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REPORT

To the Honorable Morgan F. Larson, Governor of the State of New Jersey:

Sir—The Board of Public Utility Commissioners respectfully submits its report for the year ending December 31, 1929.

With the submission of the following data illustrative of the activities of the Board of Public Utility Commissioners there is completed twenty years of service in the regulation of public utilities in the State of New Jersey.

The past year has brought to the Board a multiplicity of duties which have engaged a large part of the time of the members in the conduct of public hearings.

New problems which are intimately related to the public interest have been presented for solution. The increased activity and expansion in the public utility field necessarily reflects itself in the added duties of the Board and its staff.

During the year 1683 applications have been made to the Board for action by it.

Hearings were held on 169 days and 643 decisions and orders have been filed.

Applications cover a very broad field including many informal complaints from citizens against utility companies. In most instances satisfactory results have been attained by informal negotiations on the part of the Board's staff of engineers and inspectors, as between the interested parties.

RATE REDUCTIONS, AND RESULTS OF CONSOLIDATIONS

The total rate reductions filed in the year 1929 are estimated to reduce annual revenue in the amount of about \$2,100,000. In a number of cases, however, rate reductions have been filed unaccompanied by any estimate of the effect on the annual revenue so that the amount named will be exceeded. About 82 per cent. of the reduction in revenue by these rate reductions was made by six electric utilities.

The amount of reductions is usually estimated on the basis of the reduction in revenue for the succeeding year, it however continues 4

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during the following years and grows by the extension of service to new customers, the reduced rates inducing greater use of the service by old as well as new customers.

The electric utilities are peculiarly fortunate in that their transmission and distribution lines may be extended to reach new customers over a much larger territory than is feasible with other utilities (except telephone system). Improvement in generating machinery has affected a marked reduction in the cost of such current delivered to the lines. These factors have made it feasible and economically sound to merge and consolidate smaller, less efficient electric utilities into larger systems with resulting benefit to the public served.

In 1918 there were 31 private electric utilities operating in this state, whereas in 1928 these have been reduced to 11 and more than 95 per cent. of the 1929 revenue from commercial metered light and power sales was received by five companies having electric operating revenues in excess of \$1,000,000.

In order to establish the effect on the public interest by the concentration of the electric light and power business in fewer companies, a study has been made of the records of three of these five companies covering operations from 1924 to 1928, inclusive, one of them from 1925 to 1929, and one from 1924 to 1929 with one or two months of 1929 estimated and adjusted. For each company and for each year the periods under consideration, the kilowatt hours sold and the revenue received therefor, have been tabulated and the average rate during year preceding such period for each company computed. The total number of kilowatt hours sold by each company during the periods is computed at the average rate for such sales during the year preceding such period.

It is to be understood, however, that this average rate must be applied with caution as it is affected by the relative amount of short hour and long hour use of service by the customers of the respective companies. As applied herein, however, it is believed that the results are sufficiently accurate for the purpose of illustration.

The following table is illustrative of rate reductions which have been passed on to electric users amounting to \$31,056,000;

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These reductions are due in a large measure to the elimination of comparatively small less efficient power stations and the transmission of power to local substations. All of this is made possible by re-grouping of companies in a smaller corporate group. Customers using electricity are partly responsible for this reduction in rates because of a greater use by them of the product, induced by the development of devices and appliances coupled with a lower rate.

It is to be noted that these large reductions in rates and revenues have been effected without expensive rate cases and either by the voluntary action of the companies or upon demand by the Board, based on study of operating conditions of the respective companies.

STREET TRANSPORTATION RATES

Public Service Coordinated Transport and its predecessor, Public Service Railway Company, has been before the Board on numerous occasions commencing in 1918, and has submitted data showing the higher costs of operation and, in general, changes in the relation between the earnings and operating expenses which resulted in decreases in the net earnings available as a return on the investment. Decisions were rendered by the Board from time to time, readjusting rates on various bases, none of which resulted in sufficient increase in the net earnings, whether measured by the standards set up and claimed by the Company or by the standards of value adopted by this Board. Finally, as a result of suggestion by the Board, and after consideration of all that had gone before, including the court decision which had some time before authorized the imposition of an eight cent fare, the Company, on October 1, 1923, put into effect a five cent rate for each fare zone without transfers but with adjustments in the lengths of the zones.

Coincident with the increased costs, and partly a cause for the reduction in net revenues, the development of transportation by buses (largely at first by agencies entirely independent of Public Service Coordinated Transport) materially reduced the passengers carried by street railways. Many independent bus lines and individual buses already in operation were taken over by Public Service Transportation Company, a company formed especially for the operation of buses, and in addition purchased many new buses. Following the enactment of a law authorizing the same, the Public Service Transportation Company and Public Service Railway Company were consolidated forming the company now known as Public Service Coordinated Transport.

Following the institution of the five cent fare in October 1923, many adjusments were made, partly on the request of municipalities, but to a certain extent after formal hearing at which all interested parties were represented. In addition a considerable amount of coordination of bus and street car service has been effected, and in a number of cases, particularly where the track itself was in bad condition and required reconstruction, street car service has been abandoned in favor

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of service by buses. These various changes have without question resulted in improvement of the net revenues of the Company and this information has not only been made public from time to time, but was communicated directly to the employees of the Company through their union representatives. This was important because of the fact that the contract between the Company and its employees expired a few months ago, and was only renewed after the union officials were satisfied that the revenues were insufficient to provide increased wages for the operators.

The Company has now, under date of November 21, 1929, filed with the Board a proposed readjustment in rates under which the transient rider will be required to pay ten cents where five cents is now the fare, but those who make a habit of riding on the cars or buses of this Company will be able to purchase ten tokens for fifty cents, by the use of which they will still be able to obtain the ride for five cents. Thus those who make use of tokens will not have an increase in the charge for service. Many references have been made to this arrangement as an increased rate. It is true that the object in adopting this plan is to bring about some increase in the revenues, but what this increase will amount to is problematical. It is practically impossible to predict the results of this arrangement. No one is able to tell just how many people will purchase tokens or how many will be required to pay at the rate of ten cents per zone. The new rate of fare is distinctly an experiment and can be considered only as such. In view of this fact, and in view of the utter impossibility of determining the results, the Board decided to allow the experiment to be made, the Company (as has been the practice in the past) furnishing the Board with periodical statements as to the results.

This has led to an examination by the Board of the operating results of the Public Service Electric and Gas Company, both with regard to gas service and electric service. Examination indicates that no more than a fair return is being obtained at the present time in connection with the operations of the gas department. On the other hand, examination of the appropriate data concerning the electric operations indicated that there should be some adjustments downward in the rates for electricity. The Company was called into conference and its officials, were informed that coincident with the inauguration of this experiment in street transportation rates, there should be a reduction in the rates for electric rates providing for a substantial reduction. The new rate becomes effective with the first of the new year. There have been other reductions in electric rates, almost entirely brought about by suggestions from this Board and negotiation with the Company.

A more complete statement concerning this is found in another part of this report.

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STREET TRANSPORTATION

Auto Buses

There has been a further marked development of the auto bus transportation during the past year. As of December 1st, 1929, there was approximately 3,330 auto buses in operation in intrastate service on approximately 423 routes, compared with about 2,500 auto buses on approximately 360 routes at the same time last year.

The operation of auto buses by corporations, rather than by individuals is becoming more general with the result that the number of individually owned auto buses has greatly decreased. The Public Service Coordinated Transport is the largest operator of auto buses in the State. Several of the smaller street railway companies have placed in operation additional auto bus routes and other railway companies which had not operated auto buses previous to this year have inaugurated such service, either as auxilliary service or in substitution for trolley service which has been abandoned.

The De Luxe or parlor car type of auto bus service has been extended to a considerable degree, routes extending for the most part from the center of the larger cities to surburban districts. This type of service has also been inaugurated in a number of instances between cities. A superior type of vehicle is operated, limited stops only are made in many cases; no standees are allowed and the fare charged is somewhat higher than the corresponding fare on other means of transportation through the same territory. There continues to be a distinct demand for such service.

The practice of substituting auto bus for trolley service has continued mainly for economic reasons. This has occurred in some cases where street railway tracks have reached such a state of disrepair as to call for extensive replacement. In other cases the substitution has been made apparently because of comparatively light traffic which, under many conditions, can be more economically operated with auto buses. Another apparent reason for the substitution of buses for trolleys is due to the continued development of larger types of vehicles, which appear, in many instances, to more adequately handle the traffic than the smaller types.

The substitution of auto bus service for steam railroad service or the operation of auxilliary auto bus routes by steam railroads, has been greatly extended during the past year.

The service furnished and the equipment operated by auto bus companies has been kept under continuous observation. In cases where it was found that the equipment was not in safe and proper operating conditions, the necessary repairs have been immediately required. 8

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In this connection, it should be noted there continues to be a marked improvement in the type of auto buses generally operated throughout the State during the past year.

During 1929 the Board received approximately 270 applications for approval of municipal consents for the operation of auto buses. These applications cover the approval of municipal consents for the operation of buses on new routes, additional buses on existing routes, extensions or changes of existing routes and for the transfer of buses on existing routes, and involved the operation of approximately 2020 buses.

Approximately 200 informal and formal complaints were received pertaining to bus and street railway operations and inspector's reports submitted on the informal and a portion of the formal cases. Hearings were held on the formal cases and decisions rendered.

Incidental to the inspection of interstate auto bus equipment much information has been obtained concerning the number and character of interstate routes and the number of buses operated. The Board's records indicate that there are approximately 69 auto bus companies, or individuals, operating 122 interstate routes; approximately 1250 auto buses are engaged in this service.

The matter of interstate buses carrying insurance and filing a record of the same with the Board, which was also placed under the jurisdiction of the Board in the statute hereinbefore referred to, has received attention, with the result that a fairly accurate record has been obtained of this situation as applying to interstate buses.

The situation in South Jersey has become complicated through the promiscuous operation of many interstate routes extending between points in New Jersey and the City of Philadelphia, Penna. In several instances the operators of these lines do not consistently follow the same route, but change their field of service, sometimes from day to day, in order, apparently, to serve the territory which will bring in the greatest revenue. Other interstate routes are more stable in their operation. This entire situation, which is detrimental to local operations, exists only through the absence of the authority for regulation of the operation of interstate lines by State or Federal legislation.

STREET RAILWAYS

Frequent inspections have been made of the service furnished and the equipment of street railways. Investigation of complaints and accidents has also been continued. Extensive traffic checks and surveys have been made from time to time both on the Board's initiative and in connection with the investigation of the complaints. Appropriate action has been taken on all these matters when such appeared necessary or advisable for the betterment of the service. The experiment of rehabilitation by several of the companies of a number of cars, by

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providing more comfortable riding qualities and more attractive appearance, has been continued as in past recent years. with apparently very satisfactory results both to the public and the operators.

Several other improvements have been made by the Street Railway Companies in connection with their equipment, particularly in regard to the matter of track reconstruction which has been carried on very extensively, especially by the larger utilities.

ELECTRIC HIGH TENSION TRANSMISSION

The electric utilities of this State have accomplished a great deal during the year toward insuring continuous and adequate service for the public. This advance has been made possible through the completion and projection of new generating stations and transmission lines throughout the State. The most important project of this kind is the 220,000 volt high-tension steel tower transmission line now being erected to connect the properties of the Pennslylvania Power and Light Company, the Philadelphia Electric Company, the New Jersey Power and Light Company and the Public Service Electric and Gas Company. This line extends from the Pennsylvania Power and Light Company's lines at Bushkill on the Delaware River to the Switching Station at Roseland, N. J., which may be termed the northern leg; and from the Philadelphia Electric Company's lines across the River from Lambertville, N. J., to the Roseland Switching Station, which may be termed the southern leg. The northern leg of this line has been practically completed this year and the southern leg is now under construction. This 220, 000 volt line will permit interchange of power between these utilities, making it possible to insure service and reserve capital normally necessary for spare units, for other purposes.

Through the medium of these interconnections, the Conowingo and other hydro electric plants and the Mine Mouth plants in the Pennsylvania coal fields together with the New Jersey plants will form one of the largest power pools in the United States. Roseland Switching Station will become the hub of a gigantic net work of transmission lines supplying practically all of North Jersey. Last year the 132,000 volt steel tower transmission line connecting Roseland with the Public Service Electric and Gas Company's generating stations on the Newark Meadows was completed. This year connection has been made between Roseland and a Switching Station at Metuchen and other transmission lines between Metuchen and Trenton, thereby linking the Public Service Electric and Gas Company's northern division with the southern division, and insuring service to the most densely populated sections of New Jersey with power from many different sources of supply. A modern 53,000 kw. generating station has been erected at Holland, N. J., by the New Jersey Power and Light Company, which plant is nearing completion and should be in operation the early part of 1930. This plant operates under 1200 pounds steam and will sup-

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ply power to the New Jersey Power and Light Company's system which heretofore has been dependent on generating stations outside of the State, whose system will be tied into Roseland through a transmission line from the New Jersey Power and Light Company's system to that Switching Station.

At South Amboy, New Jersey, construction is well under way on a 60,000 kw. modern high-pressure steam generating plant operating under 1400 pounds steam pressure. This plant will supply energy to the Jersey Central Power and Light Company's system.

At Deepwater, New Jersey, a high-pressure steam generating station is approaching completion and should be completed this year or the early part of next year. This station is jointly owned by the United Gas Improvement Company and Atlantic City Electric Company. Transmission lines are being built from this station across the southern end of the State, which is now receiving power from the generating station at Atlantic City and through a connection from Wilmington, Delaware.

It is of interest to know that upon completion of the plants described above, New Jersey will have within its boundary three generating plants of the most modern design, all of which are using steam at a pressure of 1200 lbs. or over, which should assure the public that the utilities of this State are following the latest practices and most modern methods in order to assure continuous service, at a minimum cost.

The utilities of the State, in addition to the regular supply of electrical energy, will be called upon during the next year to supply electrical energy for the electrification of the Lackawanna R. R.

APPRAISAL DIVISION

During the year applications for adjustments in rates have been under investigation concerning 16 gas, water and electric companies, examinations where sales of entire property or transfer of stock ownership were involved concerning 17 electric, water or telephone companies, issues of securities by 18 electric, gas and water companies; 35 applications have been investigated and passed upon involving approval by the Board of the sale of unused parcels of land aggregating a total value of \$709,946. The transfer of investment in unused and unnecessary land or other property to property actually used and useful in the furnishing of service to the company has the effect of reducing the total investment involved in proportion to the amount of business done, and such transfers should be encouraged where the sale price is sufficient.

Hearings by the Interstate Commerce Commission on railroad valuations and telephone property depreciation have been attended when necessary and the data and exhibits in those cases analyzed and commented upon before the Interstate Commerce Commission.

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Extensive routine work has also been done in compiling and analyzing costs and unit prices of constructing and operating the various classes of utilities. Price indexes from all available sources are regularly compiled and analyzed.

The results of this work are utilized in all applications for approval of securities issued for the purpose of financing construction by public utilities.

INFORMAL COMPLAINTS

During the year about 800 informal complaints were received from customers of electric, gas, water and telephone companies. These complaints relate chiefly to individuals grievance against public utilities. About 35% come from applicants for service involving extensions of facilities, where the terms proposed by the utilities appear unsatisfactory. The number of complaints referring to extensions is less than the number received during 1928. Approximately 45% of the complaints refer to bills rendered and can be classified as high bills, applications of rate schedules, deposits to guarantee payment of bills and requests that meters be tested by Inspectors of the Board. The remaining 20% refer to quality of service furnished, reasonableness of the company's rules, disputes between companies as to boundary lines of territory served, etc. Informal complaints are referred to Inspectors for investigation and report, and many complaints are adjusted to the satisfaction of the complainant.

INSPECTION OF PLANTS

The customary periodical inspection of plants and distribution systems of gas, electric and water companies, have been made by the Board's Engineers during the year. At all visits made to gas plants, tests are made of the heating value of the gas. Periodic tests are made of the standards used by the gas, electric or water companies to test customers' meters. The Board's rules require that all meters be tested at regular intervals and that records be kept of all such tests. These records are open to examination by the Board's Inspectors and each company is required to file with the Board periodic reports giving the summary of all meter tests made by the company.

SERVICE DIVISION-WATER DEPARTMENT

During 1929, a considerable deficiency in rainfall was experienced not only throughout this state but throughout the entire country and a large part of the world. In New Jersey a considerable excess in rainfall during 1928 was converted into a decided 1929 deficiency in all districts. Notwithstanding this fact, no failure of water service due to

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failure of supply was reported. This is due in a measure to the policy of the Board of fostering interconnection for emergency purposes of all contiguous water systems.

GAS UTILITIES

During the year the International Combustion Company completed the construction of a low temperature carbonization plant at Raritan and the company is now selling 3,000,000 cu. ft. of gas daily to the Public Service Electric and Gas Company. The gas is delivered to a new holder station of the latter company situated adjacent to the coke plant. The plant consists of eight retorts, seven of which are operated continually, the eighth acting as a spare. In addition to the coke ovens the company has installed two water gas sets which are used to make a blue, or water, gas of lower heating value than the gas made in the coke plant, so that the heating value of the gas delivered to the Public Service Electric and Gas Company will meet the requirements of the Board's rules. In emergencies the water gas sets can be used to supply all the gas required by the Public Service Electric and Gas Company for its customers in what is known as its Central Division. During the year gas mains have been extended in various parts of the State. The Public Service Electric and Gas Company has extended its transmission mains to New Providence, Butler, Bloomingdale; Wayne Township, Pequannock and Radburn in the Passaic Division, Northvale and Park Ridge in the Bergen Division; New Providence in the Essex Division: Oak Tree and Bonhampton in the Central Division and Bellmaur, Hutchinson Mills and Lumberton in the Southern Division.

STEAM RAILROADS

The Board, during the year, has received a number of applications from railroad companies to discontinue the maintenance of agents at railroad stations from and to which traffic had decreased. When such an application is received the Board fixes a date for a hearing and causes a notice to be posted in the stations directing attention to the time and place of the same. Objections have been given due consideration, and where it appeared that the revenue warranted the continuance of the agency and public inconvenience would result from abandonment, this has been denied.

In most cases, however, it appeared that the conditions did not justify continuance of the agencies and permission for their withdrawal was granted. The decrease in railroad traffic appeared to be directly due to the development of motor traffic, including private automobiles, buses and motor trucks.

Inspections have been made during the year of steam railroad tracks and bridges. Reports with appropriate recommendations of the Board's engineer, forwarded to the companies, have been accepted by them. A percentage record of track conditions is kept of all the

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main and branch lines in the State, by means of which comparisons may be made which indicates improvements or impairment of track conditions.

ELECTRIFICATION OF RAILROADS

Electrification is actively under way on both the Pennsylvania and Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroads. The former is connecting up its Philadelphia and New York electric zones, construction work having advanced through Trenton. When this work is completed Manhattan Transfer will cease to be the point of change from steam to electric trains.

Overhead construction on the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad is advancing rapidly, the overhead structures being set across the meadows from Hoboken to Montclair and on the main line they are under construction to Dover via Morristown. The Montclair Branch will probably be the first placed in operation and that during the late summer of 1930, with the line to Morristown shortly following.

STATISTICS AND ACCOUNTS AND ANNUAL REPORTS

Reports are made to the Board annually by all utilities subject to its jurisdiction. These reports give the revenues and expenses, the fixed charges and the additions to and deductions from the capital account. RECEIPTS AND OPERATING EXPENSES OF PUBLIC UTILITIES

The following is compiled from reports submitted by public utilities for the calendar year 1928. Reports for the year 1929 will not be submitted until after the first of March.
