SUBJECT CURRENT PROGRAM STATISTICS

Attached please find CURRENT PROGRAM STATISTICS for July 1999. Included are TANF-oriented data, and the WFNJ Statistical Summary. Some items of interest include:

- The TANF caseload continues to decline. Since January of 1999 there has been a decrease of 10.9%.
- Food Stamp households decreased more than 8,000 since January 1999.
- Due to manual reporting from a number of municipalities, General Assistance recipient numbers are not as current as TANF and Food Stamp data. Recipient figures reported are for June 1999, which are 8.3% below June 1998.



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Highlights of CURRENT PROGRAM STATISTICS

[The number of single parent families is reduced by the number of companion cases listed for payment on the source table FF-012, to avoid double counting.]

As of the end of July 1999, 56,696 eligible families in New Jersey were receiving TANF cash assistance:

- **55,330** single head of household families
- 1,366 two-parent families.

The largest number of TANF families receiving cash assistance, by county:

Essex — 18,149, Hudson — 9,761, Camden — 5,854, Passaic — 4,407, Union — 3,488

The number of TANF cash assistance families in the other 16 counties ranged from:

32 families in Hunterdon County to 2,505 in Mercer County,

with eight counties below 1000 families

More than 1400 fewer eligible TANF families were receiving cash assistance in July 1999 than in June 1999, with a decline of more than 35,300, or 38.4 percent, compared to the number of families receiving cash assistance two years ago in July 1997.

- Single head families: Approximately 1400 fewer were eligible in July 1999 than in June 1999, and 32,200 below two years ago in July 1997, a drop of 36.8%.
- Two parent families: declined by 3,200 or almost 70 percent from about 4,500 in July 1997.

FOOD STAMP PROGRAM

(Tables 2 and 6, Graphs 2, 5, and 6)

At the end of July 1999, less than 151,000 households were authorized to participate in the Food Stamp Program.

- TANF: about 46,000 households with 149,000 persons.
- Other low income: approximately 104,600 households with 188,700 persons.
- Total persons: 338,000, including 162,000 adults and 176,000 children
- By County: 58.7 percent of the households were in: Essex 38,650
 - Hudson 21,660 Camden 13,840 Passaic 14,200

Two years ago in July 1997, 192,500 households were authorized to participate in Food Stamps in New Jersey. Over the next two years the number declined by about 41,900, or 21.8 percent, to 150,600 by July 1999.

- TANF(FS) households steadily declined by more than 43,000 from about 89,000 in July 1997 to 46,000 two years later. There were approximately 103,500 Other Low Income households in July 1997 and about 1100 more two years later.
- Total FS Recipients Authorized to Participate: were about 441,150 in July 1997, and declined to 337,850 by July 1999, a drop of 105,300, or 23.4 percent.
- Adult FS Recipients: declined from about 210,000 in July 1997 to 162,000 in July 1999, a drop of 48,000 (22.9 percent).
- Recipient FS Children: declined by 59,400 (23.9 percent), from about 231,100 in July 1997 to 175,800 in July 1999.

EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE

(Tables 3, 7 and 9, Graphs 3, 7

and 9)

In July 1999 Emergency Assistance (EA) payments were made for 1,716 eligible TANF families and 296 SSI recipients in New Jersey. For TANF families this included payments for:

- Temporary Rental Assistance (TRA) for 306 families
- Motel placements for 210 families and emergency shelter placements for 276 families
- All other TANF-EA for 924 families (including back rent, back utilities, security deposits, furnishings, clothing and food allowance, or transitional housing)
- 657 families in Essex County, 234 in Passaic County, 132 in Middlesex County, 126 in Bergen County and less than 100 TANF families in each of the other seventeen counties.

In the past two years, the average number of EA payments for TANF families was 3,547 in 1997, 2,437 for 1998, and 1,873 for the first seven months of 1999. Payments were made to 51.5% fewer families in July 1999 as compared to July 1997.

- TRA payments were 23.4% of the number in July 1997.
- Motel payments were 88% from two years ago.
- Emergency Shelter payments were approximately 90% of the number in July 1997.
- Other TANF-EA payments were approximately **55%** of the number in July 1997.

For 1997 there were an average of 6,700 GA EA recipients, 5,600 for 1998 and 3,900 for the first half of 1999. Of those, GA TRA payments were made to an average of 4,000 recipients in 1997, 3,300 in 1998 and 2,100 for the first half of 1999.

TANF PARTICIPATION RATES

(Not updated)

The TANF participation rate for September 1998 was 28.67% for the State as a whole. This is an increase of about 1.5 percentage points from August 1998.

Participation rates by county:

- Three counties, Essex, Gloucester, and Mercer, were between 22 and 25 percent.
- Eight counties, Atlantic, Camden, Cape may, Hudson, Hunterdon, Ocean, Union and Warren, were clustered between 28 and 32 percent.
- Six counties, Bergen, Burlington, Cumberland, Middlesex, Morris, and Passaic, were between 33 and 36 percent.
- The four highest counties were Monmouth, Salem, Somerset and Sussex, which ranged from 41 to 45 percent.

GENERAL ASSISTANCE

(Table 9, Graph 9)

There were 25,176 GA recipients in June 1999. Total recipients were 29,131 in June 1997 and 27,446 in June 1998.

- There were 15,419 Employable GA recipients in June 1999.
- With about 9,800 in June 1999, this was the first month Unemployable GA recipients dropped below the 10,000 to 11,000 range over the past two years.


CHILD SUPPORT AND PATERNITY

(Table 10)

During the first nine months of FFY 1999, the total distribution of collections of the Child Support and Paternity Program was more than \$500 million, an increase of almost 11 percent over the same period of FFY 1998.

Explanatory Notes

The Department of Human Services Division of Family Development provides basic income and an opportunity to achieve self-sufficiency for individuals and families served by the Division's programs. The Division provides leadership, direction and supervision to those public agencies responsible for administering those programs and plans for and develops policies to promote self-sufficiency.

WORK FIRST NEW JERSEY (WFNJ) - Fully implemented July 1, 1997, this is New Jersey's welfare reform program which responds to the requirements of the Federal Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act (PRWORA) of 1996. PRWORA establishes Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) as the replacement for AFDC cash assistance. WFNJ includes two segments, WFNJ/TANF for families with children, and WFNJ/GA (General Assistance) for single adults and couples without dependent children. The emphasis is on achieving self-sufficiency and limits lifetime receipt of financial assistance to a total of five years.

Participants Receiving Child Care Services - From Issuance Disbursement Summary (OMEGA report # RM703). Total number of active participants who show receipt of **Child Care**.

Number of Persons Closed on FAMIS Due to Employment- From FAMIS report # FM463.

Post TANF and Receiving Child Care - Persons no longer in receipt of TANF but still receiving child care. From Issuance Disbursement Summary (OMEGA report # RM703).

MEDICAID ONLY FAMILIES no longer receive TANF financial assistance but remain eligible for Medicaid under applicable provisions which extend coverage beyond the period of assistance. These are shown separately in these tables because cash assistance and Medicaid have been de-linked.

FOOD STAMP PROGRAM (FS) - Authorized by Congress as a nutritional supplement program to provide low income households with more food of greater variety and better nutrition. Program eligibility is based on household income, resources, and expenses for medical, shelter, and dependent care. CWA staff refer certain recipients to the New Jersey Department of Labor for participation in the Food Stamp Employment and Training Program.

EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE (EA) - Payments to those eligible for WFNJ/TANF or WFNJ/GA, authorized during the 30 consecutive days immediately following the emergency (defined as a substantial loss of shelter, food, clothing, or household furnishings by fire, flood or other similar disaster) or if the eligible individual or family is in an imminent or actual state of homelessness.
