*To His Excellency Joel Parker, Governor of New Jersey:*

SIR:—I have the honor to transmit herewith my report of the transactions of the Quartermaster General's Department for the year 1865.

Very little was done except in the early part of the year in recruiting and equipping troops for the United States service. In March last authority was received from the War Department to raise ten (10) new companies to be assigned by your Excellency to old regiments of infantry reduced in the number of companies, to give to persons desirous to avoid the draft an opportunity to volunteer.

Immediately thereafter Camp Bayard was put in order for troops. The first of the ten (10) companies was mustered into the service under command of Captain Silas A. Smith, and forwarded by assignment to the Second (2d) Regiment, and while the second (2d) company, under Captain Green, was being recruited, and when about to be mustered into service, the news of the capture of Richmond and the surrender of General Lee's army was received. This company was thereupon disbanded, and the men transported to their place of enrollment.

These two (2) companies were the only volunteer troops furnished with quartermaster and commissary stores by the state, on account of the United States during the year, except regimental colors to our troops in the field. A statement of the issue will be found in exhibit E.

The termination of the war left on hand a large amount of clothing, camp and garrison equipage, and ordnance and other stores belonging to the United States. Authority was at once applied for and received, to turn over to the appropriate department of the United States the stores on hand. Exhibit E will show the quantity of clothing, camp and garrison equipage, turned over during the year, and exhibit F the quantity of ordnance and ordnance stores turned over during the year.

There still remains in store a large quantity of ordnance and ordnance stores to be turned over, which were turned into the arsenal by three (3) months and nine (9) months troops upon their muster out of service. They are now being packed, preparatory to their being forwarded to the United States arsenal at Bridesburg.

For the last four (4) years very little attention has been given by the state authorities to the State militia. They have been wholly absorbed in raising and equipping troops for the United States service. No encouragement had been given by the state to the enrollments and organization of uniform companies, and until the past year the state was not in a condition to supply serviceable arms to such companies as were organized for local purposes, she having issued all that were fit for service to troops mustered into the United States service in 1861.

Until the passage of the acts of 1864 and 1865, the companies in existence were purely voluntary, self-sustaining, composed of persons of property, who were willing to devote a portion of their time and means to sustain a military organization, for instruction, to be ready in case of an emergency. It was with great difficulty and expense that these companies could be kept in existence, owing to the want of proper encouragement and constant drains upon them for volunteers and drafts to meet the calls for the United States service. Some military companies volunteered bodily, whilst others furnished from time to time a greater number of volunteers for the war than were comprised upon their muster roll at any one time. I am informed that one (1) company from this place, Company A. National Guards, furnished five (5) officers and one hundred and eleven (111) non-commissioned officers and privates for the United States service. Many of them became distinguished for meritorious conduct, and all of them rendered important and valuable service to their country.

From past experience we are satisfied of the necessity of a well organized and well equipped militia force in time of peace. The value and importance of an efficient military force does not so much consist in a great number of undrilled and undisciplined and poorly equipped body of militia, as it does in a small, well drilled and well appointed force, furnishing a reliable body of troops always prepared for any emergency.

Exhibit I contains the number of active militia companies organized, equipped and attached to the Rifle Corps and State Guard, and the number of articles of clothing furnished to each, under the act of April 6, 1865. This act provides as follows :

SECTION 16. *And be it enacted*, That every non-commissioned officer and private shall supply himself with his proper uniform within one month after the organization of his proper corps, and every officer thereof shall supply himself in the same time with his proper uniform, arms and equipments complete: but any non-commissioned officer or private may, if he so elect, be furnished by the state with his proper uniform prescribed by order or regulation: in case he so elect an

entry to that effect shall be made upon his company or corps roll, and such uniform shall be furnished by the Quartermaster General's Department, upon the requisition of the commandant of his company, countersigned by the commandant of the regiment or battalion to which such company is attached: the uniform so furnished shall be left at the company or other proper armory for safe keeping, and the person supplied with the same shall be charged with the value thereof, and shall not be entitled to receive pay for any service for which he may become entitled to pay, until the sum charged against him for such uniform shall have been liquidated, when, and in that case, such uniform shall become the property of such person, and until then the same shall be and remain the property of the state.

General Order No. 8, of 1863, prescribing the uniform, clothing and equipments of the Rifle Corps, provides for a particular style of uniform, known as the Chasseur. This uniform has not been strictly adhered to. Companies of the militia have been attached to the Rifle Corps having a different style of uniform, and in order to save the expense of an entirely new uniform for these organizations, their several distinct uniforms have been retained, so that in the Rifle Corps there are four (4) distinct uniforms. I have not felt justified, owing to the high price of all kinds of clothing, in providing any more clothing than is required from time to time for issue to the militia. Clothing is not contracted for until requisitions are received from company commanders, properly approved as required by law, and no more ordered than is required to meet the wants of a particular company. Whenever it was possible I have advertised for proposals for bids for furnishing clothing, and have uniformly awarded it to the lowest bidder. In most instances, owing to the particular emergency for a limited quantity where a particular style of uniform is required, I have contracted for clothing without advertising for bids, upon the most favorable terms. The cost of clothing would be considerably lessened if ordered in larger quantities, uniform in style and of regular sizes. This cannot be done to advantage so long as so many different styles of uniforms prevail in our service.

I would earnestly recommend that a State uniform be adopted for the entire militia of the state, to differ only in the usual badges to distinguish different arms of the service. This would lessen materially the cost of clothing to the State and to the soldier. By the act referred to, all clothing issued to the militia is charged in money value against the soldier, and is to be paid for by military service, which he is required by law to perform.

There have been two (2) encampments of the Rifle Corps held during the past year in pursuance of Special Orders Nos. 3 and 11. The first (1st) was held on the 22d of May, at Raritan, in the county of Somerset, on the line of the Central Railroad, and continued four (4) days. It consisted of nine (9) companies, six (6) companies of the Second (2d) Regiment, two (2) of the First (1st) Battalion, and one (1) of the Second (2d) Battalion, numbering about five hundred (500)

men, under command of the senior Captain Tipson. The Second (2d) encampment was held at Jamesburg, Middlesex county, on the line of the Camden and Anby Railroad, on the 2d of October, and continued four (4) days. It consisted of ten (10) companies, four (4) companies of the First (1st) Battalion, two (2) companies of the Second (2d) Battalion, three (3) companies of the Third (3d) Battalion, and one (1) company of the State Guard, numbering about five hundred (500) men, under command of Brevet Brigadier General William J. Sewell. These encampments were of essential service in encouraging and fostering a proper spirit of rivalry between the different companies, in drill and military exercise.

Section 35 of the act entitled "An act for the more effectual organization of the Militia," makes it the duty of the Quartermaster General to compare the returns made by the respective Brigade Inspectors of the number and condition of the arms and equipments in the respective regiments and battalions inspected with the number actually loaned to the respective companies in said regiments or battalions, and if the number does not fully appear on the respective returns, or their good condition is not manifest, he shall as soon as may be, cause the public arms and equipments of such companies to be returned to the Arsenal. He is also required to lay before the Legislature a particular return of all the arms and equipments belonging to the state, the number loaned out, in whose hands and whether under proper responsibility. The Brigade Inspectors have failed to make returns except from the brigades of Salem and Morris, during the past year. He has therefore no official information of either of the number or condition of arms in the hands of companies, or whether they remain under proper responsibility, or if the number agrees with the number loaned to said companies. Bonds of the officers, with ample security are invariably required to be filed by companies making requisitions for arms. Exhibit A contains the ordnance and ordnance stores in the Arsenal on the 30th of November, and their condition, whether serviceable or unserviceable. Exhibit M contains tabular statements showing a complete return of the arms and equipments belonging to the State in the hands of the militia of the several Brigades of this state, issued from the year 1837 to the close of the present year. A large amount of this property has been in the service for many years. Much of it is undoubtedly useless if not entirely lost.

The State Military Agency at Washington has been continued under the charge of Col. J. C. Rafferty, and its usefulness has been felt and appreciated by the state and the soldier and his family, in furnishing means of communication with the different departments of the government, in obtaining settlements for back pay, bounties and pensions due to discharged soldiers and the families of deceased ones, and in relieving many cases of distress to our sick and wounded soldiers and their families. It has been a medium of distributing such articles of clothing and delicacies as were furnished by benevolent



societies and by kind friends at home, to the sick and wounded soldiers in the hospitals of the department at Washington and the army of the Potomac. It has been of great service to those soldiers enlisted in the general service or on detached service, who were not citizens of this State nor serving in New Jersey regiments, but were credited to the quota of this State, in collecting for them, without expense, the state pay to which they were entitled under the laws of the state. During the last winter and spring, while the Army of the Potomac lay in front of Richmond, immense quantities of clothing and eatables were forwarded by this department at the request of benevolent societies and individuals, through the Agency, to our soldiers. These stores were delivered promptly whenever the public service would permit. Occasionally, when the army was in motion, or the means of transportation were so absorbed by the government that it could not be furnished without detriment to the service, the Agency failed to make the deliveries as promptly as was desirable. In consequence of these unavoidable impediments, in some few instances, the articles were lost by reason of their perishable nature. With these exceptional cases, everything was promptly forwarded and delivered to the persons to whom they were directed. For a more detailed account of the transactions of the Agency I refer you to the report of Colonel Rafferty in the appendix.

Fourteen (14) regiments of infantry and five (5) batteries of artillery were mustered out of service during the past year, and upon their arrival at this place, whether by detachments or complete organizations, were received by the state authorities at the depot, and invited to partake of an entertainment prepared in anticipation of their arrival. Bechtel Hall and Lischer's Band were permanently engaged for these occasions. Troops were escorted to the place of entertainment, where speeches were made by your Excellency or by some person in behalf of the State, congratulating them upon their safe return from so many victorious battle fields, and tendering to them the hospitality of the state as a compliment for their long, faithful and meritorious services. The Thirteenth (13th) Regiment was not entertained by the state. It was, under special authority of the War Department, ordered to proceed directly to Newark, to be paid and discharged at that place. There was, therefore, no opportunity afforded to tender the hospitality of the state to the Thirteenth (13th) Regiment. His Honor Mayor Mills officiated on these occasions as Chief Marshal, assisted by a detachment of the City Police. To his services, and those of his assistants, we are indebted for the order and good cheer that prevailed on these occasions.

The following statement will show the amounts of the several claims of this state, for expenses incurred under general authority, in aid of the United States to suppress the late rebellion, and the settlement of which is provided for under the act of Congress approved July 27, 1861, and the dates of filing the same with the third Auditor as well as the amounts received by the state on account of



the same, and the credit of the United States Tax of 1861, the assessment and collection of which was assumed by the State :

The clerical force employed in this office during the war, has been reduced from time to time as the requirements of the service would permit, so that in May last it consisted of but one clerk. The labor attending the settlement of the claims of this State against the United States for expenses incurred on account of the war, is sufficient to occupy the entire time of one person, in answering letters, giving



explanations and furnishing statements of receipts and issues and abstracts of purchases of stores issued to the troops and expended in the course of their recruitment and organization for the United States service.

The acts of March 30th, 1864, and March 31st, 1864, organizing the State Rifle Corps and State Guards, and the act of April 6th, 1865, for the more effectual organization of the militia, have greatly increased the duties of this office. The several acts provided among other things, for twelve (12) days of drill, and four (4) days encampment annually, for which service the troops are entitled to draw from the state the necessary allowance of camp and garrison equipage, pay, forage and subsistence. They also provide for furnishing clothing and equipments to every non-commissioned officer and private enrolling himself in the active militia, who may elect to be furnished by the state. The clothing so drawn shall remain the property of the state until paid for by military service or otherwise. It is charged against the company commander, who, in order to account to the state for it, in his return to this office, charges the money value thereof against the men of his command who shall so elect, and gives them credit for the number of days of service performed during the year, for which he is entitled by law to pay. Consequently, the labor of this office has been so much increased under the acts referred to, and the limited clerical force employed, that I have not been able to give that attention or progress to the settlement of the state war claims that I desired.

I therefore have to request authority to employ additional clerk hire temporarily upon United States accounts.

The force at the arsenal has also been greatly reduced. By law the Quartermaster General is authorized to appoint an armorer and assistant armorer, the former at a salary of five hundred dollars (\$500) per annum, the latter at a per diem of one dollar and twenty-five cents (\$1.25) for every day actually employed. This compensation is inadequate to command the services of competent persons, nor is it possible with this force to take proper care of the large amount of property in store at the arsenal. The force now employed and the duties of each are as follows, viz:

Joseph Sterling, military storekeeper.

Charles F. Snowden, repairing and cleaning arms.

William Powell, repairing and cleaning arms.

John M. Cook, in charge of clothing and equipments.

Henry Streeper, night watchman.

John Dayton, teamster and laborer.

The arsenal having been originally erected for a penitentiary, is illy adapted to the storage of arms, its heavy walls, low ceilings and small windows render it too damp for the purpose, thereby increasing the labor and care necessary to protect the arms from deterioration by rust.

I would very respectfully recommend that an appropriation be



made sufficient to fit up the storehouse erected during the war, for the purpose of an armory.

Exhibit C, the clothing, camp and garrison equipage, ordnance and ordnance stores, received from persons in the United States service, during the year ending November 30th, 1865.

Exhibit E, clothing, camp and garrison equipage issued from State Arsenal to volunteer troops and recruits in the service of the United States, during the year ending November 30th, 1865.

Exhibit F, ordnance and ordnance stores turned over to the United States government, during the year ending November 30th, 1865.

Exhibit G, camp and garrison equipage turned into the arsenal by disbanded and other military companies during the year ending November 30th, 1865.

Exhibit H, ordnance and ordnance stores turned into the State Arsenal by disbanded and other military companies during the year ending November 30th, 1865.

Exhibit I, clothing, camp and garrison equipage issued to the uniformed companies of this State upon requisitions approved by the commandants of the corps to which said companies are attached, during the year ending November 30th, 1865.

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## STATE MILITARY AGENT'S REPORT.

OFFICE NEW JERSEY MILITARY AGENCY, }  
WASHINGTON, D. C., December 31, 1865. }

*Major General Lewis Perrine, Quartermaster General N. J. M.:*

GENERAL:—I have the honor to present the following report of the business of this Agency during the past year.

It has been of the same miscellaneous character mentioned in my former reports. General transfers of sick and wounded Jersey men to Newark have been obtained as follows:

January 30th.—All men of the Thirteenth, Thirty-third and Thirty-fifth Regiments New Jersey Volunteers, inmates of the hospitals of the West.

April 1st.—All Jersey men, inmates of the hospitals of the Department of Washington, unfit for duty within thirty days.

April 22d.—All Jersey men wounded, in hospitals and able to travel.

July 17th.—All Jersey men, inmates of any hospital, to their own State.

Transfers of individuals were obtained from time to time: whenever there was sufficient ground for asking the favor.

Since the 1st of January, 1865, one thousand five hundred and fifty-four (1,554) Jersey men have been admitted in the hospitals of Washington and Alexandria.

Over sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000) back pay and bounty have been collected for the privates of our Jersey regiments.

Advice and instruction given in numerous instances where men collected their pay in person: of the amount of such claims I have no memorandum.

In January a number of members of the Marine Corps credited to New Jersey, requested my assistance in obtaining from their commanding officer their local bounty. The amount retained by him was \$2,900. I made a statement of the case to the Secretary of the Navy, and finally succeeded in having the money paid to the men.

March 15th.—Two Jersey men, ship carpenters, taken prisoners at



Plymouth, N. C., while in government employ, called upon me for aid to reach their homes in New Jersey. They had been for a year at Andersonville, were mere walking skeletons, ragged and penniless. I took their statement and made a written application to the Quartermaster General, and in twenty-four hours the men left for home, each with six hundred dollars (\$600) in their pockets, their wages for the time they were prisoners.

May 25th.—I was informed that three hundred (300) unassigned Jersey men were in the Provisional Camp at Alexandria. I made a written application to the Provost Marshal for their transfer to Trenton, to be mustered out. This application was returned with an endorsement that the camp was broken up and the men assigned to Jersey regiments.

June 24th.—Several of these men called and stated that one hundred and ninety-five of them (the larger portion said to have been assigned to 1st N. J. Battery) were at the Soldiers' Rest in this city, had been there some days and unable to obtain transportation to Trenton.

These men left Trenton March 30th for City Point, forwarded from City Point to Barke's Junction, then back to City Point, thence to Alexandria Soldiers' Rest, then to provisional camp, then to Washington street prison, then to Soldiers' Rest, then to Gen'l Meade's headquarters, back again to Soldiers' Rest, thence a second time to Gen. Meade's headquarters, thence to headquarters of 6th Corps; but as the 1st N. J. Battery had been mustered out and sent home the commanding officer of the 6th Corps refused to receive them.

They were returned to Gen. Meade, and then to Soldiers' Rest. It appeared that no existing order covered a case of this kind. Capt. Carup who has had charge for more than two years of the Soldiers' Rest (a most worthy, efficient and kind officer), had applied for instructions; but it was at a time when the Adjutant General's office was overrun with business.

It required daily visits on my part, back and forth, between Gen. Augur's and the Adjutant General's for nearly a week, before the necessary order was received by Major Camp.

Individual cases of a similar kind were occurring every few days for several months. The delay unavoidably attending the disposal of such cases can only be understood by those personally cognizant of the infinite variety of business that passes through the several bureaus of the different departments of the General Government.

April 30th.—A Jerseyman called and stated that Sept. 29th, 1864, he arrived in this city with three hundred dollars for the purpose of going into business, he was arrested as a deserter, his money taken from him, confined in Forrest Hall deserters' prison, from September 29th to December 24th, then taken to Alexandria Washington street prison, showered from time to time to make him designate what regiment he belonged to.

A member of the 13th Pennsylvania Cavalry was confined in same

prison, and from him he learned that there belonged to that regiment an officer whom the Jerseyman knew. To avoid further punishment he said he belonged to this regiment. He was accordingly forwarded *via* Fort Monroe to Wilmington, North Carolina, near which place the 13th Pennsylvania Cavalry was stationed; not belonging to that regiment he was forwarded back to Washington. On the 10th May his case was finished and his money paid back to him.

August 4th a German, giving his name as Ludwig Duhardt called and stated he was arrested in Newark, October 21, 1864, forwarded to Trenton, thence to Forrest Hall, thence to Alexandria, three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350) taken from him and forwarded to City Point, taken sick and returned to Stanton Hospital. I went to the provost marshal's office, examined the books of Forrest Hall and the Alexandria prison, but could find no record of any such name.

I stated the case to General Breck, he sent me to Colonel Paulding, Chief Paymaster of this Department to whom money taken from deserters and other prisoners was required to be paid over, but still no trace of any such man could be found.

I wrote to the provost marshal at Newark; but no Ludwig Duhardt had been arrested there. I took the man in person to Gen. Breck's office and had him examined by his chief clerk, who is a German; he seemed to be satisfied that the man had had the money alleged.

I then wrote to provost marshal at Trenton, giving the date he was sent, and enquiring if any man of a similar name had been sent from Trenton. I received a reply stating one Louis Tuchert had been sent at the time mentioned. I again went to provost marshal and traced this Tuchert from Forrest Hall to Alexandria, and on the books of Old Fellow's Hall, found Louis Tuchert alias Duhardt, court-martialed, but no record of his money.

With the information thus obtained, I visited him at Douglas, to which hospital he had been transferred, and fortunately found a German who understood and spoke English well. Finding no record of his money, it had occurred to me that he had been robbed by his fellow prisoners, and such proved to be the fact. His money was gone beyond recovery.

He had been enrolled as Louis Tuchert. Louis Tuchert drafted, Notice served at his boarding place. I wrote to his former employer, who stated Duhardt had money by him, that the day he was arrested he had taken his money to buy a lot with. As he was under sentence of court-martial, he was discharged without pay or allowances. I however obtained transportation for him to Newark. He had been absent a year, but never in the field.

The above cases will give some idea of the variety of business that requires the attention of this agency.

Thursday night the 13th of April, the public buildings and private dwellings were brilliantly illuminated and the streets filled with crowds rejoicing over the downfall of the rebellion and the return of peace. Saturday the 15th the whole city was draped in mourning

for the loss of the Chief Magistrate of the Republic by the hand of an assassin.

A meeting of the Jersey men in Washington was held at my office and arrangements made for participating in the funeral solemnities. A committee, consisting of Messrs. Burr, Fardon and myself, were appointed to attend to the necessary details.

On the day of the funeral a large number of Jersey men were present and formed a part of the procession.

In May, 12 regiments, and 3 battalions of infantry, 2 regiments of cavalry and 3 batteries of New Jersey troops arrived in the immediate vicinity of Washington. There was scarcely a moment during business hours, but what my office contained Jersey soldiers. These troops remained here till mustered out. I endeavored to give you frequent and early information of their movements.

May 23d and 24th.—The review of the armies of Grant and Sherman took place. About noon the day previous I obtained permission from General Angur to erect a stand for the accommodation of Jersey men.

It was nearly opposite the one occupied by the President and General Grant. The erection of the stand, the printing, signing and distributing the tickets, in the short time at my disposal, required considerable labor.

Two hundred Jersey men were thus enabled to enjoy a fine view of the war worn veterans and the distinguished men on the President's stand.

The correspondence by mail and with the different offices has been large. From the 1st of June to the 4th of August, one thousand (1,000) communications by mail, and to the public offices, were sent from this office. That of the month of May was fully as great, but I cannot give the exact number with the same certainty that I do that from June to August.

The number of those calling during the past year, whose names appear on my journal, are one thousand three hundred and one (1,301).

Shortly after opening an office in 1863, I commenced keeping a rough journal, in which I entered short memoranda, giving the name of the person calling, his business, &c.: also short notes of the business transacted.

The press of business has often made it imperfect, and on two or three occasions prevented it being kept for weeks at a time. I am now using the fifth book.

The first commences the 18th of May, 1863. There are 1,422 pages filled, averaging over eight different memoranda to a page. At eight to the page, it shows eleven thousand three hundred and seventy-six (11,376) memoranda of business for the thirty-two months it has been kept, averaging over three hundred and fifty-five (355) for each month.

I have a register of all Jersey men who have been inmates of the hospitals of this department since May 2d, 1863, giving name, com-

pany, regiment, date of admission, death, discharge, or transfer, and the hospital. This register contains seven thousand seven hundred and eighty-four (7,784) names. My journal shows eight hundred and ten (810) passes to Alexandria and the armies to have been obtained through this Agency.

There are on file three thousand and twenty-seven (3,027) letters, received from various parties: of these one hundred and seven (107) are from the Governor.

Ninety-seven (97) from the Adjutant General.

Three hundred and sixty-two (362) from yourself.

This does not give the full number received, as a large proportion of the letters received from yourself, the Adjutant General and the Governor refer to matters which require their filing in the different offices, when the subject they refer to is disposed of.

The same is true to some extent of the letters received from other parties. Upon the journal appear the names of four thousand three hundred and eighteen (4,318) individuals: about one-third of these are civilians.

This includes only those whose business demanded an entry. The actual number of calls being much larger. From middle of May to middle of June they average about fifty a day.

One week in March last, I kept a tally of those calling. There were one hundred and seventy-three (173) calls; the lowest number on any one day twenty-five (25), and the highest thirty-nine (39). More than two thousand (2,000) men have been transferred to Newark under general transfers.

Annexed are tables giving the above statistics more in detail.

Every matter brought to the attention of any public officer, requires a brief, succinct statement of the facts of the case upon which you desire action. It must be brief or it will not be read, and it must contain the main points, else you injure your case; but brevity is the great necessity.

My business has been principally with the various bureaus of the War Department, viz: The Adjutant General's office, the Surgeon General, the Medical Director and the Surgeons of the Hospitals, the Paymaster General's office, the Second Auditor, Second Comptroller, the Commissioners of Pensions, the Provost Marshal, the Quartermaster General, and occasionally with almost every department.

On the 18th July, 1862, Colonel Tufts, was appointed State Agent by the Governor of Massachusetts: it was the first agency established. Since that time all the Middle and Eastern and many of the Western States have had agencies here. Originally established for the relief of the sick and wounded, the necessities of the times have so extended the operation of these agencies, that they have become general agencies for the transaction of any and all business concerning the soldier, his friends and the State.

There have been twenty-two general hospitals in this department, miles apart; for information as to the wants and needs of our sol-



diers, inmates from time to time of these hospitals, I have been much indebted to the gentlemen of the New Jersey Aid Society, who gratuitously visited the hospitals and reported to me such cases that needed special attention.

These visits were made more frequently and thoroughly immediately after each fresh arrival of wounded.

For the first six months I visited almost daily some one of the hospitals, but as the fact of an office being open became generally known, the amount of office business increased so rapidly, that I have not, since that time, made many visits except in cases requiring my personal examination.

During the last eighteen months, the Agency has been frequently called upon by the various recruiting agents of our State for aid and assistance.

In conducting the business of the Agency, my endeavor has been to make the interest of the enlisted man the first consideration.

The carrying out of this object has occasionally made the acts of the agency distasteful to some.

After the surrender of Lee, there was an universal desire among the enlisted men to be forthwith disbanded and sent home. The delay occasioned by the immense amount of clerical labor required in preparing the necessary papers for mustering out so large a body of troops, was frequently attributed by the men to a desire on the part of their officers to retain them in service. At no time during the existence of actual hostilities, was there so much dissatisfaction and grumbling in the ranks as just after the close of the war.

My policy has ever been, while listening patiently to and righting as far as possible, the actual grievances of those calling on me, still to impress upon the enlisted man to bear cheerfully and manfully the restraint required by a wholesome discipline.

I have never considered it my duty to pass judgment on the justice or injustice of any regulation. I have ever endeavored to know what the regulations were and to give Jersey men the benefit of them as they were. Even in this, not always successful.

The pay and medical departments are those with which there has been the most frequent intercourse. Every facility has been extended by the pay department for the expeditious settlement of the accounts of the discharged soldier.

From the Surgeon General I have received a continuance of that constant courtesy and ready disposition to grant all reasonable requests which has ever characterized his able and energetic administration of the medical department.

It is difficult to give a comprehensive and intelligible answer to the question—what are the duties of a State agent? He keeps in one sense an intelligence office to answer all sorts of questions. In another he is the attorney of every soldier who needs assistance, about pay, bounty, transfer, discharge, removal of charge of desertion, pardon.



The necessity and utility of such agencies have been fully proved by the large amount of business done by them in the past three years.

Since the closing of the principal hospitals, the number of persons calling has very much diminished. My principal business for this month has been with the departments in regard to pay and pensions, and the settlement of the State pay of men in general service who were credited to New Jersey.

These are men, who were so credited through the instrumentality of this office, nearly two hundred in all, over one hundred in one list. It was before our local agents had appeared.

Thrown in contact with so many different persons of course I must have exposed myself to more or less complaint, probably to some of it correctly.

I have endeavored to carry out in good faith the trust committed to my charge, and cannot close without tendering to yourself and the Governor, my thanks for the kindness and confidence with which I have been treated.
