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To the Governor, the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

The County and Municipal Law Revision Commission herewith submits a report on the effect of the Federal Census of 1960 upon counties and municipalities.

This report is divided into two sections. The first treats of the changes in counties, and the second treats of the changes in municipalities. That material which is not adaptable to chart or table form is set forth in a narrative. Basically, the changes shown in the narrative and tables are those having to do with changes in salaries of municipal and county positions and in the number of positions authorized. The salary information contained in this report was supplied by the Department of Civil Service.

Prospective changes due to the 1960 Federal Census have been determined by an analysis of the existing statutory law contained in Title 40 of the Revised Statutes (municipalities and counties) and other pertinent statutes throughout the Revised Statutes of 1937.

The burdensome task involved in preparing an analysis of this kind is manifest. Unless a new approach is taken to the salary and classification statutes, this task will have to be repeated every decade. The present revision of Title 40, being prepared by the County and Municipal Law Revision Commision, may solve most of the problems posed by those statutes which are in Title 40.

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I. COUNTY GOVERNMENT

The changes in key positions in county government generally will be two-fold: (1) increases in salary range and (2) increases in the number and type of positions authorized by statute. These changes will result from either a change in the classification of counties or a change in the population of counties. Presently, counties are classified by **R.S.** 40:17-2 as follows:

- Class I —population exceeding 600,000.
- Class II 200,000 to 600,000.
- Class III -50,000 to 200,000, except as below.
- Class IV —Less than 50,000, except as below.
- Class V Exceeding 100,000 and bordering on the Atlantic Ocean.
- Class VI —Not exceeding 100,000 and bordering on the Atlantic Ocean.

The effective date of the changes will depend upon whether the particular statutes involved are geared solely to changes in population or to a change in the classification of counties. Those changes depending upon a change in population will become effective as soon as the census officially is promulgated. Those dependent upon a change in classification will become effective on July 1, 1961, after the census is promulgated.

The usual provision for the fixing of salaries in county government leaves discretion in the board of chosen freeholders. **R.S.** 40:21-13. Table I will show the main positions in the counties that are restricted by statute to certain salary ranges. This Table also will indicate the changes in population growth and county classification. The salary provisions affected by statute range the entire gamut of county governmental personnel. Table I contains the salary ranges for non-judicial officers and employees. Table II contains the salary ranges for judicial officers.

The promulgation of the 1960 census will have its greatest impact upon Bergen County. On July 1, 1961, it will change from a second class county to a first class county, with a resulting expansion of its county government which is pointed out in detail in the charts contained herein. The county must establish the office of county supervisor. The Bergen County police force will come within **R.S.** 40:22-5, which confers police powers under **N.J.S.** 2A:171 and **R.S.** 39:1-1 et seq, which deal with observance of the Sabbath laws and the Motor Vehicle Act respectively. See Attorney General Formal Opinion No. 21 (1959).

Morris and Mercer counties each will come within the county population group wherein the county is permitted to contract with one or more municipalities within the county to provide for the municipality or municipalities entering into such contract any service that a municipality might provide for its inhabitants. The terms of such contracts are limited to 10 years. **N.J.S.A.** 40:23-6.26 to 6.29. Union County will cease to come within this contract authority. Other changes follow.

A. Freeholders.

Counties in New Jersey are governed either by small or large boards of freeholders. There are only 4 counties governed by the large boards: Atlantic, Cumberland, Gloucester and Salem.

1. Counties governed by a small board of freeholders.

Passaic, Camden and Middlesex counties will move from the 200,000 to 350,000 to the over 350,000 category and will, therefore, gain two additional freeholders. The new board will have 9 members. **N.J.S.** 40:20-20.

Morris County and Burlington County will be increased from 5 members to 7 members by moving out of the 100,000 to 200,000 and into the 200,000 to 350,000 category. **N.J.S.** 40:20-20. Somerset County and Ocean County will increase from 3 to 5 members by moving from the less than 100,000 category to the 100,000 to 200,000 category. N.J.S. 40:20-20. It is noted that Ocean County is not treated as a fifth or sixth class county under this section.

2. Counties governed by a large board of freeholders.

In Salem County there will be one additional freeholder from the Borough of Woodstown (population 2,345—1950 census). **R.S.** 40:20-67, 68. No other county having a large board will be affected by changing classification. However, Gloucester, Cumberland and Atlantic counties may have increases in the number of freeholders if any borough in these counties has gone beyond 2,300 in population, or any town divided into wards has increased in population beyond 8,000, or if the number of wards in any such towns have been increased. **R.S.** 40:20-62 et seq.

B. Judicial positions.

The changes in the County Court, County District Court and Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court mainly are given in Table II. Certain provisions not lending themselves to a table analysis follow:

Due to population change, County District Court Judges in Bergen County no longer may be assigned to sit in the County Court House. Such judges in Union, Passaic and Middlesex counties, however, will come within this provision. N.J.S.A. 2A:6-14.9.

The statutory provisions concerning salaries of District Court Judges indicate a need for thorough revision. As they presently read, there will be no provision respecting the salary of the single District Court Judge in Atlantic County, which is a fifth class county having a population in excess of 150,000. **N.J.S.** 2A:6-14 makes provision for fifth class counties having less than 150,000 inhabitants and a single District Court Judge, and for fifth class counties having more than 150,000 inhabitants and two District Court Judges. No other provisions are applicable.

A similar problem arises in Morris County. The 1950 population of Morris County was 164,000, and the county has three District Court Judges. N.J.S. 2A:6-14 has no provision for salaries in the case of a county in that population range having three judges. Sussex County is in a similar position.

C. Surrogate, Register of Deeds and Mortgages, Clerk and Sheriff.

As shown in Table I, a total of 14 counties will have changes in salary in these offices.

D. County Prosecutors.

The changes in salary range are given in Table I. Although in Burlington County the range in salary will remain the same, the applicable position will be N.J.S. 2A:158-10 rather than N.J.S. 2A:158-12.1. In Table I the present salary of the prosecutors in Salem and Hunterdon counties is given as \$5,000. N.J.S. 2A:158-11. No changes are indicated. It should be noted that there is some question as to the applicability of that maximum. N.J.S. 2A:158-11, which may apply, would fix the salary at \$4,000.

Monmouth County's population increase moves it above the range provided for fifth class counties in N.J.S. 2A:158-10, and will not come within any other category. There will be no statutory provision providing for the salary of the Prosecutor of Monmouth County.

Cumberland and Gloucester counties, which are presently entitled to one assistant prosecutor each, will become entitled to three assistant prosecutors each, one of which may be designated the first assistant. This will occur by reason of the acquisition of an additional county judge. **N.J.S.** 2A:158-15.

Bergen County, by moving into the classification of a first class county, will be authorized to appoint legal assistants to the county prosecutor. Not more than 12 persons may be appointed to this position at salaries ranging from \$6,000 to \$9,000. N.J.S. 2A: 158-18.1, 18.2.

E. County detectives and county investigators.

Bergen County, by becoming a first class county, acquires the right to appoint 12 additional county detectives, making a total of 24 detectives. N.J.S. 2A:157-3. Morris and Burlington counties may each appoint three additional county detectives, for a total of 12. N.J.S. 2A:157-4. Ocean County may appoint two additional county detectives, for a total of 6. N.J.S. 2A:157-8.

Bergen County also may appoint 15 additional county investigators, for a total of 24. **N.J.S.** 2A:157-11. Burlington and Morris counties may appoint 7 additional county investigators, for a total of 9. **N.J.S.** 2A:157-12. Salem and Hunterdon counties each may appoint one additional county investigator, for a total of two. **N.J.S.** 2A:157-13.

There is no provision authorizing county investigators for Atlantic County. Ocean County, by its population increase, will move from coverage by **N.J.S.** 2A:157-16 into the same position as Atlantic County.

Where the number of authorized county detectives and investigators would exceed the number of officers employed for the enforcement of criminal laws, approval for additional appointments first must be obtained in counties of the first class having a population of less than 800,000 persons from the Superior Court Assignment Judge of the county and in all other counties from the board of chosen freeholders. **N.J.S.** 2A:157-22.

F. Court attendants and constables.

At present, in Bergen County, court attendants of the Superior Court, County Court, Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court, and those coming under the office of the Sheriff are paid \$2,400 for the first year, with increments of \$200 per year until a maximum of \$3,400 in the sixth year with power in the board of freeholders to increase this salary beyond the maximum. N.J.S. 2A:11-36. Under the new county classification, court attendants will receive a salary ranging between \$4,500 and \$6,000 to be fixed by the board of freeholders with provision for increments within this range. 2A:11-34.

In addition, under the new classification for Bergen, sheriffs may appoint four persons to act as officers in charge of court attendants (N.J.S. 2A:11-35), whereas formerly they could only appoint two such persons (N.J.S. 2A:11-36.1). Under the new class, sheriffs also may assign one or more attendants to operate elevators to be used exclusively for prisoners. N.J.S. 2A:11-38.

The Superior Court Assignment Judge in Bergen County will continue to appoint the Sergeants at Arms and Court Criers, but his authority to do so will move from N.J.S. 2A:11-26 to N.J.S. 2A:11-21.

County Court Judges in Bergen County formerly appointed Sergeants at Arms at \$960 per year. N.J.S. 2A:11-27. Under the new classification, they will have authority to appoint both Sergeants at Arms and Court Criers but there is no salary provision. N.J.S. 2A:11-23, 24.

Overlapping provisions becloud the effect of change in salary of constables and court attendants in Morris and Burlington counties. It is difficult to determine whether Morris at present comes within N.J.S. 2A:11-42 or 43. It is fairly clear that Burlington at present comes under N.J.S. 2A:11-44. However, after the census is promulgated, it would appear that both N.J.S. 2A:11-40, 41 and N.J.S. 2A:11-43 apply.

N.J.S. 2A:11-46 provides that in counties having less than 150,000 persons, there may be a maximum of 10 constables, and in counties over 150,000 there may be 15 constables with one additional constable for each additional 20,000 persons. This would change the authorized number of constables in 12 counties as follows:

Atlantic County	from 10 to 15
Burlington County	from 10 to 18
Morris County	from 15 to 20
Monmouth County	from 18 to 24
Mercer County	from 18 to 20
Middlesex County	from 20 to 29
Camden County	from 22 to 27
Passaic County	from 23 to 27
Union County	from 27 to 32
Bergen County	from 34 to 46
Hudson County	from 39 to 38
Essex County	from 52 to 53

G. Grand Jury.

Mercer and Morris counties will each become entitled to a second Grand Jury 2A:71-6. In counties not coming within N.J.S. 2A:73-6, the salary of the clerk of the Grand Jury is fixed by the court.

H. Other provisions relating to court system.

Superior Court Judges may employ stenographers and fix their salaries between \$2,800 and \$3,400 except that in counties of the first class (Bergen County affected) the board of freeholders shall set the salary. N.J.S. 2A:11-9.

Any Superior Court Judge of two or more counties or of a second class county entitled to appoint a secretary may increase the salary of such secretary to that of a secretary-stenographer of the Superior Court Chancery Division. **N.J.S.** 2A:11-10.1. (Bergen County will cease to come within this section, and Burlington and Morris counties will come within this section.)

The Assignment Judge of the Superior Court in counties of the first, second, third and fifth class may designate a stenographer to act as assistant clerk to the Grand Jury without extra compensation, but the board of freeholders may provide extra compensation. N.J.S. 2A:73-7. (Hunterdon, Salem and Ocean counties will come within this section.)

In Bergen County, the Assignment Judge of the Superior Court will acquire the power to designate a county officer to act as librarian of the county law library if there is none at present. In such a case, the board of freeholders may fix additional compensation for such county court officer. N.J.S. 2A:11-37.

I. Other county personnel.

1. Jail keepers, in counties of the second and fifth classes with a population of more than 200,000, where the control of the jail has been taken over by the board of chosen freeholders, shall receive the same compensation as court attendants. **R.S.** 30:8-24.1. If Burlington, Morris and Ocean counties have jails under the control of the board of chosen freeholders, they will be affected.

2. Criminal Identification Bureau Officers.

There will be no change in salaries of criminal identification bureau officers since the salary range is geared to the 1940 Federal Census. **R.S.** 40:41-33.1.

3. Prison guards.

In Bergen County, guard keepers, industrial officers and guard orderlies in jails, houses of detention and penitentiaries will move into a salary range of \$2,000 to \$6,000. **R.S.** 30:8-13.1.

4. Bergen County also will be affected by the provisions of **R.S.** 30:8-15 which direct the board of chosen freeholders to appoint a warden for the county jail, a physician for the penitentiary and a physician for the county jail—each to serve for three-year terms.

5. Chief Medical Examiner.

Counties of the first class may create the office of chief medical examiner under **R.S.** 40:21-61 to 79. Counties of the second class may create the same office under **R.S.** 40:21-30 to 30.19. The two acts are worded similarly. Bergen county will be governed by the provision for a first class county. Burlington and Morris counties will come within **R.S.** 40:21-30.1 to 30.19.

6. Fire marshals.

This office may be established in counties of the second, third, fourth and fifth class with a maximum salary of \$1,000. There is no mention of first class or sixth class counties in any statute concerning fire marshals. **R.S.** 40:22-16 to 22. Bergen County no longer comes under these provisions, and Ocean County enters this category.

J. Office of the County Clerk.

In Middlesex County, the County Clerk will be authorized to create a court division and registry division within his office, and appoint a deputy clerk for each. **R.S.** 40:38-25.2 to 25.5.

Provisions concerning salaries of employees of the County Clerk's Office are geared to the 1940 Federal Census, **R.S.** 40:38-32, and there will be no changes.

K. Changes in county government.

The power of counties to contract with municipalities within the county for the providing by the county of services to the municipalities, affecting Mercer, Morris and Union counties, and the establishment of the office of county supervisor in Bergen County are discussed in the introduction to this narrative. Bergen County also is affected by **R.S.** 40:21-59 and 60 which provide that the county counsel and the county engineer in counties of the first class shall be appointed by the board of freeholders for three-year and five-year terms, respectively.

L. Hospitals.

Counties over 400,000 may establish a county hospital for sick, disabled, aged, mentally ill and communicable diseases, including tuberculosis. **R.S.** 30:9-12.1 to 12.14. Union, Passaic and Middlesex counties will come within these provisions.

County hospitals for communicable diseases in second class counties may abolish their board of managers and substitute the board of freeholders or a committee thereof. **R.S.** 30:9-38, 38.1. Burlington and Morris counties may be affected.

Counties of the fourth and sixth class not having a general hospital may give \$10,000 to any hospital within the county for the care of indigent residents. Salem, Hunterdon and Ocean counties will cease to be in this category. **R.S.** 44:5-19.

Certain provisions will affect only Bergen County:

1. Counties of the first class may have maternity hospitals. R.S. 30:9-24.

2. Public assistance provides for municipal hospital care for indigents in counties of the first class. **R.S.** 44:8-146 to 152.

3. In counties other than the first class (this provision will cease to apply to Bergen County), the board of freeholders may make annual appropriations not exceeding 1/12 of 1% of the assessed valuation of real estate in the county to charitable hospitals. Such amounts are not to exceed the deficit of such hospital. **R.S.** 44:5-16.

4. In counties of the first class the board of freeholders may provide for the care of resident indigents upon the certification of the county physician and the approval of the board of freeholders. The board may appropriate up to \$5,000 per hospital for this purpose. **R.S.** 44:5-17, 18.

5. Counties of the first class having a hospital for communicable diseases may use the hospital as an annex to the county almshouse to provide a sick bay, provided the space is not needed for persons with communicable diseases. **R.S.** 30:9-44.1, 44.2.

M. Vocational schools.

Vocational schools are authorized where not presently existing in counties of the second class. **R.S.** 18:15-58.1 to 58.19. Burlington and Morris counties will acquire this new authority.

N. Registration and voting.

The clerk of the board of freeholders in counties of the first class and the secretary of the board of freeholders in other counties are constituted commissioners of registration. The commissioner in counties of the first class and the board in all other counties have complete charge of permanent registration. **R.S.** 19:31-2. Bergen County is affected.

In counties of the first class, the commissioner receives a salary from \$2,500 to \$7,-500; in counties of the second class having a superintendent, \$1,000; and in counties of the second class not having a superintendent, the commissioner receives his salary as a member and secretary plus 50% additional.

Burlington County will acquire the power to establish the office of superintendent of elections. The statute provides that this office once established shall not be abolished. **R.S.** 19:32-26 to 53.

O. Governmental services.

Counties in the first and second class may establish a county sewerage authority. Burlington and Morris counties will acquire this power. **R.S.** 40:36A-1 to 63.

A second class county may establish a water supply commission having 7 members, who shall serve without compensation. Burlington and Morris counties will acquire this authority. **R.S.** 40:36-1 to 3.

County-owned quarries in counties of the second, third and fifth class are required to furnish stones free to the municipalities within the county. **R.S.** 40:23-28. Bergen County will cease to come within this provision, and Salem, Hunterdon and Ocean will enter the coverage of this provision.

P. County Boards of Taxation.

The county boards of taxation in each county are composed of three members each except for first class counties which have 5 members. **R.S.** 54:3-2. Bergen County's board of taxation will increase from three members to 5 members. The salaries of members of boards of taxation are given on Table. I The member acting as president of the board receives \$500.00 additional salary. **R.S.** 54:3-6.

Q. Miscellaneous.

Second class counties over 400,000 population may adopt a standard plumbing code. **R.S.** 26:3C-1 to 3. Union, Passaic and Middlesex counties will enter this category.

Counties other than first class may make appropriations for museum purposes. R.S. 40:23-6.22. Bergen County will lose this power.

County employees' requests for deductions of group insurance premiums ordinarily are automatic. They are made with the approval of the board of freeholders in counties of the first class. (Bergen County affected.)

Counties of the first, second, third and fifth classes may issue bonds for airport purposes. R.S. 40:28-4. Hunterdon, Salem and Ocean counties will acquire this power.

Counties of the second class may acquire or maintain land improved by the Federal government for park purposes, provided the county has not adopted any other law for maintaining a park commission. **R.S.** 40:37-252 to 260.

All counties, except counties of the first class, having a board of managers appointed under **R.S.** 30:9-45 to 60 may appoint a county nurse. **R.S.** 40:21-45 to 47.

The superintendent of welfare in counties having a population between 350,000 and 600,000 shall enjoy tenure after 15 years. **R.S.** 40:21-47.1. Passaic, Camden and Middlesex counties are affected.

The tables which follow illustrate in detail the principal salary changes in non-judicial positions and changes in salary and numbers of positions in judicial offices which will occur as a result of the 1960 Census.

II. Municipal Government.

The analysis of municipal government is set out in narrative, chart and table form.

Where the name of a municipality is underlined in the narrative or chart, this indicates that there has been a change effected by the 1960 Census.

This part of the report analyzes the compensation of municipal officers, the classification of municipalities, and the effect of the Census on ward lines, departments and personnel, size of governing bodies, election procedure and other areas of municipal law which are affected by changes in population of municipalities and changes in classification of counties and municipalities.

COMPENSATION OF MUNICIPAL OFFICERS

In the absence of provision to the contrary, the compensation of the chief executive officer and governing body of a municipality must be fixed by its legal voters. **R.S.** 40:46-23.

To this there are exceptions, both express and implied.

A. Express Exceptions: R.S. 40:46-23.

1. Municipalities of more than 20,000 population, the governing body shall fix the salary of the mayor by ordinance.

2. Municipalities located in counties of the third and fifth classes over 80,000 population in which the legal voters have not fixed the compensation of the chief executive officer and governing body, the governing body may, by ordinance, fix the salary of the mayor and members of the governing body at not in excess of \$1,000 in municipalities up to 12,000 population and not in excess of \$2,500 in municipalities having a population of more than 12,000.

3. Municipalities governed by the commission form of government. See Charts 6 and 10.

4. Municipalities governed by municipal manager government. See Charts 13 and 15.

5. Boroughs located in counties of the fourth and sixth classes. See Chart 27C.

6. Townships having a population between 9,000 and 14,000. See Chart 34A.

7. Townships located in counties of the sixth class. See Chart 34C.

8. Cities of the fourth class in counties of the sixth class. In such cities the members of the governing body may by ordinance fix the compensation for the mayor at not exceeding \$3,500 and for the members of the governing body at not exceeding \$1,000.
