To the Governor and Commander-in-Chief:

SIR—I submit herewith my official report of the operations of this department to this date, as required by law.

The annual returns made by company commandants of the National Guard, of the public military stores in their custody, show the arms, with some exceptions, to be in good condition. Such as are reported otherwise will be ordered returned to the Arsenal for repairs. A large number of arms have been cleaned, rebronzed and repaired during the past year.

The seven regimental and battalion organizations formerly comprised in the First Brigade have been consolidated under General Orders Nos. 7 and 9, Headquarters Division, National Guard, dated at Newark, May 21st and June 8th, 1892, respectively, into three organizations, known as the First, Second and Fourth Regiments. The requirements of paragraph 10 of General Orders No. 9, touching returns and transfers of the property of the State in possession of the old organizations, have, with a few minor exceptions, been complied with. Company D, late Fifth Regiment, has been consolidated in the remaining companies, which are now included in the First Regiment. The arms in the possession of the above-named company were returned to the Arsenal.

For a detailed statement of the number and kinds of arms, the property of the State, in store at the State Arsenal, the Camp Grounds at Sea Girt, and in possession of the National Guard, and other organizations to which issues are authorized by law, reference is made to the appendix.

ACCOUNTS OF PAYMASTERS.

Acting under your orders as transmitted by the Adjutant-General, I detailed Lieutenant-Colonel William H. Earley, of this department, to make a thorough examination of the accounts of the Paymasters

who were retired under the orders from Division Headquarters, re-organizing the First Brigade. Colonel Earley reports that he examined the accounts of the several organizations from 1886 to 1892, inclusive, and that with the exception of some instances where the regimental or battalion commandants had neglected to countersign vouchers as required by law, and a few errors of a trifling nature, he found the accounts to have been accurately and carefully kept. In the case of the late Fifth Regiment, however, he has been unable up to the date of this report, to obtain any information or access to vouchers or books of account; but I have assurances from Captain Williams (retired), Paymaster of the late Fifth Regiment, that his accounts will be submitted for examination at an early day.

ENCAMPMENT.

The Second Brigade, National Guard, under command of Brigadier and Brevet Major-General William J. Sewell, encamped at Sea Girt from July 11th to 16th. The expenses in connection therewith were as follows:

The apparent increase in the amount of the pay-roll of the Superintendent and employes is occasioned by the circumstance that the cost

of the extra force required for assisting in the removal of buildings last fall, and the cutting and gathering of the hay crop, and other necessary work preparatory to the encampment, has heretofore been charged to the item of construction in camp expenses. This year it has been included in the current expenses of the Camp Grounds, where I think it properly belongs.

The receipts from the Camp Grounds for the year were \$470.58. They would have been considerably larger, but the bills for sales of hay are unsettled at this date.

THE DEATH OF GENERAL STEELE.

Brigadier-General Dudley S. Steele, of the First Brigade, died at his residence in East Orange, on the 12th day of March last, and his funeral, on the 16th, was attended by many State officials and officers of the National Guard, anxious to pay the last tribute of respect to a beloved brother officer. The Fourth Regiment, National Guard, formerly commanded by General Steele, acted as the funeral escort. The necessary transportation was furnished by this department.

The death of General Steele was a severe loss to the National Guard. In him were united many of those qualities of head and heart essential to the character of a gentleman and soldier. Of a most kindly, sunny and courteous disposition, yet he always preserved that quiet dignity of demeanor and action in his official relations which not only commanded the respect, but the esteem of all with whom he came in contact. His intercourse with this department during his entire connection with the National Guard was of a most pleasant and satisfactory nature.

COLUMBIAN PARADE AND CELEBRATION.

The part taken by this department in the above celebration consisted in furnishing transportation, including ferry-boat service from 42d street, on the return trip, to the twenty-five companies of the National Guard of this State comprising the Provisional Brigade, under the command of Brigadier and Brevet Major-General William J. Sewell. Great-coats for the brigade were also delivered at Camden, Trenton, Elizabeth and Newark, for use in case of inclement weather. The weather proving fair, the cases containing the coats were returned to the Arsenal unopened. Hot coffee was served out to the brigade at the foot of Liberty street, before moving, and upon the dismissal of the parade the brigade moved to the armory of the Twelfth Regiment, N. G. N. Y., and partook of an excellent repast provided by the Committee of Arrangements. The brigade was then transported home without delays or accidents.

EXPENSES OF THE NATIONAL GUARD.

The net expenditures for the year, after deducting receipts from sales of obsolete and unserviceable stores, &c., were \$84,814.56, as is shown by the following statement :
