CURRENT PROGRAM STATISTICS

Attached please find CURRENT PROGRAM STATISTICS for October 1998. Included are TANF-oriented data, and the WFNJ Statistical Summary. Some items of interest include:

- The TANF caseload continues to decline. Since January of this year there has been a decrease of 18.7%.
- Food Stamp households also continue to decline. Since January of this year there has been an 8.3% decrease.
- Due to manual reporting from a number of municipalities, General Assistance caseload numbers are not as current as TANF and Food Stamp data. The most current caseload data, June 1998, shows an increase of 1.7% from January of this year.

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Highlights of CURRENT PROGRAM STATISTICS

TANF

(Tables 1 and 5, Graphs 1 and 4)

[The number of single parent families is reduced by the number of companion cases listed for payment on the source table FF-012, to avoid double counting.]

As of the end of October 1998, 66,910 eligible families in New Jersey were receiving TANF cash assistance:

- 64,988 single head of household families
- 1,922 two-parent families.

In addition, there were about 6700 families receiving Medicaid Only assistance.

The largest number of TANF families receiving cash assistance, by county:

Essex — 20,756, Hudson — 11,071, Camden — 7,198, Passaic — 4,978, Union — 4,208

The number of TANF cash assistance families in the other 16 counties ranged from:

■ 50 families in **Hunterdon** County to **3,089** in **Mercer** County, with seven counties below **1000** families

Nearly 1800 fewer eligible TANF families were receiving cash assistance in October 1998 than in September, with a decline of more than 34,500, or 34 percent, compared to the number of AFDC families receiving cash assistance two years ago in October 1996.

- Single head families: almost 1700 fewer were eligible in October 1998 than in September, and 31,300 below two years ago in October 1996, a drop of 32.5 percent.
- Two parent families: declined by 3300 or 63 percent from about 5200 in October 1996.

FOOD STAMP PROGRAM

(Tables 2 and 6, Graphs 2, 5, and 6)

At the end of October 1998, 165,000 households were authorized to participate in the Food Stamp Program.

- TANF: about 70,000 households with 225,500 persons.
- Other low income: close to 95,000 households with 144,500 persons.
- Total persons: about 370,000, including 175,500 adults and 194,500 children
- By County: almost 50 percent of the households were in:
 Essex 43,400

Hudson 22.800

Camden 15,700

Two years ago in October 1996, 213,100 households were authorized to participate in Food Stamps in New Jersey. Over the next two years the number declined by more than 48,000, or 22.6 percent, to 165,000 by October 1998, the third consecutive month below 170,000 this year.

- TANF(FS) households steadily declined from about 102,000 in October 1996 to about 70,000 two years later. There were 111,000 Other Low Income households in October 1996 and less than 95,000 two years later.
- Total FS Recipients Authorized to Participate: were 490,000 in October 1996, and declined to 370,000 by October 1998, a drop of 120,000, or 24.5 percent.
- Adult FS Recipients: declined from about 235,500 in October 1996 to 175,500 in October 1998, a
 drop of nearly 60,000 (25.5 percent).
- Recipient FS Children: also declined by about 60,000 (23.6 percent), from about 254,500 in October 1996 to 194,500 in October 1998.

EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE

(Tables 3, 7 and 9, Graphs 3, 7 and 9)

In October 1998 Emergency Assistance (EA) payments were made for 2505 eligible TANF families and 258 SSI recipients in New Jersey. For TANF families this included payments for:

- Temporary Rental Assistance (TRA) for 466 families
- Motel placements for 295 families and emergency shelter placements for 306 families
- All other TANF-EA for 1438 families (including back rent, back utilities, security deposits, furnishings, clothing and food allowance, or transitional housing)
- 875 families in Essex County, 363 in Passaic County, and less than 200 TANF families in each
 of the other counties.

In the past two years, the average number of EA payments for TANF/AFDC families was about 4750 in 1996, 3550 for 1997, and 2500 for the first ten months of 1998. Payments were made for slightly more than half as many families in October 1998 as in October 1996.

- TRA payments were less than one third of the number in October 1996.
- Motel payments declined by 12 percent from 334 in October 1996.
- Emergency Shelter payments declined by about 20 percent from 385 in October 1996.
- Other TANF-EA payments declined by 40 percent from 2388 in October 1996.

For 1996 there were an average of 6800 GA EA recipients, 6700 for 1997, and 6400 for the first half of 1998. Of those, GA TRA payments were made to an average of 4100 recipients in 1996, and 4000 in 1997 and 3900 in the first half of 1998.

TANF PARTICIPATION RATES

(Table 8, Graph 8)

(Not updated)

The TANF participation rate for September 1998 was 28.67% for the State as a whole. This is an increase of about 1.5 percentage points from August 1998.

Participation rates by county:

- Three counties, Essex, Gloucester, and Mercer, were between 22 and 25 percent.
- Eight counties, Atlantic, Camden, Cape may, Hudson, Hunterdon, Ocean, Union and Warren, were clustered between 28 and 32 percent.
- Six counties, Bergen, Burlington, Cumberland, Middlesex, Morris, and Passaic, were between 33 and 36 percent.
- The four highest counties were Monmouth, Salem, Somerset and Sussex, which ranged from 41 to 45 percent.

GENERAL ASSISTANCE

(Table 9, Graph 9)

There were 27,446 GA recipients in June 1998, almost unchanged from May 1998. The GA total was about 1700 below June 1997 and about 4000 below June 1996.

- There were **17,000 Employable GA** recipients in June 1998. The level remained around **20,000** from June 1996 through April 1997, and less than **18,000** since July 1997.
- With about 10,400 in June 1998, Unemployable GA recipients remained in the 10,000 to 11,000 range over the past two years.

CHILD SUPPORT AND PATERNITY

(Table 10)

In FFY 1998, October 1997 - September 1998, the total distribution of collections of the Child Support and Paternity Program was \$621.6 million, compared to less than \$593 million in FFY 1997, October 1996 - September 1997.











Explanatory Notes

The Department of Human Services Division of Family Development provides basic income and an opportunity to achieve self-sufficiency for individuals and families served by the Division's programs. The Division provides leadership, direction and supervision to those public agencies responsible for administering those programs and plans for and develops policies to promote self-sufficiency.

WORK FIRST NEW JERSEY (WFNJ) - Fully implemented July 1, 1997, this is New Jersey's welfare reform program which responds to the requirements of the Federal Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act (PRWORA) of 1996. PRWORA establishes Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) as the replacement for AFDC cash assistance. WFNJ includes two segments, WFNJ/TANF for families with children, and WFNJ/GA (General Assistance) for single adults and couples without dependent children. The emphasis is on achieving self-sufficiency and limits lifetime receipt of financial assistance to a total of five years.

Number of Persons Employed This Month, Still Receiving TANF - From Activities Summary Report (OMEGA report # RM064).

Participants Receiving Child Care Services - From Issuance Disbursement Summary (OMEGA report # RM703). Total number of active participants who show receipt of **Child Care**.

Number of Persons Closed on FAMIS Due to Employment- From FAMIS report # FM463.

Post TANF and Receiving Child Care - Persons no longer in receipt of TANF but still receiving child care. From Issuance Disbursement Summary (OMEGA report # RM703).

AID TO FAMILIES WITH DEPENDENT CHILDREN (AFDC) - Replaced by WFNJ/TANF July 1, 1997, AFDC provided financial assistance for dependent children and their natural or adoptive parents, or certain other relatives recognized as taking the place of a parent.

Regular AFDC (C Segment) - assistance when only one parent is in the home due to death or absence, or both parents are in the home but at least one is incapacitated.

Two-parent Families:

Unemployed Parents (F Segment) - assistance when both parents are in the home, neither is incapacitated and the primary wage earner meets the federally defined criteria for unemployment.

State AFDC (N Segment) - assistance when both parents are in the home, neither is incapacitated, and the primary wage earner does not meet the federal definition of unemployment.

MEDICAID ONLY FAMILIES no longer receive AFDC/TANF financial assistance but remain eligible for Medicaid under applicable provisions which extend coverage beyond the period of assistance. These are shown separately in these tables because cash assistance and Medicaid have been de-linked.

FOOD STAMP PROGRAM (FS) - Authorized by Congress as a nutritional supplement program to provide low income households with more food of greater variety and better nutrition. Program eligibility is based on household income, resources, and expenses for medical, shelter, and dependent care. CWA staff refer certain recipients to the New Jersey Department of Labor for participation in the Food Stamp Employment and Training Program.

EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE (EA) - Payments to those eligible for WFNJ/TANF or WFNJ/GA, authorized during the 30 consecutive days immediately following the emergency (defined as a substantial loss of shelter, food, clothing, or household furnishings by fire, flood or other similar disaster) or if the eligible individual or family is in an imminent or actual state of homelessness.
