Attached please find CURRENT PROGRAM STATISTICS for November 2000. Included are TANF-oriented data, and the WFNJ Statistical Summary. Some items of interest include:

- The TANF caseload continues to decline. Since November of 1999 there has been a decrease of 15.6%.
- Food Stamp households decreased by over 6,600 since November 1999.
- For GA, recipient figures reported are for December 1999, which are 6.4% below December 1998.

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

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Highlights of CURRENT PROGRAM STATISTICS

TANF

(Tables 1 and 5, Graphs 1 and 4)

[The number of single parent families is reduced by the number of companion cases listed for payment on the source table FF-012, to avoid double counting.]

As of the end of November 2000, 45,043 eligible families in New Jersey were receiving TANF cash assistance:

- 44,215 single head of household families
- 828 two-parent families.

The largest number of TANF families receiving cash assistance, by county:

Essex — 15,010, Hudson — 7,167, Camden — 4,692, Passaic — 3,434 Union — 2,657

The number of TANF cash assistance families in the other 16 counties ranged from:

 52 families in Hunterdon County to 2,012 in Mercer County, with eleven counties below 1000 families

There were 20,725 fewer eligible TANF families receiving cash assistance in November 2000 than in November 1999, a decline of 31.5 percent.

- Single head families: 19,729 below two years ago in November 1998, a drop of 30.9%.
- Two parent families: declined by 996 or 54.6 percent from November 1998.

FOOD STAMP PROGRAM

(Tables 2 and 6, Graphs 2, 5, and 6)

At the end of November 2000, 136,784 households participated in the Food Stamp Program.

- TANF: 35,831 households with 115,179 persons.
- Other low income: 100,953 households with 184,780 persons.
- Total persons: 299,959, including 146,432 adults and 153,527 children

By County: 57.2 percent of the households were in:
Essex 32,039

Hudson 20,178

Passaic 13,641

Two years ago in November 1998, 162,585 households participated in Food Stamps in New Jersey. Over the next two years the number declined by 25,801, or 15.9 percent, to 136,784 by November 2000.

- TANF(FS) households steadily declined by 33,159 from 68,990 in November 1998 to 35,831 two
 years later. There were 93,595 Other Low Income households in November 1998 and 7,358 more
 two years later.
- Total FS Recipients: were 365,339 in November 1998, and declined to 299,959 by November 2000, a drop of 65,380, or 17.9 percent.
- Adult FS Recipients: declined from 173,472 in November 1998 to 146,432 in November 2000, a drop of 27,040 (15.6 percent).
- Recipient FS Children: declined by 38,340 (20.0 percent), from 191,867 in November 1998 to 153,527 in November 2000.

EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE

(Tables 3, 7 and 9, Graphs 3, 7 and 9)

In November 2000 Emergency Assistance (EA) payments were made for 1,779 eligible TANF families and 390 SSI recipients in New Jersey. For TANF families this included payments for:

- Temporary Rental Assistance (TRA) for 204 families
- Motel placements for 249 families and emergency shelter placements for 383 families
- All other TANF-EA for 943 families (including back rent, back utilities, security deposits, furnishings, clothing and food allowance, or transitional housing)
- 496 families in Essex County, 167 in Passaic County, 154 in Monmouth County,
 149 in Middlesex.

In the past two years, the average number of EA payments for TANF families was 2,134 in 1998, and 1,861 for the twelve months of 1999. Payments were made to 11.9% less families in November 2000 as compared to October 2000.

- TRA payments were 11.5 % of the number in November 2000.
- Motel payments were up from two years ago.; 216 to 249.

TANF PARTICIPATION RATES

(Table 8, Graph 8)

The TANF participation rate for November 2000 was 40.59% for the State as a whole. This is an increase of 0.08 percentage points from October 2000.

Participation rates by county:

- Eight counties had a participation rate greater than 40 percent, Essex Monmouth, Morris
- Passaic, Salem, Somerset, Union and Warren.

GENERAL ASSISTANCE

(Table 9, Graph 9)

There were 23,895 GA recipients in December 1999, up from 23,274 in November.

There were 14,165 Employable GA and 9,730 Unemployable GA recipients in December 1999.





Explanatory Notes

The Department of Human Services Division of Family Development provides basic income and an opportunity to achieve self-sufficiency for individuals and families served by the Division's programs. The Division provides leadership, direction and supervision to those public agencies responsible for administering those programs and plans for and develops policies to promote self-sufficiency.

WORK FIRST NEW JERSEY (WFNJ) - Fully implemented July 1, 1997, this is New Jersey's welfare reform program which responds to the requirements of the Federal Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act (PRWORA) of 1996. PRWORA establishes Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) as the replacement for AFDC cash assistance. WFNJ includes two segments, WFNJ/TANF for families with children, and WFNJ/GA (General Assistance) for single adults and couples without dependent children. The emphasis is on achieving self-sufficiency and limits lifetime receipt of financial assistance to a total of five years.

Post TANF and Receiving Child Care - Persons no longer in receipt of TANF but still receiving child care. From Issuance Disbursement Summary (OMEGA report # RM703).

MEDICAID ONLY FAMILIES no longer receive TANF financial assistance but remain eligible for Medicaid under applicable provisions which extend coverage beyond the period of assistance. These are shown separately in these tables because cash assistance and Medicaid have been de-linked.

FOOD STAMP PROGRAM (FS) - Authorized by Congress as a nutritional supplement program to provide low income households with more food of greater variety and better nutrition. Program eligibility is based on household income, resources, and expenses for medical, shelter, and dependent care. CWA staff refer certain recipients to the New Jersey Department of Labor for participation in the Food Stamp Employment and Training Program.

EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE (EA) - Payments to those eligible for WFNJ/TANF or WFNJ/GA, authorized during the 30 consecutive days immediately following the emergency (defined as a substantial loss of shelter, food, clothing, or household furnishings by fire, flood or other similar disaster) or if the eligible individual or family is in an imminent or actual state of homelessness.
