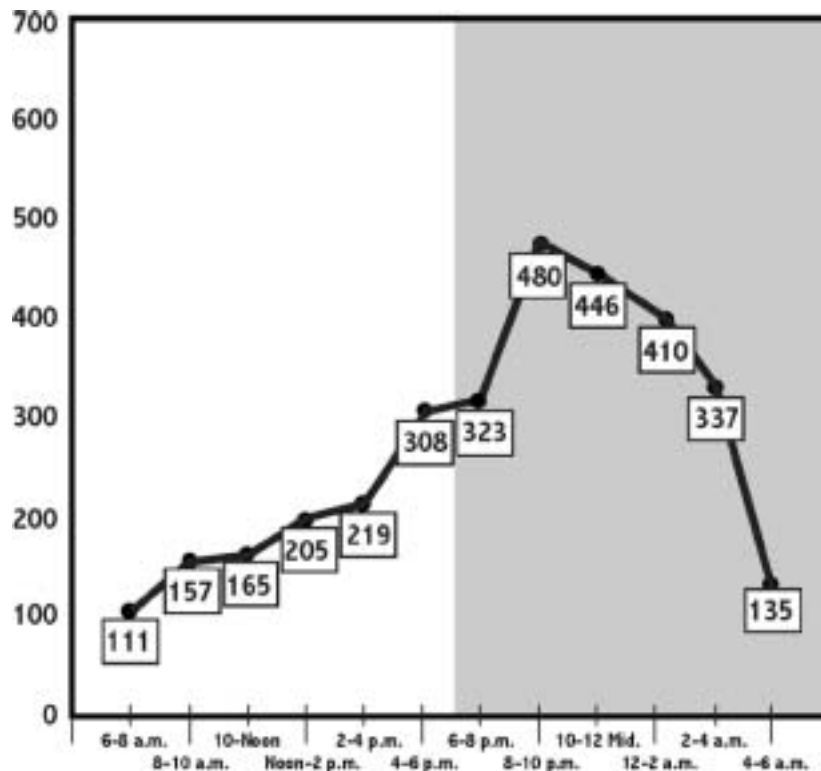
## VOLUME/TREND

- County law enforcement agencies reported 118 officers assaulted with 68 sustaining injury.
- The New Jersey State Police reported 22 officers assaulted with 12 sustaining injury.
- Other state agencies with police powers reported 162 officers assaulted with 63 sustaining injury.
- University and college police agencies reported 13 officers assaulted with 4 sustaining injury.

# Section Eleven

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## DOMESTIC VIOLENCE



# INTRODUCTION

The violence within the American domicile has been recognized for decades by elements of government and society with little done to correct the problem. Only recently has this phenomenon begun to receive the attention it deserves. In an effort to understand, identify and treat the incidents of abuse occurring in the home, the State of New Jersey, through its legislature, has provided the means to gain a meaningful insight into this issue.

In 1982, the Domestic Violence Act was instituted to protect battered victims and study the complex problems that spark such aggressive behavior. This legislation also provided the opportunity to identify the causes of violence in the home and put forth a more comprehensive effort to combat the crime of Domestic Violence.

Improvements since the implementation of the Domestic Violence Act are continuing. Pursuant to a change in N.J.S.A. 2C:25-24 enacted, June 9, 1999, arrest data is presented by county. Domestic violence restraining order violations are now captured and reported. Revised investigation and reporting procedures by the police; improved processing of domestic complaints by the courts; mandatory in-service training for police and court personnel have all enabled the victim to come forward and implement the constitutional rights granted to all Americans.

The following pages of narrative and graphics in this chapter are the result of gathered data displaying the complexities of domestic violence found within the State of New Jersey. It is through analysis of this data that, hopefully, the keys to preventing future violence can be found.

# DOMESTIC VIOLENCE STATISTICAL SUMMARY

Highlights of the 2002 domestic violence statistics are listed below:

- There were 79,844 domestic violence offenses reported by the police in 2002, a 3% decrease compared to the 82,373 reported in 2001.
- Murders increased 30% in 2002 (52 ) when compared to 2001 (40).
- Assaults accounted for 46% (36,823) and harassment accounted for 39% (31,348 ) of the reported offenses in 2002.
- Arrests were made in 32% (25,774) of the offenses reported for 2002, a decrease of 3% when compared to 2001 ( 26,551).
- The most frequent day of domestic violence occurrences was Sunday (14,294 ).
- For the twentieth consecutive year, the most frequent hours of domestic violence incidents were between 8:00 p.m. and midnight, when 28% (22,202) of the offenses were reported.
- Children were involved or present during 37% of all domestic violence offenses occurring in 2002. Specifically, 6% (4,625) were involved and 31% (24,944) were present.
- Wives were the victims in 22% (17,556) and ex-wives were the victims in 3% (2,279) of the reported domestic violence offenses in 2002. Overall, females were victims in 77% (61,715) of all domestic violence offenses.
- The number of domestic violence complaints that had prior court orders issued against the offender decreased from 19,186 in 2001 to 17,720 in 2002. This is a decrease of 8%.
- Alcohol and/or drugs were involved in 30% (23,877) of the reported offenses occurring in 2002. Alcohol involvement alone accounted for 27% (21,313) of the total domestic violence offenses reported.
- Persons age 60 or over were victims in 3% (2,271) of all reported domestic violence offenses that occurred in 2002. Elderly were the victims in 17% (9) of the domestic violence murders (52).
- Domestic violence does not occur at a regular frequency, but when viewed as a ratio of its occurrence to a fixed time interval, one act of domestic violence would occur every 6 minutes and 35 seconds.
- Domestic violence offenses arising from a dating relationship accounted for 14% (10,909) of the state total.
- There were 3,679 total arrests involving domestic violence restraining orders reported by police in 2002. Of these, 1,816 were arrests for violations of a restraining order **only**, while 1,863 were arrests for violations of a restraining order **with** an offense arrest.

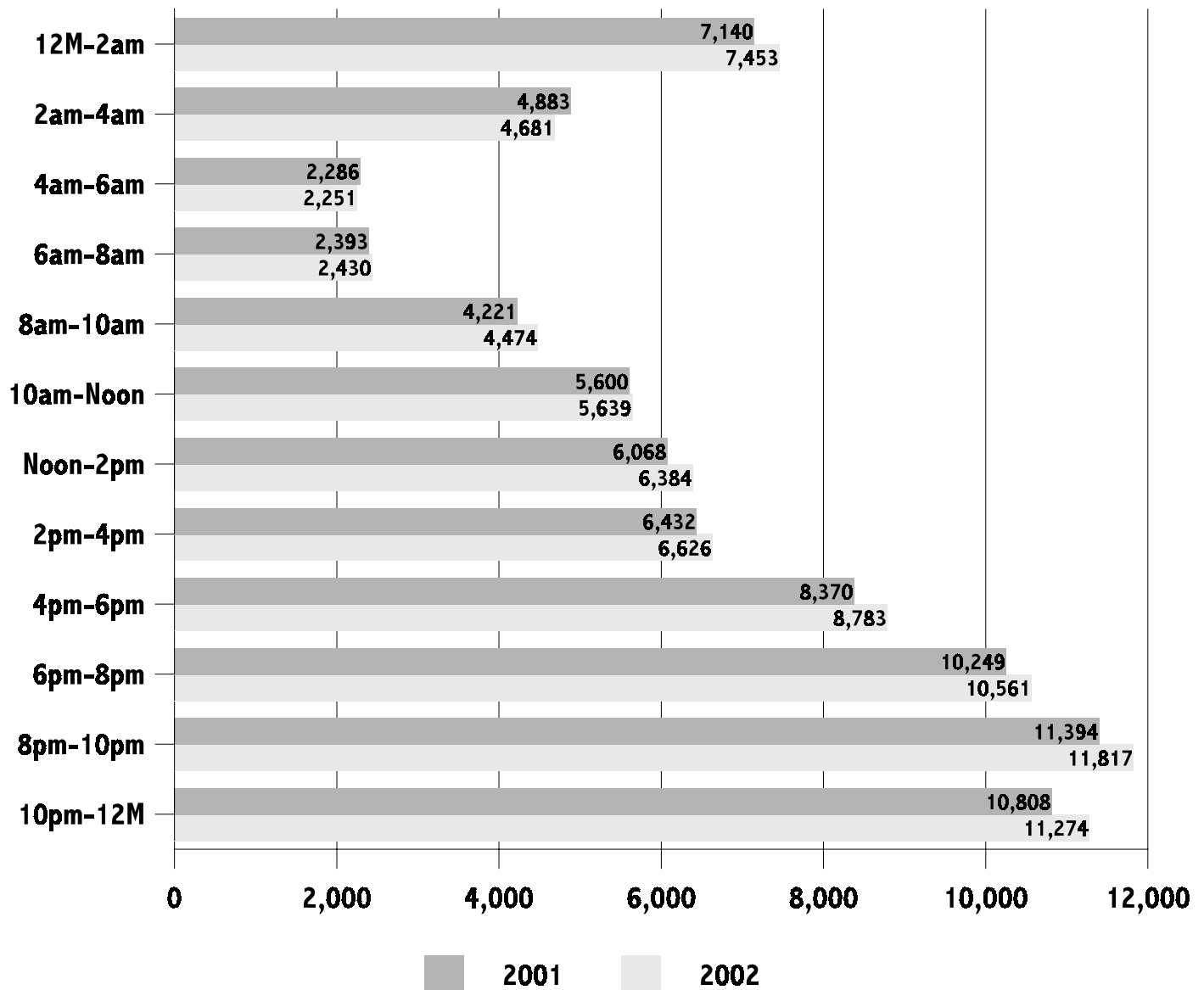

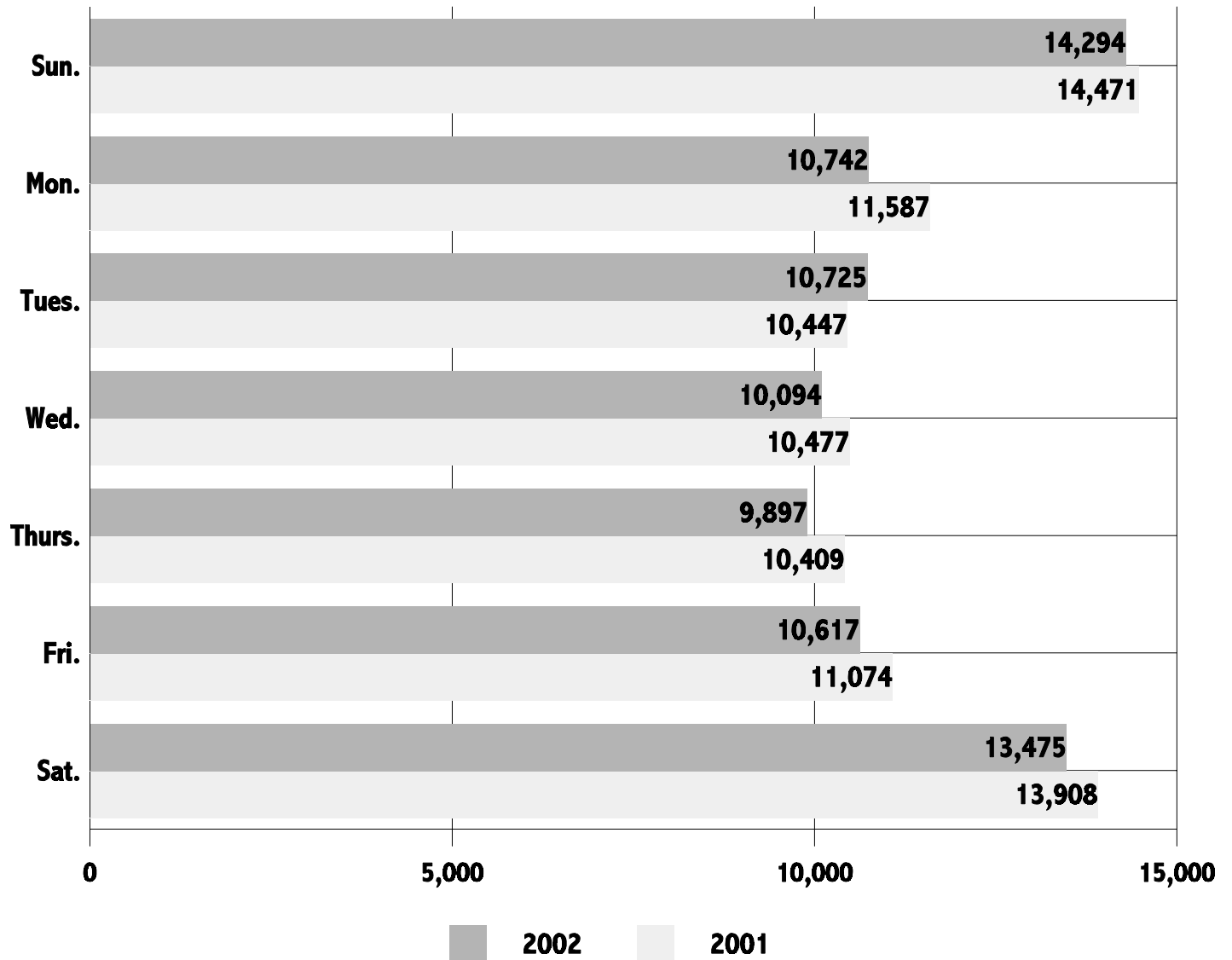
# DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OFFENSES BY TIME OF DAY 2001/2002



- During 2002, 28% (22,202) of the reported domestic violence offenses occurred between 8:00 p.m. and 12 midnight.

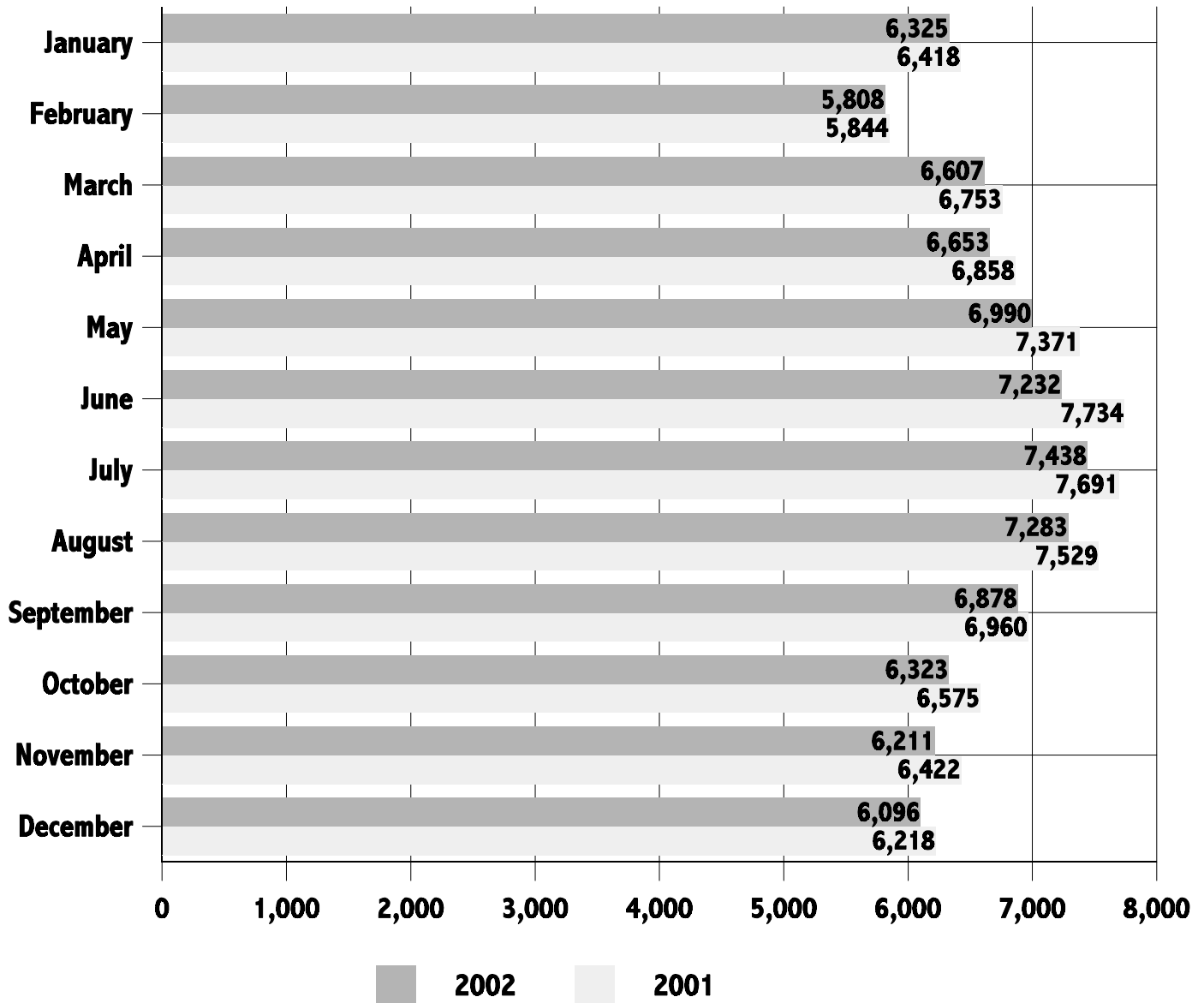


# DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OFFENSES BY DAY OF WEEK 2001/2002

# INTRODUCTION

Crimes motivated by hate and bias tend to erode the basic fabric of society. Bias incidents having a racial, religious, ethnic, sexual or gender component as well as crimes against individuals with a handicap, manifest themselves in a wide spectrum of criminal activities. These bias incidents jeopardize the active and open pursuit of freedom and opportunity. They attack our citizens based on their race, religion, ethnic heritage, sexual orientation, handicap, or gender. Closely linked to such heritage are individual values, beliefs, and identities.

Realizing that no agency within the state was collecting complete data on bias incidents, a broad-based Ad Hoc committee was created to develop a comprehensive statewide reporting system. As a result of the committee's recommendation, Attorney General Executive Directive No. 1987-3 was issued mandating all New Jersey law enforcement agencies to begin reporting bias incident offenses to the Division of State Police, Uniform Crime Reporting Unit, on a monthly basis, effective January 1, 1988. On August 15, 1996, legislation was enacted which enhanced the state's definition of a bias incident to include crimes that are gender or handicap-motivated.

The directive was instituted to capture vital data in an effort to identify the problem. This information permits proper evaluation of progress in preventing bias crime and assists with necessary planning for the future.

This is the fifteenth annual publication concerning bias crimes, which contains comparisons to the previous year's statistics. The published statistics and graphs are the result of data submitted by the police community of New Jersey.

Hopefully, the information contained in this publication will be of value to various segments of society and serve its intended purpose.

# BIAS INCIDENT STATISTICAL SUMMARY

Highlights of the 2002 bias incident offense statistics are listed below:

- New Jersey law enforcement agencies reported 578 individual bias incidents, resulting in 625 specific bias incident offenses in 2002, a 23% decrease compared to 2001.
- Harassment accounted for 47% (295) of all bias incident offenses.
- Criminal mischief and damage to property accounted for 42% (260) of all bias incident offenses.
- Racial bias accounted for 42% (262) of all bias incident crimes in 2002.
- The target category of person accounted for 57% (354) of all bias offenses.
- The Black race represented the most frequent racial group victimized by bias crime, accounting for 35% (221) of all bias offenses.
- The Jewish religion represented the most frequent religious group victimized by bias crime, accounting for 31% (193) of all bias offenses.
- The Hispanic ethnicity represented the most frequent ethnic group victimized by bias crime, accounting for 7% (43) of all bias offenses.
- The most frequent days of occurrence were Monday & Friday (99 offenses each).
- The most frequent month of occurrence was April (77 offenses).
- The most frequent place of occurrence was a residence, where 33% (204 offenses) of all bias incidents occurred.
- Forty-four percent (278) of all bias incident offenses were cleared with 36% (101) being cleared by arrest, and 64% (177) being exceptionally cleared.
- A total of 113 arrests (73 adults and 40 juveniles) were made resulting from bias incidents. Compared to 2001, arrests decreased 40 percent.

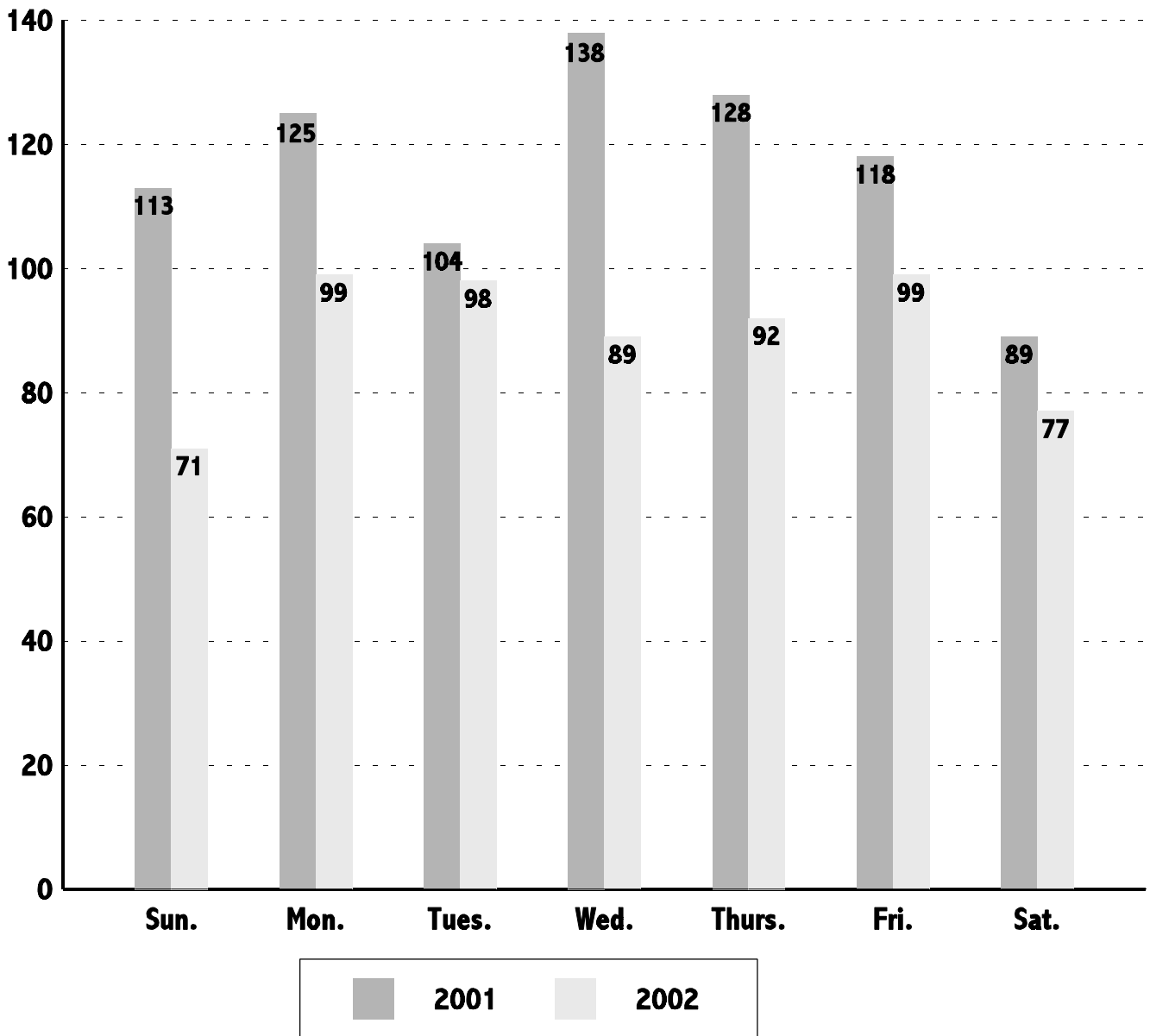

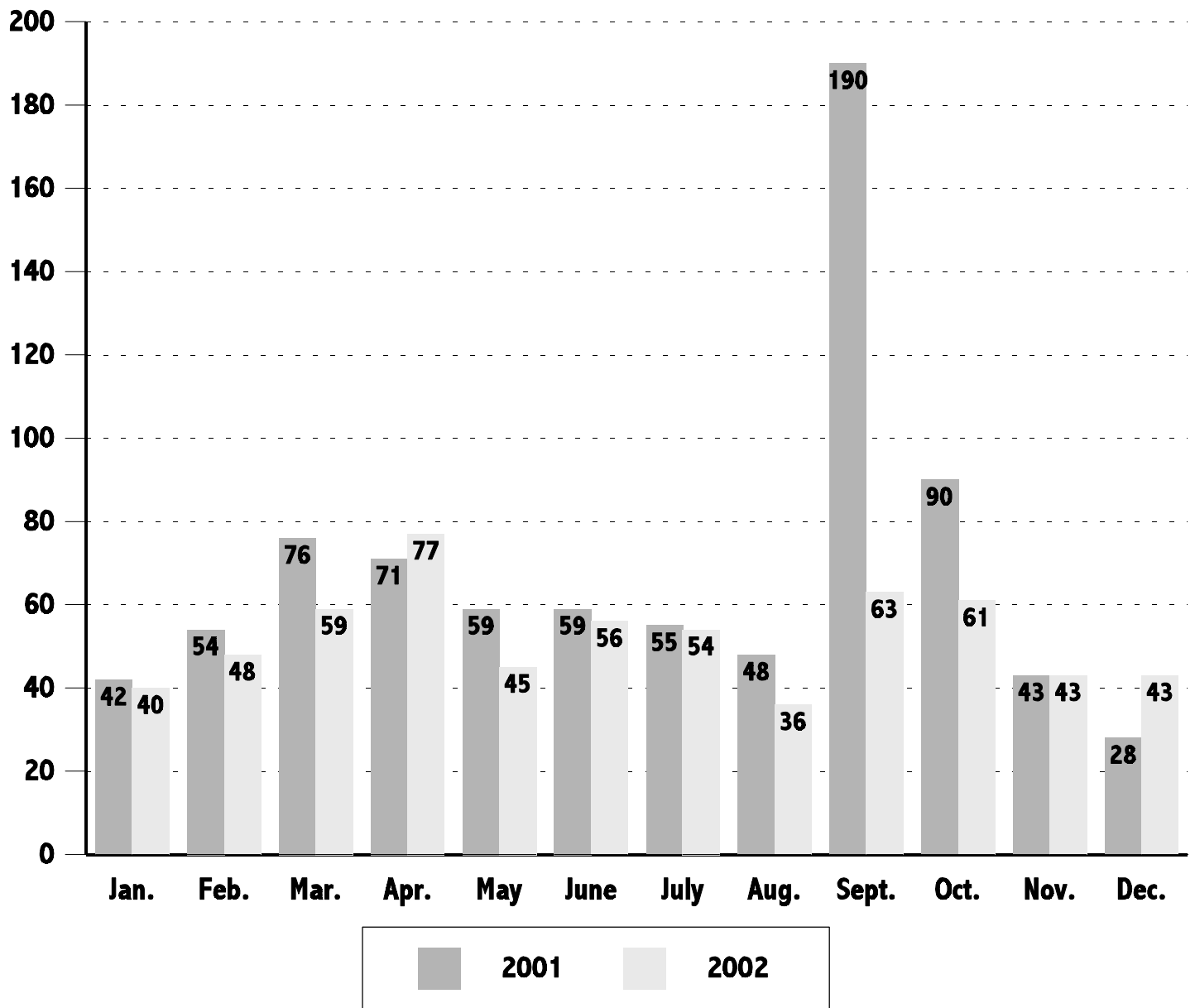
# BIAS INCIDENTS BY DAY OF WEEK

# GLOSSARY OF TERMS

<b>ADULT</b>	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person aged 18 or over.
<b>AMERICAN INDIAN or ALASKAN NATIVE</b>	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North America, and who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.
<b>ARREST RATE</b>	The number of arrests for Part I and Part II offenses for each unit of population, generally per 1,000.
<b>ASIAN or PACIFIC ISLANDER</b>	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands. This area includes, for example: China, India, Japan, Korea, the Philippine Islands, and Samoa.
<b>BLACK</b>	A person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa, characterized by dark skin pigmentation.
<b>CLEARANCE</b>	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the solution to a particular crime, usually by the arrest of the offender.
<b>CLEARED BY ARREST</b>	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared when the offender has been identified, sufficient evidence has been obtained to formally charge and the offender has been ordered to appear in court.
<b>CRIME INDEX</b>	The total of the seven major offenses used to measure the extent, fluctuation and distribution of crime in a geographical area. The following crimes make up the index: Murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft; these offenses are referred to as Index offenses.
<b>CRIME RATE</b>	The number of Index offenses reported for each unit of population per 1,000.
<b>CRIMES AGAINST PERSONS</b>	Consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, rape, and aggravated assault.
<b>CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY</b>	Consists of the following Index offenses: Robbery, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft.
<b>DAY</b>	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the hours from 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.
<b>ETHNIC ORIGIN</b>	Having or originating from linguistic or cultural ties with a specific group.
<b>EXCEPTIONAL CLEARANCE</b>	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared exceptionally when an offender has been identified or located and sufficient evidence to charge has been obtained, but there is some reason beyond police control that prohibits the offender from being brought before the court.
<b>HIERARCHY RULE</b>	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, each crime or attempted crime is counted in only one offense category. If several offenses are committed, simply glance down the list of Part I offenses and stop at the first offense recognized from the facts given; this offense is the correct classification for this criminal activity.
<b>HISPANIC</b>	A person of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.
<b>JUVENILE</b>	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person under the age of 18.
<b>JUVENILE CLEARANCE</b>	Those crimes where the offenders are identified as juveniles.

<b>NIGHT</b>	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the hours from 6:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.
<b>NONVIOLENT CRIME</b>	Consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft.
<b>POPULATION</b>	Is the year-round population of the municipality shown in the most recent State population estimates published by the Department of Labor, except that in the year of promulgation of a Federal decennial census, the census figures shall be used.
<b>RESORT MUNICIPALITY</b>	Is a municipality which, because of its recreational, entertainment or amusement characteristics or facilities or its close proximity to such characteristics or facilities, experiences a total increase during the seasonal period in the number of persons temporarily resident therein of 25 percent or more of its population.
<b>SEASONAL POPULATION</b>	Is the average of the estimated number of persons temporarily resident in the municipality during the three consecutive months when the temporary population is greatest.
<b>TEMPORARY RESIDENT</b>	Means the occupying for any period of time during the seasonal period by any person not counted as a resident of the municipality for population purposes of an accommodation in a rented residential unit or vacation home.
<b>UNFOUNDED</b>	Classification of reported crimes that are found to be false or baseless.
<b>VIOLENT CRIME</b>	Consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.
<b>WHITE</b>	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, North Africa, or the Middle East.

# CALCULATIONS OF RATES AND TRENDS

1. **Crime Rate per 1,000 inhabitants:** This represents the number of Index offenses per 1,000 inhabitants. For example: What is the crime rate for a municipality with 513 Index offenses (murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft), with a population of 8,280?

$$513 \text{ (Index offenses)} \div 8,280 \text{ (population)} = .061957 \times 1,000 = 62.0 \text{ (crime per 1,000 inhabitants)}$$

2. **Crime Trend:** A crime trend shows the extent to which crime increased or decreased. This is done by comparing a period of the current year with the same period of a previous year. For example: A municipality experienced 264 Index offenses in a previous year and 513 Index offenses in the current year. What is the percent of the increase?

$$513 \text{ (current year Index offenses)} - 264 \text{ (previous year Index offenses)} = 249 \text{ (numerical increase)}$$
$$249 \text{ (numerical increase)} \div 264 \text{ (previous year)} = .943 \times 100 = +94\% \text{ (percent change)}$$

NOTE: If there were more Index offenses in a previous year than in the current year, we would have a percentage decrease.

3. **Number of Police personnel per 1,000 inhabitants:** This is calculated in the same manner as a crime rate. For example: A municipality with a population of 8,280 and 28 police personnel. How many officers are there per 1,000 population?

$$28 \text{ (police personnel)} \div 8,280 \text{ (population)} = .00338 \times 1,000 = 3.4 \text{ (police personnel per 1,000 inhabitants)}$$

NOTE: This formula can be applied to either total police personnel or just police officers per 1,000 inhabitants.

4. **Police Assaulted Rate:** This is calculated at a rate per 100 police officers. For example: A municipality with 25 officers had five of them assaulted during the month. What is the police assaulted rate?

$$5 \text{ (police officers assaulted)} \div 25 \text{ (police officers)} = .2 \times 100 = 20 \text{ (police assaulted per 100 officers)}$$

5. **Clearance Rate:** This refers to the percent of Index offenses cleared (solved), over a specific period of time. For example: A municipality with 513 Index offenses in a chosen time frame, cleared 95 of these offenses. What is the clearance rate?

$$95 \text{ (Index offenses cleared)} \div 513 \text{ (Index offenses)} = .185 \times 100 = 18.5 \text{ (percent cleared)}$$

6. **Annual Mean Population:** Is determined for each municipality designated a resort municipality by use of the following formula:

$$AMP = \frac{12P + 3SP}{12}$$

Where **AMP** equals Annual Mean Population; **P** equals Population; **SP** equals Seasonal Population.
