By the feregoing statement it appears that the indebtedness of the State on civil account is \$35,139.68. The subscription for the increased Capital Stock of the Joint Companies, authorized by Joint Resolution No. 1, approved February 4, 1867, was made for 721 shares, which was sold, realizing a premium of \$15,878.25.

There were also two dividends of five per cent. (\$14,435 each) paid; the last (August dividend) was made payable in stock ($144\frac{7}{20}$ shares) at par, which was sold for \$18,098.80, making the total amount of income received from the stock held by the State \$48,-412.05.

To meet the demands on the Treasury there was transferred to the State Fund, \$35,139.68; to the School Fund, \$14,874.37; which with the balance, \$2,688.33 in Bank, makes the total amount standing to the credit of the War Fund, \$52,702.48.

SCHOOL FUND.

The income of the School Fund being insufficient to meet the annual appropriation for the support of Public Schools, the deficiency was made up by a transfer of \$14,874.47 which is now due the War Fund. All the interest due on the Securities in my possession has been paid. By order of the Board of Trustees there were placed in the hands of the Attorney General for foreclosure the Bonds and Mortgages (amounting to \$39,807.89) of those persons who were delinquent in paying the interest due and over due, varying from one
