

Nonagricultural wage and salary employment rose by 18,300 from July 1978 to 2,964,400 in August 1978 on a seasonally adjusted basis, primarily due to nonmanufacturing increases. This was the eleventh consecutive month-to-month increase, and the largest since the November 1977 to December 1977 increase. Nonfarm payroll employment has increased by 294,200 or about 11% since the recession low point of May 1975. Private sector employment increased by 10,000 to 2,431,400 over the month.

On an unadjusted basis, nonagricultural wage and salary employment in August totaled 2,998,300, an increase of 9,200 from the July level as gains in the manufacturing sector offset losses in the non-manufacturing sector.

Before seasonal adjustment, increases in the durable and nondurable goods sector caused an overall increase of 12,500 in the manufacturing sector. Increases in seven out of ten durable goods component industries caused an overall growth of 2,900 with transportation equipment and miscellaneous manufacturing industries accounting for 86% of the growth. The 900 increase in transportation was due to additional recalls of auto workers while miscellaneous manufacturing experienced a seasonal increase of 1,600.

Nondurable goods employment on an unadjusted basis increased by 9,600 over the month. Apparel accounted for 8,400 of this increase as operations in the industry returned to normal after last month's vacation slowdowns.

Over the month employment changes in the nonmanufacturing sector presented a mixed picture with losses outweighing gains by 3,300 as three major industry groups increased and four decreased. Government dropped by 3,600 mostly reflecting drops in state and local educational services although the local drop was much less than usual. Employment in state and local government dropped by 1,800 and 2,500 respectively. Seasonal losses were primarily responsible for a decrease of 2,300 in both the service and wholesale and retail trade industry groups.

Among those industry groups to increase were transportation and public utilities, gaining by 2,700 and construction up by 1,600, which was sparked by over 400 returning strikers.

The increase of 2,400 jobs in the manufacturing sector on a seasonally adjusted basis was due to an increase of 2,800 in the durable goods sector as six out of ten component industries increased. Gains of 1,400 in electrical equipment and supplies and 1,600 in the transportation industry accounted for most of the increase while instruments dropping by 600 had the largest drop.

After seasonal adjustment nondurable goods employment only dropped by 400 despite the fact that apparel was the only industry to increase over the month. Apparel, up by 3,400, offset larger losses of 1,200 in food and 1,100 in textiles.

Among the nonmanufacturing sector all industry groups except mining increased. Over one-half of the sector's increase was accountable to the 8,300 increase in government reflecting expansion on the local level. This increase reflected a smaller-than-seasonal drop in local education as well as continued buildup in summer employment under Title III of CETA. Other gains were in transportation, which increased by 2,500, and wholesale and retail trade, which rose by 1,900.

Compared with August 1977, total nonagricultural employment on an unadjusted basis rose by 95,500, or 3.3%, with the private sector total increasing by 82,500. Manufacturing employment rose by 12,500 while nonmanufacturing hiring expanded by 83,000 from last year.

Durable goods industries increased by 9,300 from a year ago with transportation equipment, down by 2,900, and miscellaneous manufacturing down by 300, suffering the only losses in the sector. Electrical

machinery, up by 4,900, accounted for about 53% of the yearly growth in the durable goods sector.

Within the nondurable goods sector, losses in three industries held employment growth down to an increase of 3,200. Chemicals had the largest increase from last year, expanding by 3,300 partially offset by a loss of 1,100 in the textile industry.

In the nonmanufacturing sector all major industry groups except mining increased over the year. Service employment expanding by 22,900 had the largest increase followed by transportation and public utilities increasing by 13,800 and wholesale and retail trade up by 13,700.

Nonagricultural wage and salary employment before seasonal adjustment rose in August in five of the ten major labor areas. New Brunswick-Perth Amboy-Sayreville showed the greatest rise, up by 2,800 workers, followed by Jersey City, up by 1,600 workers. Of the five areas registering losses Hackensack and Paterson-Clifton-Passaic showed the largest declines, down by 3,200 and 1,800 jobs respectively, with most of the loss in the nonmanufacturing sector.

On the manufacturing level decreases occurred in only two of the labor areas, Paterson-Clifton-Passaic and Atlantic City, each down slightly by 100 workers. Seasonal gains in nondurables, primarily in the apparel industry, and also in durable goods reflected the rise of manufacturing employment in the other eight areas. Nonmanufacturing employment dropped in seven of the labor areas led by declines in government, trade, and services.

Over-the-year figures showed increments in nonfarm employment in all areas except Jersey City, in which a nonmanufacturing employment gain of 1,300 was not enough to offset the manufacturing loss of 1,700 jobs. Manufacturing employment rose in five areas over the year, while every area posted gains in the nonmanufacturing sector.

The weekly earnings of manufacturing production workers averaged \$256.06 during August, an increase of \$2.06 from July and \$14.53 from a year ago. The average hourly earnings of \$6.20 were up 2 cents from July and 38 cents from a year ago. During the August survey week, production workers averaged 41.3 hours compared with 41.1 hours a month ago.

After seasonal adjustment, the average weekly hours decreased to 41.3 hours from 41.4 hours in July and from 41.5 hours in August 1977. The seasonally adjusted workweek decreased by 18 minutes from last summer when it averaged 41.6 hours.

On an unadjusted basis, 14 of the primary manufacturing industrial groups had increases in weekly earnings over the month, while 5 had decreases. The largest increase was in textile mill products which jumped \$17.00 because of a return to normal operations after vacation. The largest decrease was in electrical machinery which declined by \$5.01 because of decreases in overtime hours and earnings.

The highest average weekly earnings in August were in the petroleum industry with \$384.94 for a 47.7-hour workweek. The highest hourly earnings were registered in transportation equipment with \$8.28. The lowest average weekly earnings were in leather products with \$147.78 for a 36.4-hour workweek.

## TECHNICAL NOTES

### Nonfarm Wage and Salary Employment

Employment data refer to persons on establishment payrolls who received pay for any part of the pay period which includes the 12th of the month. The data exclude proprietors, the self-employed, unpaid family workers, farm workers, and domestic workers in households. Salaried officers of corporations are included. Government employment covers only civilian employees; federal military personnel are excluded.

Persons on an establishment payroll who are on paid sick leave (when pay is received directly from the firm), on paid holiday or paid vacation, or who work during any part of the pay period but are unemployed or on strike during the rest of the period, are counted as employed. Not counted as employed are persons who, during the pay period which includes the 12th, are laid off, on leave without pay or on strike for the entire period, or who are hired but do not work during the period.

### Average Hours and Earnings

Hours and earnings data are derived from reports of payroll and man-hours for production and related workers in manufacturing. When the reported pay period exceeds one week, the payroll and man-hour figures are reduced to a weekly basis.

Average hourly earnings for manufacturing are on a "gross" basis, reflecting not only changes in basic hourly rates, but also such variable factors as premium pay for overtime and shift work, and changes in output of workers paid on an incentive plan. Excluded from average earnings are irregular bonuses, retroactive items, payments of various welfare benefits, and payroll taxes paid by employers.
